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In Mt. Vernon Council to go ahead with water project

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted recently to go ahead with a proposed \$5.4 million water project for the city.

If the city can obtain the funding for the project would include a new 30 inch transmission line and water intake valve that would be built at Lake Linville so more water could get to the city's water plant at Remfo Valley.

Currently the plant produces, on the average, of two million gallons a day, but has the capacity to produce four million.

Also included in the project would be major changes in the city's

Four Rockcastle County men were arrested last week after police located a man they were looking for.

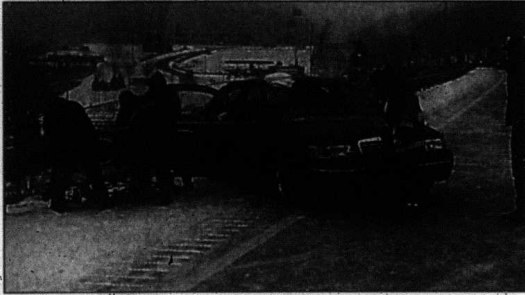
According to Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette, police were looking for Sammy Stewart, 27, of Orlando because a bench warrant had been issued for him.

Roger Evans, 22, of Mt. Vernon was charged with possession of a controlled substance first degree. He is currently on probation because of other crimes.

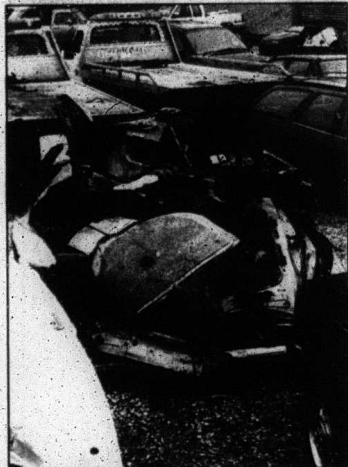

Numerous break-ins reported Rose's One Stop, Hiatt's 5 & 10 burglarized

A number of break-ins have occurred in the county over the past week at homes and businesses, including Hiatt's 5 & 10 in Mt. Vernon and Rose's One Stop in Brodhead.

Last Thursday, thieves threw a rock through the front door of Hiatt's, which is located on Main Street in Mt. Vernon around 4 a.m.

Owner Billy Hiatt said a person living in an apartment, located in another building on Main Street, heard the noise made by the rock going through his door, but did not report the incident to police.

Hiatt said he learned of the robbery on Friday when he went to open his store around 8:15 a.m.

Hiatt said thieves took five Fenton lamps from his store valued at \$300 each.

The longtime Mt. Vernon businessman said he was in the process of installing an alarm system in his store.

In Brodhead, Rose's One Stop was broken into Monday night the same way Hiatt's was hit on Thursday.

Owner Luther Rose said someone threw a large rock through the front door of his store around 2:15 a.m. Tuesday morning. Rose's is located on Hwy. 150 near downtown Brodhead.

Rose said that thieves took about \$3,000 worth of cigarettes.

Rose's wife Bonnie, who runs the store along with her husband said she thought Brodhead police officer Joe Bussell had gone off duty around 2 a.m.

Brodhead's other police officer Jason Kirby, who has been employed by the city about a week, is off work on Monday and Tuesdays.

"We don't need police officers on duty in the city during the day or even until 11 p.m. at night because we are all open," said Mrs. Rose.

"We need them on duty when we go home and maybe some of this crime would stop - it gets really frustrating replacing doors and losing inventory," Mrs. Rose added.

Brodhead City Clerk Becky Bussell said that Chief Bussell had been on duty from 7 a.m. Monday morning.

Numerous other break-ins have been reported throughout the county.

Two men kicked in the back door at the home of Ben and Geraldine

French on Saturday evening. The French's home is on Hwy. 150 at Mareburg.

Mr. French said he and his wife were at home in their basement when he thought he heard something and proceeded to the top floor.

"They didn't get anything, but they did tear up our french doors," Mr. French said.

The incident occurred around 5:30 p.m. Mr. French said that he thought the two men were on foot, but Rockcastle Sheriff Darrell Doan said a witness saw a red car pick up two men on the roadway.

Police also reported break-ins at the home of Garland Cummins and Ipa Cummins last week. Both homes are on Hwy. 150 between Brodhead and Crab Orchard.

Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane said that police had made headway on the rash of break-ins and that other arrests were imminent.

"The main problem is that so many of these people get hooked on drugs, such as methamphetamine and they will do just about anything in order to be able to purchase it," he said.

Lane declined to identify the people police think are responsible for the latest break-ins because he said they would run.

"We (police) are holding our own and believe me that is not an easy task right now," Lane said.

Last week the Rockcastle Grand Jury handed down six indictments for earlier break-ins in the county.

"We've just about got them all and we will be presenting other burglary cases to the Grand Jury," Lane added.

Brent Kirby verdict upheld by High Court

Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Commonwealth Attorney Eddy F. Montgomery announced this week that Earl Brent Kirby, 46, of Mt. Vernon, has had his conviction for reckless homicide upheld by the Kentucky Supreme Court.

According to Montgomery, Kirby was convicted in August 2000 by a Lincoln County jury for the shooting death of Lester "Frankie"

Rogers obtains \$9 million for Rockcastle Co.

U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers announced last week that he obtained \$362 million in targeted federal funding for a wide range of projects in southern and eastern Kentucky, including Rockcastle County. The funding is included in the fiscal year 2003 Omnibus Appropriations bill, which is comprised of 11 different spending bills.

President George W. Bush is expected to sign the bill as early as this week.

\$9 million of the funding will be spent on projects in Rockcastle County.

They include \$6 million to continue the six-lane expansion project on I-75 in the county and \$3 million for forest preservation and to fight marijuana cultivation and lawlessness in the Daniel Boone National Forest.

Rogers also obtained \$17 million more in funding for his eastern Kentucky PRIDE program.

PRIDE provides money for dump site clean-ups and money for low income families to replace or build septic systems on their property.

To date the Congressman has obtained \$140 million for the project. Rockcastle County is in the area served by ERIDE.

Local woman hurt in wreck Wednesday

Last Wednesday Mt. Vernon firefighters had to use the Jaws-of-Life to cut apart a car that a local woman was trapped in after a wreck on U.S. 25.

Mt. Vernon assistant fire chief David Bales said the wreck happened after a mail truck headed to Mt. Vernon Post Office rear ended the vehicle causing it to hit the back of a cattle trailer around 3:30 p.m.

After the car hit the cattle trailer it went over a steep bank near the entrance to Christian Appalachian Project, on Green Fish Hill.

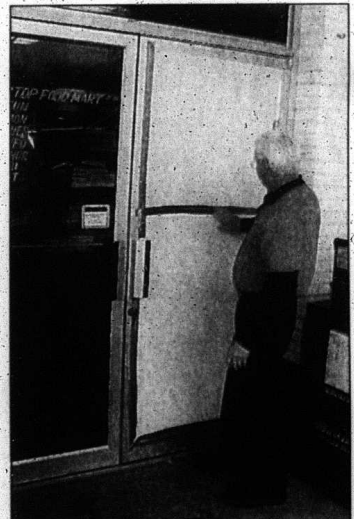
The woman, Pamela Hansel, 51, of Mt. Vernon was taken to Rockcastle Hospital where she was admitted for treatment because of her injuries.

The driver of the mail truck, Preston Jones was not injured.

Bales said that the roadway was slick and probably attributed to the accident.

The mail truck was totaled in wreck, but Mt. Vernon Postmaster Kim Owens said another truck was sent from Lexington to pick-up mail at her post office, Livingston's post office and the post office in Remfo Valley.

Mrs. Owens said there were no delays in mail service because of the wreck.

Babies Get Plugged Tear Ducts

Babies often have tear ducts that are not completely developed when they are born. When the tear ducts do not drain, the infant will have, cheeks all the time. After naps the eye may be a little watery looking.



The obstruction is often at the far end of the tear duct. Usually it will open spontaneously, but you can help this by massaging the area between the inside corner of the eye and the nose several times a day with your small finger or a cotton-tipped swab.

The increased pressure from this milking action against the obstructing membrane will usually open it by six months of age.

If massage does not work, the ophthalmologist may try irrigating the duct. A saline solution is injected into the duct and this usually washes out the debris and perforates the remaining membranes. This can often be done in the office.

