

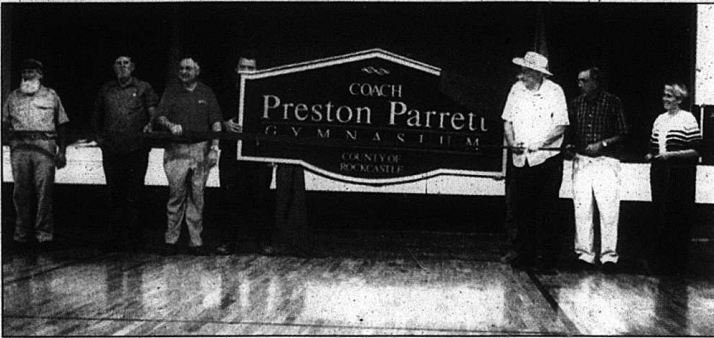

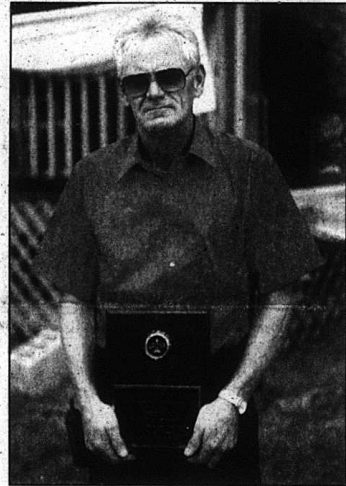

Volunteers search for boy who was at Wal-Mart

Numerous volunteers searched for three hours Thursday evening for a missing 8-year-old boy.

The Roundstone school student had been missing for about an hour and half when 911 dispatch received the call.

Volunteers searched the area around the child's home, which is located near Grace Baptist Church and even brought in a helicopter to help in the search.

Around 9 p.m. the child showed up at home. He had apparently gone with some neighbors to Wal-Mart in Berea, but had not notified his parents of his whereabouts.

On Tuesday, police were looking for another juvenile, who had apparently threatened to kill himself. According to witnesses at the scene, the teenager had possibly been sniffing spray paint for several hours on Tuesday when he got a knife and said he was going to kill himself.

Neighbors said he ran off into the woods next to his mobile home which is located off U.S. 25 in Mt. Vernon, near the former Superior Food Market.

Police, neighbors and EMT's with the Rockcastle Ambulance Service searched the area, but were unable to locate the boy. Officials said that they were not sure if the boy returned home or not.

Livingston gym named in honor of former coach

An extremely large number of people came and went at the Livingston Homecoming this past weekend.

It was probably the most people to ever attend the annual three day event.

Those attending were treated to a long parade, beauty contests, live music and an Old Timer's basketball game.

The game was probably the highlight of the evening with a standing room only crowd in attendance. Before the game, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court named the recently renovated school gymnasium after former Livingston basketball coach Preston Parrett, who coached at the school for 33 years.

Parrett was on hand to accept his

award, as was former coach Lee Gentry, who coached at the school before Parrett.

Numerous former players, students and cheerleaders congratulated the two men on their honors.

Also during the weekend, several other awards were presented.

Sam Stallworth, who serves as Livingston Fire Chief and is a member of the Rockcastle County Board of Education, was named Citizen of the Year. Stallworth has also served on the Livingston Homecoming Committee for several years.

Mark Poynter, owner of Livingston Market, was awarded the Business of the Year Award and Mrs. Lucille Carlotis was awarded the New Business of the Year Award for

Rockcastle men arrested in drug sting by feds

Two major methamphetamine seizures in three weeks have authorities concerned that an outside meth cartel may be trying to move into South-east Kentucky.

On August 9, police arrested three men in Williamsburg who were attempting to take delivery of 16 pounds of meth, a highly addictive stimulant. This week, police seized 29 pounds of meth in London and charged three people with transporting it from Southern California for distribution.

Before this month, most meth cases in the area involved an ounce or less that had been produced by, typically in homemade labs.

The two big meth shipments from out of state could indicate that large traffickers who operate "superlabs" in Mexico or the Southwest United States are moving into the area, either to try to take over the market or to establish a base to distribute meth in other states.

"It's raising our concern," said Michael Pelotero, resident agent in charge of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration Office in London.

The DEA investigated both of the recent large seizures and made arrests with support from other federal, state and local police.

The first case grew out of a traffic stop in Arizona, in which police found just over 16 pounds of meth bound for Kentucky. The DEA turned the delivery into a sting, arresting Calvin Dawson, 55, of Brodhead; his son, James Dawson, 29, of Mt. Vernon; and Bobby Lovell, 37, of Mt. Vernon, when they showed up in Williamsburg to get the shipment. All three have been charged with conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute meth and marijuana.

