## Andy Barnett pays fines of nearly \$2,000 Faces Drug Charges

A local gas has pled guilty to numerous wildlife charges and faces other charges for drug trafficking. Andy Barnett, 38, owner of Barnett's Auto Salvage at Cove Branch was arrested on December 19th and charged with three counts of buying fur without a permit and having a seven point whitetail rack in his possession, also without a permit.

Barnett was also charged with two counts of trafficking in a controlled substance and trafficking in marijuana. Barnett was also charged with receiving stolen property. He is accused of having a stolen firearm in his possession that he knew was stolen. Barnett pled guilty to the wildlife charges and paid fines and court costs in the amount of \$1,970.50. \$1,100.50 went to court costs, \$1,300 was paid as a fine and \$1,570 was paid to the once defunct local Sportsman Club.

A court date of March 12th, concerning the drug charges, has been set for Barnett for a pre-trial conference.

Barnett is currently free on bond. The local Sportsman Club will meet next Tuesday night. For more information contact Perry Mink at (606) 5198.

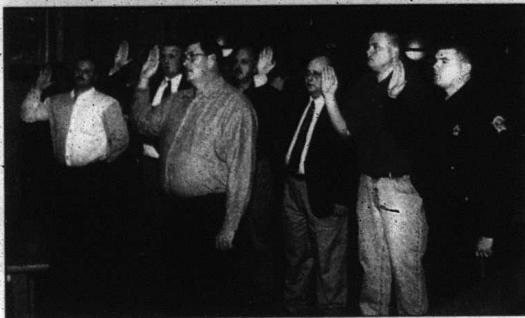
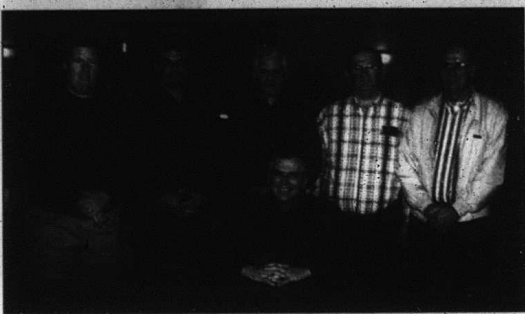

## \$3 billion cut was expected Heating program should be fully funded this year

Local Daniel Boone Development Corporation Director Betty Carter Bussell was breathing a little easier Wednesday, than she had on Monday and Tuesday.

The director of the local Community Action Agency had been very worried about last week's announcement by the federal government that money for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program, (LIEAP) would be cut by some \$3 million statewide.

Nationwide the cut would have been \$3 billion. However, Wednesday, Bussell's supervisor notified her that the Bush administration had changed their mind about the spending cuts in the program.

"We were processing as many emergency cases as we could this week, before the money ran out, but now we are feeling a whole lot better about the funding for this much needed assistance program," Mrs. Bussell said.

On Monday and Tuesday the local agency, which is located on Main

Street in Mt. Vernon, assisted 145 families and spent \$30,000 to help them heat their homes this winter.

Currently the agency is taking only crisis applications for assistance.

To qualify a family must have a disconnect notice or a four day supply of fuel. They must also be low income.

During the subsidy phase of the program in November, the local agency assisted 996 families and spent over \$110,000 in the county.

Mrs. Bussell said that the crisis program will run into March, but the exact cut off date is not known. It will depend on how much money the program actually gets from the federal government.

The LIEAP program has been in existence for 18 years and has helped thousands of Rockcastle County families.

## Reynolds moves other operations to Plastics

Reynolds Food Packaging, an Alcoa business, announced recently that it will close the qualified Plastics Plant, located in Rutland, Vermont, and move operations to its plant in Mt. Vernon. The closing is set for February 28th.

Both facilities produce a line of thermoformed containers for the foodservice industry with similar products that can be provided from a single plant. There currently are 25 hourly and 7 salaried employees at the qualified plant.

In making the announcement, Mike Roeder, president, Reynolds Food Packaging, said "the closure is

the result of excess capacity. While it was a difficult decision to make, there just wasn't a need to continue to operate two plants producing similar products when production can be handled by one facility. We appreciate the hard-work of the Qualified employees over the years and their contributions to the community."

