Seven indicted

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury returned six indictments last week for alleged crimes ranging from failure to wear a seat belt, to stealing a social security check.

Mike Lee Marlow, 26, of Rt. 1, Mt. Vernon was indicted on a charge of knowingly having in his possession a stolen check, which police say he took from the mailbox of Cecil R. Houk.

Nicky S. Thompson, 35, of Brothead was indicted on a charge of receiving stolen property. He is accused of having stolen property, belonging to Timothy Siler.

Billy G. Robinson, 39; Ricky Dale Madden, 46, and Joe King, 32, all of Mt. Vernon, were indicted on charges of burglary, first degree and theft by unlawful taking.

The three are accused of breaking into the home of Mark Robinson, on February 21st of this year.

John Campbell, 43, of Georgetown was indicted on four charges, all related to driving while under the influence of alcohol. Campbell has been convicted of DUI three other times.

I-75 north closing last Thursday explained

If you were unfortunate enough to try to be going north on U.S. 25 last Thursday between 8:30 a.m. and 3 p.m. or thereabouts, you probably wondered why it was taking you an hour to reach Roundstone Elementary from Mt. Vernon.

Hai Holbrook, director of emergency management services for Rockcastle County, explained that a wreck, which happened about 3 a.m. Thursday morning, sent a semi-trailer trailer over a hill at the 7 1/2 mile marker starting the chain of events.

The accident happened when a truck, which had broken down in the middle of the road, was clipped from behind by another semi, causing a front tire to blow out. The driver then lost control, went through the guard rail and over the 100 foot embankment. The impact caused the truck's fuel line to rupture and tore the filters from the oil lines. The truck lost about 11 gallons of oil and 100-120 gallons of diesel fuel, but none of it went into a stream about 15 feet from the accident.

However, Holbrook said an environmental team had to be brought in to clean up the contaminated soil and then a wrecker took several hours to retrieve the truck. That portion of the clean-up is what caused the interstate to have to be shut down for several hours, re-routing all the northbound traffic onto U.S. 25 to Berea.

Fiscal Court finally rules

No lights, sirens for constables

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court settled the question of blue lights/sirens for county Constables at a special meeting of the court Monday.

After a short discussion of a letter to the Magistrates from County Judge/Executive Buzz Carlotto, laying out the court's options to deal with the matter,

Magistrate Fred Mullins made a motion to approve the devices with restriction, as laid out in Carlotto's letter.

The restrictions included: no high-speed pursuits; fully-marked vehicles that meet the fiscal court's standards; uniform requirement of at least a badge; restriction of activity to county-

maintained roads and state highways, with the exception of a request for back-up on the Interstate by sheriff's department or state police; a minimum of 40 hours basic law enforcement training and prohibition of road checks, unless in conjunction with the sheriff's department.

However, Mullins' motion

died for lack of a second and no other motion was made.

Wednesday, in a written statement brought to the Signal, Mullins explained his reasons for the motion:

"I made the motion to permit our county's constables the use of blue lights and sirens at yesterday's fiscal court meeting because of several reasons.

"I think the added visibility of cruisers on the roads in our communities would help deter crime.

"I think the constables, if provided lights and sirens, could add to the present law enforcement in Rockcastle County.

"The fiscal court's insurance coverage would not be compromised, because the county's present coverage extends to all law enforcement officers.

"The county judge gave us three options: approve lights and sirens; reject lights and sirens or approve lights and sirens with restriction.

"I made the motion for the court to approve lights and sirens with restrictions, including state training for law enforcement officials and restrictions on certain types of activities constables could engage in. This was all in accordance with how one of the options was presented.

"I am still convinced that constables, if given permission to use lights and sirens with specific restrictions placed by the fiscal court, could augment present law enforcement activities and restrict criminal activities.

"I made the motion to permit, with restrictions, because of my convictions; no other magistrate seconded the motion and I respect their opinion. However, the county judge had no alternative but to pronounce the issue dead at the meeting."

