## More money available for cattle farmers

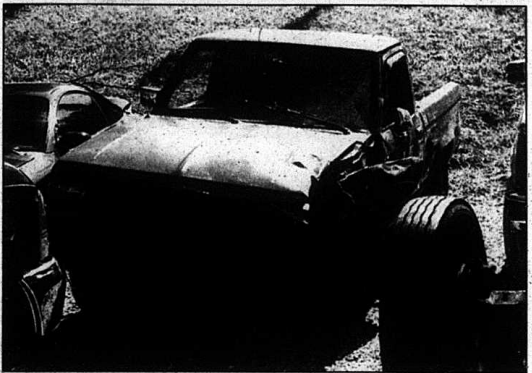
The Rockcastle County Cattlemen's Association will utilize remaining funds (\$33,000) from the spring Genetic Improvement Program through a second funding cycle.

Applications will be available Nov. 1 through Dec. 2 at the Rockcastle County Cooperative Extension Service office. Priority will be given to producers who did not receive funds in the first cycle.

However, if funds are available, additional request will be taken from previous participants.

The genetic improvement program assists farmers in purchasing bulls with high quality genetics. Expected Progeny Difference (EPD's) guidelines set by the state are mini-

## Important meeting held concerning Burley Co-op

Just as outside forces are eroding Kentucky's tobacco culture, a split threatens the heart of the burley business.

Direct sales, a possible farmer buyout and dwindling demand are reshaping the market for what was once the state's top cash producer for farms.

And many farmers are questioning the future need for a price support system that has changed little in the last 40 years. Is the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative becoming obsolete?

Once a solid, stolid, predictable bastion of the burley business, the co-op is now fraught with fault lines that could crack wide open.

"There's been just a ground swell of farmers notifying people they want a change," said Roger Quarles, a Georgetown tobacco farmer, who sits

on the co-op board.

Wednesday, seven directors joined the 30 member board that represents thousands in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana and Missouri, who have a stake in burley.

At least one incumbent was unseated under a new one-man, one-vote system that wrestled power out of the hands of tobacco-rich counties.

"Another longtime director, 'W.' Rusty Thompson of Woodford County, apparently scraped by with less than a 20-vote margin to cling to his seat.

But the big earthquake that could erupt at this week's meeting - and possibly break open the insular co-op - is a burgeoning coup.

Quarles said he planned to challenge Henry West of Paint Lick for leadership of the co-op. West has been president for only a year, but

it's been a tumultuous one.

West, who since 1995 had served as co-op vice president under Rod Kuegel, who is now president emeritus, is seen as closely allied with longtime co-op Chief Executive Officer Danny McKinney of Rockcastle County.

And many co-op members and directors don't blame West as much as McKinney for the faux pas of the past year, including:

• A \$1.4 million ad campaign aimed at getting burley growers to continue participation in the federal price support program - and ensure the need for a co-op.

• Paying \$1.25 million for an old tobacco warehouse in Cynthiana after a controversial one-on-one phone vote between West and individual directors.

• Surprisingly killing off the progressive, diversification-oriented Commodity Growers Cooperative, and then trying to pass the deed off as a "restructuring" - minus funding.

McKinney and his executive compensation have become lightning rods for critics.

**Dissension in the ranks**

McKinney said he thinks he's become a target for members because "I'm the one out front, and the one out front usually draws the fire. Personalities and politics get all mixed up some times. From that, you have dissension and divisiveness."

In 2002, McKinney's salary should be at least \$135,000 according to co-op minutes.

McKinney would not say what his salary actually is.

Some other perks he acknowledges: McKinney gets one of five co-op vehicles that he also can put to personal use. Besides the co-op standard retirement package, McKinney is also guaranteed a bonus that means he will receive another 25 percent of his salary for at least 15 years. By age 64, his death benefits will top

## Two more die in local wrecks

Two more people died on Rockcastle County highways last week bringing the total for the year to 12.

On Friday, Daniel Evans, 33, of Whitley County, died in a single vehicle accident on Interstate 75 at the 50 mile marker.

According to Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell, Evans apparently lost control on the slick road, hit the cliff and ended up in the median.

Dowell said that the truck Evans was driving landed on top of him after he was ejected from the vehicle.

