

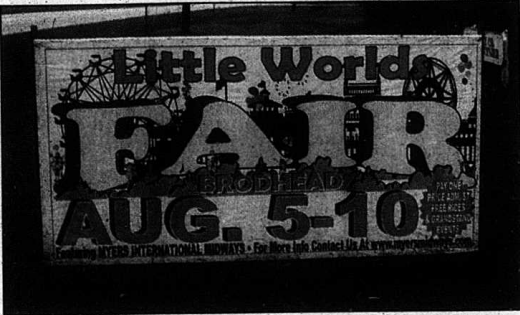

The 107th annual Little World's Fair will kick off on Thursday with the Dairy Show. The annual fair will run through Saturday, August 10th.

Local Fair starts Thursday (today)

The second oldest fair in the state of Kentucky will kick off on Thursday at the Rockcastle County Fairgrounds.

The 107th Little World's Fair and Rockcastle County Agricultural Fair will begin with the Dairy Show on Thursday night, (tonight) at 5:00 p.m. and end on Saturday night, August 10th with Mud Races as the main event at the Grand Stands.

The Midway will open each day at 6 p.m. except for Thursday when family day will be held starting at 12 noon.

A complete listing of each day's events appear in this week's newspaper on page A-6.

(Editor's Note: The following is a brief history of the Little World's Fair in Brodhead.)

One week out of each year, the Brodhead Fair is in full swing. This is a very exciting time for the young and the old. Some people come to the Fair for the entertainment and others to have reunions with old friends.

The original fairground was located in Brodhead, just west of present day West Street on property currently owned by Mr. Cleston Saylor. It was later moved to the present location, which is a part of the old Martin farm. And is now the county fairgrounds.

The first Brodhead Fair Board was established in 1895. Shares were sold for about \$5.00 per share and the Fair was owned and operated by the stockholders. Mr. D.A. Robbins recalls that families of the stockholders received free passes and hence, his father, Frank Robbins, being a stockholder, he never had to miss a day. Little did he dream, in those days of his youth, that he would one day be a co-owner.

In later years the stockholders sold the Fair Company to Dr. M.M. Phillips and Mr. W.O. Yaden, who in turn sold to Millard Shafer. Millard Shafer sold it to D.A. Robbins and his brother-in-law, Clarence "Teddy" Frith, and after several years ownership, they sold it to the county. Rockcastle County now owns the fairground property and each year at "Fair" time, leases the land and buildings to William Gentry and Frank Martin. They continue to have crowd-drawing exhibitions and carnivals in August of each year.

In earlier years, the Fair was more agriculturally oriented than it is today. In those days, it served as the Rockcastle County Agricultural Fair, although it was never so named. Farmers brought their cattle, hogs, chickens, sheep and farm produce for display and judging. Their wives and

daughters vied for ribbons and prizes for their cakes, candles, canned vegetables and fancy needlework.

The Flora Hall continues to be an important part of the Fair. The mule and pony races were replaced by more sophisticated horse shows. The Horse Shows drew participants from all areas of Kentucky and surrounding states and was the main attraction of the Fair for many years. The prohibitive expense of prizes forced the owners to drop the horse shows from the program. In recent years, the horse shows have been replaced with special events scheduled for each night of the Fair, usually a rodeo provides free entertainment on the late two nights of the Fair.

The Fair is now operated by Bill Gentry and Larry Doyle.

Young Republican Club being formed

A group of local young people are now reorganizing the Rockcastle Young Republican Club. The previous club had merged with the current Rockcastle Republican Party after receiving several state awards including, most notably, the Kentucky Young Republican Club of the Year Award in 1993.

Mt. Vernon council passes budget for new fiscal year

The Mt. Vernon City Council will have a budget for the coming year after all.

On Tuesday night, the council approved the second reading of the upcoming budget and it will become final after it is published in this week's Signal.

According to the budget figures being published this week the city's expenditures will exceed their revenue by almost \$326,000 in the next fiscal year.

According to the budget, every account will operate in a deficit except for the fire department budget which will receive \$5,000 and spend \$5,000.

According to Mayor Karen King the city will absorb the deficits with monies carried over from previous years revenues.

But in a nutshell the city will spend much, much more than they expect to take in.

According to the budget passed on Tuesday night, the city expects revenues of \$2,073,000 and will expend \$2,399,000. That includes all accounts including the water and sewer funds.

The council did not vote to raise any type of tax or fees, and did not drop the city's family health insurance plan.

They did vote for a different health insurance plan for employees which will save the city \$13,000, according to Mayor King.

"I think all of our employees are happy with the new budget, they know we had to make some changes in their health insurance, but they still get to keep their family plan," she said.

