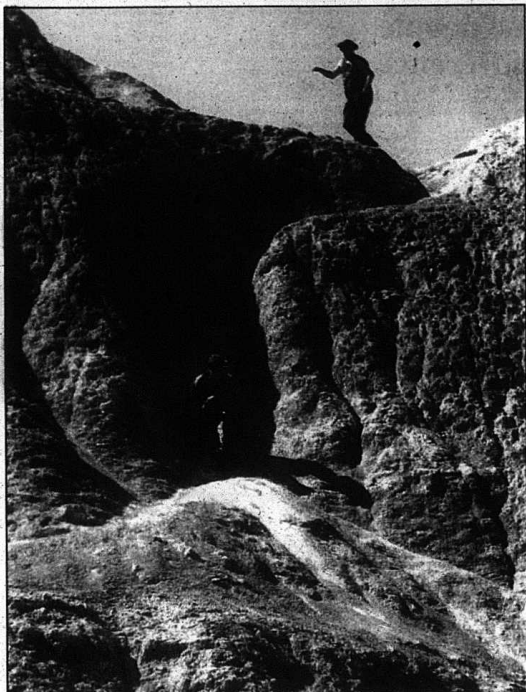

Only one more week until the American Cancer Society Relay for Life on Friday, August 2nd at the Rockcastle County Middle School football field and track. The event will start at 7 p.m. with an opening ceremony and a survivor walk to begin the evening's activities. There

will be entertainment throughout the evening by: Josh Bray, Dorothy Cromer Teague, Amber Thacker, The Bittersweet Cloggers, The Hunt Sisters (Cari and Casey Hunt) and Dog Leg Right. A live auction will also be taking place during the evening. Several of the participating relay

teams will also have activities taking place at their campsites for adults and children who attend the event. After sunset (about 10 p.m.) luminaries decorated with the names of those who have battled cancer will be lit and left glowing throughout the night (Cont. to A-11)

Flat Rock Baptist remember loved ones

Flat Rock Baptist Church will have two teams participating in the Relay for Life. The church has five cancer survivors in their family and in a year and a half seven members of their church lost their lives to cancer.

Daria Reams, team captain for one of the two teams, is a cancer survivor who teaches at Roundstone Elementary School. Kaye Mason, a Rockcastle County Hospital employee, is the team captain for the youth team. Kaye's sister-in-law,

Indictments returned for numerous serious crimes

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down indictments last week for alleged crimes ranging from attempted murder to sexual abuse of a minor.

Four men were indicted in connection with a March 10th shooting on Negro Creek Road, that injured a local woman.

Floyd Neeley, 31, of Berea, was indicted on a charge of attempted murder. Neeley is charged with allegedly trying to kill Donnie Jones that March night, but instead, Melissa Lawson, 23, of Brodhead was shot twice.

Police said that Jones' trailer on Negro Creek was hit 13 times by gunfire around 1 a.m.

At the time, police said it was a drive-by shooting, but later reported that Neeley had allegedly been paid with illegal drug methamphetamine to kill Jones.

Indicted at the same time as Neeley was the alleged person who wanted Jones, 26, killed.

Henry Baker, 32, of Crab Orchard and his brother Benny Baker, 35, have also been charged in Lincoln County.

Also indicted in the same case was Jason Caldwell, 19, of Mt. Vernon, who has pled guilty in Lincoln County to other charges and apparently is turning state's evidence.

Earl Overbay, 36, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon was indicted on four counts of sexual abuse involving an underage family member.

Christopher Collins, 27, of Rt. 4, Mt. Vernon, was also indicted in connection with an alleged sex crime.

Collins is accused of sexual abuse of a sex crime involving a family member.

Michael Denny, 34, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for allegedly trying to obtain a false prescription for Tylox.

Billy Joe Spoonamore, 58, of Mt. Vernon was indicted for running off from a Work Release Detail on January 31st. He is still not in custody.

Winslow Marcum, 42, and Roy Blevins 35, both of Gray also are accused of walking away from a work

release program on March 8th. They are both back in custody.

Arthur Bishop, 57, of Mt. Vernon was indicted on a count of Wanton Endangerment in the second degree and later, his charge was reduced to a misdemeanor by Circuit Judge William Cain.

Walter B. Price, 50, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon was indicted on six counts, which apparently involved a traffic stop last November.

Price is accused of manufacturing Methamphetamine, possessing the drug, possessing scales and other drug paraphernalia while in possession of a firearm, operating a vehicle under the influence of drugs or alcohol, operating a vehicle on a suspended license and running from police.

Dalmas James Doan, 35, of Mt. Vernon, was also indicted for an alleged drug related crime.

Doan is accused of possessing Methamphetamine last November.

Thomas Renner, 33, of Mt. Vernon was also indicted on four counts, which apparently involved a traffic stop on November 16th of last year. He is charged with possession of a control substance and three traffic violations.

Tony Gore at Renfro

Tony Gore became captivated with Southern Gospel Music at the tender age of 10-years-old as he listened to a local radio station in his hometown of Clanton, Alabama. The dream of singing Gospel Music grew in his heart until he started singing locally at the age of 14. His next step was singing with The Southmen, a regional group based out of Birmingham, Alabama. Tony then joined The Wilburns from Carthage, Tennessee. The Wilburns' songs featuring Tony's incredible voice started leaping up the charts. During his nine years with The Wilburns, Tony captured the hearts of Southern Gospel fans all across the nation.

In 1993, Tony left The Wilburns to form Tony Gore and Majory, and began touring in the spring of 1994. Immediately they were embraced by Gospel Music fans everywhere. The first song they released in 1993, "Thank God," was a Top Five song. Then they released "I Know What It's Like," another Top Five song. "Put on a Crown" was a Top 10 song, but is still the most requested song they have ever done.

Was first football coach at RCHS Mr. Glenn Polly dies on Monday

The first ever head football coach at Rockcastle County High School died Monday at the Baptist Regional Medical Center in Corbin.

Coach Glenn Polly, 70, of East Bernstndt, who was well-known throughout the county, had been in poor health for the past several years and had received a heart transplant a few years ago.

When Rockcastle County consolidated the three county high schools in 1972, Polly was brought in to head the football program.

