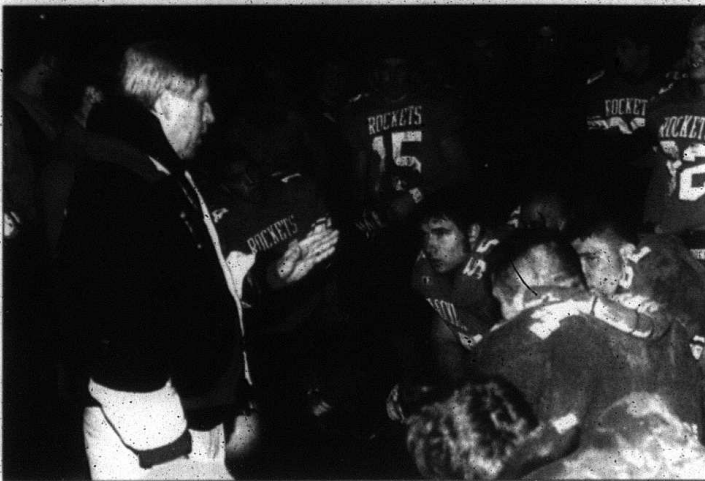

Bell County goes down for second time

Rockets win third straight regional title with 31-14 win

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team will play in their third straight state-wide final game on Friday night after a 31-14 win over visiting Bell County in the regional final.

Bell County has been considered the class of the region for years by most observers, but the class of the region certainly has to be considered the ROCK, after their three year dominance of the Bobcats.

A large crowd braved the extremely cold temperatures as the Rockets won their 12th straight game of the season putting their record at 12-1.

The Rockets also overcame a fumble on the opening kick-off and some very questionable calls. Two touchdowns were also called back.

Quarterback Aaron Andykin turned in his best performance of the season, throwing for 111 yards and rushing for another 38. He had no interceptions. He threw two touchdown passes and rushed for another one.

Marty Reagan also played well again with 89 yards on 17 carries. Reagan also had a touchdown run and an extra point conversion.

Devin Taylor had five catches for 76 yards and he also kicked a field goal and two extra points. He caught a second quarter touchdown pass as well.

Derrick Hurst caught a 35 yard touchdown pass in the first quarter, after catching the ball he made an excellent run to the end zone.

Fullback Clell Swinney had 60 yards on five carries.

The game was tight throughout the first half, with Rockcastle leading 7-6 and then 15-6 before going up 21-6 with less than two minutes in the half.

But Bell took the ball straight down the field scoring a touchdown, and the two point conversion, to make the score 21-14 at halftime.

But that would be it for Bell County as the Rocket defense held them without a score in the second half and the Rocket offense put up ten points.

"Abney, Rice, Brummett, Thomas, Leger and Boreing did a great job of giving Anderson time to throw and making holes for our backs," Larkey said.

Defensive coach Tony Saylor also had nothing but praise for his defense. "They stopped a good team especially in the second half," Saylor said.

"I think our kids wanted it more and they adjusted well in the second half," he said.

The Rocket offense had 287 yards and the Rocket defense held the Bobcats to 213 total yards.

Senior Stephen Boreing and junior Devon Bussell led the defensive unit in tackles. Boreing had 13 tackles and assists and Bussell had twelve.

Keagan recorded a sack and ten tackles and assists. Benny Northern had a sack, fumble recovery and four tackles and assists.

Jason Leger had six tackles, Michael Brummett had three tackles and assists. Tanner Abney had five tackles and assists and James Bussell had three tackles and assists.

Linebacker Chris Croucher had seven tackles and assists, Taylor had two tackles and assists and a key interception.

Hurst had one tackle.

The Rockets, who have had seven straight winning seasons

under the guidance of Larkey and Saylor will face Fort Thomas Highlands, a team who defeated Lexington Catholic last week.

Highlands has a record of 10-3, but have lost to three very good teams, two of which were AA schools.

This season the Bluebirds lost to Dixie Heights, Henry Clay and Louisville Male.

In 2000 Highlands defeated the ROCK 41-9 in the semi-final game.

