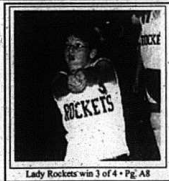

## Civic leader Lee Keene dead at 70

Was Rockcastle Hospital Administrator for 13 years

Former Rockcastle Hospital Administrator and Mt. Vernon City Council member Lee Keene died Wednesday at a Knoxville hospital. Mr. Keene was 70.

Family members said he suffered a stroke on Sunday morning shortly before leaving for church and that on Monday he suffered a brain hemorrhage.

Mr. Keene was hospital administrator for 13 years and member of the Mt. Vernon City Council for seven years.

Mr. Keene was instrumental in expanding the local hospital and he was also a personal friend of Kentucky Governor Paul Patton.

Keene used his influence with Patton to help get several projects done in the county and several local officials had only good things to say about him this week.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, who is also general counsel for the local hospital, said Wednesday that Mr. Keene was a "leading proponent of growth in our county, with goodwill always on his mind."

"His positive impact has gone far beyond what he accomplished at the hospital," Burdette said.

Rockcastle County Judge-Execu-



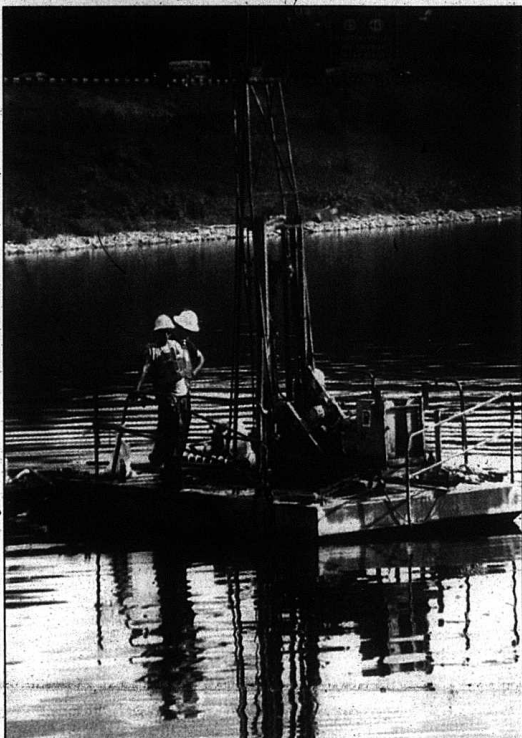
Former Rockcastle Hospital Administrator Lee Keene died in Knoxville on Wednesday.

utive Buzz Carloftis called Keene a forthright, candid person who had Rockcastle County's best interest at heart. "He was a great asset to this county when he moved here to take over the operation of the hospital," Carloftis said.

"I feel like the city of Mt. Vernon, Rockcastle County and the state of Kentucky has lost a true public servant," Mt. Vernon Mayor Karen King said.

Mr. Keene, who is survived by his wife Patricia, a son Lee Douglas, Jr. and a daughter Barbara Sue Taylor, will be at Lynhurst Funeral Home in Knoxville, TN.

Engineers were busy on Monday core drilling around the intake valve at Lake Linville. Apparently, the valve, which has been in place since the lake was built in the 1960's has cracked and is not putting enough water into the water plant.



Because of the amount of water the City of Mt. Vernon pumps each day, they will soon consider a project that would dredge the lake in certain areas, including the area shown above. The city pumps 1.5 million gallons of water a day and is the county's main supplier of bulk water. Although the city recently completed a \$5.4 million renovation of the water plant, there is still not enough water going into the plant, to guarantee that the plant can meet their demands.

## Boone Cromer Road residents may get water

The Rockcastle County Water Association is attempting to provide more water to rural homes in the Sand Springs area of the county.

The association announced this week that they hope residents along the Boone Cromer Road will participate in a project that could provide water along the road.

Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis said the county

was willing to dig the water line along the road at no cost to Rockcastle, which would allow them to install the water lines.

Rockcastle, which now serves 565 homes in the county, is asking residents along the road to pay a \$517 meter service fee, which would help in the cost of the project.

Deadline to sign-up for the project is October 31st.

## Monday last day to register for fall election

Rockcastle County voters have until Monday to register for the fall election.

Voters can also change parties until that date. All changes and registrations must be made in Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk's office by 4 p.m. on the 7th.

Those needing to vote by absentee ballot can pickup applications until October 29th. Absentee ballots must be returned to the clerk's office by 3 p.m. on the day of the election.

