## Thursday snow closes local schools

Rockcastle County Schools were dismissed fifteen minutes after it started Wednesday morning, after a winter snow storm blanketed the county.

Rockcastle County School official Richard Bray said that many students had to be taken home by private vehicles, after it became very slick in a very short period of time, but thanks to the cooperation of school employees and even some private individuals there were no injuries.

Weather officials said that about three inches of the white stuff had fallen by four p.m. and Rockcastle School officials announced late Wednesday afternoon that there would be no school on Thursday, (today).

Many churches cancelled services on Wednesday night and some businesses, including Mt. Vernon Plastics closed up shop.

It was the first major storm of the season and had been predicted by forecasters.

Police are blaming the snow and ice for a fatality on interstate 75 around 8:30 a.m. Wednesday on the weather conditions.

James Eddie Price, 65, died at the scene. The north bound lane of I-75 was closed for a period of time because of accident.

## Most motorist good during holiday

On Wednesday, November 27th, through Sunday, December 1st, at 11:59 p.m., the Kentucky State Police at London were out in force targeting intoxicated drivers, speeding motorists, seatbelt and child restraint violators to help make this holiday season a safe one for those living in and traveling through our post area.

This effort was to reduce traffic accidents and fatalities that are caused by intoxicated drivers and speeding motorists. By working saturated patrols and traffic safety checkpoints throughout the post area over 700 vehicles were stopped.

Those traffic stops resulted in the following traffic activity: a total of 536 citations were issued which were 231 Speeding, 50 Seatbelt, 3 Child Restraint violations and 15 Drivers were arrested for Driving Under the Influence.

The remaining citations were for other traffic and non-traffic related offenses. The State Police investigated a total of 19 accidents with 0 fatal crashes.

Additionally the Kentucky State Police at London responded in 319 complaints, opening 25 criminal cases, made 44 criminal arrest and gave assistance to 34 motorists. Detectives and Troopers from the London Post conducted two death investigations in the London Post area.

On Thursday, November 28th Detective Billy Madden and the London/Laurel County Major Crimes Task Force conducted the investigation into the shooting of Bobby Ray Grubb, 44, of Manchester which resulted from a domestic dispute in Laurel County.

Trooper Phillip Hayes is investigating the death of Jeffrey Barlow.

## Rockcastle man killed in domestic dispute

On Thursday, November 28, at approximately 10:35 p.m., members of the London/Laurel County Major Crimes Task Force responded to the report of a shooting five miles north of London on Little Arthur Ridge Road in Laurel County.

According to the investigation Bobby Ray Grubb, 44, of Rockcastle and his wife, Brenda K. Grubb, of East Bernstadt had been separated for several months when he discovered she was visiting a family member for Thanksgiving when Bobby Ray Grubb, suddenly showed up. While there a domestic dispute erupted between the two and a family member at the residence shot Bobby Ray Grubb once. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Laurel County Deputy Coroner Doug Bowling.

According to court records, Brenda Grubb had gotten an emergency protection order against her husband.

## Local McKinney brothers receive huge fines for wildlife violations

What is probably one of the largest financial penalties ever assessed in Kentucky was ordered in the Rockcastle District Court cases recently involving two local brothers, Michael and Jonathan McKinney, of Sand Springs.

Last Wednesday, in Rockcastle District Court both Michael and Jonathan McKinney pled guilty to 28 of the 85 charges lodged against them earlier this year. Most of the misdemeanor charges brought on September 13, 2002 were charges related to possession of illegally taken wildlife.

After Fish and Wildlife Officer Steve Isaacs, along with Kentucky State Trooper Coby Smith in cooperation with the Rockcastle Sheriff's Office, investigated the McKinney's activities, a search warrant was obtained from the Rockcastle County Attorney's office. The search turned up a number of deer mounts and turkey parts.

In addition to being assessed the brothers were ordered to repay \$12,500 to the Department of Fish

and Wildlife for illegally possessed deer and turkey parts. The brothers also forfeited 23 firearms, a litany of hunting accessories, deer and turkey mounts and their rights to hunt for five years.