Evans was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle Hospital due to massive and internal injuries. The accident occurred around 7 p.m.

On Saturday, a local man was also killed in an automobile accident

involving an all-terrain vehicle.

Frankie E. Marler, 29, of Sand Springs, died after the four wheeler he was driving collided head on with a Ford Ranger truck driven by Roscoe Smith, 39, of Mt. Vernon.

The wreck occurred on Hwy. 1249 around 2:45 p.m.

Kentucky State Trooper Late Owens said that Marler also had a passenger on his four wheeler. Jonathan W. Taylor, 16, who was seriously injured in the wreck.

Taylor was taken to Rockcastle Hospital and later transferred to the UK Medical Center in Lexington, where he was listed in serious condition on Saturday.

Smith's passenger, Gregory Thomas, 18, of Livingston, was not injured in the wreck.

## Court discusses prisoner cutbacks

The Rockcastle County Detention Center has been a money making business for the county since recent renovation and remodeling, but that may soon change.

Rockcastle County Jailor James Miller told the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court on Tuesday that the State Department of Corrections was beginning to limit the number of prisoners that the local jail could hold.

Miller also said that the county was currently holding about 40 local prisoners, which is a big increase from previous years.

The problem for the county is that they receive no money for housing local prisoners, but they do receive money for holding state prisoners.

Miller said that he had been able to keep about ten more prisoners than the state allowed for a long time, but it looked as if that was going to change soon.

There is a new director with the corrections department who is committed to keeping the number of prisoners in jail to the regulations set by the state, Miller said.

The local jail has been holding about 90 prisoners a day and last month the county's payment from the state alone was over \$60,000.

The county spent over \$1 million on the jail renovation a couple of years ago and keeping less prisoners will certainly hurt the county's ability to pay the debt service on the jail.

Miller said that in order for the detention center to continue making

money the county would need to provide more beds, possibly on the second floor of the courthouse or even building a new facility.

Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlottis said that building a new facility would be difficult for the county at this time, but that all options are being considered.

The fiscal court also briefly discussed improvements at the jail and the Rockcastle County Animal Shelter, which will open in Roundstone soon.

## RCMS site of exercise

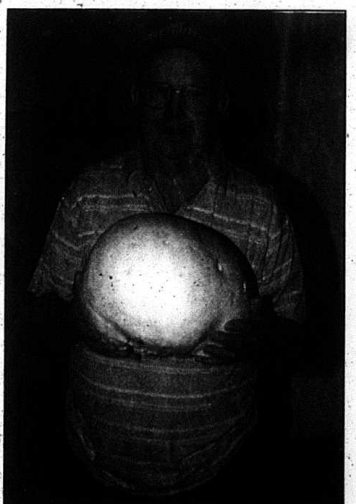
The Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program (CSEPP) will hold its annual exercise Wednesday, October 23.

## Guard against pneumonia

"Shots" are not just for children. We are getting more and more useful vaccines for other infections and many of these are for older age groups. One of the most important vaccines is the pneumonia shot.

Pneumococcus is a bacteria which frequently causes pneumonia as well as a number of other serious infections, such as meningitis. This shot will protect a person against 90% of the important strains of this bacteria and help prevent a serious illness.

Often this infection strikes and spreads so rapidly that it becomes life-threatening before antibiotics can take effect. This is especially true in the elderly. The vaccine may give a person that extra protection he needs to keep a serious infection at bay or slow the spread of infection until antibiotics take effect.

Who should get the vaccine? Like with flu shots, those who are at highest risk are persons over 50 and anyone with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart, lung or kidney disease. The vaccine is extremely im-

portant for anyone who has had his spleen removed. Your doctor can advise you about the many other indications that might exist for you.

Serious side effects from the vaccine are rare, but local reactions of soreness, a low-grade fever and mild muscle aches are not uncommon.

In most respects it is similar to the flu shot, but the one big difference is that the shot is only given once, not each year. However, many doctors are now giving a booster shot if it has been over six years since the first shot.