But the council did renege on a promise to the Rockcastle County Development Board.

Two years ago the council voted to give the board \$25,000 to help the board operate. This year they cut their contribution to \$13,000.

Crystal Jones, of Mt. Vernon, always figured that she'd be seeing her three-year-old daughter, Angel, off to school in the near future.

Not the other way around.

"She sees me go to school everyday," said Jones, a junior social work major at Eastern Kentucky University's Tri-County Center in

Ms. Sparks is cancer survivor

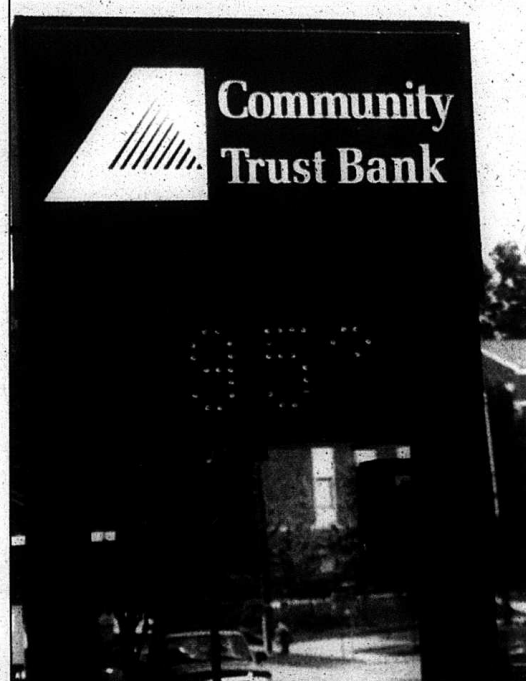
73-year-old Ms. Eva Sparks, of Mt. Vernon, who many Rockcastle Countians know because of her dealings with the public for 48 years, is a cancer survivor.

In 1989 she decided to quit smoking after her brother-in-law was diagnosed with lung cancer.

Four months later she went for a check-up and doctors told her she also had lung cancer.

"I was one of the lucky ones because doctors said that had I not of quit smoking the cancer in my lung would have spread faster than it did," she said.

Surgeons removed half of one of Ms. Sparks' lungs and she went (Cont. to A-12)

Cancer has touched so many lives, nearly every family in this county has had some type of experience with it.

In 1976 my grandfather Murphy, only 68-years-old, died of lung cancer, on my sister Sara's fifth birthday.

Needless to say, Sara never really knew her grandfather and Travis and Allison came along after he was gone, so they got cheated as well.

I was lucky because I had gotten the privilege of knowing him and like most grandchildren, I certainly admired, respected and loved him.

Granddad was a hard worker and a man who loved his children and grandchildren. Cancer was cruel to him and his family because he had all of the systems of pneumonia and that is what doctors treated him for, for several weeks, before they diagnosed him with cancer.

He suffered through the chemotherapy, only to succumb to the disease a few months later. As so many know, he was so sick during his treatments that he had no quality of life.

Just as Ms. Eva Sparks, who is a cancer survivor, told me this week, everyone should have regular check-ups and don't take your health for granted because you never know when the horrible disease will strike you.

To all the people who have obviously worked very hard on this project congratulations, and to all cancer survivors another congratulations.

Ms. Zi Graves died last week. She was a columnist for this publication for many years and she will be greatly missed.

Ms. Zi, as we called her, was a strong, willed, independent woman, who did not care to express her opinion to whomever would listen or read.

She really enjoyed writing Sweet and Sour and we appreciate the time and effort she put into it.

We didn't always agree on matters, but early on I realized that I probably wasn't going to win any of those battles and I respected her opinion and her insights and I was always taught to respect my elders.

This statement is getting old, because it is a direct reflection of the number of deaths lately, but our thoughts are with Ms. Zi's family.

It's true that I often write inflammatory, knee-jerk opinions that get in print and cause hard feelings and certainly do nothing to advance my cause or argument. The better way, I'm told by friends and readers, is to be diplomatic and well-reasoned as opposed to ranting and raving.

about that. There is nothing representative about state government in Kentucky unless you are a big road contractor or insurance company or predatory lender or any other entity with shrimp and whiskey to fill their bellies or cold hard cash to slip into a legislator's pocket who will protect and assure that your particular scam remains "legal".

I certainly do not feel represented in Frankfort and if you are not personally the beneficiary of a kick-back, or some other special favor from a legislator, you should not either.

Perhaps the day will come when honest, reasonable, tolerant, justice-minded, people will overwhelmingly

run for and be elected to the Kentucky Legislature. There is no incentive to do so now because the power brokers are at large and for every honest man or woman in the Legislature, there are, at least, three others methodically manipulating the system for personal gain without regard to you and me, or for the best interests of the so-called "Commonwealth."

