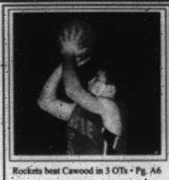

Western offering \$1,000 reward

The Western Rockcastle Water Association is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those involved in stealing equipment from the association.

\$5.4 million water project discussed at Mt. Vernon

The new Mt. Vernon City Council, and newly elected Mayor Clarice Kirby, discussed a possible \$5.4 million water project for the city with engineers on Monday night.

Engineers with Daily & Associates of Louisville and AGE Engineers in Stanford told the council the project was needed so that the recently expanded and upgraded Mt. Vernon water plant could produce as much water as possible.

As much as possible for the plant would be 4 million gallons a day. The plant currently produces 2 million gallons a day, which barely meets the needs of the country.

Mt. Vernon's water treatment plant is responsible for 95 percent of the water in the country.

A few years ago, the city spent approximately \$4 million to upgrade its system.

At the time, the city was told that the plant would produce 4 million gallons a day, but the plant has never been able to produce that amount and, according to engineers, the most the plant has ever produced was 2.7 million gallons a day.

Engineers said the problem was that the plant couldn't get enough to it from Lake Linville.

The engineers attending Monday night's meeting stopped short of saying

that the work on the last project was "shoddy."

The last engineers on the project, Nesbitt Engineering, no longer do business with the city and the city and Nesbitt have had some legal problems.

Engineers told the council that a new transmission line and new water intake valve in Lake Linville were needed to solve the water supply problem to the water plant.

The new 30 inch line would reduce to 24 inches before the water headed into the plant.

Engineer Luther Galloway also told the council that extensive work should be done on the city's water tank system.

Galloway suggested that the city make several changes at their Tank Farm on Town Hill, including removing two of the four tanks currently in operation.

Galloway also suggested removing the Radio Tower Hill Tank located on Juanita Davis Road and building a new 500,000 gallon tank on the same site.

Galloway said that a new 12 inch line should be built from High Street to the Tank Farm and an eight inch line should be built from the Tank Farm to the new tank on Radio Tower

Money still available for free septic systems

As scary as it may be, the Government is actually watching over some households in the country.

Rockcastle County residents, who do not properly dispose of their raw sewage still have time to avoid possible huge fines from the state for polluting the environment.

Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotta said this week that the Septic-System Program, which has been underway in Eastern Kentucky and Rockcastle County for the

past nine months, still has money available.

The program is part of U.S. Congressman Harold Roger's Personal Responsibility in a Desirable Environment (PRIDE) program, which has dumped millions of dollars into Eastern Kentucky to help clean up the area.

The Septic System Program provides money to low income households who have no septic system, a failing system or are running a

Kentucky Governor Paul Patton recently announced \$250 million in Medicaid cuts for the state.

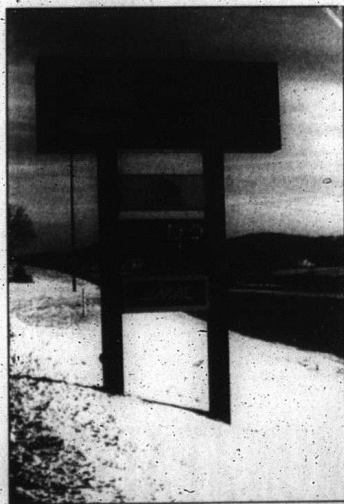
In an effort to determine what affect the cuts will have on health care facilities in Rockcastle County, the chief financial officer for

Rockcastle Hospital Inc. and its affiliates, Charles "Bud" Black was asked to comment.

