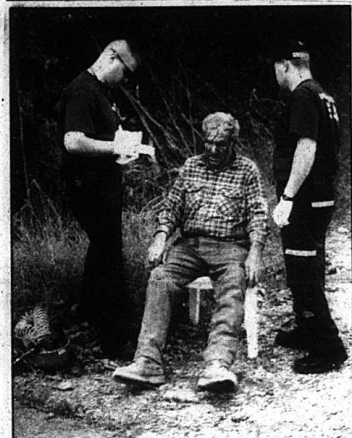
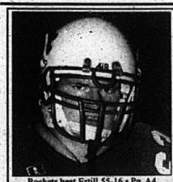

McKinneys set free on bond

Two Rockcastle County men who were arrested last week for numerous crimes involving killing deer and wild turkeys have been released on bond.

Brothers Jonathan McKinney, 21, and Michael McKinney, 27, were released on a combined \$7,500 cash bond. Jonathan's bond was \$5,000 and Michael's was \$2,500.

The McKinney's father, Casper, posted the bond.

The two were arrested after authorities found 49 deer antlers and seven turkey beards on their property, which had apparently been taken illegally.

They are due in court on November 6th.

The McKinney's brother, Gary, is currently on death row, after being convicted of three brutal murders in Pulaski County several years ago.

Community meeting held by development board

The Rockcastle County Development Board (RCDB) sponsored a Community Meeting last Thursday, for the purpose of soliciting further public input regarding the developing Rockcastle County Strategic Plan.

The meeting also provided an opportunity to share results of the six task forces, which have been working since March 30th in their respective areas of development.

Approximately seventy citizens attended the meeting held at Rockcastle County High School Auditorium. The task forces shared their findings and recommendations to be included in the Strategic Plan. John Clontz, Chairman of RCDB welcomed those attending and reviewed the planning process to date. Peter J. Hiller, Director of Brushy Fork Institute of Berea College and

contracted consultant to assist RCDB for the project, submitted for inclusion in the Strategic Plan.

RCDB was created to coordinate Rockcastle County's efforts for economic and community development. A primary goal of RCDB is to oversee the design of a long term Strategic Plan for the county that will guide development while preserving local values and quality of life.

RCDB will submit the Strategic Plan to state government during the month of October. Once completed and the plan becomes official it will be shared extensively with all segments of the community. RCDB has also submitted a grant application for Phase II of the planning process; if

Three indicted

Three more Rockcastle County people are facing drug charges in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Timothy Robbins, 24, Sheila K. Overbay, also known as Sheila Wilson, 29 and Sammy Stewart, 27, all of Mt. Vernon were indicted two weeks ago by the Rockcastle Grand Jury in connection with a drug bust on June 23rd.

The three are accused of trafficking in marijuana over five pounds and trafficking in Tylox and Xanax.

Stewart and Robbins have been arrested and are due in court on Friday.

Overbay has not been arrested. Kentucky State Police Officer Lafe Owens is the investigating officer.

Neighbors looking for criminals

Residents of Chestnut Heights Subdivision, which is located near Brindle Ridge, two miles from Brodhead have organized a neighborhood watch program.

One resident, Bobby Bishop, said the program was started because of the numerous break-ins in the subdivision in recent months.

Bishop said residents had been running the neighborhood watch for a couple of weeks and that someone is patrolling 24 hours a day.

"Maybe this story will do some good, if they are smart enough to read," he said.

"We are tired of the problems and potential dangers to our families and we intend to do what we can to keep it from happening," he said.

Three of five schools earn reward money

Roundstone leads way in test scores

The Rockcastle County School System got a mixed report card last week when the state released the results of last year's test scores.

The test, which shows how much a school has improved or declined is known as the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System (CATS).

Depending on what grade a student is in, students are tested on several subject matters including reading, math, science, social studies, arts and humanities, practical living and writing.

At the high school level, a school is also scored in connection with their drop out rate and retention rates.

Three of the four county schools improved from their scores a year ago, with the most gains being made at Brodhead School.

Brodhead's scores were up seven points.

"Our staff works really hard on our curriculum and we have great community support," said Principal Caroline Graves.

Brodhead's scores were in the top seven percent in the state. Their best scores were in Science and their lowest were in Math. Brodhead has 400 students.

Students at Roundstone continued to lead the county with the highest scores.

Roundstone has been recognized nationally for their accomplishments and have a student body of about 300.

Roundstone's highest scores were in Science and their lowest were in arts and humanities.