So what do I surely do not hold my breath, but until the people who live in this state from Paducah to Pikeville, Covington to Williamsburg get angry enough to make things change, it ain't gonna happen. There's not an example in history of diplomacy wiping out corruption. Nor is there any example of legislating common sense.

NO HIDDEN COSTS

All of us have had the experience of opening a bill and being staggered by the amount. This is often because what we THOUGHT we were paying has been considerably augmented by "hidden costs" - taxes, service charges, surcharges, interest charges, etc.

The great majority of funeral directors adhere to a professional code of ethics which includes provisions for seeing that this doesn't happen. In order to eliminate those hidden costs, you will find that these funeral directors are explicit about the costs of goods and services. In addition, once the family decides on the kind of service desired, the funeral director should provide a written document for the family to review and approve.

This should include a description of the service and the price. Any supplemental charges for merchandise or service should be listed! It should also make mention of any surcharges which the funeral director will advance on behalf of the family, e.g. newspaper notice, cemetery charges, flowers, transportation, etc.

Day 7 - July 3, 2002 (Continued)

After the water park, we stocked up on ice and supplies at Wal-Mart, then took the kids to a Golden Corral in Rapid City. The waiter, a really big, rough looking guy, singled out Justin and Derrick to pick on. The two of them couldn't do or say anything without getting verbally slammed. I, along with several others, laughed so hard I could hardly eat. Great entertainment, but Justin and Derrick probably didn't enjoy it much.

After eating, we finally got on the road into the Black Hills. On our way to where we spent the night, we drove past Mount Rushmore. The security was extremely tight; with a State Police checkpoint and National Guard personnel all along the route leading to the monument. We drove right past the monument and stopped in the National Forest about two miles further down the road.

The place we stopped is probably one of the best natural campsites Jenny and I have ever found. Boulders bigger than houses, level ground with plenty of room to park and set up our tents. We would have the whole area to ourselves for three nights before we moved on to Wyoming.

Day 8 - July 4, 2002
Had left over donuts, milk and

juice for breakfast this morning up on the boulders overlooking our campsite. The view is magnificent. We left the pup tents standing and headed into the town of Keystone. As we passed Mt. Rushmore, the police are gone, but the National Guard is still there.

In Keystone, we let the kids roam for a short time after we purchase tickets for the 1800's train. Since some of the rides are sold out we need to drive to Hill City where we catch the train for a round trip from Hill City to Keystone and return. We took the back road to Hill City. Over thirty rail road crossings, stopping at each one since we're in a school bus. I forget that part when I chose the route. Pretty scenery though. I don't think the group was that excited about the train ride. So they did what boys from Rockcastle County do best. They flirted with the girls working on the train.

Finally, after the train ride, we head for Mount Rushmore. Since it's later in the day, security is back in force. We pass through police checkpoints, get a complete check out by a search team, to include a dog going through the bus and pass through metal detectors before we're in the monument. We all discuss the security measures later and come to the consensus that while it's a shame that

'terrorists have brought this to our country, the monument is still open for us to enjoy.

Mount Rushmore is simply a special place. People are either awed by the monument, or they're disappointed, there doesn't seem to be much middle ground in peoples reaction. Jenny has always loved to just soak up the monument, while it evokes such strong patriotic feelings in me that I sometimes become emotional. This year, because of 9-11 those feelings are really close to the surface. After letting the groups wander the monument for awhile, I am extremely surprised and pleased to hear several in the group talking about some of the facts they've learned about the monument and their country in the short time they've been here. It just reaffirms my belief that travel is educational.

Jenny does it again. She never stops trying to enhance the trip. Now she manages to top everything we've done in the program, at least as far as I'm concerned. She got permission for the group to formally retire the National Colors at the end of tonight's program. After talking to the Ranger in charge of the days program, we find that the flag that we'll be retiring is the same one that flew over the monument on 9-11. Even though the flag is tattered, the Rang-

ers decided that it would not be taken down until the 4th of July.

Like a lot of people, they were sending their own message to those who attacked our country last September.

After gathering the group and practicing several times in the main hallway of the museum, we all sat down to enjoy the final minutes of the program, which included patriotic music by the Air Force Band and a film about the monument and the people who built it. The entire crowd of approximately 10,000 people sang the Star Spangled Banner during which time hidden lights lit up the faces on the mountain and our nation's flag. The Cadets were introduced by the Ranger in charge, followed by the retiring of the Colors. It went picture perfect, there wasn't a sound to be heard, not even a child crying. When we got home and re-viewed the video I shot, we couldn't believe the number of camera flashes. Afterwards the kids were floating, they were so pumped up about what

they did. What a tremendous honor.

