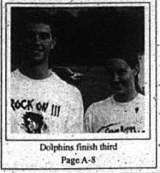


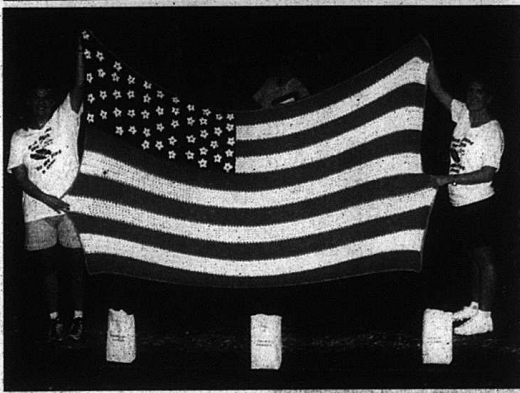

Election filing deadline for November is Tuesday

If you plan on being a candidate in this fall's General Election you have only a few days to file.

The filing deadline is next Tuesday at 4 p.m. All local filings must be made in Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk's office.

This fall there will be races for State Representative, State Senator, U.S. Senator, city council positions, school board seats, Mayoral races and magistrates.

Local realtor and businessman, Republican State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, who has served in the Kentucky House for twenty years is facing Democratic opposition from Stanford attorney J. Paul Long, who is also a former county attorney in Lincoln.

Rockcastle's new State Senator,

Democrat Ed Worley of Richmond, is facing opposition from Republican Barry Metcalf, a former State Senator himself.

Worley's wife, Jamie, is a native of Rockcastle County and former Rockcastle County High School teacher.

In Mt. Vernon, five people, including incumbent Mayor Karen Kling have filed for that office.

King faces opposition from council members Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner, as well as from local businessman Doug Bullock and Jody Adams, a patient at Rockcastle Hospital.

Former council member Lou Vanhoose, former Mt. Vernon police officer Matt Bryant and current council member Wayne Bullock have filed for council seats in Mt. Vernon.

This week a local woman also filed for school board in division one.

Donna Hasty, 34, of Sand Springs, who is currently studying to be a respiratory therapist, will seek the school board seat, which represents East Livingston, West Livingston and South Mt. Vernon. That seat is currently held by Livingston Fire Chief Sam Stallworth, but he has yet to file.

Stallworth said Wednesday that he would file for re-election by the Tuesday deadline.

Mrs. Hasty is no stranger to the board of education. A few years ago she was a strong advocate of school safety and attended several school board meetings and served on a school safety committee.

Noe is new principal at Roundstone School

As the Rockcastle County School system gets ready to start another school year, one more administrative position has been filled.

Lisa Noe, 36, a third grade teacher at Roundstone for several years, was selected by the Site Based Council to replace former principal David Pensol, who was hired as the district Instructional Supervisor a few weeks ago.

Noe has taught in the local school system for thirteen years, first teaching junior high at Brodhead, before going to Roundstone.

Noe also was a member of the Site Based Council at Roundstone for a total of four years.

Noe was the only person interviewed for the job at Roundstone. Her and husband, Dale, make

their home in Berea. They have a three-year-old son.

Roundstone has 20 teachers and a total staff of 38 and an enrollment 300.

With Noe's hiring, only one administrative position remains unfilled.

Kelly Pensol, who has served as the district's Technology Coordinator for the past 11 years, resigned her position and will teach third grade at Roundstone, taking Noe's place.

School starts August 15th

Rockcastle County public school students will return to class on Thursday, August 15th for half a day.

They will attend class the entire day on Friday.

Local school officials are expecting about 3,000 students, to be enrolled on the 15th. This figure includes preschoolers. The enrollment is basically the same as it has been for the past few years, according to school officials.

The first break for students and employees will come on Labor Day, September 2nd.

School will also be dismissed on October 3rd and 4th, November 4th and 5th, 28th and 29th, December 23rd-January 3rd for Christmas break, January 20th, February 17th, and April 7-11 for Spring Break. The final day of school next Spring is

Denham starts Catfish Farm

Ever heard of "growing" catfish? Well it can be done.

Just ask Jimmy Denham, 28, of Lambert Road, who has his own Catfish Farming Operation on May Apple Road, approximately two miles downstream from the Fairview Church on Roundstone Creek.

With the help of Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Bazz Carlifots and a state grant in the amount of \$25,000 Denham recently had two ponds built on his property, with a total surface area of five acres.

The ponds are only four feet deep because research has shown that channel catfish grow much faster in warmer water.

According to information from the state's Aquacultural board, it takes only one and three fourths pounds of feed to grow one pound of Catfish, making the operation very cost effective, when properly operated.

The harvest is estimated to be between 5,000 and 6,000 pounds of fish per acre, every 18 months.