Conservative treatment is preferable unless the obstruction is discovered at a later age, when it may be wise to probe the duct fairly quickly unless there is a good response to massage. Probing the tear duct should be considered if it is still plugged at six months of age.

Probing the duct is usually done in the operating room using anesthesia. It is quite successful in younger children, so if massaging regularly does not solve the problem after a few months, it is appropriate to see an ophthalmologist for an expert opinion on whether this minor surgery should be done.

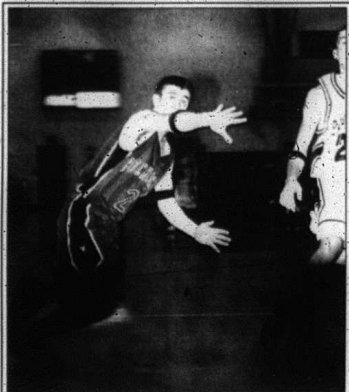
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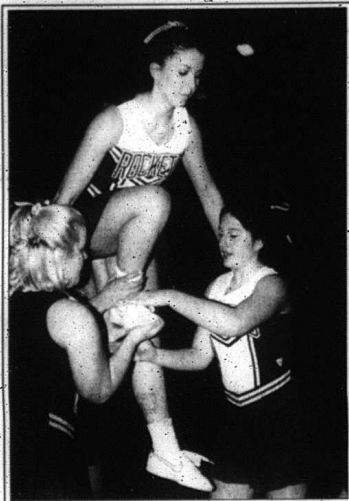
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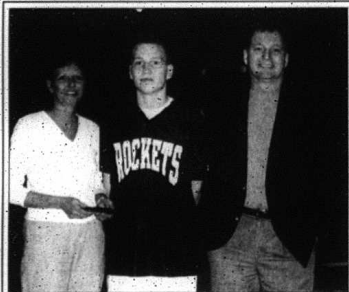

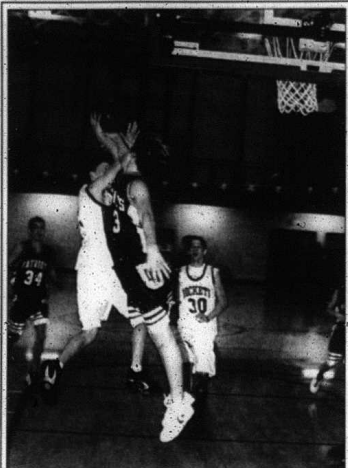

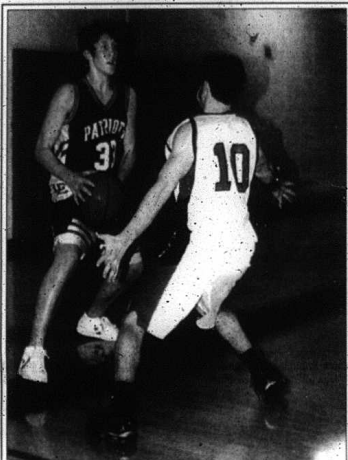

The Rockets, 19 and 4, will play their last regular season game this Friday night at McCreary Central.

"We didn't play real well tonight is all I've got to say," head coach Clayton Cash said.

Cash, who is in his 11th season at the ROCK, said his team must work hard this week to get ready for next week's district tournament.

"We got to get focused and come together - Oneida will not be a push-over," he said.

The Rockets will play the Mountaineers in the first round Monday night. Game time is 6:30 p.m.

The Rockets have defeated Oneida twice this season and are the number one seed in the district.

If the Rockets defeat Oneida they will play the winner of the Clay and Jackson County.

The last team with 22 wins was the 1998-99 team, also coached by Christy Noble.

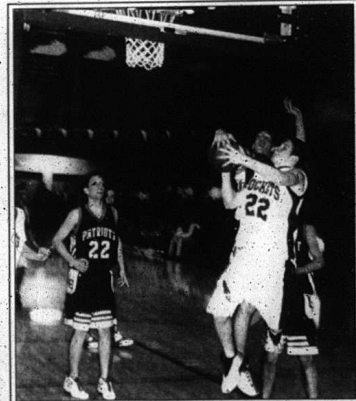
Nine Lady Rockets got in the scoring column with Johana Abney leading the scoring with 26 points.

