Students going to school longer

Students in the Rockcastle County school system are going to school just a little bit longer than usual these days. The Rockcastle County Board of Education voted last Thursday night to extend the instructional time for the school system by 30 minutes each day for 24 days.

The extended instruction time began on Monday of this week and will last for 24 days, until April 3rd, according to Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond.

Hammond said the vote by the board actually only extends the school day ten to fifteen minutes, because all of the elementary schools were already going longer than required by the Ky. State Department of Education.

Hammond said the biggest change in time spent at school was at the Rockcastle County High School and the Rockcastle County Middle School.

By going the extended half hour for 24 days the school system will make up two days missed because of inclement weather.

The board also voted to take off Memorial Day on May 26th and

Rewards are being offered this week for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those who have killed family pets in Rockcastle County.

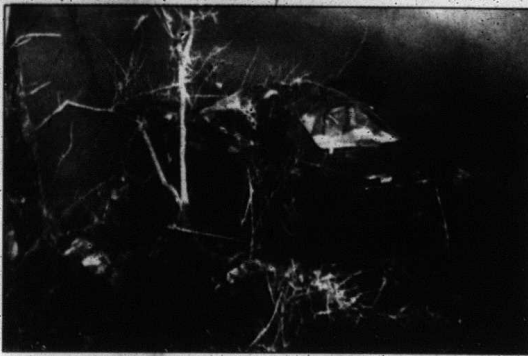
Frank Stallworth and his family live at Rockcastle near Grace Baptist Church and in the past year and a half someone has poisoned two black Labrador Retrievers and a cat with anti-freeze.

"One of the dogs was blind and both were in a pen when someone put anti-freeze in their water bowl," he said.

"It takes a low life person to kill a child's pet and I hope the state strengthens the cruelty to animal law now in effect," he said.

A bill now being considered in the state legislature, House Bill 435, strengthens the current cruelty to animal law and would make it a felony for someone to intentionally

Kenna Lanham was 47 Guilty verdict returned in beating death

A Garrard County jury found Phillip Lanham guilty Friday of suffocating his wife and tampering with evidence. Lanham is a former Rockcastle County school System instructional assistant.

Lanham's wife, a Rockcastle County school psychologist, Kenna Lanham, was 47, and had worked for the school system for 13 years, before she was brutally murdered in her Cartersville home on October 11, 2001.

The jury recommended that Phillip Lanham, also 47, receive the maximum sentences allowed by law: a life sentence for murder and five years for tampering with evidence, to be served consecutively. The earliest Phillip Lanham would be eligible for parole is in 20 years.

Kenna Lanham's relatives, wearing homemade buttons depicting Kenna with two grand-children, hugged each other after the verdicts were announced in court.

"I'm just so relieved," said Freddie Isaacs, Kenna Lanham's sister. "It's just been like a bad dream."

The new director is Ben Perry a 45-year-old father of four who decided a couple of years ago that he would get out of private business and dedicate his time environmental issues.

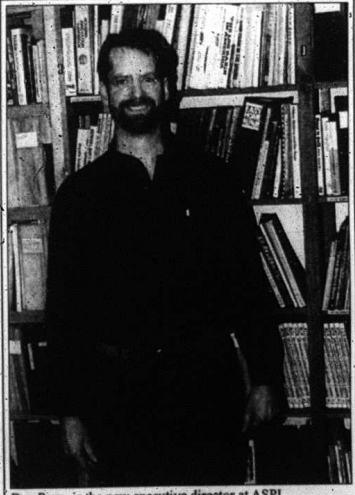
"I gave in to my life-long passion for environmental issues and enrolled in the graduate environ-

Police making strides in solving numerous crimes

Rockcastle County law enforcement has been working overtime in order to deal a blow to those responsible for a rash of break-ins that have taken place during the past few weeks, according to a recent press release issued by Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette.

Burdette said the Kentucky State Police and detectives stationed here, and the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office have successfully solved several recent burglaries, and the investigation continues.

"At least six recent thefts have been solved to the point that arrest warrants have been issued," Burdette said. "Law enforcement has worked together, with the help of the com-

munity, to successfully pinpoint facts necessary to identify those responsible for the recent thefts. And, we have much more to do and the work is ongoing," Burdette added.