The second big seizure grew out of a DEA investigation in Southern California.

An informant there told federal drug agents that a large meth manufacturer named Eduardo "Lalo" Perez-Hernandez had made several shipments of the drug from his ranch outside San Diego to the London-Corbin area and was planning another large shipment, according to a sworn statement from Fred J. Baker, a DEA special agent in the London office.

Baker testified at a hearing yes-

terday that Dale Clinton Lewis, 40, and his girlfriend, Tammy Davidson, 34, both of Knox County, went to Perez-Hernandez's ranch last week to pick up the shipment.

Lewis, with Davidson as passenger, brought the load back to Kentucky in a dog box in the back of his Ford pickup truck while the informant and Jose Salazar-Peligo, 34, followed in a Chevrolet Suburban. Salazar-Peligo, of Puebla, Mexico, was to make deliveries of the drug and collect for past shipments, Baker said.

The four "drove more or less straight through" to Kentucky from San Diego, Baker said, arriving early August 26. The DEA kept tabs on the shipment with a tracking device on

Two arrested

A Tennessee woman and a Herndon, Va. man were arrested late Wednesday night, after police received a tip they were hauling stolen property in a covered trailer.

State trooper Colby Sam and Rockcastle Deputy Aaron Matthews arrested the couple around midnight at the Super 8 Motel in Mt. Vernon.

Police say when they searched the trailer and motel room they found items that had been reported stolen to other agencies, components to make methamphetamine, meth and marijuana.

The two were lodged in the Rockcastle Detention Center and their vehicle and trailer were impounded.

The couple was charged with receiving stolen property, manufacturing meth, trafficking in a controlled substance and trafficking in marijuana.

McKee man seriously hurt

A McKee man is listed in critical condition at the U.K. Medical Center in Lexington after an accident in Livingston Sunday afternoon.

Livingston police officer William Harris said that Daniel Brewer, 44, was riding his motorcycle south on Hwy. 25 around White Star when Earl Ponder, 88, of Livingston turned into his path.

Brewer's motorcycle skidded 37 feet before striking Ponder's vehicle. Brewer was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital and later flown to U.K. with massive head injuries. He was wearing a helmet.

Ponder was treated at the hospital and released. The accident occurred around 6 p.m.

dren, but the methods that are often suggested are not enough.

Cutting off welfare payments after the first child is born won't stop Sarah from having babies. Sarah does not have babies because she wants more money. She has babies because she cannot stop the cycle of abuse that began when she was just a child.

Sarah's father began sexually abusing her when she was six. The abuse continued until Sarah became pregnant by her boyfriend, got married and left home.

"Getting pregnant protected me from my father," Sarah said. "I didn't think about what I would do with a baby. I just wanted to stop the abuse."

Unfortunately for Sarah her husband was no different than her father. He emotionally and occasionally physically abused her. He forced her to have sex whenever he wanted. "I didn't know I could say no," Sarah told me. Her father had taught her that her main function in life was to be a sexual object for a man. Sarah was just doing what she was taught.

Therefore in the first two years of marriage Sarah had two babies.

After her divorce Sarah began dating almost immediately. "I need a man," Sarah claimed. She had sex with her boyfriend soon after they began dating and became pregnant almost immediately. "I thought he

loved me," Sarah said. "He promised he would take care of me and the kids, but when our son was born he disappeared."

Would cutting her welfare have stopped Sarah from having three children? I doubt it. Her sexual ac-

tivity came because she had been sexually abused not because of a quest for more funds. She tried and tried to find a man who would love her but the men she chose were just like Dad: they fathered her children and then abandoned or abused her.

Another suggested tactic to stop "Welfare Mothers" from having babies is to cut off all funds to them so that they have to return home to their parents who (theoretically) will help take care of them so (the taxpayers) won't have to. What would happen to Sarah if she were forced to return home to her father? The abuse would probably start again. And what of her two little girls? What would her father do to them?

The reasons women have children are much more complicated than just financial. The reasons have to do with the environment in which they grew up and how they were treated. Just cutting off the funds won't stop the conception of more children. Programs to teach job skills and provide counseling for these women are what will make a difference.