Last year the ROCK defeated Covington Catholic in the semi-final game to advance to the state finals in Louisville.

"We can't make any mistakes and we have to control the line of scrimmage again," Larkey said.

Police make more drug arrests

A second wave of arrests in what police are calling a major drug trafficking business operating between Texas and Kentucky took place Friday, with seven more arrested on cocaine charges.

The seven are linked with 11 arrested in an October roundup and indicted earlier this month in U.S. District Court.

Richard Badaracco of the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) said Friday's second wave of arrests likely will be the last in this particular investigation, which has been going on 16 months and involves 18 federal, state and local law enforcement agencies.

Most of those arrested Friday live in Lincoln County, as did the bulk of those already under indictment.

Numerous large fines for illegal hunting here

But most abide by the laws

The Department of Fish and Wildlife has been active in Rockcastle County during the past couple of months.

According to court records, Officer Steve Isaacs has charged at least thirty people with violations of Fish and Wildlife laws, he has also charged at least five individuals with violations of law that are not Fish and Wildlife laws, which he has legal authority to do, such as burglary and drug related charges.

The incarceration time, fines and costs vary based on the charges and facts of each case, but a review of cases already disposed of in court reveal stiff penalties are being imposed.

"We are trying to be fair with everyone who is charged with these types of offenses," Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette indicated. "And Officer Isaacs of the Department of Fish and Wildlife having updated our office at one point during modern gun season, that he had checked 91 hunters and all were compliant with the law. That shows that enforcement is working, and that most of our citizens are diligent in hunting legally," Burdette added.

"And, all other law enforcement agencies are working in cooperation with the Department to promote safe and legal hunting, so we can conserve our wildlife in Rockcastle County."

Persons charged with illegally taking wildlife have been required to reimburse the state for the cost of the wildlife taken. Some have lost their firearms, and forfeited their right to hunt for up to three years.

Last Wednesday, Christopher Fleming, 27, of Copper Creek, was caught hunting deer without a license and had to pay over \$350 in fines and costs, reimburse the Department of Fish and Wildlife \$757 for the illegally taken deer, lost his hunting privileges for three years, forfeit all four weapons, ammunition, deer grunt calls and had to pay towing and storage for his confiscated 1991 Chevy pickup.

On October 30th, Karac Grubb, 18, of Livingston, paid nearly \$1,000 in fines and costs for illegally taking a wild turkey. He was required to pay replacement costs for the turkey to the department in the amount of \$275, and lost his hunting privileges for two years.

Jerry Price, II, 21, of Somerset, was found guilty of "spooflighting" and fined \$150 plus costs on November

13. Delbert Slusher, 25 and his wife, Amanda, 18, both of Livingston, illegally possessed protected wildlife, raccoons and received over \$300 in fines and costs. Mr. Slusher had to forfeit his weapon to the Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Other cases have been resolved with fines and forfeitures, and numerous other cases are still pending.

Notably, the cases of brothers Jonathan, 20, and Michael McKinney, 26, of Sand Springs are pending a resolution in court. The McKinneys were arrested after approximately 87 counts were levied against them for illegal possession and taking of deer and turkey. A felony gun charge is also pending.

Kidnapper gets federal jail time

Ruth Lillard, who was convicted of kidnapping a Mt. Vernon man and then forcing him at knife-point to drive to Tennessee, has been sentenced to 14 years in prison - almost twice the time her partner in the crime received after he pleaded guilty.

Ruth Lillard, 30, was tried in July and sentenced Thursday. Justin L. Lillard, 23, pleaded guilty in April and received a seven year, three-month sentence, in part because he cooperated and did not force a trial.

Last year, the pair from Joplin, Missouri, kidnapped Mike Jones, 48, as he was showing his pickup truck to them and their baby. They forced him to drive down Interstate 75 to Carville, Tennessee, where Jones escaped to safety with only minor injuries.

Points East

There was an article in last Sunday's Lexington Herald Leader Food Section, which the paper has cleverly renamed "A LA CARTE" in its ongoing effort to be significantly more pretentious than your average rag, touting a cookbook which subsequently touted the gourmet experience of eating the still-heating heart of a live cobra. I wasn't lying nor even stretching the truth.