He had played at the University of Kentucky as a linebacker in the Paul "Bear" Bryant era and had coached at Hazel Green High School in Laurel County, before leaving there to work for the American Heart Association.

After resigning from his job at RCHS, he was later hired as head football coach of then Laurel County High School.

Local attorney John Clontz, who played quarterback for Polly in 1974 and 1975, said Polly was a tough, unique man, whom he admired very much.

"I did not play high school football until my junior year and having Mr. Polly as my coach was the best thing that could have happened to

me," he said. Polly is survived by his wife Louise, a son, Mike Polly, and a daughter, Cathy Farris, among others.

His son Mike played football for his dad at RCHS until a broken leg ended his career. Funeral services for Coach Polly were held Wednesday at Bowling Funeral Home in London.

I've been "on vacation" for the last nine days.

Brother Keeter, whose vacation coincided with mine, and old friend Mark Mitchell from Indianapolis, rolled into the front yard on my first day off with Mark's bass boat in tow and then we made sure the lights on mine were working and we headed down 1-75 for Woods Creek Lake in Laurel County, 60 miles away, where we caught limits of trout and even a few keeper crappie.

Only problem is that Woods Creek was supposed to be a stopping point to make sure the boats were running good. I'd previously made arrangements with Ed Maggard to use the nice little dock he has there on the shore with the camp parked and leveled up on the side of the hill right there above the water line and just far enough away from the lake that you can have some privacy.

The notion was to fish until midnight or so and come back to Ed's place and sleep until the sun came up and move on to Laurel or Cumberland Lake the next day.

Ed is "retired" and has a lot of friends and twice as many relatives to accommodate and now spends more time making sure friends and relatives are happy than he ever did earning a living. And is bored when we don't aggravate him and I'm sorry that I don't do it enough.

Because Ed's wife, Carrie, is easily the best camp cook I've ever known, even though she never shows up at camp. She uses Ed to cater to us when we are on the lake and it's better than catching fish. If you have never had an egg, bacon and cheese sandwich, secretly grilled and seasoned on toast in the wee hours of the morning on Laurel Lake, lovingly prepared by Mrs. Ed Maggard, you have missed out on one of America's great culinary delights.

It would be an instant success on the chain franchise scheme.

You'd think it was more than enough and you feel humble that Ed would share his camper with whom-ever showed up during the warm months to take advantage of the lake. But Mrs. Maggard sits home and worries that we might be out there starving (call it intuition because she is usually correct) — and takes her own precautions to make sure we are fed. Actually, Carrie doesn't worry about us because she feeds hungry birds in her backyard aviary all the time and takes delight when the food

gets gobbled up. (My favorite idea of a second life is to come back as a woodpecker in Carrie Maggard's backyard)

So I'm rambling here. And here is the end of the story.

We met Ed at his dock last Tuesday because he'd been waiting to make sure we showed up. He had other company who had gone off and left him but he had faith in my telling him that we would be there and when he climbed up to his dock he tossed two big aluminum foil-wrapped packages into my lap.

"Fudge in the heavy one, gingerbread in the other. You can thank Carrie."

He climbed in my old boat and we headed down the lake where closer family than me were fishing off a pontoon and we pulled up alongside so Ed could join them. I took off on down the lake with brother, Keith after Ed had disembarked and we found a place where the fish always bite and we caught our limits of trout after fishing into the wee hours of the morning.

About three in the morning we ate Carrie Maggard's gingerbread like it was the staff of life. (I had sampled the fudge and decided I was taking it home.)

The fog rolled in so thick and soupy that we were lost on Woods Creek last Wednesday morning and dared not to move our boats. We

could hardly see each other from stem to stern. It was like being captured in a cloud. Trying to navigate back to the dock would have been futile. Actually we were not lost and the lake is small. We knew exactly where we were and had enough sense to stay there but we had not intended to stay all night. From time to time we caught a fish and checked to see how we were doing on keeping to the limit.

Then it occurred to me that Ed Maggard was not in the boat. Because Ed is the absolute master and absolutely nobody has ever caught

more fish per bait-in-the-water on Woods Creek than Ed Maggard, nor exceeded it more. And being in the boat with him is the ultimate joy of fishing. Woods Creek is fine fishing but without Ed in the boat it lacks a certain quality that keeps it from being measurable in terms of average or good or even great as opposed to serene and complete. We caught fish but mostly I missed Ed Maggard's company.

It was not serene. Not complete. An hour or two after sunrise we

until my junior year in high school. My thoughts are with his family this week.

Another former player of Coach Polly's, John Clontz, summed it up pretty good this week, there was no confusion about where Mr. Polly stood on matters.

He was a leader, a molder, a man you could trust and a man that you looked up to. Most importantly he was a friend.

He gave advice, most of it good, and he knew how to get all over you and he knew how to praise you. It was obvious that he was a very caring man, who loved football and his players. Football is no easy thing to play and even harder to coach. I personally thought that the administration could not have picked a better man to head the program.

He was a man, who would run laps with you, call you out of class if he thought there was a problem and a man who took his job very, very seriously.

Many Friday nights he would be

so nervous that he would have to go into his office and chain smoke.

And when he called you into his office before the game to talk to you about the seriousness of what was about to happen, you listened.

It wasn't easy to play for Mr. Polly, because there simply were no slacks. Slackers were not allowed on his field.

He approached football in a fashion that he always said would guide you through life.

He would get aggravated at times and pade-up across from you with no lines on, and knock you on your butt, all in an effort to show you the proper way to do things.

He knew football is a dangerous sport and he always said that you wouldn't get hurt unless you were afraid of getting hurt.

Looking back on the way he felt about that, he was simply trying to tell you to suck it up.

He was an emotional man, who was also a part-time preacher.

He knew the importance of being a Christian and he fought his own demons all of the time. He was very

candid about how hard it was to resist temptation.

Between my junior and senior year he resigned. I was upset because we actually had a pretty good team.

The makings of a pretty good team, which he and his assistants, Jim Cox and Larry Travis, had prepared for three or four years to be winners. We had paid the price.

I didn't understand why he would leave us. It wasn't his nature to walk out on his team and he knew the way I felt.

One day, before he left the high school he had talked to some of the other players and they told him that I was thinking of not playing my senior year, because I didn't know what was going to take place and that I was pretty aggravated with him.

