Two school board races this Fall Eight file for Mayor in city of Mt. Vernon

Maybe people are being more civic minded or maybe it is the fact that the next Mayor of Mt. Vernon will make \$3,000 a month, have a family health insurance plan and a retirement plan with the state.
Whatever the reason, eight people have filed for Mayor in the City of Mt. Vernon.
This fall, incumbent Mayor Karen King will face possibly seven

challengers (she likely will not).
One candidate, who filed this week is only 23 years old and state law requires that a Mayor of a fifth class city, which Mt. Vernon is, must be at least 25 years old to run.
Timothy Kirby, of Barnett Trailer Court, filed his papers in County Clerk Norma Houk's office and Mrs. Houk said she must accept them according to state law until the matter is looked into.

Former council member Lou Vanhook, former Mt. Vernon police officer Matt Bryant who is an associate Pastor at Faith Harvest Fellowship, current council members Clark "Joe" Mullins, Lonetta Daugherty and Wayne Bullock have all filed for council.

Also filing for Mt. Vernon city council were: Daniel Boone Development Director Betty Carter Bussell, Shelley Raines Lewis, a social worker with the state of Kentucky, Don Jones, a rural mail carrier and local volunteer fireman Bryan Hansel and Steve Renfro. Hansel works at Dowell and Martin Funeral Home and Renfro works at Jack's S&T.

Fletcher meets with local people

At the urging of citizens and leaders throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky, Congressman Ernie Fletcher (R-KY-6th) launched an Exploratory Committee for Governor and kicked off a statewide tour in early June at the State Capitol in Frankfort. Fletcher is in Rockcastle County on Monday.

"I am looking forward to traveling across the Commonwealth of Kentucky," said Fletcher. "I believe it's important to get out and meet with folks and to listen to their concerns. This tour is about the overall well-being of every citizen, from every walk of life throughout our great state."

During his exploratory announcement tour, Congressman Fletcher was focused on a variety of issues including education, poverty, positive economic development, healthcare, technology, a cleaner environment and supporting family farms.

He spoke about those issues at the Rockcastle Republican meeting which was held at the Kastle Inn in Mt. Vernon.

Other candidates are council members Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner.
Local businessman Doug Bullock, local businesswoman Rebekah Hammond, who is the wife of Rockcastle County Superintendent Larry Hammond, have all filed as well.

Another local businessman, Kevin Fletcher and a patent at the Rockcastle Hospital, Jody Adams, have also filed for Mayor.

In Brodhead there will be no races, since all four current council members, Curt Brown, Johnny Wilcox, Larry Taylor and Everett Albright have no opposition.

Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash is also unopposed.
In Livingston, current Mayor Curt McHargue, faces competition from J.C. Raymond Griffin and only three have filed for council.

They are Todd Mink, Katha Carpenter and Jason Medley.
Local realtor and businessman, Republican State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, who has served in the Kentucky House for twenty years, is facing Democratic opposition from Stanford attorney J. Paul Long, who is also a former-council attorney in Lincoln.

Barbara Bennett, who is a former businesswoman in Rockcastle County and whose son-in-law, Barry Adams is a police officer, has also filed for city council.

All total, eleven people will seek six seats on the council.

Donna Hasty, 34, of Sand Springs, who is currently studying to be a Respiratory Therapist and incumbent board member Sam Stallsworth of Livingston, will face off in the division one school board race. Division one is composed of East Livingston, West Livingston and South Mt. Vernon.

Steve Owens, 55, of Mareburg, and local pharmacist Tina Cain Hasty, 43, will square off in the division three school board race. One of the two will replace board chairman, Dr. G.W. Griffith, who did not seek re-election. He served on the board for ten years.

Division three is composed of the precincts North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon and Bullock.

There will also be two magistrate races and a constable's race this fall. Two term third district incumbent Republican Billy McKinney faces

Local Fiscal Court agrees to KACO loan, sets tax rates

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court had a busy day on Tuesday, setting tax rates, accepting money

from the state and agreeing to borrow money for the Brodhead Rural Fire Department.
Brodhead Rural fire chief Johnny

Denney met with the fiscal court and requested that they borrow \$35,000 from the Kentucky Association of Counties so they could finish paying for a building they bought in the Quail area several weeks ago.

