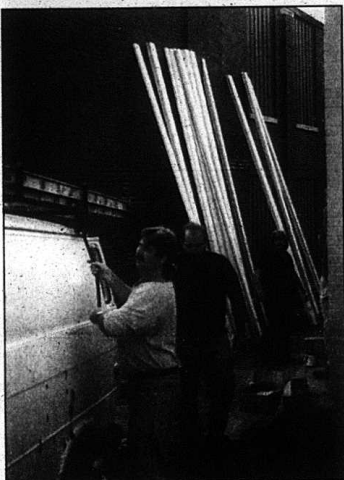

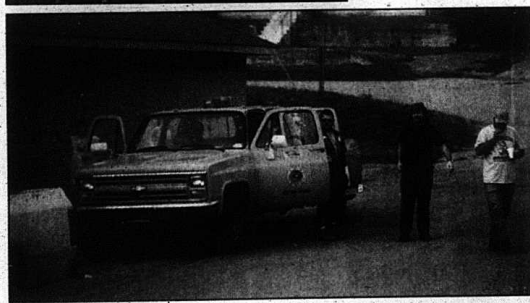

When student hits school bus No one injured

According to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond, about ten students were still on the school bus when a Rockcastle County High School student crossed the center line of Hwy. 1505 and hit the bus.

Randal Adams was driving bus 963, when the accident occurred as he ran his afternoon bus route.

Police said that it appeared that there was no way possible for Adams to avoid the car driven by the student.

Another bus was taken to the scene to transport the students on to their homes.

County uses grant money, prisoners to save historic facility

Livingston School gym looking good

During the 1930's, almost a quarter of all adults were out of jobs and their families faced starvation.

The federal government, in an effort to combat poverty and get people off the streets, created the "Works Progress Administration (WPA)."

Among their many tasks were the construction of highways, trails, major dams and public buildings.

Aside from some bridges and maybe one small building, the Livingston School gym is the only large surviving structure in Rockcastle County from that era.

The building is made from hand-cut sandstone quarried near Livingston, and has a six-foot deep foundation which was built under the supervision of the WPA and the Livingston Independent School Board.

After the school was closed in 1994, the gym and classroom buildings were heavily damaged by vandalism.

Only four months ago the gym's bleachers had fallen to the ground because the floor had fallen through and there were other major problems.

In addition to the roof leaking, the interior walls on either side of the stage had disintegrated from rot. The main interior walls were blistered from weather. Every single window in all buildings was gone, including the glass basketball boards.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court was able to take over the buildings this year and thanks to State Representative Danny Ford a \$100,000 state grant was secured for clean-up and renovation.

"In all honesty, when I look back at photographs we took prior to renovation, I really wonder what the magistrates and I must have been thinking," Rockcastle County Buzz Carlottis said.

"The exterior of the building's stones were covered in two coats of blue, then red, paint. On top of that graffiti," he added.

"Had it been a living object, it would have been very, very sad. Many suggested that we tear it and the main building down and put in a parking lot," Carlottis said.

"I believed its 'bones' were far too good to demolish, and that if just needed a lot of tender, loving care. Thankfully, the magistrates agreed," he continued.

"I had our county's work release inmates under the direction of Bill Sowder, begin work this past spring ripping out the old flooring, scraping walls, pulling down old conduit, tearing down decayed walls, and cleaning up eight years of vandalism and neglect. They erected scaffolding and put 136 gallons of paint on the ceiling alone. They reconstructed the floor out of natural white oak, tongue-and-groove and were able to completely lay 5,400 sq. ft. of flooring from Monday afternoon through the following Saturday."

"This was no small feat. Every single plank of bleachers was sanded, in hopes of restoring them to their original clear-coat finish. This was not possible, however, due to the years of abuse. Finally, we decided to paint them," Carlottis said.

The stage's proscenium arch was blackened by old varnish and graffiti. The decision was made to sand it and use enamel on its surface to highlight its architectural details.

Because the building was constructed during the art deco era, which was noted for its curves and multiple horizontal lines, every attempt was made to take advantage of its curved window openings by using horizontal stripes in the school's colors.

