



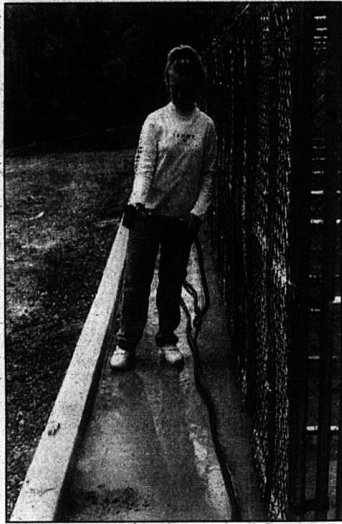

Voters have several choices next Tuesday

Normally a general election in a Republican dominated Rockcastle County generates little interest, but next Tuesday things will be somewhat different.

There are several competitive races, including one for the city of Mt. Vernon Mayor's seat and a race for state representative.

There are races for magistrate in district one and three and ten people are running for six council seats in Mt. Vernon.

Voters will decide whether or not to send Republican U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell back to Congress for a fourth term and they will also have a say in who represents them in the state senate.

There are two constitutional amendments, one which would change Kentucky's constitution and one that would create family court in all 120 Kentucky counties, also on Tuesday's ballot.

Local resident and Chief of the Kentucky Supreme Court Joe Lambert of Mt. Vernon, has lobbied heavily for the Family Court issue. His wife Debra is currently the Circuit Judge of Family Court for Lincoln, Rockcastle and Pulaski Counties.

Lambert says that three million Kentuckians are still not served by family court.

In Mt. Vernon, seven people are running for Mayor. The next Mayor of Mt. Vernon will assume a full-time position in January and make \$3,000 per month. The next Mayor will also receive retirement benefits and health insurance from the city.

Incumbent Mayor Karen King has six challengers, including two current council members, Clarice Kirby and Jackie Renner.

Also running for Mayor are Rebekah Hammond, wife of Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond, local business people, Kevin Fletcher and Doug Bullock and Jody Adams, a patient at Rockcastle Hospital.

There are ten candidates for six council seats in Mt. Vernon. On the ballot are incumbent council members Clark "Joe" Mullins, Lonetta Daugherty and Charles Wayne Bullock.

Also on the ballot are Betty Carter Bussell, Bryan Hansel, Steve Renfro, Barbara Bennett, Don Jones, Shelley Raines Lewis and Lou Vanhoose

State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, faces his first real challenge in 20 years.

Ford has opposition from former Lincoln County Attorney J. Paul Long, a democrat.

Incumbent State Senator Ed Worley of Richmond, who is married

to a Rockcastle County native and former Rockcastle County High School teacher, Jamie Mullins Worley, faces a challenge from former State Senator Barry Metcalf Worley is a democrat and Metcalf is a Republican.

Worley represents Rockcastle County along with Madison and Lincoln Counties. He got Rockcastle after re-districting by the state legislature this Spring.

Longtime statesman and noted U.S. Congressman Harold Rogers of Somerset faces only a token challenge from Democrat Sidney Jane Bailey.

There are school board races in division one and division three. Division one consists of South Mt. Vernon and East and West Livingston. Current school board member Sam Stallworth is being challenged by Sand Springs resident Donna Hasty, in that district.

Steve Owens, a retired bank examiner for the state of Kentucky and Tina Hasty, a pharmacist at Rockcastle Hospital are candidates in division three, which consists of the precincts of North Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon and Bullock.

One of the two will replace School Board Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith, who did not seek re-election, after ten years of service.

Two term incumbent Republican magistrate Bill McKinney faces opposition from Democrat James "Bear" Bradley in the third district.

In the last county election four years ago, McKinney beat Bradley by only thirteen votes.

The third district consists of the precincts, Brown, West Brodhead and Bullock.

In district one, which I made up of the voting precincts, North Mt. Vernon and North Brodhead, two term incumbent Democrat John Holbrook faces opposition from Republican David Gibbs.

In Livingston, current Mayor Ed McHargue faces a challenge from

restaurant owner J.C. (Raymond) Griffin.

In the council race at Livingston Jason Medley, Katha Carpenter and Todd Mink will be elected because only three people filed for the four council seats.

