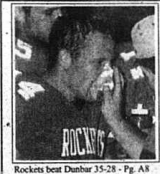


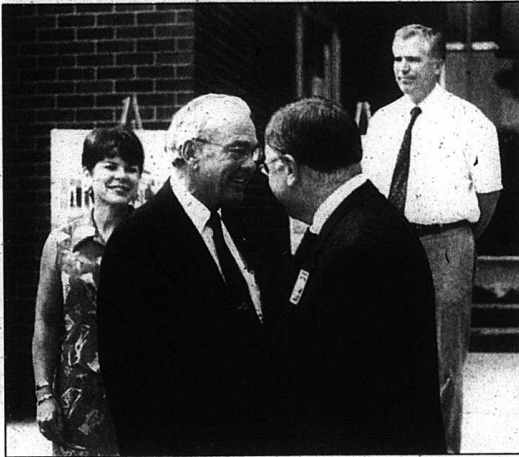

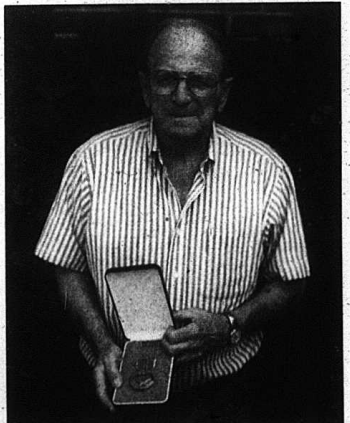
## Mink held over to local Grand Jury

A preliminary hearing of Rocky G. Mink, 21, was held Monday, on charges of Arson 2nd Degree, five counts, class B felony. Mink has allegedly burned several vehicles during the early morning hours of August 27th in Mt. Vernon.

The court found that probable cause existed sufficient to hold the case over to the Rockcastle County Grand Jury, and the matter was held over for the November Grand Jury.

Assistant Chief Eddie Delaney of the Mt. Vernon Police Department testified that Mink had used lighter fluid and W-D-40 lubricant to accelerate fires in the parked vehicles.

# Insurance premiums for county employees increase

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court agreed to renew their health coverage for county employees on Tuesday, although the average premium is up 30 percent from a year ago.

Dorine Benjamin, an insurance agent with Cumberland Valley Insurance Management in Kentucky told the court that she had shopped everywhere for the best price and that

the county's current carrier, CHA was still the cheapest.  
The court voted to stick with the same plan now offered to all county employees and officials, which will cost \$200.29 for an individual plan and \$620.77 for a family plan.  
The court agreed to pay \$125.00 of the premium on both plans. Last year it was \$100.

The current plan calls for a \$500 deductible for individual plans and

\$1,000 for family plans.  
Everyone who works under the county umbrella, including those in each county office, are eligible for the plan.

The maximum out of pocket expense is \$2,000 for an individual and \$4,000 for a family.

The court also agreed to allow Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloloffs to sign three Master Commissioner Deeds for property along Oscar Isaacs Road in northern Rockcastle County.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette told the court that three landowners, Charles Denver O'Neal, Ellis McChesla, including those in each county office, are eligible for the plan.  
Burdette said the Master Commissioner would sign over the three landowner's property.

## Gov. visits county

Governor Paul Patton was on hand last Wednesday to acknowledge Rockcastle County's Agriculture Leadership in utilizing Phase I Tobacco Settlement Funds through cost-share programs.

Patton noted that Kentucky's state legislature was reinvesting 50% of Kentucky's tobacco settlement funds back to each individual county.

He thanked Representative Danny Ford and Senator Ed Worley for their efforts to improve Kentucky agriculture.

In Rockcastle County, an eight

member agriculture development council accepts program applications and forwards them to the Kentucky Agriculture Development Board in Frankfort.

Rockcastle County's Beef Cattle Association, as a nonprofit organization, has administered three cost-share programs approved by the state agriculture board.

These programs include the Forage Improvement Program, which was completed last spring with 218 applications submitted by producers

## Points East

I was at my brother Keeter's (Keith Adams) house at Redstar on the Sunday evening before Labor Day when sister-in-law, Nancy announced that it was too hot to cook anything else so she was just going to fix soup beans and corn bread for supper if that was all right with everybody and everybody but me said that sounded just fine and Keeter even yelled back from the front yard for her to hurry up cause he was getting hungry.

And I was thinking to myself, "Lucks."

Lucks pinto beans out of a can have probably, on several occasions, stopped or at least postponed starvation in some third world countries during the course of mankind's reign on earth but none, to my knowledge, are documented. I've even had them placed in front of me in a bowl at the time I took a white, and immediately decided that it was time to get back on my diet and I've only been close enough to starvation a time or two to actually ingest them without benefit of much chili powder, onions etc.

No Nanco (real name Nancy but she lets Keeter call her by that name so I do too because she is my favorite sister) yelled back and said it would take about an hour for supper to be ready because she was just now putting the beans on and I was thinking again that it only takes about five minutes to heat up a can of Lucks so I decided to go into the kitchen and offer some advice. (One of the first and most frequent things we do when we come home for the holidays is offer advice on how to live their lives to our kin folks in the mountains but they never listen to a word...)