While the building was one of many thousands of such structures built by the WPA around the country, the buildings were not cookie-cutter copies of each other. Each was unique, depending upon what the owner wanted.

Using work release prisoners who are overseen by Bill Sowder and James Renner, as many as 15 inmates work on the building and have utilized their many talents, from professional painters to floor layers, to drywallers. Air conditioning is on the county's wish list for another year if funds become available.

When all is said and done, the

Police raid house in Mt. Vernon

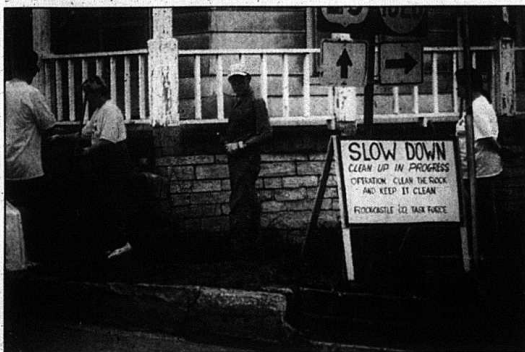
Components which are used in the manufacturing of the illegal drug Methamphetamine were apparently found at a Mt. Vernon residence on Monday night.

Points East

I'm still having an occasional piece of jagged rock or stone or whatever pass through my urnial tract. I'll spare you the details. Suffice only to say that I approach peeing these days with much trepidation even though the doctors say I should drink water and/or cranberry juice by quart several times a day.

But still, over the week-end I managed to photograph a wedding and get in a fishing trip. The wedding story can wait another week because there's a chance I can actually run a photograph with it because the bride, Andrea Helton, was my old friend Junior Helton's grand daughter and she was simply too beautiful to describe in words.

No sooner home from the wedding and frankly in a lot of pain, my buddy, Jeff Neff who is half the partnership in Later Knob Pottery called up and suggested a fishing trip Sunday afternoon. I told him to call first but that I could walk, wetting a line might get me off my mental preoccupation of dreading the next trip to the bathroom.

Anyway, Jeff and I'm age guessing 12 year-old son, David, rolled in around mid-afternoon and I followed that I could go fishing as long as it didn't involve one of the five mile, chin-deep, wading marathons that

Jeff and I normally undertake in pursuit of the ever-vile smallmouth bass hopped up beneath huge rocks and old sycamore stumps in those remote sections of Paint Lick Creek or Silver Creek that lesser souls than we deem inaccessible.

Jeff and I have been known to reach these elusive places without hiring Sherpas so National Geographic has never requested that we do a documentary which is just as well. These places are actually better left alone because the streams-side weeds are full of vicious copperheads and rattlesnakes that strike on sound and most of the coyotes, skunks and preying black bears have rabies and there are any number of other reasons (quicksand, whirlpools, mutant beaver, etc.) why you should stay out of your fishing holes.

Anyway, I'd already made arrangements for us to visit a big, deep, spring-fed farm pond about the size of a football field which I can only tell you is located in central Kentucky and which I knew to be full of fat blue gill. Jeff is normally interested in larger game but I convinced him that

David was going to have the time of his life and that I wasn't able to do much walking and I knew we could open a few cattle gates and drive right

up beside the pond I had in mind.

We made up steep banks on dry grass and arrived pond-side literally seconds before a big thunderstorm blew in. If we'd been any later, the grass would have been so slick that Jeff's truck would never have made the climb. We'd no sooner stopped than the rain came down and we watched kingfishers, a pileated woodpecker and a green heron feed, oblivious to close, jagged flashes of lightning and earth-shaking thunder claps, along the shore from the cab of the truck. Barn swallows were sweeping through gnats and mosquito hatches just before the ensuing down-pour that made the pond surface look like a huge cauldron on hard boil.

"This is gonna be just too good," I told Jeff and David because the fresh cool rain was infusing the pond with oxygen along with making it a more pleasant to live. I ventured out to the truck first. It was still raining but I figured a good wetting down wouldn't hurt my mid-emperor and sure enough, I caught a fat blue-gill on the first cast and another on the second fishing regular old red worms on a number 1 Aberdeen hook because if you use anything smaller the little ones can get it in their mouth and we were after the ones that weigh a quarter pound and up. I had 16 lb test line on a Shimano Spinx 2000 reel mounted on a 6' light weight rod. That's a little heavy for bream, but who knows when a bass will hit?

