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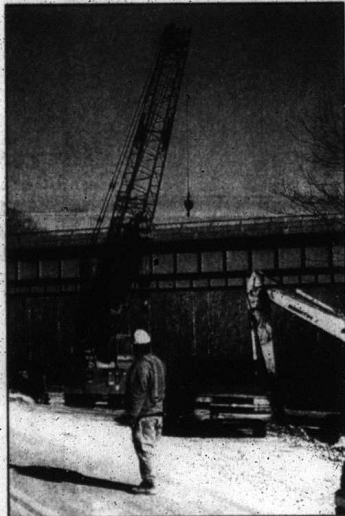

## Numerous crimes committed here

A rash of break-ins, robberies and vandalism has occurred in the county over the past week. Vehicles have been stolen from Town and Country Motors, Bustle's Auto Sales, J & J Auction House and property has been stolen and damaged at Town & Country Chevron, J.B. Alcorn's Garage in Mt. Vernon, Pizza Hut and Dairy Mart in Brodhead. Police say that three men drove a stolen vehicle into the front doors of

Dairy Mart in Brodhead on Friday night and stole their quarter machine. Nothing but change was taken at Pizza Hut, however a radio was stolen from Town and Country Chevron, where several car windows were also broken out. Another vehicle at Town Country Motors was also heavily damaged by would-be thieves and police reported that Game Warden Steve Isaacs' home in Mt. Vernon was also

broken into Monday night. Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink is investigating the break-in at Isaacs. All of the stolen vehicles have been recovered. Marvin Mink, owner of Town and Country Chevron, is offering a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those who robbed and vandalized vehicles at his station. ## After heated discussion McHargue put on Livingston City Council

The first meeting of the year at the Livingston City Council was certainly an eventful one. Newly-elected Mayor J.C. Griffin became visibly upset when the three councilmembers voted in favor of former Mayor Curtis McHargue to fill the vacant spot on the four member council. Near the end of Friday afternoon's meeting, councilwoman Kathy Carpenter nominated McHargue. Her motion was seconded by Todd Mink and Jason Medley also voted in favor of McHargue. Griffin told the three that he thought their actions were planned and "cut and dried" before the meeting ever started. Griffin beat McHargue by two

votes in the General Election. Griffin told the council that if McHargue, who also served as a council member for several years, was put back on the council it would "paralyze" him (Griffin). Griffin suggested that McHargue's presence on the council would make it difficult for him to do his job as Mayor. Mrs. Carpenter, Mink and Medley strongly disagreed with Griffin and said that McHargue had been a good public servant and deserved to be put on the council. Griffin said that he would be in favor of other people serving, such as former councilman Brady Durham, who also became upset during McHargue's nomination and

## Court votes to borrow \$300,000 for expenses

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court voted on Tuesday to borrow \$300,000 in order to pay off bills incurred during the past year. Rockcastle County Judge-Executive Buzz Carlolffs said the money was needed to pay bills from the bad weather in the county during the spring and for dump site clean-ups through the PRIDE project. Carlolffs also told the court that a portion of the \$300,000 would be used to pay for blacktop and graveling on some county roads last year and to pay a \$60,000 payment on the Ten Foot Hole Bridge leading to Piney Branch. The court voted unanimously to borrow the money from Citizens Bank at a rate of around five percent for one year. Much of the \$300,000 will be

repaid by the Federal Emergency Management Agency and by PRIDE. Tuesday's meeting was also the first for the new fiscal court. The first meeting for newly-elected magistrates William Denny,

Ralph Allen and David Gibbs also lasted over four hours with 35 items on the agenda. In other business, the court voted

We had a heavy dusting of snow here a couple weeks ago. Not enough to pull out the cross country skis and spend a lot of time falling down and waving our legs in the air and cursing bitterly that the Good Lord didn't give us better coordination, but enough to get us out among the critters that have to put up with this cold weather and endure it without the benefit of modern heating devices that most of us have in our homes.

So we, (Ole Blue and me) went hiking across the back 78 to see if the geese were still on the ponds and whether or not the Great Blue Heron who inhabits the shallow edges of those ponds was frozen into a block of ice and grounded because he'd led the ice freeze round his legs.

This heron, we have decided, is surely male because a female would have had enough sense to fly much farther south where it's warmer. Geese freeze over, and where minnows and crawfish are readily available for their meals, but we are not herons. And who knows what herons are thinking when they decide to winter in central Kentucky. Perhaps this spindly legged bird just wants to brag to his fraternity brothers next spring, that he toughed it out in Kentucky over the winter. It wouldn't be the first time that a bird or a fraternity pledge has done something remark-

ably stupid.

Anyway, Ole Blue (My favorite and only outside dog) and I went tripping through the snow and we noticed an abundance of tiny tracks made by birds and rabbits and creatures that seemed to be dragging their tails behind them. I tracked with toes and ankles made by creatures with four feet instead of two less there is such a thing as a four-legged bird.

