a trillion different diet plans available st overweight people have veral. We know we should

and most overweight geople have irried several. We know we should exercise, yet most of us do not. We know we should lose weight, but we do not. What is wrong? On August 26 it will teach a class on "Food, Fat and Addiction; Why We Can't Stop Eating." The class will meet at The Center for Rural De-velopment on Highway 27 in Somerset. The class is open to any-element on the source of the con-traction of the consenting individu-als and families on a variety of is-just, including depression, anxiety, fairtial problems, abuse and stress, sishee 1985. My training and back-ground are as a minister. I combine that with an interest in psychology and "what makes human beings tick."

In these years I have seen my clients suffer much misery because of their weight. They feel guilty because they weigh too much, and then they eat more because they feel guilty!

guilty!

An overweight person does not need to feel guilty. Genetic, psychological, cultural, familial or physical problems may femilial or physical problems may fem being overweight. Seldom is it a case of lack of will power. Two people can eat the same diet and get the same amount of exercise, and one will the same diet and get the same amount of exercise, and one will weigh more than the other. The one who weighs more has no reason to-feel guilty.

An addiction to food is sometimes

hard to break, because the addict has to eat every day. This would be like a recovering alcoholic having one beef three times a day! Food addiction may take the form of compulsive overesting, anorexia or bulimia. Body image is very important to motional health, and many Americans have a poor body image. We are ashamed of the way we look, either because we think we are overwight or because we do not like some part of our body. The worse

we feel about our bodies, the more likely we are to have trouble with our weight. It is a vicious cycle. Most of us know what it is to eat when we are not even hungry. We often eat for emotional reasons, com-fort or stress relief, rather than be-cause we are hungry. Many of us have dieted and lost weight only to gain back the pounds we lost plus more! We Americans are diet erazy, vet six out of ten of us

are diet crazy, yet six out of ten of us are overweight. Something is wrong with this picture, Recently a man in New York has