Denham raises cattle and he calls the fish-raising operation an "under-

water feedlot," with a much greater potential return per acre with less expense.

The two ponds are expected to be operational in September or October with feeding operations beginning in April and lasting until November.

A farmer owned co-op in Western Kentucky purchases catfish from

farms and processes them for stores and restaurants.

Denham said that he expects to sell to the co-op and to pay lake distributors.

First off, I need to thank all of you who expressed sympathy for my recent bout with kidney stones. I had no idea that they were so common, and so many of you had gone through the pain that several women described as "worse than child birth".

I'm still weak in the knees and I break out in a cold sweat every time I go to the restroom but, the x-rays say they've all passed and I'm sure that, in time, I'll get over the paranoia.

In the meantime, my good friend and dad near brother, Fred Beste, has sent me a clipping from "The Sand Paper" a well-written newspaper serving the Jersey Shore at Manahawkin, NJ and obviously a fairly large one because the clipping came from page 43. The particular piece had to do with the fact that live fish bait is being dispensed from vending machines in Manahawkin and the Pat Johnson, the writer, thought that was about the coolest thing he/she had ever seen.

Actually the Kain Pole in Richmond, KY has had a redworm/nightcrawler vending machine in front of the store for three or four years for folks fishing Gibson Bay who run out of bait in the middle of the night or maybe getting a late start so I was very familiar with the concept until I discovered that this guy in New Jersey is selling live eels, crabs, clams, bloodworms nightcrawlers and chicken livers.

That's right. Chicken livers which only thought fit for hungry catfish in the Kentucky river because they smelled and looked remarkably like the stuff that runs out of a sewer line straight pipe are touted as one of the best baits for big striped bass out of the Jersey surf. Apparently the bass in New Jersey mistake the livers for oysters, or so think the fishermen.

Because it's the vending machine concept that appeals to me. And as soon as I finish this column I have to get right back onto my business plan which, pending Fred's ability to raise adequate venture capital (and I have

no doubt that he will because this is the best deal he's ever heard about in a lifelong career of betting on innovation) will revolutionize the experience you little people have when you go to the lake for a day or two.

What we intend to do is install floating vending machines on old houseboats and cruise around the major lakes in Kentucky sort of like an icecream truck. We'll knock the cabins and sleeping quarters out of the houseboats and have them set up so that you can drive your boat between the pontoons and get anything you want simply by inserting your credit card or, say a hundred bill, and pushing buttons without ever getting out of your boat.

When you do drive through all the buttons will be right there beside you and when you drive out the whole order will dump out of a chute into your boat and you can be on your way without any hassle. If you're in a big house boat or a cabin cruiser that won't fit in the drive-through, not to worry. We'll have rental jn boats that you can paddle through much the same as you'd use a grocery cart at the grocery store. But you'll have to hurry or somebody will push you

slow behind out of the way. It will be the ultimate in convenience folks and you will be amazed. We'll be shooting off fireworks or smoke signals every thirty minutes to let you know where the vending machine is. Needless to say, we are still working out the deal with the Army Corps of Engineers and we are trying to recruit our buddy, Steve Meng, to work

out what few minor details are not covered above and actually give him a piece of the action to captain the first floating vending machine. Mengo can't wait to see you all on the lake. Nor can I. In the meantime, if you have any questions or want to invest in this venture, call Fred Beste on the Jersey Shore. He's the only partner with time on his hands right now.