Finally, in a huge clump of broomage I found both the beginning and end of a long and treacherous trek. I used my pocket knife to loosen up the roots and pulled back the mound of ooze. Underneath them lay a huge pile of feathers and straw groomed into what was obviously a thoughtfully developed and constructed nest. And obviously inhabited. The nest wiggled and squirmed when I touched it.

Ole Blue turned his head over sideways and perked up his ears and at about that moment, a tiny, fawn-colored mouse came tearing out a minuscule entrance hole at the bottom of the nest. I was on my hands and knees and Blue was on his haunches but the mouse came out in such a hurry and reared up on its hind legs in such a fit of fury that both of us fell backwards.

Blue tucked his tail between his legs and backed off several steps,

While the mouse took advantage and closed in on Blue. I regarded the nest. It was still wiggling. I got down to eye-level and satisfied myself that it's inhabitants were hairless babies.

While Mama mouse held Blue at bay, I quickly replaced the clump of broom-edges and used my finger to clean out the earthen entrance hole that I had not previously noticed and then I backed away myself.

Mama mouse gave me a long stare and then rushed back toward her den. There was a flurry of activity as she scratched out some dirt that had fallen into the entrance and then she poked her head back out as if to say, "How dare you disturb my home!"

I kicked away the crust of snow until I could find a few flat rocks to lay atop the disturbance. I'd made around the broom-edges clump partially to insulate it—but more hopefully to ward off the foxes and pos-

sums and raccoons and skunks and any other predators that Mrs. Field Mouse might encounter as a result of the attention I had drawn to her privacy.

I'll go back to the nest, next time it snows, and look for tracks around the entrance. If I see some, I'll not feel so guilty.

I realize that folks like to photograph and discover nature from time to time, but it is oh so easy to destroy lives or contribute to imbalances and we sometimes don't realize what we are doing. Little light brown field mice do us not the slightest bit of harm. They are stunningly brave and beautiful little creatures and they have enough trouble surviving their predators without our interference. I, for one, will be content to take photos of their tracks from now on.

## How Are Gall Stones Treated?

The time-honored cure for gall stones has been surgery—remove the gall bladder and it will not cause further problems. For most people that is all the best choice.

For some, however, there are alternative methods when a person needs treatment for gall stones. Gall stones are very common and most people with stones do not need treatment if they have no symptoms.

A new method of treatment is shock wave lithotripsy. This method uses ultrasonic waves focused on the stones to break them up. The smaller stone fragments will pass down the ducts more easily. It is most useful when there is only a single stone and it is not too large. People using this treatment have up to 80% resolution at one year.

There are a couple medicines which are used as well. They are only useful for cholesterol stones. The smaller stones, 75% of all stones. Unfortunately, the results are relatively poor. After taking the medicine for two years, only about 14% have complete resolution of the stone. The expense of the medicine is also a factor, costing over \$10,000 per year.

The medicine have side effects including diarrhea, possible liver damage, and an elevation in the cholesterol. For these reasons they are used mainly in people who are unable to tolerate surgery.

Today, most surgeons do laparoscopic surgery to remove the gall bladder, which requires only a few very small incisions. The recovery period is much shorter with this than when a large incision is needed and a person can return to work and her usual activities much sooner. It is an excellent choice for people who meet the criteria for this procedure.

## Keep Salads Safe

Salads taste good at any meal. Fast transportation and modern storage make salad ingredients "in season" year round. Many salad ingredients are fresh and uncooked. This means we need to be careful not to serve harmful germs with our salads.

It is easy to keep salads safe. Always wash your hands before you start to prepare a salad. For that matter, wash your hands before you prepare any food. Clean your hands by rubbing all hand surfaces with soap under running hot water. This includes between the fingers. Rinse thoroughly and dry with a fresh paper towel. Make sure utensils, equipment, bowls and all surfaces have been washed in hot soapy water and then completely rinsed. Don't use the same cutting board to cut up raw meat, poultry or fish as you do to cut up your salad ingredients without washing the cutting board in hot soapy water after each use. The easiest way to prevent spreading harmful germs is to have two different looking cutting boards, using one for raw meat, poultry and fish and the other for foods that require no further cooking.

Many people enjoy a "green salad." Follow these basic tips for a perfect salad:  
\*Start with fresh greens. When shopping, only buy the amount that you will use quickly. Greens don't stay fresh very long so use them as soon as possible.

\*Handle all salad ingredients gently. Fruits and vegetables bruise easily. Bruised ingredients don't make a pretty salad.  
\*Thoroughly rinse fresh fruits, vegetables, and greens under running water. As you put the salad together, work quickly. Ingredients can lose their crispness if held at room temperature.  
\*For the best tasting and healthiest salad, keep the salad in the refrigerator until ready to serve. If there are any leftovers, return them to the refrigerator quickly. If the salad is out of the refrigerator longer than 2 hours or you are unsure of the length of time, throw it out. It is better to be safe than to serve a salad full of harmful germs.

Enjoy the following recipe:  
Sweet Slaw  
3 cups shredded cabbage  
1 cup pineapple chunks  
1 cup diced apple  
1 cup mini-marshmallows  
1/2 cup celery  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
Wash hands and all surfaces. Combine all ingredients. Mix well. Refrigerate. Makes 6 servings at 33 cents per serving. 110 calories; 4g fat; 5mg cholesterol; 2g fiber; 14g sugar per serving.

