Former officer charged after police search property

Federal drug agents swept through Brodhead and Stanford last week rounding up eight people, including a former Mt. Vernon police officer, accused of running a cocaine and marijuana operation that stretched from Kentucky to Texas.

The eight men arrested were charged with drug trafficking and placed in federal custody in Lexington, marking the end of a 15-month investigation that involved 18 federal, state and local law enforcement agencies.

A former Mount Vernon police officer, Larry Thompson, 48, of Brodhead was described as the operator of a "major" drug ring broken up by last Wednesday's arrests.

Also arrested in the raids that took place at various locations were Robert Durham, 54, Nathaniel Pope, 20, Raul Tomo, 32, George Moore, 47, Darlene Moore, 37, Josh McClure, 20, all of Stanford and Salvador "Julio" Reyes of Brodhead.

Thompson was a Mt. Vernon police officer for six years and left the force ten years ago, according to Mt. Vernon Chief Bill Mink. Mink said to his knowledge Thompson has not worked in law enforcement since then.

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration and office of U.S. Attorney Gregory F. Van Tatenhove,

announced that the arrests had been made in a written press release issued Friday.

Approximately 60 law enforcement officers, including Mt. Vernon police officer Barry Adams were involved in the arrests and the execution of the nine federal search warrants last Wednesday.

In addition to the DEA and the U.S. Attorney, agencies participating in the investigation included the

Kentucky State Police, Lexington Police, U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service the Internal Revenue Service and several other law enforcement agencies.

A detention hearing was held in federal court for Thompson on Tuesday. According to authorities Thompson will likely be indicted in federal court on Thursday and he is still being held without bond.

Council votes to take in five more roads

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted on Monday night to take five more roads inside the city limits into the city's road work program.

City Engineer Luther Galloway suggested the city take in four streets, but in the end the council voted to take in five.

The five streets named had not been maintained by the city or the county in recent years, mainly because the city had no deed or easements to the roads and the county did not maintain them in recent years because they are in the city limits of Mt. Vernon.

One of the streets accepted is that of a Mt. Vernon council member and another is that of a local doctor and his wife who have complained persistently about the condition of their road.

Galloway and city maintenance supervisor Dennis McClure recently surveyed all the streets inside the city of Mt. Vernon and Galloway reported on the length and condition of each road.

The five roads that the council agreed to maintain on Monday night are the road in Four Sons Subdivision, which runs from West Main Street, near the Hwy. 461 by-pass, Redbud Drive, which runs off Chestnut Drive in Chestnut Hills Subdivision, which connects with Paul Street and Hillcrest Drive, which extends off Redbud Drive in the same subdivision.

The council also voted to take in Jerri Lane, on the end from the Hwy. 461 by-pass, which runs behind Town and Country Motors and McHaffey's Sporting Goods. The council also voted to take in Lower Drive, which runs off the Sand Springs Road on Town Hill.

Councilwoman Lonetta Daugherty lives on the portion of Jerri Lane that was put on the city's road maintenance list. Dr. James Cunningham and his wife Sue, live on Hillcrest Drive and they have been very vocal about the condition of their road and the fact that neither the city or county would maintain it, as has Daugherty.

Galloway was very detailed about the condition of the roads in the city and at one point told the council that if they brought all roads in the city up to specifications it could cost the city as much as \$2.6 million.

But in almost the same breath he said that if the city did that it would cause more problems that it would benefit the city because the widen-

ing of many streets would bring the roads in question too close to the dwellings along the streets.

Galloway said that many streets in the city are as narrow as eight feet, but that because of the low volume of traffic, the width of the streets does not seem to be a problem.

Galloway told the council that the city currently has just over 17 miles of city streets and spends about \$40,000 per year resurfacing some of those streets.

Councilman Joe Mullins suggested that the city use some of their municipal aid money from the state to upgrade one street at a time and not necessarily resurface some streets that are currently in good shape.

Galloway and McClure recorded 117 city streets, which includes many streets that are still not worked by the city or the county.

In other business, Mayor Karen King told the council that city attorney John Clontz had recommended that the council hire an engineer from Cincinnati to review the recent \$5.4

million renovation and expansion project at the city's water treatment plant.

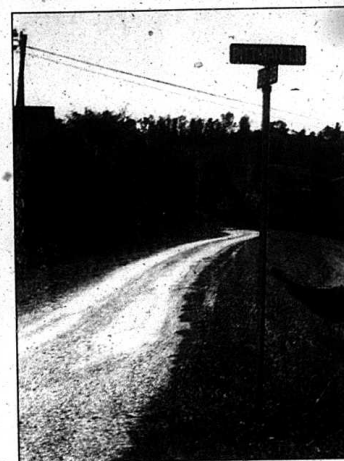
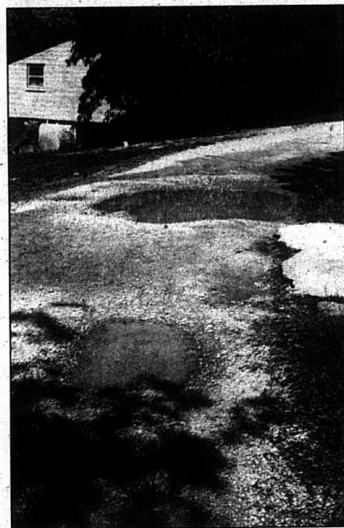
King said that Nesbitt Engineering, who was in charge of the project gave the city bad advice on several things to do with the project, including a second transmission line from Lake Linville to the city's water treatment plant.