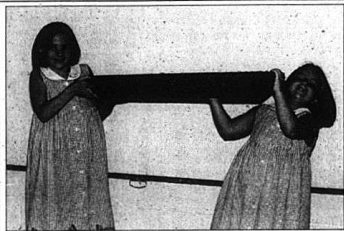

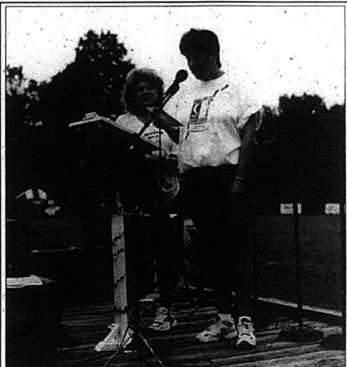

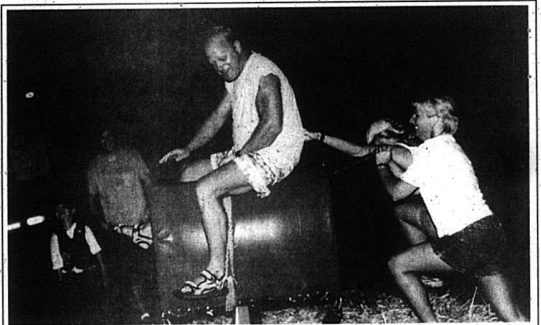

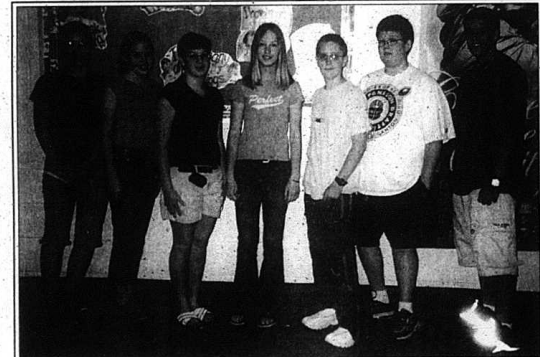

YSC Update
This is the first of a series of sub-articles to appear with *Minds in the Middle*. Not only is it a requirement, it is also to inform, educate, and perhaps entertain. Education, not unlike other agencies, is famous for acronyms and several will be used extensively in this section. Each will be explained as used, with some being familiar, others new. YSC - Youth Services Center, FRYSC - Family Resource Youth Services Center, OFRYSC - Office of Family Resource Youth Services Center.

FRC - Family Resource Center, and KERA - Kentucky Education Reform Act. FRYSCs were part of the 1990 Kentucky Education Reform Act. Each district in the state had the option to submit a grant for these centers to be located within the schools. Rockcastle was fortunate to have all grants funded. The mission of FRYSCs is to remove non-cognitive barriers to learning. FRYSCs are funded yearly by grants from the state. The money is allocated to the local board and is then used as directed by the Advisory Council and local school board. OFRYSC is located in Frankfort with nine regional offices throughout the state. Rockcastle is in Region 9 and the regional office is located in Barbourville, Kentucky. The unique characteristic of the FRYSCs is that each is independently governed by its Advisory Council and the needs within the individual school. No two FRYSCs are the same! YSCs are located in the middle and high schools, while FRCs are located in the elementary schools.

Brandon Hargis, a sixth grade teacher at Rockcastle County Middle School in Mt. Vernon, recently completed a 10-day honors workshop for middle school teachers at the NASA Langley Research Center in Hampton, Virginia, sponsored by NASA and the National Science Teachers Association.

Mr. Hargis successfully completed with hundreds of other educators for one of 18 spots in the NASA Educational Workshop NEW (5-8) at NASA Langley. Nearly 250 other educators attended similar workshops at one of ten other Agency centers across the nation.

"My experiences in the NASA NEW program at Langley Research Center have strengthened my background in aviation and aerospace technology and continued to keep me on the path of a life long learner. It is my hope that the resources we discovered at NASA will be incorporated within hands-on, inquiry-based and portfolio appropriate lessons/activities that engage and inspire the next generation of explorers."

The NEW 5-8 program was designed in the wake of a national study which indicates that if students have

not developed an interest in math or science by the third grade, their chances of doing so decrease over time. NEW 5-8 was created to encourage students' enthusiasm for math and science by engaging their teachers in an exciting program that can be easily transferred across the elementary curriculum.

The NEW 5-8 program is a unique combination of scientific and hands-on experience. During the two weeks the teachers learned about cutting-edge NASA projects, visited NASA facilities, attended seminars by NASA researchers, engineers and technicians, and studied topics ranging from aerodynamics to interplanetary exploration. A portion of the program was devoted to NEW 5-8 Sharing, in which teachers shared ideas and strategies for translating their experiences into invaluable, classroom material.

Educators are now encouraged to spread their knowledge beyond the classroom to other educators and to their community, yielding a heightened awareness of the importance of a strong math and science base in our increasingly technological world.

RIF honors school

Reading is Fundamental, Inc. (RIF), the nation's largest children's and family literacy organization, and Coca-Cola North America, today announced the official kickoff of Rockcastle County Schools as a recipient of a 2002 Ingenuity Grant, part of their "Reading Takes You Places" partnership. Project Director Rebecca Isaacs and Dr. Robert Popp, who will evaluate the program, met July 29th in Washington, D.C., with RIF staff and a team of research and evaluation experts to launch their new literacy program.

Reading is Fundamental and The Coca-Cola Company have entered into a three-year partnership to enhance RIF's ability to provide essential literacy services to at-risk children nationwide and to increase public awareness about the importance of reading for children and families. The partnership provides funding for RIF to make competitive grants available to support creative literacy programs developed and implemented at the local level. RIF's 1,600 multi-site programs are eligible for these grants, with Rockcastle County Schools being one of 19 grant recipients selected nationwide this year by RIF's panel of experts.

"RIF is grateful to have this opportunity to support innovative ideas for the development of motivational

education projects," said Carol H. Rasco, President and CEO of Reading is Fundamental. "With the generous assistance of Coca-Cola, Rockcastle County school children will be able to experience a fun, new method of learning that they couldn't receive through their standard school curriculum."