Magistrate District Four As the first order of business of the meeting, the court opened sealed bids for three voting precinct booths, located at East Mt. Vernon, Brown and West Mt. Vernon.

High bidder on the building on Poplar Street (West Mt. Vernon) was Novice Gentry at \$1,450;

Carol J. Martin for the Brown precinct building (Willilla) with a bid of \$550 and Donna Blanton

for the East Mt. Vernon precinct building (behind Cox Hardware) with a bid of \$251.

The court also decided to sell the Poplar Street property, on which the precinct building was located, to the high bidder on Tuesday, April 8 at 10 a.m. at the site.

A permit application by R&M Sanitation was approved by the court. The company has met all requirements and was recommended for approval by James E. Pinner, solid waste coordinator.

An extension of solid waste haulers and convenience center permits was approved through July 8, 2003 for: Bee Garbage (hauler and convenience center); I&M Garbage Service; Mink's Garbage Service; Perkins' Garbage Service; Riley's Garbage Service and Waste Management Container Service.

The court also passed an ordinance approving the increase of fees for the Sheriff's Department for the service of Civil Summons to \$30, from \$20, and \$20 for arrest fee, from \$10.

The increased rates will be in effect upon publication in The Signal and the second reading of the ordinance at the next regular meeting of the court.

An approval of a time extension to complete work on the Ten Foot Hole Road low water crossing was received from the Division of Emergency Management. The county now has until August 15, 2003 to complete work for damages received during the flood disaster of August, 2001.

The court also approved a motion by Magistrate Billy McKinney to work out an agreement with Beth Hamm to rent the former Brothead Adult Day Care building. The building has been vacant for some time and the magistrates felt an occupying was needed to keep the building from deteriorating. Rental was set in the neighborhood of \$400 plus utility per month with a security deposit required.

Historic Rockcastle Co. home being restored

Some people in this world feel like they should give something back to their community and Charles Stanley Phillips is one of those people.

Phillips, the grandson of the late Wally Phillips a former Rockcastle magistrate, is still in the process of restoring a historic Rockcastle County building.

But he, Craig Clark, Gerald

Chasteen and Roland Hammond have already completed the outside of what used to be an old coach house. One that certainly has plenty of history.

"If these walls could talk - oh the stories they could tell," said Phillips. Ulysses S. Grant ate lunch there. Frank Smith was shot to death there. A 30-year-old woman died during childbirth and, according to one man's story, she still haunts the place.

Some say that you could throw down cool dust at night at the bottom of the steps and in the morning children's footprints would be there! J.S. Adams kept slaves to work the farm and Tom Jim Ballard made legal whiskey there.

Verbal history even says that "Devil Bill" Adams ran the coach house, which is located in the Red Hill Section of Rockcastle County.

Even if it sounds like the set of a Walt Disney adventure film, the coach house is real and has been since about 1808.

Wally Phillips bought the coach house from Thaddeus Drew, his father-in-law.

Thad Drew, got the coach house from Tom Jim Ballard who got it from J.S. Adams.

Records of ownership of the house are gone, they were burned with the courthouse in 1873, but Phillips knows that a man named Stephen Gilbert did the original survey on the property.

Probably the oldest house in this county was originally intended to be

a coach house where people and animals rested on their long trips from London to Richmond. The house stands beside the original Daniel Boone Trail that eventually became the main road from Indianapolis to the Cumberland Gap.

Some people say that the reason the Red Hill Road was called the Old State Road is because it was the main thoroughfare from Ohio to Tennessee.

Though it can't be completely documented, legend has it that "Devil Bill" Adams, one of the county's most colorful characters, owned the house and farm at one time.

It is said that he owned 6,000 acres of the land in the area and kept 75 slaves on the place.

The slave houses were kept across the road from the house, "Devil Bill" apparently didn't like the smell of the shanties in which he housed his slaves. How "Devil Bill" got his nickname is a matter of some conjecture but it apparently had something to do with the way he treated the slaves.

J.S. Adams is the first recorded owner of the coach house and the property adjacent to it.