Mayor King said after the meeting that the city was anticipating bringing in four million gallons of water a day into the plant after the renovation project was complete, but that the city was only able to get about two million gallons a day into the plant as of now.

"That is basically the amount of water we were getting into the plant before the huge project and Nesbitt told us we would be okay if we put in a second transmission line, but that did not work either," said Mayor King.

The second transmission line cost the city about \$34,000 and according to King did not do anything to alleviate the problem.

Representative candidate has spent no time in the ROCK

The general election is less than two weeks away and, Rockcastle County voters have a lot of decisions to make.

In Mt. Vernon, they will choose the first full-time paid Mayor in the history of the city.

Two school board members will be elected and there are two magisterial races, which, in the end, could change the direction of the fiscal court.

But it is hard to believe that Long apparently doesn't think that he should do anything in Rockcastle County to make voters aware of what he stands for, or even what kind of

legislator he thinks he will make.

One thing Rockcastle voters should keep in mind, if Long doesn't care enough about Rockcastle County to make the slightest efforts to solicit votes in the county, what do you think he will do for the county if he were to get elected to the state house. Can you spell nothing?

Representative Ford is in a position now more than ever to help Lincoln and Rockcastle County residents.

He has been the minority leader in the House and he has the ear of his fellow legislators and Governor Patton.

I had some business acquaintances coming in from Little Rock who wanted to see what the Federation of Appalachian Housing Enterprises (FAHE) does to create affordable housing and yet promised to haul them around a few counties.

It's always a pleasure to show off good work, especially when there's a chance you might enlist somebody else to join you in it. And besides that, Sister Mary Barbara Phillipart had driven all the way from Arkansas on Friday night to make the visit. Sister Barbara works for the Diocese of Little Rock and is part of the investment committee for The Seton Enablement Fund, which loans money to organizations like FAHE so we can keep on doing the work we do.

Sister Barbara is not a "spring chicken" and she spends most of her time preparing bilingual radio broadcasts for Spanish and English speaking audiences in Little Rock. In her spare time she does due-diligence and loan underwriting for the Seton Fund which is largely comprised of retirement savings from folks like herself. "We don't need to make much profit but we can't afford to lose the principal," she said.

Profit to Sister Barbara is 1% interest and the knowledge that the rest did good work. The more good work, the better.

"But you have to have confidence that the principal is going to be re-

paid and that's why I'm here," she said.

And that's why I was up early on Saturday morning to go tooling around with Sister Barbara and Jim King (Ex. Director of FAHE) and his three kids and 16 year-old Emma who had ridden through most of Kentucky after dark to make sure Sister Barbara didn't go to sleep.

We saw Irvine and the fine work that Brenda Rice has done to restore some downtown buildings and turn them into beautiful apartments for folks who never dreamed of having one. We saw Campbell Street in Lancaster and I tried to talk about the chute (shoot) and how wonderful it is that that community is being revitalized. But we saw nothing of the eastern hills where the bulk of FAHE's work goes on.

Still Sister Mary Barbara and Emma were content. Maybe most content when we stopped in Paint Lick for Village Fest and had our lunch from the street vendors. Everything from soupbreads and corn bread to Mexican everything cooked right on the street. And good stuff to take home.

Honey and molasses and oh-so-fresh corn meal ground on the spot. Painted gourds and gingerbread and fried apple pies. Cookies and fruit

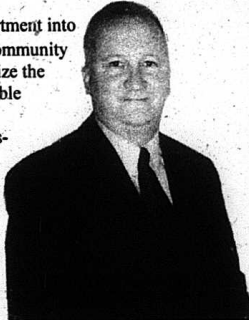

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What is a Pap Smear?

 Pap smears are the primary method of detecting early cancer of the cervix (the tip of the uterus). In fact, the test is so useful and sensitive, it can detect changes as they are occurring, years before they ever become cancerous.

Pap smears are graded on a scale, depending on how severe the changes are. The range is from perfectly normal to cancerous. When a woman is found to have an abnormal Pap smear, it is often just a very low-grade abnormality. These minor changes can be rechecked in a few months. Often these changes are due to inflammation, such as from an infection with yeast or trichomonas. These possibilities should be checked out and treated before the Pap smear is repeated.

More severe changes call for a prompt evaluation. These changes are usually evaluated with a microscope called a colposcope which magnifies the cervix 16-fold or more.

This allows the doctor to see the changes in the blood vessels and tissues better and to biopsy the most abnormal areas.

Researchers have found that most abnormal pap smears are due to the woman having been exposed to a virus called the human papilloma virus, usually at an early age. The cells of the cervix are most susceptible to the harmful effects of this virus during the teenage years. It is not uncommon for women in their early 20's to develop severe changes or even cancer. This is especially true for smokers, because smoking decreases a person's folic acid and reduces the cells' resistance to these changes.

A woman should have a Pap smear each year long with a general exam and evaluation of the uterus and ovaries.

It was another shoutout for the defense And those kids play with a lot of pride.