The 25,000 Ingenuity Grant awarded to Mt. Vernon Elementary School, in collaboration with the public library, basic arts coordinator, community educator coordinator, Even Start program, Family Resource Center, local Kiwanis group, Christian Appalachian Project, Adult Literacy program and local newspaper, will create a camp environment to support an early childhood summer literacy initiative.

The five and six-year-old students attend a summer camp during which they will move through the thematic stations to increase phonemic awareness, and improve reading, writing, and listening skills. There will also be activities that provide large and small motor skills, such as outdoor play and team games.

During the two-week camp, parents will join their children each Friday at the camp. They will participate in activities and workshops designed to promote involvement in

their children's literacy experience. In addition to the camp there will be parent/child activities held during the school year that will involve reading readiness workshops as well as other family services. Staff members for Camp Learn-A-Lot include: Judy Maples, Camp Director; Shelley Parkerson, Curriculum Counselor; Sherry Cash, Academic Counselor; Janice Davidson, Instructional Counselor; Mary Ann McNew and Sandy Johnson, Arts and Humanities; Janet Mullins, Recreation and Darlene Mays, Transportation.

Benefits of the Ingenuity Grants include increasing knowledge in the field of reading motivation, strengthening the engagement of volunteers and community members in children's literacy initiatives, and most importantly, contributing to children's success in becoming motivated readers. The wider benefit for the Ingenuity Grants is that they will be models for reading initiatives that can be duplicated at the state or national level.

Through the three-year, \$18 million "Reading Takes You Places" partnership, The Coca-Cola Company is supporting RIF's efforts to give children in some of the nation's highest-need communities access to the joy and power of reading. Launched in June 2001, the four-point initiative includes distribution of 10,000 Classroom Collections of new, high-quality hardcover

children's books for selected RIF programs serving kindergarten through third-grade children; a fleet of Story Travelers, 15 mobile literacy awareness vehicles that promote the value of reading across the country and the RIF Reading Planet (www.rifreadingplanet.org), an interactive website for parents and kids.

Camp Learn-A-Lot

Camp Learn-A-Lot, a literacy based summer camp at Mt. Vernon Elementary School, is a ten-day adventure into reading and writing for young students entering first grade. Camp instruction is conducted by four Reading Recovery teachers and instructional assistants trained in early reading strategies.

The Camp Learn-A-Lot program is made possible through a grant partnership of Reading is Fundamental (RIF) and the Coca-Cola Company. Ingenuity Grants. This partnership provides funding for RIF to make competitive grants available to support creative literacy programs developed and implemented at the local level. Ingenuity programs are awarded to RIF multi-sites to develop demonstration programs that generate effective literacy programs and strengthen community-focused reading programs, enhance community outreach and foster significant collaboration.

The impact expected from participation by students, parents and local partners in Camp Learn-A-Lot consists of developing a love and appreciation of reading, increases academic achievement, increases parents' use of resources related to their own educational and employment skills. Cope attends summer school at NASA

This summer, 18 teachers and administrators traded-in their checkbooks, hall passes and dismissal bells for wind tunnel tests, acoustic labs and aeronautics-related briefings at a two-week NASA Educator Workshop (NEW) at NASA's Langley Research Center, Hampton, Virginia. The educators were invited to attend NEW in state teams of four members.

Among the participants was a team from Kentucky. Richard "Joe" Cope, a writing teacher at Rockcastle Middle School, was a member of the team. "My time at NASA Langley was more than beneficial to both as a writing teacher and as a person interested in science," said Cope. "What we saw at NASA was very exciting and certainly cutting edge."

The NEW program was designed to increase student enthusiasm for math, science and technology by immersing educators in an exciting program that can be integrated into their curriculum. In a unique combination

of scientific and technological hands-on activities, the workshop introduced the teachers to cutting-edge NASA projects and a variety of facilities at NASA Langley. They attended seminars by NASA researchers, engineers and technicians and studied topics ranging from aerodynamics to interplanetary exploration.

In keeping with NASA's mission, "to inspire the next generation of explorers," the NEW participants have accepted the challenge to integrate NASA materials into their next class of students and to share their summer experience at NASA with fellow educators in their schools, districts and state.

NEW is funded by the NASA Education Enterprise and is a collaborative effort of NASA's Langley Office of Education and the National Science Teacher Association. Teams were selected from Langley's five-state service region, which includes Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, North Carolina and South Carolina.