Last year's principal David Pensol, who has moved on to the central office, credited his staff, students, as he always did during his eight years at the school.

"It is simply a total effort on

everyone's part - Roundstone is a special school with hard working people and concerned parents," he said.

Roundstone's scores ranked 14th in the state and in the top two percent.

At the largest elementary school in the county, Mt. Vernon students scored 2.2 points higher than a year ago.

Students, who number 690, scored higher last year in every subject area than a year before except writing, which fell only a couple points short.

Mt. Vernon's best scores were in reading and vocational studies.

They were rated in the top 24 percent of the schools in the state.

Rockcastle County Middle School's scores dropped 2.3 percent from a year ago.

Their highest scores were in reading, but student test results in math showed a dramatic 18 point drop.

Besides being down in math, scores were also lower in social studies, arts and humanities, vocational studies and writing. They were up in science.

Becky Isaacs, the school system's new testing coordinator, said that administrators were looking at several

Local young people part of Georgetown Mission works

The aftermath of Sept. 11th continues to affect many aspects of the American lifestyle. From decreased attendance at major events to a decline in air travel, the aftershocks of that devastating day are evident nationwide.

Unfortunately, the ministry work of student missionaries has not been immune from the post 9/11 fallout. At Georgetown College, for instance, the number of summer missionaries was down nearly 35 percent.

On the average, Georgetown College sends out 60-70 summer missionaries each summer. This year, the number was down to 45. Sharon Felton, campus minister at Georgetown credits September 11 for the decrease.

"Many parents", she said, "are hesitant and unwilling to send their children overseas at this time." Despite any threats from terrorists or other dangers, Felton insists that missions work is a calling that still sounds loudly.

"Missions are what we've been

called to do. We're called to love the world, to baptize and make disciples. It's a calling to all Christians," Felton said.

Lower numbers didn't represent lessened enthusiasm on behalf of those missionaries who ventured out last summer. Angie Blanton, a 2002 graduate, who spent the entire summer acting as an interim music minister at a church in Johannesburg, South Africa, was even more eager to be in the mission field since the September 11th attacks.

"I feel like now is the most important time to go because, now, people need a positive American image, and a positive Christian image," she said.

Contributing to the sense of urgency Blanton feels is the AIDS epidemic sweeping the African continent. She said that many of the people with whom she shared the Gospel may not be alive another year, making her mission all the more important.

Blanton spent much of her time

in Johannesburg, taking occasional trips to surrounding areas offering choir clinics and youth services to the families who lived in the squatters camps. Squatters camp are a shacks made of scrap pieces of wood with no running water, and no kitchen, the cooking is done outside. She remembers one particular nine year old boy named Seepo. As with many of the children and families in squatters camps, Seepo had no shoes or coat and it was winter in Johannesburg. According to Blanton it was very sad to see. "I knew if I gave him shoes his parents would probably sell them for money," she said. "It is very eye-opening," she added. "It changes your perspective on things."

Blanton hopes to go back to South Africa in December with a National Youth Conference. She has also been invited back to perform music conferences in the main areas of South Africa.

Other students who served overseas this summer were Jerica Wallace of Georgetown in Haiti; Andrea

Davis of Georgetown and Daniel Harrison of Saddleville in Bosnia; and others who ventured as far as Venezuela.

Many of the students stayed closer to home. Andy Hale of Mount Vernon worked with the education discipline/pastor in Crestwood, Kentucky. Others served needs in California, Arkansas, Alaska and across the nation with Passport, Crosspoint, and other ministry oriented organizations.

Hale, a senior at Georgetown, who had previously served as a missionary in Chile, was looking forward to an internship at a large church. "It was nice to be on staff with 10-12 other people and see how the church functions," Hale said. Hale had the opportunity to work in every aspect of the church, from small bible study groups and bible school to outreach programs and men's and women's ministry.

Hale hopes to intern again next semester.

Ashley Gill of Winchester said her

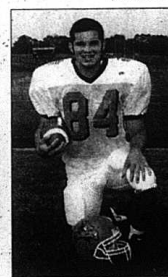
decision to stay close to home was motivated by an opportunity to see children in her hometown, not fear. The Georgetown senior is working as a children's minister at

The Wine Saps are Getting Ripe

Here and there throughout the mountains on old farmsteads stands a weathered, withered Wine Sap apple tree or maybe several; still groved in what might once have been an orchard. Had they been watched over and pruned with any tend of care the limbs would be hanging full just now and ready for the picking. Carefully handled and unbruised, they would keep in the cellar hard and crisp and juicy until early next Spring.

