Police make arrests for stolen vehicle

Last Friday, Kentucky State Po-lice Tryoper Coby Smith observed a 2000 Nissan Xterra SUV reporter stolen from Somerset earlier drive onto 1-75 from U.S. 25 in Mt. Vernon traveling southbound, according to KSP Public Affairs Officer Craig

Sutton said that Smith attempted to stop the vehicle when the driver began to accelerate in an attempt to chude. aneer. It has been known for a long time that increased treeses in life make it more likely for you to have infections in the following months. The most seri-ncies stresses are deaths in the family, divorce, and major stresses in life, such as a change in residence or lobb.

Statistics have shown that even what we consider. To be good changes, such as a ensise in pay or moving to a nicer home, are great enough stresses that illnesses are more likely in the following year. There is also evidence that stress significantly increases irregular heart beats, raises the blood pressure and even affects our ability to fight cancer. Some studies have shown that tumor cells grew faster in patients who were under stress—the defenses against tumor cells appeared to be decreased. Sudder feath from irregular heart hythms has been reported to be more common in people under psychological stress. Blood pressure readings are higher when a person is under stress, and there are even reports that diabetes and some forms of arthritis can be related to stress. Just where this will end one knows, but we do know that for a happy and healthy life it is good to keep stresses to a minimum.

To be eligible, a producer's livestock operation heádquarters must be physically located in a county with a qualifying disaster designation. Eligible investock are livestock owned or cash leased on or before June 1; 2002 and have been owned or cash leased for a minimum of 90 calendar days and mitude cattle, sheep, goats and buffalo as well as cartish.