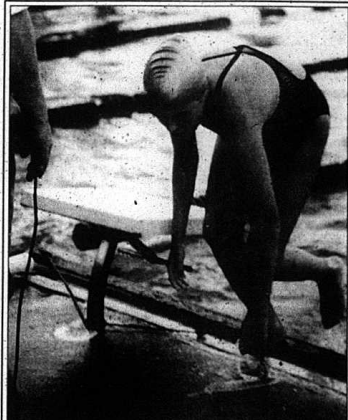

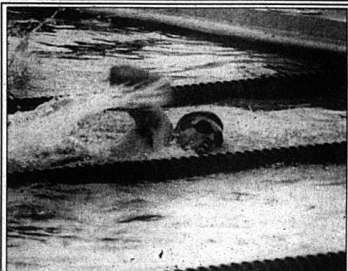

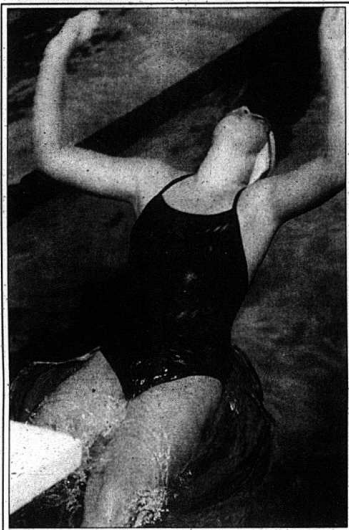

Corps of Discovery travel out West

Day 12 - July 8, 2002

Departed Devil's Tower, heading toward Yellowstone.

Got up early this morning, no rain after all last night. Just lots of wind and lightning. We don't even wait for breakfast, just eat donuts as we go down the road. We're on the road by 6:00 a.m.

We take state roads into Montana, passing through the Wind River Sioux and Crow Indian Reservations. We stopped at a small gas station in the Crow Reservation to get a pop and use the facilities. A group of our kids immediately started playing hickysack beside the bus. Soon an Indian teenager drove up on a riding-lawnmower and starting talking to the kids. Then a man pulled up in a pickup, came on the bus and asked me if I was sure I knew where we were going. When I assured him that I did, he said that a lot of people were having a hard time figuring out where to go. I then told him that I thought it was fairly simple, just stay on the highway. When he started to give me directions to the local high school, I asked him just who he thought we were. Come to find out, he mistook

us for a fire-fighting team which hadn't showed up at the local assembly point. Talk about confusing.

We finally arrived at the Little Big Horn National Battlefield. After a quick lunch of sandwiches, we walked through the National Cemetery to the visitors center. We attended two interpretive talks at the visitors center. The second one was given by a retired Army Colonel, who was without a doubt the most dynamic and interesting instructor any of us had ever heard. He gave an outstanding talk about the leaders involved, the events leading up to the battle, then the tactics used by both sides. I have always considered myself a student of military history, but I learned more in that short talk than I would have believed possible. After the interpretive talk, we walked up to the monument where the final battle took place. As always, I can't help picturing in my mind, what a grim day that must have been for the men of the Seventh Cavalry. We also drive out the ridge to where Reno and Benteen fought their own battles that day. This was a first for me as well as the kids.

We need to get on down the road, so off we go again. Or as Tim keeps writing in his journal, verses from Willie Nelson's "On the Road Again." It's 110 degrees today, and for the first time this trip, it feels like it. The wind coming in the bus feels like a blast furnace. We need fuel and ice before heading up into the Big Horn Mountains, so we stop in the town of Sheridan where we also eat supper at Subway. We are really running behind schedule today, but we haven't wasted any time either.

We finally get off the interstate and start heading up the mountains. You can feel the temperature dropping each mile as we get higher. The view is spectacular and it seems like you can see a hundred miles.

When we finally get to the top of the mountain range, the temperature is in the low 70s and the vegetation has completely changed. We pulled off on a Forest Service road to let the kids stretch a while and just walk around. We're at close to 10,000 feet elevation here and it just feels strange. Without giving any explanation, I tell everyone to race to a point about 50 yards away, and off they go. Many of them don't make it that far, and those that did really felt it when they stopped. It was probably mean, but I wanted to really show them what a change in elevation does to your physical ability. It backfires though, they all want the Raider Team to train here next year.

Further down the road, we pull over to allow Jenny and some of the kids to photo and video a moose and her calf. I didn't even know they had moose in Wyoming. We also see another solitary moose off in the distance. Still further down the road, we start passing patches of snow. When we get close to one, I stopped the bus just long enough to have a short snowball fight. Jenny chickened out and hid behind her camera. Every-

body else though, really got into it.

It's starting to get pretty late, and we still have to get down off the mountains before dark. We make one more stop. There's a pull off where you can see the desert we'll be descending into far below, where it is already dark. We also see one of those scenes that most of us will remember for the rest of our life. Off in the distance, several miles away, is a flock of sheep. We can barely make out three or four dogs working the sheep across this mountain side towards a covered wagon type vehicle which is right on the skyline. What kind of life-style does this shepherd have, to be up here so high, surrounded by some of the most beautiful scenery God placed on this earth? Everything I've read about these shepherds says that they stay up here all summer, moving their flocks from one mountain side pasture to another, until winter arrives.

