The race commenced in a parking lot at Palomar Shopping Center

on Harrodsburg Road in Lexington far earlier than I thought it should have started and traversed miles of blacktop that had already been poured around the countryside in anticipation of mansions to come. Many muddy lots, lots of road, but not a house in sight. A potentially ritzy Lexington subdivision wannabe that was going to get lots of local attention (free advertising) on television.

So I put on my old black sweat pants, knocked the dirt out of the treads on my Reeboks and donned an old XL Camp Shawnee t-shirt. I drove into the parking lot and it was like the Olympics. Two or three hundred skinnibones and tanned athletic types in those skimpy little see-through nylon wisps of material they call running shorts were dancing around showing off jock straps and running bras and other athletic underwear and bending over and touching their toes a lot to make sure everybody had a glance if they didn't have much imagination.

Not the kind of crowd you want to smoke in so I ran back out to the truck and fired up a Winston.

If you're going to run 7.84 miles or whatever without a smoke break, it's my opinion that you get that last nicotine fix in as close to the start of the race as possible.





Locally, five people have already filed for the Mayor's position in Mt. Vernon.

They are current Mayor Karen King, council members Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner, respiratory patient Jody Adams and Doug Bullock, the most recent to file.

Bullock is 47 and he and his wife, Jewel have three children. Jewel is also the twin sister of Sheriff-Elect Darrell Doan.

"I believe everyone in the city deserves good paved streets along with a state of the art water and sewer service," he said.

"I have installed a lot of the water sewer lines in the area and I helped build the sewer treatment plant," he added.

"Some of my best qualities are the way I get along with everyone and I really like living in Mt. Vernon," he added.

The only person to file for city council in Mt. Vernon is Matt Bryant, a former police officer.

No one has filed for school board in division one and three. Sam Stallsworth is the incumbent in division one and Dr. G.W. Griffith, who is the current board chairman is the incumbent in division three. Division one is comprised of East and West Livingston and South Mt. Vernon.

Division three is made up of the precincts: North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon and Bullock.

To run for Mayor you must be 25 years-old, a resident of the city for a year, have two signatures from voters inside the city and pay a \$200 fee.

The same is true of city council hopefuls, but they must be only 21 years of age.

School board candidates must be 24 years-old and lived in Kentucky for the past three years.

They must also have a high school diploma or G.E.D.

To run a candidate must have 20 signatures from voters in his or her division and pay a fee of \$200.

The deadline to register for all city and school board offices is August 13th.

Rockcastle Countians can register to vote or change their party affiliation until October 8th.

One thing that might make the City of Mt. Vernon's mayoral race a little more interesting this year is the fact that the job now pays \$3,000 per month. The benefits include health insurance and state retirement.

No candidates have filed in Brodhead nor Livingston or for school board as of yet.



R. D. of Mineral Point, Missouri asks: "When 46 drivers show up for a race, where does NASCAR come up with allowing only 43 to start the race? Why not let all drivers who show up to race. When a driver brings car, equipment, etc to a race track and doesn't get to race, that's expensive."

"You're right R. D., it's not only expensive to race, but it's bad for the car's sponsor when a team doesn't make the race. NASCAR limits the size of the field in Winston Cup and Busch Series races to 43 entries. That's their rule. That's just the way it is. The starting field in the Craftsman Truck Series events is limited to 36 trucks.

For tracks like Daytona and Talladega, the number of cars could be increased, but on small tracks like Martinsville and Bristol, 43 is the maximum number the track size could accommodate.

"Whether a team makes the race or not, it costs over \$200,000 just to build and get each car to a race. If a driver doesn't make the race, then the sponsor has lost all their advertising money they invested in that car for that race. While the team doesn't lose the money it cost to build a car, it does lose all the money and time invested getting the team to and from the track.

This is just one of the reasons it costs so much to win in Winston Cup and Busch.

Never Grab a Cat by the Tail





"What Saith the Scriptures"

The past few weeks we have been studying the importance of taking things in context. Let's look at another example.