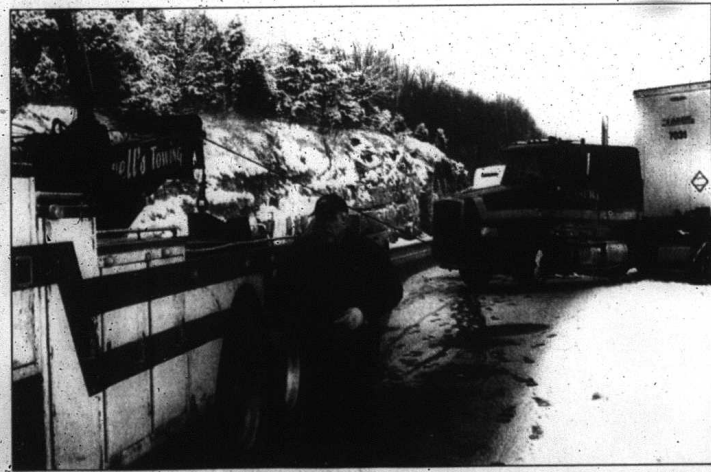
Black said that presently there is

The Family Room

Domestic violence is, unfortunately, not a rare occurrence. Travel with a two-parent home and a belief that divorce is never the right thing to do. A woman must do whatever the husband demands because he is the head of the house. I know of abusers who quote Scripture to their mates to back up their controlling behavior. In no way does God desire for his children to live in abuse. No Scripture demands that a woman give in to all her husband's demands. Children who grow up in abusive families become abusers. This is simply not true for everyone. Yes, some children from abusive homes do become abusers when they reach adulthood. Others become victims of abuse, and others become neither. Children are affected by the abuser's they see and hear, but not every child is affected in the same way. Abusers can change just because they want to. The promises of an abuser to change should be greeted with skepticism. They are human like the rest of us, and when was the last time you made a major behavioral change in three weeks? Most change takes much longer. Abusers who want to change should seek counseling and medical help, and they should expect to work at changing for the next several years. Everyone knows who the abusers are, because they have such bad reputations. Some abusers are considered upstanding citizens by those who know them. They may be doctors, ministers, lawyers, businessmen and leaders in their churches and communities. Both the abuser and his spouse hide the abuse, and others may not know. Even family members may be unaware.

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Preventing Ear Infections in Children

Presented by: Dr. Kimberly Carraluis Ear infections are one of the most common problems for children in the preschool years. Some children will get repeated infections that never seem to clear up completely.

However, keeping the ears free of infection and fluid is very important at this age when so much of a child's learning and social development depends on good hearing. Fortunately, there are many things a parent can do to help protect a young child's ears from infections. First and foremost is a clean environment. Pollution is a big factor in causing the congestion that will eventually lead to plugged ears, fluid accumulation, and infection. Cigarette smoking is a major cause of irritation to the airways. Children will get a runny nose, congestion of the nasal passages, and a cough from cigarette smoke. These conditions predispose to infections and also prevent the child from resolving infections as easily. Heating with wood or kerosene is another source of pollution which contributes to congestion and infection. Heating with oil, gas, or electricity is far cleaner.

For young children, being put to bed with a bottle is a problem. The milk or juice will pool around the Eustachian tube and promote infections. Breastfeeding has been shown to reduce the risk of ear infections. The other big cause of ear infections is through exposure to viruses from other children, especially in day care centers. The larger the group of children, the greater the number of viruses that are spread around. Try to keep the groups small!

State cost share program sign-ups announced

The Rockcastle County Conservation District will be accepting requests for financial and technical assistance under the Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program beginning February 3, 2003 and extending through February 28, 2003.

The Kentucky Soil Erosion and Water Quality Cost Share Program was created to help agricultural operations protect the soil and water resources of Kentucky and to implement their agriculture water quality plans. This program was established to assist landowners address existing soil erosion, water quality and other environmental problems associated with their farming or woodland operation.

The 1994 Kentucky General Assembly established this financial and technical assistance program. Kentucky Revised Statutes 262.115, establishes that the program's funds be distributed by local conservation districts and the Kentucky Soil & Water Conservation Commission with priority given to animal waste related problems, agricultural district participants and to those practices on the National Agricultural Water Quality plans on file with their local conservation districts. Funding for the pro-

gram comes from the Kentucky General Assembly through the direct appropriations to the program from the Phase I Tobacco Settlement Funds and from funds provided by the Kentucky Department of Agriculture.

Practices eligible for cost share are: Animal Waste Utilization, Vegetative Filter Strips, Sinkhole Protection, Heavy Use Area Protection, Rotational Grazing System Establishment, Livestock Steam Crossing and Riparian Area Protection.

Ranking of Applications will be done on the state level by the Kentucky Soil and Water Conservation Commission at the Kentucky Division of Conservation located in Frankfort. Approval of applications is based on a statewide ranking criteria and the availability of funds. Cost share rates are a maximum of 60 to 75 percent of the actual installation cost of the practice not to exceed \$7,500 per year for agronomic practices or \$20,000 per year for animal waste practices.

