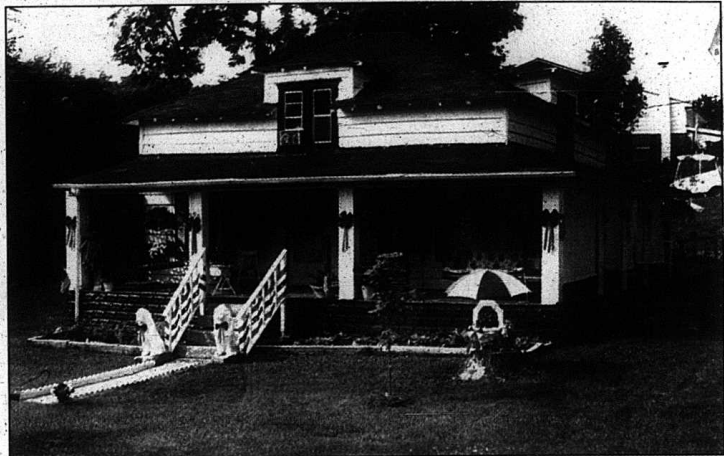

Meth is problem for Rockcastle, southeast Ky.

Jeff Burdette says the manufacturing and selling of the illegal substance Methamphetamine (Meth) is the current biggest drug problem in Southeast Kentucky, including Rockcastle County.

"It is no doubt the poor man's cocaine, but the problem stretches across all classes of families," he said.

"The good news is that we have made great strides in putting the brakes on the problem in this county in the last couple of years and a lot of people responsible for making and selling the illegal drug are in jail," he said.

"There are a lot more sentences in the works - especially in federal court, which means more drug dealers and manufacturers will be off the streets," he said.

"They have got making the stuff down to an art," said Mt. Vernon Police Officer Barry Adams.

Adams, who also works with the Federal Drug Enforcement Agency based in London, said the problem with Meth is that most people have what it takes to make some form of it in their garage. Some of the ingredients used are, batteries, lighter fluid, Sudafed tablets, anti-freeze and Red Devil lye.

"There are different forms and strengths of the drug, depending on who makes it, but any form is very dangerous," Adams said.

Adams, who has had special training concerning the manufacturing of the drug, said that when people first started making the drug, they would make it into a crystallized type of powder and snort it.

"A lot of them have started making the liquid form and inject-

"They can make it in their homes, barns, inside cars and even in the woods. If they can get the right ingredients and have a pot and a hot fire," he said.

Of the last 116 indictments returned by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury in the last eighteen months, over half of those have involved either the manufacturing of Meth, possession of the drug for use, or possession of the drug for sale.

The Webster dictionary defines Methamphetamine as "An amine derivative of amphetamine used in the form of its crystalline hydrochloride as a stimulant."

"If you could see some of these people after they have taken some of this drug, you'd definitely know it is a stimulant," Adams said.

Burdette praised the help of retailers, who have notified police when large quantities of items needed to make Meth are bought.

"They (the retailers) have been very cooperative and helpful with a lot of our worst repeat offenders," Burdette said.

Burdette said that he expects more indictments involving Meth when the Rockcastle Grand Jury meets later this month.

City of Mt. Vernon passes new budget

The Mt. Vernon city council voted 3-2 on Monday night to pass the first reading of their 2002-03 budget.

Council members, Lonetta Daugherty, Wayne Bullock and Joe Mullins voted in favor of the budget, while council members Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner voted against it.

Both said on Tuesday that they were very uncomfortable with the proposed budget and Mrs. Kirby said it was very hard for anyone to understand.

In a memo to the council in June, the Mayor said the council should think about several ways

to increase revenues, such as raising the payroll tax to half percent to one percent, raising water and sewer rates, a restaurant tax, an insurance tax above the one the county already has and cutting expenses to meet the city's revenues, such as laying off employees or cutting benefits.

The Kentucky Cabinet for Workforce Development announced this week that Rockcastle County's unemployment rate had increased from April to May by seven tenths of a point.

Rockcastle's jobless rate stands at 6 percent, while the state's is 5.1.

Although the county's rate increased slightly, from April to May, it is still 6.9 percent lower than the previous year's rate, which stood at 12.9 percent.

6007 Rockcastle Countians were employed in May and 385 were unemployed.

The lowest unemployment rate in Kentucky was recorded in Woodford, Oldham and Jessamine Counties. All three had a rate of 2.7 percent. The highest unemployment rate was recorded in Magoffin County, which had a rate of 13 percent.

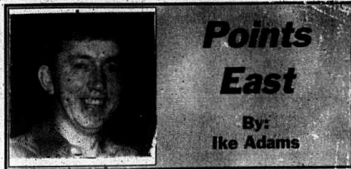
The sixty-day registration period provided under federal law closes Monday, July 8.