The first advice I intended to give was that I knew for a fact that Keeter had cooked a big mess of half full beans in his garden the night before and that if my preference was worth anything, I'd just as soon help string and break them up right then so we could have a decent supper.

But Nancy was emptying a pound bag of dried pintos into a colander and rinsing them off and she already had a big piece of fat back steaming in the kettle and, at that point, I thought my sister-in-law had gone off the deep end of the dock and spent too much time on the bottom.

In my experience it takes at least eight hours to cook pinto beans in what you call hillbillies cast iron beans. To really do it right, you soak them overnight in warm salty water, drain them a few times, and then put them

in the kettle with aforementioned fatback where they are allowed to simmer from the time you go to work until you get home. And the longer you taste, the better your beans are apt to taste when you finally get home.

Not only that, but a pinto bean cooked from the dry stage for just an hour and then rammed down the barrel of a .50 caliber black powder musket charged with a hundred or so grains of black powder is more lethal and accurate at a hundred yards than any lead bullet ever minted. If you don't believe it, ask anybody who was in the Civil War.

Anyway, Nanco finally told me to stand back and watch or get out of the way and it was pretty clear that she meant business. She belted the beans for a few minutes, until the strips started fading, advising me to watch and learn, and then popped a pressure lid on top the kettle. I hadn't even recognized it as such but it was a pressure cooker.

When the pressure cap, set at 10 pounds, started rattling she turned the timer, put a big pone of cornbread in the oven and commenced slicing tomatoes and onions. She stopped the beans and turned off the timer at 20 minutes, let them cool for 10 and then simmer with lid off for another 10. In the meantime the cornbread finished baking.

My Mom used to say that it was a waste of heat and sweat to cook soup beans in September. But my Mom never had Nancy's pressure cooker nor a clue about how good they taste when prepared by an expert. If you don't want to fgender, don't go to my sister-in-law Nancy's house to eat. And if you live outside the mountains, please don't be giving her any cooking advice. It scares me to death that Nancy might take it.

### Ike Adams-September 5th

For nearly a month I had looked forward to a couple of days in Letcher County to visit kin folks and take advantage of Jess & Cathy Campbell's invitation to come to their molasses stir-off over Labor Day Weekend. The plan was to leave Paint Lick right after work on Friday and come home on Monday morning.

But things don't always go as planned.

LaVerne Ledford, wife of my neighbor and great friend, Dan who was the second real resident of Paint Lick I met upon moving here 20 years ago and who plowed my garden with his tractor but wouldn't take any money for the effort because "the dirt was so poor it wouldn't sprout crab grass" passed away late last

week and her funeral was last Saturday.

I'm not big on funerals and don't plan on having one myself but Mrs. Ledford was a super-special, kind and gentle woman and not much any of the Eighty-one years she spent on this earth were wasted. And besides that she'd spent over sixty of those years married to Dan, which I considered more than reason enough to make paying last respects a high priority.

I also figured that LaVerne's funeral would be more of a celebration of her life than a grieving affair even though almost everybody in the Old Man Presbyterian Church (Oldest Protestant Church in Kentucky and built even before Kentucky became a state in 1792 or Dan was born) swept through all the verses of "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder", "How Great Thou Art" and "Where the Roses Never Fade" without so much as glancing at a hymnal. Most of those of us weeping knew that the hymns were right on target and at least one of us knew that every word to every song accurately described Mrs. Ledford and her undying Faith. Let me simply say that if LaVerne is not there when the roll is called, the rest of us won't show up either.

So I didn't get started to Letcher County till nearly dark on Saturday and when I made it to Ulvah, Kentucky where Line Fork Creek runs into the Kentucky River to sweeten the water they drink in Lexington and where Jess and Cathy live, they'd stopped winning the cane hours earlier. To make a long story short, I got there in time to take a few pictures beside the half acre sorghum cane field had been on Sunday morning and another family emergency popped up.

I was able to take photos of the molasses boiling down but I never got a taste. I photographed Jess's mill which is powered by an old Honda automobile motor and drive train while two lazy mules belonging to

my high school classmate, Randy Campbell, stood ten feet away munching on cane stalks and gouged each other with their hind legs and guttawed to each other that their great grand parents had to walk in circles to drag around a pole that powered the mill.

My Daddy owned one of those old mules (Mert was her name) and would tie an ear of corn onto the end of a broom handle, fasten it to her shoulder harness, run it up through the top of her bridle so the corn was dangling about two feet in front of her nose and she'd chase it all day at a fast walk which was all the power you needed if she was hooked up to a gin pole and you wanted to make molasses.

Randy's mules didn't look or act a bit smarter but it would have taken them all week to gin out the cane that little Honda contraption did in just a few hours.

I came home telling the story and a certain daughter who does not like to have her name mentioned in my column wanted to know the names of Randy's mules. I told her that I didn't get that well acquainted with them. Then she wanted to know if they were male or female.