Yards to Paradise

Growing Some Food in the Urban Landscape Could be a Lifesaver

My thoughts vacillate from my front yard pool that is ice and snow covered to the box of sweet potatoes harvested from three plants I grew in a raised bed last season. And, from the chicken I had on Sunday, flavored with sage and rosemary from my perennial flower beds, to the chicken, wild mustard, dandelion, wild violets and cress I plan to harvest from the yard for some "wild" greens. Maybe the cold weather is affecting my brain, or maybe the new crop of new seed and nursery catalogs I've been reading are to blame. I have a question. If there were no gas at the corner market and no food at the grocery store, and all restaurants were closed, what would you and your family do for food?

First, what's that got to do with landscaping? Second, that scenario will never happen; after all, this is the twenty-first century, right? Besides, the waterfowl ponds were nicer than usual in the cold, still air. The chicken and potatoes were delectable. And gas is plentiful and so is food. All's well. No worries.

My mother used to tell me of the hard times in the 1930's when the chicken market crashed. I remember reading *Gone With the Wind* by the light of the full moon because we couldn't afford the kerosene for the lamp when I was a grade schooler. I can remember Scarlett O'Hara and that she was hungry at Tara after General Sherman's union army marched through Georgia—a rich southern belle was sold the land by herself just to get by. Hearing the

call by some for a military draft reminds me of stories about rationing during WWII. The women and kids all had to fend for themselves because all of the able men were off fighting Germany or Japan.

I know "baby boomers, generations X and Y" smile disinterested smiles as grandparents tell, between scrumptious bites of chicken, of tough times. Besides, surely we'll never HAVE to scrounge around the yard for a mess of wild greens to eat, about a deer for some meat. This is America, not Afghanistan or Ethiopia, right?

Though George Washington and his troops nearly starved at Valley Forge, literally, about two hundred all but twenty-five years ago while fighting for liberty from repression, we think that as a time far, far away as we pop a frozen entrée into the microwave.

Besides, the neighbors have this yard full of neat little evergreen shrubs and the prettiest green grass (compliments of those guys with the truck, hose and space suits). I can't let dandelions grow in the yard. Why, the neighborhood association would all get together. I'd be a nuisance in the community!

Mission is about accomplished for this article. So, go ahead and look at the garden catalogs. Plan some areas in your yard to grow something for the dinner plate. It will be fun, I think you'll see. There are so many trees, shrubs, plants, including vegetables, that both look good while growing and provide some mighty good eats.

And, if ever, another "time of great trouble" comes, sprague from the flower bed or an apple from the backyard tree might be a lifesaver.

Tobacco production meeting

The Annual Tobacco Production Meeting will be held on Monday, February 10th at 7:00 p.m. in the Rockcastle County High School cafeteria. Local sponsors, along with the Young Farmers Association, will be providing a meal and needs for the night in planning. Please call 256-2403 to register no later than February 7th.

Tobacco continues to be Kentucky and Rockcastle County's number one cash crop. Many things are happening which will affect the crop this year. The USDA Secretary of Agriculture will announce the quota on February 3. Estimates are a 11% quota cut, however, the

secretary has a plus or minus 3% discretion. The 10% carry forward rule may take effect if 317 million pounds are not sold across the burley belt. Tobacco has been included in the agriculture disaster bill, so a TLAIF payment may be coming. At last but no least, will a tobacco buyout program occur in the near future?

Starting float plants is just 8 weeks away, so planning the 2003 crop is at hand. Mr. Gary Palmer will be on hand to discuss production practices and answer any questions. Again, mark your calendars for Monday, February 10, 7:00 p.m. at the high school, and call 256-2403 to register.

County Executive Director Incurres Social Security Number

We have been advised that several CCC-1099G's, IRS forms to report payments, were mailed to Kentucky producers with an incorrect Social Security number. The 3rd digit is duplicated and the last digit of the number has been dropped off.

All other information listed on the CCC-1099G is correct and the amount received from Commodity Credit is correct for tax filing purposes.

A revised CCC-1099-1 correction is to be mailed to producers on Jan. 31, 2002 in time for filing.

Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCCP)

Direct and Counter-cyclical payments for 2002 through 2007 will be based on each producer's individual production history. Signup for the program is scheduled to begin October 1, 2002 and end July 2, 2003. Program participation is voluntary and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.

Producers have been mailed additional information concerning this program. Those who have questions should contact their local USDA Service Center or county FSA office. More information about the 2002 Farm Bill issues is available at <http://www.usda.gov/farmbill>. **USDA Suspends Burley Tobacco Auction Sales**

The AMS Tobacco Programs, suspended auction sales for burley tobacco after sales on January 16, resume sales on February 3 and conclude sales for the season on February 20.

The burley tobacco marketing area covers auction markets in the states of Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Ohio and Indiana. Sales of burley tobacco at non-auction receiving stations will not be affected by the sales suspension.

Due to the lack of rainfall providing necessary humidity to prepare tobacco for market and a decrease in market deliveries, it has been decided that a two-week recess would be in the best interest of all segments of the tobacco industry.

After consultation with affected segments of the tobacco industry, the suspension of burley tobacco auction sales will provide more preparation time and allow additional time for the industry to better assess the amount of production remaining to be sold.

Inspection and price support services will not be available at designated auction markets during the two-week suspension period. **Warehouse Designation - A Must!** Producers that wish to designate their burley tobacco quota to a different buying point may do so during the next regular re-designation period. Producers will be limited to designate the farm one time during each regular re-designation period. Therefore, if a farm has multiple tenants which will market tobacco at separate buying points, the farm operator will need to designate for all those tenants at the same time.

Changes in Tobacco Program Does Not Limit Carryover Tobacco

Jeffery S. Hall, Kentucky State Executive Director of the Farm Service Agency, wishes to remind farmers that recent changes in the Burley tobacco program do NOT change the amount of physical tobacco a farm can carryover from one crop year to the next. Tobacco that is not sold this season can be carried over as unmarketed tobacco and sold in the next marketing season.

Effective with the 2002 Burley tobacco quota, the total amount of undermarketing that can be "carried over" as quota additions to farms, nationwide, is limited to 10 percent of the national basic quota for the preceding year. In the past, these undermarketings could be brought forward and added to the next year's basic quota provided the farm did not exceed the prior year's basic quota plus prior year's leased-in pounds.

Factoring, or the limiting of individual farm undermarketings may be required beginning with the 2002 crop year. Factoring will occur if the 2002 crop year undermarketings for the entire Burley belt exceeds 10 percent of the 2002 national basic quota. The new limit is not farm specific; the limit is to be applied, if it will be applied to the undermarketings from all farms when the 2003 Effective Quota is determined.

Farmers that carry over unwanted tobacco are required to report the pounds "carried over" and the location of storage of storage to the local FSA County Office.

Salads - Healthy Way to Help Get 5-A-Day

Do you get five servings from fruits and vegetables every day? The Food Guide Pyramid recommends that each person over the age of 2 eat a total of five servings of fruits and vegetables every day. Only 17% of those living in Kentucky eat the recommended 5-A-Day (5 or more servings).

A fruit serving is one piece of fruit, (apple, orange, banana, etc.) or melon wedges 1/2 cup of 100% fruit juice, or 1/2 cup canned fruit. A vegetable serving is 1/2 cup chopped raw or cooked vegetable or 1 cup of leafy raw vegetables.

Try to eat at least two fruits and three vegetables every day. Do you have orange juice for breakfast? Did you have several tomato slices on your sandwich for lunch? Did you eat carrots with your sandwich? If so, you have had three of your five servings for the day. When you eat your evening meal, try to eat at least two more servings from these groups. If you eat more, that's even better!

To help reach the 5-A-Day goal, reach for the salads. Fruit or vegetable salads can help you meet this goal. Salads can add a crunch to a meal. Salads can add coolness to a hot meal. Salads also add a lot of color. By eating different colored foods, you are getting different vitamins and minerals your body needs each day. Try colorful foods such as carrots, radishes, broccoli and tomatoes. Add apples, pears or raisins to a tossed salad.

For a fruit salad, start with a can of fruit cocktail and add oranges, canned pineapple and grapes. Combine your own favorite fruits and vegetables. Or look in cookbooks for new recipes that you haven't tried. Color is key when eating for healthy reasons.