The building, which has been used for a transmission business as of late, is the same location where Robbin's Muffler Shop was located for several years.

The Brodhead Rural Fire Department will use the building as a lab-station, where a truck and equipment

After driving truck into store front Brodhead man arrested in Stanford

A Brodhead man suspected of cocaine use plowed his truck into a front window at Owens Furniture on East Main Street in Stanford, breaking giant panes of glass and landing himself in the hospital.

Larry Thompson, Jr., 22, was hospitalized not for injuries received in the accident but to ease him down from the drugs he had taken, according to Stanford Police Det. Rick Edwards.

Edwards said Thompson's pickup truck was still running when police arrived at Owens Furniture Thursday after being called about the wreck.

Thompson was conscious and lying on the floorboard of the truck, but could give police no information on how the accident occurred.

"He didn't know a thing," Edwards said. "We never could get anything out of him."

Edwards estimated that Thompson was traveling 10 to 15 mph when he hit the glass front of Owens Furniture.

A 1977 graduate of Rockcastle County High School, she holds both a Bachelor of Science and a Doctorate of Pharmacy from the University of Kentucky.

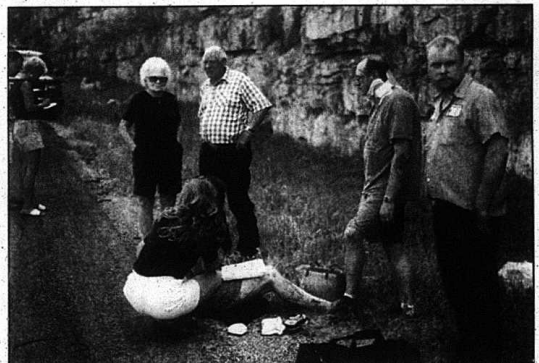

SHOULD CHILDREN ATTEND THE FUNERAL?

The funeral is a sad, but important event in the life of a family. Generally speaking, there is little justification for not permitting a child to participate. It allows them to express their own love and devotion. Keeping them away may damage their sense of belonging and deprive them of the opportunity to share their emotions.

On the other hand, the child should never be forced to attend the funeral - no matter how therapeutic one

thinks it might be. At the same time, try not to make them feel any shame or guilt for wanting to stay home. Instead, you might suggest that someone later, when they feel like it, you could visit the cemetery together.

If the child is to attend, it is important that you explain the details of the funeral service in advance. Being well-prepared and understanding what is going on will do much to relieve unnecessary distress.

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Phase II Tobacco Payments

Kentucky tobacco quota owners and farm operators have been receiving Phase II tobacco payment applications August 5-9. To qualify for this payment, all paper work must be completed and post marked no later than September 16, 2002. If you have not received, or have problems with applications, a toll free hotline is available for assistance at 1-877-549-2537. Your FSA farm number and county number will be helpful.

The Phase II program for 2002, which is the 4th year of a 12 year program, will provide Kentucky producers with approximately 148 million dollars. This is 25 percent greater than last year and will continue at the higher rate through 2008.

Eligible parties are:

*Quota owners—persons that owned a burley tobacco quota in 2001

*Growing farms—person that controlled the land used to produce burley tobacco in 1998, 1999, and/or 2000, and shared in the risk of production.

*Grower/tenant—A person that provided labor to produce burley tobacco in 1998, 1999, and/or 2000.

and shared in the risk of production. Distribution of funds:
*Quota owner will receive approximately 1/3 or 43.3 million dollars. This will be based on the farms basic quota as of July 2, 2001 at an estimated rate of 19.1 cents per pound.

*Growing farms will receive approximately 43.3 million but this will be based on the average of 1998 effective quota and marketings at approximately 3.1 cents per pound plus the average of 1999 effective quota and marketings at approximately 3.4 cents per pound. *The grower/tenant payments will be the same as growing farm.