In Brodhead, incumbent Mayor Walter Cash and the four current council members: Larry Taylor, Johnny Wilcop, Everett Albright and Curt Brown are all unopposed. Next Tuesday the polls will open at 6 a.m. and close at 6 p.m., unless you are in line at 6 p.m. According to Rockcastle County Clerk Norma Houk. Those needing to know where they should vote can call Mrs. Houk's office at (606) 256-2831.

I-75 Speedway to be sold

Rockcastle Circuit Judge William T. Cain has ordered the sale of I-75 Speedway, which is located at Cove Branch near the Burr Exit of Interstate 75.

The order was entered on September 13th and the sale will take place on November 15th at 1:30 p.m., according to court documents.

The judgement and order of sale was the result of a suit brought against the local race track owners

by Goff, Excavating Company of Brodhead. According to court documents, the race track owners have not paid Goff nearly \$50,000 for work he has

Family Courts for Kentucky

In 1991, a group of thoughtful and caring people began a Family Court Pilot Project in Jefferson County. Their goal was to create a court that was family-friendly and devoted exclusively to family law cases. They determined that the same judge should consider all legal matters relating to a family and that the judge should be able to use counseling, mediation and divorce education to reduce the distress of families in crisis. The Jefferson County Family Court was so successful that the pilot project was expanded in 1998 to eighteen other counties across Kentucky. In 2000, it was expanded again so that today there are Family Courts in twenty-six counties, serving over one million Kentucky citizens. But, unfortunately, almost three million Kentuckians in ninety-four counties have no access to these specialized family-friendly courts.

Family court is based on the "one family, one judge" concept that all judicial proceedings involving children and families, whether juvenile, domestic violence, custody or divorce, should be collected and resolved in a single court. By having one judge preside over all the legal problems facing a family, unique family circumstances can be better understood. While a Family Court is a court of law, it is also a link to services in the community. Family Court judges understand that distressed families with children often need more than a legal resolution of their problems. Sometimes, they need assistance to restore family stability and help in dealing with serious problems such as alcohol and drug abuse, domestic violence, and child abuse and neglect. Family Courts often make specific referrals to outside agencies and order specific treatment to meet the individual needs of children and families. While it is impossible to completely protect children from the difficulties of life such as divorce and family discord, Family Courts help nurture children and families through these difficult times.

Family courts are exclusively for family law matters. Other types of civil and criminal cases remain in the circuit and district courts. Children and families in crisis shouldn't have to wait in line. If the process is too drawn out, or if the case is heard again and again by different commissioners or judges, solutions may be delayed, inconsistent or contradictory. Where court involvement in family matters is necessary, courts should do more than merely decide who wins and who loses. With dedicated judges, competent and well-trained support staff and helping professionals, Family Courts are making an otherwise dreadful ordeal a survivable experience. While all cases are important, none are more important than those involving children and families.

There is no doubt that Family Courts have been successful. However, our state constitution does not expressly provide for Family Courts. Believing that Family Courts are vitally important and that they should be available to all Kentucky citizens, the 2001 Kentucky General Assembly placed the Family Court Amendment on the November 2002 General Election Ballot. Now the people of Kentucky vote on the final say on Family Courts. But, unless the Amendment is approved by the voters, there can be no further expansion of Family Courts and the pilot project will have to be discontinued.

Although it was passed overwhelmingly in both houses of the General Assembly, passage of a constitutional amendment is always difficult. Kentuckians are properly reluctant to amend their constitution, and when they don't understand a proposed amendment, they often vote no. It cannot be assumed that everyone that everyone knows about Family Courts and that a majority will vote to approve the constitutional amendment. That's why I have joined with judges, lawyers, court employees, and citizens across Kentucky to talk about family courts and why they are good for Kentucky. As a result, many significant groups and organizations have endorsed the Family Court Constitutional Amendment. Among them are the Kentucky Education Association, the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation, the Kentucky State AFL-CIO, the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, the Kentucky Association of School Superintendents, the Kentucky Retired Teachers Association, the Kentucky State Lodge Fraternal Order of Police, the Kentucky Burley Tobacco Growers Association, several Kentucky chapters of the NAACP, and many more. Virtually all major newspapers in Kentucky, including *The Courier Journal* and *The Herald-Leader* have endorsed the Amendment.