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Feeding Children

Children need a variety of food for their bodies to feel good, look good, and grow. No single food can give them all the nutrients that they need. They need variety at every meal, every day. Following the Food Guide Pyramid will help your child grow healthfully.

It is recommended that children eat the same number of servings from each group as adults except for milk. Young children should consume 3 glasses a day, but by the time children are over 10 years old

they should drink 4 glasses of milk. Other serving sizes should be age appropriate.

HUNGRY CHILDREN
About one-fourth of Kentucky children do not eat breakfast. Children who are hungry sometimes "act up." These hungry children might be labeled as trouble-makers, sleepy, slow, inattentive, or "paced out." They cannot learn or play as well as children who eat breakfast. They make more errors, and they are less likely to get the nutrients they need. They are also more likely to have higher cholesterol levels than children who eat breakfast.

Encourage your child to eat breakfast. Breakfast can consist of fruit, a muffin, a peanut butter sandwich, or even a piece of pizza. **OBESITY**
An obese child is not a healthy child. If your child is overweight, encourage him/her to make-wise food choices by having healthy, low-fat food items readily available. Don't have "junk" foods around to tempt the child. Serve low-fat desserts. Cookies and cakes are party foods-not everyday foods. Eat meals and snacks at regular times.

Encourage your child to be active-not just busy. Limit TV time. Provide "child-size" servings, especially snacks. The child will always get "seconds" if he/she is still hungry. Do not make your child clean his plate. If he is full, he is finished eating. Discuss food choices-not his weight. Help your child accept his body. If obesity is extreme, you and your child need to discuss this with your health care provider and a registered dietitian.

Renovating grass hay fields with red clover

It is cost effective to seed red clover into grass hay fields?

For years farmers have used the disk of February's moon as a time to overseed clover into fescue or orchard grass. By adding clover through the renovation process, grass fields are improved in three ways. Clover will add nitrogen to the soil and benefit surrounding grass. As much as 180 pounds of nitrogen may be added. With current nitrogen cost this year, clover renovation may be worth as much as \$400 of urea or just over \$45 per acre.

The second benefit to adding clover is the improved quality of fescue. Fescue is a higher protein feed that animals prefer over grasses such as endophyte infected fescue and orchard grass. Clover will also grow best during mid summer when other grass has stopped. Clover will fill in during mid summer, increasing the total yield.

The third benefit to adding clover is that fescue hay and pastures infected with the endophyte fungus is slowly lowering cattle production

through its detrimental effects during summer months and can carry through in hay. Adding clover dilutes the amount of fescue available and gives animals a choice. Clover being more abundant and preferred by animals will then become a larger part of their diet. Keep in mind that cattle continuously grazing red clover will kill the stand out because of close grazing. A rotational grazing system of 7 days on and 30 days off is necessary to keep red clover in pasture.

Lowering fertilizer cost, increasing yield and improving the quality of feed available to livestock makes clover very cost effective. However, clover varieties vary in results.

Research at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture has compared the performance of common or uncultivated clover with that of better certified varieties. The cost of better varieties has traditionally been as much as \$1 more per pound. However, in 2002 the additional cost is less than 25 cents. An additional seed cost of \$2 per acre was worth over 3500 pounds additional hay over the first 2 years. Stands of the certified varieties were thick and vigorous going into their second winter, while common varieties were clearly thinning. Certified varieties lasted into the third season increasing their overall yield.

Farmers planning to seed clover should contact their farm supply store 10 to 14 days before you need seed. This allows store owners to be sure they have certified seed of the variety and amount desired.

Community Walking Program

The Community Walking Program is for all residents of Rockcastle County who are interested in improving their health. The goal of the program is to walk a minimum of three days a week for thirty minutes or ideally, five days a week for thirty minutes. The program will last for 12 weeks. Participants who complete the program and turn in their walking logs will be eligible to receive incentives or prizes.

Participants will register at the Rockcastle County Health Department. Each person will receive a registration packet and a walking log-book to track their time or mileage. At the time of registration, it is not required but walkers can have their height, weight, blood pressure, and pulse recorded. In addition, optional body measurements such as circumference of waist, hips, thighs and arms can also be recorded. These body measurements can provide the walker valuable, spontaneous encouragement as you see positive changes in your body with a consistent exercise program. Follow-up measurements will be offered at the end of the program.

