Indictments returned by Rockcastle Grand Jury against six

Six Rockcastle Counties were indicted by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury on charges ranging from receiving stolen property to trafficking in a controlled substance.

Phillip Mullins, 23, of Brodhead was indicted for receiving stolen property, on or about March 21, 2003, over \$300 allegedly belonging to Vicki Perkins.

Anthony Frederick, 41, Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon, was indicted for trafficking in a controlled substance, first degree. The indictment charges that on or about August 22, 2002, Frederick knowingly and unlawfully trafficked in a controlled substance by possessing Oxycodone and Tylox, with the intent to distribute.

Lee Bradley Hammond of Rt. 2, Livingston, 49, was indicted on three charges — trafficking in a controlled substance with intent to distribute, operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol or drugs, second offense and driving on a suspended or revoked license.

All the offenses allegedly occurred on or about July 16, 2003 in Rockcastle County.

Jeremy Holt, 27, of Mt. Vernon was indicted for two offenses — robbery, first degree and terrorist threatening.

On or about November 10, 2001, Holt allegedly used physical force and caused physical injury with a deadly weapon upon James Price while in the course of committing a theft at Barr Shell. Also on that date, Holt allegedly threatened to kill Jason McGowan.

Flagrant non-support was the charge of the indictment against David Denney, 31, of Rt. 5, Mt. Vernon. Denney is charged with failing to provide for minor children in the amount of \$12,987.30 from January 30, 1997 through April 7, 2003.

Jack McCormick, 27, of Williams St. in Mt. Vernon was indicted for unlawful possession of a methamphetamine precursor, first offense and receiving stolen property over \$300, belonging to Earl Walls.

The offenses allegedly occurred on or about December 4, 2002.

New City Commissioner for Livingston

Ralph Allen Newcomb was recently appointed a Commissioner for the City of Livingston.

Mr. Newcomb was appointed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Jason Medley who has moved his residence to Brodhead.

Salute begins

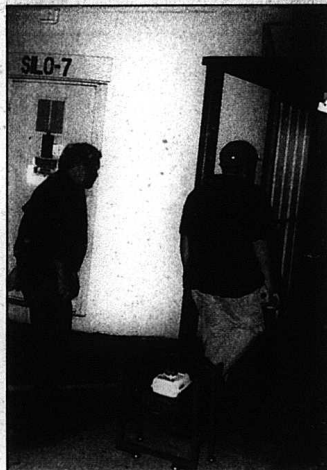

No one injured in fire at Plastics

No one was injured in a fire at Mt. Vernon Plastics Tuesday night. Plastics is located in Rockcastle Industrial Park number one, on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon.

According to Mt. Vernon firefighter Bryan Hansel, a hydraulic hose on one of the machines at the plant, apparently came loose and a heating unit caused an explosion, around 8:30 p.m.

Hansel said that there was fire on the floor and in the ceiling, but that the sprinkler system in the plant put out the fire on the floor before firefighters arrived on the scene.

Hansel said that firefighters had to extinguish the blaze in the ceiling and that the fire itself caused little damage, although the plant did sustain smoke and water damage.

Doug Macmerdo, operations manager at the plant said that he was very pleased with the reaction of his employees.

"Our managers did an excellent job getting the employees out of the plant and getting the power off," he said.

"We also appreciate the quick response by the fire department, they did a great job," he added.

Macmerdo said that the machine, that caught on fire would be repaired and that the plant was back in partial operation by 3 p.m. Wednesday.

The operations manager said that the plant was back to 75 percent production by 7 p.m. Wednesday.

Plastics has two production lines and 130 employees. They make deli style plastic containers and lids and containers for restaurants.

Charges against wife dropped Thompson pleads guilty in drug case

Larry Gene Thompson, Sr., the leader of an alleged cocaine drug ring that centered in Rockcastle, Garrard and Lincoln counties and reached from Texas to Kentucky, pleaded guilty to three drug-related counts and two forfeiture counts last week in U.S. District Court.

Thompson, Sr., a former Mt. Vernon police officer, however, would not admit that his wife, Greta McClure Thompson, was also charged in the case, was involved in distributing more than 500 grams of cocaine, one of the charges to which he pleaded guilty.

Greta Thompson, 47, and another defendant, Kathy Owens of Somerset, appeared in federal court on Monday.

All charges against Thompson were dismissed, although she agreed to give up any interest she had in her and her husbands property.