Farmers who have kept records of the 1998-1999 and 2000 effective quotas and marketing averages, may calculate their 2002 Phase II payment, to be received by December 30, 2002. Keep in mind these are only estimates and the final payment rate will not be known until November 15, 2002. Again, the final application deadline is September 16, 2002.

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Tomatoes: A Healthy Summer Food

Summer is the perfect time to add tomatoes to your diet. Tomatoes are abundant and available at local groceries and the Farmers Market. Tomatoes are a low calorie food. A small tomato contains only 25 calories. Tomatoes contain phosphorus, potassium, vitamin A and trace amounts of other vitamins and minerals.

When choosing tomatoes, select firm, well shaped tomatoes that are bright in color. They should also have no spots, be heavy for their size and give slightly to pressure. Store tomatoes at room temperature and out of direct sunlight. Use ripe tomatoes within three days. You can ripen light pink tomatoes in 3-5

days. To use some of the fresh tomatoes try this recipe:

Easy Salsa
1/2 pound tomatoes, rinsed and chopped into small pieces.
1 green pepper, chopped into small pieces.
1 clove garlic (optional), peeled and chopped in very small pieces.
1 tsp dried parsley or cilantro (3 tbs if using fresh chopped)
Cold water
1 tsp salt, or salt to taste
3/4 teaspoon sugar (optional)
Wash ingredients before chopping. Mix tomatoes, green pepper, garlic, and parsley or cilantro together. Stir enough cold water to make mixture sauce-like. Add salt and sugar. Serve immediately. Refrigerate any leftovers in an airtight container for up to 3 weeks. Makes about 1 cup (16 one tablespoon servings).
Nutrition per serving: 5 calories, 1 gram carbohydrate, 0 gram protein, 0 gram fat, and 146 milligrams sodium.

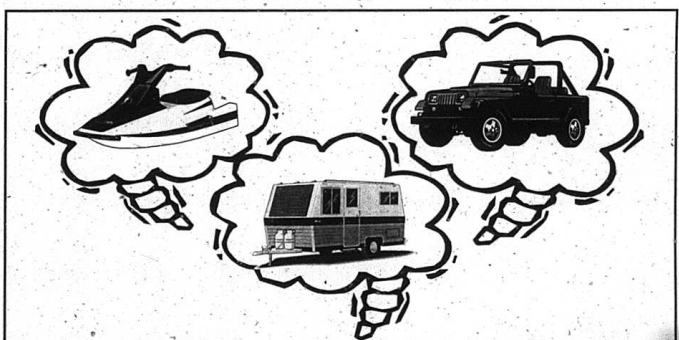

Alexander completes Rogers Scholar session

Cody Alexander, a junior at Rockcastle County High School, recently returned from Somerset where he participated in The Center for Rural Development's Rogers Scholars program. The annual session is a unique and exciting learning opportunity for 48 rising juniors from 42 counties in Southern and Eastern Kentucky.

The heart of The Center for Rural Development's mission is "that no young person will need to leave home to find his or her future." These words, spoken by Congressman Hal Rogers, the program's namesake, frame its goals of encouraging youths to seek job opportunities at home while increasing their marketable skills in the field of telecommunications. "We want to help the young people of our region develop confidence, skills, and a deeper commitment to their hometowns and this state," says Lonnie Lawson, executive director & CEO of The Center.

The session began on Sunday with tours of the facility and a welcome reception for Scholars and their parents. The Scholars' first activity, a variety of exercises designed to help them get to know each other, broke the ice and set the tone for what the Scholars described as "friendships that will last a lifetime." After learning a little about each other, the Scholars got to learn about themselves through Myers-Briggs personality typing.

Monday brought a message by Congressman Hal Rogers, and then the Scholars headed for Team Leadership Center in Wayne County where, under the direction of Norrie Wake, they were challenged to conquer their fears and limitations through a ropes course, alpine tower and other adventures that also served to bring the Scholars closer together.