I told her that it looked to me like the men were doing all the work at the stir-off so I figured the mules were of the female persuasion because they were just standing around and unless they were made the soup beans that were simmering in a huge iron kettle and tasting like what I expect of food in Heaven, and the pans of corn bread that were stacked on tables all around, they'd probably made about as much of a contribution to the process as she would have.

She didn't even ask if I'd brought home any molasses.

Maybe next year I can bring the whole family and those that want to can get personally acquainted with Randy's mules and tasting like what is a big help to Jess and Cathy.

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"NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND" a slogan being touted by our schools to which I am sure everyone subscribes. Hopefully as your next school board representative I can have some budgetary impact upon funding the pre-school program so as to include all who wish to participate instead of only those who meet a prescribed formula. It has been proven that the younger the child is exposed to the education process the likelihood of success as an adult is magnified many times.

We had mentioned a few weeks ago about the Learning Boxes for infant and toddler through first or 2nd grade that we have for checkout to our educators.

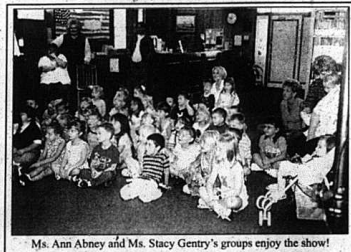
We want to encourage the daycare

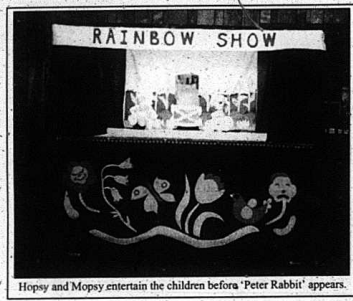
So, please keep Jerry's open, go in talk to him, shake his hand and say hello sometime.

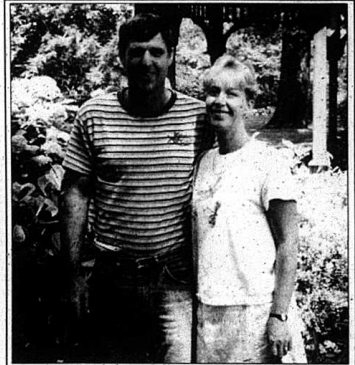

**Local man named Ky. Worker of the Year**

Roy Riley is celebrating his Labor Day like no other.  
The Richmond construction worker was named the 2002 Kentucky Worker of the Year in Dickie's Workwear's 11th annual contest.

Riley, 54, was nominated by his oldest daughter, Kathy Hensley, 34, of Orlando. She had to write a 100-word essay about why her father deserved to represent American workers.

"Dad had sacrificed so much for us all over the years," she wrote in the essay. "I remember some tough times when we did without, but we always had love and each other."

Riley did not know Hensley entered the contest.

"It was a real shock," said Riley, who has five children. "She has a way with words."

"My Dad is honored to have been chosen to represent the people of Kentucky that work hard for a living everyday," Hensley said. "I wrote the essay in appreciation of my Dad, but also all the construction workers who helped to build America everyday. They build our homes, schools and businesses. They work in extreme conditions, scorching heat in the summer and bitter cold in winter. They risk their lives on bridges and scaffolding daily. I just wrote the essay from the heart. I was added."

Other than its sponsorship, the contest has nothing to do with Dickie's, said Kassie-Bell, an account executive and media specialist for the company. When Bell called to tell

Riley he had been selected from about 2,000 Kentucky entries, he did not believe her.

"He thought it was a joke because he wears Dickie's so much," Bell said. "He thought someone in his family or a friend was calling him and teasing him about his clothes. I really had to convince him that he won."

As a carpenter, Riley has worked on everything from factories to bridges, and finds Dickie's clothes to be appropriate.

"My wife, my mother and my grandmother, thank the Lord for all those women, they bought all my wardrobe my whole life and that's pretty much what I wear," Riley said. The winning prize includes a \$250 gift certificate to Dickie's and \$250 cash. Riley intends to treat himself to some accessories for his deer and turkey hunting hobby.

Fifty-one winners are selected by a Dickie's committee. A yearlong process narrows the thousands of entries to about 100. Then a committee narrows that to 10. A group of about 15 people votes on winners from each state and one national winner.

"It's something like you see on TV," Riley said. "Everyone else is always winning. But I still want to pinch myself."

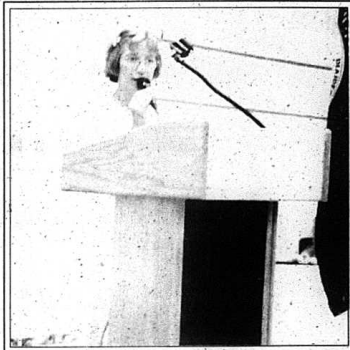

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# Rockets beat powerful Dunbar in bowl 35-28

The Rockcastle County Rockets won their second straight game Friday night beating Paul Laurence Dunbar 35-28 in a very exciting high school football game.

The Rockets, who lost their season opener to Mason County, defeated possibly the best team in Lexington, even though they lost their quarterback mid-way through the third quarter.