Owens pled guilty to possession of cocaine for personal use and she will be sentenced at a later date.

Thompson, Sr., 49, of Brodhead also pleaded guilty to possession and distributing more than five kilograms of cocaine, using a telephone to facilitate the commission of a drug felony offense and conspiracy to launder money.

He will be required to forfeit property that was used to commit and to facilitate the drug transactions as well as his interest in a total of \$2 million that the United States estimates the defendants received from drug trafficking.

As part of the forfeiture requirements, horses, mules and farm equipment, belonging to Thompson, Sr. and Joshua McClure of McKinney, also a defendant in the case, were sold recently in Madison County, resulting in a profit of more than \$200,000.

Also, in February, a check from Madison Livestock Sales reported 67 cows and calves and four horses that belonged to Thompson, Sr. and Greta Thompson were sold, resulting in more than \$26,378 put into the United States' registry account.

As part of a plea agreement, the United States will recommend Thompson, Sr. be sentenced to 10 years in jail, according to Assistant U.S. Attorney Ron L. Walker, Jr.

"We will recommend that at sentencing based upon if he continues to cooperate," Walker said.

Thompson, Sr. will not be able to appeal his sentence and his rights to vote, hold public office, own a firearm and serve on a jury will be taken away, Judy Karl Forester said Friday.

Sentencing is set for 9 a.m., July 3rd.

Jeffrey K. Wethington, Sr. another defendant in the case is scheduled for a trial by jury. The trial for Wethington, Sr. is scheduled for 9 a.m. June 2.

Thompson, Sr., Wethington, Sr., Larry Gene Thompson, Jr. and Salvador De Jesus Reyes-Munoz of Brodhead, both of whom have pleaded guilty, and Ralph T. Brock of Lancaster are all currently in custody.

Brock was released on bond in December but was remanded to custody of the United States Marshal on March 26 after a urine test revealed the use of controlled substances, according to Walker.

Travis Wethington of Liberty and Robert "Bobby" Durham of Stanford recently requested to be rearranged to enter plea agreements with the U.S.

Roberto Hernandez of Texas is scheduled to enter a guilty plea Friday.

Four plead guilty and two sentenced in Circuit Court

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth's Attorney for Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski, announced last week that four people entered pleas of guilty and two people had their probation revoked for violating the terms.

According to Montgomery, Michael Saylor, 22, and Stevie Lamb 26, both of Mt. Vernon had their probation revoked. Saylor was sentenced to a period of two year's imprisonment. Saylor was initially sentenced to a period of two year's probation on July 29, 2002. Saylor admitted he had violated the terms of his probation. Lamb was sentenced to a period of three year's imprisonment. Lamb was initially sentenced to a period of three year's probation on December 14, 2001.

Danny Bustle, 34, of Mt. Vernon entered a plea of guilty to the offense of two counts of Manufacturing

Methamphetamine, 4 counts of Receiving Stolen Property over \$300, Assault, fourth degree, Custodial Interference and Unlawful Imprisonment. Montgomery's office has recommended a sentence of ten year's imprisonment.

A sentence of ten year's imprisonment has been recommended for Rocky Mink, 20, of Mt. Vernon who entered a plea of guilty to the offense of three counts of Arson, third degree. Terry Riley, 32, of Mt. Vernon, entered a plea of guilty to the offense of DUI, 1st, Fleeing and Evading Police, first degree and Criminal Mischief, third degree. Montgomery's office has recommended a sentence of two year's imprisonment.

Doug Lewis, 52, of Mt. Vernon, entered a plea of guilty to the offense of ODUI, 4th. Montgomery's office has recommended a sentence of one year imprisonment.

This coming Saturday night, April 19th, commencing about 7:00 PM, some of the finest Bluegrass Music talent in the Bluegrass, or at least along the fringes of the region, will repeat a concert that they first staged on a cold night back in February.

Staged in the old Kirksville School gymnasium/auditorium in Madison County, the first one was easily the best night of musical entertainment I have experienced over the last couple of years and I fully expect the one this weekend, to be even better. (Kirksville is on the Kentucky Road Map in Madison County. The school is right beside the road on 595, on the left, about a quarter mile after you turn off 1295 and head into town. You can't possibly miss it if you can see how to drive.)