In Paul's description of the Lord's supper we read, "After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood; they do so as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me." (1 Cor. 11:25) Now we are told by some that "this cup" has reference to the drinking vessel and we are to use only one in the Lord's supper, and that this cup - a drinking vessel, is an emblem of the New Testament. [Now certainly there is nothing wrong with using one drinking vessel in the observance of the Lord's supper.] But if we notice the context, this explanation cannot be so. "For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come." (1 Cor. 11:26) Notice Paul said "drink this cup". Now if those who say we are to use one drinking vessel, could demonstrate how you can drink a glass or metal vessel, "drink this cup" I would go along with their conclusions. But the language in context shows that a figure of speech is being used when we read about "this cup" in the Lord's supper here.



Crop Reports A Must!
Producers with crops such as tobacco, corn, soybeans, hay, pasture, vegetable, etc. may report the planted acres to the FSA office now through July 15, 2002.

All farms with an effective quota greater than zero (0) must file a FSA 578. Report of Crop Acreage, no later than July 1st. Reports filed after the deadline will be subject to a late file fee. Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective quota that will not plant or lease quota away from the farm MUST file a zero acreage report, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota not established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

We strongly urge producers to contact the office and request an appointment prior to filing the report. You may do so by calling 256-2523 extension 100.

2002 Marketing Year Penalty Rates
The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the penalty rates that will be charged producers for marketing excess tobacco for the 2002 marketing year.

According to James R. Little, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency, the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 Section 314, as amended, provides for these penalties and sets a penalty rate of 75 percent of the average market price for that kind of tobacco for the previous market year. For the 2002 market year Burley tobacco (type 31) the rate per pound will be \$1.48 per pound.

Burley Tobacco Leasing.
Producers may lease burley tobacco quota effective immediately through July 1st. Producers may list quota for lease on the bulletin board space by way of contacting the county office either in person or by telephone.

Warehouse Designation
As a condition of price support beginning with the 2001 crop year for tobacco; producers were required to inform FSA of the warehouse within which they would market tobacco. This is acquired by completing the form FSA 808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Initial designation will end August 1, 2002. Producers are encouraged to complete this form after all lease and transfers have been updated. After the initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day during the following regular redesignation periods:

- September 30-October 4, 2002, with card effective October 14, 2002.
- October 28-November 1, 2002, with card effective November 11, 2002.
- December 02-December 06, 2002, with card effective December 16, 2002.
- December 27-January 3, 2003, with card effective January 13, 2003.

The warehouse will be indicated with a number on the market card. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, you must return that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

Tobacco Spot Checks
Producers who have reported unmarketed tobacco stored on the farms as subject for random spot checks. Spot checks are performed by local FSA personnel to verify the amount of tobacco reported. These spot checks will be carried out during the next few months. If you have moved tobacco from where you first reported the storage, please contact FSA to report the new location.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder
Producers with Production Flexibility contracts (PFCs) authorized

under AMTA in the 1996 farm bill must continue to follow contract requirements for the 2002 crop year. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY2002 is August 1, 2002. PFC payments for the 2002 crop year will continue to be issued, as requested, until September 30, 2002, provided all eligibility requirements have been met.

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contracts) payments early must submit a form for which you wish to receive your 2002 payment.

Producers are encouraged not to request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion of the entire farm as payment received must be refunded. Changes in your farming operations must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer. All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1, 2002.

New Farm Bill
On May 13, 2002 President Bush signed into law the 2002 Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002.

FSA will be using all available means to provide you with complete and timely information the new program and provisions by way of direct mailings, new releases, fact sheets, county newsletters and public meetings. Frequently updated information will be posted on the web site at <http://www.usda.gov/pas/farmland>.

The website will include farm bill program details, questions and answers, program applications and sign-up forms, as well as other important materials from USDA agencies on farm bill implementation. The website will also contain advanced electronic applications to help program beneficiaries receive program benefits faster and more efficiently.

Loan Deficiency Payment (LDP) Eligibility

In accordance with the provisions of the new farm bill, FSA has recently issued LDP eligibility recommendations grown in 2001 on nonparticipating farms. In addition a special beneficial interest waiver will be available to producers who marketed 2001 commodities before applying for their LDP payment.

The ending date for applications will be announced by FSA as soon as regulations are published. Producers who previously requested LDP's, but were disapproved based on lost beneficial interest, will be able to apply for their LDP on the 2001 production year.

August 1, 2002 - Deadline to sign or revise the 2002 PFC contracts.