It was close to midnight before we got back to camp. On the way, we had noticed a note under our windshield wiper. It was a note from someone from Mercer County just saying hi. No one was even close to being tired, so Jenny decided to cook a late supper of chili by lantern light. Just about the time supper was ready, a car turned off the main road and stopped in camp. When the driver got out I couldn't believe it. It was Kyle Fletcher and his wife, Audrey, from Broadhead. Kyle was one of the original members of the "Corps of Discovery '98," who came out here with us four years ago. He was camped in a nearby KOA, and saw our tents set up earlier in the day. Other than our daughter, Kyle was the first of the original group to make it back to South Dakota. Ticked Jenny and I both.

Day 9 - July 5, 2002
Still in Black Hills National Forest.

Woke up this morning to the sound of beautiful Native music that Jenny and Jay were playing over the external speaker on the bus. We then had a breakfast few of us will ever forget. Don't remember what all we had, but it included oatmeal with walnuts and raisins. I love my wife with all my heart, and I sincerely believe she's the best cook in the world. But she has never tried to cook oatmeal in a big pot over a Coleman stove for 14 people before. I ate mine right away, but it was starting to set up pretty good before I finished. Oatmeal is supposed to stick to your ribs, but this stuff stuck to anything it touched before it got to your ribs. The kids harassed her to no end. I didn't though. I learned long time ago in the Army, you never give the Mess Sergeant a hard time. You never know what you'll be eating the next meal. She took the harassment real good though.

Board the bus for a short trip down the road where the group takes a short dip in Horse Thief Lake. Don't spend much time swimming though, we've got places to go and hills to climb. We pick up ice in Keystone and head up on Iron Mountain Road. Beautiful scenery. The road cuts through the mountains in narrow one-lane tunnels. I chicken out and bypass two of

them though. I don't think Mr. Perkins will be amused if I stick one of his buses in a tunnel in South Dakota. Several switchbacks and pig-tail loops where you can almost read your own license plate from the driver's seat.

We finally arrive at Harney Peak in Custer State Park. I don't think too



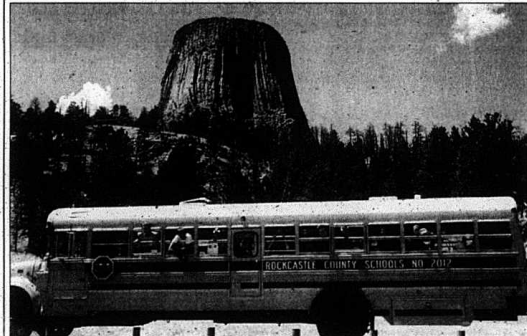

many are all that anxious to climb to the top, but we split into two groups and head out after a good threat brief. Jenny and I find out that we just may be getting a little old. The kids breeze right along, but it just about kills us. At about the half way point, we run into Kyle and his wife, Audrey, heading back down. It's the last we see of them, since they're heading home.

We continue plodding along the trail. Maybe if we went at our own pace instead of trying to stay up with teenagers we wouldn't hurt so much. For the first time on the trip it's cloudy and sprinkling just a bit, with thunder way off in the distance. At least it keeps the heat down. Jenny finally sends me on ahead when we're approaching the top. As usual, she's

worrying about the kids. I finally reach the top where I find the entire group enjoying the view, especially a storm way off in the distance and the forest fire that's burning over near Deadwood. After a few photos I send them on down while I re-pack the cameras. Shortly after I start down, Joe shows up with Jenny in tow. She's too stubborn to start up a mountain without getting to the top. After they return from the top, we rejoin the group and give them instructions to meet us in the lodge at the bottom. On the way down, the rain got a little heavier and the temperature actually started to get a little chilly. When we finally joined the kids at the bottom of the trail, nobody was interested in the planned swim in Sylvan Lake. We actually had to run the heater in the bus on the way back to camp.

On the way to camp, since everyone was tired, we stopped in the town of Custer had pizza for supper. It was great, especially since we got it cheap. Customers before us left before their order was done, so we got it almost free.

Several of the kids had expressed some concern before starting up the mountain that they might not be up to the climb. I guess we made it sound too hard. Many of them had a real sense of accomplishment and did much better than they thought they would. All were impressed by the view (five states, SD, ND, NE, WY and MT). While a storm was coming in and we were covered with clouds, the Badlands had been in several days ago were still lit up by the sun. Everybody slept extremely well that night.