A recent burglary at Flat Gap in Rockcastle County, at the Darrell Isaacs' residence, has resulted in the indictments of Michael Durham, 22 and Michael Richmond, 22; both of Mt. Vernon and Mitchell Dooley, 18, of Flat Gap. Most all the items stolen have been recovered and the arrest of the third suspect, Mitchell Dooley, is pending.

A February 12th burglary of a building, owned by Bobby Bishop in Brodhead, has resulted an arrest warrant being issued for a suspect au-

thorities believe is responsible. Authorities are not releasing the name of the fugitive, pending his apprehension.

The residence of Mark Robinson, on Cove Branch, was burglarized on February 21 and three arrest warrants were issued by the County Attorney's office. One defendant, Billy Gene Robinson, is in custody under a \$10,000 cash bond, following a preliminary hearing on Burglarly 1st degree charges on Monday. Two other arrests are expected shortly.

On February 27th the home of Chara Whit, near the Rockcastle Library in Mt. Vernon was burglarized and arrest warrants were issued shortly after securing evidence at the scene, including witness statements that were crucial to the investigation.

John Kemper, Jr., 26, of Conway was arrested Saturday night, March 1st, after a burglary at Robbie's Antiques on U.S. 25 at Conway. Deputy Sheriff Joe Rush and KSP Trooper Lufe Owens made the arrest after a neighbor observed the defendant in the store and detained him until authorities arrived. Kemper is under a \$15,000 cash or property bond, pending a preliminary hearing scheduled for Monday, March 10.

"These are cases where the identity of the perpetrators are known, arrests are being made, preliminary hearings are being held and presentment to the Rockcastle Grand Jury is imminent. We are pleased with law enforcement's quick response and detailed investigations," Burdette said.

Chief Sheriff's Deputy, Nathaniel Price, acknowledged pending joint investigations with the KSP, including a case where Kentucky State Police officer Jason McCowan arrested Keeha Saylor of Crab Orchard and

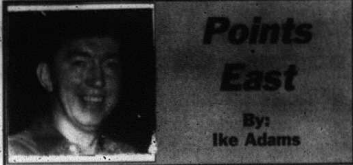

Treat Low Back Pain

Back pain is something that plagues almost everyone at one time or another. Usually it is from strains or overuse of the lower back, but sometimes there is a disc, arthritis or other causes for the pain.

The exact cause of the pain may be easy or difficult to determine, but the treatment should not be difficult. There are several important things you can do to make the pain go away and stay away.

The first thing to do when the pain begins is to rest the back. The proper position for this is lying with some bend at both the hips and knees. Pillows can be placed under the knees when lying on your back, and they are also helpful when placed between the knees when lying on your side. You should not lie on your stomach. Two or three days of bed rest may be necessary, but often just frequent rest periods intermixed with light activity is best. Medicines are very useful in decreasing the pain and relaxing the muscles. Sore muscles always tighten up causing the pain to worsen. Aspirin or ibuprofen are very helpful; you should use up to 8-12 per day, taken with food. Acetaminophen helps pain, but it does not decrease inflammation. There are also many excellent prescription medicines that are taken only once or twice a day. It is important to use these medicines early to stop the pain and inflammation, rather than wait until the pain is incapacitating.

Immediately after an injury to the back, ice packs to the area are useful in limiting the pain, swelling and muscle spasm. After two days, warm packs or baths can give excellent relief. Finally, physical therapy is very useful in teaching you exercises that will strengthen your back and help prevent low back pain.

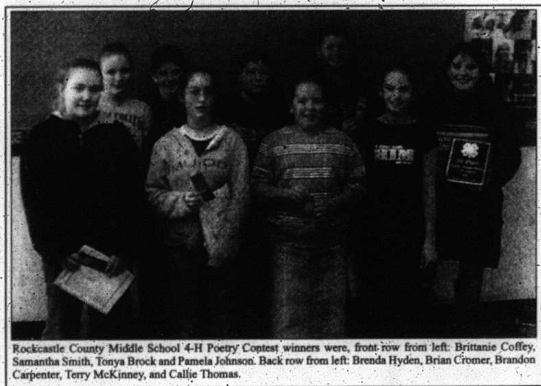

They are headed to the region for the first time in four years and they have a chance to go to the state tournament for the second time in Head Coach Clayton Noble's era.