Now most of their limbs are dead. We, here east of the Mississippi, depend mostly on Washington State to send us nice fresh apples and they are mostly of the Starkes varieties. I

wonder how many people even know what a Wine Sap is.

One late-April Saturday morning near the break of day in 1968 or 69 I had stumbled and probably fallen half a dozen times to get to the mouth of Grassy Creek where it runs out of Virginia into the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River. I was a college student at the time, more focused on Richard Brautigan's "Trot Fishing in America" than romantic literature and Grassy Creek was my ever beckoning.

The lower reaches of the stream, just before it ran into the river, required a rugged half mile trek and 5 or 6 cross-crossings of knee-deep, algae covered lime stone, crossing ah

deluge designed by God or the devil too bruse and soak if it did not drown you. Take a fall and you were gonna wind up downstream somewhere soaked and battered.

I managed to negotiate the stream that morning without serious incident and reached my favorite stretch of water believing that I had it to myself. In fact, I'd never had it otherwise when there, at the head of my favorite pool, I found an old fellow casting with an ultra light spinning outfit into the eddy of the pool. He caught a nice rainbow and saw me as he netted it and motioned for me across the stream.

He was dressed mostly like me, in a pair of old jeans and some gym shoes with felt tapt to the bottom to keep from slipping. A kaiki shirt and baseball cap and an old weather-beaten willow creel dangling off his shoulder. I didn't have a creel because I generally string my keepers on a bush limb or put them in a vest pocket.

I had hot coffee and he had what I took to be a thermos jug so I waded over as he gutted his fish and put it in his creel along with two others he'd already caught. The only thing more beautiful than a rainbow trout stretched out over moss in a creel is that same rainbow trout properly placed in a cast iron skillet and fried

in real butter and sprinkled with pepper so it's fit to eat.

"Wallace Ratliff is my name and I'd be proud to know yours." I told him mine and we'd shaken hands and talked about the fishing. "Have a drink of my cider."

Wallace had already poured himself a cup of my coffee and swallowed it down so I took his container in hand and noticed that it was a quart jar wrapped in a piece of wool. I took a sniff and it smelled like cider so I guzzled down probably a full cup before I realized my mistake.

"I was gonna warn you but you was too thirsty but that there is about 180 proof cider. It's been boiled a couple of times. You ever hear of wine sap cider?"

I told him I had and Wallace said to me, "They weren't named that way for nothing. They ever had but it's that juice that give em the name. All apples got cider. Thees the only ones that got sap and you have to still the cider our of it."

The Wine Saps are in right now, if you can find em, and they are the finest apple I've ever tasted. Wallace Ratliff took his "Granny Fighting Cider" recipe to the grave a few years ago but he knew how to turn them into a unique product. Forgive me, but I'm thinking economic development at the moment---

ing who are victims of unhealthy religious teaching. The effects of this kind of teaching can last for years. I am interested in helping people trade in the guilt and shame for a religion of freedom and joy. I will teach Winning Against Depression on Tuesday, October 15, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m., and Depression strikes many people, and yet most of us know so little about it. Depression can be fatal, because some of its victims will commit suicide. Even when not fatal, it is a painful illness that can make a person and a family miserable. Insomnia, overeating, low energy, anxiety, guilt, and hopelessness are just some of its many effects.

I have had some personal experience with depression. I know what

it feels like to be depressed, and I know it does not feel good at all. I would like to help some of those other depressed persons out there. Come to this seminar and you will find out how you can beat depression. You will learn that depression is very treatable. You will find that there is hope!

In this seminar I will explain the causes of depression. Also you will learn to recognize depression in its many forms, and you will find out about the treatments for depression that really work.

The second seminar is Domestic Violence: How Can We Help, presented on Thursday, October 24 from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month and this class will teach participants what they can do to help someone who is being abused. Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,

In an attempt to clarify some important issues regarding the disputed Oscar Isaac Road, the O'Neals feel that our readers of the Signal should hear from the other side, because you are only hearing what the fiscal court wants you to hear, and the O'Neals names keep appearing if the Signal by Buzz Carlolis. We think this is because he wants to keep us at front and center of the controversy he keeps referring to. We don't appreciate this and request that he cease and desist from such activity!