The concert will start at 7 and end around midnight and the music will be non-stop. Wilderness Trail, John Cosby and the Bluegrass Drifters, The Parker Brothers, Darla Cosby, Betty Wright, and a host of special guests will sing and play Bluegrass and Bluegrass Gospel music for you as good as and as proficiently as it gets. They will perform old standard songs better than the original artists and, between them, they know about every Bluegrass song ever written or recorded.

In short, they will knock your socks off and you will go away wondering why these bands are not on the stage of the Grand Ole Opry every Saturday night. But when you get to talking to the musicians you will find that they are into making the music because they love it and not because they consider it a knock-down-drag-out business, a Nashville.

Admission at the door is only \$8.00. I'm not sure what the cut-off is age wise but kids under 12 either get a big price break or they get in free. Bottom line is, with a ten dollar bill you can get in, stay all evening, eat a couple of hot dogs and drink a cup of coffee. A big outdoor festival is gonna cost you three times that much to get in the first night.

Give me a choice between seeing/hearing a big Nashville or other commercial act or festival and this group and I will take the latter every time. I know most of the words or at least the chorus to about every Bluegrass

Song ever popularly recorded and a bunch that never made it. I have hundreds of albums and tapes and CDs that I listen to regularly. I know quality when I hear it and I promise that if you show up this weekend you will hear Bluegrass Music as good as it gets in a venue second to none. The roof doesn't leak and the acoustics are amazing.

The old Kirksville School was originally a high school founded back in the 20's or 30's or maybe even earlier than that. I'm pushing a deadline here and don't have time to call someone to give you a history lesson. Anyway it was turned into an elementary school only in the sixties but the gym and auditorium remained. Finally, three or four years ago, a fancy new school was built out on 52 and the alumni and community members of Kirksville are doing everything they can to keep the facility maintained as their own special place.

This concert will raise some money to help them do just that. The same auditorium stage with its original floor on which the bands will play on Saturday Night have hosted Bill Monroe & The Bluegrass Boys, Lester Flatt and Earl Scruggs, The Stanley Brothers, Johnny & Jack, Hylton Brown, Lily Mae Ledford and the Coon Creek Girls and the Lord only knows how many other big stars over the years before most of us were born.

They didn't even have amplification systems back in those days because the natural acoustics were perfect and the audiences were polite and quiet.

If you come out this Saturday Night you will find a sound system, assuming that it works as well as it did last time, that is akin to the best stereo surround system you ever heard. Not too loud, but loud enough to drown out fools like me in the audience who want to sing along with every word.

It's a chance to hear Bluegrass Music in a venue where it publicly originated on what promises to be a wonderful, central Kentucky evening. It's a chance to relive history, have some good clean fun, and, perhaps, assure that something good and wonderful continues to survive. I can't think of a better place to be. I hope to see you there.

Letter to the editor:

I was quite disappointed in the school board's decision to not accept the five additional snow days offered to KY counties. From all of the districts I have polled around Rockcastle, I have yet to find another that did not accept these "free" days.

From what I understand, the school board would have to request these days from the State. These days would be granted and the School system would get the funding as if school were in regular session. Our school board, not wanting to be seen as "light" on education decided to not seek these days and instead to lengthen the regular school calendar.

If Rockcastle chose to accept the addition days, the school system would actually save money. The schools would get the funds without having to spend any of the money on buses or school lunches; teachers could use these days for career development and planning for the next school year.

I would much rather have my child attending a class where the teachers and staff were well planned and prepared for teaching than to lengthen the calendar.

Since the weather has gotten warmer and outside activities have increased, many kids are finding it hard to concentrate on school work. I do not think that my children will gain any educational value in attending school an additional five days this school year. I have talked with several other parents in the county and I know that they too were hoping that the board would accept these days.

Our school age children will essentially only have two months for summer break, as the school calendar starts in early August this fall.

I hope that other parents would also let their opinions be known to the school board members of Rockcastle County. I would like to see the school board ask other parents how they feel on this issue. I have much respect for our school system and I am very pleased with the level of education my children receive; however, I would like to see the school board reconsider their decision on this matter.

Hypertension, the silent killer

Causing few or no symptoms, hypertension has become known as the "silent killer". You must have your blood pressure taken to diagnose it.

A normal reading is below 140/90. When it goes above this reading it should be followed closely. The diagnosis should not be made from just one or two readings. The blood pressure will vary depending on heart rate, excitement, and just being in your doctor's office.