Disability, age and employment out of the county are legitimate reasons to vote by absentee ballots, according to Mrs. Houk.

There will also be a voting machine set up in the clerk's office beginning on October 21st for those unable to vote on election day.

This fall, incumbent Mayor Karen King will face six challengers.

One candidate, who filed was only 23 years old and state law requires that a Mayor of a fifth class city, which Mt. Vernon is, must be at least 25 years old to run.

Timothy Kirby, of Barnett Trailer Court, has since withdrawn.

Other candidates are council members Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner.

Local businessman Doug Bullock and local businesswoman Rebekah Hammond, who is the wife of Rockcastle County Superintendent Larry Hammond, have filed as well.

Another local businessman, Kevin Fletcher and a patient at Rockcastle Hospital, Jody Adams, have also filed for Mayor.

In Brodhead there will be no races, since all four current council members, Curt Brown, Johnny Wilcox, Larry Taylor and Everett Albright have no opposition.

Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash is also unopposed.

In Livingston, current Mayor Curt McHargue, faces competition from J.C. Raymond Griffin and only three have filed for council.

They are Todd Mink, Katha Carpenter and Jason Medley.

Local realtor and businessman, Republican State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, who has

served in the Kentucky House for twenty years, is facing Democratic opposition from Stanford attorney J. Paul Long, who is also a former county attorney in Lincoln.

Rockcastle's new State Senator, Democrat Ed Worley of Richmond, is facing opposition from Republican Barry Metcalf, a former State Senator himself.

Former council member Lou Vanhoose, former Mt. Vernon police officer Matt Bryant who is an associate Pastor at Faith Harvest Fellowship, current council members Clark "Joe" Mullins, Lonetta Daugherty and Wayne Bullock have all filed for council.

Also filing for Mt. Vernon city council were: Daniel Boone Development Director Betty Carter Busell, Shelley Raines Lewis, a social worker with the state of Kentucky, Don Jones, a rural mail carrier and local volunteer Iremen Brian Hansel and Steve Renfro. Hansel works at Dowell and Martin Funeral Home and Renfro works at Jack's S&T.

Barbara Bennett, who is a former businesswoman in Rockcastle County and whose son-in-law, Barry Adams, is a police officer, has also filed for city council.

All total, eleven people will seek six seats on the council.

Donna Hastly, 34, of Sand Springs, who is currently studying to be a Respiratory Therapist and incumbent board member Sam Stallworth of Livingston, will face off in the division one school board race. Division one is composed of East Livingston, West Livingston and South Mt. Vernon.

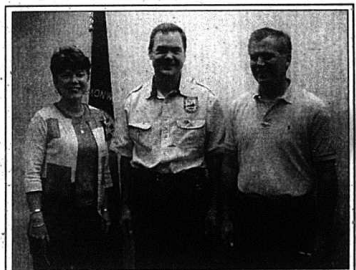
Steve Owens, 55, of Mareburg, and local pharmacist Tina Cain Hastly, 43, will square off in the division three school board race. One of the two will replace board chairman, Dr. G.W. Griffith, who did not seek re-election. He served on the board for ten years.

Division three is composed of the precincts North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon and Bullock.

There will also be two magistrate races and a constable's race this fall.

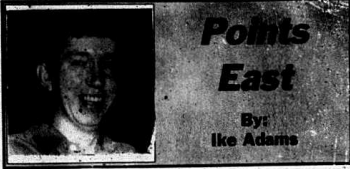

## Our Readers Write

Dear Editor,  
Enclosed is an article that was printed in the *Lexington Herald-Leader* on Monday, September 23, 2002. Would you please print the article in the Signal?

I am a lifelong citizen of Rockcastle County. I dispatched at Rockcastle County 911 from January 2001 until I began dispatching for the Kentucky State Police in Richmond in January 2001. I enjoy every aspect of dispatching.

I have received calls ranging from non-injury accidents to fatal accidents, where the victim has been ejected from the vehicle and is laying in the roadway. I have received calls from EMS response for a female in labor, a female stating her husband is deathly sick, no medical history indicating what he is suffering from. The man had an aneurysm and had no chance of survival. He was pronounced dead shortly after arriving at the local hospital. I took a call from a male subject threatening suicide. He stated he was severely intoxicated, suffering from depression and had a 12-gauge shotgun, planning to end his life. I kept the male on the phone more than 30 minutes until units arrived. The male subject was not injured and he received the help he needed. I can't begin to remember the countless domestic violence complaints I have taken, as well as prowler complaints...shootings... juveniles beyond the control of their guardians...burglaries, robberies, thefts...missing persons...sexual abuse...it's never ending.