I'd like to preface this column by saying that I normally hate cold weather. Next to despising cold weather, I hate droughts.

The bottom line to all that is that central Kentucky spent nearly a year and a half drying out during the last half of 2000 and all of 2001. I watered my garden with a hose attached to public water so much and so often last year that what few vegetables I grew tasted like Clorox which is what I assume the Garrard County Water District uses to purify dead carp, catfish, cows and human fecal bacteria which are so abundantly distributed in our water supply.

Then we got a series of late season frosts in the Spring of this year. The last one, which has to be some kind of record, wiped out my garden on May 29 when the temp dropped to 29 degrees here in the lowest part of Lowell Branch. Figure in rhinos, hippos, camels, wildbeests, water-buffaloes, and any number of other mammals and Noah had to have a lot more room than the Bible accredited to that ark. Me and the neighbors couldn't even float a baby elephant if we worked at it for the next ten years and there's no evidence that Noah had state-of-the-art power tools. So call me skeptical about the Ark story—especially if I have to feed the water buffalo.....

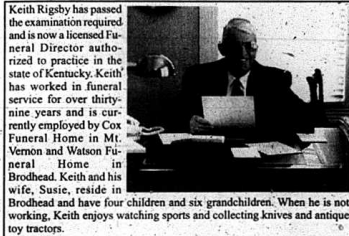
He also had the privilege of at-

Cadets attend Summer Camp

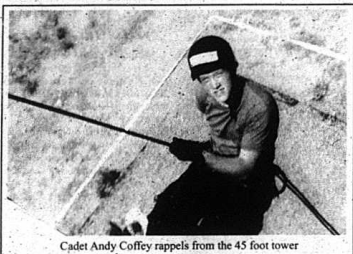
Rockcastle County High School Army JROTC Cadets spent the week of June 17th attending the JROTC Summer Camp at the Wendell H. Ford Regional Training Center near Greenville. The camp included approximately 500 cadets from over 50 high schools in Kentucky, Tennessee, and Ohio.

The cadets held leadership positions within each company and led morning physical training sessions. The training included rappelling off a 45 foot tower, water survival training, rifle marksmanship training, pontoon boat operations, an obstacle course, problem solving and decision making on the Field Leadership Reaction Course, construction of a concrete bridge across a stream site, land navigation course and a physical fitness test. Cadets also got to ride between training sites in M113 Armored Personnel Carriers provided by the Kentucky National Guard.

Cadets lived in open bay barracks with cadets from other high schools and dined in an army style dining

facility. On the second evening cadets participated in competitive intramural sports including volleyball, tug-of-war and a two mile relay team. Rockcastle cadets who were in the 1st Platoon of Company B won the volleyball and tug-of-war competition and took second in the two mile relay. On the third evening cadets got a night out in Greenville with Major Jim McGuire, the JROTC Senior Army Instructor. The activities included dinner at a steak house, bowling and some shopping at the local Wal-Mart.

SGM Taylor, Rockcastle County Army JROTC Instructor, worked the camp as the committee chief in charge of the Basic Rifle Marksmanship Training. Major McGuire accompanied the Rockcastle cadets who included Joe Husband, Andy Coffey, Jesse McCollum and Billy Shackelford. The cadets received some invaluable leadership and confidence training, team building and problem solving skills, but most of all had a fun and exciting time at Summer Camp 2002.

Cadet Husband wins Leadership Award

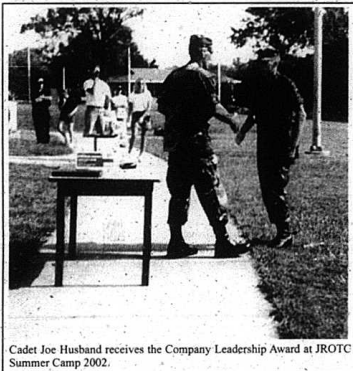

Local educators featured at 2nd Annual Governor's Literacy Summit

A team of Rockcastle County educators was chosen to present ideas on district leadership for literacy at the second annual Governor's Literacy Summit at the Galt House Hotel in Louisville.

This one-day conference brought together 250 educators and community representatives from a wide range of organizations dedicated to improving literacy in Kentucky. Participants considered effective plans to improve reading outcomes and heard from successful programs that address literacy from early childhood through adulthood.

Superintendent Larry Hammond, Instructional Supervisor Shelby Reynolds and Title One Coordinator Claudimnia Cash presented a session on ways school districts can support all schools in their work to continually improve reading achievement.