When the readings are consistently high, your doctor will consider several factors which may be affecting your blood pressure. Use of tobacco, alcohol, coffee, and salt may contribute to the elevated readings. These are all life-style factors which can be changed. Losing weight and increasing your physical activity may be all that is needed to control mild hypertension.

When dietary and life-style changes do not control the blood pressure, medicines are usually started. A wide variety of medicines are available and the best choice often depends on your age and medical conditions, such as diabetes or asthma. Water pills, which remove salt and water from the body, or beta-blockers, which slow the heart rate, are often used first. They have proved their effectiveness over decades.

When the readings are extremely high, there is an immediate risk of a stroke or heart attack until it is controlled. Hospitalization to treat the blood pressure and protect against these complications may be necessary.

A person's blood pressure may increase with age, so yearly checks are needed. Early treatment can help prevent the complications of heart attacks, strokes and kidney failure.

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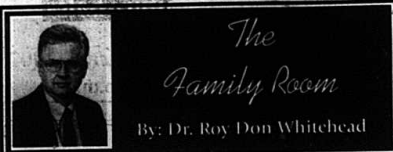
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What Saith the Scriptures

Today we would like to study for a few moments the conversion of the Ethiopian eunuch in Acts 8:26-39

Now notice that the eunuch was studying from Isaiah 53, and had a question about the passage for Philip to answer, vs. 34. Philip begins at this same passage of scripture, and preaches unto him Jesus, verse 35. Let's notice what vs. 36-38 says, "And as they went on their way, he came unto a certain water, and the eunuch said, See, here is water: what doth hinder me to be baptized?" And Philip said, If thou believest with all thine heart, thou mayest. And he answered and said, I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. And he commanded the chariot to stand still; and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him. How in the world did the eunuch know anything about baptism? Well the Bible says that Philip preached unto him Jesus, verse 35. So we must conclude that when we preach Jesus, we will also be preaching about baptism. Folks who do not preach what the Bible says about baptism, are failing to preach Jesus like Philip did. We also see that the eunuch made the good confession in verse 37, (Romans 10:9-10). Now take note that the eunuch was baptized that very day Philip had the opportunity to preach Jesus unto him. He did not wait days or weeks to be baptized as do human denominations practice today. After the eunuch believed and obeyed the gospel, notice "And he went on his way rejoicing" vs. 39. Have you done as the eunuch did?

Learning to Live With Stress

Stress is the pressure one feels from the impact of day-to-day living. Everyone feels it. If a person did not feel stress that would mean he was dead, so stress is not necessarily a bad thing.

Even happy events cause stress. Nothing is more joyous than the birth of a healthy baby, yet talk to any new parent, and they will tell you about the stress involved. Nine months of pregnancy, the sleepless nights when the baby comes home and all the other changes make the couple feel as if they are living in a pressure cooker.

A wedding is a most joyous occasion, yet it is also filled with stress.

For couples who have been married several years, building a house can provide similar pressure.

An unhappy childhood or a failed marriage can cause stress many years after the original event. Survivors of childhood abuse often have to deal with depression as adults. The depression is caused by the pain left from childhood.

Any change or loss causes stress. A move, a job change, a divorce or a death, all make the living of a normal life more difficult.

There are some proven methods for dealing with the stresses of life.

One of these is exercise. The simplest and least expensive form of exercise is walking. All that is needed is a pair of walking shoes.

A walk in the evening after work can be a tremendous stress reliever. The worries of the day move aside as the walking relieves stress. Joining a partner for a walk may provide just the incentive needed to begin an exercise program and stick to it. (See below.)

Another helpful stress relieving technique is deep breathing. For some this requires learning to breathe in a new way. Shallow or chest breathing is not relaxing. In fact it causes more stress. In deep breathing the stomach expands on the in-hale (because the diaphragm expands

to pull in more air) and contracts on the exhale (because the diaphragm contracts to push the air out of the

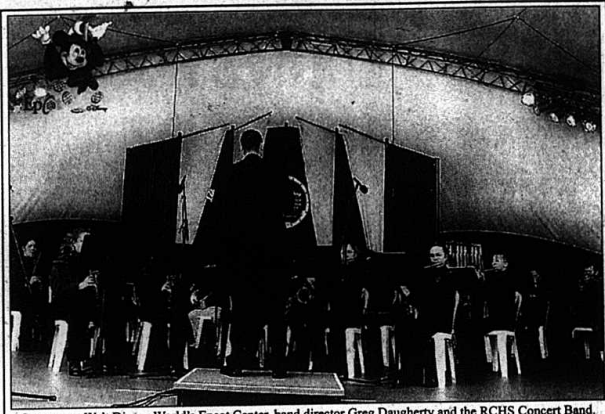

lungs). Practicing in front of a mirror will help. Expansion of the stomach on inhaled and contraction on exhalation means deep breathing is occurring.