On November 5, 2002, the people of Kentucky will vote on Family Courts. On the ballot, the question will be:

Are you in favor of Family Courts in Kentucky by amending The Kentucky Constitution to allow the Supreme Court to designate a division of circuit court as a family court?

Children and families are Kentucky's most important resource, and when they must go to court, they deserve our highest priority. I urge every Kentuckian to vote "yes" so that we may bring the services, compassion and commitment of Family Courts to all Kentucky children and families, who need their help.

Getting started exercising

Taking up running, biking or any sport to improve your physical health sounds great, but it is not always easy to get started. How do you do it? How much should you do?

First, get the right equipment. Proper equipment will make participation in your sport more enjoyable and help prevent injuries. Advice can be obtained from reputable salesmen or knowledgeable friends already in the sport. Local sport clubs can be an excellent source of information and inspiration.

It is often helpful to talk to your physician to get an exercise prescription. After listening to your heart and lungs

and evaluating your physical condition, he can tell you where to start and how fast to progress. You may start with jogging a half mile, or just walking briskly. Exercising three to five times a week is enough to improve your fitness and health. It is wise to allow a day of rest for your body to repair and rebuild the muscle cells that have been exercised. After more strenuous exercise, a couple days of rest is important.

Once you establish a base to start at, you can normally increase the amount of training by about 10% per week. Increasing faster is apt to cause problems with tendonitis, stress fractures or other "over-use" injuries.

The zeal of getting started and the desire to improve quickly can often have a negative effect. When a person develops an injury, it is discouraging and decreases the enjoyment of the sport. This causes many people to give up. It is the slow and steady improvement that will make any sport more enjoyable and give you the satisfaction of your accomplishments.

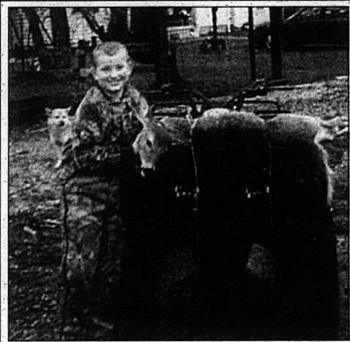

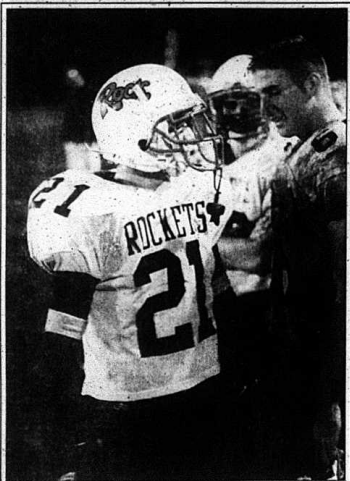

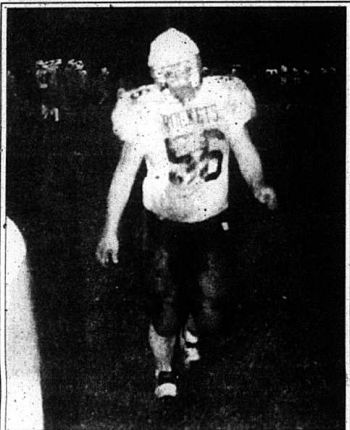

Defensively the ROCK was led by Boreing and sophomore Chris Croucher.

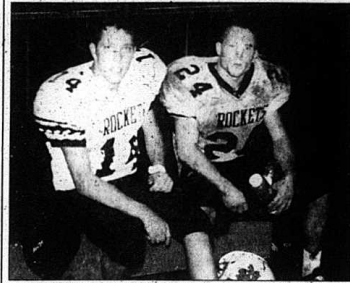
Boreing had six tackles and assists and Croucher had three sacks on his way to eight tackles and assists.