Presumably, the snake dies after you chew on its heart for awhile but I still can't imagine the horsey set flocking out to the closest snake store and ordering live cobras for, say, 12 dinner guests unless they have competing hay-burners entered in the same race.

To give the paper due credit, there were no precise instructions for serving live cobra hearts. And the cookbook reviewer did seem to think that the culinary value of snorting snake hearts, while not totally disgusting, might be a bit far-fetched for even the blue-bloods of The Bluegrass.

(I personally believe that still-throbbing snake-hearts, besides being a great name for one of Dave Barry's Rock Bands) has the potential for dramatically improving the taste and texture of Keeneland burgo and I've set to wondering how the hearts of cow-suckers and garter snakes might favorably substitute for cobras' in the much the same way as spoonbail and carp eggs get passed locally for caviar.)

That here's what I've got me off. The same reviewer, while registering some veiled disgust to frowning down on snake hearts, found it almost equally disgusting to butcher a hog (the called on rigs) and then eating the fresh pork.

In the first place, if you are home butchering, you shoot the hog between the eyes with a .22 rifle and immediately cut its throat so that it bleeds properly. You scald the carcass with boiling water and rake off the hair after you are sure the hog is dead. You wash and rewash the carcass, with scalding water.

There are any number of ways to slice the hog open to its entrails, depending on the supervising butcher, but once you do that, if the heart is still beating, you drop your knives and butchering implements and head for the hills at a hard run because it's almost a sure thing that you are dealing with a witch. (I've never actually seen that happen but I've heard

about it and I know for sure that I wouldn't want to cope with a hog that had been shot and bled and scalded and still had a beating heart.)

The truth of the matter is that all butchered hogs, in my personal experience, yield the most deliciously edible pork before the meat has been salted or refrigerated. That's nothing as good and tasty and as a chunk of fresh pork tenderloin certainly

roasted on a stick over the coals of the same fire that heated the butchers' tubs of scalding water—and served with a big slice of cornbread-for lunch, while the butchering is going on. I've been there many times. I know what I'm talking about. I'd much rather have a fresh ham,

country-butchered the day before Thanksgiving and trimmed of excess fat than the plumpiest turkey ever to hit an oven. Where did the notion that fresh meat isn't good originate? How long does a hog have to be dead for newspaper writers at the Herald Leader, etc. cease to be disgusted and consider it delicious? Why does a frozen turkey seem more palatable and legitimate on the dinner table because it's been dead/frozen for a certain length of time than one that got slaughtered this morning with an ax and prepared for dinner?

I'm just asking. I know the answer has to do with pure denial and naivete. But for whatever its worth, I'll take the fresh meat any day as long as the heart ain't still beating and it ain't a snake. You will too, if you are ever blessed with the opportunity to try it.

Stop Winter Itch

When the humidity drops very low in the winter, the skin suffers. Not only does the skin dry out from the low humidity, but also from many things we normally do, such as bathing which washes away the skin's protective oils. When the skin gets dry it begins to itch, and scratching it only makes it worse.

The first step in helping the skin is to increase the humidity in the house. Use a vaporizer or humidifier. Lowering the temperature also helps -- the more you heat, the more you dry the air.

A person should bathe less frequently and use a superfatted soap, such as Basis, Dove or Carols. Avoid replacing the oils and keep the skin moist.

Kerl Lotion or Eucerin are other oils that can be added to the skin after a bath. If the oils are added to the bath water, they make the tub very

slippery and dangerous. You should pat your skin dry after a bath or shower and then apply the bath oil.

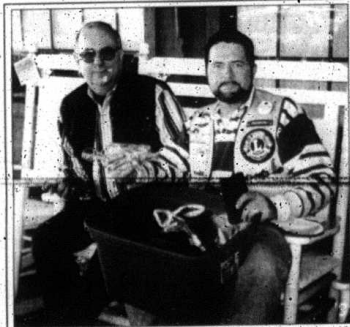
Carmol and Natraplus are lotions which draw water into the skin and help hold it there.