**SHOULD THE BODY BE VIEWED?**

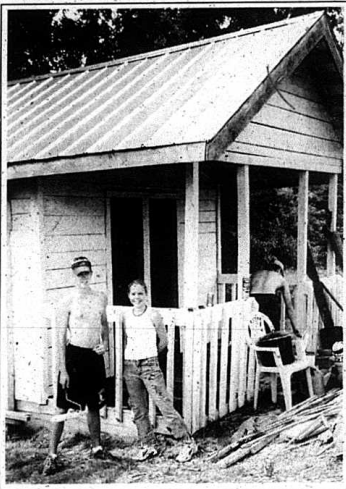
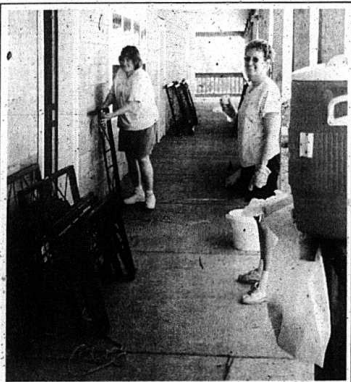
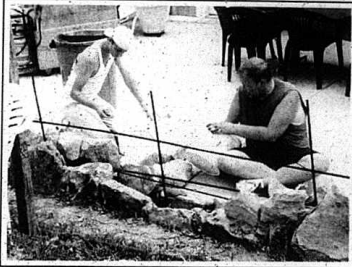
expect that this had been a work camp! Each participant rose early each morning to eat and get ready by eight a.m.

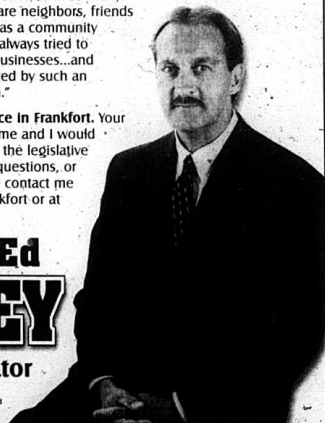

Prior was a Lieutenant on Engine 601 and was probably once assigned to the truck now located in Corbin, which is Engine 604.

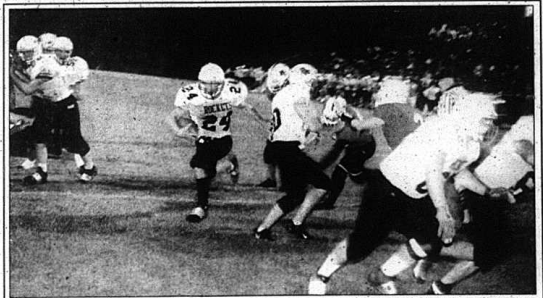

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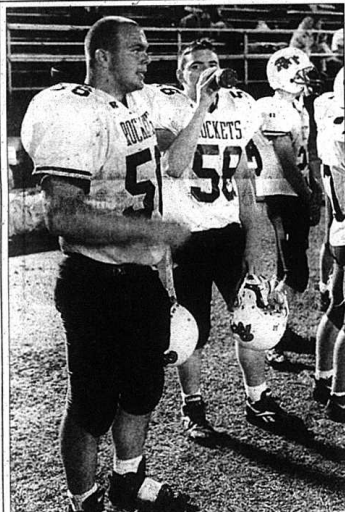

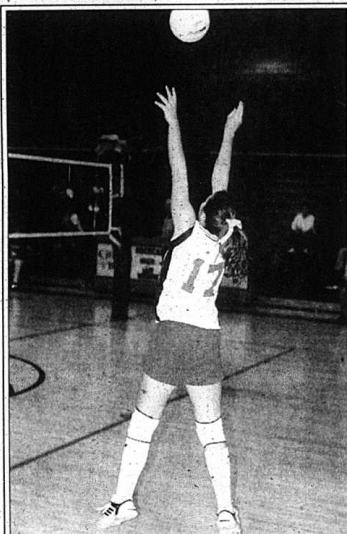
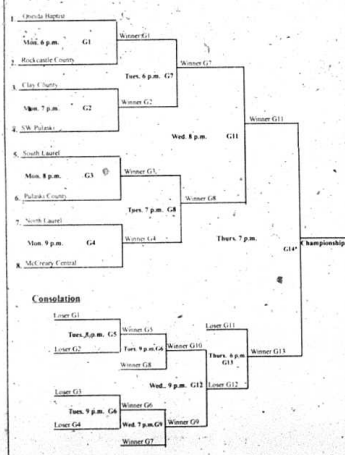


Quarterback Aaron Anderkin gets instructions from Rocket head coach Tom Larkery on Friday night. The Rockets easily defeated Knott County Central.