Day 10 - July 6, 2002

Sad to say, we packed up camp to leave the Black Hills right after breakfast. Several comments about the we had yesterday morning. Stopped in Keystone to let the kids wander around the shops a little before we left. On the way into Rapid City we stopped at a little tourist spot where the students panned for gold. They really got into the spirit. Jessica was the only one who found gold, but several found semiprecious stone and pyrite. Departed the gold panning area and arrived at the Journey Museum, where we saw a great Imax Theater movie and toured the museum. Met mom and dad again for the final time. The museum is really educational, chronicling the history of the entire area from prehistoric times to near present time.

After touring the museum, we ate at Golden Corral before getting on the road again, heading for Wyoming and Devil's Tower. Along the way, we pass near Deadwood where they were finally getting the forest fire there under control.

The scenery leading into Devil's

Tower is hard to describe. If anything, it's even prettier than the Black Hills, to me at least. We caught our first look at the tower when it's still about 15 miles away. For the first time this trip, I've got to admit that I'm disappointed that the group as a whole doesn't seem to appreciate the country we're passing through. Sometimes I need to remember that when I was younger, I was probably the same way. They finally get more interested as we get closer to the tower. Devil's Tower is undoubtedly the oddest terrain feature I've ever seen. Many people, to include several among our group, find the area invokes spiritual feelings. To understand, you just have to go there and see it yourself.

As soon as we arrived in the campground started a fire to cook hamburgers. Almost immediately, the campground host showed up and told me there was a state-wide ban on outdoor fires. In fact, people weren't even suppose to smoke outdoors due to the high risk of fire. So crank up the Coleman Stove again. That night we were entertained by "Buffalo Bill" Boycott, with old-time music, cowboy poetry and best of all, the story of Custer's last stand told in Indian sign language (from the Indian's side of course).

The next morning we had bacon and homemade fried apple pies, cooked over a Coleman stove. Once Jenny showed them how, the kids set up an assembly line, one rolling out the biscuits, one filling them with

cooked apples and one frying the pies. It was great.

Afterwards we spent a little time in the small museum before walking around the tower. There were about 10 people climbing the tower in sev-

eral small groups. We stopped and watched each group along the way. Jenny thought we'd have to tie up Andy. He seems to be part Mountain Goat, and thinks he has to climb anything with sides. Andy swears he'll come back out and climb the tower someday and we believe him. It's really something to watch the climbers.

After supper, we heat up water and have supervised hair washing and good prairie baths. It's been several days since the last shower, but everyone is doing a great job of staying clean, with baths from a wash bowl. We hit the sack early for an early departure tomorrow morning. It's clouding up bad, and looks like a real bad storm coming in. Lots of wind and lightning.

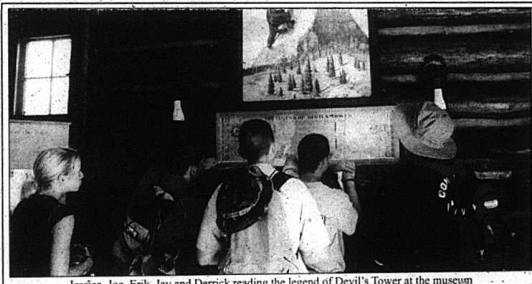

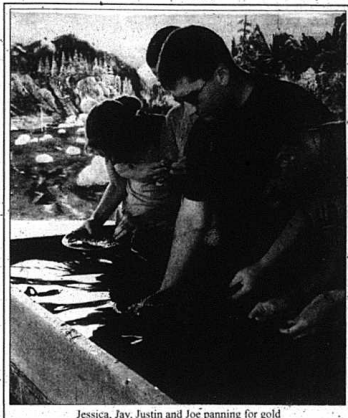

ATTENTION INCOMING 6th GRADERS

Tips to Safely Can and Freeze Your Fruits and Vegetables

Many of us are busy canning and freezing the bounty from our gardens and local markets. To safely preserve products, always follow U.S. Department of Agriculture time-proven canning and freezing procedures. Below are the answers to some frequently asked questions.

* Can food be re-canned if the lid doesn't seal?
If you discover the unsealed jar within 24 hours, the food can safely be re-canned. Remove the lid and check the jar sealing surface for tiny nicks. Change the jar if needed and add a new, washed lid, then reprocess using the same original processing time.

* How long will canned food keep?
Properly canned food will retain optimum eating quality for at least one year when stored in a cool, dry place. Canned food might lose some quality in a few weeks or months if stored in a warm place (near hot pipes, a furnace or indirect sunlight) depending on the temperature. Dampness might corrode cans or metal lids, causing leakage and food spoilage.

* Do I need to exhaust a pressure canner?
Yes. It's very important to allow steam to escape for 10 minutes before closing the valve, or putting the weight on the vent. This allows the inside temperature to correspond to that of the pressure gauge.