Buzz Carlolis needs to put the blame of the controversy in its proper perspective, since he now has a rather extensive survey of the Oscar Isaac Road, showing the amount of land taken from the O'Neals property. The citizens have a right to know the truth. If he would tell you the true facts about this controversy, he would remind you that the fiscal court violated state regulations in 1976 when it accepted a 15 foot right-of-way into its road plan. He would also tell you that road maintenance, such as mowing and road patching, has been continued by the county on the Oscar Isaac Road to current date. He would tell you that the deed transferring this road property to the county in 1976 is defective, which means it has a cloud on the title. You must not knowingly deed away property which does not belong to you. He, too, would tell you that the O'Neals lost part of their Tract #2 due to corner shaving, their private 15 foot right-of-way to Tract #3 and other land from Tract #3 running parallel with the road due to public encroachment.

Here is how the 15 foot right-of-way became property of the O'Neals through a chain of title. Private right-of-ways, like buildings and other things such as fences and trees, transfer along with the property unless there is a restriction clause in the deed. Our research revealed no such clause. In 1943 Oscar Isaac Road deeded his brother, Charlie, a 20 acre tract along with a 15 foot right-of-way to that property, Charlie Isaac, 1944, after building a road upon that property along with his father, Albert (see court record testimony) deeded Walter Miracle the 20 acre tract; Walter Miracle, 1945, deeded Wm. (Bill) Sparks 12 acres of this tract, subsequently becoming Tract #3 of William Sparks. He had already bought two other tracts from Walter Miracle. In 1946 James Sparks was deeded the other eight acres by Walter Miracle. In 1967 the O'Neals purchased all three tracts of the William Sparks' property from the Sparks' heirs.

The person who deeded the county the now called Oscar Isaac Road in 1976, according to research through the recorded deeds in the Rockcastle County Clerk's Office, never regained title to any portion of this 20 acre tract, including the 15 foot right-of-way, since 1943.

In closing, we ask the readers to decide for themselves who caused the controversy! Also, ponder in your mind who has contributed the most land toward the improvement of this road. The only money we are getting from our land is for the additional land granted through the condemnation suit.

The Family Life Abuse Center is a domestic violence program that provides shelter and other assistance to victims of domestic violence (women, men and children). Our program serves the Cumberland Area

District - which includes Rockcastle, Laurel, Whitley, Knott, Bell, Harlan, Jackson and Clay counties. Services are cost free and based upon the individual's need. Referrals are made regarding community resources such as housing, education or job training, as well as group or individual counseling. There are victims advocates who work within our shelter to provide legal advocacy. My position within the program is to raise community awareness and educate the public regarding domestic violence.

The month of October is a time when domestic violence advocates around the nation draw attention to the epidemic of domestic violence and its devastating consequences. In research conducted by the United States Department of Justice, 53% of all victims of crime identify the offender(s) as an intimate partner, relative, friend or acquaintance. Victims identified intimate partners (current or former spouses, boy or girlfriends) as the perpetrator in 10% of all violent crimes. (Rennison, 2001).

This year, we are asking people to join our community in providing support to domestic violence victims and to inform perpetrators there is no excuse for abuse. The Family Life Abuse Center will hold a candlelight vigil to honor domestic violence survivors and pay tribute to those who lost their lives as a result of abuse. This event will take place on Thursday, October 3rd at the Mt. Vernon Courthouse Lawn at 7 p.m.

In conjunction with the candlelight vigil, we have developed a community awareness project entitled "The Safe Site" as a way to educate the public about domestic violence and to provide information specific to our program. The project includes informational brochures to be placed in bathrooms and clear vinyl stickers to be placed on window fronts indicating the phone inside may be used to contact our program or the police. We are calling upon local businesses and community organizations (libraries, banks, police departments, health care facilities, social service organizations, schools, etc.) to participate in promoting domestic violence awareness. The best way to do so is to create a supportive environment within the community.

We are asking the community to display purple ribbons during this month as well. The purple ribbon campaign began as a way to honor and remember loved ones who lost their lives to domestic violence. The symbol has been adopted by domestic violence advocates, friends and families as a visible gesture of support for survivors and victims of domestic violence. The display of purple ribbons sends the message there is no place for domestic violence in the home, workplace, community or school.

We need to understand that domestic violence is our business. When a neighbor, friend, co-worker, or family member is suffering, they need to know help is available. Domestic violence is not something that can be regarded as a "pri-

vate affair" any longer. Only once we begin to understand the dynamics of abuse can we make a difference. To join our efforts, please contact our program (see number below). Thank you for your consideration.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the accompanying statement of receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, for the year ended December 31, 2001. This financial statement is the responsibility of the County Clerk. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on this financial statement based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the County Clerk's office prepares the financial statement on a prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the modified cash basis and laws of Kentucky, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the County Clerk for the year ended December 31, 2001, in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated May 20, 2002, on our consideration of the County Clerk's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

Based on the results of our audit, we have presented the accompanying comment and recommendation, included herein, which discusses the following reportable condition:

"They have gotten on the weights and they were an improved team from a year ago," Larkey said.

