For some, however, there are alternative methods when a person needs treatment for gall stoned. Gall stones are transmissioned to the stones to break them up. The smaller stone fragments will pass down the ducts more easily. It is most useful when there is only a single stone and it is not to large. Peoplessing this treatment have up to 80% resolution at one year. There are a couple medicines which are used as well. They are only useful for cholesterol stones, but these comprise 75% of all stones. Cultorinately, the results are relatively poor. After taking the medicine for two years, only about 14% have complete resolution of the stone. The expense of the medicine is also a factor, conting over \$10.000 per year. The medicine have side effects including diarrhea, possible liver damage, and an elevation in the cholesterol. 



Yards to Paradise

Avoid these problems at planting time

us all sorts of mistakes and thrive us all sorts of mistakes and thrive anyway. But, I advise digging a test hole in your yard, pour in a large pail of water, and come back the next day and see how much water is still in the test hole. Hint: if the water is still

the test hole. Hint if the water is still there, plant a willow, eypress or black- or red alder maybe instead. Better yet, plant the tree simewhere else, or se the rootball on top of the existing yard and bring in a big load of good dirt and create a raised bed around your new tree.

Another matter is loss of roots when a B&B (balled and burlapped), tree is dug. To append up healthy growth of a new tree, remove some limbs to equalize the lost roots. And potted trees and shrubs may be rootbound. Try scratching or untaining a few of the roots as to you gut it.

rootbound. Try scratching or untaf-gling, a few of the roots as you put it in the planting hole.

This tragic that most new construc-tion has little topsoil in the yards. Scraped eavily to level the lot, and sold. A skimpy layer is reapplied to the flat new yard around the new home. Raised beds can be a big help in dealing with such conditions. May your yard be nearer paradist than before.

FAQ: What do you think caused
my tree to die? This is a common
question. Some causes of such problems we are fixing to cover.
I hear things like "I've never had
my luck with ...hododendrons, azaleas, roses, .etc." My inclination,
hough I agree some plants require
more effort to grow successfully than
other plants do, is to sak "what did
you do wrong?"
Or, "I'watered my plants every
day all summer. I did my part, so
there must have been something
wrong with the plants!"
OK, those are a few problems I
hear. Since I seldom have a tree or
thrud die which I plants, what are the
above-mentioned good folks deing
hat, we can correct or avoid? Hopefully, here are some helpful answers

that we can correct or avoid? Hope-fully, here are some helpful answers and solutions.

For members, of the Ericaceae plant family, you need acidic soil with lots of organic matter and never too dry nor too wet. Avoid planting wan town or game matter and nevér too dry nor to wet. Avoid planting this group of plants in the hottest, sunniest places, OK, blueberries need full sun, l'ilike a mixture of sind, peat, pine fines to replace about 50% of existing soil and mix with the other 50%. But, if clay or hardpan subsoil is all you have to work with, a raised bed may be the only way to grow these plants successfully. They also need loose soil, and no distrubing their fine little roots! Rhododendrons; szaleas; moun-tain laurel, blueberries, lingonberries, heather, peris japonica, enkiarithus are all members of the ericaceae fam-ily.

ly.

For rose gardens, mulch, organic fertilizer, frequent watering (mornings not evenings), pruning and win-ther protection of the graft union are important. Standing water can kill tost of plants.

For acid loving plants, the drip of the house may pose a problem. You see, mortar from the bricks or stone may lie in excess just under a skimpy layer of added topsoil, along the sides of your house. To grow azalaesa, camellias, or many other plants need-

ing an acidic soil in this situation, will

ing an acidic soil in this situation, will medin removing the waste concrete and mortar and replacing with high-organic-matter soil. An acid fertilizer may also be needed.






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