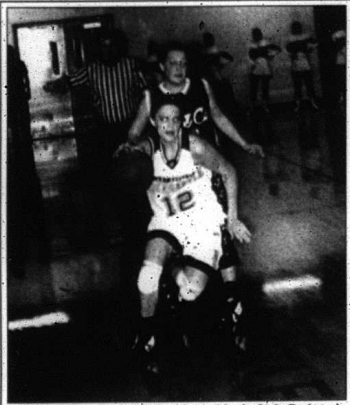
Possibly the best girl's basketball team to ever play at the ROCK, the girls jumped through a major "hoop" on Tuesday night as they defeated

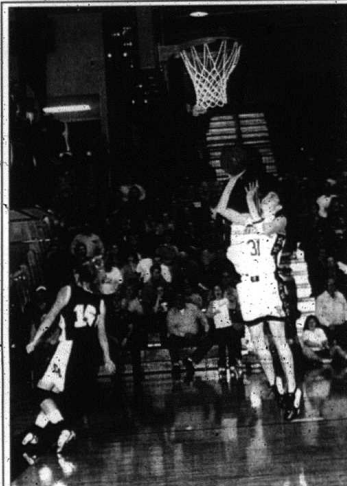

Rockets to play for district title

For three quarters Monday night, the Rocketry advancement to the finals of the 49th District Tournament seemed in question. However, a strong fourth quarter that saw the Oneida Baptist Mountaineers fade, gave the Rockets the 64-46 win.

As Chris Settles did against McCreary Central last Friday night, senior Jason Reynolds put the Rockets on his back and kept them in the game the first three quarters with his 20 point output.

Settles sends Rockets past McCreary

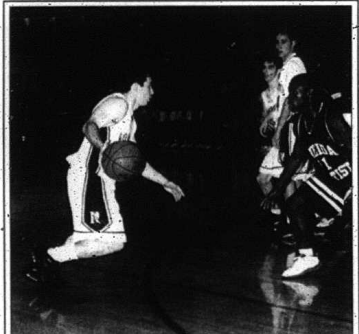
Senior Chris Settles had the major hand in keeping the Rockets from going into district play with a loss, after he scored 23 points on Friday night at McCreary Central.

The Rockets were behind one at the end of first period, but they led

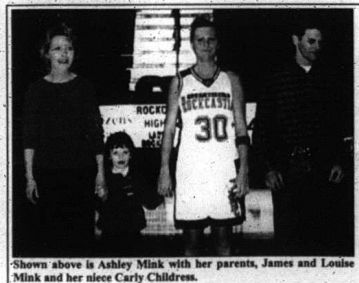

Election Day on May 20th. School bus drills are scheduled for April 4th, when school will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. and Spring Break begins on Monday April 7th. The main office for ASPI is located in Mt. Vernon and the geographic area of focus in Central Ap-

palachia includes Eastern Kentucky, West Virginia and portions of Tennessee, North Carolina, Virginia and Ohio. The building and grounds at the Mt. Vernon office feature solar applications, a greenhouse, cistern, windscope, a raised-bed garden and solar charging station for an electric vehicle. There is also a 252 acre demonstration site on the Rockcastle River where there is a solar home, cordwood buildings, compost toilets, various garden plots, a sustainable forestry operation, a nature center and over five miles of nature trails. "Our various projects fall under three major program areas, which include the Appropriate Technology Demonstration Project, Appalachian Sustainable Forest Program and ASPI Publications," Perry said. The Technology Project includes the Kentucky Solar Partnership and various alternative energy initiatives, low cost housing, waste utilization and organic gardening applications.