Senior Quarterback Aaron Anderkin left via ambulance after suffering a concussion, but that didn't slow down the rest of the Rockets, especially senior Marty Reagan.

Reagan rushed the ball 34 times for 207 yards and scored four touchdowns.

Two of those touchdowns came after Anderkin left the game.

"Marty is one of the best football players ever to hit this part of the country," Rocket head coach Tom Larkey said after the game.

Larkey also gave a lot of credit for Reagan's success to his offensive line. Tanner Abney, Michael Brummett, Nick Thomas, Benny Northern, Jarrod Rice and Stephen Boring, make up the Rocket front.

"They were outsize and probably out talented but they gave it all they had," he said.

"After Aaron got hurt we basically had no choice but to do our running game and we did a good job with it," he said.

Dunbar is considered one of the best teams in Lexington, if not the best and they have the athletes to back it up.

The player which hit Anderkin after he released a pass in the third period is being looked at by several schools in the SEC, including U.K.

"Clint Keller, at 6-3, 235 was responsible for putting Anderkin out of the game."

"In all fairness to him it didn't look like he hit him late, he just had a clear shot at him, he was moving

on pretty good when it happened and he hit him right after Aaron released the ball," Larkey said. Anderkin was knocked unconscious momentarily.

Larkey said that a decision on whether Anderkin will play Friday night is still up in the air. He spent Friday night in the hospital and has not practiced this week.

Before he left the game, Anderkin threw two touchdown passes. The first TD was to Reagan, who caught a 42 yard pass with no time on the clock at the end of the first half.

The reason for the Rockets getting to run a play with no time, was the fact that refs had called a defensive penalty and a quarter cannot end on a defensive penalty.

That was a big momentum builder for our kids, it gave us a lot of confidence going into the second half," Larkey said.

Early in the third period Anderkin hit wide-out Senior Michael Hayes with a 22 yard pass to put the Rock up 21-7.

Hayes made an excellent catch in the corner of the end zone for his first TD of the season.

Placekicker Devin Taylor, who took over for Anderkin at Quarterback, also made all five of his extra point attempts.

Beside's Reagan's 207 yards, rushing and the one TD catch, Senior Cletl Swinney turned in a good performance for the ROCK, with 86 yards on eleven carries.

Anderkin was seven for eleven passing for 121 yards and he threw one interception. It was the 18th straight game he threw a touchdown pass.

Taylor caught four passes for 46 yards and Hayes caught two for 35.

Dunbar probably thinks they shot themselves in the foot offensively, because of the number of turnovers they made, but then again they were up against a Tony Saylor coached defense.

"The Rockets picked off four passes and recovered three fumbles. Dunbar had a total of 299 yards offensively, 321 on the ground and minus 22 on the ground.

"We played hard, dodged some bullets and beat a very good team," Saylor said.

Picking off passes for the Rockets were Reagan, Taylor, Stephen Boring and Devon Bussell.

Benny Northern, Tanner Abney and Steven Rowe each recovered a fumble.

Bussell picked his pass off on the last play of the game after Max Saylor got the Dunbar quarterback by the shoulder pads.

Reagan led the defense in tackles and assists with 12. James Michael Bussell had 5, Northern, 4, Abney, 4, Boring, 4, Taylor, 4, Anderkin, 3, Chris Croucher, 3, Michael Brummett, 3, Caleb Blair, 1, Swinney, 1, Saylor, 1, and Devon Bussell, 1.

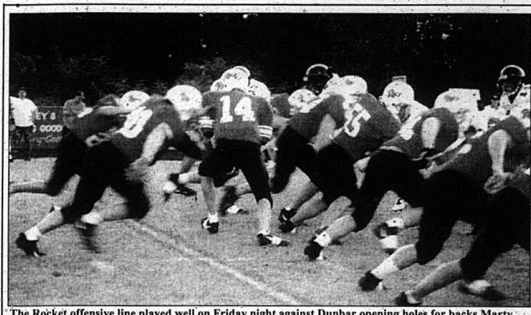
Boring was named defensive MVP and Reagan was named offensive MVP.

Hammond shines at BG State Games

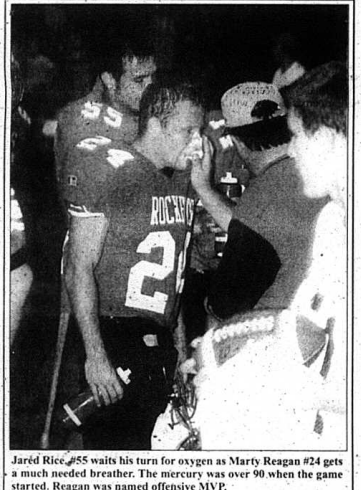

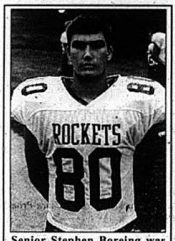

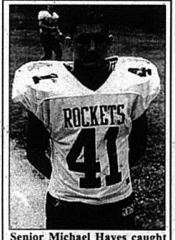

# Portion of Hwy. 150 project completed in Lincoln County

A ribbon cutting officially opened a portion of the U.S. 150 and Cedar Creek Lake last Wednesday and signs were unveiled naming the road and a boat ramp for the man whose dream for the county is embodied in the project - John Sims.