Walking will be done at each individual's convenience, wherever he or she desires. Mileage or time will be documented on the log book system. At the end of the program, walkers that complete the program will be eligible to receive incentives and recognition for their outstanding effort!

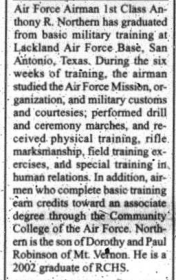

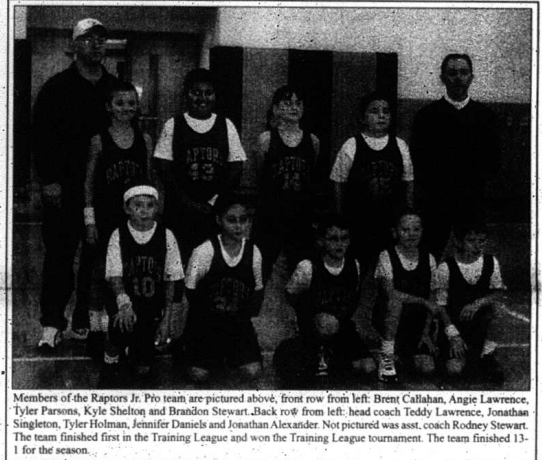

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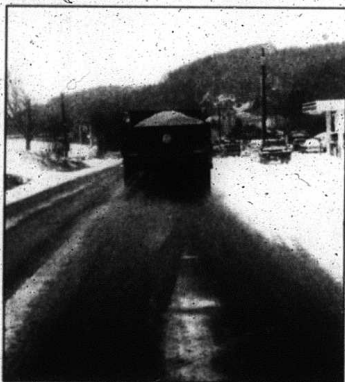

Yards to Paradise

Winter Interest in the Landscape

Cold days arrived early last fall and I heard several say they enjoyed the white Christmas.

There is little daylight either before or after work by which to enjoy the outdoors at mid-winter. But, for those who are enjoying retirement, there are certainly some interesting things to see and do in the yard. For most, at least a day or two off from the regular grind can mean a few hours free to do whatever strikes your fancy for wintertime outdoor enjoyment.

Some interesting landscape features can be found and admired in winter.

Examples are frostitened grasses waving in the cold wind, flower seed heads crowned with a load of snow, a goldfinch extracting seeds from a dried pinecone or dried teasel. Such are most glorious in winter. Miscanthus, pennisetum, panicum, chrismanthum and other grass species may indeed have been placed in the landscape scheme primarily because of their wintertime attractiveness.

Some perennials that I like to leave throughout the winter and not remove the dead stalks or seed heads from include coneflowers, sedum

(especially "Autumn Joy"), casta, yarrow, lysop, salvia, teasel and artemisia.

Some trees and shrubs exhibit nice characteristics we may not notice at other times of the year. Do you notice red twigs on blueberries, some willows and dogwoods in summer? Probably not! Without their foliage, such plants can look striking against the white of snow.

Corkscrew willows, contorted filberts, winterberry hollies, are all more striking minus their leaves. Wisteria, grapevines, passionflower vines, offer nice form covering a post, trellis, or arch during the wintertime.

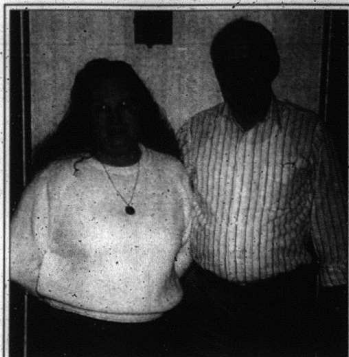
Some folks may think dead and seed heads are signs of laziness. Others appreciate the winter charms of such and wait until spring to clean up the litter. The preferred approach is probably somewhere in the middle. Remove dead leaves and flowers that are ugly unless it would be better for the health of the plant to wait, and let stay the aesthetically pleasing dead foliage and flowerheads.

A trellis, gazebo, fence or weather-resistant garden ornaments may have a charm all their own in the winter. So will feeders and birdhouses.

Maybe stone outcroppings, mossy logs, rotting stumps, or simply the stately shape of a pin oak or cypress will get your attention in a special way when you give the winter landscape a good long glance. Expect some nice surprises as you take a wintertime stroll or drive along a quiet lane.