The forest program encompasses a Nature Center, the nature trails, a program to promote the use of Ginseng, an off-road vehicle project and a project which addresses flooding. ASPI publications produce two quarterly newsletters, a weekly tele-

vision program, a website, a video series, a technical paper series and several informational books. The newsletter reaches about 4,000 people, many of whom are regular contributors to ASPI. "Our current projects include the Kentucky Solar Partnership, which is

advocating the widespread use of solar technology in Kentucky, the Appalachian Ginseng Foundation, which is promoting ginseng and other native herbs as health, sustainable alternatives to unsustainable logging and doing research on various ginseng derivatives," Perry said. "A major upgrade of our Nature Center exhibits, interpretive booklets for our Nature Trail and a video to promote our facilities and programs to students and educators is also underway," he said.

Perry said the Off-Road Vehicle Project monitors off-road vehicle use in the area and advocates responsible regulation of off-road vehicle in Kentucky. "The flooding project monitors flooding in Central Appalachia and seeks to establish its relationship to poorly regulated strip mining, clear cutting, mountaintop removal and development, while providing information to citizens which empowers them to stand up to commercial interests when their homes, lives and local environments are at risk," Perry said.

He also said that ASPI seeks to instill a sense of pride and appreciation in the citizens of the region for their marvelous natural heritage and empower them to speak out and take action when they are being exploited or taken for granted.

"I think it has got enough support," he said Wednesday.

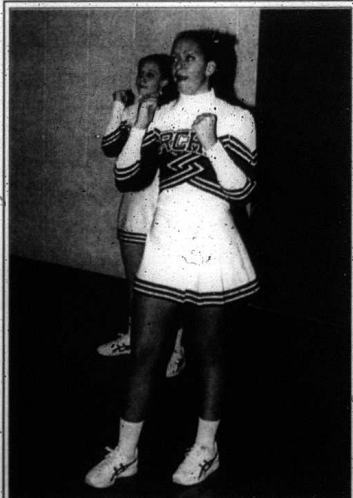

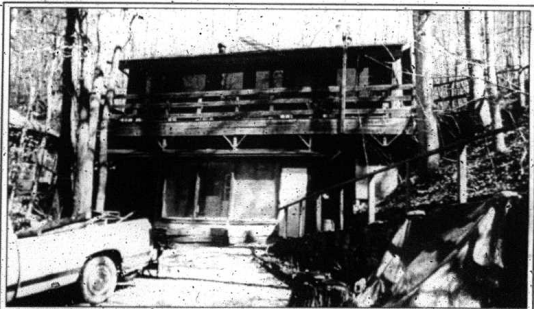

Rogers Announces

Major new counter-drug initiative in Southern & Eastern Kentucky

U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-5) announced recently that he has secured \$8 million for a new comprehensive counter-drug initiative in southern and eastern Kentucky.

The new project will bring together law enforcement, citizens groups and health care professionals for one specific purpose - to fight the drug epidemic in southern and eastern Kentucky. The region-wide grant program will focus on three main tasks; creating regional drug task forces that pool resources for interdiction, confiscation and undercover operations; working with citizens groups in local communities to establish drug treatment programs and working with educators to expand drug awareness and education programs. The project will be operated out of the Center for Rural Development in Somerset.

"The drug epidemic is the worst scourge we've ever faced in southern and eastern Kentucky," said Rogers. "These drugs have torn families apart, ruined lives and stretched the resources of law enforcement and social service agencies to the absolute limit. This new initiative will help equip our law enforcement citizens groups, and health care professionals with the resources necessary to tackle this problem head on, thus funding gives us a major boost in our war against drugs."

Rogers also announced that he has

obtained \$7.5 million to continue the Hal Rogers Prescription Drug Monitoring Program. The competitive grant program allows states that are either looking to create a monitoring program, or upgrade their current system, to apply for federal money to supplement state funding. There are currently 17 states, including Kentucky, which have prescription drug monitoring programs in place. This year, four new states are expected to start programs, bring the total number of partners to 21. This funding provides enough money to allow most of the other non-participating states to get monitoring programs up and running if they choose.

Congressman Rogers became heavily involved in efforts to combat the drug problems in southern and eastern Kentucky after hearing from numerous Kentuckians about the devastating effects of illegally used prescription drugs, particularly Oxycotin. Prescription drug abuse is a national epidemic, and in some cases, even more prevalent than that of the traditional killers like heroin, cocaine and methamphetamine.