Michael McKinney was sentenced to one year, to serve 45 days on 14 counts of misdemeanor possession of illegally taken deer and turkey.

Jonathan McKinney was sentenced to one year to serve 15 days on 14 misdemeanor counts. Both are on two years probation, and after their release, each brother is required to do 150 hours of community service.

"The brothers recorded many of their illegal hunting activities on video, and hadn't tagged or reported their takes," County Attorney Jeff Burdette said. "It would have been difficult however to prove a number of charges that were lodged, except for possession charges, so I believe their resolution was a fair one," he

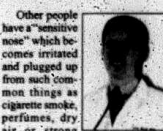

# Sinus Headaches

The sinuses get blamed for a lot of things, especially headaches. The swelling and pressure that occurs in the sinuses when they become plugged up and infected can be quite severe. Even a gentle touch to the cheeks, forehead, and alongside the nose can be very painful.

The sinuses become plugged up for a variety of reasons. About one person in six has allergies and the nose is one of the main targets for pollen. If allergies are the main cause of sinus problems, a person can treat the symptoms with antihistamines and decongestants. There are also corticosteroid nasal sprays and medicines that prevent allergic cells from releasing histamine. These medicines can be very effective.

Allergy testing shows exactly what a person is allergic to. This will help the person avoid specific allergens and it allows prescribing allergy shots, which desensitize the nasal passages to the pollens of dusts.

Other people have a "sensitive nose" which becomes irritated and plugged up from such common things as cigarette smoke, perfumes, dry air or strong odors.

To treat sinus headaches, you must first relieve the pressure in the sinuses. Decongestants and prescription nasal sprays can decrease the swelling which obstructs the sinus openings. Antibiotics are needed to treat bacterial infections, if indicated. Other factors should be corrected if possible. This includes avoiding cigarette smoke and other airborne pollutants, such as smoke from burning wood.

In some cases, surgery is needed to open the sinuses and keep the passages from becoming easily plugged again.

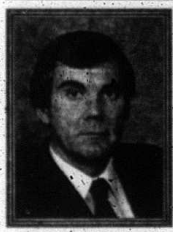

## Ken Mattingly earns national certification

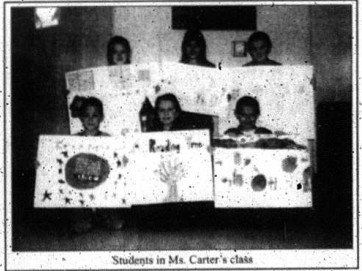
A Rockcastle County Middle School teacher was recently recognized for accomplished teaching by earning the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS) certification. James Mattingly is one of 304 Kentucky teachers awarded NBPTS certification this year and one of 349 total Kentucky NBPTS-certified teachers. According to NBPTS, Kentucky was one of the top 10 performing states in percentage pass rate across the nation.

The NBPTS recognizes accomplished teachers who meet stringent standards in their classroom practices. As an NBPTS candidate, Mattingly developed a portfolio analyzing student work and 20-minute segments of classroom videotapes and participated in a rigorous one-day assessment of content knowledge.

NBPTS estimates that each candidate spends a minimum of 300 hours on the NBPTS certification process while maintaining a full-time teaching status.

With 349 teachers who have received national certification, Kentucky has a goal of having an NBPTS-certified teacher in every public school by 2020.

The 2000 General Assembly provided incentives to Kentucky teachers pursuing NBPTS certification to support experienced teachers like Jacqueline Fortner. 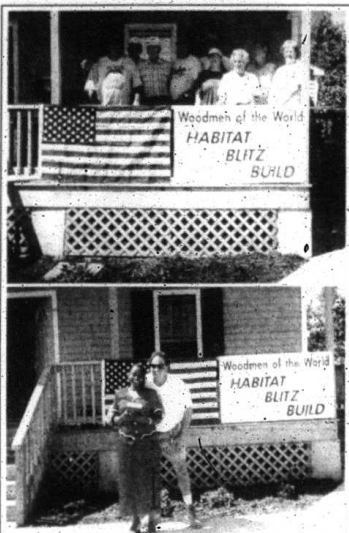