Paula Quick, an Alcoa spokesperson, said that Alcoa anticipates additional staffing but exact requirements are not known as this time. "Basically, the move to Mt. Vernon will broaden and diversify that plant's product line and help solidify its position as a manufacturing center of

excellence within Alcoa," Quick said. "This means increased job security for Mt. Vernon plant employees and increased financial sustainability for the plant."

Dan Vice, vice president and Director of U.S. operations for Reynolds Food Packaging said, "Our efforts in the weeks ahead will be

## Burdette may run for Ky. Attorney General

Political sources have indicated that Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette may soon announce his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Kentucky Attorney General.

Burdette, who was reelected to his third term as County Attorney in November of last year, has recently generated publicity statewide for prosecution of Fish and Wildlife violations here in Rockcastle County. In Sunday's edition of the *Lexington Herald Leader*, credit was given Burdette for prosecution of several significant cases, including one of the largest in Kentucky history. He practices law with his associate, Bill Reynolds, on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

Burdette was named Kentucky's Young Republican of the Year in 1992 and Kentucky's Young Farmer Spokesperson of the Year in 1993. He was also instrumental in having the Rockcastle Young Republican Club named 'Club of the Year' in 1992.

When asked about reports of his potential candidacy, Burdette would

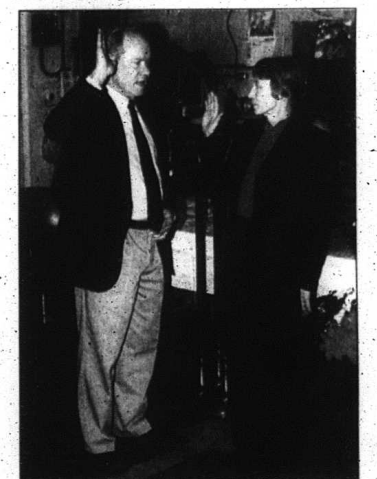

## Taking Care of Fevers

What should you do when your child gets a fever? Does he need to be checked right away or can it be treated with acetaminophen or ibuprofen?

A fever is merely a symptom which means an infection or occasionally some other illness is going on. Typically, the fever is low grade with viruses and higher with bacterial infection. Generally, the higher the fever, the worse the infection. However, some children will get a fever of 105 with mild infections and very sick children may have only mild fevers.

Infants under three months old, any fever should be considered serious and be evaluated very promptly. In older children, a low grade fever with the typical viral symptoms of a runny nose and cough may best be treated with acetaminophen or ibuprofen, decongestants and cough suppressants.

If a child has persistent or high fevers, or localized symptoms such as an earache or sore throat, he should be examined to determine if antibiotics are needed.

Once antibiotics and other specific therapies are started, it is wise to treat the fever to make the child more comfortable, help him rest better and help avoid dehydration.

Acetaminophen or ibuprofen should be given on a regular basis to maintain a therapeutic level. Sponge baths may be helpful once the medicines have reset the "thermostat" in the brain. Always give plenty of fluids. Although aspirin is normally avoided in children with infections because of the risk of Reye's Syndrome, ibuprofen is safe, effective and long acting, making it a popular choice.

