Indictments returned

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down indictments on Friday for various offenses.

Eric Payne, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted for theft by deception, by issuing a check to the Rockcastle County Circuit Clerk's office in the amount of \$307.35 knowing it would not be honored by the drawee.

Roger Alcorn, 36, of Crawford Street, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for flagrant nonsupport for minor children in the amount of over \$3,799.92.

Todd S. Smith, 30, of Forest Lane, Richmond, was indicted for operating a motor vehicle while his license was suspended, third offense and for operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, third offense, on at least two previous occasions and for resisting arrest.

Rocky G. Mink, 20, of Lockland, Ohio, was indicted on Arson charges. Mink is accused of starting fire to vehicles owned by Ronald E. Hornsby, Garner Mink, Gary Mink, Jack Rowe and Jerry A. Mullins.

Dennis L. Doan, 40, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted for possession of a controlled substance by possessing cocaine, a schedule II controlled substance.

Kirby, Bullock sentenced

Troy Kirby, 36, and Johnny Lee Bullock, 55, both of Rockcastle County, were sentenced on September 10, in United States District Court in London by United States District Judge Jennifer B. Coffman.

Kirby and Bullock, both were found guilty on January 16, by a federal jury in United States District Court in London, of conspiring and manufacturing, possessing and distributing methamphetamine.

Kirby was found guilty of being a

convicted felon in possession of a firearm and possessing a firearm not registered in the National Firearms Registration and Transfer Record, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 922 (g) (1) and Title 26, United States Code, Section 5861 (d).

Kirby was sentenced to 360 months in prison to be followed by 10 years supervised release, and a \$600 special assessment.

Bullock was sentenced to 235 months in prison to be followed by 6 1/2 years supervised release, and a \$400 special assessment.

Two local men face numerous charges

A recent joint investigation by Steve Isaacs of the Department of Fish and Wildlife, KSP officer Colby Smith and the Rockcastle County Attorney's office has resulted in the charges of two local men.

Michael D. McKinney, 27, and Jonathan C. McKinney, 21, were charged with a litany of hunting violations after a cache of deer antlers, mounted deer trophies and turkey beads were recovered from their property.

Jonathan McKinney was also charged with felony possession of a stolen shotgun.

Arrests are pending, with bond set at \$25,000 cash on each case.

The search of the McKinney residence turned up 49 deer antlers ranging from spike to eleven point, and thirty-seven turkey beads.

Several guns were located, one of which was apparently stolen.

Videos confiscated during the search allegedly reveal that the de-

fendants were spotlighting wildlife illegally and taking wildlife illegally," Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said.

"There existed no evidence that either defendant had ever been properly checked in or properly verified the numerous trophies and mounts at their home," he said.

"First we thank the Department of Fish and Wildlife and Kentucky State Police for dedicating officers and resources to Rockcastle County in order to maintain good and healthy wildlife source," Burdette stated.

"And in this case, the defendants are facing many misdemeanor charges related to the illegal taking of wildlife that have penalty ranges of up to 12 months in jail, loss of hunting privileges, restitution of the value of wildlife illegally taken and forfeiture of weapons. The felony charges carry a potential sentence of up to five





Rockets roll over Lincoln Co. 42-0

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team continued their annual dominance over the Lincoln County Patriots on Friday night with a 42-0 win at Death Valley in Stanford.

The Rockets are now 3-1 on the season and will host Estill County on Friday night. It will be homecoming at the ROCK.

However Friday night's win did not come without a price, as the injury plagued Rockets lost another player, this time for the entire season.

Sophomore Max Saylor, who had been playing on both sides of the ball for the Rockets, received a severely dislocated right ankle and a broken bone in the foot in the second half of the game.

According to doctors, Saylor will

be operated on next week and will be unable to participate in any sporting activity for four months.

"It's been one more bad day for us injury wise," said defensive coach Tony Saylor, who is also Max's uncle.

"We've been pretty lucky for the past few years, but this year luck has definitely not been on our side," he said.

Head Coach Tom Larkey, who won his 157th game on Friday night, said that it was almost unbelievable the number of injuries the Rockets have suffered this season.

"I don't think I have ever had a team that has been banged up as bad as this year's squad," he said.

Quarterback Aaron Anderkin, who threw two short touchdown

passes on Friday night, saw limited action, after he suffered a concussion the week before. He will likely see limited action again this week.

Junior Rocket lineman Jason Leger who broke his foot at camp, will find out this week when he will be allowed to return to the line-up.