The entrepreneurship section of the program was featured on Tuesday as the Small Business Development Center's David Stevens taught the Scholars the skills necessary to be entrepreneurs. They then used

questions were asked and answered. Wednesday morning the Scholars got an introduction to some new fields through their minors: networking, video production and web development, while in the afternoon majors began. Alexander participated in the networking major where he got to study the inner workings of a computer, the Internet and other computer related topics. The other majors were video production and engineering. Wednesday evening the Scholars learned some valuable skills: proper table etiquette and ballroom dancing. James Malinchak, contributing author to and associate editor of the *Chicken Soup for the Soul* series, gave an inspiring-after-dinner speech and conducted a workshop with the Scholars.

On Thursday, the Scholars returned to their majors, before concluding the day with a videoconference with Rural Utilities Service Administrator Hilda Gay Legg, followed by dinner and a movie.

The Center's partner and affiliate organizations gave presentations to the Scholars on Friday morning, and then the students received community service training. One important component of the Rogers Scholars program is that each student has to devise and implement a service project for his or her home community. The afternoon was spent preparing for Saturday's presentation to the parents, before the Scholars headed to the YMCA for a pool party.

On Saturday, impressive presentations were made, and the Scholars exchanged some tearful goodbyes, sad to be leaving their new friends.

In addition to these activities, the Scholars enjoyed various speakers throughout the week. These included Dr. Aaron Thompson from Eastern Ken-

tucky University; Hasan Davis, lawyer, educator, actor and poet; Dr. Lee Todd, president of the University of Kentucky and Bob Arnold, executive director/CEO of the Kentucky Association of Counties, all of whom had an inspiring message for the Scholars.

"All of the great speakers taught me a lot about the life and how to live it," said Alexander. "Rogers Scholars," he continued, "is the best thing you can do in high school to teach you leadership, friendship and technology."

Dates for this year's program were July 14-20 and 21-27. The Scholars housed at the Hampton Inn in Somerset, with all costs for the program being paid for by The Center.

Being chosen for Rogers Scholars involves a highly competitive process. Factors such as grade point average, community service, extracurricular activities, letters of recommendation, and an essay are considered. Students must apply as high school sophomores, and one student is chosen from each of the 42 counties served by The Center for Rural Development. Six at-large candidates are then selected to bring the total number of Scholars to 48, half of which attend the first week and half the second.

Day 15 - July 11, 2002
 Depart Bighorn Mountains, head-
 ing back to the Black Hills.
 Slept in a little this morning. We
 were finally woken up by a road grader
 working on the access road around
 7:15. We broke camp and headed
 down the mountain, where we
 stopped at McDonald's for breakfast.
 From there, we got back on the in-
 terstate and headed towards South
 Dakota again.

Traveling on the interstate, not a
 building in sight, no cattle, horses or
 wildlife anywhere. As we top a rise,
 I see a calf in the distance on the
 other side of the highway running out
 of a draw and heading towards the high-
 way. About the time I realize what it
 is and where it's heading, I see a man
 or a horse trying to cut the calf off.
 As we draw closer, the horse gets
 around the calf and leads it back into
 the draw. The horse and the calf are
 kicking up dust, and running flat out,
 dodging and turning. The man on the
 other hand is sitting up straight, like
 he's glued to the saddle. Jeans, west-
 ern shirt, straw cowboy hat and all,
 he's (no kidding) twirling a lasso. Just
 as well put even with them, he
 throws that lasso and jerks up the calf
 by the hind feet. Talk about neat. This
 is no tourist show or rodeo arena. It's

just some guy out doing his job in
 the middle of nowhere in northern
 Wyoming. It makes my whole day to
 have witnessed the event.

We finally arrived at Crazy Horse
 Monument. After a quick sandwich,
 we head on into the visitor's center/
 museum. If you don't know already,
 Crazy Horse Monument is a totally
 private venture, attempting to carve
 a huge statue of Chief Crazy Horse
 out of a mountain. If they ever get it
 completed (probably not in my life-
 time) the statue will be fantastic.
 Many of the kids have stated that
 this was the place they were looking
 forward to visiting the most. Some are
 disappointed that there doesn't seem
 to be much progress being made on
 the statue. However, there is a great
 museum on the grounds to tour! We
 also got to watch several native
 dances, performed by a family of
 Lakota Sioux. I've got to admit, most
 of us were really impressed with the
 moves that one of the dancers
 showed. His father told us that his son
 held several National Championship
 Awards for his dancing. We treated
 everybody to Indian Fry-Bread,
 which Jenny and I both liked. The
 others weren't impressed.