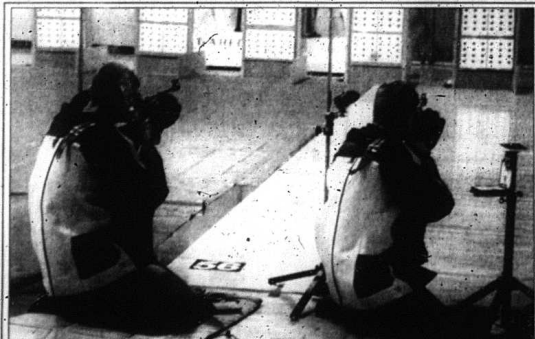

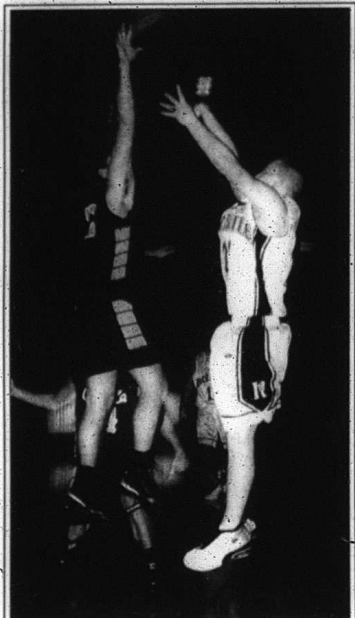
The Rockets jumped out to an

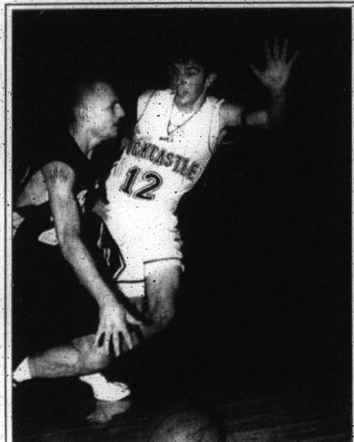

The Rockets are ranked first in the 13th Region in most polls with Corbin second.

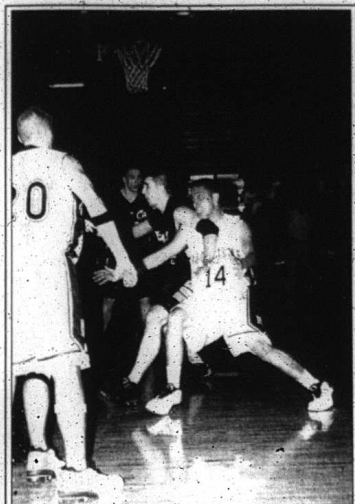
The Rockets will meet South Floyd in the losers bracket Thursday night at 6:30.

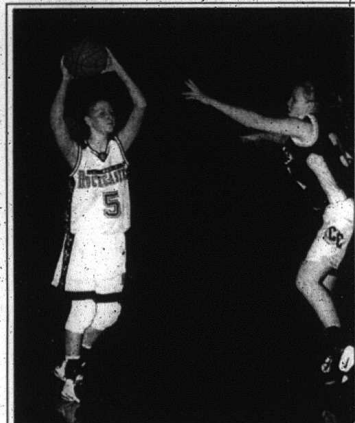

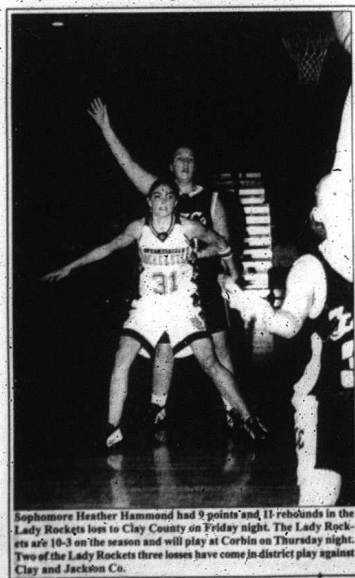

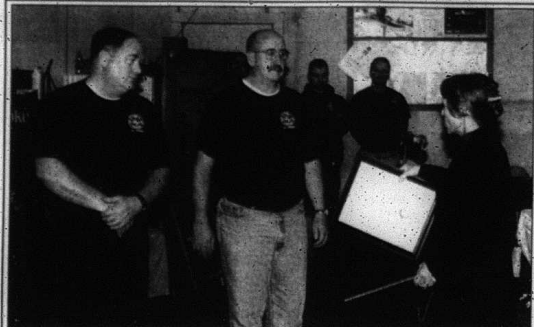

rent biggest drug problem in southeastern Kentucky. However, Burdette said the county has made great strides in dealing with the problem the last couple of years.

The City of Mt. Vernon passed their 2002-03 budget which included \$361,000 for the police department, a \$3,000 a month salary for the mayor, beginning in January of 2003. Rockcastle's unemployment rate stood at 6 percent.

Main Street businessman Billy Hunt was presented with the Best of Best award for Main Street business by Carol Bryant, Director of the Renaissance Kentucky Program for Mt. Vernon.

The Rockcastle County JROTC Corps of Discovery 2002 had the honor of lowering the flag at the Mt. Rushmore National Monument on July 4th. The flag was the same one that was flying over the monument on Sept. 11.

A Memorial was dedicated at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center for former administrator William Wayne Stewart and Billy Kirby, former county jailer and sheriff, died after undergoing heart surgery.

County Attorney Jeff Burdette reported the collection of \$1.3 million in delinquent child support payments during the most recent fiscal year, a 20 percent increase from 2001.

Also in July, Glenn Polly, a former football coach at RCHS, died.

After tabling the budget for 2002-03 for several meetings, the City Council passed a budget which showed the city's expenditures exceeding their revenue by almost \$326,000 in the next fiscal year.

