April 12-26 Pride clean-up weeks set

Rockcastle County residents who want to spruce up their community can volunteer during the PRIDE Spring Cleanup, April 12 thru April 26.

During this two-week period, James Renner, local PRIDE coordinator, has scheduled cleanup activities across the county. Volunteers will provide the manpower to clean roadsides, hillsides and waterways and PRIDE will provide the trash bags, gloves and safety vests. "By working together today, we can have a cleaner, healthier tomorrow," said Karen Eagle, Executive Director of PRIDE.

In previous years, Rockcastle County residents have made a tremendous difference. Since 1997, PRIDE cleanup efforts in Rockcastle have produced impressive results:

- 1 stream cleaned
- 43 dumps cleaned up
- 18 roadways cleaned
- 64 appliances collected
- 389 tires collected
- 1,428 bags of trash and 296 tons of trash collected.

In this effort, 486 volunteers worked 2,285 hours.

Set your clocks forward Sunday

Daylight Saving Time goes into effect at 2 a.m. Sunday morning, April 6. Remember to set your clock forward one hour Saturday night before going to bed.

DS-Will remain in effect until the last Sunday in October.

Burning law in effect through April 30

County Judge Executive Buzz Carlotta issued a reminder to Rockcastle Countians this week that the Forest Service's "Burning Law" will be in effect through April 30th.

During this time, it is unlawful for anyone to set fire to, or to procure another to set fire to, any flammable material capable of spreading fire and located in or within 150 feet of any woodland or brushland.

There is an exception to this law between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m., prevailing local time.

And, of course, all fires should be attended until extinguished.

Two from Bee Lick indicted for methamphetamine sale

A Lincoln County Grand Jury, last Friday, indicted a Bee Lick couple for, among other things, allegedly selling methamphetamine to an undercover police informant last month. Suzy Cromer, 36 and Kenneth Smith, 30, were charged with involvement in the sale of methamphetamine to the undercover agent. Both of the accused listed Brodhead addresses, but were arrested on Smith's property in the Bee Lick section of Lincoln County.

Police originally went to Smith's house to look for items stolen in Rockcastle County and found the makings of methamphetamine, a drug typically manufactured in home labs and sold on the street.

Cromer allegedly sold some of that meth to an undercover state police informant with the cooperation and advice of Smith.

In the indictment, Cromer was charged with five counts of receiving stolen property, items stolen from five different locations in Rockcastle

County were allegedly found at Smith's home.

The two also were charged with

manufacturing methamphetamine while in the possession of a firearm

Missionary murdered in Guatemala

Todd Fields was from Rockcastle

A missionary, who is a native of Rockcastle County, was shot and killed Friday during a robbery in Guatemala.

Todd Fields, 41, of Mt. Vernon, who had been a missionary in Honduras for 13 years, was leading a group of high school students on a retreat to neighboring Guatemala when the group was robbed, said his wife, Lynnell Hammons Fields.

Details are still somewhat sketchy, but Mrs. Fields, who worked with her husband in the mission field, said he was driving a van carrying two other adult missionaries and the children of other missionaries.

"Men in a van pulled up alongside their van and tried to get them to stop and tried to run them off the road," Mrs. Fields said. Her husband, in turn, tried to get away and run the bandits off the road.

Friday's tragic incident happened on the Pan American Highway, Mrs. Fields said.

At some point, Fields was shot, and the robbers then took the other two adults and students to a secluded spot and robbed them. No one else was harmed, Mrs. Fields said.

Mrs. Fields said that her husband was apparently shot twice, the last time through the heart.

"Knowing Todd, he probably told the bandits to take his life and leave the rest alone," Mrs. Fields said.

Fields' father, Bob Fields, who along with his wife Eddie, run cleftRock, a Christian retreat at Pongo, said he was informed that after the bandits took the other adults and students to the secluded location they were bound face down and held at gunpoint for an hour and a half.

"Everyone was robbed, including Todd and the only thing left in the van was Todd's passport," Mr. Fields said.