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Sexual Abuse Can Lead to Early Pregnancy
Sarah is twenty-four and has three children. She receives welfare, food stamps and an SSI check for her youngest who has several physical problems. Two of the children are by her first husband who was abusive to her. After her divorce she became pregnant by her boyfriend who left soon afterward.
Though Sarah is fictitious her story is not. I think of Sarah and women like her when I hear the call to "stop women on welfare from having babies."
It is a good idea to help women in Sarah's situation have fewer chil-

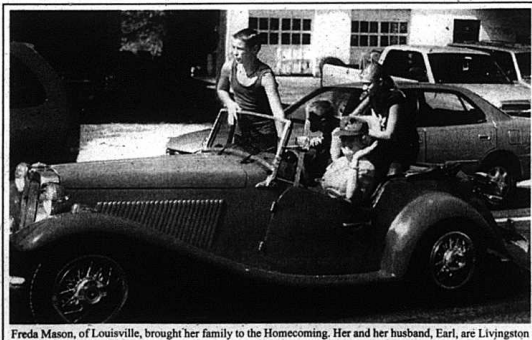

Yards to Paradise

Landscaping for Drought and Fire Resistance

There are plants that survive despite receiving little water. There are plants that survive when raging wildfires sweep through neighborhoods.

By choosing some of these plants for our landscaping we may lessen our worries during dry periods.

Before mentioning some tolerant plants, consider the following tips. Part of the success in drought survival or during watering restrictions is prior conditioning. A healthy tree can better take periods of stress. Too much fertilizer causes fast growth, which becomes excessively stressed when water is not available.

Realize there are microclimates in your yard, areas dryer, wetter, warmer, colder than most areas. Against the north and east sides of a house, fence, or outbuilding there is usually a "rain shadow." Also under large trees, much less rain falls on the ground.

Create whole beds or whole areas of drought tolerant plants. Mixing them with water-loving plants creates a dilemma when watering, because some drought tolerant plants will die from over-watering.

Mulch to conserve soil moisture (as well as keep weeds down and for a nice appearance). A healthy tree can better take periods of stress. Too much fertilizer causes fast growth, which becomes excessively stressed when water is not available.

Some drought tolerant plants are suggested below. You can probably think of others.

Trees: white oak, burr oak, chestnut oak, scarlet oak. European black alder (all extremes), ash, Kentucky coffee tree, catalpa, redbud, mulberry, osage orange, honey locust, hackberry, pinon pine, blue spruce, Norway spruce, deodar cedar.

Shrubs: Arizona cypress, sumac, pee gee hydrangea, yucca, privet, northern hollyberry, redbud, photinia, rosemary, crepe myrtle, potentilla, barberry, pyracantha, wisteria, pea shrub.

Perennials: artemisia, baptisia (false indigo), yarrow, most mints, lavender, sea holly, lambs ears, Virginia creeper, caryopteris (blue mist or blue beard).

Groundcovers: English ivy (once established it needs plenty of water the first season), Alyssum, creeping rosemary, lavender cotton, fountain grass, buffalo grass, blue gramma grass, fescue, creeping thyme.

When it comes to fire, no plant is completely fire proof. Plants that store lots of water, cactus for instance, don't burn easily. Incliant or sedums (succulent plants) don't burn readily.

Deciduous trees that have been

well watered a day or two before a wildfire do not burn much. The same is true of evergreen ivy, provided it is not wilted and dry prior to the fire.

Evergreen trees, any trees for that matter, that are very resinous will burn wildly in a fire. And resistant trees or groundcovers are useless if dead leaves, dry grass, dead branches, etc., litter the ground among them!

In fire prone areas, reduce the fuel a fire would need to a very minimum, while still maintaining an esthetically pleasing landscape. The use of gravel, lava rock, paver stones, and concrete in place of mulch would help.

And a hedge row of pines leading right up to the house could split disaster if caught in a dry wind-driven fire!

the Suburban and through surveillance including from the air.

Police arrested Lewis, Davidson and Salazar-Pellejo on August 26.

They are charged with conspiring to possess and distribute methamphetamine. Because of the large amount of the drug involved, they face maximum sentences of 10 years to life if convicted.

There have also been arrests in California related to the case and more arrests are expected in the London area, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Stephen C. Smith.

Methamphetamine production and trafficking has mushroomed in Kentucky in recent years as the drug spread from California and across the Midwest into the Eastern United States.

In 2001, for instance, the Kentucky State Police investigated 156 meth labs in Kentucky, said Lt. Lisa Rudzinski of the KSP. This year, the number could double; state police had investigated 174 labs as of July 31.

Rockets roll over South Laurel 48-0

It was no contest on Friday night as the Rockcastle County Rocket football team continued their annual dominance of South Laurel.

But this time the ROCK took it easy on the Cardinals, 48-0. It was so bad that after the first play of the second half the "mercy"

rule kicked in and the clock did not stop until the game was over.

Most of the Rocket varsity got a breather in the second half as the ROCK coaching staff took no chances on any more injuries, which have plagued the 2002 team.

Tailback Marty Reagan scored three rushing touchdowns and Quarterback Aaron Anderkin threw two touchdown passes and rushed for another as the Rockets evened their season record at 1-1.

Junior Devon Bussell was on the other end of those two touchdown passes, one for 61 yards and the other for five.