* What causes corn to turn brown during processing?
This usually happens when too high a temperature causes sugar in the corn to caramelize. It is especially a problem with super-sweet varieties. Discoloration also might be caused by some minerals in water used in canning.

* I've heard canning bread or cake in a jar isn't recommended. Why isn't it safe?
Choose recipes you can freeze, because breads and cakes aren't recommended for canning. Many recipes for quick breads and cakes are low acid and have the potential to support certain bacteria that cause botulism if they are present inside the closed jar. Canning jar manufacturers do not endorse baking in their products. Commercial breads or cakes in a jar are made with additives, preservatives and processing controls not available for home canner.

* Why blanch vegetables before freezing them?
Blanching is the process of heating or scalding vegetables in boiling water or steam for a short time. This slows or stops enzymatic action that reduces flavor, color and texture. It also removes dirt and organisms from vegetable surfaces; helps retain vitamins; and wilts or softens vegetables, making them easier to pack in freezer containers.

* How should I blanch vegetables?
Use a wire blanching basket and covered saucepan, or a wire basket into a large kettle with a fitted lid. Use one gallon of vigorously boiling water per pound of prepared vegetables. After putting vegetables into the basket, lower it into the container and begin blanching time as soon as the water returns to a boil, usually within one minute. If it takes longer to return to a boil, you're using too much vegetable for the amount of water. Be sure to keep heat high for the total blanching time.

* Why do I need to cool vegetables after blanching?
Quickly and thoroughly cool vegetables to stop the cooking process. Otherwise, they'll be overcooked and lose flavor, color, vitamins and minerals.

* What causes frost or ice crystals on the surface of frozen vegetables?
Inadequate draining before freezing, slow freezing, or temperature fluctuations above 0 degrees Fahrenheit might cause this. It can affect frozen vegetables' texture and appearance.

* How long will food remain frozen if the power goes off?
The food will stay frozen longer if the freezer isn't opened, is full, located in a cool place and is well-insulated. Food in a loaded

freezer usually will remain frozen from two to four days, depending on the freezer size. A half-filled freezer will keep food frozen for

only about one complete day. To help retain intrajug cold, cover the freezer with blankets. Be sure to keep blankets away from the compressor.

* Can thawed food be re-frozen?
Yes, if one of the following two conditions is met: (1) The food has partially thawed and still has ice crystals in the package, or (2) the freezer temperature has remained at 40 degrees F or below. Always check the color and odor before using the food.

* What is freezer burn?
It is drying on the surface of an improperly wrapped frozen food. Although the food is safe to eat, it's poorer quality. To prevent freezer burn, the wrapping or package must be air-free and sealed airtight.

* Does freezing kill germs or improve the quality of food?
It does neither. Although freezing doesn't kill all bacteria, yeasts and molds in food, it does keep them from rapidly multiplying when the food remains at 0 degrees F or less. However, surviving organisms can multiply when the food is thawed.

* Frozen food is only as good as the quality of the fresh food. So choose high-quality products at optimum maturity and freshness.

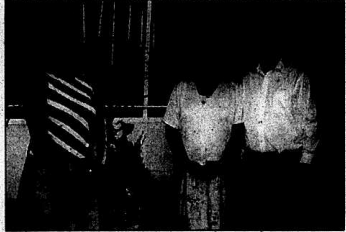

SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action. Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

1. Arrive at bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed.
2. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
3. Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you.
4. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
5. The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating arrangements.
6. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
7. Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
8. Obey the rules posted on each bus.
9. Do not block aisles in any way.
10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus.
11. Never run toward the bus, Always load and unload when the bus has come to a complete stop.
12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses.
13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
15. Report any damages to the bus.
16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions.
18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule.
19. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language
 - b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus
 - c. Fighting on the bus
 - d. Destruction of bus property
 - e. Defiance of driver's authority
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
20. **Disciplinary Action:** Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.



Parents & Teachers School Bus Safety Alert

A child's clothing can be dangerous when getting off the bus. A number of children have been injured or killed when their clothing became caught when exiting the bus.

Dangerous clothing that can get caught in handrails, doors or other areas include:

- Jackets or sweatshirts with drawstrings
- Backpack straps
- Scarves or other loose clothing

Please talk with your children about these Safety Rules:

- Stay away from Danger Zones around the bus
- If you drop something near the bus, don't pick it up. The driver may not see you. Tell the driver & follow his/her instructions.
- Remember that motorists don't always stop for the school bus. Use extreme caution when getting on or off the bus.