Sure enough, on my third cast I hooked into what felt like a locomotive. At first I thought it was a big carp. All I could do was let it run and make sure the drag was just loose enough to let the line slip so that it wouldn't break my line or rod when it ran in powerful surges with me hanging on for all I was worth. I yelled for Jeff to come with the need and help me after 10 minutes or so when it became obvious that I might actually be able to land the thing. It was a channel catfish, about 30 inches, 12 pounds or so, clean, strong, healthy and we finally got it netted and onto a stringer and tied to an old log.

Then we began catching the blue-gill and bass. We only kept three bass because they were hooked so badly they would not have survived release. It's a good idea to leave the bass in a pond, not because they aren't great eating but because they control the blue gill (much better eating) population so that it doesn't get stunted. Too many blue-gill is worse than none at all because they never grow to eating size.

Then Jeff hooked another catfish which turned out to be identical to mine and after a memorable battle and we put it on the stringer. Then came a bad-mean snapping turtle in the twenty pound range that we finally released (or maybe it released us) before it destroyed Jeff's truck or amputated one of us.

We'd been putting the big blue-gill in mesh fish baskets and we had kept 50 or more out of easily 300 to 400 before it destroyed Jeff's truck or amputated one of us.

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

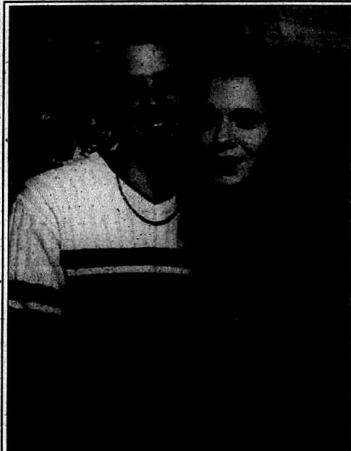

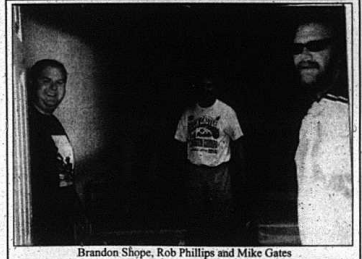
United States at Christ's Outreach this summer.

4-H Land Judging goes to state

Rockcastle County's 4-H Land Judging Team received special recognition at the 2002 Kentucky State Fair 4-H Land Judging Contest. Jameson Cable, Matthew Whitaker, Brandon Cole, Andrew Nelson, and Bill Burdett formed Rockcastle's team which won the Senior Division 4-H Land Judging Contest. Winning the senior division has earned team members an opportunity to represent Kentucky at the National 4-H Land Judging Contest to be held in May 2003 in Oklahoma City.

Developing land judging skills needed to win the state contest takes lots of practice and motivation. Jameson Cable started as a junior team member in 1997. Jameson follows a family tradition started by older brother Chaz Cable who was on the 1998 Kentucky 4-H team which competed at the nationals in Oklahoma. Bill Burdett worked his way up from junior division following two older brothers, Tim and Tracy, who have also competed from his cousin Warren Whitaker, who helped get him started. Warren competed in the national contest in 1998. Andrew Nelson is no stranger to winning teams. Andrew started out in the junior division and received junior champion at two state contests. Brandon Cole may be a newcomer compared to other team members, but previous work in the RCHS Agriculture Department with Mr. Reynolds and Mr. Hayes, along with lots of practice this summer, earned his place on the team.

4-H Land Judging is a summer youth activity which allows young people to learn about how to use and protect the soils which make up our farms and homes. This includes looking at how steep slopes are, how much topsoil has eroded away, as well as potential to erode, how deep can plant roots penetrate the soil, and the soils potential to supply water to plants. Conservation measures and practices to protect the soil are also important factors taught by land judging.