Besides Anderkin, Reagan and Bussell's offensive stats, senior Clell Swinney had 61 yards on three carries and he caught one pass for 12 yards.

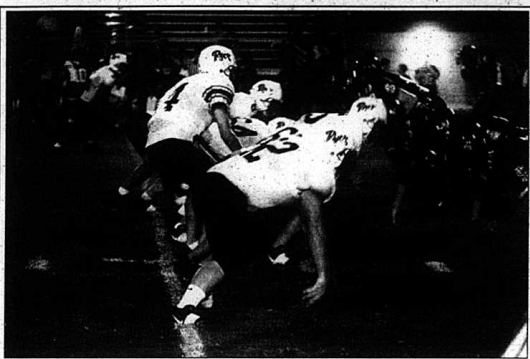
Junior Devin Taylor had three catches for 34 yards and he made six of the seven extra point attempts he kicked.

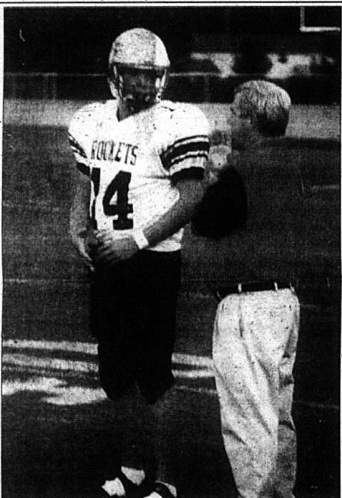

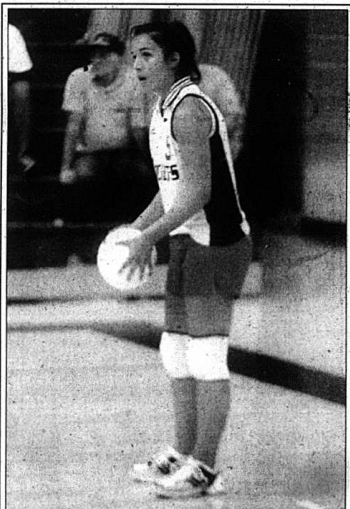

It took three games but the Lady Rocket jayvees also took the measure of their Clay County counterparts Tuesday night.

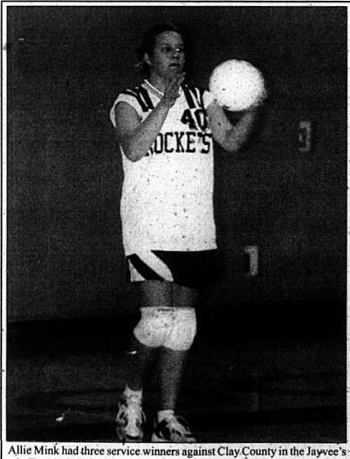

It was a 15-3 runaway for the Rockets in the second game with Rogers again leading in service winners with 9; Parsons got 4 and Mink

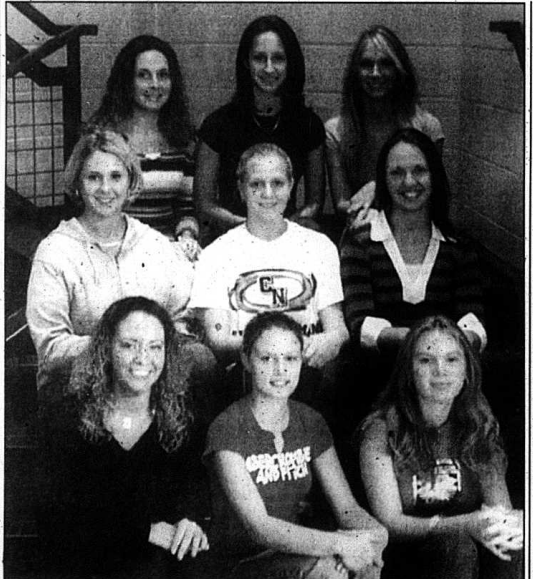

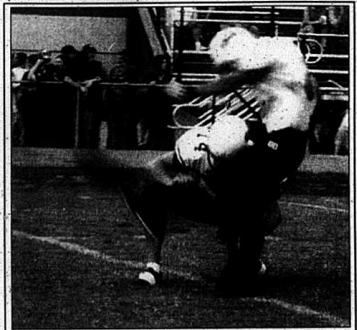
and Bryant, 1 each.

Mission team volunteers at Christian Outreach

Christ's Outreach for the Blind, a non-profit, Christian-based camp in Mt. Vernon, hosted a mission team of four adults and six teenagers from Tabor United Church of Christ in Lebanon, Pennsylvania, August 11-17. Mike and Lori Gates, Directors of Christ's Outreach, have coordinated the work of mission groups from across the U.S. this summer.