The Rockcastle County Cross-Country teams competed in the annual KTCCA Meet of Champions at Cave Lake Park in Wayne County this past Saturday. Halloween is on the way, bringing fun for Kentucky's children as they go out and collect treats to eat. Most treats children receive as safe and add to the enjoyment of the holiday. The Cabinet for Health Services wishes to provide parents and children some general guidelines to ensure this Halloween is as safe as possible for our children.

"Every year Kentucky's children look forward to going Trick-or-Treating," said Guy Deltos, Assistant Director of the Cabinet's Division of Public Health Protection and Safety. "While it's fun for children to dress up and try their luck in gathering treats and candy, we just want to provide some general food safety guide-

- lines which should be remembered when collecting and consuming the food."
- Only visit homes and businesses that you are familiar with.
 - Don't take candy or treats from persons who you do not know.
 - Only eat candy if the outer wrapper has been commercially made and wrapped.
 - Do not eat candy if the outer wrapper has been noticeably altered.
 - Homemade treats should not be eaten unless you know and trust the person who made them.
 - Do not eat any candy or food that is unwrapped or appears to have been tampered with.
 - Do not eat any candy or food that

- appears to have a powder or dust on it.
- Always wash your hands before eating any foods.
 - After handling any unclean food products, wash your hands thoroughly.
 - Be conscious of choking hazards such as gum, peanuts, hard candies, or small toys as treats to small children.
- Also, children as well as adults should not use decorative eye contact lenses obtained without a prescription or professional fitting as they could cause serious permanent eye injury-possibly leading to blindness.

Rockcastle Hospital joins SCC in new radiography program

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. (RHRC), CEO Steve Estes announced today that the Mt. Vernon-based healthcare organization had committed its financial and clinical support to Somerset Community College (SCC) for the creation of a new health occupations program in radiography.

"We are dedicated to providing quality healthcare services to the people of this region so they don't have to travel far for the care they need. To do that, we must have highly-trained professionals in a number of fields," Estes said. "SCC has demonstrated that it does an excellent job of training local people for local healthcare jobs and we are pleased to again partner with them to make the radiography program possible."

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. operates inpatient and outpatient acute care programs, 60 long-term beds for ventilator-dependent patients, 105 long-term nursing care beds, a home health care service, and a state-of-the-art medical office building, all of which are accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO).

"This generous gift will allow Somerset Community College to add a seventh career field to our Health Division," said Jo Marshall, the President and CEO of Somerset Community College. "Communities in this area are currently experiencing a shortage of qualified technologists. I think it's wonderful that Rockcastle Hospital has made it possible for us to fill that need with SCC graduates. Rockcastle Hospital has been and continues to be a valued partner in the education of the citizens of South Central Kentucky."

Three additional area hospitals also have made funding pledges for the new radiography program. They are Wayne County Hospital, Clinton County Hospital and Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital.

The radiography program will prepare an individual to become a radiographer, whose primary function is to administer ionizing radiation for medical diagnostic imaging. The program will emphasize quality patient care and radiation protection. The Associate of Applied Science Degree will feature a course of study concentrating on radiography, basic science and mathematics.

The program at Somerset Commu-

nity College, like the other six health occupations programs, will employ a selective admissions program. Students wishing to enter the program will be required to submit a separate application. The program will then select students based upon standard criteria.

A survey conducted by the American Society of Radiologic Technologists shows that more than 80 percent of those radiographic technologists surveyed reported earning more than \$40,000 per year.

Employment opportunities in radiography are expected to be very favorable.

There are some shortages of qualified technologists at the present time. Hospitals are the principal employers of radiological technologists, however, a number of new jobs are expected to open in doctor's offices and outpatient clinics over the next 10 years.

According to Somerset Commu-

nity College's proposal to begin the radiography program, which was submitted to KCTCS earlier this year, six other KCTCS colleges currently have the program. Those programs are located in Louisville, Madisonville, Elizabethtown, Owensboro and Bowling Green. The proposal records that all of the graduates of the other program obtained employment within three months of graduation.

The first students are expected to be admitted to the Somerset radiography program during the Fall semester of 2003. However, prospective applicants for the radiography program could begin their general education courses as soon as the Spring semester in January 2003.

RHRC is a non-profit organization that serves patients from across Kentucky, Tennessee and several other states. It was established in 1956.