Moving more slowly will also help eliminate some stress. Some people are always in a rush. Even if they have plenty of time, they move quickly.

Their steps and hand movements always make them seem to be in a hurry.

Consciously slowing down the movements can eliminate some stress. This will not be easy for the person who is accustomed to rapid movement. It takes a concentrated, continuing effort to change the pace at which one approaches life.

Talking about the stress also helps to relieve it. I tell my counseling clients that "telling is healing." Those old stories that cause so much pain become less painful with each telling. Sharing the pain with another human being makes the load easier to bear whether the stress is from current or past events.

MUSIC is another stress reliever. For some this means sitting quietly

listening to Bach, Beethoven or the soothing sounds of modern jazz. For others this means groovin', to the driving beat of rock-and-roll. Making a place in life for music can soothe the savage soul.

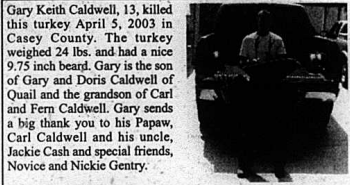
The sound of water is another stress reliever. Bubbles in a fish tank or the sound of the ocean lapping the shore makes short work of stress.

When buying eggs, always choose those from a refrigerated case. Look for clean, uncracked shells. Always buy eggs before the "Sell By" or expiration date on the carton. A U.S. Department of Agriculture grade shield or mark means the eggs have met quality and size standards. Buy the size that's most useful and economical for you.

Temperature fluctuations are critical to safety. Take eggs straight home from the store and immediately store them in the original carton in a refrigerator set at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below. Put the carton in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Don't wash eggs before storing them, because this could remove the protective mineral coating and increase the potential for bacteria on the shell to enter the egg. Eggs shouldn't be left unrefrigerated any longer than two hours. Once they are refrigerated, eggs need to stay that

Keeping Eggs Safe

Spring is a festive time of year as plants and trees awake from a winter's nap and we prepare for seasonal celebrations and observations.

Eggs are a traditional food often used for spring festivities but they may contain organisms that could make people sick. So when you're preparing for an egg hunt it's important to properly store and handle the eggs for this activity.

Shell eggs might contain *Salmonella enteritidis*, bacteria that can cause foodborne illness. Although the number of bacteria is quite small, foodborne illnesses have occurred in the past few years. Groups especially vulnerable to *Salmonella* infections include those with health problems, the very young and senior citizens. Eggs must be properly handled, refrigerated, and cooked to remain safe. Keep eggs refrigerated, cool eggs until yolks are firm, and thoroughly cook foods containing raw eggs.

When buying eggs, always choose those from a refrigerated case. Look for clean, uncracked shells. Always buy eggs before the "Sell By" or expiration date on the carton. A U.S. Department of Agriculture grade shield or mark means the eggs have met quality and size standards. Buy the size that's most useful and economical for you.

Temperature fluctuations are critical to safety. Take eggs straight home from the store and immediately store them in the original carton in a refrigerator set at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below. Put the carton in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Don't wash eggs before storing them, because this could remove the protective mineral coating and increase the potential for bacteria on the shell to enter the egg. Eggs shouldn't be left unrefrigerated any longer than two hours. Once they are refrigerated, eggs need to stay that

way. Leaving cold eggs at room temperature can cause shell sweat, which facilitates bacterial growth.

If eggs crack on your way home, break them into a clean container; tightly cover, refrigerate them. Use eggs that crack during hard cooking are safe.

Here are some safe-handling guidelines for eggs:
Before and after contact with eggs, wash your hands, utensils, equipment and work areas with hot, soapy water.

Don't keep any raw or cooked eggs out of the refrigerator for more than two hours.
Raw eggs and other ingredients, combined according to recipe directions should be immediately cooked, or refrigerated and cooked within 24 hours.