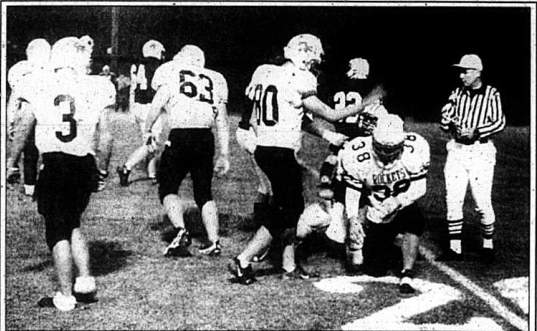

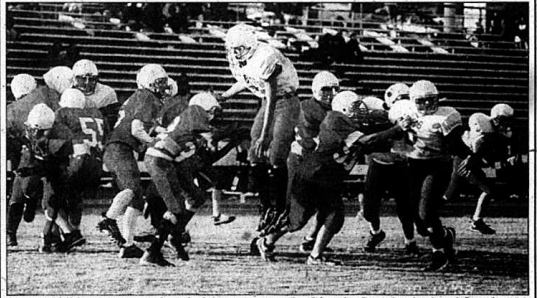

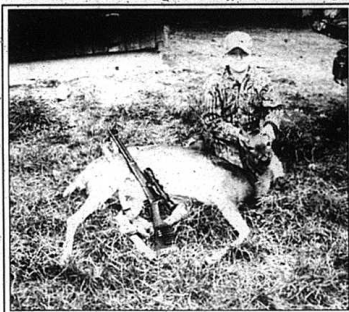
KSNA to hold nursing conference at Renfro

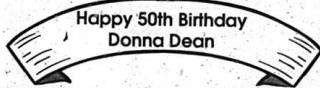

King said that depending on the results of the individual review by the Cincinnati firm, she may suggest legal action against Nesbitt. Currently the city still owes Nesbitt \$14,000, but King said she has no intentions of paying the final payment until the review of the project is complete.

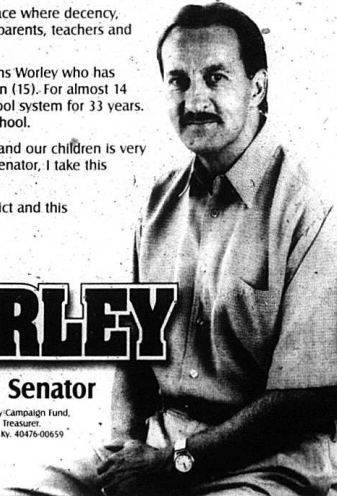

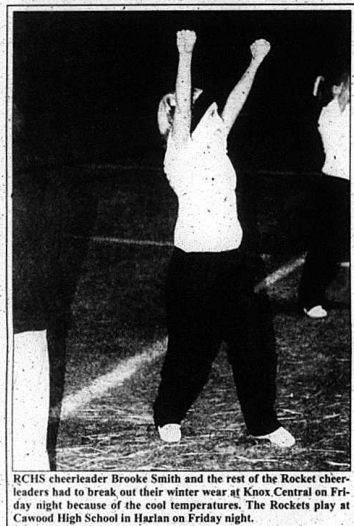
Howard deployed

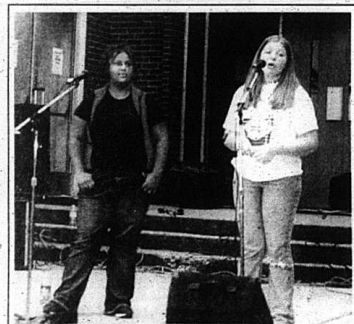

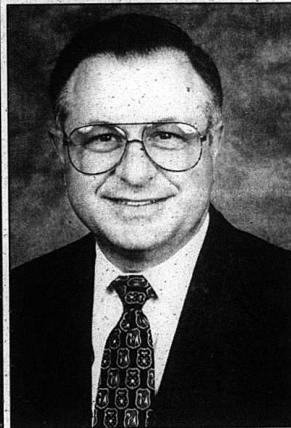

Yards to Paradise

Deciduous Shade Trees for Home Landscaping

No matter if your yard could use a new shade tree, a complete landscape job, or a replacement of an old or dead tree in a mature landscape surrounding an older home, consider selecting some of the following species which all drop their leaves over-winter.

Both spring and fall are great times to plant new trees in Zones 6 or greater (generally, below the Mason-Dixon line, or south of the Ohio River). These are the only times to plant bare-root trees or to move trees, though potted or containerized trees as well as balled and burlapped trees can basically be planted anytime the soil is not frozen if given proper care.

Let's begin with favorites, then venture a bit "out on a limb" perhaps, as we take a look at shade trees which drop their leaves in the fall.

Maple trees seem to be on every street, in just about every yard. There is a reason for this! Several species

of maples make some of the best general purpose yard trees. Red maples, silver maples, Norway maples, sugar maples and several others too may work well in a home landscape. Red maples are best known for fall leaf color, but are fairly fast growing and easy to care for and look good year around. Silver maples don't color much and some communities are even outlawing them, but they make a large tree in a hurry and will grow almost anywhere with no special care. Norway maples don't color trees, but it is the red and purple leaved cultivars that are in biggest demand. Sugar maples grow slow into venerable old giants that grandkids may enjoy when they are old. Some hybrid crosses of the red and silver maples, Autumn Flame, Armstrong and Autumn Blaze, may be a way to have the good parts of both in one tree.

Oak trees are large and stately and long-lived. Lots of leaf clean up as well as messy acorns may be a draw

back to some people. They are another much used tree, for which there are many good reasons.

Pin oaks are a popular common choice because of their form, as well as gracefulness in old age. White oaks are large trees which age well, though they take quite a few years to reach a good size. Red and scarlet oaks are planted for red leaf color in fall. Shumard oak, willow oak, chestnut oak, burr oak are among better shade tree choices. Live oaks are evergreen, but usually cannot survive where temperatures fall below zero.