The Little World's Fair ran from August 5-10 and the Rockcastle County Young Republican's Club

was recognized and The American Cancer Society held their Relay for Life at the middle school and raised a little over \$21,000.

Lisa Noe, a third grade teacher at Roundstone Elementary, was named principal at the school, replacing David Pansel who took a job at the central office.

School began August 15th, with officials expecting about 3,000 to enroll.

Republican U.S. Congressman Ernie Fletcher visited the county as part of his exploration to make a run for governor. Fletcher met with county officials and members of the Young Republican's Club.

The Fiscal Court agreed to borrow \$35,000 from the Kentucky Association of Counties for the Broedhard Rural Fire Dept. to help finish paying for property the department bought in the Quail area. The court was also presented with a contract from State Senator Ed Worley for \$200,000 to blacktop rural county roads.

The residence of Danny "Bird" Bustle in Mt. Vernon was raided Monday night, August 19 and compounds, allegedly used in the manufacturing of Methamphetamine, were found.

Members and officers of the Rockcastle development Board spent a Saturday cleaning up in Mt. Vernon. One property cleaned up is at the corner of Main and West Main Streets and may eventually be used to house offices for many local agencies, including the development board.

No one was injured in a wreck involving a Rockcastle County school bus. 10 students were on the bus when it was struck by a high school student who crossed the center line on Hwy. 1505.

The Mt. Vernon City Council set the city's property tax rate at \$1.06 per \$1,000 assessed value of property, up from \$1.00 for 2001-02.

A seven car pileup on Interstate 75, in which two people were injured, backed up traffic for several miles and caused an overload on U.S. 25.

Bridgette Lear, escorted by her father, Bill, was crowned Queen of the Pigskin Classic on Saturday night where Rockcastle County lost their only football game of the season, until the state championship, to Madison Co.

A Stanford couple lost their unborn child in a wreck on U.S. 150 when their car was bumped from behind, by a suspected drunk driver, causing it to run up an embankment and flip over.

The former Livingston School Gymnasium, which has been completely renovated by the Fiscal Court, was named in honor of Preston Parrett, who coached at the school for 33 years.

Three Rockcastle men were arrested in a drug sting by federal agents. The arrests were made in Williamsburg when the three showed up to take delivery of the drugs. All three were charged with conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute meth and marijuana.

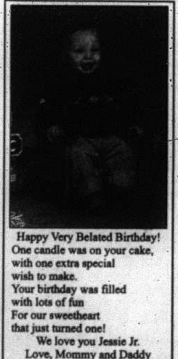
Livingston held their annual Homecoming Parade with State Representative Danny Ford serving as Grand Marshal. Sam Stallworth as named Citizens of the Year and Rockcastle Firefighters were honored.

Western Rockcastle Water Association received grants in the amount of \$73,000 from two federal agencies to construct 18 miles of water lines and serve 117 new users in Rockcastle, Palaski and Lincoln counties.

After 57 years, Willard Collinsworth, of Brindle Ridge, received a Bronze Star from WWII.

Governor Paul Patton visited the county to discuss the Renaissance program for the city and the efforts of the Rockcastle county Development Board. He also brought a check for \$425,000 to the Agricultural Development Association.

Troy Kirby and Johnny Lee Bullock, both of Rockcastle County, were sentenced to 60 days in jail for manufacturing, possession and distribution of methamphetamines.

Elizabeth Matekovich was crowned Kentro Valley Jamboree Queen at halftime at the Rocket's season opener.

The Cystic Fibrosis Bike-A-Thon, chaired by Clara Proctor, raised \$8,981, had 54 participants and 28 bicyclists.

Tim McIntosh and Sheena Swiney were crowned Football Homecoming King and Queen at RCHS during halftime of the RCHS-Estill Co. game.

In October, One of Rockcastle County's leading citizens, died in a Knoxville Hospital.

Lee D. Keene, who had been Administrator at the Rockcastle Hospital for 13 years and a member of the Mt. Vernon City Council for several years, died at the age of 70 from an apparent brain hemorrhage.

The Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department and City Council agreed upon the purchase of a new fire truck for the department. The price tag was \$64,000.

Highway deaths for 2002 continued to grow in October when two more people died in wrecks on Rockcastle roadways.