Dispatchers are taking all these complaints while trying to get the responding officers, EMS and fire personnel where they need to go, as quickly and as safely as possible. If you have ever called for law enforce-

ment services and wondered why we ask all the questions we ask, it's for the safety of the men and women who are sworn to serve and protect you. I am not complaining about my job, but it would not hurt to hear someone say thank you once in a while. Dispatching can be a very stressful job. Dispatchers must be very patient and understanding people. I care about other people and enjoy helping others whenever I can; otherwise I would not be doing this job, because it does not come with a high salary.

The next time you call 911 or any police agency, think about this before you curse at the dispatcher on duty. Your life may depend on their reactions and quick thinking.

Dispatchers: emergency lifelines

When you call 911, your first contact is not with a police officer, firefighter or emergency medical technician.

The first person you talk to is a dispatcher. Because callers depend on dispatchers to send help quickly, it is a very stressful and mostly thankless job. We work every holiday and most weekends, and the pay isn't the best.

Not only do we have to deal with every type of problem imaginable, we also have to worry about getting emergency personnel to and from a call safely. There is a lot of stress knowing that so much depends on our decisions and how quickly we make them.

Yet, seldom does anyone hear us complain. You see many newspaper articles

about police and firefighters, but when was the last time you saw one about a dispatcher telling a caller how to give CPR and saving a life, or about a dispatcher talking a man with a gun out of a house?

I love my job. I enjoy what I do and like going home at the end of the day knowing that I made a difference in the community. And I'm not saying my job is more important than the work of police officers, firefighters or EMTs; it's not.

I am working that dispatchers are equally important and that their jobs are hard, too. We're part of the team, and it takes the whole team to get the job done.

In Montgomery County dispatchers serve the Mount Sterling Police Department and the Montgomery County Sheriff's Department and answer all 911 calls for the county (except wireless 911 calls, which go to Kentucky State Police), including all those for the fire department and ambulance services. At times, a dispatcher can be responsible for more than 10 law enforcement units at once.

It's pretty stressful to have a phone at each ear, with a woman on one screaming that her baby isn't breathing, and on the other, someone who wants to know why the police came to his house earlier that day, getting upset when we ask to put him on hold for a minute. A police officer making a traffic stop asks for a check on a license plate, which we do and find out it's a stolen vehicle driven by a robbery suspect. Meanwhile, a sheriff's unit answers "a man with a gun" call.

With all that going on, a dispatcher forgets about that bathroom break she has needed for hours and

the now cold lunch she has pushed aside.

For every call that requires us to send an officer, we deal with 10. For every radio call, 20 are handled by phone. They could be EMS and fire calls, someone asking for directions to the gravel lane somewhere off U.S. 460 or another wanting to know why their cable TV service is off and when it will be back on.

I have worked by candlelight and used a portable radio when the electricity was out. I have worked 12-hour shifts through Court Days, when everyone else was enjoying shopping and funeral cakes, and I have listened to a child crying because he can't wake Mommy up and wants to know why.

In spite of all we do, dispatchers are seldom thanked or even recognized.

A good example is the New York dispatchers on 9/11. How much have you heard about them? I can only imagine what they were going through that day.

They heard the cries for help from passengers on the hijacked planes and took the calls from crying people wanting to know what had happened to their loved ones -- and with no answers to give. Amid all that, they were worried about the police officers, firefighters and EMTs at the World Trade Center and why they were not answering their radio calls.

And at the same time, they were trying to cope with the same shock and horror that the rest of the nation felt.

Dispatchers are truly unseen and unsung heroes and the voice behind the badge.

Traffic crashes cause an average of 115 fatalities every day in the United States -- that's one death every 13 minutes. After a steady 20-year decline in the number of traffic fatalities nationwide, that number has stagnated at about 42,000 per year. While last year's campaign resulted in a 29% reduction in fatalities on October 10, 2001, we have to go further! Imagine a day with zero traffic fatalities and **Put the Brakes on Fatalities!**

The second annual **Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day** will be celebrated on October 10, around the nation and here in Mt. Vernon, to encourage the public to take a greater stand in keeping themselves and their loved ones from becoming one of those statistics. The ultimate goal is to unite the country in achieving one full day of zero traffic deaths by encouraging the public to reduce the tragic toll of motor vehicle crashes by taking pro-active steps such as:

- Driving assertively, as if your life depends on it -- that means courteously and defensively.
- Don't drive while impaired, distracted or in an aggressive manner.
- Buckling up on every trip -- every time.
- Using properly-installed child safety seats for children age 8 and under.
- Don't speed, and slow down to posted speed limits in construction zones.
- Keeping vehicles and tires properly maintained.
- Wearing appropriate protective gear when bicycling, skating or riding a motorcycle or scooter.
- Always stopping and looking left, right, left before crossing streets; and
- Working with local officials to remove hazards and improve roadway safety.