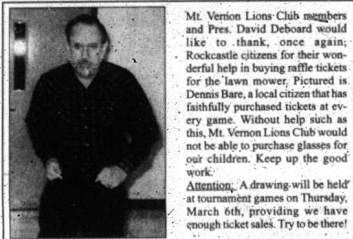
The funding is included in the final version of the FY 2003 Omnibus Appropriations bill, which is comprised of 11 different federal spending bills, the congress approved the legislation last Thursday night. The President is expected to sign the bill into law as early as next week.

Barley Tobacco Bits and Pieces

Producers who have completed marketing burley tobacco are reminded to return their marketing cards to the FSA as soon as possible.

If you have stored tobacco at the warehouse for marketing next year, we urge you to bring a copy of the weigh sheet to the FSA office.

If you received notification-requesting documentation for sharing in the risk pertaining to purchased tobacco quotas in the past three years, you will need to furnish FSA receipts

(seed/chemicals) and the marketing sale bill for the 2002 marketing year.

Burley Clean-Up Sales - We have been notified that burley tobacco auction markets will have cleanup sales beginning the week of March 10th. Clean-up sales schedules for burley are as follows:

Mt. Sterling-March 10th, A.M.; Somerset-March 11th, A.M.; Danville-March 11th, P.M.; Madison-March 12th, A.M.; Carrollton-March 12th, P.M.; Lexington-March 13th, A.M. and Cynthia-March 13th, P.M.

Also, with this notice, the national office has advised that designation will be suspended for the rest of the market year. Therefore, farm operators will NOT be required to re-designate pounds before marketing.

Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) The Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) will provide \$53 million to eligible applicants to help enhance the economic stability of tobacco producers. On Feb. 20, 2003, the President signed the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, which included provisions to provide direct payments to all acreage allotment/marketing quota holders and tobacco growers.

Applications for direct payment sign-up for TOPP begins March 17 and ends May 16, 2003. Late filed applications will not be accepted.

Funds will be dispersed according to allocation formulas tied to the various types of tobacco with payments being issued between mid-May and June 1, 2003.

Eligible persons are one who owns, controls or produces eligible tobacco on a farm for which an acreage allotment/marketing quota was established for the 2002 marketing year.

Eligible types of tobacco include blue-cured (types 11-14), Burley (type 21), blue-aired (types 21-23), Dark air-cured (types 35-36), Virginia sun-cured (type 37), Cigar filler/binder (types 42-44 and 54-55).

Making Small Dietary Changes Leads to Large Weight Loss

A single dietary change might be all it takes to lose excess pounds that have crept up over the years. By eating just 100 fewer calories each day for a year, you can lose 10 pounds in that year.

Nutritionists usually recommend a gradual weight loss of no more than one-half to two pounds a week. It's also suggested that obese children and older adults lose weight under the guidance of a healthcare provider. It's hard to attain adequate nutrition if you consume less than 1,200 calories a day. It's easy to consume half or more of your daily calories in one fast-food meal, especially if you're sipper-sipping portions. You can save 100 calories or more by following these suggestions when next visiting a fast-food restaurant.

If you're not very hungry, order the smallest hamburger the restaurant offers. Order the smallest size of French fries, or split them with a friend. Better yet, order a side salad. Reduce fat-free calories, and remember to check the number of calories on the dressing. A reduced-calorie dressing still might contain about 100 calories or more per packet. Try using half a packet of dressing. Instead of a regular soft drink, order a diet version or plain water. Skip the mayonnaise or sauce when eating your favorite hamburger or other sandwich.

Following are more suggested single dietary changes equal to cutting 100 calories. Using just one of these suggestions could help you lose 10 pounds a year. If you like to lose more weight, try two or more changes daily.

Drink two glasses of one-percent, low-fat milk or skim milk rather than two glasses of whole milk. The nutrients are comparable. Substitute two tablespoons of low-fat mayonnaise for regular mayonnaise or use mustard to replace mayonnaise.

If you've been drinking a 20-ounce cola, use a smaller container to a 12-ounce container size. Even

better, substitute a 12-ounce can of a diet soft drink, with no calories, for a similar amount of a regular soft drink with 160 fewer calories. An alternative is to drink a glass of cold water, drawn with a slice of lemon or lime.