## Extension Winter meetings

Planning for Extension Service winter meetings is well under way. Local gardeners are helping Extension staff organize a 13 week Master Gardener Program. This intensive educational program includes 40 hours of classroom and field training. Registration is being taken at the Extension office through January 24. Classes will hold each Wednesday from 9 am to noon beginning February 5.

The Annual Tobacco Production Meeting has been scheduled for Monday, February 10<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 p.m. at Rockcastle County High School. Tobacco continues to be Rockcastle County's number one cash crop.

Tobacco settlement funds through the Phase 4 program have allowed programs to assist local farmers. Currently Forage Improvement Program applications are being taken for pasture improvement and hay improvement. Deadline for applications is January 31.

Phase 1 funds are also helping fund a Genetic Improvement Program. Approved applicants will receive training on bull selection for the program on Tuesday, January 28<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 p.m. at the Extension office.

**Forage Improvement Cost-Share**  
The Rockcastle County Cattlemen's Association will utilize remaining funds (\$77,000) from the

2002 spring Forage Improvement Program through a second funding cycle. Applications are being taken through January 31, 2003 at local farm supply stores or the Extension office. Limited funds may limit the number of applications being approved. Applications are accepted on a first come basis while funds are available.

The Forage Improvement Program has 3 areas:  
\*Pasture improvement, which includes 3 pounds per acre certified white clover, plus lime and fertilizer according to UK soil test recommendations.  
\*Hay renovation which includes 10 pounds per acre certified red clover, plus lime and fertilizer according to UK soil test recommendations.  
\*Alfalfa seeding, which includes 20 pounds per acre certified alfalfa plus 5 pounds orchard grass per acre, 2 pounds boron, lime and fertilizer according to UK soil tests.

All approvals require soil test results from each field or practice applied for. Since fields freeze in mid to late January, farmers are encouraged to take samples as soon as possible.

7. Poem must have a title and be neatly printed or typed on regular size copy or typing paper.

## At State Level RCMS to participate in reading and math tests

Rockcastle County Middle School has announced it will participate in the 2003 state National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP).

RCMS is one of only 249 schools in the state asked to participate.

The 2003 state NAEP assessment, which requires about 90 minutes of a student's time, is designed to measure what students know and can do in reading and mathematics. Students will be asked to read for literary experience, to gain information, and to perform a task. They will respond to multiple-choice questions in reading and they may also be asked to create their own responses, which may consist of writing short answers or one or more sentences.

In mathematics, students will respond to multiple-choice questions and will also create their own responses, which may consist of a variety of formats, including writing a sentence or more, drawing a diagram or showing how they derived their answers.

NAEP protects the confidentiality of students, teachers and schools that participate by not collecting student, teacher or school names. The assessment is designed to report on the academic performance of large groups, based on state representative samples of fourth- and eighth-grade students. NAEP provides results for major demographic groups, including gender and ethnicity and states that meet NAEP reporting criteria are able to compare their results with both national results and the results of other states.

For more than thirty years, NAEP has been the country's only nation-

ally representative and continuing survey of students' educational achievement. Because the national NAEP samples were not designed to support the reporting of state-level results, state NAEP was introduced in 1990 to provide participating states reliable data concerning the achievement of their students. The project is

authorized by Congress, directed by the U.S. Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics and developed by Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N.J. Westat, Inc. of Rockville, MD conducts sample selection and data collection.

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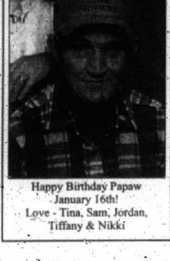

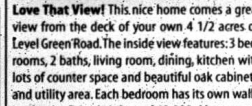

Abney and Rowe had 4 steals each and Abney added 4 assists.

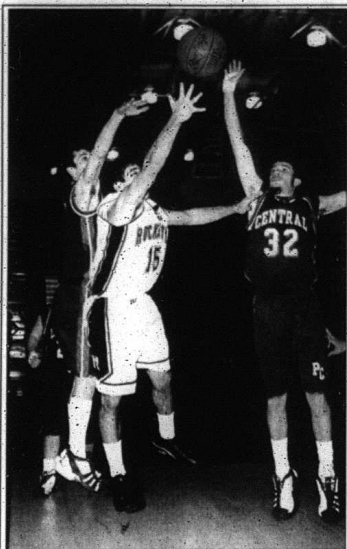
Monday night, the girls hosted Madison Central and came away with a big 71-55 win to put their season record at 12-4.

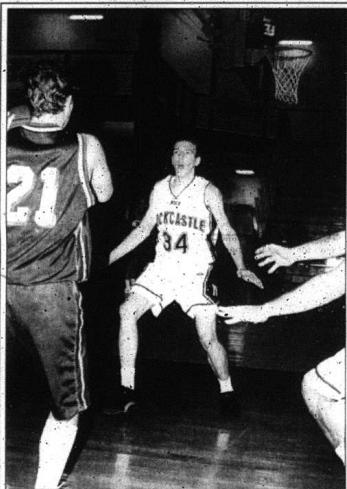
The girls upped their shooting percentage to 56% and were 16 for 26 in free throw shots for 61%.