Put the Brakes on Fatalities Day is coordinated by a coalition of more than 40 national safety organizations, federal, state and local government agencies and provide sector companies working together to reduce the death and injury toll of motor vehicle crashes. 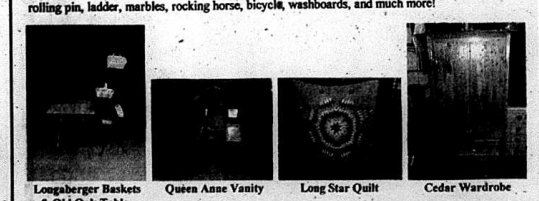

# Time for Flu Shots

It is time for flu shots again. Each fall and early winter, people at high risk of complications if they catch this serious influenza virus should receive the shot. Unfortunately, only about 20-40% of people who should get the immunization do so. This low immunization rate allows the virus to spread through a community more easily. The virus normally spreads through the United States during the winter months, so it is important to get the shot by mid-November.

A person should get the shot if he is over 65 or if he has any severe or chronic illness, such as heart disease, lung disease or diabetes. Residents of nursing homes or other long-term care facilities should routinely get the shot. Younger people should have the shot if they have any chronic illness, such as kidney failure or immune deficiencies.

The vaccine is incubated in eggs, so if a person is allergic to eggs, chickens or feathers, he should not receive the shot without first doing a


scratch test to verify the allergy. The shot should not be given during an acute respiratory infection or other active infection.

The shots are very safe and if any reaction occurs it is a mild fever with aching and fatigue. This may last one to two days. Rarely, a person will get hives, which is probably due to an egg allergy.


The more serious paralysis of Guillain-Barre syndrome is very rare and is only known to be associated with the "swine flu" component which was last used in 1976. Epidemiologists predict which strains of the virus are likely each year, so the shot is different each year.

Flu shots are now available at Rockcastle Medical Arts Building, Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Appointments are not required.



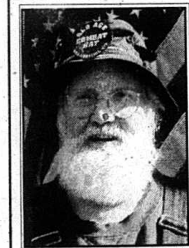

## Cornelius receives teacher award

Six years ago, Bonnie Allene Cornelius got an unexpected call from Rockcastle County High School. "They had lost a teacher mid-semester, and my former neighbor, who taught at the school, remembered I have an English degree," she explains. Although in the midst of a 23-year nursing career, Cornelius didn't want to appear unappreciative. "I filled out an application, certain that would be the end of it," she said. "I was called for an interview and hired the same day."

is," notes Rockcastle County High School Assistant Principal Betty McKinney. "In addition to being one of the best teachers I have ever seen anywhere, Ms. Cornelius is also a critical care nurse, a career she continues in her spare time. Her nurturing nature is well-fitted to both professions."

"I know teachers make a difference," Cornelius said. "Many children face enormous stumbling blocks to learning. I was one of those children. Some of my teachers were exemplary role models. They gave me the determination to succeed. Often, the teacher is the only positive role model in a student's life. Teachers help children find alternative paths and the strength to pursue them! What a wonderful service that is!"

Cornelius earned her associate's and bachelor's degree in nursing and her master's degree in English at Eastern Kentucky University. Her professional affiliations include the KCTE-LA, KNA and Business and Professional Women's Association. She participates in a variety of staff de-

velopment and leadership activities and has earned a number of awards and honors, including "Rockcastle County High School Teacher of the Year 2002," a Teaching Excellence Award from Georgetown College and nomination to *Who's Who Among America's Teachers*. Cornelius further supports her community through involvement in a wide variety of civic-related activities.

The Kentucky Teacher Awards is a partnership between the Kentucky Department of Education and Ashland Inc. It combines the best components of the Ashland Inc. Teacher Achievement Awards and the Kentucky Teacher of the Year programs.