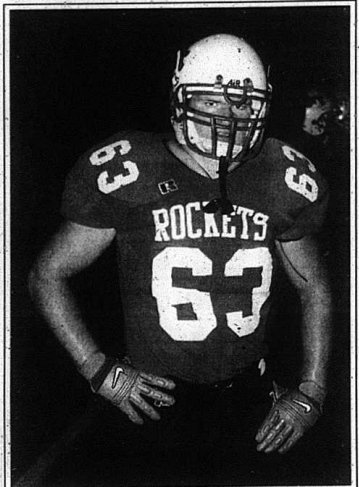
Larkey was also in a different position this season than he was this time last year.

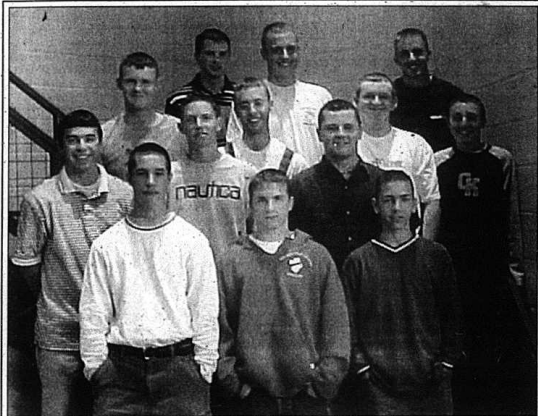

Ordinance #02-0909A

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles for city purposes in the corporate limits of Broodhead, Kentucky.

Whereas, KRS 83A.130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance, provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, KRS 132.487 and 132.488 requires submission to the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet prior to October 1 of each year the annual tax rate to be levied on motor vehicles and motorboats.

Now therefore Be It Ordained by the City of Broodhead, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - motor vehicles and motorboats

An ad valorem tax rate of .25 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of motor vehicles and motorboats subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment and Penalty

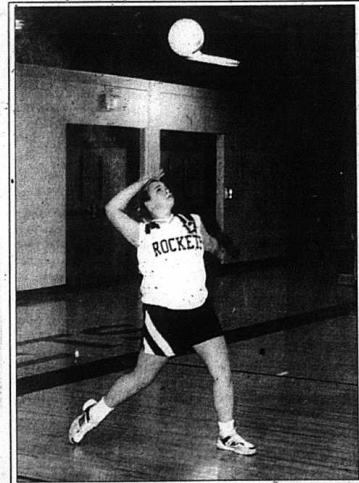
A. All ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall be collected by the Rockcastle County Clerk in accordance with the provisions of KRS 134.800 and other applicable statutes.

B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS 134.810 and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

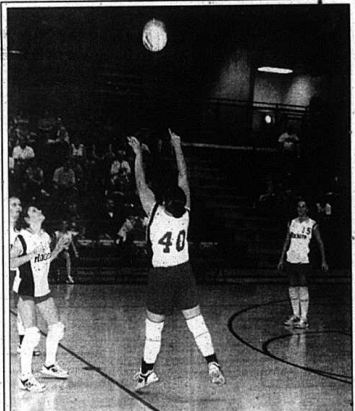

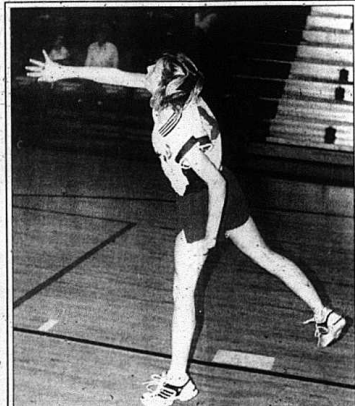
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Jeni Durham serves during the J.V.'s win over North Laurel Monday night.

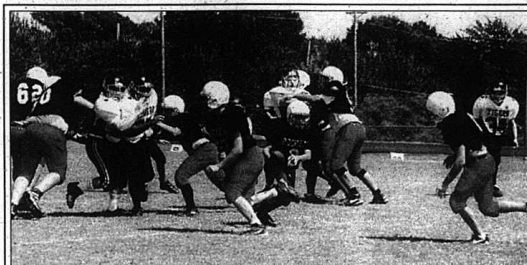
However, Lexington Catholic proved too much, handing the Rockets their third loss of the season 26-16.