He called me into his office and explained to me some aspects of life and some of the things that one has to do and the reasons for it.

After our two hour conversation I left with a better understanding of what he was going through and why he did what he had to do.

Corps of Discovery travel out West

Twenty-seventh of June, six-thirty in the morning, the "Corps of Discovery 2002" is finally getting on the road. After 10 months of planning, fundraising, motivating the eventual members of the group (and their parents) and sweating the multitude of details necessary for a trip of this nature and scope, we finally get to start the fun part of the adventure. This is the second trip we've taken out West with students, and sadly to say it's also the last (we're getting too old to keep up with teenagers). The reason for both trips was to expose as many Rockcastle students as we could to a part of our country that few of them would see otherwise. We also felt it was a great educational opportunity to allow the students to actually visit areas of our country they have studied in their history and geography classes over the years and to compare and contrast life here in rural Kentucky with living conditions in the West.

This trip, as well as the trip four years ago were both highly successful in meeting those goals. Along the way, we also had a lot of fun, as well as learning to deal with the necessary hardships of traveling over 4,500 miles in 19 days with 14 people in a school bus, camping out every night and cooking most of our own meals outside over a fire or Coleman stove. It takes a special group to make a trip like this, and we were blessed to have the right kids to take along. Members of the "Corps of Discovery '02" were Tim Tyler, Jonathan Noe, Jacob Helton, Brian Bullock, Chris Eldridge, John Phelps, Joe Husband, Justin Cornelius, Jessica Toothman, Erik Stallworth, Andy Coffey and Derrick Hensley, along

with group leaders Jenny and Keith Taylor. Our daughter, Tami, also decided to follow us to South Dakota in her Blazer for a little vacation.

The students were split into three tents. Both A-Team and B-Team had five students each. A and B teams alternated duties as Kitchen Police and Tent Detail. In addition to this, John and Chris were assigned to permanent bus detail, responsible for organizing and securing equipment on the bus.

The following is a journal of our trip, covering Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Iowa, South Dakota, Wyoming, Montana, Nebraska and Colorado.

Day 1 - June 27, 2002
Departed RCHS at 6:30 a.m. Arrived at Graham Cave State Park in Missouri where we spent the night after making Sloppy Joes for supper. Hot and muggy night with plenty of mosquitoes. States traveled in were Kentucky, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri. Long boring miles.

The one point of interest we stopped at was the St. Louis Arch, symbolizing the gateway to the West. The arch is the largest stainless steel structure in the world and is an amazing feat of engineering. On the way back to the bus we got caught in a red downpour. Ms. Jenny danced a jig every time lightning struck nearby. Justin was struck by the changes in the landscape along the way from home to Graham Cave as well as finding the arch is much larger than expected. Brian was interested in the change in the city skyline from the time construction was started on the arch to today. The whole group was also fascinated with the talking trash cans in the

McDonalds where we ate lunch. In fact, they spent the entire meal feeding trash into the can.

Day 2 - June 28, 2002
Departed Graham Cave, Arrived at Lewis and Clark State Park in Iowa where we spent the night after eating hot dogs cooked over a camped fire. We were right on the lakeshore. Four years ago we almost got carried away by mosquitoes, this year there wasn't any at all. States traveled in were Missouri and Iowa. Pretty landscape, just too much of it.

The only points of real interest were the only reproductions in the world of the keel boat and pirogues used by Lewis and Clark in the original "Corps of Discovery" in 1804. The kids had a real quick tour of the boats after swimming in the lake, which used to be a channel of the Missouri River. All of them remarked on how the lake bottom was real slimy mud. I'm not really sure what they expected in the bottom of the lake.

Kids seemed fascinated in sign for McDonald's that just said McStoP.

Day 3 - June 29, 2002
Departed Lewis and Clark State Park, after a detailed tour of keel boat. Arrived at Snake Creek, State Park in South Dakota where we spent the night. States traveled in were Iowa and South Dakota.

Before we departed Lewis and Clark State Park, we got a really great tour and educational talk from one of the builders of the reproduction keel boat. Learned some really interesting facts not only about the keel boat, but also about the diet and equipment used by the original ex-

pedition. We learned that the original boat weighed approximately the same as a Greyhound Bus when it was loaded. The crew, with an average of 19-years old, each ate about 12 to 15 pounds of meat a day. As the ranger pointed out, take 48 quarter-pounders from McDonalds and throw the bread away.

Stopped in Yankton, South Dakota to restock supplies and get more ice. Bought five pounds of lunch meat and bread for lunch out in the parking lot of a grocery store. It's Tim Tyler's 18th birthday today. Jenny got him a birthday cake, card, balloons and a banner. Figured we would skip the ice cream since it was 105 degrees.

Arrived at Snake Creek fairly early in the afternoon. There is no way to describe the view, other than to say it is absolutely awesome. An enormous lake is formed by a dam further down the Missouri River. The water is so blue that it doesn't even look real, and you can see forever. The wind is blowing pretty strong and building up some fairly large waves out across the lake. We set out a little gear just to stake out our campsite while everyone goes swimming. The beach is man-made and fairly new, so the only place where the waves are stirring up silt is where we are swimming which doesn't keep anyone from having fun.

After swimming awhile, we start a fire to cook out hamburgers. The wind, which is getting stronger makes for interesting cooking. While I flip the burgers, I have to be careful they don't end up in the next campsite.

After supper, we all walk across the road to a scenic overlook to watch a beautiful sunset. Upon returning to camp I decided the wind was blowing way too hard to set up tents, so we just bed down under the stars. Neither Jenny or I get much sleep due to the wind, which seems to get stronger every minute. Finally, at around two in the morning, I got worried about where some of the boys were sleeping. After waking them up and moving them away from the trees they were near, we tried to get some sleep. Around four in the morning, during a fifteen second time span, the wind went from the strongest I've ever experienced to dead calm. Talk about wind.

Day 4 - June 30, 2002
Departed Snake Creek State Park. Arrived at Cedar Pass Campground

in Badlands National Park after a fairly eventful day.

Upon waking up at Snake Creek, and comparing comments about the wind last night, we ate a quick breakfast and loaded the bus. Before leaving though, we had a short group prayer in a small wayfarers chapel. On crossing the Missouri the landscape changes immensely. The topography is much more rugged with long sweeping views. This is definitely horse and cattle country. We're traveling state roads now, and other vehicles are few and far between.