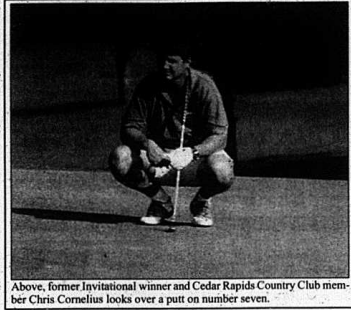

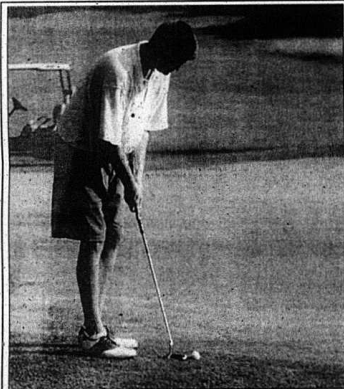

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

- B. Provide for budget amendments if requested by the legislative body or if anticipated through administration and implementation.
- C. Prepare any financial statements required for publication purposes, pursuant to KRS 424 and 91A.
- D. Cause each fund of this budget to be audited as prescribed by law.

SECTION THREE: The detailed operating budget is adopted by reference for administration, accounting and reporting purpose.

SECTION FOUR: This ordinance shall be published in the newspaper by title and summary within thirty (30) days after adoption.

SECTION FIVE: This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon passage and publication as required by law.

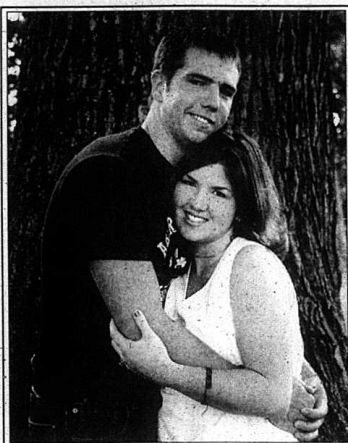

The Family Room

The Bible Does Not Support Abuse

I am tired of hearing the Bible used to justify the abuse and control of women by men. God does not, and did not and will not approve of abuse in any shape, form or fashion. Any attempt to "prove" that abuse is OK by using Scripture is a misuse of Scripture.

The passage that I hear most often quoted by abusive males is Ephesians 5:22. "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord."

I know of abusive, controlling males who quote this to their wives just after "ordering" them to do what the husband says. Paul, the author of this passage, did not mean that a wife was to accept any kind of treatment that the husband dishes out. Nor did he mean that the wife should stay in a marriage where she is being abused.

Taking Scripture out of context is a favorite past time of those who try to use the Bible to justify their actions. To understand Ephesians 5:22, we must examine it in the context of the passage in which it occurs.

The verse just prior, Ephesians 5:21, says, "Submitting yourselves

to another in the fear of God." Now here is a verse that is not quoted much at all! Especially by abusive, controlling males! This verse calls for the mutual submission of the wife to the husband and the husband to the wife. The Apostle Paul is calling for husbands also to be submissive to our wives.

This mutual submission implies more of a marriage partnership than the "wives submit" approach. In a partnership marriage there will be times when each leans on the other for support and advice. I have discovered that there are some areas of life in which my wife is much wiser than I. If I am smart, I will defer to her when a decision is to be made in these areas. At other times I may take the lead in decision making.

There is another verse in Ephesians 5 that is not often quoted by males who seek to control. Ephesians 5:25 says, "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it." We husbands are to love our wives with the same sacrificial love with which Christ loved the church, and Christ loved the church so much that he died for it! Husbands who order their wives to submit are not

demonstrating this kind of sacrificial love. Any husband who orders submission must first ask himself if he loves his wife enough.

Yet another verse speaks to husbands. In Ephesians 5:28, Paul says, "So ought men to love their wives as their own bodies." If a man loves his wife as he loves his own body, he will not abuse his wife. That would be like abusing his own body, which would be foolish.

A loving husband does not attempt to enforce submission. He lovingly leads by example and at times submits himself to his wife (verse 21). Submission that is enforced by fear

is not healthy submission. No loving husband will attempt to use fear to force his wife to give in to his demands.

Men who want to use Ephesians 5:22 to justify controlling their wives had better look closely at the rest of this passage. If 5:22 is to be taken seriously, then the rest of the passage must be carefully heeded as well. Loving your wife as Christ loved the church and loving her as your own body are not easy instructions to obey, but they are a part of the message that the Apostle Paul left for us husbands.

Agricultural News

County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Commission (C) will hold its monthly meeting open to the public the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County FSA Office located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, August 1. The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA as the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have. They will operate FSA committee operations within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws

and applying their judgement and knowledge to make decisions.

