



West Nile Virus confirmed in county

The West Nile Virus (WNV); ansmitted by the bite of certain

Most human WNV infections cause either no symptoms or mild flu-like illness. As with many illness, those people with compromised im-nune systems can experience a more severe reaction. The incubation time-from the bite and clinical symptoms-can range from three to 14 days. Only two types of mosquitoes, out of a to-tal. of 52 different types, carry the WNV.

The virus was first reported in New York State in 1999. This year it

has been spread from coast to coast. Kentucky currently has reported the virus in birds in 72 counties and horses in 48 counties with one posi-tive horse found in Rockcastle County. The fact that the virus was

If a person suspects they have been infected by the West Nile they should, as with any illness, contact heir health care provider, but the best idea is to eliminate or lessen the chande of being exposed to mosquitoes. I. Since standing water is a prime breeding medium of mosquitoes, prevent stagnant water in animal watering troughs, dishes, etc. by changing it every few days.

2. Turn over, cover or remove equipment such as tarps, buckets, barrels and wheelbarrows that accumulate water.