We spent the night at one of the
 campgrounds in Custer State Park.

Jenny took some of the kids swim-
 ming while I stayed with the others
 at camp. Jacob showed us how much
 better he was doing with his lasso.
 Eric made a fine calf.

We set up a field shower that Jus-
 tin brought, behind some ponchos we
 strung up. We couldn't get the shower
 high enough, so you had to squat. Felt
 good though.

After a supper of soft tacos, we
 settled down for the night.

Day 16 - July 12, 2002

Depart Custer State Park, heading
 towards Wind Cave National Park.

After a great breakfast and break-
 ing camp, we board the bus and head
 out again. Busy schedule today.

Our first stop is at a campground
 general store. It's special though. For
 one thing, the roof is made from the
 hull of a huge boat. In fact the whole
 store used to be referred to as the
 Western White House. President
 Calvin Coolidge used it to get out of
 Washington, D.C. when he was in
 office. Personally, I don't know why
 anyone, even the President, would
 want to go back to Washington after
 spending any time here. Jenny bought
 everyone a T-shirt before we moved
 on.

We then traveled out Custer State
 Park's wildlife loop road. At first we
 didn't see anything, but soon came
 upon a couple of fairly large groups
 of buffalo. In fact, we stopped at a
 prairie-dog town and watched a herd
 pass through the area. I think we all
 had more fun watching the prairie
 dogs. Further down the road, we
 spent quite a bit of time feeding the
 so called "wild burros" that roam the
 area. The kids and Jenny had a ball
 feeding our last remaining apples to
 the pests. They almost had one on
 the bus, but not quite.

We next drove on to Wind Cave
 National Park, where we staked out
 our campsite and checked out the
 schedule for the cave tours. Then we
 headed into Hot Springs, South Dako-
 ta to restock ice and supplies. We
 ate sandwiches out in the parking lot
 before heading to our next scheduled
 stop.

Our next stop was an educational
 one. We stopped in a working archeo-
 logical dig at Hot Springs, where they
 are digging up the bones of several
 types of mammoths, wolves and
 short-face bears. I, for one, found the
 stop really interesting. Afterwards,
 we stopped at a Dairy Queen for ice
 cream.

Then we headed back to Wind
 Cave, where Jenny and the kids took
 about a ninety-minute guided cave
 tour. After a short film on the cave
 and the park, the whole group went
 underground to a chilly fifty degrees.
 As usual, she was worried about
 Andy wanting to go off into the un-
 known to explore but he ended up

being asked (by the park ranger) to
 stay back with his flashlight and
 bring up the rear of the whole entire
 group.

Afterwards, we head back for
 camp for supper and setting up tents.
 Once the kitchen was cleaned up, the
 kids and I sat around and discussed
 the trip. We took each day, one at
 a time, talking about what they liked
 and disliked, and what they found
 interesting or boring from excerpts
 typed by then, she just threw down her
 sleeping mat on the ground and fell
 asleep under the stars. That's where I
 found her about an hour later. She
 hadn't been able to find her sleeping
 bag, so she was just shivering there
 under a sheet.

Day 17 - July 12, 2002
 Depart Wind Cave National Park,
 heading home.

Woke up this morning around
 4:30. The camp was quiet of course,
 so we were careful breaking camp.
 From now on, we'll eat most of our
 meals in restaurants to save time and
 make better mileage each day.

As always, the scenery is beauti-
 ful, if a little flat. Cattle and farm land
 stretching as far as you can see, with
 small towns few and far between.
 Our only interesting stop today is
 Cabelas. If you've never been to one
 of their stores, it's hard to describe.
 Just imagine a sporting goods store
 (hunting, fishing and camping) the
 size of Wal-Mart in Beres. We gave
 each of the kids \$50 and around an
 hour and a half to look around. Per-
 sonally, I'd like to have spent the
 entire day, but we need to get down
 the road.