Rural Development (Housing)

Rural Development (low income housing) is regularly scheduled to be in the Rockcastle County FSA Office on the next Tuesday of each month. The next day scheduled for RD is Tuesday, August 13th. The main office is located in Richmond, at 2150 Lexington Road, Suite C and the phone number is 859-624-1980 ext. 4.

FY 2002 PFC Reminder

Producers with Production Flexibility contracts (PFCs) authorized under AMTA in the 1996 farm bill must continue to follow contract requirements for the 2002 payment. Producers are encouraged not to

request a payment for the farm if they are considering selling a portion of the entire farm as payment received must be refunded. Changes in your farming operation must be reported timely in order to reflect PFC payments to the current crop year producer.

All changes reflected on the CCC-478, Application for PFC Payment, must be signed by August 1st.

Disaster Leasing

Farmers who suffer a burley tobacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producer that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer must file a crop report with FSA, file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, have planned sufficient acreage to produce the farm's effective quota, provide a measurement fee and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing the measurement fee will be refunded.

Remember: If you are a farmer whose tobacco is suffering from poor weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease, etc. Come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions PRIOR TO HARVEST!

Warehouse Designation

As a condition of price support beginning with the 2001 crop year for tobacco; producers were required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they would market tobacco. This is required by completing the form FSA 808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Initial designation will end August 1, 2002. Producers are encouraged to complete this form after all lease and transfers have been updated for cards to be effective the first date of marketing. After the initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day during the following regular redesignation periods:

- September 30 - October 4, 2002 with card effective October 14, 2002.
- October 28 - November 1, 2002 with card effective November 11, 2002.
- December 2 - December 6, 2002 with card effective December 16, 2002.

* December 27 - January 3, 2003 with card effective January 13, 2003.

The warehouse number will be indicated on the marketing card. Therefore, if you decide to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, you must return that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card that card to the FSA office in specific time periods to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public tobacco warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

Warehouse Closing

Recent notification to county FSA offices reflect Madison Tobacco Warehouse of Richmond, will not be eligible for designation during the 2002-03 marketing year. Producers who have previously designated this warehouse need to contact the FSA office and change warehouses by August 1, 2002. Also producers with tobacco stored at this location will need to contact the warehouse for removal of the tobacco.

Producers who have missing tobacco which were stored at Peoples Tobacco Warehouse in Danville, for the 2000 crop year need to contact the FSA office.

Phase II Payments

Beginning the week of August 5, applications will be mailed to tobacco farm operations and letters will be

mailed to tobacco quota owners about the 2002 fund. These applications, which are exactly like last year's, must be completed and returned promptly postmarked no later than September 16, 2002.

To be considered complete, the application MUST BE SIGNED, by all parties involved with each farm. If the same person fits all the roles designated, that person must sign in all sections that pertain to him/her. If there is a significant line, it must be filled in. The application must be SIGNED IN ALL PLACES indicated on the form. ANY APPLICATION THAT DOES NOT INCLUDE THE SIGNATURE AND SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER OF THE ELIGIBLE PARTY WILL BE INCOMPLETE AND PAYMENTS WILL NOT BE MADE.

Step-by-step instruction are included with each application. Help is also available at the local FSA office, by contacting the toll-free help line at 1-877-549-2337 or on the web site at www.kyagpolicy.com. Funds are expected to be distributed by the national trustee by December 31, 2002.

Important Dates to Remember
August 1, 2002 - Deadline to sign Warehouse Designation.
August 1, 2002 - Deadline to sign or revise the 2002 PFC contracts.

WHICH IS YOUR OPTION?
With the availability of financial reports around these days, we are constantly bombarded with advice regarding life insurance. The people who believe that permanent life insurance such as whole life and universal life is the only way to go, and those who recommend "buy term and invest the difference" philosophy. The simple answer and the conclusion is, best is what is best for you.

ILLUSTRATE THE TERM COST
The chief reason people choose life insurance coverage for protection is to provide another source of funds for dependents after the death of the insured. Both permanent (such as whole life) and term insurance can supply that safety net, but which one does so most effectively? Term insurance is attractive because it has a lower premium, which often makes it the policy choice of average people with limited means and few financial responsibilities. Term insurance offers a fixed benefit for a specific period (one year, five years, etc.). At the end of that time, the coverage is usually renewed, at a higher premium. On the other hand, whole life insurance offers a fixed premium for an entire lifetime, a potentially increasing death benefit, and coverage that will not terminate, provided premiums are paid when due. With term insurance's increase in premium as it approaches, over the course of several decades the cumulative cost of term coverage may well surpass that of a comparable whole life policy. In addition, some term policies require evidence of continued good health with each renewal. If you become uninsurable under the contract, you may not be able to renew the policy.