Finally, we start down the mountain. Low gear all the way for probably twenty miles. The only time I need to use the brakes is when we come up to cattle standing in the road. I guess it's the only level ground they have. It's a little too dark to see if their legs are shorter on one side, but it sure would help if they were.

It's further into Cody than I thought, and we don't arrive at the campground till around midnight. With the weather being perfect, we decide to just sleep under the stars tonight. We've got a good soft bed of grass, and an almost cold breeze, with a beautiful sky above us. A perfect night.

Day 13 - July 9, 2002

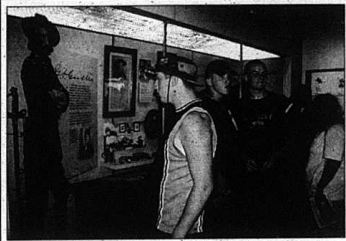
We departed Buffalo Bill State Park, where we spent the night, and head into Yellowstone National Park. On the way, we stop at one of the first Ranger Stations, where we read about bears (Grizzly Bears) and how to avoid them. In fact, a couple of campgrounds in the area are closed due to

trouble with bears in the area, several others are limited to campers with hard sides only.

After entering Yellowstone, our first stop is Yellowstone Lake; where several of the kids take a quick dip in the water. It's quick mainly because it's cold. We also see one of those stops along the geyser basin where you find all different types of geyser pools. Some are just mud pots, boiling and reeking of sulfur. Others are crystal blue pools that seem as though they have no bottom. Temperatures of the pools vary, with the color of the pool indicating the temperature of the water. Later, we finally pull into the main lodge area, where Old Faithful is in the process of erupting. We let the groups wander after setting a meeting time to rendezvous beside Old Faithful, 10 minutes before the next eruption.

After watching Old Faithful erupt, Jenny and I are surprised to learn that the kids are disappointed in the eruption. Most thought there would be more noise accompanying the event. After getting a little diesel at the lodge, we continue our circle through the park. Yellowstone is beautiful in many ways, not just the geysers and hot springs that are all over the area. We saw a large number of buffalo and only a few elk. What Yellowstone has a lot of though is waterfalls and fast running streams throughout the entire park. After stopping at one of these streams, we noticed a large cloud of smoke in the distance. The cloud was enormous, reaching so high that the top half was white as snow. We kept our eye on this cloud the rest of the day, since our route brought us closer and closer. We found out later that the fire was far

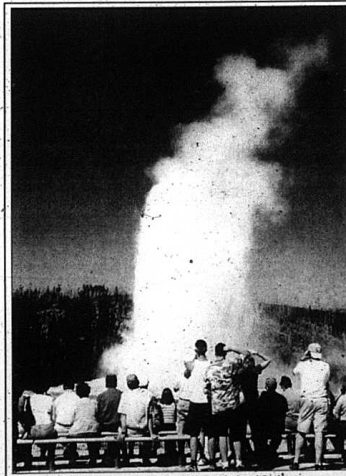

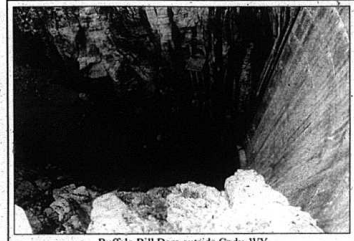

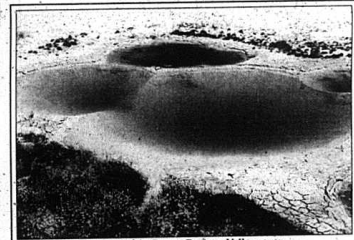

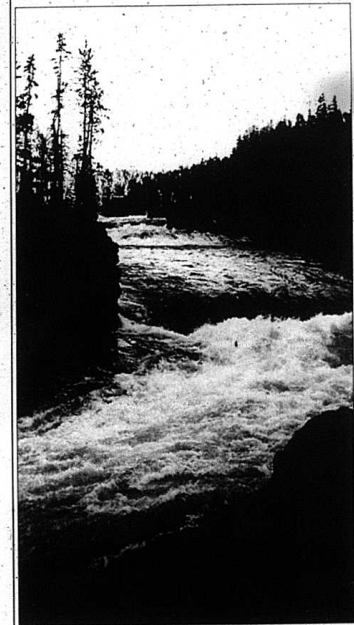

Day 14 - July 10, 2002

Dale, have three school age children. Steve Owens, 55, of Mareburg, has filed for the school board seat in division three. He is a retired Chief Bank Examiner by the State of Kentucky.

This seat is currently held by board chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith, but Griffith announced a few weeks ago that he would not seek re-election. He served on the board for ten years.