Lindens or basswoods, are fine shade trees for residential use. They have some small yellow blooms, the fall color is not impressive. But, except for those limits, they are a better shade tree choice in all ways to, say, a Bradford pear.

Tulip poplar is a tall and lovely tree with a straight trunk that provides quick shade. Occasionally a few large limbs may snap in severe storms. Yellow tulip shaped blooms in May, and lemon yellow fall color are pluses.

Ash trees make good choices for the landscape. Green ash, white ash, mountain ash, are all OK. The variety "Autumn Purple" ash is commonly used by landscapers because of the purple fall hues. "Marshall's seedless" ash is desired because it makes no mess much. Grass grows under ash trees. And the Korean and European mountain ash are more desirable than the native tree for yard use.

Gum trees are wonderful because of their coloring. Black gum is a bit troublesome to transplant and keep well shaped. But it is wind and fire

resistant, and has perhaps the best red in autumn of all trees. Sweet gum grows into a desirable shape, has star shaped leaves, with excellent fall colors of red, orange and purple. Most objections to this tree come from the spiny seed pods which create quite a litter on the ground. Eucalyptus trees are also called gum trees, and are native to Australia. If it gets much below zero where you reside, you won't succeed in growing eucalyptus.

The ginkgo tree, once thought to exist only in fossils until found in China in the 1940's, is technically considered a conifer. But it's tall, stately shape and slow but strong growth, combined with wonderful yellow fall color that all drops off at once (just one leaf raking here), make this a superb lawn tree. Some sources would say I should tell you to buy a male tree, since the females produce fruit, seed and what some consider an odor. You be the judge; unsexed seedlings are cheaper, plus it takes at least two decades to fruit.

Other trees with shade tree potential are honeylocust, willows, yucca, beech, cherry, hackberry, hornbeam, cypress, dawn redwood, birch, mimosa, golden rain, golden chain, hawthorn, yellowwood. And perhaps flowering trees such as catalpa, evodia, polonia, igiri and Russian olive.

Though evergreen trees and flowering trees and shrubs may make nice shade trees too, several have been covered before or will be in the future in this column.

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Agricultural News

FSA Issues Payments for CRP
Jeffrey S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, has announced FSA will begin issuing payments totaling \$22,232,597 to eligible producers under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Under the CRP, which was reauthorized in the 2002 Farm Bill, producers voluntarily retire environmentally sensitive cropland for 10 to 15 years. In return, USDA's Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) makes annual rental payments to producers and shares the cost of establishing approved conservation practices. Land to be enrolled must be highly erodible, contribute to a serious water quality problem, provide important wildlife habitat, or provide substantial environmental benefits to certain conservation uses. Today's announcement will pay an average of \$3,021 per farm and \$71.25 per acre on 11,449 contracts and 7,357 farms in Kentucky.

Power of Attorney Forms
If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it is not valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney form is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). Non-FSA power of attorney forms currently on file are not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. Farmers are cautioned that the authorizing signature on the FSA-211, must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

County Committee Election Coming Soon
As of August 1st the local FSA office began accepting nominations for the upcoming election to be held December 2, 2002.

Committee members are a critical component of the day-to-day operations of FSA. The CEC members help run FSA farm programs at the local level. Farmers who serve on committees help decide the kind of programs counties will have and how they will run. They make FSA agricultural programs fit the needs of local producers.

Nomination forms must be received in the local FSA office by October 28, 2002.

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP)
Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Signup for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations. Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

Designation By Landowner

The designation by landowner method of dividing a farm is the division of contract acres, allotments, or quotas in the manner AGREED to by all parent farm owner(s) and farm purchasers or transferees. Sellers must have owned the farm for three years prior to the date of designation by landowner method. The County Committee may waive the 3-year ownership requirement of either of the following apply:

- COC determines the sale was not primarily to keep or sell allotments, quotas, or contract acres.
- Land sold will be devoted to nonagricultural, recreational, residential or industrial use.
- The designation by landowner method may be used when any of the following apply:
 - Part of a farm or tract is sold or ownership is transferred.
 - An entire farm or tract is sold to two or more persons.
 - Farm or tract ownership is transferred to 2 or more persons.

With the designation by landowner method the 1,000 pound rule also applies when there is a change in ownership. Thus, if a resulting farm has less than 1,000 pounds of tobacco quota the owner shall either:

- Purchase additional quota to make 1,000 pounds.
- Sell the quota.
- Combine the quota with another farm to make 1,000 pounds. An FSA-155, Request for Farm Reconstitution shall be signed by ALL sellers, buyers, and if applicable, the holder or the deed of trust, lien holder or mortgage holder, state or county.

Farm Changes
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

• October 1, 2002 - Signup for DCP crop year 2002 and 2003 begins.

Farm Storage Facility Loan Program signup continues.

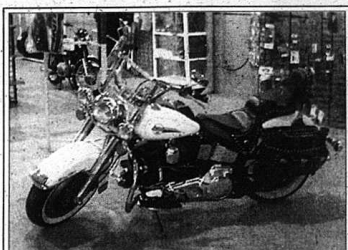
Conservation Reserve Program signup continues.

April 1, 2003 - Ending date for owners to select base and yield options.

June 2, 2003 - Signup for the 2002

and 2003 DCP ends.