Gov. Paul Patton and a multitude of local and state officials were on hand for the ribbon cutting, which followed a similar event at the new Lincoln County Technical Center adjacent to Lincoln County High School.

John Sims of Crab Orchard was county judge/executive and threw his political support behind a politically unknown Casey, County native, Wallace Wilkinson, in his race for governor. Wilkinson, then a multimillionaire businessman living in Lexington, agreed to back Sims' idea for a fishing lake and realigned U.S. 150 between Stanford and Mt. Vernon.

More than a dozen years later, Sims is out of office and Wilkinson died in bankruptcy but the \$11.7 million lake was built and the lake is ready to start catching rainwater and impounding a 784-acre body of water that the state Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources project will become a fishing destination.

Cedar Creek Lake is expected to attract nearly 38,000 individuals on fishing trips annually, based on an estimate of 48 trips per acre of lake surface. Also based on historical estimates, those fishermen and women are expected to spend an average of nearly \$20 each on trip-related expenses in addition to approximately \$30 a person for fixing related expenses including boats, fishing gear and the lake.

All together, the state expects

sportsmen to spend \$2 million a year from the state in Cedar Creek Lake.

The dam that will impound the lake was created when the new road was built. Rather than bridge Cedar Creek, the dam was built and the potential for fishing tourism created.

With normal rainfall this winter and next spring, it is expected the lake will fill in about a year when the water starts to rise, which will come after the less desirable fish in the creek and ponds that will be inundated are killed. The state will stock sport fish. The less desirable types include carp, bullhead, catfish and green sunfish.

For starters, the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources plans to stock 2,500 10-inch and 15,000 five inch largemouth bass, 20,000 black crappie, 180,000 one-inch bluegill, 120,000 one-inch redear sunfish and 8,000 nine-inch and 20,000 one-inch channel catfish.

Between the state wildlife agency, which owns the lake property, and the local Cedar Creek Sportsmen's Club, fish spawning habitats have been built into what Lake Malone near Russellville. The Lincoln County lake will have 21 miles of shoreline and extend 3.6 miles from the dam upstream toward Otterheim.

The lake will have a maximum depth of 60 feet and an average depth of 22 feet.

The state has been surveying the portion of the new 150 in Rockcastle County, but has not started buying right-of-ways.

The Livingston home is a passive solar heated by many south facing windows. The Disputanta home is a round geodesic dome with a cupola and wrap-around porch. The electricity for both homes is produced with solar electric panels. The office of Appalachia - Science in the Public Interest (ASPI), a nonprofit group in Mt. Vernon, has a net metered system with 20 solar panels that cut the electric bill in half. When a net metered solar system is producing more than the building is using, the electric meter on the building spins backwards. ASPI also uses a solar electric car for daily errands.

Take the Kentucky Solar Building Tour and explore the ways people are using energy that is less damaging to the environment than conventional methods of generating electricity and heat.

and 1992 seeding practices completed utilizing \$120,000; the Genetic Improvement Program receiving 67 applications with 44 bulls or semen purchased, utilizing \$41,300; and the Cattle Handling Facilities Program receiving 57 applications, and to date, have 44 projects completed, utilizing \$47,570.

No further applications are being taken, however farmers are completing approved projects and are expected to utilize nearly \$100,000. The Beef Cattle Association has utilized Southern Kentucky Agricultural Development Association to handle these funds by writing checks to General Fund 1099's. Projects to utilize remaining funds will be planned this fall.

"All of the other landowners agreed to sign their deeds," Burdette said. O'Neal will receive \$1,134 for his property, McNew will receive \$417 and Ramsey will get \$18.00.

Vehicles belonging to Gary Mink, Garner Mink, Robert Hornsby, Jerry Mullins and Jack Rowe, all of Mt. Vernon, were burned to varying degrees after Mink allegedly poured the accelerants on the driver's side seat and ignited them. Mink was observed in the area, stopped and lighter fluid and W-D 40 was found in his possession.

Also, Delaney testified to finding a footprint that matched the shoes worn by the defendant, Rocky Mink. Over Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette's objections, the court reduced Mink's bond from \$250,000 cash to \$100,000 fully secured bond. Burdette argued that considering the seriousness of the class B felonies which carry 10 to 20 years in prison each, that Mink posed a threat to the community if released. The court indicated that the bond seemed excessive, and that the \$100,000 dollars would be sufficient.

Mink remains in jail at this time.