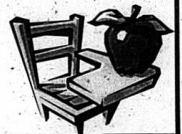

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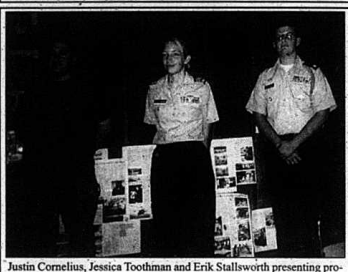

Are you the lucky winner of a sweepstakes promotion? Be careful, you could be the victim of an embarrassing scam. According to the Kentucky Attorney General's Consumer Protection Office, sweepstakes companies always rank in the top ten when it comes to consumer complaints.

Did you know that certain sweepstakes companies also might be breaking federal law when they request money from you in exchange for a free prize? You do not have to pay any shipping and handling charges, fees, etc. for a prize, you won. If there are any taxes to be paid on a prize, the company pays them directly to the government, not the sweepstakes company. If you have any questions about a legitimate sweepstakes promotion or you think you've been swindled by a sweepstakes scam, call both the National Fraud Information Center at 800-876-7060 and the Kentucky Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at 888-432-9257 for assistance and give them the opportunity to inform other consumers about the fraudulent

scheme. For other information about fraud and rip-offs, contact the Rockcastle Co. Extension Service at 256-2403.

### "What Saith the Scriptures"

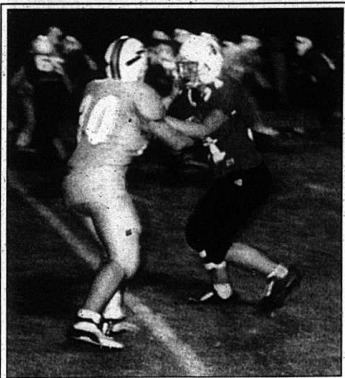

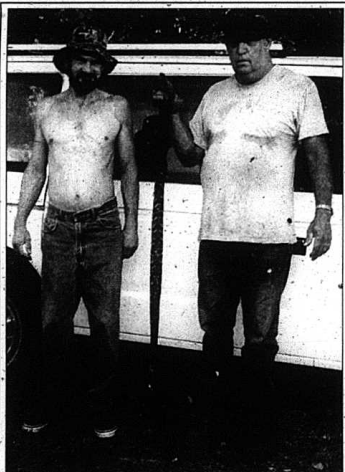

The girls were led by an awesome performance by Kayla Hayes, who dominated the entire race from start to finish. She placed 1st overall with an awesome time of 22:06.03. Jessie Asher ran a great race and remained close the entire way. She finished 2nd with an excellent effort of 22:51.83. Heather Hammond also stayed close to the front of the pack and ran very well. She finished 3rd overall with an exceptional effort of 24:04.87. Elizabeth Bussell ran well and finished 12th in 26:48.38. Ashley Bullock ran her first race of the season and performed very well with a 15th place finish in 32:33.1.

## Lady Rockets win three of four

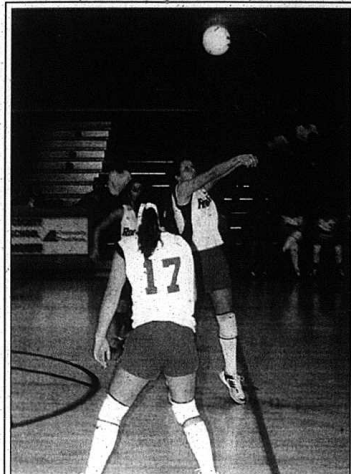
The RCHS Lady Rockets volleyball team picked up three wins against one loss in their last four outings.

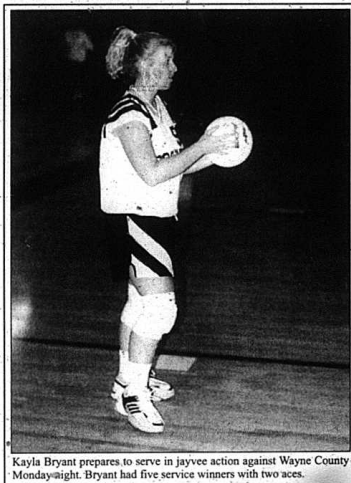
Parsons had 3 winners each with 2 aces each and Rachel Childress had an ace in her two service winners.

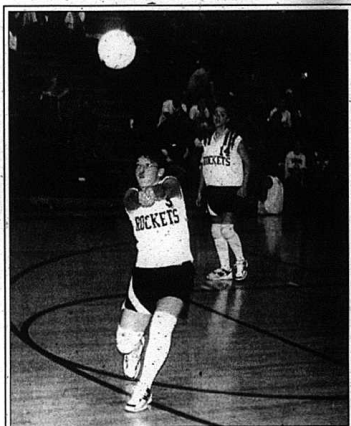
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Rachel Childress returns the ball in the Lady Rockets win over Wayne County Monday night. Also in the photo are Sarah Mullins and Allison Anderkin.