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Replacement heifer sales

Replacing an aging beef cow herd can be a never ending task for beef producers. New replacement heifer sales can be a reliable source to keep cow herd numbers up. Finding the money to replace all old cows at one time is impossible for most farmers. However, culling 15 to 20% of cows due to age, losing calves, or non-breeders happens each year. Since the average herd is 25 to 30 cows, keeping 5 or 6 replacement heifers plus a calving ease bull can create management nightmares.

Replacement heifer sales in Madison County and Burbon County are helping farmers solve the replacement heifer problem. Madison County's Top of the Crop sale will be Friday, October 25th at 6:30 pm at the Madison County Stockyards. Burbon County's Elite Heifer Sale will be Monday, November 4th at 6:00 p.m. at the Paris Stockyards.

Replacement heifer sales set quality standards, health standards

and calving ease to assure buyers purchase good replacements. All heifers receive vaccinations and health practices to assure quality replacements. Pelvic measurements are used to cull possible calving problems and low birth weight bulls are used to assure heifers have little if any calving problems. In Paris, over half the heifers are bred AI to low birth weight bulls. This also assures calving dates within 10 to 14 day period. Farmers wishing to purchase in these sales are encouraged to walk the pens 2 to 3 hours before sales time. Having a plan on what to purchase will allow matching your cow herd as well as grouping future calf crops.

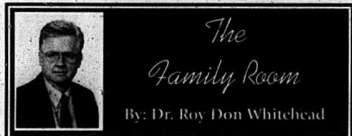

Misguided Individuals Sometimes Misuse Religion
Sarah (not her real name) came to the abuse shelter because her husband had beaten her. This was not the first time this had happened. Sarah was a

Christian and very confused about what God would have her do in this situation. "My pastor told me that I should give him another chance," Sarah told me, "but I don't want to. If I don't, am I going against God?" Sarah is one of many battered women who have run into a brick wall when trying to discern what God would have them do. "After I left him, John (not his real name) has started going to church," she added. "Last Sunday he got saved, and I hear he is getting counseling with the pastor now. My mother told me he bought a new Bible and carries it with him everywhere."

Battered will use any means possible, even religion, to convince the spouse to come home. Many abusers have gotten saved or rededicated their lives or confessed sin in front

of the church the first week their wives moved to an abuse shelter. "Christians and even pastors are sometimes fooled by this display of religion. How could they not believe a man who stands in front of the church weeping and confessing to abusing his wife? They see this as an indication the batterer has changed and implore the wife to "give him another chance."

Most of the time these people do not know the history of the relationship.

They do not realize that the victim has kept the abuse secret, hidden from the public. She has covered her bruises and her emotional hurts so well that no one knows what she has endured. They do not know that she has already given him a second chance "at least a hundred times." They do not know that she has heard these same promises over and over again, only to have them broken every time.

Immediately after an abusive incident, the abusive relationship often goes through a "honeymoon stage" in the honeymoon stage the abuser

will say he is sorry and make promises he cannot keep. He may bring home flowers and candy. If she has left him, he will write her letters or try to find her.

He may promise to stop drinking, to see a counselor or never to hit her again. Most victims of abuse have heard these promises many times before.

If the victim believes the promises and returns home, the honeymoon stage will last for a little while. Gradually, though, the abuser reneges on his promises. He stops going to church and refuses to see a counselor. He begins to show more and more anger, and soon abuses her again. Then comes another honeymoon stage and the cycle continues. Many abuse victims have reported that cycle literally hundreds of times.

Batterers are often good con men and can make a person believe the sky is red. They seem so sincere when they make their promises. Perhaps they are sincere, but the real question is: do they have the ability to keep their promises? Most do not.

For those who believe the abused woman should always stay with her abuser and try to "work it out," I have a question: do you really think that God wants a woman to continue to be abused and to raise her children in the midst of that abuse?

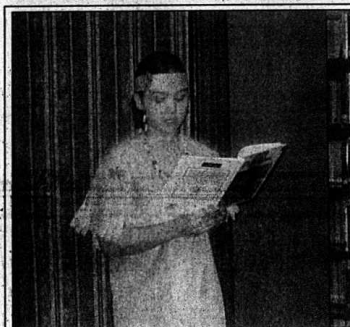

Hunting and fishing license buyers must present proper ID

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) has taken a step to comply with new Child Support Enforcement Regulations which regard to the sale of hunting and fishing licenses.

Child Support Enforcement Regulations, promulgated after changes in federal and state law, now mandate that all license and permit issued by a state agency must be able to be cross-referenced with a database of individuals delinquent in making child support payments.

These regulations further prohibit the KDFWR from issuing sport hunting and fishing licenses to those individuals.

Those individuals who do not have a social security number, driver's license number or a disability authorization card number to the license agent.

Those individuals who do not have a social security number, driver's license number or a disability authorization card number should have the license agent call the KDFWR Licensing Help Desk during normal work hours for further instructions.

This change is a result of a federal mandate for all licensing agencies.

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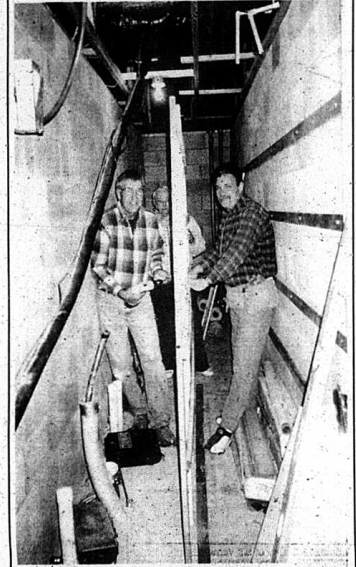

Busch spins but still wins
MARTINSVILLE, Vir.--

The much talked about and anticipated tire wear never materialized during Sunday's Old Dominion 500 as Kurt Busch, driver of the No. 97 Roush Racing Ford survived an early spinout and just went fast to win his second race of the season and his career.