Tonya Lunsford led the scoring for her team with 6 points; Thacker got 4; Barnes 3; Hayes 2 and S. Lunsford 1.

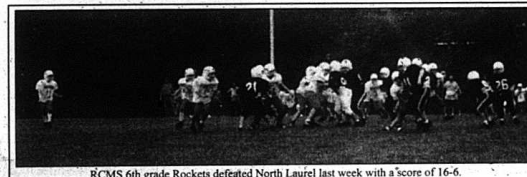

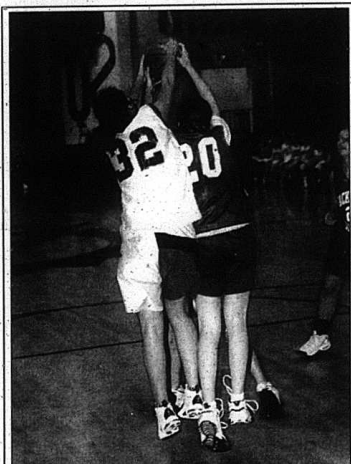

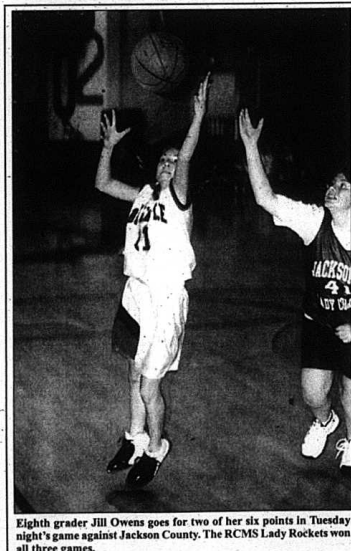

CPH-45 is a beef feeder-calf program that certifies a prescribed herd health and weaning program. This includes respiratory vaccines for IBR, PI3, BVD, IB. Somnus and pasteurized, as well as black leg vaccine. All male calves are castrated and healed. All calves with horns are dehorned and healed. A dewormer that controls inhibited ostertagia must be used. Calves are weaned 45 days allowing them to learn to eat from a bunk and water from a trough. Local veterinarians will work with beef producers who wish to prepare their calves for special CPH45 sales.

A CPH45 sale is scheduled for December 4th at 6:00 p.m. at the Garrard County Stockyards in Lancaster. The sale is part of the Kentucky Beef Network program for Rockcastle, Madison, Lincoln, Garrard and Boyle County beef farmers. Orvil Whitaker, KBN regional contact, is working with local farmers to assure their calves meet all the CPH requirements. October 15th is the deadline to wean and receive vaccinations for calves to qualify for this sale. Special cart tags and all the written guidelines are available at the Extension office by contacting Tom Mills at 256-2403.

Ordinance #2-0909

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax for city purposes in the corporate limits of Broadhead, Kentucky.

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes, and,

Whereas, KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance, and,

Whereas, KRS 83A.130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, the City has calculated the tax rates for real and personal property (rangible) in accordance with KRS chapter 132

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Broadhead, Kentucky as follows: **Section One: Tax Levy** - Real estate and personal property A. An ad valorem tax rate of 25 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

B. An ad valorem tax rate of 25 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty

All said taxes shall be due and payable as set forth on the tax bill. A holder prior to the due date shall receive a two per cent (2%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at the face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a six (6%) penalty.

Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof

This ordinance applies to the 2002 calendar year assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2003 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

Grant funds available for homeowner septic systems

If you are a homeowner and have a failing septic system or a "straight pipe," you may be eligible for a free septic system. The program is part of the \$9,000,000 "PRIDE Homeowner Septic System Program." In Rockcastle County, the Cumberland Valley RC&D Council and the Rockcastle County Conservation District are jointly administering the project. The project is being funded by a grant from the Hal Rogers PRIDE program and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

To be eligible for the program the applicant must meet the HUD poverty guidelines and must own the property on which the septic system will be installed. The grant program is for existing homes and is not for new/unoccupied homes. If your home is near a municipal or county sewerage line the grant program will also pay the expenses to hook your home onto the sewerage line.

This program is targeting a known 36,000 straight pipes and failing septic system throughout the 40 county PRIDE area. Pollution, from straight pipes and failing septic systems is the main water pollution problem in eastern Kentucky. Nearly 1/2 the private drinking water wells in Kentucky are

contaminated with coliform bacteria, an indication that the wells may be contaminated water. By installing adequate septic systems or hooking on to an existing sewerage line we can all be a part of drastically improving the water quality of eastern Kentucky and Rockcastle County.