The Rev. Kenton Parkey, who had led several mission trips from Wildie Christian Church located here in Rockcastle, to the Fields' mission in Pena Blanca, Honduras, said he was devastated when he learned the news Saturday.

The Fields lived in Honduras with their two daughters, Savannah, 14, and Sophia, 10.

"We warned us on our trips that it was dangerous in several areas where you don't travel alone," Parkey said. "He knew the danger, but we never dreamed it

would happen to him."

Todd's parents were career missionaries in Israel, and Fields and his wife were also former members of the Peace Corps.

During the past 13 years, the couple had been missionaries affiliated with Global Outreach International of Tupelo, Miss. Global is a non-profit foundation that helps people of developing countries and leads church-based missions. Several Kentucky churches sponsor the Fields' mission work.

The Fields have built churches, schools and two "feeding centers" to feed children rice, beans and milk. The Fields also set up a couple of tilapia fisheries so that locals could raise the freshwater fish to eat.

"Todd loved people and he worried about 'people starving,'" said his wife of 20 years.

"Anyone that knew Todd knew him as a gentle giant of a man," said his brother-in-law Eddie Hammond.

Todd stood 6 feet 5 inches tall, weighed more than 300 pounds, and knew no strangers, according to family members and friends.

"He was a very gentle man, and he loved the Honduran people," said Wes White, director of personnel for Global Outreach. "He was a dear friend."

"And despite the danger, church groups saw how Todd Fields and his family showed unconditional love to the Honduran people. It was a message that hit home particularly to teens from the States that visited the Fields family, Parkey said.

"I think it brought the reality of what they live here, and that someone would be able to give up the comfort we have here to help those people," Parkey said.

Mrs. Fields said that her and her two children would likely return to Honduras to continue the Lord's work.

"Although this is so tragic and painful, you can't stand for something the majority of your life and just say I give up when something bad happens," Mrs. Fields said.

"I know Todd was right with God and I'm sure God was glad to get him," she said.

Todd Fields was a 1979 graduate of Rockcastle County High School and a graduate of Eastern Kentucky University.

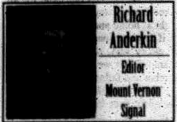

A small tribute to a "giant" human being



who you could always depend on. There are many funny stories about the big guy, but I am going to relate just a couple.

When we were juniors I played end and Todd played tackle. Todd was concerned about winning - because he was a strong competitor - but he also was afraid he might hurt someone because of his size and strength.

Todd would simply pummel the man in front of him with his tackle position on a running play and then come back to the huddle and question outloud whether we thought the player was hurt.

Some of us, including his future brother-in-law would always say who cares, its football. Todd would then hammer him again and voice aloud his concern for the man's safety.

So being Todd, the diplomat and the humanitarian, he got where he would tell the lesser mild across from him. "I would just lay down, he wouldn't hurt him."

Nine times out of ten it worked. Todd was our place kicker my senior year and I held for him. We were in a game one night and Todd, who probably wore a size 18 shoe, missed the right part of the ball on an extra point one time, kicking my left hand and breaking my little finger. However the big guy was strong enough that even though my hand was between his foot and the ball - it still sailed through the uprights.

There are many more funny, serious, heart warming stories about Todd, that his family and friends will remember.

Todd gave his life to the work of helping other people and last Friday gave his life to save other innocent people.

Todd was driving several American high school students to a retreat when bandits in another van pulled up beside him.

Todd tried to run them off the road, but was unable to after they shot him once.

From all indications, Todd realized what was about to take place and pulled off the roadway and negotiated his life for the lives of those with him.

Todd was shot through the heart the second time, but the others with him were unharmed. Everyone was robbed - but because of Todd's actions everyone else was left alive.

Todd left two daughters, 10 and 14, and his wife of 20 years behind. He also left other loving family members and friends behind.

I think part of my problem in life has been that I don't look up to a lot of people.

Todd Fields was a person that I always looked up to because of who he was and his actions. He was simply a "Gentle Giant" of a man.