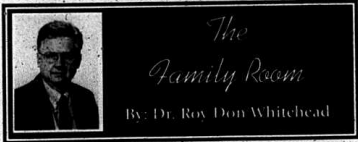

The Family Room

"Vote 'Yes' For Family Court
On Tuesday, November 5, the following amendment will appear on the ballot in Kentucky:

"Are you in favor of Family Courts in Kentucky by amending The Kentucky Constitution to allow the Supreme Court to designate a division of Circuit Court as a Family Court?"

I urge you to vote "Yes" in support of Family Courts. Family Court is currently an experiment in twenty-six Kentucky counties, including Pulaski, Rockcastle and Lincoln. Now that these courts have proven themselves, it is time to pass a constitutional amendment and assure that all Kentuckians have access to these courts.

What are Family Courts? These are the courts that handle all matters relating to family law, such as divorce, domestic violence and juvenile offenses. Instead of seeing two or three judges for different problems, families will be seen by one judge. This will allow the judge to be more familiar with the family's situation. "One family, one judge" is the motto of Family Court.

Consider the fictitious Johnson family. Mrs. Johnson has filed an Emergency Protective Order against her husband for threatening her and the children. Mr. Johnson files his own protective order, claiming that his wife threatened him. Their fourteen year old son Johnnie has been skipping school and has been sent to juvenile court. Now Mrs. Johnson

has filed for divorce. This is certainly a complicated tangle of legal, social and psychological issues. Under the old system three different judges might have heard this case: one judge for domestic violence, one for Johnnie's truancy and another for the divorce. Under the family court system one judge hears all these cases. This allows that judge to understand the complicated dynamics of this family in distress.

Family Court judges and staff receive specialized training in family relations, child development and psychology. Because these courts handle only family related issues, they can specialize in this area of law.

Family court judges also are in a good position to refer families to social service and other agencies who can help. The judges can order the family into counseling or to a divorce education class. In the case of domestic violence, the judge may order the abuser to attend anger management classes and the victim to attend domestic violence education.

With all these good reasons in favor of the amendment, it should pass easily, right? Not necessarily. The amendment passed the Senate and House with ease, but Kentuckians have shown a reluctance to tinker with the state constitution. Many amendments; some bad and some very good, have been voted down at the polls. Amendments should be very carefully considered and this is one amendment that deserves to pass.

Family courts have proven their worth in the last few years. I hope you will join me in voting "Yes" for the Family Court amendment.

Kentucky Cabbage

Cabbage is a healthy Kentucky grown food that is low in fat, low in calories, and rich in vitamin A.

Select cabbage with leaves that are crisp and free of insects and decay. It should be covered loosely and can be stored in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. Wash just before using.

To boil: Do not use an aluminum pan. Cut cabbage into quarters and boil in water for 10 to 15 minutes until tender. Drain and serve hot.

Here is a quick recipe that is loaded with vitamin A and low in calories:

CABBAGE PECAN TOSS
4 cups cabbage, coarsely shredded

1/2 cup carrot, shredded
1/4 cup onion, sliced
2 tablespoons water
1 tablespoon margarine or butter, melted
1 teaspoon Dijon-style mustard
1/4 cup chopped pecans, toasted
In a large pan combine cabbage, carrot, onion, and 2 tablespoons water. Cook, covered, over medium heat for 5 to 7 minutes. Drain. Add margarine or butter, mustard, and pecans. Stir together and serve hot. Yield: 8 servings.
Nutritional Analysis: 55 calories, 1 g protein, 4 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber, 4 g fat, 4 mg cholesterol, 40 mg sodium.