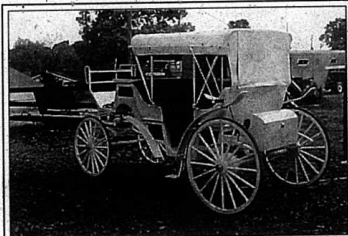

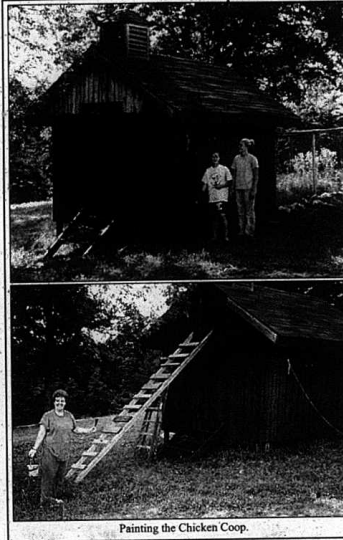

The third district is composed of Brown, West Brodhead and Hollock.

In district one, two term incumbent Democrat Magistrate, John Holbrook, faces opposition from Republican challenger David Gibbs, owner of Castle Cleaners in Mt. Vernon.

District one is comprised of North Mt. Vernon and North Brodhead precincts.

Statewide, incumbent Republican U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell is seeking a fourth term. He faces opposition from Lois Combs Weinburg, the daughter of former Kentucky Governor Bert Combs.

Longtime U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset and a former Rockcastle County prosecutor is unopposed.

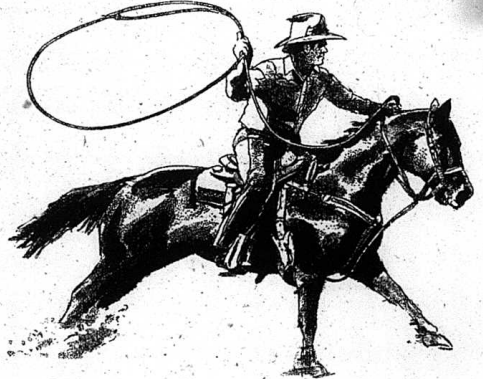

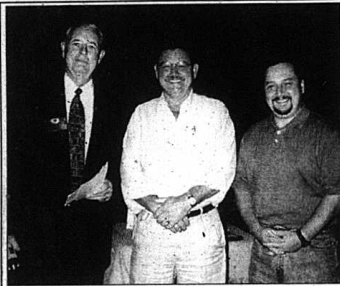

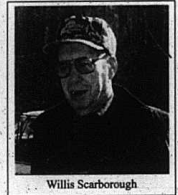

## A monthly community update from Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital

### We're partnering with Post-Secondary Education because EDUCATION PAYS

Nowhere is Kentucky's theme, "Education Pays," more evident than in healthcare. And, at Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital, we are doing our part to ensure that more people have the opportunity to access higher education through our support and partnership with the consolidated Somerset Community College - formerly STC, LTC, and SCC.

Actually, our involvement with higher education takes many forms - from direct monetary contributions and in-kind donations of equipment to enhance the learning opportunities for health care students to scholarships for new students and tuition reimbursement for our employees.

As the leader in healthcare for this region, we also believe one of our roles is to provide additional educational opportunities for individuals in the area. When the nursing shortage became a critical issue during the 1990's, Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital stepped in to provide a \$105,000 grant to SCC to help expand their nursing program and give more students the opportunity to enter this important profession.

Our latest collaborative effort with Somerset Community College addresses another critical shortage - that of radiographers. Working closely with Dr. Jo Marshall, CEO of the Somerset District, LCRH leadership and SCC officials began to lay groundwork to develop a new radiography degree program to enhance the educational opportunities for students in this area.

An essential component of the plan was funding, and Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital spearheaded a campaign to garner financial support for the new program from area hospitals in order to make offering the program financially feasible for the college. Our donation of \$332,193 along with a commitment from Wayne County Hospital, Clinton County Hospital, and Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center of \$45,000 each over the next three years, will provide the necessary start-up funds for the program. In addition to the obvious benefit of helping relieve a critical shortage of staff, this initiative will also enable many individuals to have a better job, a better standard of living and the opportunity to help others through their profession.