So long big guy.



George Collins, who wants he publicly known that he lives someone on the bank of the Kentucky River between Carrollton, KY and the Head of Rockhouse in Letcher County where, he maintains, the River really starts, called me up on his cell phone last Sunday night.

"The law ain't looking for me that I know of," says George, "but on general principals, I'd just as soon they didn't know exactly where I'm at until I get a chance to buy a fishing license."

"You have till Monday. Your 2002 license don't expire until March First," I told him.

"I know that," said George. "But the last ones I bought expired in December of 1979 and I just keep putting it off. Besides that, it costs less to license a car than it does to legally catch a bluegill so I'm not in a big hurry to be law-abiding."

I knew that George was calling on a cell phone because that's what it said on the caller-ID thing I pay to screen out telemarketers and anybody else who calls me without identifying themselves and letting me decide whether or not I want to talk to them. Generally I don't take calls unless they have a name and number pop up on the caller ID gizmo. Don't bother calling me if you are ashamed of who you are.

Fortunately, I have an answering machine, or voice mail as they call it these days, and George left the following message: "Okay Adams, I'm going to call back in two minutes. I know you are home because it's too cold for you to be outside. If you don't answer when I call back, I will go to my grave cursing you." Click. I took the next call and even though it was as obscure as the first, I had recognized his voice on the previous message.

I called him several names that

seriously questioned his ancestry and he replied in turn. That's what the way we sacrilegious hillbillies greet when we love and haven't seen each other in awhile - and if we ain't in church or a funeral home.

So Collins goes to calling me about catching oodles of channel catfish and sauger at an unnamed spot below a lock on the river and by this time I knew he was far below the mouth of Rockhouse. On the other hand, there are 11 locks on the river over the course of 150 miles so he wasn't giving much away.

"I heard your early garden washed off," George finally said.

I don't remember advertising it in the paper but it is common knowledge that my first planting of the season did not fare well in the mid-March flooding.

"Yep," I said. "I'm gonna have to plant peas and stuff all over again but I'm used to it."

"Not if you come and see me," said George. I pulled up on the bank around this bend in the river last night and there on the sand bar was the purest patch of peas and lettuce and kale and spinach and mustard and green onions that you ever saw grow and not a weed in it."

"What's that got to do with my garden," I asked?

"Well, I said," there was this big mail order envelope from Parks Seed Company with your address on it fastened to a backer stick and stuck right in the middle of the patch."

Click.

It's heartening to know that the garden I had wash away here on Lowell Branch is thriving well somewhere between the head of Paint Lick and 150 miles downstream toward the mouth of the Kentucky River.

Enjoy George, but don't be calling back unless you're willing to share a mess of peas.

Take a Walk

Exercise looks help. In a decades-long study of Harvard graduates, it has been shown that people who exercise regularly have less obesity, osteoporosis, hypertension, and a lower death rate.

It does not necessarily help to become obsessed with a certain activity for a few months or years, such as running, and then quit, or go skiing a couple times each winter. To be most useful, exercise does not have to be extremely vigorous, but it must be done on a regular basis. Walking is one of the best exercises for this.

Walking has many advantages. It does not require any special equipment other than good shoes, and it does not require any special buildings or fields. It can be done anywhere and can be incorporated into a person's daily activities of getting the mail or going to work. Virtually anyone can do it.

Even in the winter it can be a good exercise. When it is too cold or icy outside, a person can walk in shopping malls, up and down stairs or do volunteer work in hospitals, nursing homes or in community projects. Walking can also be a good starter program for more vigorous sports such as running, swimming or tennis.

Injuries are uncommon with walking and the exercise keeps the bones strong by helping prevent the loss of calcium associated with aging.

Walking does not burn quite as many calories per mile as running, but it still is an excellent way to help reduce your weight. The weight loss and cardiac benefits can be further increased by vigorous arm swinging or carrying small hand weights.

William Earl Phillips was an Army veteran of WW II. In the beginning of his career, he was a Military Engineer, after passing a four year college final exam. His second rank was Sergeant.