The campground we usually stay
 at outside of Grand Island, Nebraska
 was full by the time we got there, so
 were forced to go down the highway
 a little further and stay at a KOA.
 They were full also, but they put us
 out in their overflow area next to a
 corn field. It was perfect, we had the
 best site in the camp. Showers and
 a swimming pool. Life sure is tough,
 but we managed.

Day 18 - July 14, 2002
 Departed Grand Island, Nebraska,
 heading for Graham Cave, Missouri.

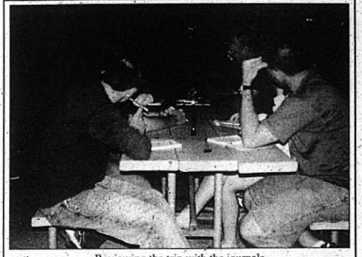
Long day on the road today. Lots

 tonight.

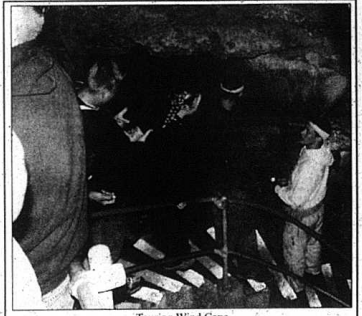
Day 19 - July 15, 2002

 ing it on them.

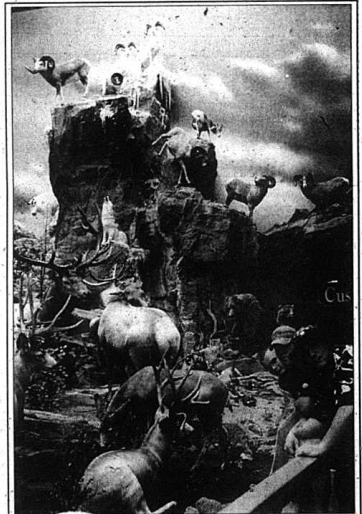

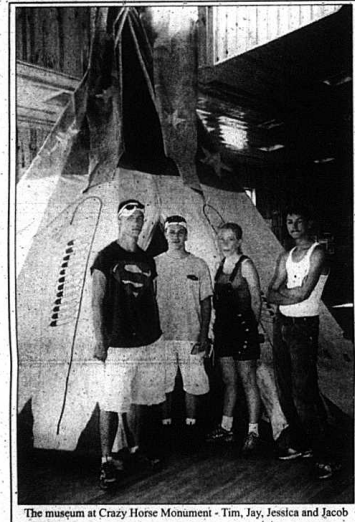

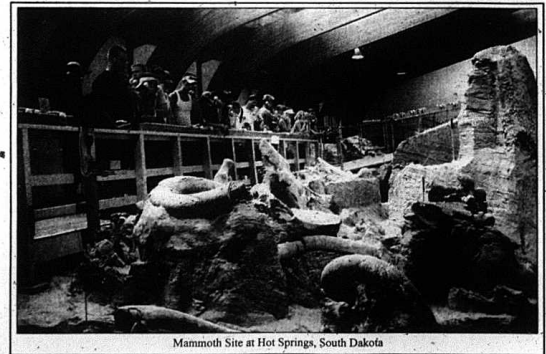

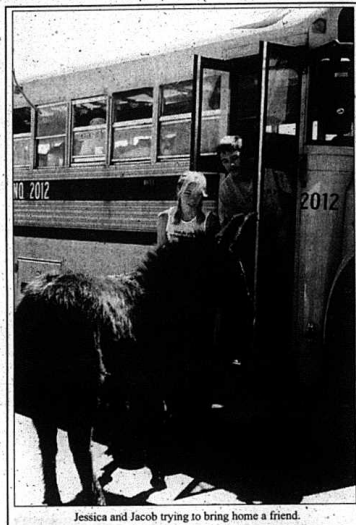

Third District magistrate Bill McKinney said that the payment on the truck would be about \$170 per month and he and Denney told the court that the fire department would make the payment. KAC's interest rate is 3.75 percent and only the county can go to them for funding.

State Senator Ed Worley of Richmond, who now represents Rockcastle, Madison and Lincoln Counties in the state Senate was at the court meeting to tell the court that he had gotten \$200,000 in state funding to be used on county roads.