Why do we do this? Because our commitment to the growth and development of healthcare services to meet the needs of the people in our service area is one we take seriously. It is a partnership. We are a team. And, as our hospital continues to grow, we want to do our part to make this area an even better place to live, to work, and to play.

So, while Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital plays an important part in many very worthwhile programs and projects, few will have the impact on the future of our community and our region like our support of education and our partnerships with institutes of higher learning.

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## The Family Room

### What is Normal?

I know a woman who blows-dries her lawn mower. Yes, that is correct. She blows-dries her lawn mower. Is this woman normal? What is normal anyway?

Actually the woman who blows-dries her lawn mower is very normal and also very smart. Her lawn mower will not start when it is cold, but when it is warm it starts easily. Rather than waste energy in a futile attempt to start it when cold, she brings her lawn mower, warms it, and then starts it right away. She admitted to me that she does this on the back patio, rather than out in the yard where the neighbors might see. She does have some fear that they might question her sanity if they saw her.

What is normal is sometimes difficult to define. Something might look abnormal (blow drying a piece of lawn and garden equipment, for example) but have a perfectly rational explanation. The reverse is also true. Someone washing his hands might look very normal unless it is known that he does it hundreds of times each day in a vain attempt to keep the germs away.

As a counselor I am often asked, "Are my actions normal?" Here are my answers to some of the most frequently asked questions.

"Is it normal to be angry?" Yes,

anger is a normal human emotion. Everyone gets angry at times. If this seems unbelievable to you, consider how you would react if someone attempted to harm one of your children. More than likely you would be angry, a very normal response.

"Is it normal for couples to fight?" The answer to this question depends on what is meant by "fight?" All couples have disagreements and tense times. This is normal. Two people cannot live together and always be in harmony. Not all couples however fight physically. Nor do all couples verbally cut each other to shreds with angry words and accusations. That is not normal.

"Is it normal to cry?" Yes. God gave you the ability to cry so that you might rid yourself of painful emotions. Grief, sadness and loss are best expressed with tears. Tears help to wash away the pain that you feel inside. What is not normal is the absence of tears in very sad situations.

When you go for a month after the death of a loved one and shed not one tear, something is not going right.

"Is it normal to talk to myself?" Yes, and yes. Talking to yourself does not make you crazy. Talking to yourself is, instead, a great way to preserve sanity. Saying positive things over and over serves to counter the negative messages that may live in your

head from days past. You may be one of many people who carries on a constant dialogue in your head about what is going on around you. That does not make you crazy.

"Is it normal to fantasize about hurting someone who abused me?" I hear this question often from adults who have been victims of childhood abuse and from women who are victims of domestic violence. Yes, it is normal to think about hurting the one who hurt you, but it is not normal to act on those thoughts. While it may be OK to think about revenge, actually hurting someone only puts you on their level. As the victim works through the feelings of being abused, the desire for revenge usually goes away.

"Is it normal to want to be happy?" This may seem a strange question to some, but I have been asked. It is often accompanied by the comment, "Maybe I should just be satisfied with my unhappy life." Yes, it is normal to want to be happy. No one need feel condemned to misery.

### Religion, Domestic Violence & Depression Class

This fall Dr. Don Whitehead, pastoral counselor from Somerset, is offering three classes that are open to the public: Winning Against Depression, Domestic Violence: How Can We Help, and When Religion Gets Sick. All classes will meet at The Center for Rural Development in Somerset.

Dr. Whitehead will teach Winning Against Depression on Tuesday, October 15, from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. Dr. Whitehead has studied depression and counseled with families for more than 17 years. He has presented his ideas about depression to audiences across the state. He is a minister who blends a spiritual approach with current scientific research.

"Depression strikes many people, and yet most of us know so little about it," Dr. Whitehead states. "Depression can be fatal, because some of its victims will commit suicide. Even when not fatal, it is a painful illness that can make a person and a family miserable. Insomnia, overeating, low energy, anxiety, guilt and helplessness are just some of its many effects."

"I have had some personal experience with depression," Dr. Whitehead reports. "I know what it feels like to be depressed, and I know it does not feel good at all! I would like to help some of those depressed persons out there. Come to this semi-

nar and you will find out how you can be helped. You will learn that depression is very treatable. You will find that there is hope!"

In this seminar Dr. Whitehead will explain the causes of depression and how you will learn to recognize depression in its many forms. He adds, "and you will find out about the treatments for depression that really work."