Antihistamines can be used for severe itching, especially at night when itching is much more noticeable. Antihistamines may cause drowsiness which can help you sleep through the night, but drowsiness during the day-time can be troublesome. Cortisone creams will help if there is any inflammation of the skin and help to moisturize the skin if they are in an ointment.

Using these products, either singly or in combination, will help stop the winter itch.

To the Citizens of Livingston
We would like to personally thank you for supporting the Mayor and Commissioners in our endeavor to get our town back in the position where we can do things that have needed to be done for a long time. Under the present administration, the town has been able to receive some revenue that has been long over due. The State Uniform Financial Reports have been completed, releasing approximately \$8,000 to our budget for much needed road and street repair. 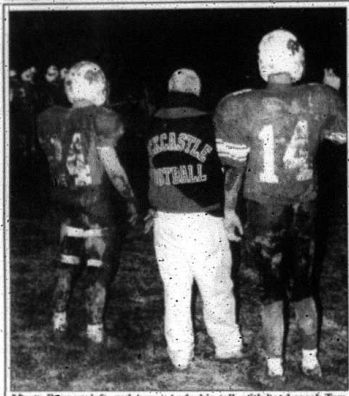

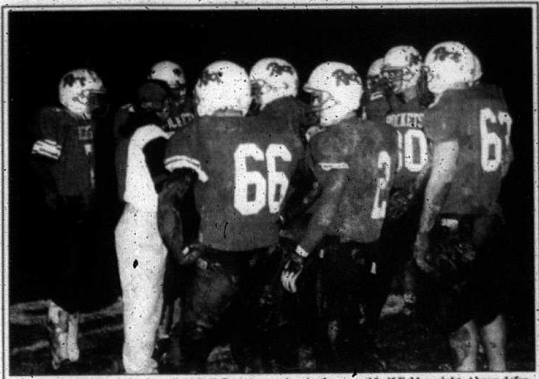

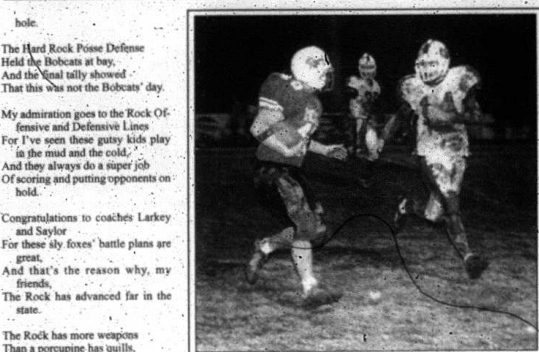
Bullen entered a guilty plea on July 26, 2002, conspiring to possess with the intent to distribute over 500 grams of a mixture of substance containing cocaine, a Schedule II controlled substance, forfeiture of assets, and possessing firearms in furtherance of a drug trafficking crime.

Bullen was sentenced to 120 months in prison to be followed by four years supervised release and a \$200 special assessment.

The case was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Mt. Vernon Police Department. The case was prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney, Stephen C. Smith.

Mission group at Christ's Outreach

In August 2002, Brenda Venhuizen working through CAM (Coalition of Appalachian Ministries) presented to her congregation an opportunity to service the Lord at Christ's Outreach for the Blind. At that time many people picked up information and applications. Three people filled out the paperwork on

the spot. One member who was unable to go on the mission trip and having a heart for doing the Lord's work and helping others wrote out a check to help buy materials needed at Christ's Outreach. Then Kim Kuster presented the needs of the camp to her OASIS (Orland Area Sight Impaired Support) group. The

group was able to donate commercial kitchen cookware to the camp. By the time the group was ready to head to Kentucky, a total of twenty adult skilled and unskilled workers were ready to go. On October 20th, the Orland Park group arrived at Christ's Outreach for the Blind in a caravan of five vans with a truck loaded with donations arriving the next day.