In Rockcastle County, applications for the "Homeowner Septic System Program" can be picked up at the Rockcastle County Conservation District office at USDA Service Center, Hwy. 150. The homeowner

will complete the grant application, provide proof of income and proof of ownership of the property on which a septic system is to be installed, along with other documentation as required in the grant administration procedures. 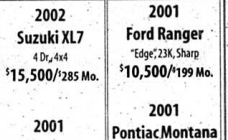

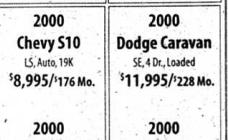

September is National Food Safety Ed Month

"Four Steps to Food Safety" is the emphasis of the 2002 National Food Safety Education Month (NFSEM). The national observance of Food Safety Education Month began in 1995 to focus attention on safe food handling and preparation both at home and in commercial kitchens. NFSEM is supported by federal, state and local government agencies, the food industry and consumer organizations.

This year's theme, "Four Steps to Food Safety," draws attention to preventing the invisible cause of food borne illnesses: microorganisms. The microorganisms are tiny bacteria that a person cannot see and may make food unsafe to eat if the proper steps are not taken to prevent their growth

or presence in the food we consume. Bacteria are everywhere; therefore, following some basic food safety guidelines is very important to make the foods safe to eat.

CLEAN! Hands, utensils, work surfaces, or anything that touches the food should be clean. Wash hands thoroughly with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds. Dry them with a paper towel. Utensils and equipment should be washed thoroughly to remove all residues after each use. Bleach is often used as a sanitizer in commercial kitchens to ensure destruction of the last 99 percent of germs remaining on surfaces. Consumers can clean their own utensils and equipment at home in a similar manner by making a sanitize so-

lution using one teaspoon of bleach to a gallon of water.

SEPARATE! Prevent cross-contamination of bacteria from one food or location to another. Cross-contamination is the transfer of harmful bacteria to food from other foods, cutting boards, utensils, hands or aprons. An example of cross-contamination is cutting raw meat on a cutting board and then slicing a tomato on the same cutting board without washing the cutting board and knife between uses.

COOK! Cook foods thoroughly to proper temperature and use a food thermometer to measure the internal temperature. Eggs, fish and beef cuts like roast or steak should be cooked to a minimum internal temperature of 145F. Cook pork products to 150F. Cook hamburger or other ground beef to 155F to destroy E. coli 0157:H7. Poultry products like chicken and turkey often are contaminated with the bacteria Salmonella and should be cooked to an internal temperature of 165F for at least 15 seconds.

CHILL! Keep cold foods cold! Refrigerators should be 40F or less and freezers should be 0F or below. Place a thermometer in both your freezer and refrigerator and check the temperature daily to be sure the units are working properly. Refrigerate or freeze perishable foods and leftovers within two hours to prevent spoilage or food poisoning. Thaw foods in the refrigerator or during the cooking process. Never thaw foods at room temperature. If using a microwave oven to thaw foods, continue cooking the food until it is cooked completely.

Now that you know some simple food safety guidelines, take this test to see if you practice safe food handling techniques. Ask yourself each question. Answer "yes" or "no."

1. Did you...
1. Wash hands with warm water and soap for 20 seconds before preparing food?
2. Wash hands with warm water and soap for 20 seconds before eating?
3. Clean countertops before preparing food?
4. Rinse fruits and vegetables with cold running water before preparing them?
5. Did you dry your hands with a clean paper towel after washing them?
6. Clean the cutting boards for raw meat, fish or poultry before using them again for any other food?
7. Keep raw meat, fish and poultry wrapped properly in the refrigerator so juices do not drip on other foods.

8. Put cooked meat, fish or poultry on a different platter than the one with the raw juices.

9. Did you...
9. Rotate food in the microwave to avoid "Cold spots"?
10. Bring sauces, soups and gravy to a boil when reheating?
11. Make sure eggs were cooked properly?
12. Not eat cookie dough or cake batter that was made with raw eggs?
13. Use a thermometer to check the temperature of cooked meat, fish and poultry?
14. Use a cold pack for packed lunches or picnic foods?
15. Refrigerate leftovers right away?
16. Defrost foods in the refrigerator, in cold running water or in the microwave and then cooking the food?

If you answered yes to all of these questions, then you are very knowledgeable of and practice safe food handling guidelines. Give yourself an "A!"