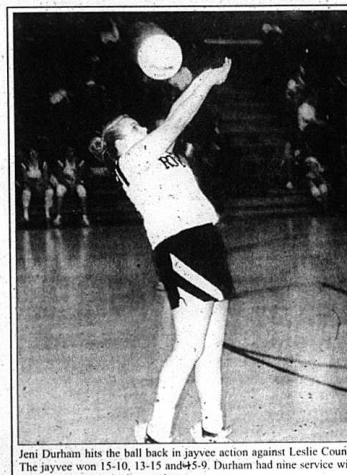

\$850,000. "If Danny isn't replaced, I think you'll see a lot of angry farmers. And I think farmers think they can't replace Danny without replacing Henry," said John Fritz Jr., past president of the industry ombudsman group, the Council for Burley Tobacco. Fritz said he asked for an audit of all co-op expenditures, from the

\$200,000 in directors' fees projected through September 30, 2002, to the \$35,000 invitation-only annual meeting on Wednesday.

"It's a whole lot easier to spend other people's money. Where's all this expense money going?" Fritz said. "There's no watchdog or anybody.... It's kind of like a private boy's club."

The co-op exists to buy all the tobacco that the cigarette makers won't. The co-op holds onto the surplus, then sells pool stock when it can, using the money to pay off the

government loans used to buy the tobacco. Millions of pounds of tobacco sitting in the warehouse can rack up years of expenses: processing, storage, insurance and the overhead of co-op expenses.

**Big unresolved questions**  
When the tobacco is finally sold, any difference between sale price and accrued expense has to be covered. That shortfall comes directly out of farmers' pockets in the form of what the co-op calls the "no-net-fund" pennies per pound collected as each bale of burley is sold.

Including salaries and benefits, \$11 million in overhead expenses were added to the cost of tobacco in pool storage through September 30, 2001, according to the co-op's pro-pays balance sheet.

No one knows what it will mean for farmers if the co-op goes under. Burley growers are lobbying hard in Washington for a buyout, but that could end the current quota system and make the USDA-run program virtually obsolete.

Another unresolved question is what would happen to the co-op's own trust fund. Now at more than \$25 million, the nest egg was built up from a one-time tobacco sale in the

1980s when McKinney convinced the USDA to let the co-op buy out the pool, then turned around and sold it for a huge profit.

# California artist visits her roots

Carol Henry is a native of Hamilton, Ohio, now living and working in Malibu, California. 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## Agricultural News

### Power of Attorney Forms

If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it is not valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney form is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney, Form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). New FSA power of attorney forms currently on file are not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. Farmers are cautioned that the authorizing signature on the FSA-211, must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

### Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP)

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Signup for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

### Designation By Landowner Method

The designation by landowner method of dividing a farm is the division of contract acres, allotments, or quotas in the manner AGREED to by all present farm owners and/or tenants or transferees. Sellers must have owned the farm for three years prior to the date of designation by landowner method. The County Committee may waive the 3-year ownership requirement of either of the following apply:

- COC determines the sale was not primarily to keep or sell allotments, quotas, or contract acres.
  - Land sold will be devoted to nonagricultural, recreational, residential or industrial use.
- The designation by landowner method may be used when any of the following apply:
- Part of a farm or tract is sold or ownership is transferred.
  - An entire farm or tract is sold to 2 or more persons.
  - Farm or tract ownership is transferred to 2 or more persons.

With the designation by landowner method the 1,000 pound rule also applies when there is a change in ownership. Thus, if a resulting farm has less than 1,000 pounds of tobacco quota the owner shall either:

- Purchase additional quota to make 1,000 pounds.
- Sell the quota.
- Combine the quota with another farm to make 1,000 pounds. An FSA-155, Request for Farm Reconstitution shall be signed by ALL sellers, buyers and if applicable, the holder or the deed of trust, lien holder or mortgage holder, state or county.

### County Committee Election

**Coming Soon**  
As of August 1st the local FSA office began accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 2, 2002.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 28, 2002.

### Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

### Join Fall Field Day

Eastern Kentucky University Department of Agriculture and the Kentucky Department of Agriculture will be sponsoring a Joint Fall Field Day on October 10, at EKVU's Meadowbrook Farm. Demonstrations and tours will begin at 4:00 p.m. with a meal following at 6:00 p.m. Program and Discussion to immediately following the meal. Topics will include Farm Program, FFA Recognition & Report on Agriculture, To-

bacco Buyout & Receiving Station and Madison County Ag Development Funds.

### Livestock Compensation Program (LCP)

On September 29, Secretary Veneman announced the 2002 Livestock Compensation Program. This program will provide assistance to certain livestock producers experiencing severe 2002 crop year feed and pasture losses due to drought. The program is available only in counties named as primary counties under a Secretarial disaster designation by a Governor. At this time Rockcastle County is NOT one of those counties.

## The Family Room

**Many Are Called, But Few Succeed.**  
Trevor has been trying to quit smoking. (All characters are fictional.) After thirty-five years as a smoker, he is not finding it to be an easy task. "The cravings are horrible," he says. "It's the first thing I think about in the morning, and the last thing at night. When I am with someone else who is smoking, it takes all my will power not to have a cigarette. I'm not sure I can hold out much longer."

How long has Trevor been without a cigarette? Forty-eight hours. "I know that doesn't seem long to anyone else," he explains, "but to me it has been an eternity."

Trevor has quit smoking many times before, usually for a week to three months at a time. "The cravings will get so bad or something will happen to stress me out," he reports, "and I will pick up a cigarette again. The longest I ever went was three months, and then our daughter was born. I had a cigarette afterwards and I was hooked again. Other people quit smoking. Why can't I? I guess I am a weakling with no willpower." Is Trevor a weakling? Does he lack willpower? A recent study of the California Smokers, Hotline sheds some light on the subject. (The study appears in the most recent issue of New England Journal of Medicine.) The hotline enrolled 3,282 smokers who wanted to quit. All of the callers received a packet of information to help them quit.

At the end of one month only 10% of the smokers who tried to quit on their own had succeeded. This demonstrates how difficult it is to quit smoking.

Nicotine is a very addictive drug. At the end of a year only 4% of those who tried to quit on their own had succeeded. That is an amazing statistic because it graphically illustrates the difficulty of quitting.

Trevor's difficulty in quitting smoking has nothing to do with willpower.

He is up against one of the most addictive of drugs, nicotine. He is hooked, and it will be very difficult to get unhooked on his own. Only four out of one hundred people were able to quit for a year on their own.

The mistake that Trevor made is that he tried to do it on his own. Statistics show that help from the outside will increase his chances of success. The study quoted above also looked at people who received help in trying to quit. Each of these received an average of three phone calls from a trained counselor over the space of one to two months. Of these 21% were smoke free after a month, and 8% were smoke free for a year. That is double the success for those who tried by their own.

Outside help improves one's chances for success when trying to quit smoking.

Getting help is not a sign of weakness but a sign of intelligence. Where can Trevor find help? I recommend that he start with his family physician. Zyban is a drug that contracts the effects of nicotine. It is available only by prescription and is not for everyone. There are also several systems of nicotine replacement such as the patch or inhalers that can be helpful in the short term. Trevor can also find a group for those who are trying to quit. (Call the American Cancer Society or the local health department.)

Good luck to you as you try to quit!

# Stop Identity Theft In Its Tracks



*The following list provides tips on how to stop an ID theft before it happens. Proactive measures provide the best protection for your assets and your good name.*

- ... Do not give out financial information such as checking account and credit card numbers - especially your Social Security Number - on the phone unless you initiate the call and know the person or company you're dealing with.
- ... Do not pre-print your driver's license, telephone, or Social Security numbers on your checks.
- ... Report lost or stolen checks immediately. Also, review new checks to make sure none has been stolen in transit.
- ... Store cancelled checks and new checks - in a safe place.
- ... Guard your personal identification numbers (PIN's) for your ATM and credit cards, and do not write on or keep your PIN's with your cards. You should also guard your ATM and credit card receipts. Thieves can use them to access your accounts.
- ... Be creative in selecting personal identification numbers for your ATM and credit cards, and passwords that enable you to access your accounts. Do not use birth dates, part of your social Security Number or driver's license number, address, or children's or spouse's names. Remember, if someone has stolen your identity, he or she probably has some or all of this information.
- ... If you receive financial solicitation that you're not interested in, tear them up before throwing them away, so thieves can't use them to assume your identity. Shred or make unreadable any other financial documents, such as bank statements or invoices, before disposing of them.
- ... Do not put outgoing mail in or on your mailbox. Drop it into a secure, official Postal Service collection box. Thieves may use your mail to steal your identity.
- ... If regular bills fail to reach you, call the company to find out why. Someone may have filed a false change-of-address notice to divert your information to his or her address.
- ... If your bills include suspicious items, do not ignore them. Instead, investigate immediately to head off any possible fraud before it occurs.
- ... Periodically contact the major credit reporting companies to review your file and make certain the information is correct. For a small fee, you can obtain a copy of your credit report at any time.