On D-Day, Sgt. Phillips was one of the Anglo-American Expeditionary Forces who struck the French coast in the most gigantic amphibious operation ever undertaken on Normandy. He was extensively wounded twice. After being hospitalized for nine months in England, and still recovering, he served over two years as an MP.

Sgt. Phillips was going to be promoted to yet a higher rank but, much as he loved his career in the Army, it would have meant leaving away from the one person he loved more than anything, his wife Christine and their five children. The fifth son was named after his dad, General Bradley. He was discharged with full honors.

After having three more children, Mom and Dad drew up their own blueprints and had a new home built in Red Hill, near Livingston. While their youngest daughter, Ann, was growing up, she, like her Mom, would hang on every word while Dad talked about his life in the Army.

Because Ann was so close to Dad, he would talk to Mom about passing on his two Purple Hearts, Medal of Honor, Grenade and Sharpshooter medals, all bars and stripes and other medals, etc., to Ann sometime.

On Christmas Day 1998, Mom passed down all her husband's medals. At the same time, Mom passed down other items from their life together to their other children. We will never forget that day in some ways, it was sad. Today's medals are encased in a special handmade solid cherry English Queen Anne style display, with mirrored rounded and platform which is forever lit up. They are now proudly displayed in Ann's condo on the Dayton Beach coast.

As we children grew up, Dad taught by example. Today, we still remember one of Ann's memories: On Christmas Day 1998, Mom passed down all her husband's medals. At the same time, Mom passed down other items from their life together to their other children.

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How clean she kept it even though there were eight children. We also remember there were always plenty of people who joined our table for all three meals. They were made to feel right at home and always welcomed as if they were part of the family sick, in every way, they were. We are thankful that we grew up having a mother and father like ours.

Mom and Dad would often say they had four handsome sons and four beautiful daughters. On the other hand, they would remind us to always be "yourself" and never (and this was law) be "snack-up." By being snack-up, they meant the loss of our personality. In place of that, show yourself to be friendly. Dad and Mom, we still follow this rule and have many friends wherever we go and wherever we live. How could we not be proud of a Mom and Dad like ours?

Dad, years have passed since you went away. Yet to us, you are still with us. You made such a great impact on our lives that, in our minds and hearts, we still feel your wonderful love for us. And Dad, our love for you is just as strong.

Your wife, Christine, and sons, Brad, Gary and Jack of Dayton, Ohio; daughters, Juanita, Lois and Shirley Miller, both of Indiana and Ann Phillips of Daytona Beach Shores, Florida. Also, the father of the late Henry Phillips and Lois Neenan Neenan. Grandfather of the late Johnny E. Phillips and two sons-in-law, Ann's husband, Scott Jones from Columbus, Indiana and Charles R. Charles Rote from Jackson, Ky.

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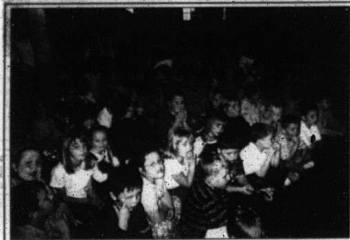