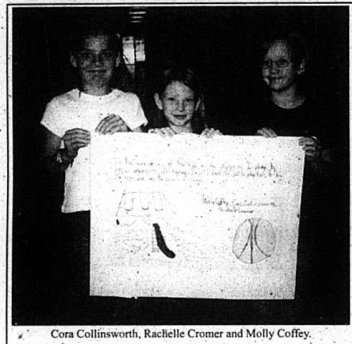

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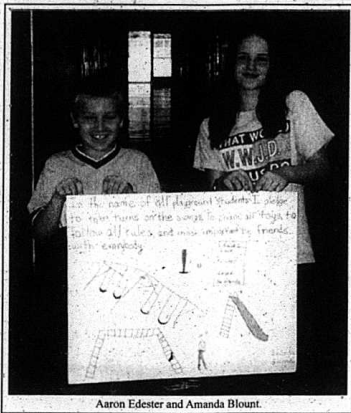

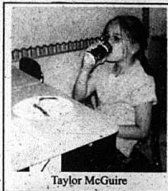

## Think Food Safety, Nutrition as Schools Open

Since school doors have opened to thousands of Kentucky children, now is a good time to remember some food safety and nutrition tips for your children's "brown bag" lunches and after-school snacks.

To be sure food safety is the main ingredient of school lunches or snacks, keep cold foods below 40 degrees Fahrenheit. Put cold liquid foods in a previously chilled vacuum bottle. Use an ice pack or gel freezer pack to keep solid foods cold. Freeze boxed juices or drinks in a plastic bottle the night before, then put the frozen drink in with the other foods.

Used chilled ingredients to make sandwiches. Freeze sandwiches made with simple ingredients such as peanut butter and sliced meat or poultry. The sandwich will thaw by the next morning. Do not use mayonnaise or mayonnaise-like dressings, because freezing causes oil and water separation. This can make bread soggy. Instead, buy single-serving packets of mayonnaise and dressings, or put these in separate containers. Butter and stick margarine don't separate when frozen.

Maintain hot foods at 140 degrees F or higher. Use a vacuum bottle to maintain the temperature of hot liquid foods such as soups or stews. Boiling water in the bottle for a several minutes before adding hot foods.

Always throw away leftover lunch or snack food items that might have gotten too hot. Remember the saying, "when in doubt, throw it out."

Also, thoroughly clean lunch boxes; wash your hands well in hot soapy water between preparations of different types of food; and use clean utensils and work surfaces.

Letting your children help you prepare their school lunches or after-school snacks has several advantages. It gives children opportunities to think about the nutritional qualities and healthfulness of the foods they eat. Helping your children prepare lunches also boosts their self-confidence and makes them feel comfortable working in the kitchen. They will even want to help you pack their lunches or snacks, thereby learning more about food safety.

Since children agree to good food choices for their lunches or snacks, you have the opportunity to introduce new foods. In addition, you have the peace of mind that

they're eating what they want and not trading with friends, who might have less nutritious choices.

Remember to take into account your children's overall eating pattern when preparing food. One meal or snack won't break the nutritional bandwagon. Generally, a lunch should contain only one-third to one-half of the day's nutrients and calories. Offer a variety of foods including two servings of fruits or vegetables and two of bread and grains, as well as some protein and low-fat milk or other dairy product.

### Back to School: Restful nights sleep means nine hours for students

School-aged children need at least nine hours of sleep each night to ensure good health. Lack of sleep causes many problems with the school environment. Students can be too sleepy to learn, contributing to a negative overall performance.

- \*Tossing during sleep;
- \*Difficulty falling asleep;
- \*Daytime sleepiness;
- \*Nightmares or bed wetting;
- \*Teeth grinding or clenching; and/or
- \*Early waking.

Although children carry much of the responsibility for their evening schedules, parents must establish clear guidelines and enforce them to help children reach nine hours of sleep.

Parents can help children prioritize tasks and then start them from the most important to the least. Starting themselves from sleep and help them find a balance. Setting a routine with consistent times of going to bed and getting up can be a first step.

Many childhood sleep problems are related to irregular sleep habits. Anxiety about going to bed, falling asleep also ranks as a cause of problems. Persistent sleep problems could be symptoms of emotional difficulties.

Talk with your child about the stressful issues in his or her life. Parents can see what is worrying their children and interfering with a good night of rest.

The consequences of inadequate sleep include lack of focus, irritability, frustration and impulsive behavior. An untreated sleep disorder can interfere with school and increase the risk of accidents and illness.

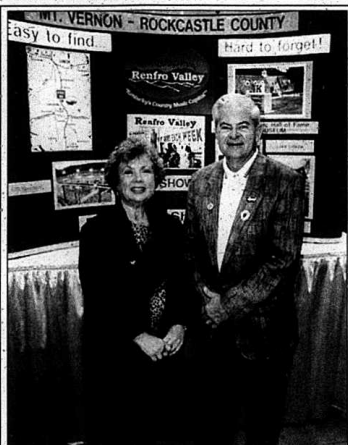

## Constitution Week

Origin  
Miss Gertrude S. Carraway, while President General, was responsible for the annual designation of September 17-23 as Constitution Week. She submitted a tentative resolution to the Committee, NSDAR that was adopted April 21, 1955 by the Continental Congress.