Frankie E. Marler, 29, of Sand Springs and a Whitley County man died in separate accidents.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court discussed possible cutbacks in the number of prisoners being held at the Rockcastle County Detention Center and Danny McKinney, of Broedhard, kept his job as head of the powerful Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative.

The Rockcastle Health and Rehabilitation Center (formerly Sowers Nursing Home), in Broedhard got high marks for the quality of their operation.

A large crowd attended the annual Bittersweet Festival in Mt. Vernon and a former Mt. Vernon Police Officer, Larry Thompson, was arrested by federal agents and charged with several drug trafficking crimes.

Thompson has been accused of being the mastermind behind a cocaine and marijuana operation that stretched from Kentucky to Texas.

The Mt. Vernon City Council will review the new city and county's work program; and the Rockcastle County Animal Shelter at Roundstone opened for business.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge William Thomas ordered that the Rockcastle Speedway at Cove Branch in order to pay creditors and the general election was winding down.

The big news in November was the general Election. Mt. Vernon voters elected Clarice Kirby as their new Mayor. She defeated several challengers, including incumbent Karen King.

Yotes in Mt. Vernon also elected their new council members, Steve Kenfro, Brian Hansel and Betty Carter Russell.

State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon soundly defeated Democratic challenger J. Paul Long, a Stanford attorney. Ford will begin his 11th term in office this week.

Tina Cain Hasty defeated Steve Owens in the division three school board race and Sam Stallworth retained his seat on the board by defeating challenger Donna Hays.

J.C. Griffin defeated incumbent Livingston Mayor Curt McHugh and Republicans David Gibbs defeated two term Democrat Magistrate John Holbrook. Gibbs will now represent the county's first district.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court received a \$100,000 bill for a pregnant prisoner at County Clerk Norma Houk reported that there was no problems in Rockcastle, as far as voting went, on election day.

Local businessman and contractor David King announced that he would open a water bottling company in Climax and Larry Thompson's federal court trial was set for January 16th in Lexington federal court.

Contractors accidentally cut a main phone line in Mt. Vernon and knocked out service for hundreds of businesses and residents. Service was interrupted for 24 hours in some cases.

The Kentucky District Council of the Assemblies of God filed a lawsuit demanding that the local Assembly of God property, now the River of Faith, be sold. The Council said the sale should take place because there has been broken between the council and the local church.

Family members, friends and colleagues of the late Dr. Orson Arvin gathered at the Rockcastle Hospital to commemorate his life and work in Rockcastle County.

The Rockcastle County Rocket football team won their third straight

district and regional title in November.

The Rockets went on to win another state semi-final game and play in the state championship game.

They defeated the Highland Bluebirds in Kentucky and did not score until the last play of the game.

Rockcastle's new Game Warden Steve Isaacs charged at least thirty people with violations of the Fish and Wildlife laws in Kentucky and a woman, convicted of the kidnapping of a local man, was sentenced in federal court.

Former Rockcastle Constable Tommy Bullens was sentenced in federal court on drug related charges brought while he was constable and a Mission Team helped out at the local Christ Outreach Center.

In December, Rockcastle County Schools were closed for three days after the first snowfall of the season.

Jonathan McKinney, 22, and Michael McKinney, 26, received scores of 13 years and 6 months in a case involving wildlife and a Rockcastle man, Bobby Ray Grubb, 44; was shot to death during a domestic dispute.

The Rockets played hard but lost in the state championship game for the second straight year to Boyle County by a score of 21-0 and Sherman Allen, 67, of Broedhard died in a single car wreck on Hall's Hill on Hwy. 150. Allen was the 13th person to die in Rockcastle roadways in 2002.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education honored outgoing Chairman Dr. G.W. Griffith for his 10 years of service to the board and Kentucky Governor Paul Patton let eight prisoners out of the Rockcastle Detention Center early because of the state's budget crisis.

Three Mt. Vernon City employees, Dennis McClure, Burgess Mullins and Junior Jerry, were honored for their 13 years of service to the city and Broedhard and Mt. Vernon held their annual Christmas parades.

neither confirm or deny.

"I am happy to serve as County Attorney here. I can be a part of my community's progress and growth," Burdette said. One of the projects recommended by the governor would enable Western Water to Association to extend water service for approximately 48 new customers. The project would serve for 50 households in Rockcastle, Lincoln, Palaski and Garrard counties. The grant is for \$250,000.