A tradition which first started in 1979 has reached over 60 young people with an opportunity to participate in the Kentucky State Fair. Sixteen 4-H'ers on 6 different teams have advanced to the national contest, forming once in a lifetime memories.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that on August 12, 2002, Kentucky Utilities Company ("KU") filed with the Kentucky Public Service Commission ("Commission") in Case No. 2002-00146, an Application pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statute 278.183 for approval of an amended compliance plan ("KU's 2002 Environmental Compliance Plan") for the purpose of recovering the capital and operation and maintenance costs associated with new pollution control facilities by way of assessment of an environmental surcharge on customers' bills beginning March 1, 2003, through KU's existing Electric Rate Schedule ES on file with and previously approved by the Commission. The total cost of these new facilities is estimated to be \$17.3 million.

Compliance with all federal, state and local environmental regulations requires KU to continually build and upgrade equipment and/or facilities required to continue to operate in an environmentally sound manner. Specifically, KU must expand the ash treatment facilities at the Ghent Power Station at Ghent, Kentucky to meet current environmental water quality standards.

The estimated impact on a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month is expected to be an initial increase of \$0.13 for KU customers in 2004, with the maximum increase expected to be \$0.27 in 2006.

The Application described in this Notice is proposed by KU. However, the Public Service Commission may make an order modifying or denying KU's Application. Such action may result in an environmental surcharge for consumers other than the environmental surcharge described in this Notice.

NOTICE TO PARENTS, TEACHERS, AND EMPLOYEES OF THE ROCKCASTLE COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION

On October 22, 1986, the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA, Public Law 99-519) was signed into law. The law required EPA to develop regulations, which provide a comprehensive framework for addressing asbestos problems in public and private elementary and secondary schools. On October 30, 1987, EPA published the Asbestos-Containing Materials in Schools Rule [40 CFR Part 763 Subpart E]. This Rule requires all public and private elementary and secondary schools to inspect for friable and non-friable asbestos, develop asbestos management plans that address asbestos hazards in school buildings, and implement response actions in a timely fashion.

To carry out the above activities involving inspections, management plans, and response actions the Rockcastle County Board of Education has utilized accredited personnel. On April 30, 1987, EPA published the Model Accreditation Plan [40 CFR Part 763 Appendix C to Subpart E] required by AHERA, which specifies training, examination, and other requirements for persons who inspect, develop management plans and design or conduct response actions in schools. The Model Plan became effective on June 1, 1987.

In 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education retained Barry W. Cooper, Inc., who completed an initial inspection to locate all asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) and developed and submitted to the State of Kentucky an asbestos Management Plan that includes the results of the inspections. In December of 1988, the Rockcastle County Board of Education began to implement this management plan. The facilities were once again inspected in August of 2002.

Copies of the management plan are always available for review for those interested persons at the Administration Office at 245 Richmond Road, Mt. Vernon, KY and at the Principal's Office at each School any time during normal office hours.

Copies are available for duplication at a cost of 25 cents for each 8-1/2x11 page of the Management Plan.

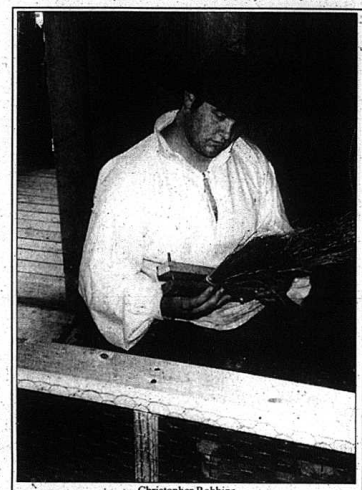
Local youth makes it in Craft Marketing Program

Jackson Bray, a student at RCHS was chosen as one of 17 students statewide to attend the Kentucky State University Summer Transportation Institute.

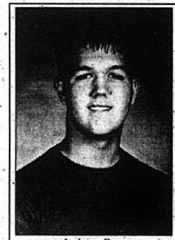

Jessica Robinson got two points on her serve, Rogers one and Krystal Parsons one for all the scoring by the Jayvees in the second game.