Don't pour your salad in dressing. If you've been using salad dressing, use just one or two cups of salad, try cutting back to one and one-half tablespoons or less. Some nutrition sources recommend about one tablespoon of dressing for each two cups of salad. Also, experiment with reduced-calorie salad dressings.

Adults often eat more than one serving of cereal, based on the size listed on the box. This might be one way calories are sneaking into your diet. Compare the amount you're eating to the serving size cited on the cereal box to determine if you're pouring more calories. To aid portion control, try using a smaller bowl.

It's easy to put a couple of tablespoons of butter or margarine, which can add up to 200 extra calories, on a baked potato without giving it a second thought. By switching to sour cream, you can save as much as one-fourth cup for every fewer calories use a light or fat-free sour cream, or substitute yogurt for the sour cream.

Microwaving popcorn at home or work is a common occurrence. It's easy to eat one-half a bag or more at one sitting. Even two cups of butter popcorn might contain about 100 calories. To gauge how much you're eating, remember one cup is about 10 pounds a year. If you like to lose more weight, try two or more changes daily.

"She was an excellent employee who took her job as a school psychologist very seriously and she always put the students she worked with first," said Rockcastle County Schools superintendent Larry Hammond.

"Kenna was the school system's first ever school psychologist who carried a heavy work load for many years before she became involved in the needed help - she was just really dedicated to her job and to the kids," Hammond said.

"She had such a soft heart and all of her co-workers, including myself, will never forget her," Hammond added.

Kenna Lanham's position was based at the Rockcastle County Central Office, but she worked in each school in the county.

Phillip Lanham, wearing a black turban and with his hair pulled back into a ponytail, sat quietly throughout the trial which began last Tuesday.

His attorney, Susanne McCollough, did not call him to the stand or any other witnesses and rested Wednesday after the prosecution presented its case.

Phillip Lanham had told an emergency dispatcher that he had awakened 7 or 8 a.m. that October morning to find his wife lying next to him on the floor. He told police he had put her to bed and then cleaned the house but she was still unresponsive when he called for an ambulance 47 5 p.m.

Lanham had told the dispatcher and police that he thought his wife had died of hypothermia.

But police and an emergency medical technician said they could see that Kenna Lanham had been beaten because she had bruises and cuts all over her body. And they could see that there had been an attempt to

clean the house, with a towel in a washer and the house smelling of bleach. He had also tried to vacuum up blood from the floor.

Forensic pathologist Dr. Cristin Roll testified that Kenna Lanham had died of asphyxiation from a blunt object, although it was never specifically identified during the trial.

Both Lanham's attorneys had suffered, from substance abuse addiction and the days preceding Kenna Lanham's death had been filled with a series of phone calls to Garrard County's 911 seeking help because the couple was fighting.

Phillip Lanham told police that his wife was "blind stone drunk" and was cut and bruised because she kept falling down and running into things. "We propose she could have had seizures from withdrawal," McCollough said.

"The thing is, Kenna knew her husband struggled with emotional difficulties, however Kenna loved him and she wanted to help him in any way she could," Anderken said.

"That is who Kenna was - she was always looking to help others and especially students," the counselor said.

During closing arguments, Commonwealth Attorney Tom Lockridge stopped any speculation that Kenna Lanham was impaired when he told the jury that blood-alcohol results showed that she was not even legally impaired.

Lockridge told the jury that given the bruises and cuts all over Lanham's body it made more sense that she was beaten and suffocated.

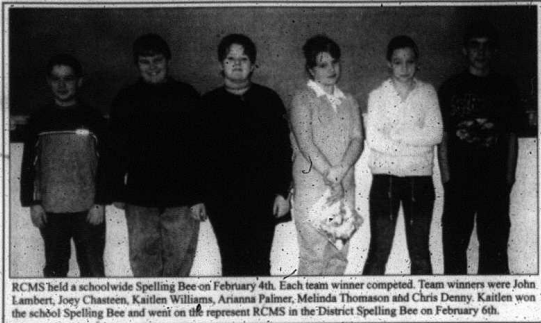
Lockridge noted that Roll said it takes two minutes of compression on the nose and mouth for a person to lose consciousness and another two minutes to cause brain damage and death.