Busch gained the lead on lap 401 and led the remaining 99 laps. "The team is what put me out front," said Busch. "We came in ninth and went out third. It took me about 20-laps to get the tires worn in, and then I could do a lot of damage and go fast."

Busch came from the farthest back (36) in the history of the Martinsville track to win. Johnny Benson, Ricky Rudd, Dale Earnhardt Jr., and Ward Burton rounded out the top-five.

The sixth place finisher Jimmie Johnson was the highest finishing rookie. Rounding out the remaining top-ten were, Ricky Craven, Dale Jarrett, Rusty Wallace, and Mark Martin.

Points leader Tony Stewart came in 11th and is now 82 points ahead of Johnson. "I'm dominated the early stages of the race. After two caution periods during the first 100 laps, the top-three leaders were Rusty Wallace, Ryan Newman, and Jeff Burton—all Ford drivers."

During a pit stop under caution on lap 103, Jeff Gordon's No. 24 team did not get all the lug nuts tightened on one of his tires and he had to come back into the pits a second time. When green flag racing resumed, he was in 36th position.

By lap 125 Tony Stewart, who had qualified 33rd had worked his way up through the field and was fifth. Kurt Busch brought out the fifth caution when he spun coming out of turn four of lap 179. The leaders when the race continued were Ward Burton, Tony Stewart, and Robby Gordon.

Jeff Gordon brushed the wall on lap 248 and pitted during lap 252 with damage to both front fenders on his No. 24 Dupont Chevrolet. He came back into the pits several times for repairs and wound up 36th, effectively ending any chance he has to

win this year's championship with just four races left.

The regular driver of the No. 40 Coors Light Dodge was in the pits at Martinsville this past weekend with a broken neck after suffering a brace on his vertebrae at Kansas, three races ago. Two weeks ago at Charlotte, Jamie McMurray filled-in for Martin and won the UAW-GM 500. Team manager, Tony Gordon talked about the importance of both the team and driver in winning a race.

"I think it's a combination of a lot of things," said Gordon. "I don't think a car can be competitive in a race without a good driver. And I don't think a good driver can win a race without having a good car, so it's a combination of everything involved."

Mike Bliss drove the No. 40 Dodge Sunday in the Old Dominion 500 at Martinsville because McMurray had previously committed to running the Busch race at Memphis. After qualifying 37th, Bliss finished 14th. Jimmy Spencer, the other half of the Felix Sabates/Chip Ganassi team and driver of the No. 41 Target Dodge says the days of driving by the seat of your pants are gone.

"Dale Earnhardt was one of the greatest drivers that ever lived, but today, he wouldn't win as many races as he did during his career," said Spencer. "You guys don't realize how critical the decisions that are being made at the shops on Monday morning and the engineering that goes into these cars and the crews making the right decisions."

"I think the Dale Earnhardt period is over. Dale Earnhardt is the best there ever was at taking a fifth-place race car and winning a race with it."

Today, I don't think you can take a fifth-place race car and win a race with it.

"When Chip (Ganassi) picked Jamie, he picked the right guy, but also that team is very, very strong. That's what you're seeing with Ryan Newman, Jimmie Johnson and Tony Stewart—they all have strong race teams."

"The drivers are confident in these teams. They'll tell you to jump off a bridge and you'll survive it and some-

times you believe them. That's the confidence you need in your team. It's showing every week in Winston Cup."

Is it the driver, team, or both? You decide. But don't jump off a bridge yet.

Harry, what's this in my ear?

Smockey Yunkick, who died in May 2001, just before his 78th birthday was a legendary racing insider, owner, mechanic and inventor. A native of Pennsylvania, he joined the Army Air Corps and flew B-17s during World War II.

Most of his life was spent in a bygone era and the shame of it is that the rich and the early history of NASCAR is so relatively unknown that many readers have never heard of the drivers who ran for Yunkick.

There are few drivers today who could match his list of who's who for talent. Men like Herb Thomas, Jim Rathmans, Marshall Teague, Paul Goldsmith, Curtis Turner, Fireball Roberts, Joe Weatherly, Darryl Deringer, Buck Baker were just a few who drove for him.

One of the great regrets of Yunkick's life was not being able to talk his friend Roberts in to retiring, once it became apparent Roberts no longer had the desire to race. Roberts died from injuries suffered in the 1964 World 600 which would have been his final race if he had survived.

Yunkick was never politically correct, especially when it came to NASCAR. In his book "Best Damn Garage in Town," he talks about the France family.

One day he was talking with Bill France Sr. about his son, Bill Jr. "It will take him five years in fifth grade to get his driver's license," said Yunkick. "No, I think he can do it in four," said the elder France.

Even before he entered stock car racing, Yunkick had a pretty amazing life. He had an alcoholic and abusive father, who died when he was in high school, and a demanding mother.

Growing up on a farm, he became convinced that the family horse was out to kill him. He bought an old Dodge truck and converted it into a tractor.

