



# Rockcastle men arrested in drug sting by feds

. Two major methamphetamine seizures in three weeks have authorities concerned that an outside meth cartel may be trying to move into South

tel may be trying to move into South-cast Keintucky.

On August 9, police arrested three men in Williamsburg who were at-tempting to take delivery of 16 pounds of meth, a highly additive stimulant. This week, police setzed 29, pounds of meth in London and charged three people with transport-ing it from Southern California for distribution.

Before this month, most meth

distribution.

Before this month, most meth cases in the area involved an ounce or less that had been produced locally, typically in homemade labs. The two big meth shipments from out of state could indicate that large affilickers who operate "superfusible," in Mexico or the Southwest United States are moving into the area, either to try to take over the market or to establish a base to distribute meth in other states.

"It's raising our concern," said Michael Pelonero, resident agent in charge of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration Office in London.

The DEA investigated both of the recent large serurares and made arrests with support from other federal, state and local police.

Sarah's father began sexually Sarah's father began sexually abusing her when she was six, The abuse continued until Sarah became pregnant by her boyfriend, got maried and left home. "Oetting pregnant protected me from my father," Sarah said. "Idin't think about what I would do with a baby. I just wanted to stop the abuse."

Unfortunately for Sarah her hus-

hand was no different than her father

band was no different than her father. He emotionally and occasionally physically abused her. He forced her to have sex whenever he wanted. "I didn't know! I could say 'no," Sarah told me. Her fluther had taught her that her main function in tife was to he a sexual object for a man. Sarah was just doing what she was taught. Therefore in the first two years to marriage Sarah had two bables. After her divorce Sarah began dating almost jmmediately. "I need a man, "Sarah clyimed. She had sex with her boyfriend soon after they began dating and became pergenant

began dating and became pregnant

loved me," Sarah said. "He promised he would take care of me and the kids, but when our son was born be disappeared."

Would cutting her welfare have stopped Sarah from having three children? I doubt it. Her sexual ac-

tivity came because she had been sexually abused not because of a quest for more funds. She tried and inted to find a man who would love her but the men she chose were just like Dad: they fathered her children and then abandoned or abused her. Another suggested factic to stop "Welfare Mothers" from having babies is to cut off all funds to them so that they have to return home to their parents who (then texparents) who (the next parents) who (the parents) who they have to return home to their certain home to her father? The abuse would probably start again. And what of her two little girls? What would her father do to them?

The reasons women have children The reasons women have children The reasons women have children.

The reasons women have children are much more complicated than just financial. The reasons have to do with the environment in which they grew up and how they were treated. Just cutting off the funds won't stop the coinception of more children. Programs to teach job skills and provide counseling for these women are what will make a difference.



Once again it is time for the 4-H Poster contest. The posters are due October 18, 2002. First and second place winner will receive a plaque. The rules are as follows:

The rules are as follows:

1. Poster must be created by a currently enrolled 4-H'er.

2. Well known cartoon figures cannot be used because they are copyrighted. (Examples: Looney Tunes, Sponge Bob-Square Pants, Blues Clues, Mickey Mouse, Star Wars, Spiderman, Charlie Brown, Pooh, etc.)

3. All posters must be designed.

All posters must be designed on or

affixed to 0.16 ply construction paper, poster board (solid fiber board) of 14 inch x 22 inch dimensions (one half a standard poster board size.) They may be horizontal or vertical.