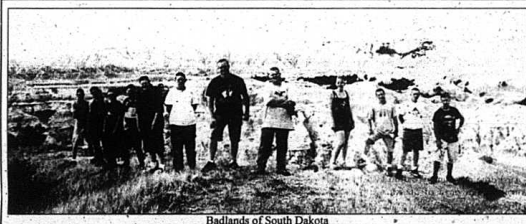
Shortly after getting back onto the interstate, we visit a reproduction "1880's Town." The kids seemed to enjoy looking around, and even witnessed some staged gun fights. Tim and Jay, dressed up as gunslingers while Jessica dressed as a saloon girl (Honest, Mr. Hale, I had nothing to do with it). After eating sandwiches on the bus again, we headed on down the highway to our next scheduled stop.

The students first view of Badlands National Park was supposed to be from the seat of a helicopter. Due to the wait involved though, we de-

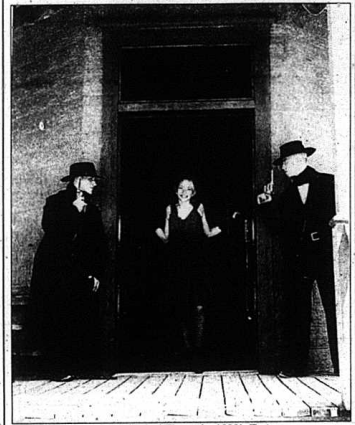
ecided to go set up camp in the park, then head back to the helicopter ride. While setting up camp, my mother and father showed up. They were traveling in the area, and decided to meet up with us here and a couple of other places we were planning to visit in the next several days.

None of the kids had ever rode in a helicopter before, so it was really interesting to watch their faces as they boarded, then took off for the mini-flights. It was probably kind of mean for my father (who retired from the Air Force) and I to talk about our flying experiences. All but two students flew, and they all seemed to really enjoy the experience. Except Jessica, she almost hyperventilated, after she got back on the ground. She went up though.

After the helicopter rides, Jenny went with Tami to pick up some hamburger for supper, while I took the kids to a "tame" prairie dog town. They all really got a kick out of getting close enough to touch some of the "p-dogs." Derrick even managed to pick one up and hold it while it ate a peanut out of his hand. It was also here that I got my first big trouble on the trip. I didn't take any photos. If

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you know my wife and her photos, then you know just how much trouble I was in for the next several days.

After returning to camp and eating what was probably the best spaghetti dinner I've ever had, we attended the nightly interpretive talk by one of the rangers. Afterwards, since the "night walk" was canceled due to a shortage of rangers, I took the group back into one of the large draws. It wasn't the same one rangers use, but we got back pretty far. I pointed out a few stars and constellations that I know, then we looked for satellites while dodging bats and trying to explain to Brian and Justin where the North Star is. This is probably a good place as any to say that the night sky out there is nothing like what it is here. The sky is so clear that you can easily see twice as many stars, and the Milky Way is so bright it actually looks like a cloud.

Even though we had tents set up, almost everyone slept under the stars again that night.

Day 3 - July 1, 2002
Departed Cedar Pass Campground and moved to Sage Creek Primitive Campground, still in Badlands National Park.

Tami left this morning, headed back to Kentucky on her own. Her

mother and I will both worry about her driving halfway across the country on her own. But I have faith in her.

This day was planned as a day of driving around the Badlands and just seeing the sights. It started out that way but on the spur of the moment, I decided we would hike along a series of marked trails that made a seven-mile loop. Jenny and I had hiked the majority of these trails during the past few years, and I knew they would get us out and away from other people, while letting the kids see some interesting sights. We were almost halfway through the loop when Jenny and a couple of others started slowing down due to the heat. We decided that the smart thing to do was to leave most of the group along a dirt road while some of us returned for the bus. Tim, Jay, John and Andy and I headed on back to the bus at a pretty good pace. Jenny and her group almost immediately found a cool culvert running under the road, where they waited for our return in relative comfort. The culvert was filled with sparrow nests made out of mud. Meanwhile, I found that I couldn't maintain the original pace I had set and forced to slow down considerably. Since we were only about a mile out, I allowed

the boys to get on ahead to the bus, as long as they maintained visual contact with me the whole way, which they did. By the time I arrived at the bus they had cold water out and were ready to go. We figured we covered three and a half miles in just a little under an hour, which is pretty fast for someone almost 50. Of course, the boys, who are all in great shape, could have run it in half the time.

After picking up the rest of the group, Jenny and I decided to get them (us) out of the heat and get liquids in them. So we made an unscheduled stop in the Cedar Lodge Restaurant where we bought everybody in the group a buffalo burger platter. Everyone decided it tasted like beef. While there, soaking up the air conditioning, John fell asleep. The whole restaurant full of people thought it was so cute that he didn't even wake up when we all got up and left. I knew his parents wouldn't like us leaving him there so I went back in and woke him up.

We then headed out to Sage Creek Primitive Campground, which as far as I'm concerned is the best kept secret of the park. It's about 20 miles out on a gravel road which has the best scenery in the park. It's on the edge of a 65,000 acre wilderness area that's home to 640 head of buffalo. Along the way to the campground we saw several times as many prairie dogs, and a hundred acre prairie dog town. We also saw hundreds of buffalo along the way. Some solitary bulls, as well as several large herds of cows with calves. All the kids seemed impressed with the size of the bulls. Several thought it was strange that they ate buffalo before they saw any.

We set up camp at Sage Creek fairly fast. I showed the group how to set up a pup-tent as a lean-to, which most of them copied. That way they could see outside during the night and still have shelter from any bad weather. One group of five though chose to set up a shelter for five which was promptly named the "Og"-tagon. While setting up camp, a couple of buffalo wandered up to the campsite. One of them settled down right across the road from camp. In fact it looked like he was settled in for the night. Derrick has a slight tendency to sleep walk, which concerned his mother a bit. Just for a joke, we put Derrick alongside the road in his sleeping bag, and took his picture, with the buffalo laying down on the other side of the road. I don't know if his mom will say when she sees the photo, but I hope she has a sense of humor.

