Insurance premiums for county employees increase

The Rockeastle County Fiscal
Court agreed to renew their health
coverage for county employees on
Tuesday, although the average premium is up 30 percent from a year

ago.

Dorine Benjamin, an insurance agent with Cumberland Valley Insurance Management in Kemucky toldthe court that she had shopped everywhere for the best price and that

the county's current carrier, CHA was still the cheapest.

The court voted to stick with the same plan now offered to all county employees and officials, which will cost \$200.29 for an individual plan

To really, do it right, you soak then overnight in warm sally water, drain them a few times, and then put them in the kettle with aforementioned fatback where they are allowed to simmer from the time you go to work until you get home. And the longer you work, the better your beans are apt to taste when you finally get home.

Not only that, but a pinto bean cooked from the dry stage for just an hour and then rammed down the barel of a .50 calibre black powder musket charged with a hundred or as grains of black powder is more bethal and accurate at a hundred yards than any lead bullet ever minted. Disaster Leasing
Farmers who suffer a burley tobacco disaster loss must file a report
with FSA prior to harvest to retain
eligibility to lease quota away under
the disaster lease provisions. The dithe disaster lease provisions. The di-saster lease provision was imple-mented to provide relief to produc-ers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer must: file a crop report with FSA, file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, have planted sufficient acreagé to produce the farm's effective quota, provide a workman like manner for the crop production, suffer more than a 20% crop loss, pay a measurement fee and meet all price support eligi-bility requirements. Dairy Program Signup Began
Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State
Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, reminds farmers that
signup for the Milk Income Loss
Contract (MILC) program began
August 13th and will end September
30, 2002. This program, authorized
by the 2002 Farm Bill, financially
compensates dairy producers when
domestic milk prices fall below a
specified level.

To be ap-proved for the program producers for the program producers and mast enter into a contract with USDA's Commodity Credit Corpo-ration to provide monthly marketing data.

MILC payments will occur in months when the price of Class I milk in Boston under the Northeast Milk Marketing Order falls below \$16.95 per cwt. Payment rates will be 45 percent of the difference between \$16.94 and the Boston Class I price for that month.
