A "baited area" means an area where feed, grains or other substances capable of luring wild turkeys have been placed. A person shall not hunt on a baited area or by the aid of baiting while the bait is present. or

fide agricultural practices.





#### Al-Anon helps members reach beyond their fears

Families and friends of alcoholics can find hope and help in Al-Anon/Alat

April is Alcoholism Awareness
Month and the following news release is a wonderfuly opportunity for
carrying the Al-Anon message to
families and friends of alcoholics.
Those who live with alcoholism
often live in fear, fear of abuse, fear
of anger, fear of trusting others. AlAnon Family Groups (including
Alateen for younger members) is a
source of understanding, help and
hope to families and friends of alcoholics. The following story, originally
published in the August 2002 issue
of Al-Anon is monthly magazine, the
forum, illustrates some of the fears
experienced.

My pattern of isolation began in childhood when my mother's abusive behavior became a source of sadness and embarrassment. It coped by being a good little grid and keeping my feelings to my-self. Years later, while I suffered from my son's alcoholism, I witherwa again. When the pain became intolerable, I decided to try Al-Anon.

It was scary walking into a room that was full of strangers, so I put on my everything's okay mask. Then the members began to share Then the members began to share their stories. Everyone's words carried such depth and honesty that I began to feel hopeful. It thought maybe I could let my guard down, too. maybe some-body would finally understand.

Continuing to attend meetings. I confronted longtime habits of self-pity that kept me stuck in misery. It was pretty difficult to feel alone and sorry for myself when I sat with people whose experiences were the same or even worse than rise.

When I was little. I often blamed

myself for Mominy's anger. Later,
I felt somehow guilty about my
son's alcoholism. Al-Anon told
me I did not cause the disease and
that I could not control or cut;
either. The only thing I could
change, I learned, was my
response. As I gradually let go of
guilt, I felt a new sense of lightpess and freedom.

Sometimes I still find myself slid-Sometimes I still find myself slid-ing back into isolation, but now I have a choice. I can stay in a dark, lonely place, if that's what I choose. Or I can keep coming back to this program, into the healing light of intimacy with my tht of intimacy with my velers on this journey fellow trav-we call life.







"In focus groups conducted by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMI) to seek depression waste-

(NIMH) to assess depression aware ness, men described their own symp

ness, men described their own symp-toms of depression without realizing that they were depressed. Notably, many were unaware that (Ephysical, symptoms, such as head-

aches, digestive disorders, and

depression.

In addition, they expressed concerr about seeing a mental health
professional or going to a mental
health clinic, thinking that people
would find out and that this might
have a negative impact on their job
security, promotion potential, or
health insurance benefits. They

feared that being labeled with a di-agnosis of mental illness would cost them the respect of their family and friends, or their standing in the com-

munity.