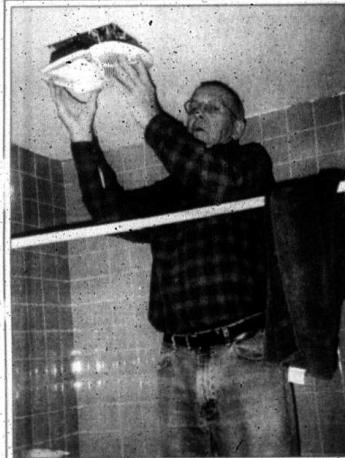
On the very first day, many of the mission work camp volunteers felt a sense of being overwhelmed - the beauty of God and the work to be done. Even though autumn greeted them with its awesome display of colored leaves and seventy degree weather, the camp presented many jobs that needed to be done. Some of the group felt that they possibly couldn't help with the skills they had, but God proved them wrong. Kim Kuster shared, "I am legally blind and have a deep passion for helping those who are usually impaired to better cope with their sight loss. This camp will teach the children that their sight may be impaired, but their lives don't have to be. When I first came, I wondered, if there would be any way that I could assist Mike and Lori. I could not pour concrete or do carpentry or plumbing. Now I realize that whatever gift God has given us, it can be used in some way to prepare the camp for its opening - even helping in the office to do office work or in the kitchen to prepare meals. I have a master's degree in Blind Rehabilitation Teaching for Adults, so I have had the opportunity this week to use some of my skills in making the camp accessible for children who are visually impaired. For example, I placed raised dots on phones to enable them to use the phones easier."

The Orland Park group worked hard during the week of October 20th. They accomplished much: painting bedframes, laying flooring, sanding, painting walls, hanging molding, putting up track lighting, hanging mirrors, bushhogging, pouring a cement sidewalk, installing a flagpole donated by the Mt. Vernon and Brodhead Lions Club, and almost completely constructing a PRIDE greenhouse. Kenneth Ipema wrote about his work experience, "God gave me the strength to do the work even with a bad arm." Also, Joyce Ipema shared how God had worked in her life to allow her to have the strength to work hard even after the loss of her son, "I lost my son six months ago. I have not been able to keep my mind set on anything. I worked for eight hours a day without feeling that I can't. God gave me strength that I have not had and the desire to complete a project we started. I could not have done it without the grace of God."

With a feeling of accomplishment, the Orland Park-Christian Reformed Church began their trip back to Illinois on October 26th. Maureen Loerop summed up the work camp experience by saying, "It's been a great experience! The work has been so hard, so fun, so rewarding. 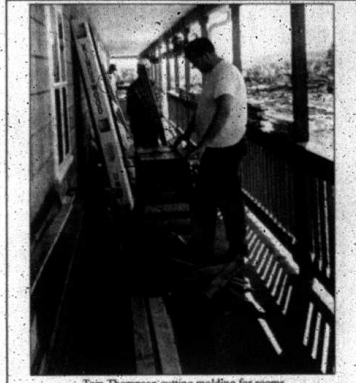

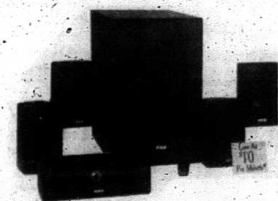

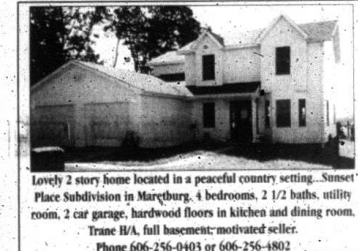

New Livestock Compensation Program (LCP)

Rockcastle County is now eligible for the Livestock Compensation Program. A program which will make available \$752 million for cattle, sheep, goat and buffalo to producers with livestock headquarters operations physically located in a county that has received a Secretarial primary disaster designation after June 1, 2001 due to drought.

Under LCP payments are based on the standard feed consumption data for each eligible type of livestock. Eligible livestock must have been owned or cash-leased by the applicant on or before June 1, 2002 and owned for a minimum of 90 calendar days. Cattle must have weighed 500 lbs. or more on June 1, 2002.

Producers are reminded payments received are to be by direct deposit method. Therefore, if you do not have a direct deposit form on file with the office please bring a void check with you when coming to apply for the program.

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCCP)

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Sign up for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003.

Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

Power of Attorney Forms

If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it's not valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney form is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney, form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). Non-FSA power of attorney forms currently on file are not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. Farmers are cautioned that the authorizing signature on the FSA-211, must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

Kentucky Counties Eligible for FSA Emergency Loans

Jeffrey S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Kentucky, has announced that all Kentucky counties are eligible for Federal disaster assistance, including FSA emergency loans (EM) for eligible farmers.

On October 24, 2002, Secretary Ann M. Veneman declared Kentucky a disaster area due to production losses caused by drought that occurred from June 15, 2002 and continuing. As a result, all counties in Kentucky qualify and are eligible for EM loans through FSA.

FSA will make loans up to \$500,000 per borrower, at a statutory

3.75 percent interest rate, subject to test for credit. Applications must be filed with the local FSA County Office not later than June 24, 2003.

the item in cold water before laundering it.

Secure common stains to prevent a stain remover or applying it. Some common stains to prevent tough problems are using a pre-wash stain remover, or applying and gently rubbing in a liquid detergent or granular detergent-water paste.

Soaking can effectively loosen heavy soils. Separate white items from colors. Also separately soak colors that might bleed, or put them with like-colored fabrics. Presoaking directions generally recommend 30 minutes or longer in cool or warm water.

If your washer has a pre-wash cycle, consider this stain removal technique; it takes less time than soaking. Use a pre-soak product, detergent, and/or other laundry additive during this cycle.

Always check clothing to be sure the stain is completely removed before putting the item in a dryer, or ironing it, because heat can permanently set the stain.

Be patient; you might have to repeat a treatment several times to completely remove a stain.

Wash will be most successful at home removal by using techniques recommended for the type of stain. Here are removal tips for some common stains on clothing and accessories that do not require dry cleaning:

To remove beverages such as coffee, tea, soft drinks, wine and alcoholic beverages, sponge or soak the stain in cool water. Before laundering, pre-treat with a stain remover, liquid laundry detergent or a granular detergent-water paste. Launder using whatever type bleach is recommended for the clothing.

Milder stains might respond better to pre-treatment or soaking in an

enzyme product prior to laundering.

To determine if a treatment will harm a fabric or color, put a small amount of the recommended stain remover on a hidden part of the clothing or accessory, such as a clipping from the seam allowance. Rub and let it dry. If the color or fabric isn't damaged, proceed with the suggested treatment.

Treat or pre-wash in warm water and an enzyme-containing product or use a pre-wash stain remover to eliminate chocolate; then, launder. If the stain remains, wash again with a bleach safe for the fabric.

When you discover a cosmetic stain, treat it with a pre-wash remover, liquid laundry detergent or granular detergent-water paste. Afterwards, launder it.

Around the home, candle wax is one of the most common stains around the holidays.

To remove dried candle wax, use a dull knife to scrape it off the surface of the tablecloth, placemat or other fabric surface. Afterwards, put several layers of clean paper towels below and on top of the stain; press with a warm iron from the back of the fabric to transfer wax onto the paper towels. Repeat this process, and change paper towels often until they no longer absorb wax.

Next, put the stained item face down on clean paper towels and sponge with a pre-wash stain remover. Then, launder it with detergent and water that's hot as possible without damaging the fabric. If any stain remains, wash again with a bleach that's safe for the fabric.

Holiday Stain Removal

Hectic holiday schedules make it easy to miss a stain on a favorite outfit or tie until you get it out to wear to a special occasion.

Fresh stains are easier to remove than old ones so check your clothing and accessories as soon as you get home from an event. When you find a stain, read and follow the care label instructions. If you take clothing to the dry cleaner, point out the stain location and its source, such as red wine, chocolate, or so forth, if you know it.

Dry cleaning is the safest, best treatment for necktie stains. If you know when the spill occurs, simply blot the spot with an absorbent towel or tissue. Don't try to clean the spot with the first available liquid.

When it's okay to remove the stain at home, be sure to use products formulated for the stain.

Since you can set some stains with the wrong removal treatment, try to find out what the stain is. If the item is washable, but you're sure of the stain source, rinse or soak