Marty Reagan led a loaded Rocket offense, rushing for 111 yards and two touchdowns on 12 carries, as last year's class 3A runners-up rolled up 379 yards total offense while limiting the Patriots to just 59 yards.

Lincoln (1-3) was at 8 yards rushing offense at the half and finished just slightly better at 13 yards rushing for the game.

The Rockets proved their worth less than two minutes into the game, driving 69 yards in four plays for the first of six Rockcastle touchdowns of the night.

Reagan accounted for 63 of those 69 yards, including running 37 yards untouched to the end zone. The two point run by Reagan put Rockcastle up 8-0.

Reagan would visit the end zone again early in the second quarter, going in from seven yards out for the six.


A fumbled Lincoln snap and the recovery by the Rock's Michael Brummett set Reagan up for the score. Devin Taylor's kick made it 15-0 with 9:33 left in the half.

The Rock would take a 22-0 lead into the half with Anderkin capping off a 49-yard drive with a three-yard pass to Michael Hayes with 4:30 on the clock.


It was the 19th straight game Anderkin has thrown a touchdown pass.



The Jayvee also encountered little problem with Barbourville, winning the first game 15-1 and the second 15-5.



West Nile Virus confirmed in county

The West Nile Virus (WNV), transmitted by the bite of certain types of mosquitoes, may cause those people who contact the virus to become ill.

Most human WNV infections cause either no symptoms or mild flu-like illness. As with many illnesses, those people with compromised immune systems can experience a more severe reaction. The incubation time from the bite and clinical symptoms can range from three to 14 days. Only two types of mosquitoes, out of a total of 52 different types, carry the WNV.

The virus was first reported in New York State in 1999. This year it

has been spread from coast to coast. Kentucky currently has reported the virus in 18 of its 72 counties and horses in 48 counties with one positive horse found in Rockcastle County. The fact that the virus was confirmed in the county is not a cause for panic, but does serve to remind everyone of certain precautions and preventive measures to take to avoid possible serious concerns about this matter. Symptoms of infection range from non-existent to fever, fatigue, headache and joint or muscle pain. Elderly people or those with compromised immune systems may experience the above symptoms in a more

severe form and including tremors, disorientation or paralysis.

If a person suspects they have been infected by the West Nile they should, as with any illness, contact their health care provider, but the best idea is to eliminate or lessen the chance of being exposed to mosquitoes. This can be done by using the following common sense methods.

1. Since standing water is a prime breeding medium of mosquitoes, prevent stagnant water in animal watering troughs, dishes, etc. by changing it every few days.
2. Turn over, cover or remove equipment such as buckets, barrels and wheelbarrows that accumulate water.
3. Discard old tires, cans or containers that hold stagnant water.
4. Clean out gutters, ditches and fill depressions in the soil to remove mosquito habitat.

Other protective measures include trying to avoid being outdoors in prime mosquito time - late evening; wearing light colored long sleeved shirts, pants and socks when going outside; and spray clothing and exposed skin with an insect repellent - preferably one with DEET as an active ingredient.

In an effort to control the mosquito population in Rockcastle County, the Cumberland Valley District Health Department, in conjunction with the Kentucky Dept. of Agriculture, is involved in an on-going eradication program consisting of chemical fogging and larvicide placement in strategic areas. Homeowners may wish to purchase larvicides to use on their property.

Two products, "Mosquito Dunks" and "Mosquito Bits" are available to the public. Anyone wanting more information about this issue can contact Danny Davis, Director of Environmental Health Services for the Cumberland Valley District Health Dept. at (606)355-9595.

Allowing Children to Leave is Difficult

My son spent some time with us this summer and then returned to Northern Kentucky University where he is a student. His leaving reminded me of our leave-taking two years ago when we left him standing in the parking lot of his dorm at the beginning of his freshman year. My dad told me that the hardest thing he ever did was leave me standing outside the dorm at Georgetown College on the first day of my freshman year. When children leave for college or a job or marriage or the military, we parents hurt.

The only thing worse than having your children leave home is hav-

ing your children not leave home. The following quote is from the play *Dearlly Departed*:
One thing about Tiny, that boy's a worker. He moved the front yard, the side yard, the back yard, plus them six acres I've got out behind the house, restacked the figwood, cleaned out the garage, and hewed in the garden until it was too dark to see. Since his birthday is coming up next week, I gave him three dollars, instead of the usual two. It's hard to believe Tiny will be turning thirty-seven. They grow up so fast.