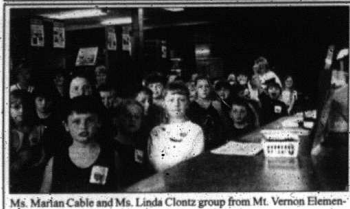
Library News

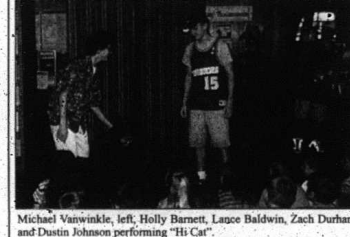

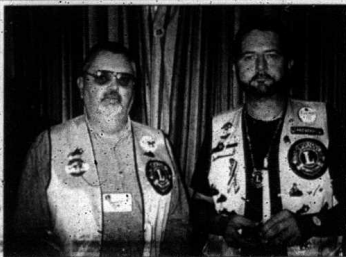

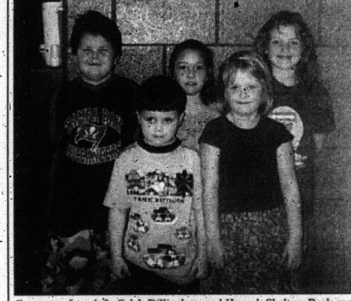

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From the Just-Us Files

Premise of landmark case remains unrealized

Forty years ago, on March 18, 1963, the U.S. Supreme Court decided the landmark case of Gideon v. Wainwright and announced a principle we all take for granted: that everyone who is accused of a crime is entitled to be represented by a lawyer, even if the accused is too poor to hire one.

No one can seriously question that a fair trial cannot be possible unless a competent lawyer is provided to those who cannot afford one. As the justices said, this "seems an obvious truth." However, decades later, Gideon's promise remains largely unkept as we still find that the quality of justice frequently depends on the ability to pay for it.

Far too often, those who are unable to afford counsel are left to meet their lawyer for the first time on the eve of an important court proceeding, or even trial. Many are faced with the prospect of being unable to spend more than a few minutes with their court appointed lawyer, contract lawyer or public defender, to give the lawyer sufficient opportunity to learn about the case.

This leads to even less time for preparation of legal strategy, and still less to perform critical investigations. Small wonder we read about and hear stories with growing frequency about innocent people wrongly convicted.

The poor are often saddled with contract lawyers or public defenders with huge caseloads, who, many times, are paid less to defend someone who might spend the rest of his or her life in jail than for a basic closing for the sale of a home.

Or, they might live in a judicial circuit that picks lawyers not for the quality of their service, based upon experience or training, but by whether the lawyer submitted the lowest bid - in other words, justice or the cheap but with a far greater long-term cost.

Those unable to afford counsel might end up convicted, or even condemned to death, for crimes they didn't commit simply because the lawyer didn't have the critical lab test, or the investigator, or the train-

ing to appropriately challenge the prosecution's case. A recent national study determined that inadequate legal representation was one of the main causes of wrongful convictions in death penalty cases.

While we hear the horror stories of sleeping lawyers, scant attention has been given to the major underlying cause of inadequate representation: lack of resources.

Ninety percent of Americans questioned in a recent poll said that the quality of justice people receive should not be determined by the amount of money they have. That poll also found that Americans want lawyers defending the poor to have salaries, resources and workloads equivalent to those of prosecutors. They want national quality standards for the defense of the poor, much like standards for doctors, architects or teachers.

Americans can no more imagine, expecting competence from a criminal defense lawyer without the necessary tools, like investigators, DNA testing and expert witnesses, than from a brain surgeon without anesthesia or a scapel. This decision in Gideon v. Wainwright was a clarion call for justice that sounded 40 years ago. The continuing consistent corruption of our justice system today calls out for action for reform and improvement.

The keys to reforming the system for effective representation for those unable to afford lawyers are simple and basic - things like proper training, resources proportionate to those for the prosecution, adequate payment for lawyers providing services, manageable caseloads and a guarantee of independence so that politicians or judges are unable to arbitrarily reduce lawyers' pay or fire them simply because they are effectively doing their jobs.

To do this will require spending more money, something that is never politically popular. However, failing to take the necessary steps will only further erode public confidence in a system that treats the wealthy and poor differently and can tragically contribute to wrongful convictions.

Gideon created the promise that all Americans would realize, the grand words carved in stone on the Supreme Court building: Equal Justice under the Law. Today, we are still treading along the road toward justice. We cannot afford to wait another 40 years to get there. We can do better now. The time has come to invest in justice for all.

Tips to Send Packages to Military Personnel Overseas

Do you know any servicemen or women who have been sent overseas? If so, you might want to send them a package filled with goodies as a reminder of home. When choosing the items for your package, remember to follow proper food handling and food safety practices.