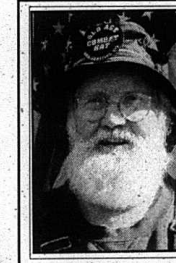

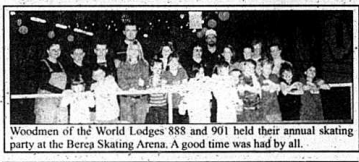

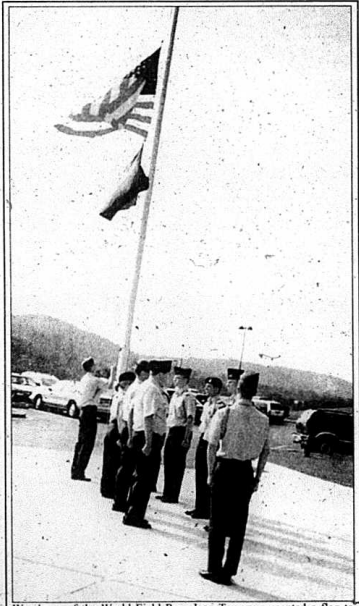

public. Moreover, if Ms. Rickles chooses to take a hobby because someone should choose to ask her how it is going, how many trick or treaters she has had or briefly listen to her music, she should make this her own problem not other peoples.

However, from what I have heard Ms. Rickles seems to be Mr. Vernon's busiest body, frequently missing police service to complain about others playing basketball too late, to settle some other gripe with a neighbor, or just because she is unaware of "whose-son" someone is.

We should ask ourselves if this is what these public services are for. It is my understanding that Ms. Rickles misuses a system designed for real problems by taking advantage of the fact that she is related to a member of Mt. Vernon's combined of the Keystone Cops version with F-Troop. Is the purpose of the local police to respond to private phone calls from relatives that report little more than the fact that Ms. Rickles does not know who someone's father is?

Perhaps Ms. Rickles' inability to use a little common sense before unleashing Mt. Vernon's second most feared (terrorists generally don't eat antrax from out of a plastic bag) can be put aside. But her refusal to sim-

Vernon Police.

Finally, while Ms. Rickles is adept at complaining about others when she thinks there is no responsibility for her actions, the reaction of her husband, Jim Rickles, when asked about the incident, shows their true colors. When I spoke to him, he simply lied about it.

Dear Editor,

On November 5, Kentucky voters can choose to formally adopt the state's Family Court System as a permanent part of the Kentucky Constitution. Chief Justice Joseph Lambert of the Kentucky Supreme Court has called Family Courts the greatest innovation in Kentucky law in a quarter century. For the first time ever, courts are giving children and families their undivided attention.

Before Family Courts started in 1991 as a pilot project in Jefferson County, families and children dealing with the distress of divorce, child custody, adoption, termination of parental rights and domestic violence competed for court time with felony offenses, medical malpractice and other criminal and civil law cases.

One Family, One Judge, One Court

Family Courts changed all of that focusing on better outcomes for families and children. To provide continuity, one judge hears all of a family's issues and problems. The program also improves access to social service

resources to help the recover from difficult situations.

Today Family Courts serve more than a million Kentuckians in 26 counties and the program is considered a national model. But that means that three million Kentuckians still don't have access to the continuity provided by Family Court.

On November 5th, Kentuckians will have the opportunity to vote on an amendment that is necessary to make Family Courts a permanent part of the Kentucky Constitution. Chief Justice Joseph Lambert has been a guiding force behind the process to adopt Family Courts as a formal amendment. As a result, 132 members of the Kentucky General Assembly voted earlier this year to pass Senate Bill 58, which placed this as the first of two amendments on the Nov. 5 election ballot.

Many prominent and concerned organizations, including the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, Kentucky Education Association, Kentucky Farm Bureau, Kentucky Burley Tobacco Growers Association, Kentucky Association of Retired Teachers, and Kentucky Circuit and District Judges Association, have endorsed the Family Courts amendment.

If approved, Family Courts will continue to use the state's existing

district system in a more efficient way. And as additional funds become available through the state budget, the program will expand to all of Kentucky's counties. If the amendment doesn't pass, this invaluable program will be disbanded throughout the state.

Please take time to vote on the important Family Court amendment on November 5.

County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Center (C) will hold its monthly meeting open to the public the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County FSA Office located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, November 3.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA as the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA committee operate within official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying the judgment and knowledge to make decisions.

Livestock Compensation Program
Jeffery S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, has announced that Secretary Ann Veneman has approved

the entire state of Kentucky for USDA emergency assistance due to the drought this summer. This designation qualifies livestock operations in Kentucky for a direct cash payment under the Livestock Compensation Program.