Achieving "100 percent literacy for Kentuckians of all ages" is Governor Paul E. Patton's vision for education in Kentucky. The Literacy Summit gave Hammond, Reynolds and Cash an opportunity to demonstrate Rockcastle County's progress in reaching that vision.

At this year's Summit, the Kentucky Literacy Partnership released "Read to Succeed: A Literacy Plan for Kentucky," and reported on progress of the Partnership agencies during the past year.

"Literacy is the gateway to a better quality of life and we want all Kentuckians to be able to pass through that gateway," said Governor Patton. "We've started a number of initiatives to move us toward that goal, and now is the time to align the initiatives to continue our momentum."

The 2002 Governor's Literacy Summit was sponsored this year by the Kentucky Institute for Family Literacy, a division of the National Kentucky Literacy Partnership. Members of the Partnership include

Kentucky Department of Education, the Department for Adult Education and Literacy, the Council on Postsecondary Education, the Governor's Office of Early Childhood Development, the Education Professional Standards Board and the Collaborative Center for Literacy Development.

Governor Patton established the Kentucky Literacy Partnership by executive order on April 26, 1999. Its purpose is to coordinate statewide literacy efforts among the public and community entities that share an interest in improving the reading and literacy skills of children and adults throughout Kentucky.

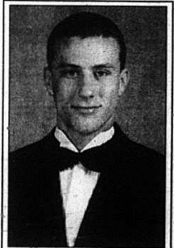

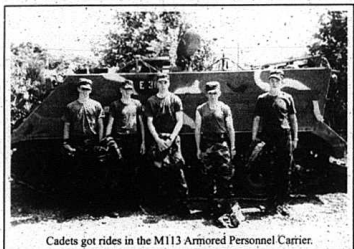

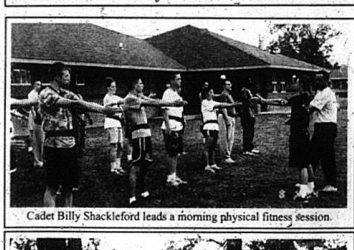

includes the Mayor's salary of \$3,000 per month, beginning in January and salaries for Rader and other employees at city hall.

The budget also includes \$1 million dollars to operate the water department and \$475,000 to operate the sewer department, which is projected to be \$60,000 more than the city will take in sewer user fees.

The budget also indicates the city is expecting a shortfall of \$40,000 in the water department.

Mrs. Kirby also said that it was her understanding that the city spent \$180,000 more last year than they had budgeted and had had to borrow some monies from the water and sewer funds to make ends meet.

By Law, the city is required to

have their budget passed and in place by July 1. That obviously is not the case.

The Signal will take a more in-depth look at the proposed budget in next week's Signal, after an interview with Mayor King, scheduled for next Monday.

Montgomery further stated that James Steven Bradley, 38, of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced on February 9, 2001, to a period of two years imprisonment probated for a period of two years for the offenses of two counts of theft by

Bradley admitted that he failed to report to his probation officer, failed to refrain from the use of alcohol, failed to refrain from the use of a controlled substance and failed to attend substance abuse treatment, while on probation. 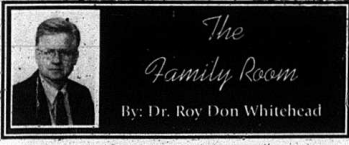

Shelter Stories from

Bethany House
Bethany House Abuse Shelter has provided help for victims of domestic violence for many years. Many women (and men) have been helped. The following stories are true but identities have been disguised to protect privacy.

1. Martha, a former resident, called Bethany House from Vermont. She was on a three-week trip with her truck driver husband. She had been a resident of the shelter until a few weeks ago when she went back to be with her husband. He had promised that he had quit doing drugs and said he had been clean on two drug screens at work. He also promised to get counseling help for his problems. He had been physically abusive to Martha when he was on drugs. "I was stupid to believe him," Martha told the staff member who talked with her. "He has hit me again. I have twenty stitches in my face, and we are on the road for another week."

After discussing her options, the staff member reminded her that she could return to Bethany House. "Oh, I'll be there just as soon as we get home," Martha promised. "I just wanted to call and talk to you, but I'll be back."

2. Darla was the victim of physical and verbal abuse by her husband when she came to Bethany House. She was the youngest of two children. Her father had died when she was young and her older brother and mother had taken care of her. She had left her husband several times when he was abusive and would always go home to Mom and Brother. They would take care of her and her two daughters until she decided to return to her husband. This was her first stay in an abuse shelter.

During her several months at Bethany House the staff could see changes in Darla. She took more re-

sponsibility for herself and her children. She found a job and soon found an apartment. She cried the day she moved out, but it was important for her to get out on her own. She was becoming on her own with Mom and Brother could never create, a fully functioning adult.