To safely cook eggs, poach, hard cook, scramble, dry or bake them. Be sure the eggs are thoroughly cooked until the yolks are firm. Scrambled eggs shouldn't be runny. Use a food thermometer to be sure you've cooked casseroles and other egg-containing dishes to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F.

Immediately serve cooked eggs and egg-containing dishes, or put them in shallow containers to quickly cool and refrigerate right after cooking. They should be used within three to four days.

His parents are Bobby and Alma Loudermilk of Somerset and formerly of Mt. Vernon. Ryan's brother Mark lives in Brodhead.

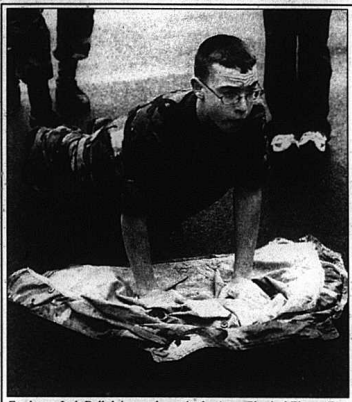
Raider team wins at EKU Mil Stakes Competition

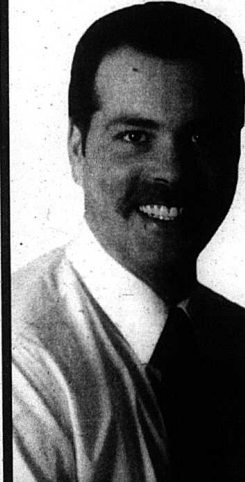

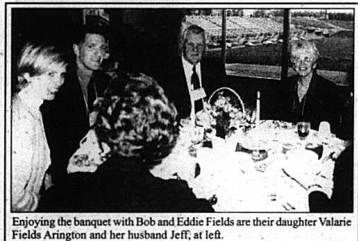
On Saturday, April 5th, three days prior to receiving the Ken Chafin Award for Creativity and Courage, Bob and Eddie laid to rest their 41 year-old son, Todd, at cleftRock Retreat Center in Rockcastle County.

Todd and his wife, Lynnell, had been missionaries in Honduras for 13 years. Todd was leading a group of high school students on a retreat to Guatemala on March 28th when the group was robbed and Fields was killed.

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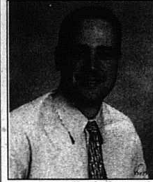

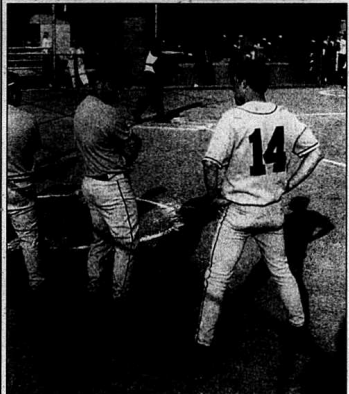

wears the other. He keeps his cannons full and his feet dry.

He may forget to floss or brush his teeth, but never to clean his rifle. He can cook his own meals, mend his own clothes, and fix his own hints.

If you're thirsty, he'll share his water with you; if you are hungry, his food. He'll even split his ammunition with you in the midst of battle when you run low. He has learned to use his hands like weapons and weapons like they were his hands. He can save your life - or take it, because that is his job.

He will often do twice the work of a civilian, draw half the pay and still find ironic humor in it all. He has seen more suffering and death than he should have in his short lifetime.

He has stood amidst dead bodies, some of which he helped to create, and felt both terrified and thankful that he wasn't one of them.

He has wept in public and in private, for friends who have fallen in combat and in unshamed.

He feels every note of the National Anthem vibrate through his body while at rigid attention, while tempering the burning desire to "square-away" those around him who haven't bothered to stand, remove their hat, or exonerate talking. In an odd twist, day in and day out, far from home, he defends their right to be disrespectful.

Just as did his Father, Grandfather, and Great-grandfather, he is paying the price for our freedom. Beardless or not, he is not a boy.

He is the American Fighting Man that has kept this country free for over 200 years. He has asked nothing in return, except our friendship, respect, and understanding.

Remember him, always, for he has earned our respect and admiration with his blood.

"A prayer for our Military "Lord, hold our troops in your loving hands. Protect them as they protect us. Bless them and their families for the selfless acts they perform for us in our time of need. Amen."

If you have time, and believe in the power of prayer, please stop for a moment and say one for our

ground troops, sailors, and airmen in all parts of the world, including those already participating in the war with Iraq.