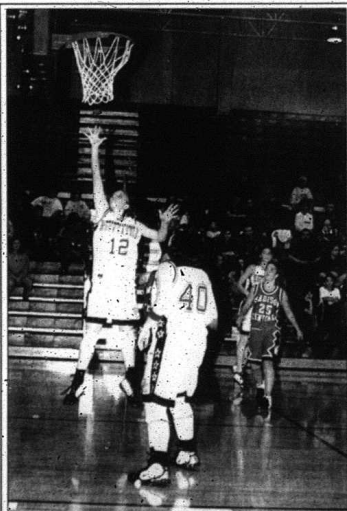
On the season, the girls are shooting 44.3% from two point range, 31.8% in three point shots and 67.5% at the free throw line.

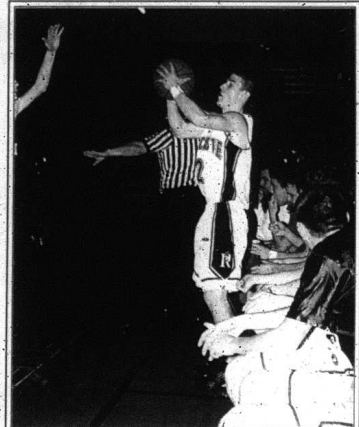
## Boys finish fifth in WYMT tourney

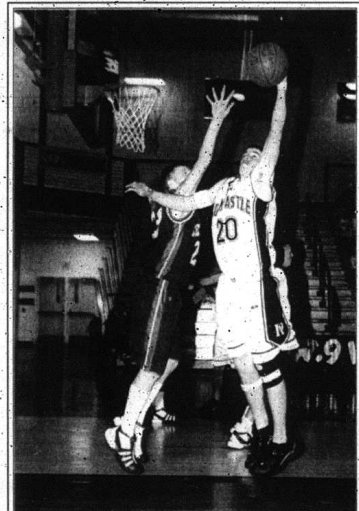
After losing the opening game to Breathitt County, the Rockets came back against South Floyd to take a 17 to 8 first quarter lead and never relinquish it.

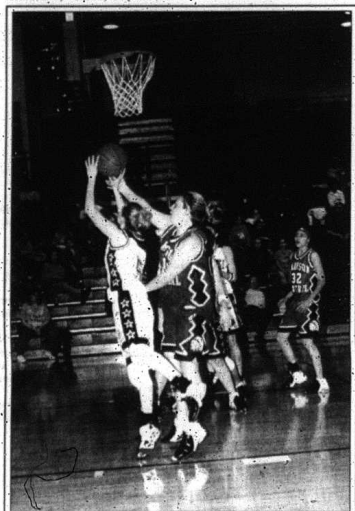
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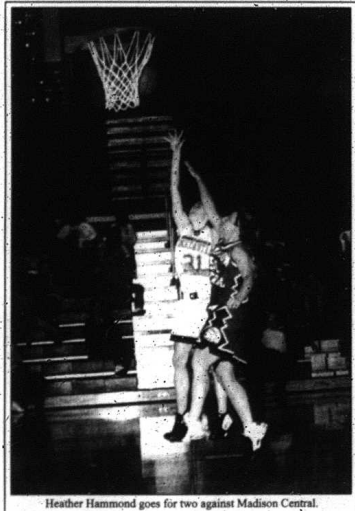
Junior Devin Taylor looks to inbound the ball against Pike Co. Taylor had 4 points in the game, along with three rebounds, three assists and one steal.

## The Racing Reporter

How the France family obtained NASCAR

When the Dawson County, Georgia sheriff would go out of town, the racing world began.

America's fascination with motorsports has come a long way since a handful of Davonville drivers took their skills from the mountains of northern Georgia to the city and to other tracks in the south.

The first NASCAR trophy and Winston Million was won by Dawsonville drivers.

"There can be a lot of arguments about where the birthplace of motorsports is," said Ed Clark, general manager of Atlanta Motor Speedway.

"Some say Daytona, because NASCAR was formed there. Others say the Carolinas because there were so many early tracks formed there."

"But you've got to say that the roots of stock car racing goes deep into the mountains of the north Georgia region. The old Lakewood Speedway was located where Atlanta's Hartsfield Airport is now, so racing came to this area about the turn of the century."

"Much of the heart and soul of racing is right here. Fast cars, great drivers, and moonshine runners all combined for a real life contest between the whiskey runners and the revolvers. That was part of the fabric of daily life in this area."

"Someone got the idea and issued a challenge of who had the fastest car and who was the best driver. Out of this became the great American sport that we know and love."

Pretty soon racing began to grow so much that drivers felt like they needed an organization to keep the track promoters, drivers and owners in line.