Few parents want a thirty-seven-year old around the house permanently. The teen-age years are an impor-

tant time of preparation for leaving for both parents and children. The struggle between parents who want to help (and control) and young people who want to be independent are often a part of these years. Adolescence can become a power struggle which both sides sometimes take to the extreme.

I remember the "Cereal Bowl War" at our house. It began over whether the boys would put their cereal bowls in the dishwasher. It ended as a power struggle as I laid down the law: "Oh, yes, you will take that bowl to the sink, because I told you to!" This battle had little to do with cleanliness and responsibility and a lot to do with who was in control.

The father in the Parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15) knew how and when to let go. When his younger son asked for his inheritance

and wanted to leave, the father allowed him to do so. Even though he knew his son was making a mistake and even though it broke his heart, he did not turn this into a power struggle.

The father could have berated his son, "You're not going anywhere! You're going to stay here and work on this farm like your brother does. I've worked and slaved to provide for you, and I, m not going to let you throw away half of what I have built. Now get out there on that tractor and get to work!"

Knowing how and when to let the child go is one of the difficult parts of parenting. Letting go too soon is not good. I have seen thirteen-year-old children who have no parental

guidance, and this is not fair to the child.

On the other hand I have seen thirty-five-year-old adults still looking to Mom and Dad to make their decisions. And I have seen parents who continually interfere in the lives of their adult children, making it difficult for these young adults to grow up and causing misery for everyone involved.

As the parent of two adults, I know the difficulty of keeping the proper balance. I pray for the wisdom of the father in the parable, so that I can discern when it is time to let them go.







Ordinance #7-2002
An Ordinance levying the Annual Ad Valorem Tax for City Purposes in the Corporate Limits of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky
 Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute KRS 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes; and
 Whereas, KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance; and
 Whereas, KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body, by ordinance, provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government; and

Whereas, the city has calculated the tax rates for real and personal property in accordance with KRS chapter 132.
Now, therefore, be it ordained, by the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Real estate and personal property.
 A. An ad valorem tax rate of 180 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of 180 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.
Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty
 All taxes shall be due and payable at the City Offices on or before the tax bill. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a two percent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be late amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged six percent (6%) penalty.

Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof
 This ordinance applies to the 2002 calendar year tax assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted for in the 2003 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections. Adopted this 16th day of September, 2002.

B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS 134.810 and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

Agricultural News

Power of Attorney Forms

If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it is not valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney form is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney, form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). Non-FSA power of attorney forms currently on file are not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. Farmers are cautioned that the authentic signature on the FSA-211, must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

Warehouse Designation

Producers that did not designate their burley tobacco quota to a buying point during the initial designation period, which ended on August 1st, must wait until the first regular redesignation period. Producers will be limited to designate for the farm one time during each regular redesignation period. Therefore, if a farm has multiple tenants which will market tobacco at separate buying points, the farm operator will need to designate for all those tenants at the same time.

September 30-October 4, 2002 with card effective October 14, 2002.

October 28-November 1, 2002 with card effective November 11, 2002.

December 02-December 06, 2002 with card effective December 16, 2002.

December 27-January 3, 2003 with card effective January 13, 2003.

Disaster Leasing

Farmers who suffer a burley tobacco disaster loss must file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer must file a crop report with FSA, file the FSA 574, Disaster Credit Request, have planted sufficient acreage to produce the farm's effective quota, provide a workman like manner for the crop production, suffer more than a 20% crop loss, pay a measurement fee and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing the measurement fee will be refunded.

Remember: If you are a farmer whose tobacco is suffering from poor weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease or etc. please come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions PRIOR TO HARVEST!!!

County Committee Election

Coming Soon

As of August 1st the local FSA office began accepting nominations

for the upcoming election to be held December 2, 2002.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 28, 2002.

Dairy Program Signup Began

August 13th

Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, reminds farmers that signup for the Milk Income-Loss Contract (MILC) program began August 13th and will end September 30, 2002. This program, authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill, financially compensates dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

Eligible dairy producers are those who produced milk in any state and marketed the milk commercially beginning December 2001. To be approved for the program, producers must be in compliance with highly and wetland conservation provisions and must enter into a contract with USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation to provide monthly marketing data.

MILC payments will occur in months when the price of Class I milk in Boston under the Northeast Milk Marketing Order falls below \$16.95 per cwt. Payment rates will be 45 percent of the difference between \$16.94 and the Boston Class I price for that month.

Program payments scheduled to begin in October 2002 will be retroactive from December 1, 2001 with producers selecting to begin in Oc-

tober 2002 will be retroactive from December 1, 2001 with producers selecting the month to start receiving payments.