Members of the United States Congress received copies of the DAR resolution and on June 7, 1955, at a flag presentation to the Senate by the Executive Committee, the NSDAR resolution about Constitution Week was discussed. On June 14, Senator William F. Knowland of California introduced Senate concurrent Resolution 140, authorizing and requesting that President Eisenhower follow the DAR example by proclaiming September 17-23 as Constitution Week. Following passage of this resolution by both Houses of Congress, President Eisenhower issued his proclamation on August 19, 1955.

The first observance of Constitution Week was so successful that on January 5, 1956, Senator Knowland introduced a Senate Joint Resolution to have the President designate September 17-23 annually as Constitution Week. This resolution was adopted on July 23 and signed into Public Law 915 on August 2, 1956. For his patriotic aid and interest, Senator Knowland received the Award of Commendation from the Continental Congress, NSDAR, in April 1956.

## Yards to Paradise

Waterfeatures Transforming Yards  
Ponds, waterfalls and naturalistic man-made streams make a most noticeable difference in a yard. In fact, the difference water makes is truly amazing!

The growth of waterfeatures continues unabated, having even grown since the terrorist attacks on America. The size increases in the catalogs of pond supplies alone would attest the veracity of this. Not to mention the proliferation of water plant availability at "big box" stores.

It is the "cocooning," the vacation at home, the escaping into our own little world, the creating of a mountain waterfall when we can't buy that retirement house we want by a roaring creek; these are some of the motives behind the growing number of watergardens and waterfalls in American yards.

My own new pond occupies about half of the front yard. Less grass mowing is wonderful. But, the sound of water every time I step outside or go to the mailbox, the clean lush greenery and the water lily blooms, the peacefulness of sitting on a nearby bench at dusk with my sweetie and a refreshment in hand... those are beyond words.

A waterscape may not be for everyone, but if properly built, it is low maintenance than an equal-sized lawn. And water plants don't need watering... they live in it all



ready. A small waterfall, together with a ten by fifteen foot pool may require adding a modest amount of water a couple times a week, unless one has an auto-fill device. We all want low maintenance these days; ponds and waterfalls built with the latest know-how are very easy-care.

Once in awhile, a few dead water lily blooms or leaves should be removed. If the pond has Koi or goldfish, they do not have to be fed every day like a cat or dog... just when they feel like feeding them and watching them.

"Home entertainment center" takes on a whole new meaning with waterfalls! Every pond owner wants to show off his or her garden addition. Children will spend hours around a goldfish pond! And since most are less than two feet deep, they are much safer than a swimming pool. Actually, picnicking by a creek or in a park may be fun, but with a backyard waterfeature you can enjoy the same (actually nicer!) facilities and never leave home.

# Mission team at Christ's Outreach

Christ's Outreach for the Blind, a non-profit, Christian-based camp being constructed in Mt. Vernon, hosted a mission team from Elm Christian School in Chicago, Illinois, July 15-19. The school's web site says, "It is easy to shove aside the concerns of those with disabilities. Each of these lives, no matter how broken, disabled or 'special' is needed by God on this earth. The mission team of fourteen special needs students and seven adult leaders worked to make a difference at Christ's Outreach by preparing a liner for a large pond, clearing trails and helping mix cement for a rock wall. exactly fit the 12-inch thick mattresses, saying: "We don't know if you can use these because they are all deep pockets!"

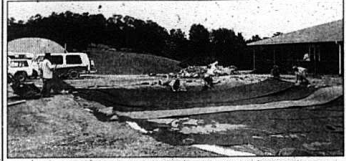

The team was out at 5AM one morning burying scripture stones around the perimeter of the 800-acre property. As they buried the stones, they prayed for God's protection for the camp, for all campers who will eventually come and that there will be no more forest fires on the property.

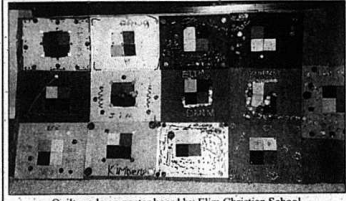
Mike and Lori Gates, Directors of Christ's Outreach, have coordinated