Avoid highly perishable items such as meats or cheeses. Also pass up high-moisture baked goods due to possible mold growth. Pack fragile home-baked cookies in rigid containers to keep them from arriving in crumbs after a long trip across the sea. Commercially packaged baked goods will hold up better than homemade ones since they are packaged for shipment.

Good choices include, hard candies, angel food cake, and deer and beef jerky. Raisins, apricots and other dried fruits, canned nuts and fruit, and commercially prepared trail mix also are recommended. If you want to send meat, select canned items like tuna, chicken, and frank and beans.

Remember many locations where military personnel are deployed are very hot and packages containing chocolate, chocolate chips and other items that melt are not a good idea. Other items you might include in your package are all-occasion or blank greeting cards, writing paper, envelopes, pens, toiletry items, batteries, small board games, puzzles, playing cards, paperback books, magazines and puzzle books.

Videos, music compact disks and cassettes are also appreciated, but you need to put "Do not x-ray" magnetic recorded tape enclosed on the outside of packages containing these.

Use the local newspaper to wrap up the contents of your package since people serving in the military love to read about what is going on at home. Because there is no way to dispose of them, do not use Styrofoam peanuts - as packing material.

Mailing tips include clearly addressing your package with a permanent ink pen. Do not use wrapping paper and string on the outside of the package since both may come apart during shipping. Include the address on a card inside the package so it can reach its destination if the address outside becomes unreadable. Due to security concerns, a package addressed to "any soldier" or "any sailor" is no longer accepted.

Know that any packages you send will be greatly appreciated. Packages create a lot of excitement when they arrive, so be sure to pack a little extra to share.

Grass tetany during early grazing

Adult beef cows nursing young calves while grazing grass or small grain pastures in late winter or early spring, are especially susceptible to an extremely acute disorder known as grass tetany. Affected cattle can die suddenly and in fact are frequently found dead before the disorder is discovered.

Although in some seasons Kentucky farmers experience losses due to grass tetany from November to May, cows are more susceptible in the late winter and early spring when they graze heavily on the new growth of grass and relapse other food offered to them. Each loss is especially damaging, because it is invariably a big, sleek cow with a healthy young calf that dies.

Grass tetany is a result of a magnesium deficiency in the cow. Weather and soil fertility seem to be factors. Grass tetany occurs when soil temperature is between 40-60 degrees and often during changeable weather. High levels of nitrogen, potassium and moisture in the soil increase the incidence, because they apparently decrease the level of magnesium found in plants naturally.

Symptoms of the disorder usually begin with nervousness and then progress to a stilted gait, staggering,

convulsions, coma and death. It always requires immediate veterinary treatment.

About 2/3 of the cows treated intravenously with magnesium and calcium compounds recover. However, to prevent relapses, treated cows should be removed from the pasture. They should be fed hay and grain plus 2 ounces of magnesium oxide daily for at least a week.

Because animals do not store up magnesium, their dietary requirements have to be supplied on a day-to-day basis. The only way to prevent grass tetany is to supplement the diet with additional magnesium. This can be done with commercial

mineral mixes containing magnesium or with homemade mixtures. Mixing 1 part magnesium oxide, 1 part trace mineral salt and 1 part dried dried grain, will do fine if it is the cattle's only source of salt.

In the Specialty Acts division, taking first place was Carri Hunt of

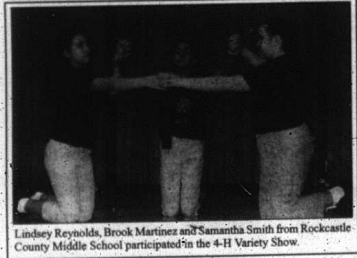

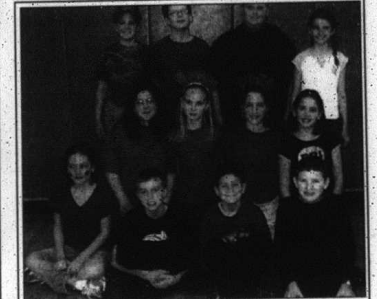