The total cost of these new facilities is estimated to be \$17.1 million.

Compliance with all federal, state and local environmental regulations requires KUY to continually build and upgrade equipment and/or facilities required to continue to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KUY must expand the ash treatment facilities at the Ghent Power Station at Ghent, Kentucky to meet current environmental water quality standards.

The estimated impact on a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month is expected to be an initial increase of \$0.13 for KUY customers in 2004, with the maximum increase expected to be \$0.27 in 2006.

The Application described in this Notice is proposed by KUY. However, the Public Service Commission may make an order modifying or denying KUY's Application. Such action may result in an environmental surcharge for consumers other than the environmental surcharge described in this Notice.

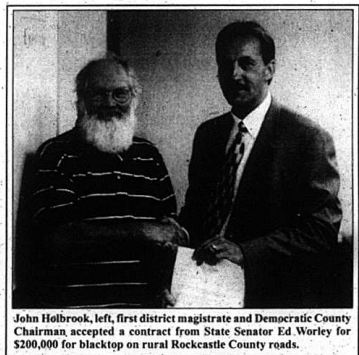

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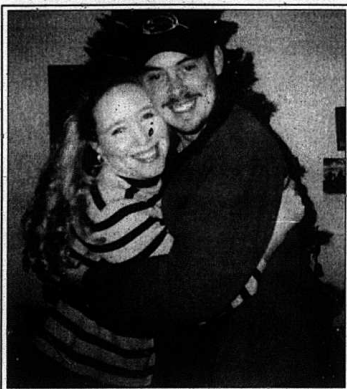

Agricultural News

Phase II Payments

Beginning the week of August 5, applications will be mailed to tobacco farm operations and letters will be mailed to tobacco quota owners about the 2002 fund. These applications, which are exactly like last year's, must be completed and returned promptly postmarked no later than September 16, 2002.

To be considered complete, the application MUST BE SIGNED by all parties involved with each farm. If the same person fits all the roles designated, that person must sign in all sections that pertain to him/her. If there is a significant line, it must be filled in. The application must be signed in ALL places indicated on the form. ANY APPLICATION THAT DOES NOT INCLUDE THE SIGNATURE AND SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER OF THE ELIGIBLE PARTY WILL BE INCOMPLETE AND PAYMENTS WILL NOT BE MADE.

Step-by-step instruction are included with each application. Help is also available at the local FSA office, by contacting the toll-free help line at 1-877-549-2537 or on the web site at www.kyagpolicy.com

Funds are expected to be distributed by the national trustee by December 31, 2002.

Updated Information on Planted Acres Requested

Producers should verify and update records on planted and prevented planted acres field with USDA's Farm Service Agency. This information, required by the 2002 Farm Bill, must be correct in order to receive accurate direct and counter-cyclical payments in the near future.

The 2002 Farm Bill gives farmers several options for establishing or updating bases. FSA is now asking producers to review and update their information now so payments can be issued promptly this fall.

The 2002 Farm Bill provides for direct and counter-cyclical payments to be made to eligible producers of covered commodities include wheat, corn, sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton, rice, soybeans, sunflower seeds, canola, flaxseed, mustard, safflower and rapeseed. Letters from FSA are being mailed to producers across the country asking for their updates. The letter will include a Summary Acreage History Report

showing the acreage of covered commodities reported to FSA. Included will be planted acres and/or acres prevented from being planted for crop years 1998 through 2001. If the information on the Acreage History Report is correct, producers do not need to take any action. If the information is wrong, producers will need to provide verifiable documentation of acreage and yields to their local FSA office by August 31, 2002.

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Sign up for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

USDA Provides Relief to Lamb Producers

Sign up has begun for U.S. Department of Agriculture incentive payments to help ewe lamb producers suffering financial losses due to current poor market conditions.

The Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP) is a four year program started to help stabilize the lamb market. The program will now provide \$26 million incentive payments to help producers increase the supply of domestic lamb meat.

Applications for the first period (Year 3), which lasts from August 1, 2001 through July 31, 2001 are due by August 15, 2002. Programs included in this year incentive payment are for ewe lambs, feeder and slaughter lambs.