3. Karen and her husband were well-known and liked in their community. He was a respected professional, and she was a homemaker who raised their two children. Friends who saw them at church thought they had a good marriage.

The truth began to come out only after Karen came to Bethany House Abuse Shelter.

John was a rage-abolic who verbally and physically abused her. In his rages he would destroy furniture and threaten to kill her. He had pointed a gun at her and had once put several bullet holes in their walls. As the rages worsened, Karen became afraid for her life. Finally, she left and came to Bethany House.

John was obsessed with Karen. She had a very difficult time getting him out of her life. This was partly because she felt sorry for him and wanted him to get help. Counseling at Bethany House helped her to see that John emmeshed she was in her relationship with John.

After she moved to an apartment, he continued to stalk her. He would show up at her door late at night, "just to talk," he said. These encounters usually ended with him threatening to hurt her unless she came back home. She continued in counseling at Bethany House to help her deal with John.

It took more than a year before John would leave her alone, but finally the encounters stopped. Because of her determination and the help she received, Karen was able to resume a normal life.

Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, FSA Director

Crop Reports A Must!

Producers with crops such as tobacco, corn, soybeans, hay, pasture, vegetable, etc. may report the planted acres to the FSA office now through July 15, 2002.

All farms with an effective quota greater than zero (0) must file a FSA 578. Report of Crop Acreage, no later than July 1st. Reports filed after the deadline will be subject to a late file fee. Marketing cards will NOT be issued without a crop report on file.

Farms with an effective quota that will not plant or lease quota away from the farm MUST file a zero acreage report, or the farm will be subject to quota forfeiture for the applicable burley marketing quota nest established for the farm, unless the State Committee and the County Committee determine that the reduction is not applicable.

We strongly urge producers to contact the office and request an appointment prior to filing the report. You may do so by calling 256-2525 extension 100.

Warehouse Designation
As a condition of price support beginning with the 2001 crop year for tobacco, producers were required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they would market tobacco. This is acquired by completing the form FSA 808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold.

Initial designation will end August 1, 2003. Producers are encouraged to complete this form after all lease and transfers have been updated. After the initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day during the following regular redesignation periods:

- September 30-October 4, 2002, with card effective October 14, 2002.
- October 28-November 1, 2002, with card effective November 11, 2002.
- December 02-December 06, 2002, with card effective December 16, 2002.
- December 27-January 3, 2003, with card effective January 13, 2003.

The warehouse will be indicated with a number on the market card. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, you must return that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

2002 Marketing Year Penalty Rates
The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced the penalty

rates that will be charged producers, dealers and warehouse operators for marketing excess tobacco during the 2002 marketing year.

According to James R. Little, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency, the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 Section 314, as amended, provides for these penalties and sets a penalty rate of 75 percent of the average market price for that kind of tobacco for the previous market year. For the 2002 market year Burley tobacco (type 31) the rate of penalty shall be \$148 per pound.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder
Producers with Production Flexibility contracts (PFCs) authorized under AMTA in the 1996 farm bill must continue to follow contract requirements for the 2002 crop year. The deadline to sign or revise a PFC for FY2002 is August 1, 2002. PFC payments for the 2002 crop year will continue to be issued, as requested, until September 30, 2002, provided all eligibility requirements have been met.

Producers who wish to receive their 2002 PFC (Production Flexibility Contract) payments early must sign a form for what month you wish to receive your 2002 payment.

Producers are encouraged not to request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion of the entire farm as payment received must be refunded. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer. All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1st.

Continuous CRP Sign-Up
Eligible acreage meeting certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt tolerance, and other practices that create water areas for wildlife may be enrolled at any time under CCC's continuous CRP sign-up. These practices are not subject to competitive bidding. For more information, contact your local FSA office.

County Committee Monthly Meeting
The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (COC) will hold monthly meetings open to the public the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, July 11, 2002.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA as the local body by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal

laws and applying their judgement and knowledge to make decisions.

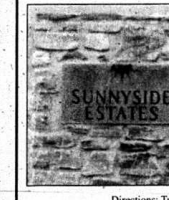

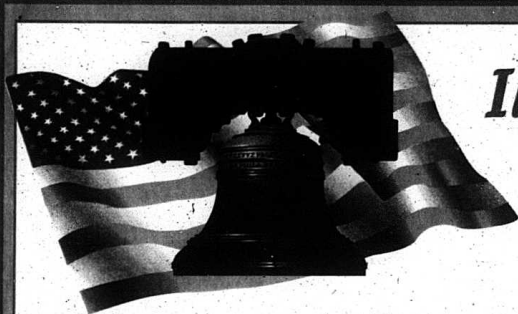