He gained the name Smockey while driving his Indian motorcycle during a race at Langhorne Speedway. The announcer didn't know his name, but his big Indian was putting out a lot of smoke, so he just called him, "Smockey."

After the race, he left the service and settled briefly in New Jersey. One day he announced to his wife he didn't like the cold and was moving to Daytona Beach, FL. He gave her the option of coming along, and expressed regret that she chose to do so.

He bought some land, which turned out to be less than a bargain.

When the river was at high tide, the shop flooded, so he built a dike to protect his investment. An alligator from the river served as a mascot until a drunken regular messed with it and was bitten. From those humble beginnings a multi-million dollar business sprung.

In addition to his NASCAR accomplishments, which included 57 wins, he had a long-term love affair with the Indianapolis 500 and other racing circuits.

In 1950, he and drivers Marshall Teague and Les Snow set out in a pair of Hudson Hornets to run the "Carrera Panamerica" or "Mexican Road Race."

In the same race Bill France Sr. and Curtis Turner drove a 1949 Nash. "We crossed the border at Brownsville, Texas, into Matamoros and the roads were good," said Yunkick. "I was driving one of the Hudsons and we were going overall. It was a good paved road, then wham, within two or three miles, we're on a trail that winds up at a river."

"The river was up and it cost us five bucks to get across on a barge that was pulled by one puny, skinny cable."

After leaving it to Mexico City, the team left their cars at the local Hudson dealership and went to a hotel.

"The taxi driver took us to a big house, called, 'Angels,' he said. 'Angels cost \$15 a day with room, meals, booze, dirty movies and hookers included.'"

"The race started about daylight. There were about 10 classes. The hot dogs or fastest drivers left first, so they wouldn't run over the slower cars. It was a real road course. The way they kept animals, people and cars back was to station soldiers within sight of each other."

"If an animal or human attempted to cross during the forbidden hours, the soldiers shot to kill. A young man, right on the outskirts of Tuxtla crossed the road, and damn if the soldiers didn't shoot him."

"At every leg of the race we had things to fix. We carried everything we needed in a two-wheel trailer, including parts and fuel."

"One night Harry was driving and horses were lined up across the road in front of us, about 20 of them and all the riders had rifles. Twenty rifles were aimed at the windshield. I reached over and turned the key off. Harry got it stopped about five feet from the end of the rifle barrels."

"It cost us about nine or ten bucks to 'get permission' to continue on our mission."

"That night after we got to a checkpoint, we ran into a bunch of drunk bandits. I was sitting in the passenger seat, and one of them stuck a pistol in my right ear. As the other men who had machetes, moved around the front of the car, Harry said, 'I'm going to floor it.'"

"I said, Harry, before you do, check over here and see if you can tell what this is sticking in my ear."

Herschel McGriff of Portland, Oregon won the race. Marshall and Les ended up seventh in the stock car class and thirteenth overall.

The Mexican Road Race was one of the wild chapters in Smockey's career.

By 1954, he had two major businesses: racing and trucking. He continued as a heavy-duty truck dealer until 1987.

He devoted years to developing alternate fuel systems and synthetic oil.

He spent another 30 years in the oil fields of South America working in pipelines, transportation and helping solve problems in the oil and gas fields.

After his racing years, he spent most of his time working on his inventions and in the oil and gold fields of Ecuador. Along the way, he had a knack for finding fun and adventure in everything he did. Alcohol, women and speed were his main addictions. He eventually gave up alcohol, but he never got over the other two.

His daughter, Trish still runs the family business in Daytona Beach.

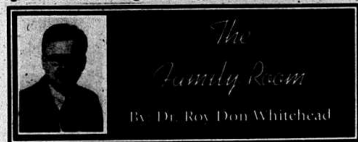

New Treatments for Depression are Ready

If you or a family member have struggled with depression, you know how miserable it can be for the whole family. Moodiness, hopelessness, guilt and lack of motivation keep the depressed person separated from family.

Sleep problems (or sleeping too much), appetite changes and lack of energy can be crippling. Because depression is so common, researchers are constantly searching for new treatments.

1. Light therapy has been around for several years. A kind of depression called Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) seems to be caused by a lack of light in the winter. For some sufferers, sitting in front of a special light box (10-20 times brighter than ordinary indoor light) for thirty minutes a day produces relief from depression symptoms. Doctors are not sure how this works and it does not work for everyone.

2. A new antidepressant Lexapro became available in September of this year. It is a derivative of Celexa, an antidepressant that has been available for several years. The manufacturer claims that Lexapro has fewer side effects and fewer interactions with other drugs. Another antidepressant duloxetine should be available soon. Unlike Lexapro it affects two different neurotransmitters in the brain. See your physician for the latest information.

3. A new implantable device available in Canada treats depression by producing an electric stimulation of the vagus nerve. In a clinical trial of this new device 75% of those tested had improved and maintained that improvement for one year.

Obviously this is not the first line of defense against depression, but can be used as a treatment for those who do not respond to other methods. Again, see your physician for news

of the latest developments in treating depression.

4. A new study supports the use of St. John's wort to treat mild to moderate depression. This European study goes against the work of some American researchers who found that St. John's wort is no more effective than a sugar pill. Scientists in both studies used standardized extracts of the plant. St. John's wort is an herb that can be purchased over-the-counter.