Don't get carried away with dressing choices for your salads. Many salad dressings are high in fat! Go light on the dressing or try a no-fat dressing. If you order salads in a restaurant, order the dressing "on the side."

Then be careful how much dressing you put on your salad. Don't pour all of it on at one time. Try to use only half of what you get. Or, better yet, dip your fork in the dressing before you put the lettuce on your fork. This still gives you a taste of the dressing without all the calories.

Salads are a wonderful way to get 5-A-Day. Try your best to eat at least five servings of fruits and vegetables. Try this Mock Thousand Island Dressing which only costs three cents per serving.

Mock Thousand Island Dressing
1/2 cup light mayonnaise or plain nonfat yogurt
2 tablespoons catsup
2 tablespoons pickle relish
Wash hands and all surfaces. Combine all ingredients in small bowl, stirring until well blended. Chill 15 minutes before serving. Store in remaining dressing in a covered container in the refrigerator up to five days. Makes 12 (1-tablespoon) servings at 3 cents per serving. 30 calories per serving; 2g fat; 100mg sodium; 2g sugar.

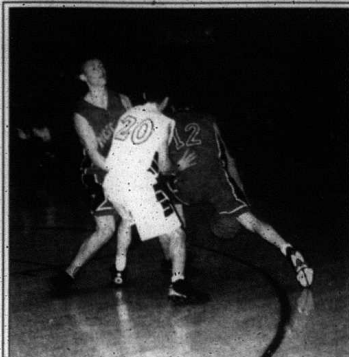
Clay County outscored the Lady Rockets by three in the third, but the Lady Rockets made their free throws in the fourth period and came away with a 71-54 road victory.

The Rockcastle County Rockets dropped their third game of the season Saturday afternoon in a hard fought contest at Clay County.

The Tigers defeated the Rockets 80-67, after going to the free throw line 39 times compared to the Rockets' 27.

At one point in the fourth period the Rockets had a ten point lead, although the game was extremely close throughout.

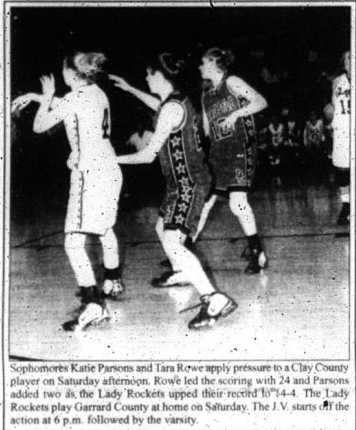

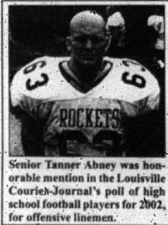

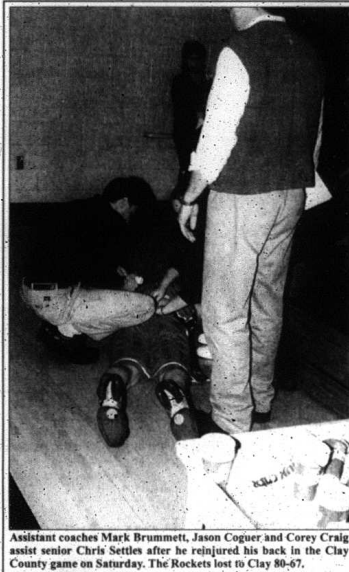

Hill. He also said the city should build a new pump station at the Tank Farm. The new transmission line and intake valve would cost approximately \$1.4 million. The water tank project would cost the city approximately another \$4 million.

Engineers said the inability to fill the Tank Farm ground storage tank during peak demand periods, the inability of the system to rotate and keep fresh water stored in ole tanks at the Tank Farm, the inability of the system to fill the high rise elevated tank during peak demand periods and the size of the tank to supply fire flows were the reasons for the needed projects.

The council took no action and will have a special meeting to discuss the projects on Monday night, at which time they will discuss possible funding sources.

Mayor Kirby admitted that if the council did vote to go ahead with the project, water rates would likely have to be raised to help offset the costs.

In other business local CPA Joe Clontz told the council that because of tax season and because he had picked up several new clients, he would not have time to complete the city's audits in a time frame that they wanted them to be completed.