According to records in former County Clerk's office T.J. Ballard, (Tom Jim) as he was better known, bought the place from the J.S. Adams heirs on the 17th of April, 1872. Little is reported about J.S. Adams, but he did run the coach house until his death.

Tom Jim Ballard is another one of those colorful characters whose name has popped up in Rockcastle County from time to time.

Tom Jim was the last to run the coach house on the premises. He died shortly after the turn of the century.

Tom Jim was said to be a gambler. It is also told that he played cards whenever possible. People have also told that he would very often involve passing livestock drivers in card games and while they gambled with others he would steal a head or two of their livestock.

It is said that Tom Jim would run a cow or pig over the cliffs behind

the house, and the weary gamblers would donate the animals to the coach house, rather than having to fool with them. There, Tom Jim stayed in "fresh meat."

Other assorted legends, many true, maybe not, have sprung up around the house.

Some say when General Grant stopped at the coach house for lunch he was heading south with his troops.

There are others who have said that the ghost of Mrs. Sally Cranberry, who died in childbirth at the coach house in 1831, still haunts the place and she is, after all, "buried" (Cont. to A7)

And the Lord knows I hope I'm wrong.

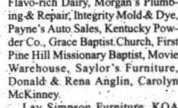

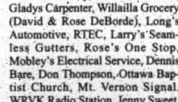

Plans for Summer Reading are already underway. Some of the businesses have already responded and we appreciate your support so much. Further acknowledgement and information will be given at a later date.

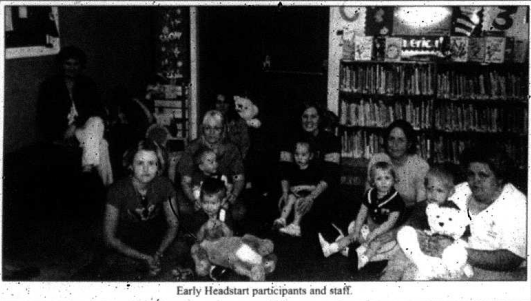

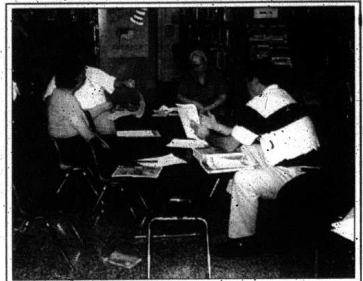

Accidental Poisonings

Presented by Dr. David Brabon

Accidental poisonings are one of the most common causes of serious illnesses in early childhood. Many bottles and boxes of cleaners, medicines and other substances are kept under sinks, in drawers and on shelves. Even when it seems like everything is safely put away, toddlers will find something.

At this age, children learn about their environment by putting everything in their mouths. Though they usually get more of a substance on their clothes and the floor than in their mouths, a parent cannot know for sure.

Accidental poisonings can be treated in different ways depending on what is swallowed by the child. Check with your doctor immediately for any accidental ingestion. He might recommend a dose of ipecac, a medicine used to induce vomiting. However, with certain ingestions such as acids or alkalis, it is dangerous to induce vomiting. Vomiting must also be avoided if the child has taken hydrocarbons, such as gasoline, or if the child is comatose or having seizures.

A tube is occasionally placed into the stomach to help remove the ingested poison. Its drawbacks are that it needs to be done soon after the ingestion, and it does not remove pills very well.

Activated charcoal is becoming the main treatment for a very wide variety of accidental poisonings. This is a compound that will bind most medicines and toxins. Activated charcoal is the most useful treatment if over two hours have passed since the ingestion. It can be mixed with a sorbital solution that makes the charcoal and poison pass through the gut more rapidly.

Always keep your doctor's phone number and the poison control center number near your phone in case of emergencies.

Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened, what you should do and what we are doing to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Compliance with the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) or Total Trihalomethanes and Haloacetic Acids is determined on a system-wide basis by calculating a Running Annual Average of all samples at all sampling plants. Test results we received during 2002 show that our Running Annual Average exceeds the Standard, or Maximum Contaminant Level of 0.080 mg/l for Total Trihalomethanes. Our system's average level of Total Trihalomethanes over the last year was 0.094 mg/l. Test results we received during 2002 show that our Running Annual Average exceeds the Standard, or Maximum Contaminant Level of 0.060 mg/l for Haloacetic Acids. Our system's average level of Haloacetic Acids over the last year was 0.083 mg/l.

What Should I Do?
You do not need to use an alternative (e.g., bottled) water supply. However, if you have special health concerns, consult your doctor.

What does this mean?
This is not an immediate risk. It has been found, you would have been notified immediately. However, some people who drink water containing trihalomethanes in excess of the MCL over many years may experience problems with their liver, kidneys or central nervous system and may have an increased risk of getting cancer. People who drink water containing Haloacetic Acids in excess of the MCL over many years may also have an increased risk of getting cancer.

What happened? What is being done?
Total Trihalomethanes and Haloacetic Acids are disinfection by-products. They are formed when the disinfectants used in this treatment of drinking water combine with organic and inorganic matter present in water. The utility has modified its treatment process and has stepped up its flushing program to reduce the levels of Total Trihalomethanes and Haloacetic Acids in the distribution system. We are attempting to have the problem resolved by the 1st of April, 2003.

The Family Room

I have spent several hours in front of the TV screen since the war began.

That is one of the reasons I felt so depressed this weekend. War news is not usually good news. Even if

our side is winning, there are casualties on both sides to mourn. There are future dangers for the troops. They may be safe today but what about tomorrow. My melancholy in front of the

television is nothing compared to that of those with relatives in the war zone. Americans with husbands, fathers, wives, children, mothers and many others over there feel the pain and anxiety much more than I do. They need support and reassurance from the rest of us. Some Iraqis who live in the US still have family in Iraq. I wonder how I would feel if I had a son in Baghdad. The anxiety must run high in those households as well.

The Gulf War of 1991 was so quick that the Americans have come to expect that kind of outcome. As of this morning (March 24) that does not look as if it will be the case. American forces are meeting more resistance as they move closer to Baghdad. American soldiers have been injured and killed while some have been captured. Being a POW must be a lonely feeling. Again, the families of these soldiers know pain and anxiety far greater than what the rest of us feel.

What will happen in the future? Who will survive and who will not? How many more Americans and Iraqis will die? Those are just some of the reasons I was depressed this weekend.

My prayer is that the Iraqi army will surrender and that Saddam Hussein will be captured and tried for his crimes against humanity. He is certainly a tyrant and possibly a madman. Because he is those things, it is doubtful that he will go down without a fight. It is doubtful that his loyal Republican Guard will surrender, but stranger things have happened. A miracle to end the war would save many lives on both sides.

My depression does no good to anyone. I do not help our troops nor the Iraqi civilians to survive the battles if I am in the depths of despair. It is time for me to pull my way out of this hole. The best thing I can do is to make a positive contribution to the people closest to me. I can do my job and do it well. I can support those who have family on the battle lines. I can go on doing what I was doing and not allow the war to totally disrupt my life.

In order to accomplish this I will have to limit my television time. I had to do the same thing after September 11, when I spent two days in a hotel room in a distant city with nothing to do but watch TV. That gave me the worst headache I have ever had in my life. I had to stay away from the television. TV is such a powerful and immediate medium that it pulls at the emotions more than the printed word could ever do. TV is a potent drug and should be taken only in limited doses. (This is even more true for children. Limiting the amount of time children spend watching the war coverage on television will help them to cope.)

Join me in prayer for a speedy end to the hostilities.