# Yards to Paradise

## Hedges Serve Many Purposes

Much shrubbery, sometimes trees or flowers, can be useful as hedging. Let's consider some reasons for planting a hedge, and some of the plant species that may work in your situation.

Hedging is less trendy at present, but there are still some very real reasons to plant a hedge in our landscapes.

I think the number one reason for hedgerows today in our yards is for privacy.

Plants with many small branches and leaves, usually somewhat upright in form, are preferable, as is evergreen shrubbery.

Neatly trimmed and shaped hedges are considered "formal" hedges.

Naturalized plants are "informal" and require less regular shearing or pruning. (We will cover informal hedges mostly, but several of the plants discussed in the following paragraphs can be sheared into formal grandeur.)

To obtain privacy, use plants with dense foliage, or stagger the planting into a zig-zag pattern, or use more than one kind of plant in a second or

third row of plants to create an effective visual barrier.

Here is a fairly long listing of deciduous hedge plants: amur maple, burning bush, broom, blueberry, barberry, bayberry, clethra, chokeberry, chokecherry, crab apples, crape myrtle, dogwoods, forsythia, hazel, honeysuckle, hydrangea, lilac, ninebark, pea tree, potentilla, pyracantha, nandina, photinia, sea buckthorn, Russian olive, spiraea, strawberry tree, viburnum (various), willow (some).

These evergreen plants can be used as hedges (you may find others to add): arbutus, boxwood, Lawson and incense cedar, Lzland cypress, Arizona cypress, camellia, cleyra, azaleas, cryptomeria, euonymus (such as Manhattan), junipers, hemlock, laurel, Oregon grape, osmanthus, mugo pine, evergreen viburnum, holly (many varieties, including Foster, Nellie Stevens, China girl, blue princess, and many more), taxus. Double check the cultivar to be sure it is suitable in your planting zone.

One reason to do a hedge is that the beauty appeals to the homeowner. So many of the hedge plants, even

some trees, can become great looking hedges with sufficient regular attention.

Again, a more formal hedge requires a lot of work. Plants such as boxwoods, junipers, yews and arbutus enable a formal look with less effort.

Hedges for purposes of keeping out animals or human traffic are thick, and often include thorns, to hinder easy passage. Barberies are often used for this purpose. Other species could include hawthorn, native wild plum, firethorn (pyracantha), roses, Osage orange, some hollies.

Division of property, including property line plantings, can be done by a row of trees or shrubs. There are many choices, among them: privet, arbutus, hemlock, Leyland cypress, viburnum, taxus, pines, spruce, holly, burning bush, etc.

Hedgerows are often effective windbreaks. Evergreen trees and shrubs work year-round so are more in demand here. Multiple rows of varied plant materials work better than just a single row of plants for the purpose of slowing wind or snow.

Hedges are homes and hiding places for wildlife. Winged creatures, such as birds and butterflies depend on protected areas for homes and for hiding from storms and predators. Four and six legged critters love hedgerows too. Trees and shrubs that also bear seed or berries are of double value to wildlife.

Though neat hedges can be more trouble than many landscape features, perhaps some hedges are what you and your yard need so that you may enjoy your space in the outdoors more.

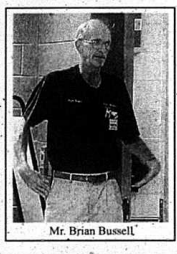

## Waste Not Adds to Waist

We're all familiar with the adage, "waste not, want not." But sometimes when we try not to waste food, it shows up on our waists and other parts of our bodies as well. The super-sized foods, so common today, can add to our sizes. And since portion sizes also have been getting bigger, so are people of all ages.