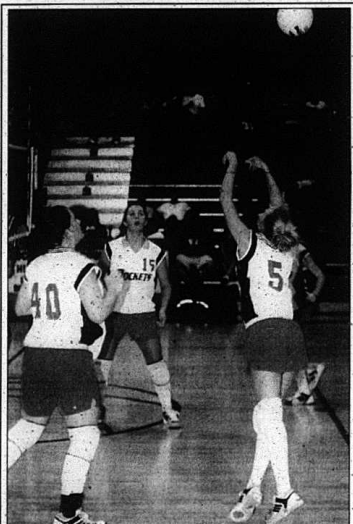

Coldiron receives award

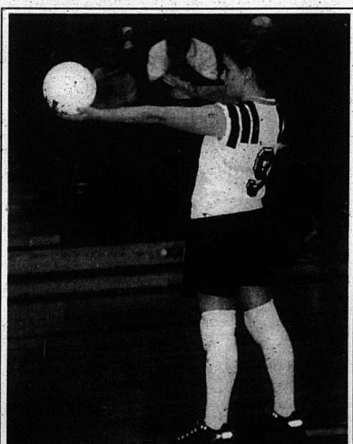
Captain Roger W. Coldiron of the United States Navy was presented the Legion of Merit Award by the President of the United States.

Updated Information on Planted Acres Requested

Producers are receiving the Summary Acreage History Report for their farms. Producers should verify these printouts and update records on planted and prevented planted acres filled with USDA's Farm Service Agency. This information, required by the 2002 Farm Bill, must be correct in order to receive accurate direct and counter-cyclical payments in the near future.

The 2002 Farm Bill gives farmers several options for establishing or updating bases. FSA is now asking producers to review and update their information now so payments can be issued promptly this fall.

The 2002 Farm Bill provides for direct and counter-cyclical payments to be made to eligible producers of covered commodities include wheat, corn, sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton, rice, soybeans, sunflower seeds, canola, flaxseed, mustard, safflower, and rapeseed. Letters from

FSA are being mailed to producers across the country asking for their updates. The letter will include a Summary Acreage History Report showing the acreage of covered commodities reported to FSA. Included will be planted acres and/or acres prevented from being planted for crop years 1998 through 2001. If the Report is correct, producers do not need to take any action. If the information is wrong, producers will be notified to provide verifiable documentation of acreage and yields to their local FSA office by August 31, 2002.

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Signup for the 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations. Producers who have questions

should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

Dairy Program Signup Began August 13th

Jeffrey S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, reminds farmers that signup for the Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) program began August 13th. This program, authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill, financially compensates dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

Eligible dairy producers are those who produced milk in any state and marketed the milk commercially beginning December 2001. To be approved for the program, producers must be in compliance with highly waterland conservation provisions and must enter into a contract with USDA's Commodity Marketing Corporation to provide monthly marketing data.

MILC payments will occur in months when the price of Class 1 milk in Boston under the Northeast Milk Marketing Order falls below \$16.94 per cwt. Payment rates will be 45 percent of the difference between \$16.94 and the Boston Class 1 price for that month.

Program payments scheduled to begin in October 2002 will be retroactive from December 1, 2001 with producers selecting the month to start receiving payments.

Full Cropland Acreage Reports Required For Payments

Effective with the 2002 crop year ALL cropland on the farm must be reported to FSA on the farm's crop acreage report to be eligible for:

- Loan Deficiency Payments (LDP's)
- Marketing Assistance Loans
- Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payments (DCP)

The Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill) requires farmers to file acreage reports with FSA for all cropland on a farm as a condition of the receipt of certain farm payments.

Additional information on any program administered by FSA is available at the local FSA Service Center or online at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov>.

Disaster Leasing
Farmers who suffer a burley to-

bacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer must: file a crop report with FSA, file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, have planted sufficient acreage to produce the farm's effective quota, provide a measurement fee and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing the measurement fee will be refunded.

Remember: If you are a farmer whose tobacco is suffering from poor weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease, etc. Come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions PRIOR TO HARVEST!

Phase II Payments

Beginning the week of August 5, applications will be mailed to tobacco farm operations and letters will be mailed to tobacco quota owners about the 2002 fund. These applications, which are exactly like last year's, must be completed and returned promptly postmarked no later than September 16, 2002.