Mention NASCAR, and the France family immediately pops to mind. But that wasn't always the case. According to several of the old time car owners and drivers around Dawsonville Georgia, the France family wound up with the name NASCAR, while those drivers who helped organize the sanctioning body became moonshiners.

Red Voght won at Martinsville, Virginia in 1941, and also the first race ever staged under the sanctioning body of NASCAR.

"My father, Red Voght was not a public figure," says his son John.

"Probably the reason for that is he only had a fifth-grade education. He went to work when he was just 12 years old.

## Beware of Hunting Law

Courts not going lightly on violators

Wildlife violations, considered good of 'boy crimes a generation ago' by the general public, are being taken seriously today by many county attorneys and judges across Kentucky.

Consider a recent case in Rockcastle county where two brothers had 23 firearms, two bows and 12 knives confiscated, were fined \$25,000, ordered to serve a total of 150 hours of community service and 60 days in jail, and lost their hunting privileges for five years.

The news is also in for who hunt illegally, kill deer, elk or wild turkey out of season, be prepared to face stiff penalties if you are caught and convicted.

"As we become more educated, we understand the benefits of wildlife to the community," said Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, who prosecuted brothers Michael McKinney, 22, and Jonathan McKinney, 26.

The Mt. Vernon siblings pleaded guilty to 14 counts of illegal possession of wildlife (deer and wild turkey). "From a sportsman's viewpoint, it's offensive to me to shoot deer from the road and leave them lay, not taking deer for food, but for the thrill of it."

Burdette said he believes people today better understand the concepts and goals behind managing wildlife resources and consider illegal hunting despicable because it's wasteful and destructive. "It's disruptive, too, spotlighting deer and shooting high powered rifles at night."

The illegal possession of wildlife (KRS 130.301) is a broad-ranging law. "It's a charge by which if we can't catch the person in the act of illegally taking the game," said Lt. Mike Fields, a wildlife and boating officer with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "It's similar to receiving stolen property in the criminal codes."

"I never thought the penalties could be that bad," said Jonathan McKinney, who still has jail time to serve. "We wouldn't have done what we did."

"The loss of hunting privileges is the sticking point," Fields said. "Violators might not mind paying a fine, but they don't want their hunting licenses taken."

The more serious wildlife violation usually draw license suspensions, but they can also be handed down for shooting across power lines, highways, shooting from a vehicle, or shooting at roadside deer decoys, depending on the situation, and whether activity posed a risk to human life.

In March of 2001, the laws protecting elk from illegal hunting and possession were beefed up to protect the state's growing herd, which now numbers more than 2,000, and is the largest herd east of the Mississippi River. So far, three cases of illegal hunting have been prosecuted. "The fine is no less than \$1,000 and no more than \$5,000, with imprisonment up to six months, or both," Casey said. "The replacement cost of the elk must be paid and hunting rights can be revoked for one to three years."

"We are funded by the sale of hunting and fishing licenses. We want people to hunt and fish, but we want them to do it legally. (Licensing revocation) is reserved for serious violators."

The position for wildlife violations are outlined in the statutes. "Every statute has a minimum and maximum for fines and jail terms," Casey said. "We make recommendations to the court. It's up to the judge to impose sentences and fines."

"Wildlife violations are misdemeanors."

"Courts can mandate participation in a hunter's education course," Casey said. "Just like motorists can be made to go to driver's school."

"We are very pleased with the support of the county attorney's office on (the McKinney) case, and the citizens of Rockcastle County who support wildlife conservation," said wildlife and boating officer Steve Isaac, who worked with other law enforcement officers in the two-month investigation.

"A large number of sportsmen want to do things right and that helps us in the court system," Casey said. "In most counties, judges and prosecutors help us rigidly enforce game laws."

"Firearms used in wildlife violations are confiscated as evidence. When cases have been successfully prosecuted, the firearms are usually awarded to the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. Most are auctioned to the public, but Casey said some firearms are retained for educational use in hunter education courses, youth hunts, or the Becoming an Outdoor Woman (BOW) program.

This time of year, the property room in the department's law enforcement division is filled with confiscated weapons and hunting equipment. "We generally auction about 100 firearms a year," Casey said. "The money generated goes to the Fish and Wildlife fund."

"Any item used in the commission of a crime can be confiscated by the court and turned over to the department, including automobiles, video cameras and hunting equipment such as treestands and knives."

Violations of fishing and hunting laws observed in the field can be reported anonymously by calling 1-800-25-ALERT (252-5378), 24 hours a day. November is the peak month with more than 10,000 calls.

"The call volume starts in late September," Fields said. "By November, the phone rings constantly. More people are out hunting, and they are attuned to possible violations."

"Kentuckians realize the tourism and economic impact of wildlife," Casey said. "It's big business."

"I hope to correct a lot of the verbal history that NASCAR has. I think most people need to recognize that NASCAR history is in fact verifiable. In fact, very little, if any of it is written history."

"In 1929, dad formed a racing association called The National Stock Car Racing Association. This is listed in a journal my mother kept. Does that name sound familiar?"