To demonstrate the intentional nature of what he called "the ultimate crime," Lockridge was silent as he testified for the jury the two minutes it would have taken Kenna Lanham to lose consciousness.

After a minute had passed on his wristwatch, Lockridge looked up to say, "that is one minute of Kenna struggling to get her breath with the defendant holding something over her mouth."

Sentencing for Phillip Lanham has been scheduled for March 21st. (Editors Note: Much of the information for this story was taken from last Saturday's Lexington Herald-Leader)

Cleaning Float Trays

The greenhouse and float-tray production systems offer many advantages to tobacco transplant producers. However, a disadvantage of the float system is that it provides an ideal habitat for the development and spread of bacterial diseases due to the constant presence of water. Therefore, it's key to success with these production systems is keeping the pathogens causing diseases out of the system.

A diligent sanitation program is a MUST! The media and water being used should be pathogen-free. All equipment and tools that come in contact with the system should be pathogen-free. That means either using new trays or re-used trays must be properly washed and sanitized.

What is available to disinfect trays? Steam, methyl-bromide fumigant, chlorine bleach, and quaternary ammonium chloride salts are available in Kentucky.

STEAMING the trays has been the most readily distinguishable, the cost is high and some items are damaged by steaming. Most studies indicate that the trays need to reach at least 160 degrees F for 30 minutes, but this method prevents producers from farmers in developing equipment to meet the temperature and time required.

FUMIGANTS methyl bromide with 1% chloropicrin has been shown as effective as steam in some of the tests. It provides excellent control of Rhizoctonia, especially when used in conjunction with Pythium, but has not been as effective as steam or proper bleach treatments. Pythium, probably because a significant amount of Pythium is found embedded in the tray. It is important to have an airtight plastic bag, to pre-wet the trays, and to avoid large stacks of trays. Methyl-bromide is heavier than air, so it will, therefore, best result occur with long short stacks rather than tall, deep stacks.

Cleaning Float Trays

bleach solution should be washed from the trays with clean water or water plus a little liquid bleach, followed by acetone to eliminate the chlorine and salts. Worker safety issues are also important with a regular time to clean. The bleach solution remains below pH 6.8 and that new solutions be made up every 2 hrs or whenever it becomes dirty, whichever comes first. Organic matter will remove the active ingredients quickly.

Q-SALTS (Quaternary ammonium chlorides) These are marketed under such names as GreenShield, Phoson, and Prevent as solutions containing 20% ammonium chloride. Many growers are using them, but the effects are not as positive as some believe, based on UK testing. The greatest benefit is in the final wash and on exposed surfaces in the greenhouse. In all UK tests, Q-salts have always provided some control, as compared to using soap washes only, but have always been inferior to any of the above mentioned methods.

Chlorine bleach solutions are made from the trays by using soap and hot water or high pressure washes. Completely soak the trays in 10% bleach solution and cover with plastic for 24-48 hours, followed by washing and drying. Turn trays on their side for best air movement. Trays which are damaged allowing large amounts of last year soil media to remain in crevices are candidates for being disposed of. Sanitation is very important. As trays are used more, more disease problems occur. For producers with QES 4 meters, an annual calibration is recommended. Contact the Extension Office if you would like to check your meters accuracy.

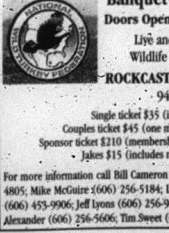

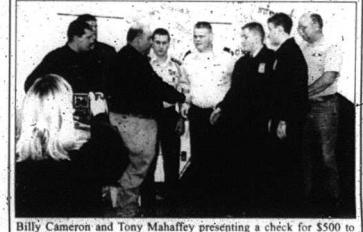

Hopfully, spring will soon be here and so will turkey season. The Rockcastle County Chapter of the National Wild Turkey Federation (NWF) would like to take this opportunity to thank the people of our community who have helped us in a variety of ways to make a positive difference in this area.

I would like to mention to the community some of the ways funds for our chapter are generated and spent. Our money is acquired in one of four ways.