5. Counseling is receiving more attention as a treatment for depression. Side effects and drug interactions have turned some people off to medication. They find that therapy has no side effects and produces results. A major study in the New England Journal of Medicine in May of 2001 studied 519 patients across the US. When treated with both counseling and medication, 85% improved. With medication alone 55% improved. With counseling alone 52% got better. The clear choice for treating depression is counseling AND medication.

6. A University of Kentucky researcher found that Wellbutrin, a well-known antidepressant, helped people lose more weight when added to a weight-loss regimen. Those who used the antidepressant along with a weight loss plan lost an average of 8.6% of their body weight in one year. Those without the medication lost 5%. Wellbutrin is the antidepressant that is also used to help people stop smoking. (The brand name is Zyban when sold for this purpose).

Any consideration of medication for depression should begin with a visit to your physician. He or she will have information on the latest medications available and can decide what is best for you. If you have not found a medication that works for you, be aware that new ones are on the way. Counseling and medication together can produce amazing results. Do not give up hope!

Deer hunters reminded elk still protected

Officials with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) are reminding state deer hunters that elk continue to be protected from harvest.

Recently, the KDFWR Commission proposed to allow some limited elk hunting outside the 24 counties that buffer and include the designated restoration zone starting with the 2003-04 deer season.

"As the firearms deer seasons for this year approach, we want to make sure hunters realize there's no open elk hunting allowed anywhere this year," said KDFWR's Deer and Elk Program Coordinator Jonathan Day.

"Out of line hunting was approved for next season, but only in counties not associated with the restoration effort," he added.

When deer hunters eventually have the opportunity to take an elk that has wandered out of the restoration and buffer zone counties, that hunter will be required to contact the KDFWR immediately and before the animal is moved. A KDFWR enforcement officer or biologist will come to the site where the animal was taken and check the animal before it can be moved. Hunters will also be checked for the appropriate hunting license, deer permit, hunting equipment and other requirements.

"These animals won't count toward a hunter's deer season limit, but we must have record of the harvest along with some other biological information from the animal. Hunter will be able to take either sex elk when this opportunity is approved, and it will not have to be telechecked," said Day.

Presently, Day estimated that less than 100 elk may move into counties where they could be taken next year, if hunters do come across them during deer season. He reminds hunters permission from the landowner is required before entering private lands to hunt.

Except on a Wildlife Management Area where a quota elk hunt may be held, the following counties are currently closed, and will remain closed

to elk harvest in 2003-04: Bell, Breathitt, Clay, Elliott, Floyd, Harlan, Jackson, Johnson, Knott, Knox, Laurel, Lawrence, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, McCreary, Morgan, Owsley, Perry, Pike, Whitley and Wolfe.

For complete information, hunters should be sure to obtain a copy of the 2003-04 Kentucky Fall Hunting Guide, available August 1, 2003 from all locations that sell hunting and fishing licenses.

It really should be called, "The Stalking Song." But this is supposed to be a love song...? When a man recites the above to a woman she's supposed to feel he loves her so much that he watches her every move as she's so beautiful and every paying attention to. So how can this "love" song be called "stalking"?

Because loving someone is different than stalking someone to keep control. Stalking is not love and love is not stalking. Webster defines stalking as, "to go through (an area) in search of prey or quarry." Furthermore, Webster gives an example of a hunter who will "...stalk the woods for deer." Comparatively, stalking a deer or a human...both feel fear of harm and try to flee danger they know is right behind them.

"If the perpetrator both continually follows and threatens his victim

with physical injury, death or sexual contact, he has committed the crime of stalking. KRS 508.130-508.150. Stalking requires a pattern of conduct consisting of at least two acts which seriously alarm, annoy, intimidate or harass the victim and would cause a reasonable person to suffer substantial distress...Neither terroristic threatening nor stalking requires that a perpetrator physically injure his victim." (Representing Victims of Domestic Violence: A Kentucky Lawyer Handbook, Section 1A: Scope and Dynamics of Domestic Violence pg. 13)

Stalking is a noted behavior included in environmental abuse. Perpetrators use environmental abuse to exert control over who the victims talks to, doesn't talk to, where she goes, how long she's gone from the perpetrator, limiting her access to bank accounts and money (including her own pay check), isolating her from family and friends, monitoring telephone calls, etc. For example, I worked with one woman whose husband worked all day. She was not allowed to leave the house or even be outside on the front porch. To make sure that she followed his rules, he spread flour all over the porch and steps. He also made sure not to leave any flour in the house for her to cover her tracks. Sometimes, he could even tell if she opened the door on a windy day. Extreme as this sounds, this controlling behavior is consistent with domestic violence. Stalking is another way of gaining control of and maintaining control over a victim and their environment and is considered emotional and/or psychological abuse. As the above quote states, it is the belief or fear of harm, not just the physical beatings. Stalking strips the victim of her rights as a human being. If someone is stalking a celebrity we press charges and call the stalker on or mentally unstable. Let me ask then, what's the difference between the stalker we don't know and the stalker we do know. Why is a celebrity stalker crazy and dangerous but a husband or boyfriend

is "just in love?" Isn't the purpose of the stalking behavior identical? Is that really just love?

The next time you turn on the radio or watch your favorite movie, think about who you consider acceptable or normal behavior. In our society there are behaviors that we take for granted and brush off as "just in the movies" or "it's just a love song." Society has grown accus-

toried to accepting stalking behaviors as normal, but stalking is not normal. Stalking is not love. Stalking is real. Stalking violates human rights. Stalking happens to real people every day. Stalking is deadly. And in Kentucky, Stalking is a crime. -S.L. Michaels