If you're an active person, the larger-sized food portions probably may be appropriate, but if you're sedentary, the food probably will be too much for your activity level. Remember to match food serving sizes to the degree of your physical activity.

Research comparing common food portions with the standard serving sizes of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Food Guide Pyramid revealed some interesting facts. Servings of cooked pasta often were about five times the recommended FGP portion equivalent of a first-sized portion of pasta. Muffins weighed more than three times the standard FGP size. Additionally, food portions in the marketplace have grown consistently larger. More than two-thirds, 67 percent to be exact, of Americans eat everything, or almost everything, on their plates. If you super-size a fast food meal for a few cents, the added calories won't make sense. Generally, consuming 100 calories beyond your nutritional needs each day can add 10 pounds annually to your weight. These extra pounds will add up over time. It's much easier and healthier to maintain an appropriate weight than to try to take off three or four years' worth of super-sized meals.

It's important to follow the recommended serving sizes of the major groups in the Food Guide Pyramid. These five general groups (bread, fruits, vegetables, meat and dairy and fats, oils and sweets) collectively provide the good balance of nutritional foods. General

daily recommendations are bread, six to 11 servings; vegetables, three to five; fruits, two to four servings; meat, five to seven ounces; and dairy two to three servings. Sparingly use fats, oils and sweets because they provide little nutritional value, but many calories. Consume only 53 to 93 grams of total fat and six to 18 teaspoons of total added sugars daily, depending on your activity level.

The higher numbers of servings total about 2,800 calories a day. This is a good diet for teenagers, active men and very active women. The lower serving numbers provide about 1,600 calories daily, which is a maintenance diet for smaller or more inactive people. Pregnant and nursing women, children under two years and some other groups have special nutritional needs beyond weight control.

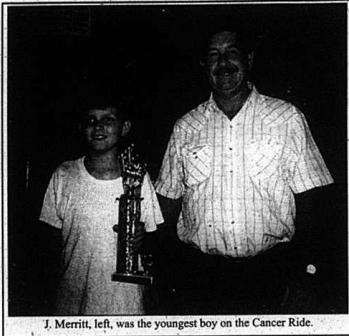
Here are some more tips to help you consume the appropriate serving portions. Use the two-thirds, one-third rule for a balanced meal. Vegetables, grains and fruits should occupy about two-thirds of the plate and meat, poultry or fish the remaining one-third. This is especially important when you're eating in a restaurant that has a "buffet."

Determine the number of servings by reading food labels when you buy groceries. If the package has more servings than you have people to eat the food, prepare a portion of the food sufficient for eaters, or use the excess for leftovers. At home, measure servings with a food scale and measuring cup until you are comfortable estimating the recommended serving sizes. Prepare standardized recipes that make a known quantity. Prepare menus in advance to curb impulse eating.

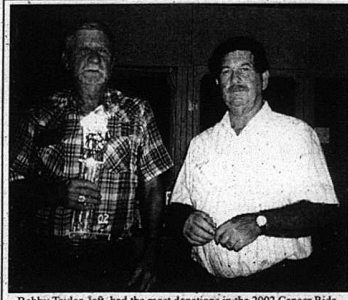

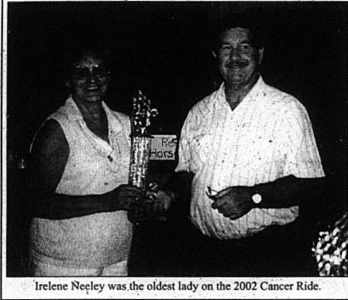
Gene Philbeck, right, is shown with Angel Philbeck, the youngest girl rider in the 2002 Cancer Ride.

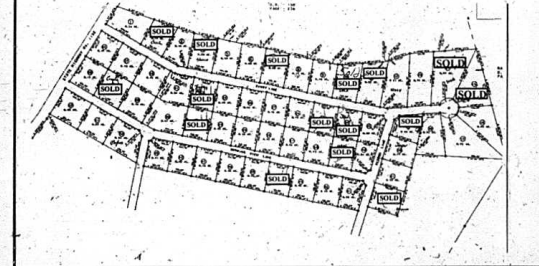
