

Contract (PFC) farms. In addition a special beneficial interest waiver will be available to producers who mat-keted 2001 crop year eligibility com-modities before applying for their LDP payment.

Because the Act provided authority to accept LDP requests on commodities produced on non-PFC farms beyond the final loan availability date, the provision was extended to

beyond the final loan availability date, the provision was extended to include PFC farms to ensure program equity among all producers of eligible contract commodities.

The ending date for application will be announced by FSA as soon as regulations are published: Producers who previously requested LDPs, but were disapproved based not beneficial interest, will be able to apply for their LDP on that 2001 production.