"In 1947, it was there when it happened, was sitting between Bill France Sr. and my father at the head of the table in Daytona Beach. There was an attorney sitting over next to my dad, who said, 'you've got to do something because you're going to have some legal problems. You need a name and organization.'"

"So my dad with a pencil started scribbling on a piece of paper. He came up with cars, and said, 'that sounds good. Let's call it the National Association of Stock Car Auto Racing.' That folks: is exactly how it happened."

According to Raymond Parks and other relatives of early drivers, after the initial meeting in Daytona was over, all the drivers and car owners went back home. Bill France and his attorneys went to work and formed the sanctioning body, and called it NASCAR.

"The next thing we know NASCAR belongs to Bill France," said Raymond Parks. "We weren't businessmen, just car owners, drivers and mechanics that worked together. We had the know-how, but France had the lawyers. He used his lawyers to draw up legal papers giving him all rights to our organization."

"That's how Bill France stole NASCAR from the other 34 of us that were there."

The rural department will be headquartered at Quail and meet there as well. The city department will remain at the current fire station

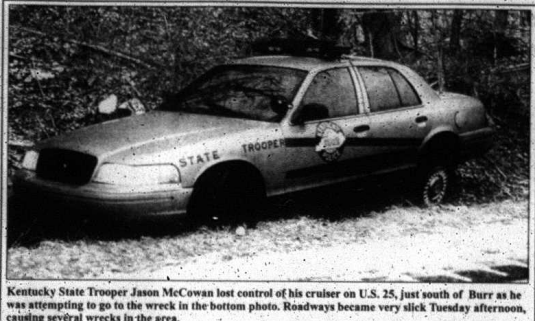
as before.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette reiterated yesterday comments he made last week, that he does not plan to be a candidate for Kentucky Attorney General.

"As I have said before, this is where I am happy, and I look forward to continuing working with citizens of this community," Burdette said. "I intend to support the Republican nominee for Attorney General and I expect that to be Tim Feeley of Oldham County," he added.

## Local man sentenced

Woodrow Lamb, 25, of Mt. Vernon was sentenced to 300 months in prison, which will be followed by three years of supervised release, and fined \$400 in federal court last week.

Lamb entered guilty pleas to using a firearm during and in relation to drug trafficking and being a felon in possession of a firearm, as well as possession of methamphetamine with intent to distribute it.

Lamb fired shots at Mt. Vernon Police Chief Bill Mink and Officer Barry Adams in July of 2001, as the two pursued him along U.S. 25.

Lamb was also ordered to forfeit some assets, including firearms.

Feeley, 46, a State Representative who was elected to a third term, announced his candidacy for Attorney General at a press conference yesterday in Frankfort.

"The Republican party is actively seeking candidates for statewide offices, unlike 1999, and Feeley is a great candidate for Attorney General. We were expecting him to file," Burdette said.

Three Democrats, Greg Stumbo, Ed Hatcher and Chris Gorman have filed for the office as well.

To buy six vehicles for newly elected Sheriff Dargell Doan at a price of \$2,000 each.

The court will pay the insurance on the vehicles and the vehicles will be in the county's name.

Doan will be responsible for the maintenance of the vehicles and the gasoline.

The court also voted to return all equipment, including vehicles, which had been purchased by former Rockcastle Sheriff Shirley Smith to him.

The court also accepted Smith's settlement for taxes received by his office for the 2002 assessment.

Former Deputy Sheriff and secretary Sonya Parker presented the tax settlement to the court for each taxing district.

Smith's office reported overpaying the county \$158, the school board, \$600; the health department,

\$48, the library board, \$1,876, the extension board; \$26, the soil conservation district, \$271 and the local fire district \$4.66.

The court also discussed their options concerning the county's five constables.

Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said the county must approve the use of blue lights and sirens by all five constables. In each case, a decision by the court would be made on an individual basis.

Currently the court has not approved the use of the lights and sirens by the constables and took no action on the matter on Tuesday, although they discussed the matter at length.

The court also discussed the possibility of requiring each constable to attend 40 hours of training at Eastern Kentucky University before giving their approval for the use of lights and sirens.

The discussion concerning the constables is the result of a request from the city of Livingston to use fifth district constable David Mason to patrol the city in the absence of a city police officer.

The court also heard from Bruce Neeley with the Ky. Transportation Department, who said the state wanted to resurface a portion of the Sand Springs Road, Ottawa Road, 1650 from 618 to 70 and Hurricane School Road.

The court took the recommendations under advisement and agreed to come up with possible alternatives to the state's plan.

The court also agreed to borrow \$55,000 for the Broadhead Rural Fire Department to be used for various reasons, including the purchase of a new fire house at Quail. The court also agreed to lease the building from the fire department for financial and insurance reasons. Judge Carlotis said that all expenses and loan payments would be made by the fire department and that the county would not be out any money.

The court also approved work on the Copper Creek bridge and County Clerk Norma Houk's budget for the next year. Mrs. Houk anticipates tak-

ing in just over \$2.1 million and having excess fees around \$12,000 to return to the county.