Clontz said the city still had not gotten all the information together that he needed to complete the audits and that even if they did soon, he would not be able to start until after April 15th.

Clontz suggested that the city find some other firm to do the audits. The last audit completed for the city was for fiscal year ending June of 1999.

The city's audits are three years behind. Mayor Kirby said he was uneasy about spending any monies until she knew the city's exact financial situation.

The council agreed to look elsewhere for an auditor. The council also passed a resolution in support of the Kentucky Renaissance Program, which is trying to buy the old St. Clair house located at the corner of Richmond and Main Street.

If the property is purchased, it is the intent of the Renaissance board to put a welcome and tourist information center.

The council agreed to help with a portion of the financing to buy the property.

The council agreed to change their meeting time back to the first Monday of each month at 7 p.m. That change will likely take place in March, but may not occur until April.

The city will also use a matching \$71,500 grant to upgrade the city park on Williams Street.

A cover for the Amphitheatre, restrooms and picnic shelter upgrades are planned.

The city will also use a \$31,000 grant from the PRIDE program to clean up four dumpsters in the city limits, buy two surveillance cameras and conduct two white goods buy backs.

straight line pipe into a creek or stream.

So far 82 systems have been built in Rockcastle County with an average cost of \$3,050, meaning the government has spent \$250,000 in the county.

Carloftis said that more septic systems have been built in Rockcastle County than any other county in the Fifth Congressional District.

Carloftis praised the work of Sandy Whitaker with the local Conservation District, which is housed in the Farm Service Agency Building on Hwy. 150 between Mt. Vernon and

Broadshead.

"Sandy has put a lot of time into this program and it certainly shows," Carloftis said.

Those wishing to apply for money for a new septic system can do that at the Farm Service Agency, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Carloftis said that because of the federal government's satellite imaging program, the government has identified every house where there is not a proper system in place.

"The state's Natural Resource Cabinet will be citing those households that have failed to make application for a free system," the Judge said.

agency detailing where curtailments will be implemented.

Black explained that all health care providers in Rockcastle County are virtually Medicaid and Medicare dependent and major cuts in either program would make it extremely

difficult to operate.

This is especially true for the nursing home, home health care and durable medical equipment industries in the area.

In a worst case scenario, there is a possibility of services being scaled back, according to Black.

The local hospital revenues are 45 to 50 percent derived from Medicaid proceeds with the other affiliates being much more dependent on Medicaid funding because they are major providers of long-term health care.

It should be noted that following Patton's announcement of the cut in Medicaid, it was estimated that approximately 6,000 people statewide could possibly lose nursing home privileges.

Black said that unless they were forced by the state no one would be denied the services of the hospital's affiliate the Health and Rehabilitation Center (nursing home) at Broadshead.

The chief financial officer said that, even then, it would be a last ditch occurrence.

The hospital and affiliate facilities such as the respiratory center, have been operating under frozen Medicaid rates for the past couple of years because of financial losses by the state.

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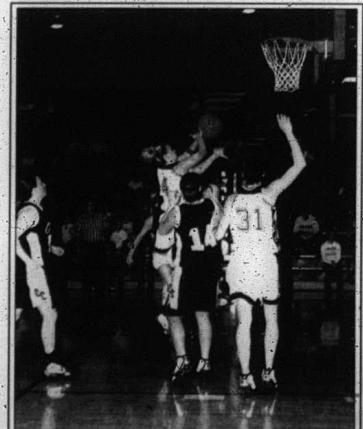

Thanks to Rockcastle County students, the First Baptist Food and Clothing Mission in Mt. Vernon had an ample supply of food on its shelves during the holidays.

If we give of ourselves to help someone in need, we are truly blessed. I hope that these young people and all of us can realize the immeasurable joy of serving others in Jesus' name."

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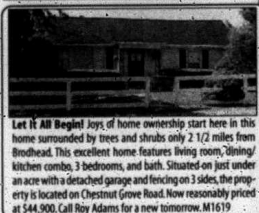

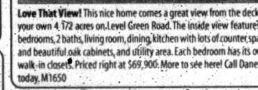

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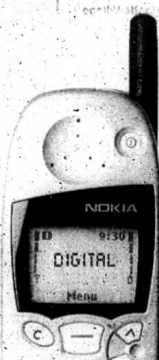