**Kiwanis Club holds annual golf scramble**

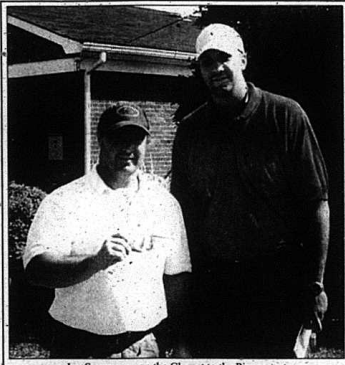

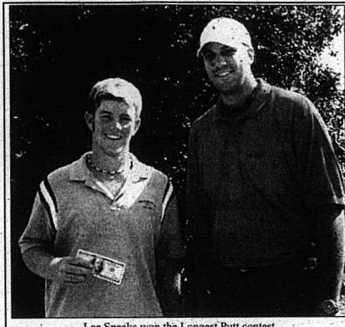

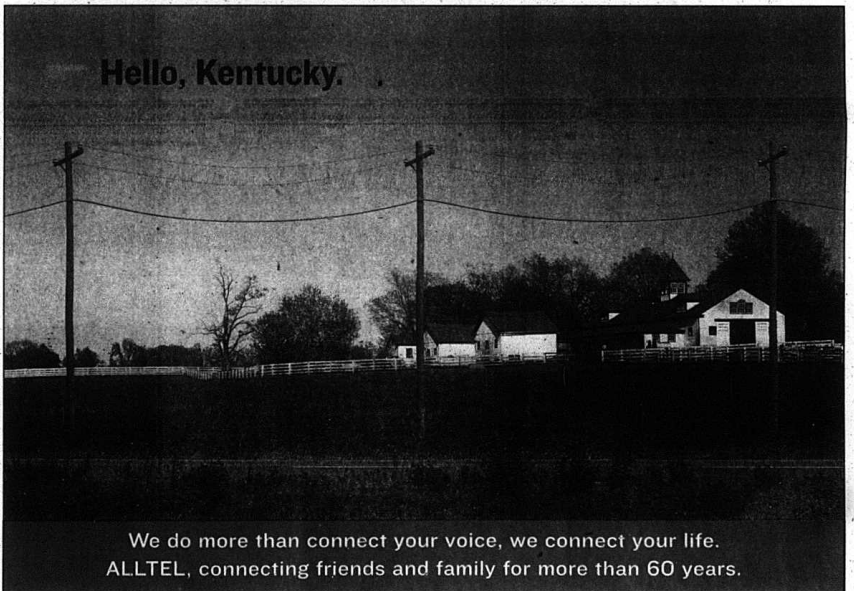

# Strategic plan moves ahead

**Projects Demonstrate Progress**  
Over one hundred citizens gathered in March, 2002, to initiate the Rockcastle County Strategic Planning process. Since then six task forces have taken on community improvement projects. The projects have formed the core of the planning process. In the weeks ahead, the task forces will be refining strategies for the strategic plan. They are seeking public input into this process. Below is a brief summary of the work to date and the strategies identified for the plan.

**Community Clean Up**  
The Beautification Task Force led by Corey Craig, has initiated "Operation Clean the Rock and Keep It Clean!" Teams of volunteers have picked up litter along several roads and in August sponsored a major clean up of the St. Clair house and the surrounding property in Mt. Vernon. Additional strategies will address:

- City and County welcome signs
- Mandatory garbage pick-up
- Planning for land use and growth

**Welcome to Mt. Vernon**  
The Tourism Task Force, led by Judy Duerson, has taken on clean up and beautification of the area at the junction of Highway 25 and the 461 Bypass, where people turn to enter the city of Mt. Vernon. This project will include adding topsoil, landscaping and constructing a welcome sign. Additional strategies will address:

- Driving tours, walking tours and bike trails
- Strengthening the Mt. Vernon Rockcastle County Tourism Commission
- Identifying natural sites (caves, waterfalls, etc.) as tourist attractions
- Coordinating all tourism activities county wide
- Marketing initiatives for tourism attractions
- A public golf course
- Strengthening local festivals

- Identifying and preserving historic buildings
- Clean up of Lake Linville and improvements to Lake Linville Park
- A civic center/conference center at Reno Valley
- Creation of a large, new park with facilities for local families and visitors

**New Business and Industry Council**  
The Workforce Development Task Force, led by Bigge Towery, is primarily focused on the creation and expansion of good jobs in Rockcastle County. Its short-term project will be to establish a local business/industry council. In July, task force members met with representatives of local industry and the Cabinet for Economic Development to begin the process. Additional strategies will address:

- Expansion of industrial/business park space
- Natural gas service to industrial parks
- Job training opportunities, through schools and on-the-job
- Housing needs assessment
- Utilities needs assessment
- A Leadership Development Program

The Leadership Task Force, led by John Clanz, identified leadership as a key to success and the driving component of the entire community development process. The task force is designing a leadership development program for Rockcastle County to be conducted annually. Additional strategies will address:

- Local citizens trained to conduct the leadership development program
- Local participation in state and regional leadership programs
- Identifying "best practices" to include in the local leadership program
- Special leadership enhancement opportunities for local officials
- A New Vocational/Technical Center

The Educational Task Force, led by Shelby Reynolds, identified the need for a new tech center as being the number one priority to address. The task force is developing a plan to leverage funding for a new facility to be built next to the Rockcastle County High School. Additional strategies will address:

- Interaction between business and industry and the educational system
- Communication among providers of literacy and adult education services
- Access to literacy and educational programs for people in remote areas of the county
- Post-secondary educational opportunities
- Quality childcare for working people

A Community Health/Recreation Facility  
The Community Healthcare Task Force, led by Dr. Tony Arvin, has begun to research a health and recreation facility. The task force envisions a "community health center without walls" which would consist of existing facilities, such as schools, as well as new facilities with exercise equipment and an indoor pool for year round use. Additional strategies will address:

- Hospital expansion
- New and enhanced medical services
- Public health services

The strategic planning process is sponsored by the Rockcastle County Development Board. Public input is welcome. Please plan to attend the community meeting scheduled for 7:00 p.m., September 19, at the high school.