The kids all remarked on the contrast of how the prairie changes to the badlands, and the difference in the scenery. A-Team cooked stew tonight on their own. They won't tell us what they put in it, but it sure was good. Chris ended up cleaning out the pot with his spoon.

Day 6 - July 2, 2002
Stayed in Sage Creek again to-night.

After breakfast, we went about ten miles back up the road to a scenic overlook. There, we divided the students into two groups. After a detailed safety brief (a lot of threats involved) the groups were free to pick their own path to a prominent land feature in the distance where we would all meet. Jenny and I traveled along high ground, where we could keep an eye on each group the majority of the time. The reason we did this is so the kids could get out onto the prairie and experience it without the noise of thirteen other people around. This is an experience you have to have yourself before you can really appreciate it. Once we all met, we picked another rendezvous even further out onto the prairie. We continued this until we were probably two and a half or three miles away from the bus. The only trails were those made by a buffalo. After a final break, under some cedars, we split again to finally meet back at the

bus. For many, this was the high point of the trip up till now. Being able to pick their own path across what is essentially wilderness really appealed to their sense of adventure.

After the prairie walk, we headed into the town of Wall, home of the famous Wall Drugstore, to do laundry and a little sight-seeing. If you want real excitement, take 12 teenagers to a laundromat where they do their own laundry. While at the laundromat, we took a bit of time into the Buffalo Gap National Grasslands headquarters, to visit the small museum there. Jessica also got to have her hair washed at the hairdresser next to the laundromat.

After the laundry was done we went into Wall Drug for a short visit. Jenny gave each of the students money to get ice-cream. There is no way to explain what Wall Drug is like. The best I can do is tell you that about half the group wants to live there. Chris, for reasons only he can tell you, promptly bought a pelvic bone. The lady that sold it to him thinks it might be from a horse, but she wasn't sure. Chris didn't care, he just wanted the pelvic bone. I try not to think why, but I saw him wearing it on his head several times. John bought something even stranger. A horse dropping, with toothpicks and feathers sticking out of it resembling a bird. A "turd-bird" of course. Jacob bought a used lasso. I've got a feeling that our freshmen might be used for practice. After promising the kids we would be back the next morning, we finally pried them out of the store and got them back on the bus.

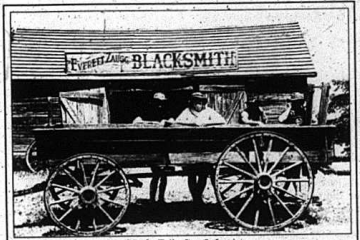
Back at camp, we took "prairie baths" and listened to a nearby horse trailer full of horses go berserk as three buffalo walked right by the trailer. The owner of the horse expressed that horses are naturally afraid of buffalo.

Another beautiful night under the stars.

Day 7 - July 2, 2002
Departed Sage Creek Campground to travel into the Blackblisks. Busy day.

We broke camp this morning and departed without breakfast. When we arrived in Wall, we sent groups to replenish ice, buy milk and four dozen large cake donuts from the bakery in Wall Drug. We had breakfast there on the bus, passing around donuts, milk and orange juice. Yes we did have cups. Afterwards, we visited Wall Drug some more before heading into Rapid City.

Our first stop in Rapid City was a small Air Force museum. We didn't stay too long, but most of the kids seemed to enjoy it. From there, we took the students to a water park where they were able to play in the water and flirt with the lifeguards. Also was the first bath the kids had in four days. While they were at the water park, I took the bus to get a rear axle seal repaired. Mom and Dad showed up while I was gone and stayed with us for awhile.

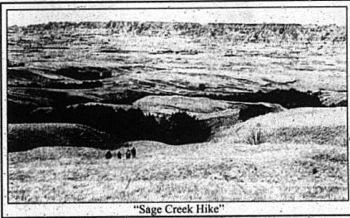

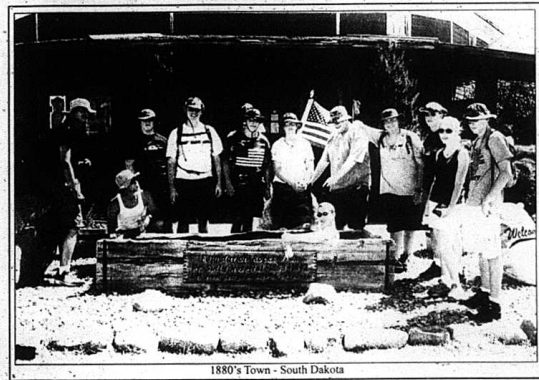

Bullock receives Francis & Ruth Moore Scholarship

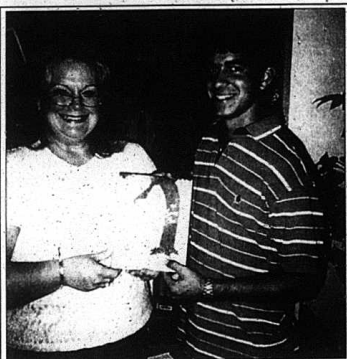
Jessica Bullock of Broadhead, has been awarded the Francis & Ruth Moore Scholarship for the 2002-03 academic year.

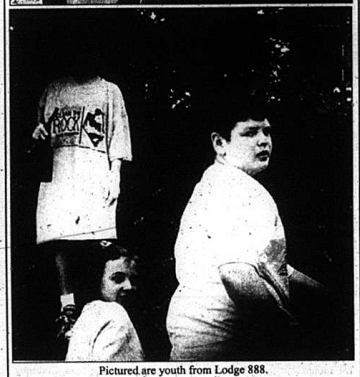

Ward Burton is back on top
LOUDON, N.H.—Ward Burton, who started the season off with a win at Daytona, then saw his racing turn sour, was back in victory lane Sunday after winning the Winston Cup, New England 300.

Burton started 31st in the 43-car field and passed Matt Kenseth with 10 laps to go. He took the lead in Turn 1 when Kenseth's No. 17 DeWalt Ford had a tire go down, then held off Jeff Green by 1.230 seconds for his fifth career victory.

"I knew if we stayed out of trouble we could have a decent run but obviously I didn't expect this," Burton said. "On older tires we were good. Maybe Matt Kenseth was better than I was but you have to be in position to win and we were in position when it counted."