"I think God is teaching us to look on the heart of people," said Joseph Hedden, Pastor of the church for five years. "We all have stereotypes of what we think blind people can do, what is going to be is archery, rappelling, things that we do not expect blind people to do," he said.

The 800-acre camp for the blind and disabled continues to take shape as each mission team makes its own unique contribution. The team laid rocks around a large fountain in front of the center, finished the walls of four rooms and a large cafeteria and installed wood trim in lodge rooms and staff apartments. "The facilities are terrific," Hedden said. But what we really like is how personal it has been. Mike and Lori have eaten with us and shared devotions with us."

"We have liked being connected with Mike and his wife, his Mom and Dad," Catherine Irwin said. "We have been so inspired by their stories of what they have been through to get

to this point. We feel really blessed that we are going to be a part of this, that we helped. We are seriously considering coming back next year."

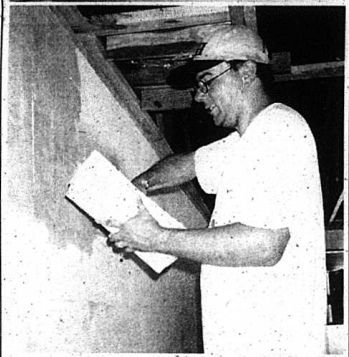
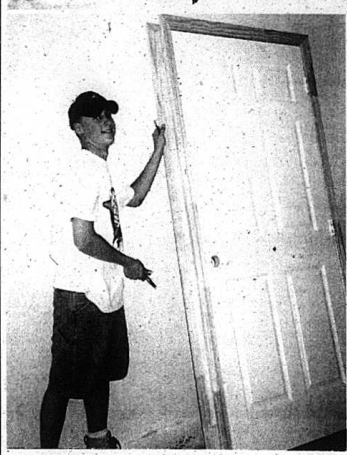
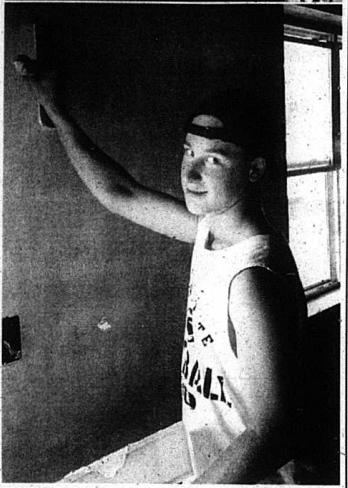
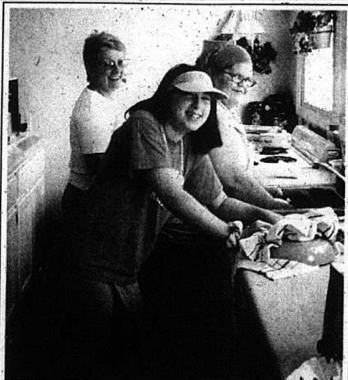
Youth volunteers, a driving force behind the work at Christ's Outreach this summer, have labored tirelessly to complete the camp. "He's (Gates) got a good thing going."

Ben Mauer, 16, said, "It should be very successful when we get it all up and running. It is awesome here. I would definitely come back."

Mike Gates, who was blinded in a hunting accident in 1989, enjoys interaction with the mission groups. With a grin, he told about teaching one of the young boys to drive a golf cart. "Oliver is 17 years old," Gates said. "He's going to try for his driver's license when he gets home. He can't wait until he tells his friends that he got his first driving instruction from a blind guy."

When Christ's Outreach for the Blind officially opens, it will accommodate 600 campers per year. Camping activities will include horseback riding, hunting, fishing, swimming, mountain climbing, hiking, rappelling, gardening and independent living skills.

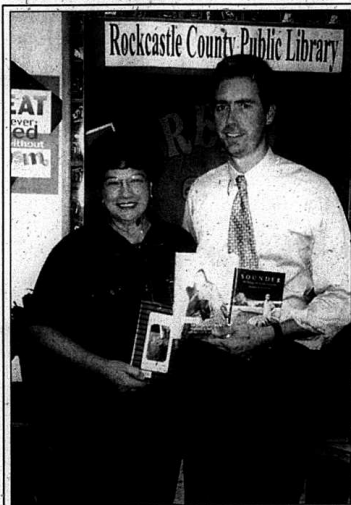

City of Mt. Vernon Ordinance #6-2002
NOTICE OF AVAILABILITY
All interested persons in City of Mt. Vernon are hereby notified that a copy of the entire ordinance creating the Rockcastle County Office of Emergency Management is available for public inspection at the City of Mt. Vernon during normal business hours.