The second seminar is Domestic Violence: How Can We Help, presented on Thursday, October 24 from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month and this class will teach participants what they can do to help someone who is being abused. Bethany House Abuse Shelter is sponsoring this class and there is no charge.

"Are you or someone you know caught in domestic violence and abuse?" Dr. Whitehead asks. "Physical, verbal and sexual abuse are happening to someone you know. At this seminar you will learn more about domestic abuse and how we can stop it. This could be important for you or a family member."

"Trying to help someone in a domestic violence situation can be very frustrating," Dr. Whitehead adds. "Often the victim will return to the abuser. This is very normal behavior, and in this class, I will help you understand why this happens. You will learn more about the causes of domestic violence and what you can do to help. This class is for victims of domestic violence and for those who try to help them."

The third seminar is When Religion Gets Sick, to be held on Thursday, November 14 from 7:00 to 8:30 p.m. "Religion continues to be a source of strength for many people," Dr. Whitehead says. "Unfortunately, religion can sometimes be harmful as well as helpful. Religion each teach unnecessary guilt, rigid legalism and rule worship that has little in common with what Jesus or the prophets taught."

"People come to me for counseling who are victims of unhealthy religious teaching," Dr. Whitehead says. "The effects of this kind of teaching can last for years. I am interested in helping people trade in the guilt and shame for a religion of freedom and joy."

"You will come away from this learning experience understanding the difference between sick religion and healthy, healing religious belief," Dr. Whitehead continues. (WARNING: Rumor has it that Dr. Whitehead will play guitar and sing at some point during this workshop.)

Dr. Whitehead has counseled people about personal, marriage and family problems since 1985. His newspaper column appears in six area newspapers. He can also be heard on Clear Channel Radio in Somerset. As a minister and a counselor, he has a unique insight into the human condition. 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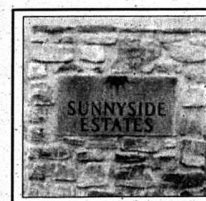


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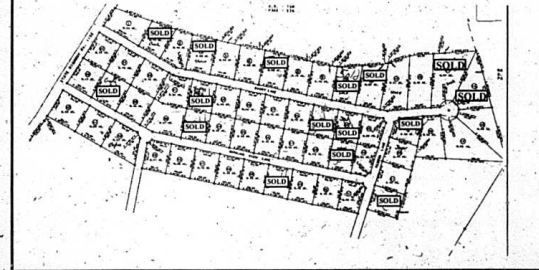

## Agricultural News

### County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (C) will hold its monthly meeting open to the public the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8:00 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County FSA Office located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 3.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA committee operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgement and knowledge to make decisions.

**Power of Attorney Forms**  
If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it is no longer valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney form is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney, form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). Non-FSA power of attorney forms currently on file are not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. It is noted that the authorizing signature on the FSA-211, must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

**Warehouse Designation**  
Producers that did not designate their burley tobacco quota to a buying point during the initial designation period, which ended on August 1st, must wait until the first regular redesignation period. Producers will be limited to designate for the farm one time during each regular redesignation period. Therefore, if a farm has multiple tenants which will market tobacco at separate buying points; the farm operator will need to designate for all those tenants at the same time.

September 30-October 4, 2002 with card effective October 14, 2002  
October 28-November 1, 2002 with card effective November 11, 2002.

December 02-December 06, 2002 with card effective December 16, 2002.

December 27-January 3, 2003 with card effective January 13, 2003.  
**Importer Assessment Rates for Burley Tobacco**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced assessment rates effective October 1, on unmanufactured burley tobacco imported for consumption. Unmanufactured tobacco is any tobacco that is not processed and packaged as a consumer tobacco product. The assessment rates are the same as for domestic

cally-produced burley tobacco and will remain in effect through September 30, 2003.

Burley tobacco importer assessment rates effective October 1, 2002 through September 30, 2003 cents for no-net-cost is 2 cents per pound of 4,4092 cents per kilogram.

The total amount of assessments is due within 10 business days after imported commerce of the U.S. Customs Service for entry for consumption into the commerce of the U.S. Failure to pay or timely pay the amount of assessment due can result in a marketing penalty of \$1.48 per pound, or \$3.26 per kilogram for the amount of burley tobacco on which such failure occurred.

### Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP)

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Signup for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines by completing with rules and regulations.

Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

### County Committee Election

As of August 1st the local FSA office began accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 2, 2002.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agri-

cultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 28, 2002.