To be considered complete, the application MUST BE SIGNED, by all parties involved with each farm. If the same person fills all the roles designated, that person must sign in all sections that pertain to him/her. If there is a significant line, it must be filled in. The application must be signed in ALL places indicated on the form. ANY APPLICATION THAT DOES NOT INCLUDE THE SIGNATURE AND SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER OF THE ELIGIBLE PARTY WILL BE INCOMPLETE AND PAYMENTS WILL NOT BE MADE.

Step-by-step instruction are included with each application. Help is also available at the local FSA office, by contacting the toll-free help line at 1-877-549-2537 or on the web site at www.kyagpolicy.com.

Funds are expected to be distributed by the national trustee by December 31, 2002.

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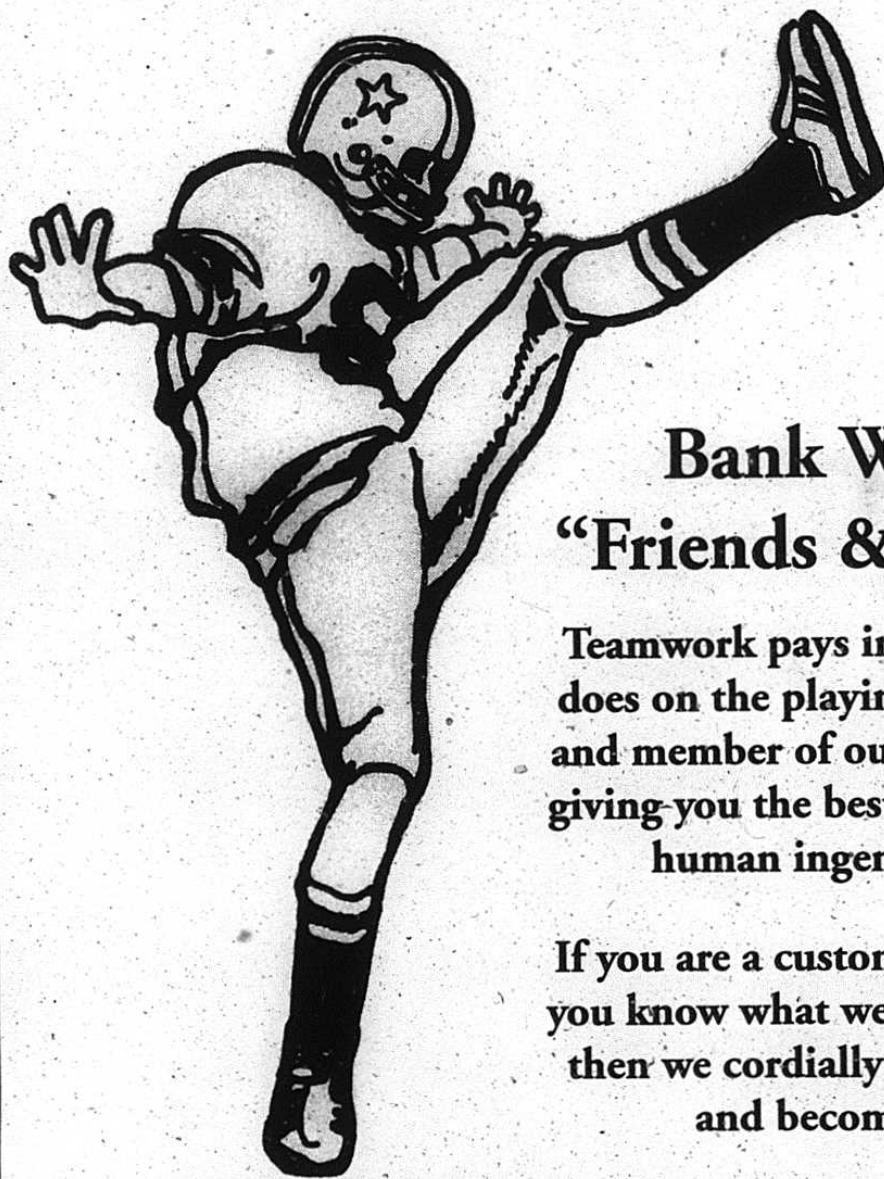

Rockets face challenge to return to the "carpet"

For many years the Rockcastle County High School football program has been successful and respected throughout the state of Kentucky.