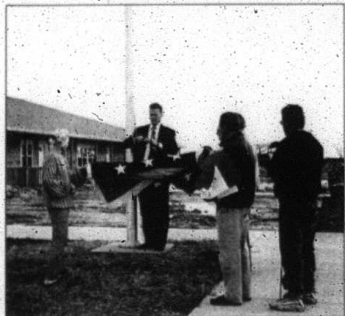

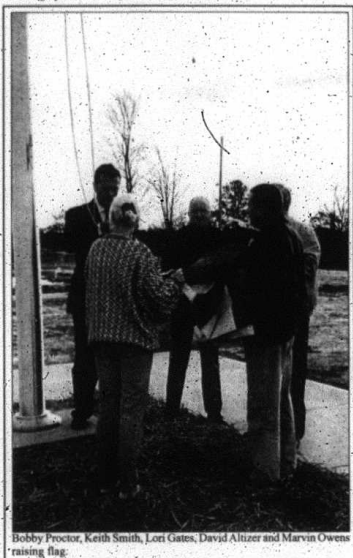

## The Family Room

### What Is Your Advice to the World?

In the comic strip "B.C." there occasionally appears a little guru who sits at the top of a mountain. Other characters climb the mountain looking for words of wisdom. What if you were that guru at the top of the mountain?

What if others came to you for advice? What would be the one piece of wisdom that you would share with them? What philosophy of life would you impart to them in a brief period of time that would change their lives?

I know what I would tell them. My one piece of advice that would improve their lives would be very simple: FLOSS. You heard me correctly. I said "floss."

No, I am not a dentist nor am I being paid by a dentist. I am not a bill for the dental floss industry. I think that, when you stop to consider it, this piece of advice makes all kinds of sense.

I began flossing my teeth late in life. Two things made me start. One was a particularly thorough cleaning by my dental hygienist. I must have said "Ouch!" four hundred times during that cleaning. When the dentist came in, I mentioned that this was the most painful cleaning I had ever experienced, thoroughly expecting him to chastise this woman for her rough treatment of his valuable patient (me). Instead all he said was, "If you would floss regularly, the cleanings wouldn't hurt." At that moment, I decided flossing sounded like a very good idea.

The second event that began my regular use of a dental floss was my discovery of a new kind of floss called Glide. My teeth are very difficult to floss. The floss hangs up and breaks and I end up with little pieces of floss stuck between my teeth. I am worse-off when I finish than when I began. But not since I discovered Glide. This stuff is amazing! It does not break but slips easily between my teeth, which are much too close together. Glide makes flossing a breeze.

It takes less than a minute to floss my teeth, yet many of us do not take that time. We offer many excuses. Some floss only occasionally. Others who floss regularly skip the teeth that are difficult to reach. (One local dentist, when asked, "Do I have to floss all my teeth?" replied, "No. Floss only the ones you want to keep.")

What does flossing have to do with improving the quality of life? First, you get to keep your teeth longer. For those of us who grew up with no fluoride in the water nor in the toothpaste, we need all the help we can get. I plan to end life with my natural teeth intact.

## Agricultural News

### County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (C) will hold its monthly meeting open to the public the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8:30 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County FSA Office located in the USDA Service Center at Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thursday, December 5, 2002.

The CFC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The CFC members help FSA as the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA's committee operates with official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgement and knowledge to make decisions.

**Warehouse Designation - A Must!**  
Producers that did not designate their barley tobacco quota to a buying point during the initial designation period, which ended on August 1st, must wait until the first regular redesignation period. Producers will be limited to designate for the farm one time during each regular redesignation period. Therefore, if a

farm has multiple tenants which will market tobacco at separate buying points, the farm operator will need to designate for all those tenants at the same time.

December 2, 2002-December 6, 2002 with card effective December 16, 2002.

December 27, 2002-January 3, 2003 with card effective January 13, 2003.

FSA has a listing for a public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31, 2003.

**New Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) Ends December 13th**

Jeffery S. Hall, State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency in Kentucky, wishes to remind farmers that sign-up for the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) for cattle, sheep, goats and buffalo producers will end on December 13, 2002.