An ordinance creating the City of Mt. Vernon/Rockcastle County Office of Emergency Management.
The General Assembly of Kentucky has enacted KRS Chapters 39A to 39F requiring the creation of a local emergency management agency and comprehensive emergency management program. The City of Mt. Vernon, to protect and safeguard the property, safety, and welfare of the citizens and the environment of the City of Mt. Vernon, enacts this ordinance.

The Rockcastle Office of Emergency Management will develop, implement, and maintain the local emergency management program according to the requirements of the State Division of Emergency Management, Kentucky Emergency Operations Plan, and the City of Mt. Vernon.

The Rockcastle Office of Emergency Management will be attached to the Office of County Judge-Executive and have jurisdiction, responsibility, and authority in matters pertaining to the comprehensive emergency management program and disaster and emergency response of Rockcastle County. The County Judge-Executive will designate and include a separate OEM budget unit classification within the county's annual budget, and all financial matters shall be handled through the uniform budget system.




The County Judge-Executive shall appoint an emergency management director within 30 days of the office and notify the state DEM of the appointment. The Emergency Management Director shall be sworn by oath to the Office of Emergency Management and shall serve no longer than 4 consecutive years without re-appointment.

The Rockcastle County Emergency Management Director shall have and exercise the authorities specified in KRS Chapters 39A to 39F, including the following: (A) to represent the Judge-Executive in matters pertaining to the EM Program and emergency response of the County, (B) to supervise and control the development and maintenance of the Emergency Management Program, and to coordinate all emergency response, (C) to develop and coordinate the Emergency Management Plan in compliance with KRS 39A to 39F, (D) to direct the Rockcastle County Disaster and Emergency Services Organization, (E) to notify the CJE and the state DEM of any type of emergency or disaster and provide an assessment of the situation, (F) to respond to the scene and investigate; coordinate a management system; activate the Emergency Management Plan and EOC; gather information and conduct briefings; notify the CJE and the state DEM of the scope of the situation; provide assistance as necessary; and to coordinate the disaster and emergency response of local agencies; (H) to protect public safety; (I) to set as representative of state DEM when requested; (J) to report to CJE; (K) to have signatory authority for the executive of contracts pertaining to the operation of the Rockcastle EOM upon prior approval from the CJE; (L) to direct all workers of the Rockcastle Office of Emergency Management and supervise any units and personnel affiliated with the Rockcastle EM Services; (M) submit regular reports to the area manager of the State DEM & County Judge-Executive; (N) to execute bond in the amount as determined by CJE, when directed; (O) to submit to the CJE a program budget request for the Rockcastle EM Office; (P) to submit to the state DEM's fiscal year Program Paper & budget request by the 15th of July each year; (Q) to enroll and register as a member of FEMA; (R) to perform duties with the approval of the fiscal court pursuant to the provisions of KRS Chapter 39F; and (S) to perform all tasks required pursuant to KRS Chapters 39A to 39F. Kentucky administrative regulations, the Kentucky EOM Plan, or guidelines set by the DEM; and to carry out all other emergency management related duties as required by the Fiscal Court, the CJE and the Rockcastle EOM plan.





Any persons violating this ordinance shall be (upon conviction) guilty of Class A misdemeanor, and may be issued a citation by the Sheriff or authorized official. The provisions are severable if any provision shall be held invalid or unconstitutional or inapplicable to any person or circumstance, shall not affect the remaining provisions. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its approval and adoption.

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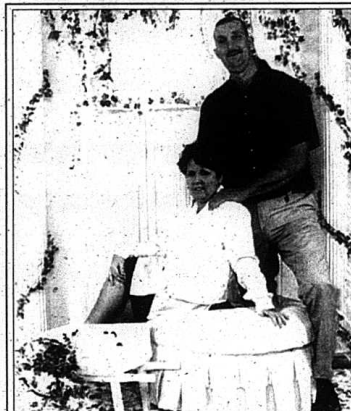



Strategic plan moves ahead

Projects Demonstrate Progress
Over one hundred citizens gathered in March, 2002, to initiate the Rockcastle County Strategic Planning process. Since then six task forces have taken on community-improvements projects. The projects have formed the core of the planning process. In the weeks ahead, the task forces will be refining strategies for the strategic plan. They are seeking public input into this process. Below is a brief summary of the work to date and the strategies identified for the plan.

Community Clean Up
The Beautification Task Force led by Corey Craig, has initiated "Operation Clean the Rock and Keep It Clean." Teams of volunteers have picked up litter along several roadways and in August sponsored a major clean-up of the St. Clair house and the surrounding property in Mt.