The Rockcastle County Health Department offers classes every Tuesday on safe food handling. If you work for a restaurant or food service establishment, this class is required prior to starting work. The schedule is as follows: First and third Tuesday - 9:30 a.m.; second and fourth Tuesday - 3:00 p.m.; Fee: \$3.00 per person. Location: Environmental Office of the Rockcastle County Health Department.

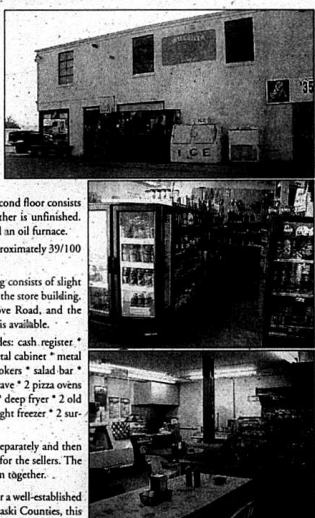

Importer Assessment Rates for Burley Tobacco

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced assessment rates effective October 1, on unmanufactured burley tobacco imported for consumption. Unmanufactured tobacco is any tobacco that is not processed and packaged as a consumer tobacco product. The assessment rates are the same as for domestically-produced burley tobacco and will remain in effect through September 30, 2003.

Burley tobacco importer assessment rates effective October 1, 2002 through September 30, 2003 of 4.40¢ per pound, or 2 cents per pound of net-weight.

The total amount of assessments is due within 10 business days after imported commerce of the U.S. Customs Service for entry for consumption into the commerce of the U.S. Failure to pay or timely pay the amount of assessment due can result in a marketing penalty of \$1.48 per pound, or \$3.26 per kilogram for the amount of burley tobacco on which such failure occurred.

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP)

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Sign up for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

County Committee Election

As of August 1st the local FSA office began accepting nominations

for the upcoming election to be held December 2, 2002.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 28, 2002.

Dairy Program Signup Began August 13th

Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, reminds farmers that signup for the Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) program began August 13th and will end September 30, 2002. This program, authorized by the 2002 Farm Bill, financially compensates dairy producers when domestic milk prices fall below a specified level.

Eligible dairy producers are those who produced milk in any state and marketed the milk commercially beginning December 2001. To be approved for the program, producers must be in compliance with highly and wetland conservation provisions, and must enter into a contract with USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation to provide monthly marketing data.

MILC payments will occur in months when the price of Class I milk in Boston under the Northeast Milk Marketing Order falls below \$16.95 per cwt. Payment rates will be 45 percent of the difference between \$16.94 and the Boston Class I price for that month.

Program payments scheduled to begin in October 2002 will be retroactive from December 1, 2001 with producers selecting to begin in October 2002 will be retroactive from December 1, 2001 with producers selecting the month to start receiving payments.

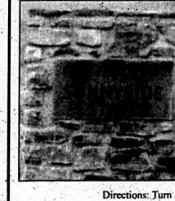

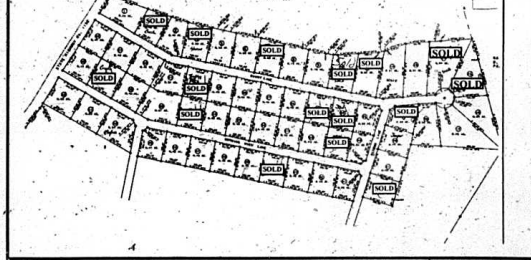

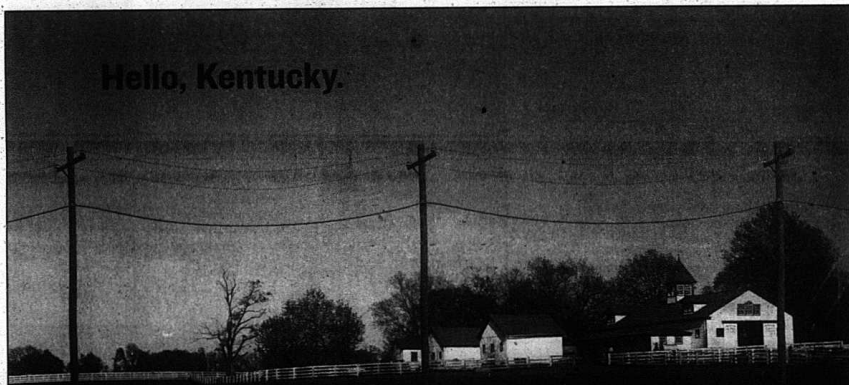