Sign-up began on October 1st for producers with livestock headquarters operations physically located in counties that have received a Secular primary disaster designation for drought between January 1, 2001 and

September 19, 2002. "All counties in Kentucky qualify," Mr. Hall said. Payments are based on standard feed consumption data for each eligible type of livestock. Eligible livestock and payment rates, adjusted by these factors include:

- Beef, buffalo and beefalo (adult) - \$18.00 per head
  - Dairy Cows - \$31.50 per head
  - Goats and Sheep - \$4.30 per head
- To date, over \$13 million has been paid to over 27,000 livestock producers in Kentucky. As of today, Rockcastle County has paid 285 producers \$235,254.00.

For more information or to sign up for the program, producers should visit their local FSA County Office. Information is also available on line at: <http://drought.fsa.usda.gov/assistance.asp#LCP>.

### Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP)

Direct and counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Sign up for the program scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003. Program participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers have been mailed additional information concerning this program. Those who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

### Milk Income-Loss Contract

MILC payments scheduled for the month of November 2002 will NOT be made at this time. Producers are reminded to continue to bring in their milk weights as available for payment as new software becomes available.

### County Committee Ballots To Be Counted

The ballots for the Rockcastle County FSA Committee will be counted Thursday, December 5, 2002. The counting is open to the public.

The Rockcastle Co. FSA Office mailed the CFC ballots November 19, 2002 for the county area of LAAR Community C. This area is the northeast and southeast section of Rockcastle County bound by Garrard, Madison, Jackson and Laurel County. Highway boundaries are Little Hurricane Road, I-75 and Hwy. 25.

A total of 1227 of farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers of legal voting age were eligible to vote through December 2, 2002 if they were eligible to take part in any FSA program.

Names of the candidates in order as they appeared on the ballot were: Joe C. Bullen, Pamela Burdette, Thomas W. Coffey and James Hazelwood.

The newly elected County Committee member will take office January 1, 2003.

### Rural Development (Housing)

Rural Development (low-income housing) is regularly scheduled to be in the Rockcastle County FSA Office on the second Tuesday of each month. The next day scheduled for RD Tuesday, December 10th between 9 a.m. and 11 a.m.

October 1, 2002 - Sign up for DCP crop year 2002 and 2003 begins. Farm Storage Facility Loan Program sign-up continues.

Conservation Reserve Program sign-up continues.


April 1, 2003 - Bidding date for owners to select base and yield options.

June 2, 2003 - Sign up for the 2002 and 2003 DCP ends.

## Identity Fraud and Theft

Identity fraud is the number one consumer fraud in the United States. On December 1st of this year, Federal authorities unveiled charges against three men in what they said was the largest identity-fraud case in U.S. history. The ring stole private financial information on people across the United States; 10,000 victims have been identified so far. According to authorities, the thieves used pilfered corporate passwords to electronically access consumer data from all three major credit-reporting bureaus.

For many consumers, the theft was the beginning of a nightmare that left their bank accounts drained and a loved crooks to run up thousands of dollars' worth of fraudulent charges in the victims' names. The case underscores the sense that identity theft, already considered the latest-greatest financial crime in the country, has reached epidemic proportions.

Identity thieves use the victim's personal and financial information, both date, Social Security number and bank account number - to make fraudulent credit card purchases, open unauthorized bank accounts and even take out loans in the victim's name. Consumers aren't legally responsible for paying the

fraudulent charges. But they must prove the transactions were fraudulent.

This particular scam started more than two years ago, when one of the men charged worked for a Long Island company that provides software and computer services to help banks and retail stores access consumer credit reports online from credit-reporting agencies Equifax Inc., Experian and Trans Union.

The employee allegedly used his position as a computer help-desk employee to partition passwords used by a variety of customers. With those passwords credit reports could be obtained on thousands of consumers, listing mortgage information, credit card numbers and loan-payment histories. So far the losses caused by this scam have been calculated at \$2.7 million, but it is expected that the total will reach several million more.

To protect yourself from identity theft, check your credit bureau report at least once a year. You can call the credit bureaus at: Experian - 1-888-397-3742; Equifax - 1-800-525-6285; and Trans Union - 1-800-680-7289.