Slaughter lambs must be marketed during August 1, 2001 through July 31, 2003 and be owned by an operation at least 30 days before marketing. Carcasses must meet the requirements of USDA Quality Grade Choice Prime; meet the requirements of USDA Yield Grade 2; have a muscling conformation score of Average Choice or better; have a 55-75 pound hot carcasses weight and be certified by a USDA Agricultural Marketing Service agent or assigned representative.

Producers must purchase or retain a ewe lamb to expand the sheep herd from August 1, 2001 through July 31, 2003 and must certify that each ewe lamb:

- Is not older than 18 months of age
- Has not produced an offspring
- Does not possess characteristics of parrot mouth, foot rot or scrapie and
- Is identified according to state identification requirements that comply with an USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service approved scrapie program for interstate movement.

Feeder lambs must be marketed during the period August 1, 2001 through July 31, 2003; be owned by the operation from birth until the time of marketing and be thick muscled and large framed as determined by the USDA Agricultural Marketing Service.

Payments subject to the availability of funds will be: \$18 per ewe lamb; \$3 per feeder lamb; \$5 per slaughter lamb and an additional \$3 if slaughter lambs are marketed between June 1 and July 31st and all

eligibility requirements are met. If application amounts exceed the funding limit of \$26 million, USDA will prorate payments. Funds not utilized during the first application period will be carried forward to the next year.

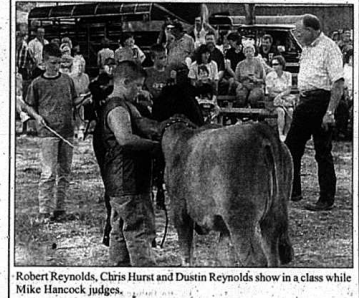

County Livestock Show

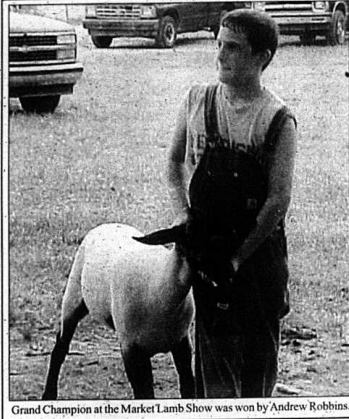

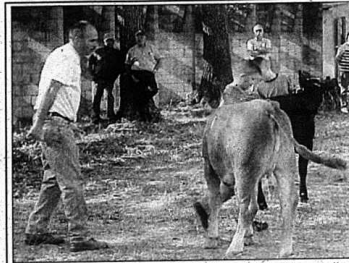

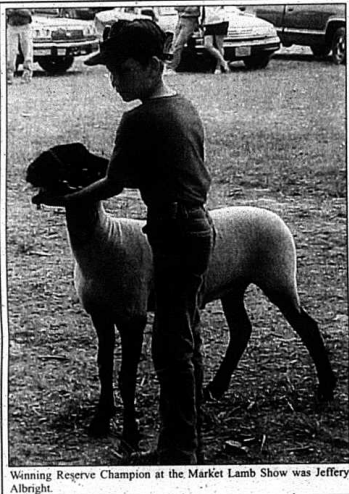

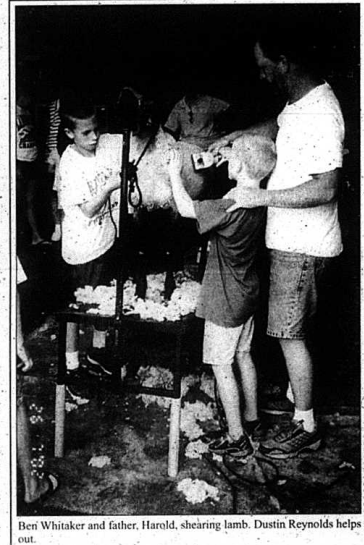

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the City of Brodhead, Kentucky as follows:

SECTION FIVE: This ordinance becomes effective immediately upon passage and publication as required by law.

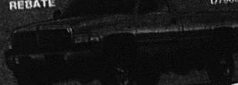