"We ran good all day and we didn't break and that's what was killing us all year."

Since winning this year's Daytona 500, Burton had only one other top-five and fell to 26th in the standings coming into Sunday's race.

Green, who started 30th, scored his career best finish in his 77th career start.

"We had a good enough car to win the race, but Ward just got away from us on that last restart," said Green.

There were 12 cautions and many drivers blamed the track conditions. Bobby Labonte, who finished 13th was one of the more vocal ones.

"I've been coming here since 1990," said Labonte. "These are great race fans. It's a great facility. But I remember in 1990 I turned over on the back straightaway because the race track came apart. I was following somebody and Dale Jarrett was following me. Ricky Craven got up

in the marbles, he came down the race track just because that is what you're supposed to do, and I got hit in the right front and turned over. That was 1990."

"They should give everybody the money they're impeding a race. It was not a good race. I don't think it was a good race."

Defending race winner Dale Jarrett, who came in third, scored his first top-five in the last four races after starting 33rd. Rusty Wallace and Ryan Newman rounded out the top-five.

Folesitter Bill Elliott finished 34th.

But many of the male drivers apparently resented her presence, because she took up a collection and raised \$3,600, more than enough to file a protest against her engine.

The protest was allowed and after speedway tech officials finished tearing down the engine in her car, they discovered the cylinder head was too large—by less than one centimeter.

She had run other events at the track, even leading the series for a while, but this latest development got to her. She believes the male drivers are the ones that got her disqualified, and will no longer race at the Fairgrounds.

NASCAR CEO, Mike Helton telephoned and encouraged her to change her mind, saying NASCAR would not tolerate the behavior shown by some of the male drivers.

The Fairgrounds track is a NASCAR-sanctioned track and must abide by all NASCAR rules during their weekly racing programs.

ROCKCASTLE COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT PUBLIC NOTICE

Notification of Rights Under FERPA for Elementary and Secondary Institutions and Child Find

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") who are attending a postsecondary institution certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

1) **The right to inspect and review the student's education records within forty-five (45) days of the day the parent or eligible student makes a request for access.**

Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal/designee (or appropriate school official) a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The Principal will make arrangements to access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.

2) **The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of the student's privacy or other rights.**

Parents or eligible students may ask the District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of privacy or other rights. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate, misleading, or in violation of their privacy or other rights.

If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3) **The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.**

One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement) and personnel on the school Board, a person serving on the school Board, a person or company with whom the District has contracted for providing a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist), or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.

A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Upon request, the District discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll, or to those entities authorized to receive such information. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. "Directory Information" is information contained in an educational record which would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. This information may be released without consent. "Directory Information" includes the student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational attended. The parent, guardian, or eligible student currently enrolled may request in all or part of the "Directory Information" be withheld. The request must be made in writing to the Principal of the child's school within thirty (30) calendar days after the Annual FERPA

Notice has been distributed in August. The written request must specifically state what information may not be classified as "Directory Information".

The Rockcastle County School District keeps educational records in a secure computer system and in locked files in each school and Board of Education office.

For students who have been determined eligible for programs for Special Education, educational records will be destroyed at the request of the parent when they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. The Rockcastle County School District may destroy the educational records of a child without a parent's request seven (7) years after they are no longer needed to provide educational programs or services. Parents are advised that data contained in educational records currently enrolled may request in all or part of the "Directory Information" be withheld. The request must be made in writing to the Principal of the child's school within thirty (30) calendar days after the Annual FERPA

Children determined eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have a hearing impairment, visual impairment, emotional-behavioral disability, deaf-blindness, other health impairment, specific learning disability, mental disability, multiple disabilities, speech or language impairment, developmental delay, orthopedic impairment, autism, or traumatic brain injury, and who because of such an impairment need specially designed instruction and related services.

The Rockcastle County School District has an ongoing "Child Find" system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education. This includes children who are in public, private, or home school, those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless, and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education.

The Rockcastle County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who has a disability, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided an appropriate education at no cost to the parents of the child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County School District find any child who may have a disability and need Special Education services. The District needs to know the name and age or date of birth of the child, the name, address, and phone number of the parent or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education is needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Rockcastle County School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education services.

"Child Find" activities will continue throughout the school year. As part of these efforts the Rockcastle County School District will use screening information, student records, and base assessment information it collects on all children in the District to help locate those children who have a disability and need Special Education. Any information the District collects through "Child Find" is maintained confidentially.

Written Policies and Procedures have been developed which describe the District's requirements regarding the confidentiality of personally identifiable information and "Child Find" activities. 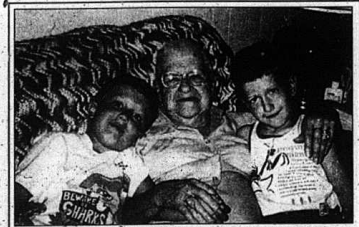

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service is accepting applications from qualified landowners for enrollment consideration into the Wetland Reserve Program. Landowners can enroll their land under a 30-year or permanent easement for a lump sum up front easement payment and have USDA pay 100 percent of the wetland restoration costs. Eligible lands include, farmed wetlands, prior converted cropland, farmed wetland pasture, and farmland that has become a wetland as a result of flooding. This is a great opportunity to retire fields where crops are frequently lost to wetness, to cash out land equity, reduce farm debt, or establish a hunting club/preserve. Review the warranty easement deed carefully as the program may not meet all landowner objectives. See Randall Templeman, District Conservationist to determine if your land might qualify. The next ranking deadline for easement purchase consideration will be October 2002. Thanks to the miracles of modern medical science, healthy organs from the body of a deceased person can be successfully transplanted to help restore the health of a living person. Those commonly include kidneys, corneas, hearts, livers and skin.

The decision to make such a donation is, of course, a personal one. It might be, well to add, however, that virtually all religions in the United States have no restrictions in regard to the donation of organs to help another patient regain his or her health.

One should also keep in mind that the donation of an organ in no way modifies one's funeral arrangements. The removal of the organ is carried out in an operating room by a team of surgeons and nurses for transplantation to the recipient. Then, after a brief post-mortem, the body can be transferred to the funeral home and the decedent's wishes carried out as specified and desired.