The court also discussed the monthly animal shelter report, which showed that as many as 40 animals had been housed on at least one occasion, during the month of December.

The report also showed that 37 animals had been adopted and 44 had been put to sleep.

During December the shelter took in \$1,528, \$500 of that amount was donated by McDonald's Restaurant.

Before the discussion concerning McHargue, the council also discussed an I.R.S. lien against the city. City Clerk Tina Tyree said that she was working to get the lien released and the interest and penalties reduced.

The City Clerk said that the lien was for about \$8,000 and apparently stemmed from the late 1990s when the city did not file all of their withholding forms and pay the taxes that were withheld from city employees.

The council also discussed the fact that the city of Livingston no longer has a police officer.

Officer William Harris is now a Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff.

Griffin suggested that the council contact with fifth district constable David Mason to patrol in the city limits while the council found a new officer.

The council also discussed the possibility of paying a contract fee to Rockcastle Sheriff Darrell Doan, for the use of one of his deputies.

The council took no action on, Tuesday, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court tabled the matter concerning Mason and did not give authority for him to use blue lights or a siren in his vehicle.

City employee Rick Cole, who helps with the city's water and sewer department, asked to go into executive session to discuss a personnel matter involving himself, but the council took no action on his request.

oners from the county jail because of budget problems and because the department of corrections will only allow Jailer James Miller to keep around 70 prisoners, the cash flow is flowing very slowly.

Rockcastle County Fiscal Court Treasurer Joe Clontz and Miller estimate that the jail is taking about a \$24,000 hit each month.

At one point Miller was keeping between 90 and 100 prisoners in the local detention center and many of those were state prisoners.

Now that number has dropped to around 70, with 34 of them being local prisoners, for which the county receives no money.

"We've got a problem, but the state has our hands tied right now," Rockcastle Judge-Executive Buzz Carlotis said.

Carlotis, Miller and Clontz say they have a \$80,000 payment on the detention center due in May and it is going to be very difficult to make the payment with the cut in revenue.

Carlotis said that expenses at the detention center would have to be reduced if things did not change soon.

Currently Miller has 19 full and part-time employees, not counting himself.

On Tuesday the court did pass a motion to allow Miller to charge each inmate, coming into the jail, a one time booking fee of \$20 to help offset a portion of what is being lost.

## Rockcastle awarded federal funds for emergency food and shelter

Rockcastle County has been chosen to receive \$8,540 to supplement food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a national board that is chaired by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and consists of representatives from The Salvation Army, American Red Cross, United Jewish Communities, Catholic Charities, USA and National Council of the Church of Christ in the USA and, United Way of America, which will provide the administrative staff and function as fiscal agent. The board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.


A local board, made up of Rockcastle County Judge Executive Bruce Carlisle and local Community Action Agency, etc., will determine how the funds awarded to Rockcastle County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by the local service organizations in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these

funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program. Under the terms of the grant from the national board, local organizations chosen to receive funds must 1) be private voluntary nonprofit or units of government, 2) have an accounting system, 3) practice nondiscrimination, 4) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and shelter programs and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying organizations are urged to apply.

Rockcastle county has distributed emergency food and shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Development Council. This agency was responsible for providing 724 nights lodging and providing utilities for more than 33 families.

## Yards to Paradise Avoid these problems at planting time

**FAQ: What do you think caused my tree to die? This is a common question. Some causes of such problems are we are fixing to cover.**

I hear things like "I've never had any luck with...rhododendrons, azaleas, roses, etc." My inclination, though I agree some plants require more effort to grow successfully than other plants do, is to ask "what did you do wrong?"

Or, "I watered my plants every day all summer. I did my part, so there must have been something wrong with the plants!"

OK, those are a few problems I hear. Since I seldom have a tree or shrub die which I plants, what are the above-mentioned good folks doing that we can correct or avoid? Hopefully, here are some helpful answers and solutions.

For members of the Ericaceae plant family, you need acidic soil with lots of organic matter and never too dry nor too wet. Avoid planting this group of plants in the hottest, sunniest places. OK, blueberries need full sun. Like a mixture of sand, peat, pine fines to replace about 50% of existing soil and mix with the other 50%. But, if clay or hardpan subsoil is all you have to work with, a raised bed may be the only way to grow these plants successfully. They also need loose soil, and no disturbing their fine little roots!

Rhododendrons, azaleas, mountain laurel, blueberries, lingonberries, heather, persimmon, kalmia, and many other plants of the Ericaceae family.

For rose gardens, mulch, organic fertilizer, frequent watering (morning not evening), pruning and winter protection of the graft union are important. Standing water can kill lots of plants.

For seed loving plants, the drip of the house may pose a problem. You see, mortar from the bricks or stone may lie in excess just under a skimpily layer of added topsoil, along the sides of your house. To grow azaleas, camellias, or many other plants needing an acidic soil in this situation, will mean removing the waste concrete and mortar and replacing with high-organic-matter soil. An acid fertilizer may also be needed.

A few other plants may need lime to do as well as they might. Legumes need a sweet soil usually. Western cedars, yellowwood, iris, are plants that come to mind that like a higher pH.