But last year the Rockets did something no other team had ever accomplished, they played in a state championship game in Louisville.

The 2001 Rockets didn't fair so well that Saturday afternoon in December against a very good Boyle County team, but they finished with a record of 14-1 and a state runner-up title.

What about this year?

With several returning starters, a quarterback who threw more touchdown passes last year than anybody in the state, (41), and possibly the best offensive and defensive line to ever play at the ROCK, expectations are high.

Rockcastle coaches have always played upped their opponents and down played their chances, but since

Head Coach Tom Larkey arrived on the scene and Head Assistant Tony Saylor started a weight lifting program and dedicated himself to stopping all opponents on defense with endless hours of preparation the Rockets have been winners.

Larkey arrived in 1985, Saylor came a couple years earlier but they have been a successful combination.

First it was just winning seasons, then it was district titles, (a lot of them) and then in 2000, the ROCK won a regional title and played in a state semi-final game.

Last year they took it one step further by winning the state semi-final game and this year they would like to take it even further, in winning a state championship.

Larkey just shakes his head when asked about his chances, but he is confident that the ROCK will do well. Just how well remains to be seen, but he and his coach-

ing staff and this year's team have a better understanding of what it takes to win that elusive state title.

And anyone who knows coach Saylor, knows he won't say much, he just works and works and keeps on working.

This year's team has some big spots to fill, thanks to graduation and some of those spots will be filled with young inexperienced players.

The ROCK defense, which was one of the best in the state last year, lost six starters and with injuries at camp this season, Saylor has his work cut out for him.

Replacing maybe as many eight people on defense is no easy task, but as the season goes on, at least two starters from last year will be back.

Junior lineman Jason Leger, who has received a lot of attention for his size, strength and overall good play has a broken foot.

He has started for the ROCK since he was a freshman and will likely miss the first five games.

Doctors have said that he will be ready by district play, but he is being sorely missed by the coaching staff and teammates.

"Jason is a very good

player and he is a motivator, who our other kids look to," Larkey said.

Linebacker and tightend, senior Stephen Boring is also on the injured list after hurting his knee at camp, but he will be back in the lineup much sooner than Leger.

Saylor said that Boreing could see some action on Saturday night when Rockcastle plays Mason County in the Bob Allen Pigskin Classic.

All total, there were as many as 13 players hurt at one point during football camp, but most of the players have healed up and will play.

"For us to have any chance of repeating the accomplishments of a year

ago, we have got to stay healthy," Larkey said.

"If we stay healthy, we will get better as the season goes along and we could be as good, if our players continue to work hard," Larkey said.

Quarterback Aaron Anderkin, who threw for nearly 2,800 yards and the 41 touchdowns has been named a candidate for Kentucky's Mr. Football, but he's not real impressed.

"I would much rather have a state championship

ring, than a Mr. Football title," he said. "Individual honors are meaningless if your team doesn't perform the way they are capable of," he added.

"It is an honor to be mentioned, but football is a team sport and it takes a total effort from everyone," he said.

Anderkin said that he likes Rockcastle's chances of returning to Louisville the first week of December, but he and the rest of his team know how hard it will be because of the level of competition in 3A football in the state.

"When you have to go through Lexington Catholic, or Covington Catholic and Highlands, anybody who knows anything about high school football knows what you are up against," he said.

Anderkin will also start at safety this year.

Larkey and Saylor both agreed that Saturday's opponent, Mason County, will probably be the best team they face during the regular season.

A lot of people are picking Mason County to win the state's 2A championship,

based on the fact that they have so many returning starters from a team that won eleven games and made it to the state semi-finals before losing to Prestonsburg.

"We've got our hands full, they are quick, have a good quarterback and a great kicking game," Saylor said.