Hyprocrites are usually wrong

Miracles are still with us. "Hello, this is Dorothy," the weak, hesitating, and raspy voice on the other end of the line said. "You re-

member when your Uncle Fred and Aunt Flossie used to come down and visit Thomas and I when you were little." My, how the years had slid by, maybe fifty. I knew my cousin Thom had lost the battle with Paul Mall

cigarettes over a decade ago. And I thought Dorothy had gone, too. The last I heard, she already had her ticket to join him. "I thought you might like to do a story for the newspaper," she continued. Just what kind of story could Dorothy tell?

Right after the Great Depression, poor southerners had a lot in common with prisoners locked up in solitary confinement. There just wasn't much freedom of choice in life for them.

Dorothy and Thomas were two such people. Their life was centered on putting food on the table and raising four children.

Both were born and raised within a mile of each other. They were childhood sweethearts, who had spent all their life in the small fishing village of Bayou La Batre, Alabama. The movie, Forrest Gump, portrays the town as being right out of a fairytale.

It depicts a lively and booming little town, but the scenes were actually shot near Charleston, South Carolina, not along the Alabama Gulf Coast. The "Bayou" as natives call it, has never been an easy place to obtain material wealth.

"I'd like you to meet me at Brookley Field and take my picture beside that B-24," she continued. "I used to work on them during World War II." That was during the time Thomas was overseas.

This was news to me. My early memories were of a couple with several babies who lived in a small wooden, unpainted house near the tidewater marsh, with no screens on the doors.

She was stout, of medium height, and usually wore a plain dress with the tail of it as she moved about the house in slippers. Her hair was black, with deep blue eyes, and full lips.

He was short and wiry with an alligator face and hands. His skin was dark brown and wrinkled from constant exposure to the sun while working without a shirt in the gulf. Both hands were calloused from pulling in shrimp nets, and I've seen him walk on oyster shells barefoot. He had a funny looking arthrod. One side was

The first thing Dorothy did after hugging everybody was put on a pot of coffee. This was before Mr. Coffee hit the market. Heated water was

poured into the top of an aged black pot filled with strong CDM or Luzitane coffee. With the coffee, there was always a slice of homemade cake.

I got a big glass of strawberry or orange Kool-Aid. Thomas always had some type of skiff or small shrimp boat. Often he would take us out and use a cast net to catch a mess of fish. If it were low tide, the men folks would wade around and pick up oysters.

We would row back to their house, tired and wet, where Thomas and my dad would clean the fish. Dorothy and mother would fry them in a deep iron skillet.

There was a little bayou back of their house that it was allowed to fish in using one of Thom's cane fishing poles. Along the path were many gnarled oak trees, whose limbs were covered with Spanish moss. They reminded me of crazy old men with beards and long fingers.

The tides brought schools of small fish in, and once I saw a bunch of ducks. One time I caught a small flounder, and ran all the way back to the house with it. The marsh grass that grew along the water's edge was a nursery for shrimp. I would often sit and stare at the small crabs and other crustaceans scurrying around in the shallow, brackish water.

Another time, I wound up with an oel on my hook. Believing it was one of the dreaded cottonmouth moccasins that inhabit southern swamps, I threw the pole down and high-tailed it.

And there were other pleasant memories. Thomas allowed me to roam around the yard that was filled with worn-out boats, nets and oyster tongs. Often, I would crawl up in one of his skills, and become skipper of one of the world's largest ocean liners.

Visiting with Dorothy and Thomas was my first spiritual awakening. Certain basic emotions, joy, excitement, and affection had found a place of rest. Often when other members of the family spoke of the couple, it wasn't good. Dorothy had to work in sea-food plants, opening oysters or peeling shrimp to put food on the table, because Thomas just wouldn't work all the time, they often said.

As a boy I didn't understand their sayings, but I couldn't question them, either.

During the wheel chair interview with Dorothy, April 3, 2002, I learned that she had quit school and served her country during World War II by

working an aircraft at Brookley Air Force Base. She was able to visit two of the vintage planes she worked on, a B-24 Liberator, and a B-17 Flying Fortress, that made a brief stop in Mobile.

"Seeing them tickled me to death," said Dorothy. "My boyfriend, Thomas (and later husband), had joined the Army. I went to work in August of '42. They sent me to engine repair school, and I worked there until the end of 1944.

"It was hard work, but I enjoyed every bit of it. We all worked together. There was no arguing or fussing, we all came in and did our job. That's the way it was. We thought we were contributing to our boys getting back home."

Discovering this bit of information really made me feel good. All I had known was her role as a housewife and mother. But I also found out why Thomas didn't work all the time. He had received a medical discharge from the Army after losing a kidney and part of his stomach to a Japanese machine gunner and left for dead while serving with Gen. Douglas MacArthur in the Philippines.

"We didn't think he would ever get well," said Dorothy. "It was a long time after he came back from the war

before he was ever able to work. He tried to get on disability, but after filling out paper after paper, he finally gave up on getting anything from the government. The red tape was just too much for him."

It's difficult, it's very hard to explain what I felt, after nearly half a century to learn what other contributions Dorothy and Thomas had made to our world, and how the hypocrites

I knew as a child had been proven wrong—as hypocrites usually are. I sure am glad Dorothy made that call to me, and, yes, I still believe.

- All exhibits (except livestock) must remain on display until 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, August 10, 2002. Prizes will not be paid for exhibits removed prior to that time.
- All exhibits (except open livestock shows) are limited to residents of Rockcastle County.
- All exhibitors and FFA members are eligible to show in all open division classes with the same animals as shown in 4-H and FFA departments. All entries must be made prior to the show.
- The Fair Board reserves the right to combine classes where a class has fewer than three entries and/or exhibitors.
- All livestock must be accompanied by an official health certificate in keeping with the State Department of Agriculture health regulations.
- No individual may take more than one entry in any one class, except that two may be entered in livestock classes.
- The Fair Executive Committee reserves the right to interpret and resolve all matters associated with or incident to the fair.
- The Fair Board will not be responsible for losses, accidents, injury to persons, animals or other exhibits, but will take precautions to prevent any losses.
- Money not used in the division may be transferred to another division on the Danish system.