Division three is composed of the precincts, North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon and Bullock.

There will also be two magistrate races and a constable's race this fall. Two term third district incumbent Republican Billy McKinney faces opposition from Democrat James "Bear" Bradley.

Four years ago, McKinney defeated Bradley by just 13 votes.

The third district is composed of Brown, West Brodhead and Bullock.

Two term incumbent Democrat, John

Holbrook faces opposition from Republican challenger David Gibbs, a Mt. Vernon businessman, in district one. District one is comprised of North Mt. Vernon and North Brodhead precincts.

The only other filing for council positions to date has been in Livingston, where incumbent council member Todd Miak has filed for re-election.

Statewide, incumbent Republican U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell is seeking a fourth term. He faces opposition from Lois Combs Weinberg, the daughter of former Kentucky Governor Bert Combs.

One of the most powerful men in Congress, U.S. Representative Harold Rogers of Somerset, a Republican, has no opposition.

Mrs. Hoak said that a new state law will require anyone wishing to run as a write-in candidate to file papers in her office by October 25th.

"Candidates must file a Statement of Intent in my office before they are accepted," she said. There is no filing fee, and no signatures are required, according to the clerk.

Phase II Payments

Beginning the week of August 5, applications will be mailed to tobacco farm operations and letters will be mailed to tobacco quota owners about the 2002 fund. These applications, which are exactly like last year's, must be completed and returned promptly postmarked no later than September 16, 2002.

To be considered complete, the application MUST BE SIGNED, by all parties involved with each farm. If the same person fits all the roles designated, that person must sign in all sections that pertain to him/her. If there is a significant line, it must be filled in. The application must be signed in ALL places indicated on the form. ANY APPLICATION THAT DOES NOT INCLUDE THE SIGNATURE AND SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER OF THE ELIGIBLE PARTY WILL BE INCOMPLETE AND PAYMENTS WILL NOT BE MADE.

Step-by-step instruction are included with each application. Help is also available at the local FSA of-

ice, by contacting the toll-free help line at 1-877-549-2537 or on the web site at www.kyagpolicy.com. Funds are expected to be distributed by the national trustee by December 31, 2002.

FSA Provides Loans to Horse Breeders Affected by MRLS
Jeffery S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, has announced a new program that provides low-interest loans to qualified horse breeders who have suffered losses due to mare reproductive loss syndrome (MRLS). The program was enacted on November 29, 2001 as part of the Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2002.

Horse breeders can borrow money to replace mares and foals or disabled by MRLS. Breeders also can borrow money to pay ordinary and necessary expenses related to the horse breeding business, purchase or lease pastures when a veterinarian or other expert determines a pasture has the potential to cause MRLS, pay or re-

finance debts directly related to the horse breeding business and local-closing cost.

Breeders should contact their local FSA office to determine if they meet eligibility requirements. Loan applications must be filed at the local FSA office no later than September 30, 2002.

Disaster Leasing

Farmers who suffer a burlap tobacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to produce that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer must file a crop report with FSA, file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, have planted sufficient acreage to produce the farm's effective quota, provide a measurement fee and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing the measurement fee will be refunded.

Remember: If you are a farmer whose tobacco is suffering from poor weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease, etc. Come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions **PRIOR TO HARVEST!**

USDA Dairy Program Signup Begins August 13

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced that signup for the Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) program will begin August 13, 2002. This program, authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill, financially compensates dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

"USDA continues to work aggressively to implement the new farm bill in an efficient and timely manner," Veneman said while touring dairy operations here and participating in town hall forums hosted by Representative Rob Simmons. "This announcement will allow dairy farmers to begin sign-up so they can obtain program benefits."

Eligible dairy producers are those who produced milk in any state and marketed the milk commercially beginning December 2001. To be approved for the program, producers must be in compliance with highly erodible and wetland conservation provisions and must enter into a contract with USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation to provide monthly marketing data.

MILC payments will occur in months when the price of Class I milk in Boston under the Northeast Milk Marketing Order falls below \$16.94 per cwt. Payment rates will be 45 percent of the difference between \$16.94 and the Boston Class I price for that month. Dairy operations will not receive a payment for months during which the Class I price in Boston is \$16.94 or higher. A similar payment calculation will be applied from December 1, 2001, through the month preceding the month the producer enters into a contract with CCC.

Program payments, scheduled to begin in October 2002, will be retroactive from December 1, 2001 for eligible production. Payments will be made on an operation-by-operation basis, up to a maximum of 2.4 million pounds of milk produced and marketed by the dairy operation per fiscal year. Producers can select the month they want to start receiving payments for eligible production.