The most common is membership dues which are \$25 per year and paid each spring. Most commonly, as members are contacting people in the spring to participate in the banquet and auction, they ask them to become a member or renew their membership.

A person may become a member at either the annual banquet or the Rockcastle Middle School on Saturday, March 15 or at the turkey-hunting seminar to be held on Saturday, March 29 at Roundstone Elementary School from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

As the annual NWF banquet and auction (doors open at 5 p.m.), you will be able to buy tickets for several guns that will be raffled off, plus many wildlife-oriented framed prints. A wide selection of other items will be auctioned or raffled from sleeping bags and turkey calls to tents, blinds and wildlife sculptures. The money raised from the auction goes to the NWF which uses the funds in various ways.

The hunting seminar to be held on March 29 at RES will feature Tim Heald, a representative of Knight and Hale Corp, as MC. Proceeds from this event will go directly to our chapter.

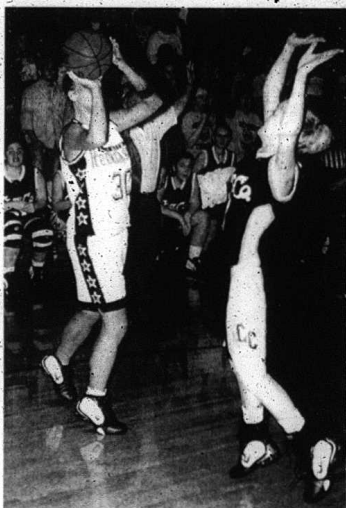
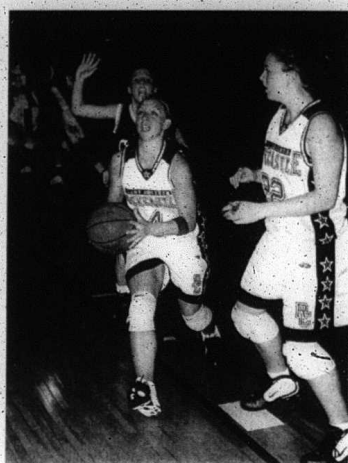
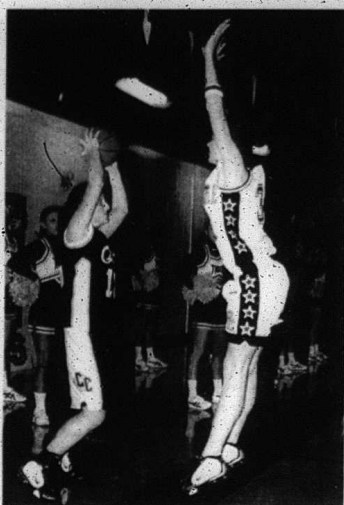

Rockcastle County High School Guidance Counselor Dale Whitaker said that a committee would be formed to pick the recipients of the scholar-

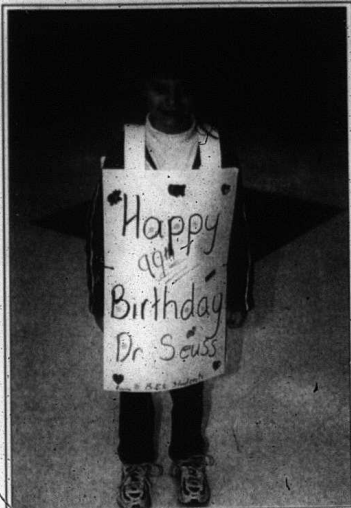
ships.

Applications for the scholarships can be picked up in Whitaker's office at the high school.

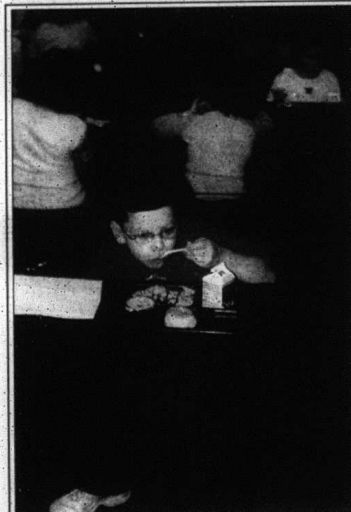
The money for the scholarships is coming from funds paid in district court for violations, such as spotfishing deer and