"It should be a good game on Saturday, but we are not as good right now as we were this time last year, so we really can't afford to make any mistakes," Larkey said.

Although the Rockets are hurting physically, when they take the field on Saturday they will have a few things on their side.

Many starters from a year ago are back and they know what it is like to win.

Returning on offense besides Anderkin are tailback Marty Reagan, who is also been named one of the top players in the region.

Reagan has played varsity since he was a freshman and he has started for three years on both sides of the football.

Reagan is a talented runner and a very good receiver, who could set a school record for career interceptions on defense this year.

Also returning are offensive and defensive linemen and captains, Tanner Abney and Michael Brummett. Both have started for three years.

Senior Jared Rice and senior Doug French are fighting for the center spot and Nick Thomas and Benny Northern will likely hold down the other offensive linemen spots.

Senior Clell Swinney, who will eventually play at fullback some was also hurt at camp and is still limited.

He and wide-out senior Michael Hayes, who is suffering from a virus, will likely not play on Saturday night.

Junior Devin Taylor will start at one wide-out and sophomores Derrick Hurst and Ricky Sandusky are competing for the other wide-out position.

backfield with Reagan and Taylor will handle the placekicking and punting.

The good news for Rocket fans is that both Dunbar and Bell County must play at the ROCK.

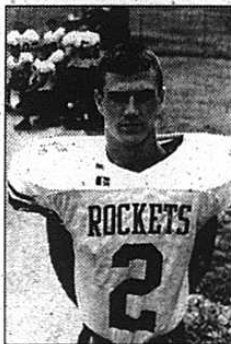
It should be noted that while coaching together, Larkey and Saylor have a combined record of 154 and 46 and last year they defeated Bell County twice in the same season.

"I wanted to surprise him and with the help of my parents, I did just that," she said.

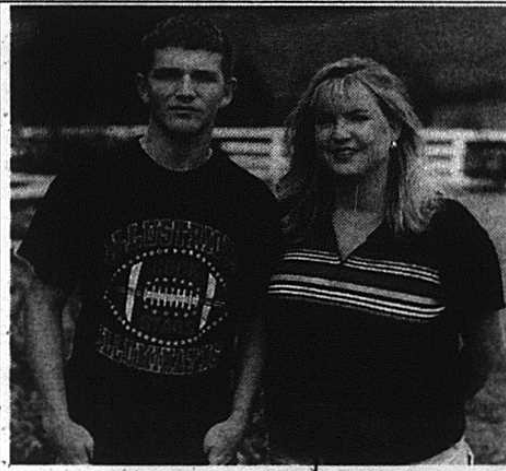
"The first thing he said was that he wondered why I hadn't

"I just did it in person," Beverly continued.

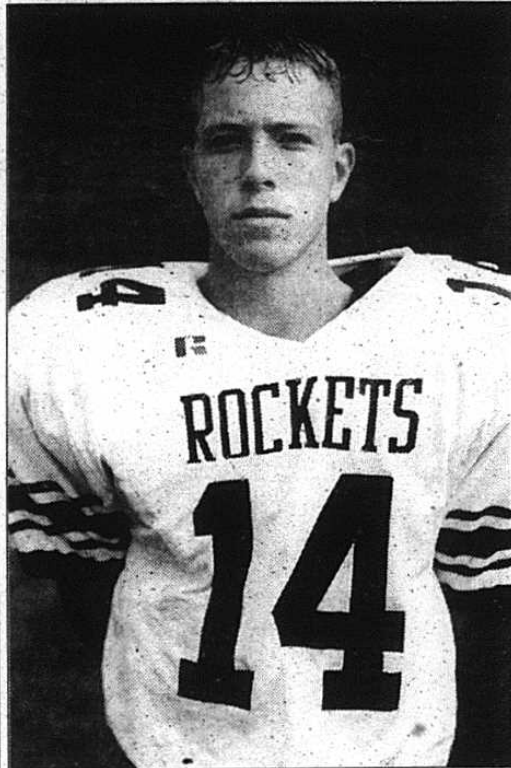
Beverly got into Louisville on Friday night, went to the game and spent the rest of the weekend with her son, before returning to Alaska on Sunday.