Lawn & Garden Priorities
When I am asked to do a landscape design for a homeowner I will ask if they have a "wish list". Though such a list would be a wonderful starting point, usually I have to ask a lot of questions to see if there is a "mental wish list".
Sometimes folks just turn the project over to me and say use your judgment and come up with something that will look good. (This is easier if I know how much they can afford to spend.) Most folks, however, have a bunch of ideas which they want included. They just want me to put them together with my own ideas and come up with something good. If only such ideas were written down and prioritized!
Whether yours will be a do-it-yourself landscape or you will contract with someone with experience to decide on some priorities and write them down.
To assist with constructing your list, I've included a priority "check-off" chart. You should feel free to add additional items to this list. My intention is to get you started organizing and prioritizing your home landscape needs today.

Now that you have considered some priorities and looked over the listings I have provided, you may realize you CAN'T HAVE EVERYTHING you want! Whether it be lack of space, lack of available money, or whatever other reason, you should pick items you consider "must-haves" and find a way to work them into an overall scheme or design.
Add other items from your list as you are able or as space permits. Only when you have a PLAN will you be able to smoothly add other items at a later date. Nobody wants to have to tear up part of an earlier project in order to make a new garden or lawn addition fit. Unfortunately, if you don't have a prioritized master plan, you will someday find that happening in all likelihood.
Using our check-list may not actually make the design work a snap, but it will keep you focused as to what you must include and what elements are whimsical and can be included as an option if they fit.
The smartest looking designs will be a disappointment if they are not also functional. If you need a garden shed or a barbecue pit or a compost bin or a nook for the garbage cans but these were omitted from that cute

design or slick proposal, then it is a failure.
The best designs give you your highest priorities where you need them in your yard or garden paradise

and at the same time look pleasingly attractive.

Heart Health

Cardiovascular disease is the term for several diseases which include high blood pressure, stroke, Coronary Heart Disease (CHD) and others. CHD is the leading cause of death in Americans - and Kentuckians. The best way to prevent CHD is through a healthy diet and other positive lifestyle behaviors.
Recent studies have shown that Kentuckians have a high incidence of some risk factors: smoking, obesity, incidence of diabetes, high blood pressure, lack of physical activity, lack of monitoring blood cholesterol levels, and low intake of vegetables and fruits.
Obviously, we can control some of these factors; others, we cannot. These include age and family history.
All these risk factors in some way contribute to elevated blood lipids - mainly as triglycerides and cholesterol.
Blood lipids are fatty substances in

the blood, including triglycerides, lipoprotein and cholesterol. Measuring blood lipids is the best predictor for risk of CHD. In general it is healthy to have:
• a total cholesterol level of 200 mg/dl or less;
• and HDL level of at least 25 percent of total cholesterol;
• triglyceride level of 200 mg/dl or less.
If your blood lipid levels are within normal range, you can follow dietary recommendations to keep them normal. If your levels are abnormal, your physician and a registered dietitian should help you to bring them into normal range by dietary changes, exercise, medications, and control of contributing conditions or diseases. Lowering blood cholesterol by one percent can give you a 10 percent reduction in risk of CHD.

Agricultural News

Farm Storage Facility Loans

The FSA office has Farm Storage Facility Loans available to producers who have a need for increased storage. In order to be eligible a producer must have a satisfactory credit history, has no delinquent Federal debt, is a producer of facility loan commodities such as corn, soybeans or wheat, demonstrates the ability to repay the debt, in compliance with USDA provisions for highly erodible land and wetlands.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder

Producers with Production Flexibility contracts (PFCs) authorized under AMTA in the 1996 farm bill must continue to follow contract requirements for the 2002 payment. Producers are encouraged not to request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion of the entire farm as payment received must be refunded. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.

All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1st.

Phase II Payments

Beginning the week of August 5, applications will be mailed to tobacco farm operations and letters will be mailed to tobacco quota owners about the 2002 fund. These applications, which are exactly like last year's, must be completed and re-

turned promptly postmarked no later than September 16, 2002.

To be considered complete, the application MUST BE SIGNED, by all parties involved with each farm. If the same person fits all the roles designated, that person must sign in all sections that pertain to him/her. If there is a significant line, it must be filled in. The application must be signed in ALL places indicated on the form. ANY APPLICATION THAT DOES NOT INCLUDE THE SIGNATURE AND SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER OF THE ELIGIBLE PARTY WILL BE INCOMPLETE AND PAYMENTS WILL NOT BE MADE.

Step-by-step instruction are included with each application. Help is also available at the local FSA office, by contacting the toll-free help line at 1-877-549-2537 or on the web site at www.kyagpolicy.com. Funds are expected to be distributed by the national trustee by December 31, 2002.

Disaster Leasing

Farmers who suffer a burley-to-bacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to produce that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to di-

aster lease and transfer must: file a crop report with FSA, file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, have planted sufficient acreage to produce the farm's effective quota, provide a measurement fee and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing the measurement fee will be refunded.

Remember: If you are a farmer whose tobacco is suffering from poor weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease, etc. Come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions PRIOR TO HARVEST!

Warehouse Designation

As a condition of price support beginning with the 2001 crop year for tobacco; producers were required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they would market tobacco. This is acquired by completing the form FSA 808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold.

Initial designation will end August 1, 2002. Producers are encouraged to complete this form after all leases and transfers have been updated for cards to be effective the first date of marketing. After the initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day during the following regular redesignation periods:

- September 30 - October 4, 2002 with card effective October 14, 2002
- October 28 - November 1, 2002 with card effective November 11, 2002
- December 2 - December 6, 2002 with card effective December 16, 2002

- December 27 - January 3, 2003 with card effective January 13, 2003.

The warehouse number will be indicated on the marketing card. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, you must return that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

Warehouse Closing

Recent notification to county FSA offices reflect Madison Tobacco Warehouse of Richmond, will not be eligible for designation during the 2002-03 marketing year. Producers who have previously designated this

warehouse need to contact the FSA office and change warehouses by August 1, 2002. Also producers with tobacco stored at this location will need to contact the warehouse for removal of the tobacco.

Producers who have missing tobacco which were stored at Peoples Tobacco Warehouse in Danville, for the 2000 crop year need to contact the FSA office.

Important Dates to Remember
August 1, 2002 - Deadline to sign Warehouse Designation.

August 1, 2002 - Deadline to sign or revise the 2002 PFC contracts.