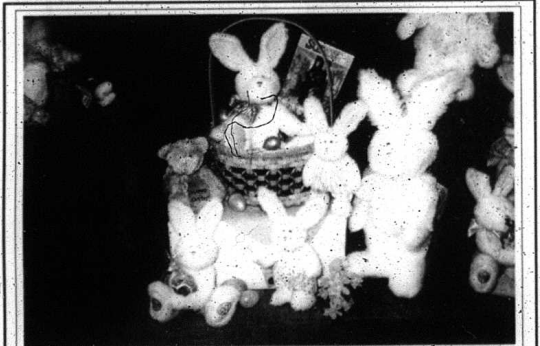

Tobacco - ESTATE PROGRAM (LEP) - Do you own a farm for which tobacco quota was established in 2002? Did you own land on which tobacco was planted in 2002? Were you the grower of tobacco planted in 2002? If so, then the Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) is for you. The Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) will provide \$53 million to eligible applicants to help enhance the economic stability of tobacco producers.

On Feb. 20, 2003, the President signed the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, which included provisions to provide direct payments to all acreage allotment/marketing quota holders and tobacco growers. Applications for direct payment sign-up for TOPP begins March 17 and ends May 16, 2003. Late filed applications will not be accepted. Funds will be dispersed according to allocation formulas tied to the various types of tobacco with payments being issued between mid-May and June 1, 2003.

Eligible persons are one who owns, controls or produces eligible tobacco on a farm for which an acreage allotment/marketing quota was established for the 2002 marketing year.

Eligible types of tobacco include flue-cured (types 11-14), Burley (type 21), flue-cured (types 21-23), Dark air-cured (types 35-36), Virginia sun-cured (type 37); Cigar filler/binder (types 42-44 and 54-55).

Livestock Compensation Program (LCP)

The Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003 extended the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP), originally created in 2003 into 2003. The 2003 LCP is an emergency initiative administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA) that provides immediate assistance to eligible owners and cash lessees of certain types of livestock for damages and losses due to any natural disaster. Producers who did not receive assistance under the 2002 LCP and who in counties that were approved as a disaster area are eligible for LCP.

To be eligible for LCP assistance, a producer's livestock operation headquarters must be physically located in a county with a qualifying disaster designation. Eligible livestock are livestock owned or cash leased on or before June 1, 2002 and have been owned or cash leased for a minimum of 90 calendar days and include cattle, sheep, goats and buffalo, as well as cash. Sign up for LCP begins April 1 at your local FSA office.

Pesticide Cards
County Agent Tom Mills will host the Restricted Pesticide Training on March 31st at 7 p.m. in the County Extension Building. Producers who have pesticide cards expired or expiring will need to attend this meeting before purchasing restricted pesticides.

Burley Tobacco Bits and Pieces
Producers who have completed marketing burley tobacco are reminded to return their marketing cards to the FSA, as soon as possible.

If you have stored tobacco at the warehouse for marketing next year, we urge you to bring a copy of the weigh sheet to the FSA office.

The 10% under-marketing rule with NOT apply when establishing marketing quotas for crop year 2003. Therefore, producers who did not sell the 100% effective quota in 2002 will be able to make up those pounds in crop year 2003.

If you received notification requesting documentation for sharing in the risk pertaining to purchased tobacco quotas in the past three years, you'll need to furnish FSA receipts (seed/chemicals) and the marketing sale bill for the 2002 marketing year.

Farmers Urged to Complete New Contracts

Warden Alexander, CED with the Farm Service Agency in Rockcastle County would like to take this time and opportunity to remind farmers they need to contact their FSA County Office to complete their base acreage and yield selection for the 2002 and 2003 Direct and counter Cyclical Programs as soon as possible. The deadline for base acreage and yield selection is April 1, 2003.

To date, approximately 40 percent of the farmers in Rockcastle County have completed the necessary program selections and signed contracts to receive payments for 2002 and 2003.

Under the new Farm Bill, farmers have more options. Their choices will impact their farm payments through 2007. Failure to make a base

acreage and yield selection by April 1, 2003 will default to the farm's 2002 PFC acreage plus 4-year-average oilseed acreage.

For the first time since the 1960's, farmers can update their acreage and yield information. "This is a tremendous opportunity, but it is very complex and will require farmers to supply production information on their operations for 1998 through 2001," Mr. Alexander said.

Program participation is voluntary and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations.