When you need to water most trees and plants, water them thoroughly once or twice a week. This is much preferred to a quick wetting of the foliage or the top of the ground on a daily basis. (Add some "wilt proof" to the water if you are going to wet the foliage...at least that will slow down evaporation from the plant leaves).

Often, I see a well shaped tree skeleton. Uh-huh. Deh. Looks like it cost some big bucks. Croaked. Why? Well, too often, the hole you planted it in (you wondered if you would strike oil before you got the hole deep and wide enough) does not drain properly.

You wouldn't plant a \$200 tree in a pond would you? Well you probably did just that when you dug a big hole into clay mud and added water around the root ball of your new tree. Sometimes it seems trees forage

**Slow Pace of FSA Programs**  
**Major Farm Bill Provisions**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is concerned about the slow pace in which farmers are signing up for the major farm programs under the 2002 Farm Bill and urges farmers to bring the process to quickly sign up in order to receive installment benefits in a timely and efficient manner.

The USDA team has developed extensive new software, trained personnel and prepared directives for the agency new and existing programs. In addition, the department developed a new website and conducted hundreds of outreach meetings to farmers nationwide to provide information on how to comply with the new law and the required changes in program participation.

USDA is committed to working at every level to assist producers, but it is critical farmers contact their local FSA office to bring processing individual program information and updates needed to participate.

Accordingly, reports to date from the states indicate that producers sign up for the direct and counter-cyclical programs is proceeding quite slowly. Several reasons explain the slow pace, including the late harvest in many parts of the country that kept farmers in the field longer than usual. Additionally, the complexity of the programs require more time for producers to understand, assemble the necessary information and make the decisions, often involving several different commodities and unknown future market conditions.

Producers are reminded that they can sign-up for major programs now and make changes to their decisions any time until the April 1 closing date for base acreage and yield updating.

**Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCCP)**

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Sign-up for the program begins October 1, 2002 and will end July 2, 2003. Producers participation is voluntary, and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers have been mailed additional information concerning this program. Those who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>.

**Power of Attorney Forms**

If you currently have a Power of Attorney on file with FSA, it is not valid for the new programs or transactions authorized by the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002 (Farm Bill). If you wish to retain an agent to act on your behalf for the new Direct and Counter-Cyclical programs, a new Power of Attorney is required.

The FSA Power of Attorney form FSA-211, has been revised to cover programs in the Act (referred to as the Farm Bill). Note FSA power of attorney forms currently on file are

not valid for any new programs authorized by the Act. Farmers are cautioned that the authorizing signature on the FSA-211, must be witnessed by either an FSA employee or a Notary Public.

**Designation by Landowner Method**

The designation by landowner method of dividing a farm is the division of contract acres, allotments, or quotas in the manner AGREED to by all parent farm owner(s) and farm-purchasers or transferees. Sellers must have owned the farm for three years prior to the date of designation by landowner method. The County Committee may waive the 3-year ownership requirement if either of the following apply:

• NCCC determines the sale was not primarily to keep or sell allotments, quotas or contract acres.

Land sold will be devoted to non-agricultural, recreational, residential or industrial use.

The designation by landowner method may be used when any of the following apply:

• Part of a farm or tract is sold or ownership is transferred.  
• An entire farm or tract is sold to 2 or more persons.  
• Farm or tract ownership is transferred to 2 or more persons.

With the designation by landowner method, the 1,000 pound rule also applies when there is a change in ownership. Thus, if a resulting farm has less than 1,000 pounds of tobacco quota, the owner shall either:

• Purchase additional quota to make 1,000 pounds  
• Sell the quota  
• Combine the quota with another farm to make 1,000 pounds

An FSA-115, Request for Farm Reconstitution shall be signed by ALL sellers, buyers and, if applicable, the holder or the deed of trust, lien holder or mortgage holder, state or county.

**Farm Changes**

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Producers are also required to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

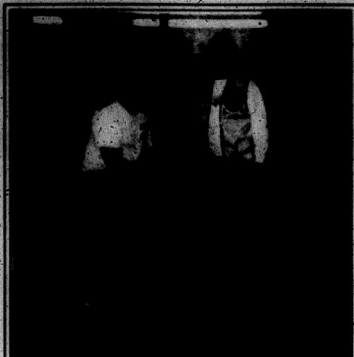

The people ask two related questions in this text. They wanted to know by what authority and who gave him this authority to do the things he was doing. Jesus did not act like authority was a non-issue, that it wasn't a big deal, it didn't really matter. He did ask them, "I also will ask you one thing, which if ye will me, I in like wise will tell you by what authority I do these things. The baptism of John, whence was it? from heaven, or of men?" vs 24-25: Jesus is showing that authority comes from either heaven or from man. The baptism of John illustrates this point the Lord was making. These folks would not give an answer to his simple question; for they would get themselves in trouble to answer either way, vs 25-27. Of course if they had loved the truth, and wanted to do what was right, they could have answered it very easily. The things we practice in religion, does the authority come from heaven or from men? Next week we will look at some examples.