As required by the 2002 Farm Bill, USDA will apply the same definition for a dairy operation as used in previous dairy market loss assistance programs. A dairy operation is any person or group of persons who as a single unit, as determined by CCC, commercially produces and markets cow milk and has production facilities located in the U.S. Producers on dairy operations are not permitted to reconstitute a dairy operation for the sole purpose of receiving additional payments.

For more information and requirements, or to sign up for the program, dairy producers should visit their local USDA Farm Service Agency offices.

Rural Development (Housing)
Rural Development (low income

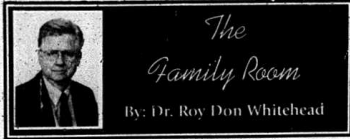

The Family Room

Walking Is the Best Exercise.
I am a walker. I have joined the fraternity of those who walk regularly.

I have been at it for about eight months now, and I highly recommend it. I walk at Rocky Hollow Recreation Center. I cannot say enough good things about the Somerset Parks and Recreation Department and the indoor walking/jogging track at Rocky Hollow. One good thing is that the cost is only \$12 a year.

The track is one-eighth of a mile in length. This is large for an indoor track. I know of one in another center Kentucky town where it takes twenty laps to make a mile.

The Rocky Hollow track is a treat. I much prefer indoor walking to the outdoor version. Indoors there are no bugs, no cars, no dogs, no hills and no heat. The indoor track is perfectly level, and the tracks for easier walking. The track is made of a composition material that is softer than asphalt or concrete and easier on the feet and legs.

Walking in general is less stressful to the body than running. Running jolts the joints of the ankle, knee and hip and can cause damage. Walking is much easier on the joints. The least stressful form of exercise for the joints is water aerobics. If this appeals to you, then you need to check out the Blakely Family YMCA. This facility has three pools, one outdoors and two indoors, a lap pool and a water pool for exercise and therapy.

Since April I have walked over 300 miles. Am I bragging? You better believe it. However, I am not where near the top of the heap of walkers at Rocky Hollow. While I walk three to four miles a day, one gentleman walks three miles in the morning and then comes back for another three in the afternoon. One woman walks ten miles a day! That is correct: ten miles in one twenty-

four hour period. She walks five miles then goes home for a rest and comes back for another five miles. As far as I know she is the long distance champion at Rocky Hollow.

I am not the fastest walker on the track, so I get passed regularly by the faster walkers. That can be a bit embarrassing sometimes. One day several little gray-haired ladies with their canes came by. Next came a man with his cane. I decided it was time to rest for awhile.

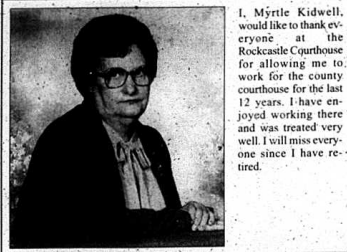
Walking can be a solitary or a group activity. Many walk with a partner.

The advantage of this is that you have someone to encourage you. If you are scheduled to meet your partner at 6:30 at the gym, that is an incentive to show up. I am usually a solitary walker. When I start, I put my mind in neutral and let my body take over. My mind roams all over the world while walking those four miles. I can be in Somerset one minute and Atlanta the next. One minute I am planning my schedule for tomorrow, while the next I am going over yesterday in my mind.

There is a camaraderie that develops among the walkers. Greeting, encouraging and kidding each other becomes a part of the walking experience.

Generally the same people walk at about the same time each day, so you get to know the faces. The walkers I admire the most are those who walk in spite of handicaps. I can be an unusual sight on the track. One man walks a mile each morning with the aid of his cane. There are other walkers who carry oxygen bottles with them as they walk. You heard me correctly, they walk with oxygen flowing. Another lady "walks" in her wheelchair. These folks have my admiration.

Walking helps me deal with the stress of life plus it is good for my health. That is a hard combination to beat. I recommend it.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on August 12, 2002, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") will file with the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") in Case No. 2002-00146, an Application pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute 278.183 for approval of an amended compliance plan ("KU's 2002 Environmental Compliance Plan") for the purpose of recovering the capital and operation and maintenance costs associated with new pollution control facilities by way of assessment of an environmental surcharge on customers' bills beginning January 1, 2003, through KU's existing Electric Rate Schedule ES on file with and previously approved by the Commission. The total of these new facilities is estimated to be \$20.3 million.

Compliance with federal, state and local environmental regulations requires KU to continually build and upgrade equipment and/or facilities required to continue to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KU must expand the ash treatment facilities at the Ghent Power Station at Ghent, Kentucky to meet current environmental water quality standards.

The estimated impact on a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month is expected to be an initial increase of \$0.13 for KU customers in 2004, with the maximum increase expected to be \$0.27 in 2006.

The Application described in this Notice is proposed by KU. However, the Public Service Commission may make an order modifying or denying KU's Application. Such an order may result in an environmental surcharge for consumers other than the environmental surcharge described in this Notice.