"We anticipate Kentucky farmers will receive in excess of \$20 million under the Livestock Compensation Program," Hall said. "Farmers that owned eligible livestock as of June 1, 2002 for a period of 90 days or more before and/or after June 1 will be eligible to apply for a direct payment."

The payment rate under the Livestock Compensation Program is \$18 per animal consuming unit, which is indexed against beef cattle. The payment factors are:

- Beef Cows: \$18.00/head
- Dairy Cows: \$31.50/head
- Buffalo and Beafalo: \$18.00/head
- Sheep and Goats: \$4.50/head

For additional information and to sign-up for the Livestock Compensation Program, contact your local FSA County office.

Warehouse Designation - A Must!
Producers that did not designate their bulky tobacco quota to a buying point during the initial designation period, which ended on August 1st, must wait until the first regular redesignation period. Producers will be limited to designate for the farm one time during each regular redesignation period. Therefore, if a farm has multiple tenants which will market tobacco at separate buying points, the farm operator will need to designate for all those tenants at the same time.

October 28 - November 1, 2002 with card effective November 11, 2002.

December 2-6, 2002 with card effective December 16, 2002.

December 27 - January 3, 2002 with card effective January 13, 2002.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

Power of Attorney Forms
If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it is not valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney form is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney, form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). Non-Farm power of attorney forms currently on file are not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. Farmers are cau-

tioned that the authorizing signature on the FSA-211; must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP)
Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Signup for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill/>.

Farm Changes
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update the FSA records with correct ownership. Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

October 1, 2002 - Signup for DCP crop year 2002 and 2003 begins.
Farm Storage Facility Loan Program signup continues.
Conservation Reserve Program signup continues.
April 1, 2003 - Ending date for owners to select base and yield options.
June 2, 2003 - Signup for the 2002 and 2003 DCP ends.

McReynolds remembers Dale Earnhardt & Dave Allison

Larry McReynolds has served as crew chief for NASCAR's best, including Dave Allison and Ernie Ivan, but his best memories center around his own and one-half seasons with Dale Earnhardt.

Two years ago, McReynolds left his job with Richard Childress Racing for a job with Fox Sports as a television analyst and broadcaster, a job that he says is demanding, but very rewarding.

"My family really wasn't that much into racing when I was growing up," he said. "I did have an uncle that raced, but it wasn't until an aunt of mine started running a car in the street stock division at Birmingham International Raceway that I became interested in it."

"Her husband ran a junkyard and I got a job working in it part-time while going to high school. Fortunately, or unfortunately, racing is like a disease. When it gets in your blood stream, no matter what level, you're hooked."

"By that time, I knew racing was what I wanted to do for a living," he continued. "But it's a tough sport to break into. It's hard, bumpy, and a very discouraging road to follow. You've got to wind up at the right place at the right time, and fortunately, that happened to me in 1980."

McReynolds read a classified ad in a NASCAR newsletter about a new race car team that was starting in Greenville, South Carolina. His made

the phone call, and two weeks later moved to South Carolina.

"After working for several small teams, he landed a job with crew chief Ken Bernstein's team. During the next six years, the team had several drivers with only moderate success."

He left Bernstein at the beginning of 1991 and moved to Robert Yates Racing, where he teamed up with a young Alabama driver named Davey Allison.

The move put Larry McReynolds on the NASCAR map. McReynolds went on to help Allison gain 11 Winston Cup victories before his death in a helicopter crash at Talladega in 1993.

"In my book, Davey Allison was one of the most awesome race car drivers there ever was," he said. "There's no telling how many races and championships he would have won if he hadn't been killed in that crash."

He continued with Robert Yates until the beginning of the 1997 season. While attending the NASCAR exhibition race in Japan in 1996, he was asked by Richard Childress to Dale Earnhardt to join the No. 3 GM Goodwrench team.

"It was the toughest decision of my life to leave Robert Yates," he continued. "But when the seven-time Winston Cup champion - Dale Earnhardt is all but begging you to come work with him on his race car, you have to take a hard look at it."

"The one and one-half years that I worked with Dale Earnhardt wasn't anything like either of us expected. A lot of people thought we were fighting, and weren't friends, but that was wrong."

"I think we were too much a like."
