Police make arrests for stolen vehicle

Last Friday, Kentucky State Police Trooper Coby Smith observed a 2000 Nissan Xterra SUV reported stolen from Somerset earlier drive onto I-75 from U.S. 26 in Mt. Vernon traveling southbound, according to KSP Public Affairs Officer Craig Sutton.

Sutton said that Smith attempted to stop the vehicle when the driver began to accelerate in an attempt to elude. The vehicle continued southbound until the driver exited the interstate turning onto KY 909, approximately 13 miles from where the vehicle was first observed.

The driver proceeded an attempt to elude arrest by driving into a wooded area off I-75 known as Cromer Ridge in northern Laurel County.

After searching the area for the vehicle, both suspects along with the vehicle were located approximately one mile off the roadway along a trail where the vehicle had become disabled after striking a tree.

Both occupants were located and the driver, Robert L. "Robbie" Sandusky, 18, of Mt. Vernon, was arrested and lodged in the Rockcastle County Jail charged with Receiving Stolen Property (vehicle), Possession of Methamphetamine, and numerous traffic offenses.

Sutton said his passenger, Mary A. Durham, 19, of Mt. Vernon, was transported to the UK Medical Center in Lexington for treatment of injuries she sustained when her vehicle struck a tree. Durham apparently broke a shoulder and the vehicle was totaled in the wreck.

Durham was charged with Receiving Stolen Property (vehicle) and Possession of Methamphetamine.

Trooper Coby Smith is conducting the investigation and is assigned

School board hears transportation, changes in pay schedule requests

The Rockcastle County Board of Education held their May meeting at the Rockcastle County Library Tuesday night. The meeting was held at the library in order for the board members to be made more aware of the partnership between the library and the Rockcastle County School System. As part of the program, drama students from the Rockcastle Middle School presented an adaptation of *Macbeth* for which grant funds from the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation were used.

Following a tour of the library's children and young adult section, Kathy McKibben gave the board a brief overview of the library's activities which involve several different entities in the county and point out what is available for all county residents.

As one of the first items on the agenda, the board heard a request from Lonetta Daugherty that some provision be made to transport students at Mt. Vernon Elementary within the 5 mile radius that is presently prohibited.

Mrs. Daugherty said that since she and her husband both had to leave home early to work, it was a hard-

ship to get their children transported to the school because her babysitter lived inside the 5 mile radius.

Superintendent Larry Hammond told Mrs. Daugherty this was, really not feasible since if an allowance were made at Mt. Vernon Elementary then it would have to be made at other schools in the county and that was not practical.

Hammond said it would involve purchasing different (smaller) buses and additional drivers at a cost of \$250,000 or more. "I don't see this as a great likelihood, unless directed differently by the board, especially as the budget becomes tighter and tighter," Hammond said.

RCHS teacher Connie Riddle spoke to the board about the possibility of changing the teachers' pay schedule from once a month (on the 20th) to either the 30th, which would give the teachers a check on August 30th, semi-monthly or every two weeks.

Mrs. Riddle said the 20th of the month payday made it especially hard on new teachers, who have to work from July 30th this year until September 20th before receiving a paycheck.

Rockcastle County Schools Finance Officer Richard Bray, who was at the meeting to present the board with the 2003-04 salary schedule and tentative working budget, responded that the 30th was out of the question since teachers would not have worked the required number of days before paperwork was processed for the first paycheck of the year to be issued on August 30th.

Bray told the board that the every two week option was not a good one because it would require extra personnel to help with processing the additional paperwork needed for this system. Calling the two-week system a "nightmare," Bray added, "Hardly any districts pay every two weeks. About half the districts in the state pay monthly and the other half wish they did."

Five teachers, including Mrs. Riddle, were present at the meeting and, on question, Riddle told the board that everyone she had talked with or heard from was favorable to the change to semi-monthly or every two weeks.

However, Supt. Hammond agreed with Bray that it would require additional staff to change to semi-

monthly or every two weeks and budget priorities had to be established.

A short recess followed with the next item of business a presentation of the 2003-04 salary schedule to the board by Bray.

Bray said the legislature had, for the first time, mandated a dollar amount raise for teachers and administrators, making up to \$40,000 a year, of \$1,000, instead of the usual across-the-board percentage raise for everyone. Those making over \$40,000 would receive a mandated 2.7% increase (as opposed to last year's 3% increase).

Classified personnel will also receive the 2.7% increase, although the legislature mandated the increase this year for the first time ever.

The mandate had no effect on the local system, Bray said, because

At fiscal court meeting Lights, sirens for constables discussed again

The oft-discussed issue of approval of blue lights and sirens for constables was brought before the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court again at their regular meeting Tuesday.