Vernon. Additional strategies will address:

- City and County welcome signs
- Mandatory garbage pick-up
- Planning for land use and growth

Welcome to Mt. Vernon

The Tourism Task Force, led by Judy Dueson, has taken on clean up and beautification of the area at the junction of Highway 25 and the 461 Bypass; where people turn to enter the city of Mt. Vernon. This project will include adding topsoil, landscaping and constructing a welcome sign. Additional strategies will address:

- Driving tours, walking tours and bike trails
- Strengthening the Mt. Vernon-Rockcastle County Tourism Commission
- Identifying natural sites (caves, waterfalls, etc.) as tourist attractions
- Coordinating all tourism activities

- Marketing initiatives for tourism attractions
- A public golf course
- Strengthening local festivals
- Identifying and preserving historic buildings

• Clean up of Lake Linville and improvements to Lake Linville Park
• A civic center/conference center at Renfro Valley
• Creation of a large, new park with facilities for local families and visitors

New Business and Industry Council

The Workforce Development Task Force, led by Bige Towery, is primarily focused on the creation and

expansion of good jobs in Rockcastle County. Its short-term project was to establish a local business/industry council. In July, task force members met with representatives of local industry and the Cabinet for Economic Development to begin the process. Additional strategies will address:

- Expansion of industrial/business park space
- Natural gas service to industrial parks
- Job training opportunities, through schools and on-the-job
- Housing needs assessment
- Utilities needs assessment
- A Leadership Development Program

The Leadership Task Force, led by John Clontz, identified leadership as a key to success and the driving component of the entire community development process. The task force is designing a leadership development program for Rockcastle County

to be conducted annually. Additional strategies will address:

- Local citizens trained to conduct the leadership development program
- Local participation in state and regional leadership programs
- Identifying "best practices" to include in the local leadership program
- Special leadership enhancement opportunities for local officials

A New Vocational/Technical Center

The Educational Task Force, led by Shelby Reynolds, identified the need for a new tech center as being the number one priority to address. The task force is developing a plan to leverage funding for a new facility to be built next to the Rockcastle County High School. Additional strategies will address:

- Interaction between business and industry and the educational system
- Communication among providers of literacy and adult education services
- Access to literacy and educational programs for people in remote areas of the county
- Post-secondary educational opportunities
- Quality childcare for working people

A Community Health/Recreation Facility

The Community Healthcare Task Force, led by Dr. Tony Arvin, has begun to research a health and recreation facility. The task force envisions a "community health center without walls" which would consist of existing facilities, such as schools, as well as new facilities with exercise equipment and an indoor pool for year round use. Additional strategies will address:

- Hospital expansion
- New and enhanced medical services

• Public health services

The strategic planning process is sponsored by the Rockcastle County Development Board. Public input is welcome. USDA Rural Development offers 100% financing, with no down payment for the purchase of a home, to low and very low income families in Rockcastle County. These loans can be used for the purchase of a new or existing single family dwelling, up to \$86,317.

• Adjusted Income Limit - maximum of \$29,050 for a family of four in Rockcastle County.

Monthly payments are reduced to as low as 1.0% (based on family's income).

Constitution Awareness Week

Tuesday, September 17, begins the national celebration of Constitution Week. The weeklong commemoration of America's most important document is one of our country's least known official observances. Our Constitution stands as a testament to the tenacity of Americans throughout history to maintain their liberties and freedom and to ensure those unalienable rights to every American.

The tradition of celebrating the Constitution was started many years ago by the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). In 1955 the Daughters petitioned Congress to set aside September 17-23 annually to be dedicated for the observance of Constitution Week. The resolution was later adopted by the U.S. Congress and signed into Public Law #915 on August 2, 1956, by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The aims of the celebration are to (1) emphasize citizens' responsibilities for protecting and defending the Constitution, preserving it for posterity; (2) inform the people that the Constitution is the basis of America's great heritage and the foundation for our way of life; and (3) encourage the study of the historical events which led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

The United States of America functions as a Republic under the Constitution, which is the oldest document still in active use that outlines the self-government of a people.

This landmark idea that men had the inalienable right as individuals to be free and live their lives under their own governance was the impetus of the American Revolution. Today, the Constitution stands as an icon of freedom for people around the world.

The DAR encourages all citizens to reflect on our heritage of freedom. "Now more than ever, on the anniversary of September 11, we must value our revolutionary ancestors and the sacrifices they made for the freedoms we enjoy today," states DAR President General, Linda Tinker Watkins.

DAR has served America for 112 years, as its foremost cheerleader. In 1928 the Daughters began work on a building as a memorial to the Constitution. John Russell Pope, architect of the Jefferson Memorial, was commissioned to design the performing arts center, known as Constitution Hall. Today, Constitution Hall is the only structure erected in tribute to the Constitution of the United States of America.

Known as the largest women's patriotic organization in the world, DAR has over 170,000 members with chapters in all 50 states and 11 foreign countries. The DAR has long promoted patriotism through commemorative celebrations, memorials, scholarships and activities for children and programs for new immigrants. 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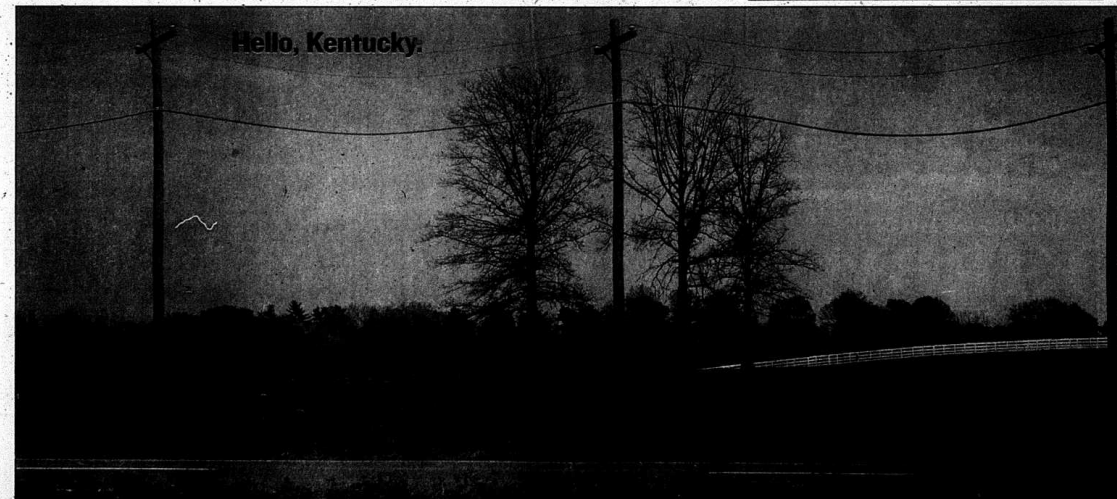
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"What saith the Scriptures"

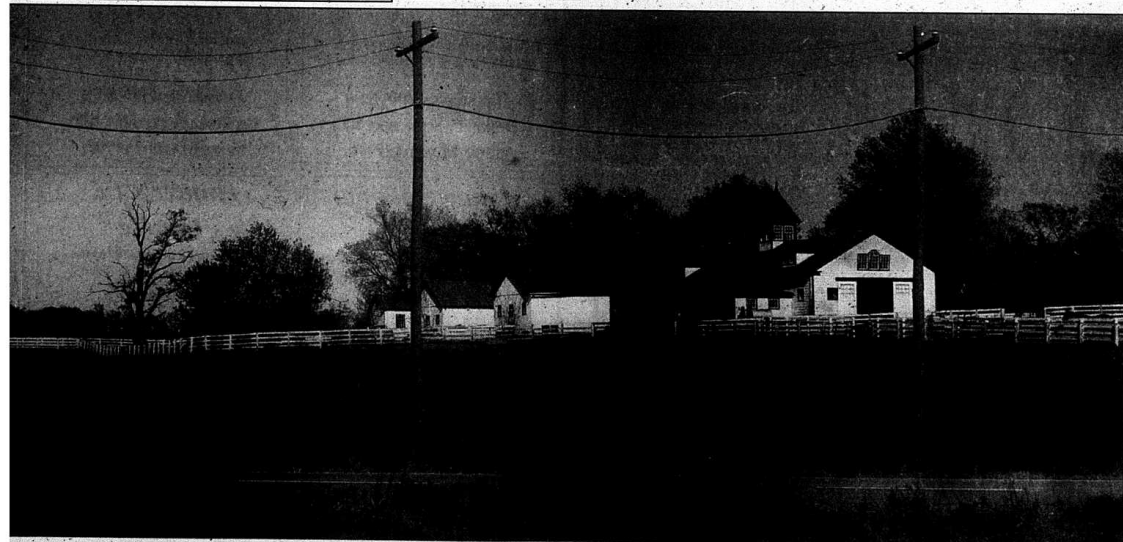
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Minds in the Middle

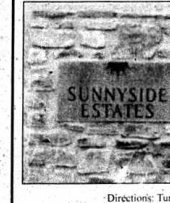

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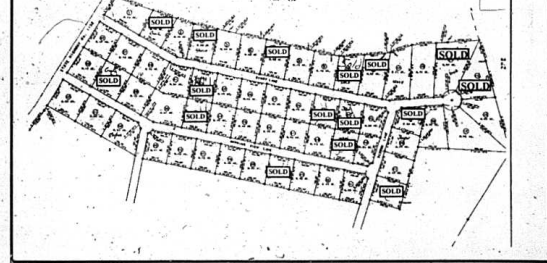