Roger Pigg, 4th District Constable, asked the court to approve lights/sirens for his car. Pigg told the court he had "been involved with helping the Sheriff's Department every way I can." Pigg also had several petitions from his area supporting his request for use of the lights/sirens. "I could be of better service to the people of Rockcastle County, especially in District 4," Pigg added.

Pigg also presented Judge Buzz Carlotus and Magistrates with polaroid shots of his car which has already been painted with proper identification. "I want to be part of Rockcastle County; to provide a better environment for our children," Pigg told the court.

Carlotus pointed out to the Magistrates that the court can approve lights/sirens on an individual basis and can withdraw the approval if warranted.

When Carlotus asked for discussion on the matter from the Magistrates, Fred Mullins, Magistrate for

the 4th District, said he was still in favor of approving the lights/sirens and reinstated his motion from the March 25, 2003 meeting. In that motion, approval was contingent on a number of requirements being met such as 40 hours of training, no participation on the interstate, etc.

When no second to Mr. Mullins' motion was forthcoming, Carlotus, saying he understood the concerns on both sides of the issue, especially the concern that all law enforcement was not being used to its full capacity, seconded the motion himself, as allowed by law. With no further discussion, the roll call vote resulted in four no votes. Afterward, Magistrate Ralph Allen said, "I am not bad against lights but (County Attorney) Jeff Burdette read the law and people need to know just exactly the way the law reads and maybe some people's minds would be more settled."

Burdette responded that basically the law states that no constable can use blue lights/sirens or have them installed on vehicles unless approved by the fiscal court of the county they are in.

The penalty for violating KRS 180.950, the state statute dealing with

Fletcher brings campaign here

U.S. Congressman Ernie Fletcher's gubernatorial campaign rolled through Rockcastle County on Sunday with a large rally at the old barn in Renfro Valley.

Over 200 people attended the bluegrass and gospel event, and the crowd also heard from Republican front-runner Fletcher about why he should be Kentucky's next governor. Primary Election Day is May 20th and Fletcher told the crowd that he would "be honored and humbled to be your next Governor."

"I'm running for Governor because I think we can do better in this state," Dr. Fletcher told the crowd. "We can improve education, we can lower the cost of health care, and we can bring good jobs to Kentucky, and I will be the candidate who gets it done."

The Mother's Day Rally, which featured songs honoring the several mothers in the audience, was hosted by State Representative Danny Ford, who introduced Fletcher to the crowd.

"I am proud to support Ernie Fletcher for Governor, someone who can restore honor and dignity to the Governor's office in Frankfort," Ford said. "You look at Dr. Fletcher, a man who is a trained engineer, who has

been a fighter pilot in the Air Force, and who served his community as a family doctor and you realize that this person has a true compassion for his fellow Kentuckians."

Fletcher talked about his wife and the mother of his two children, Glenna Fletcher, and said that "she will make a wonderful First Lady of Kentucky."

The first race for State Representative, Glenna and I walked every precinct twice," Fletcher said. "I saw a government that was getting more intrusive, that was raising taxes and putting undue regulation on small businesses. Our message was simple—let's reduce government, lower the taxes, and empower people and businesses to succeed."

Fletcher was elected to the General Assembly in 1994 and served one term before having his district changed during redistricting. He won his current 6th District seat in the U.S. Congress in 1998 and is now serving in his third term.

"I serve the people of the 6th District just north of here," Fletcher told the crowd. "And you all have a superb Congressman in Hal Rogers. He is one of the most effective of Congress-

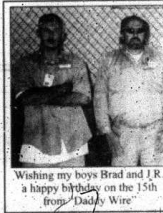

Play It Safe In The Sun

Many of us are planning to take part in more outdoor recreational activities as the weather continues to warm up. Remember that spending unprotected time in the sun increases your risk for skin cancer, the most common cancer in the United States.

Scientists estimate that one in seven Americans will develop a form of skin cancer during their lifetime. Approximately 9,000 people die from skin cancer annually. Most of these deaths are from malignant melanoma, the most dangerous skin cancer. Unfortunately, incidences of malignant melanoma are substantially increasing. A prime reason is that more ultraviolet radiation is reaching the earth as the protective ozone layer becomes depleted. Thus, its even more important to safeguard your family from unprotected sun exposure.

Here are some steps to help protect yourself and your family. Stay out of the sun when its rays are most damaging, from 10 am to 4 pm. Try to plan outside activities to exclude these times. If you're outside between 10 am and 4 pm, find shade and use as much protection as possible. Remember, you can sunburn even on a cloudy day.

Apply a broad-spectrum sunscreen with at least a 30 Sun Protection Factor. Read the label.

to discover when to reapply the sunscreen, if it's waterproof, and the product expiration date.

Wear protective clothing and sunglasses. Use a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, a wide-brimmed hat, all made of a tightly-woven fabric, and wraparound sunglasses. A baseball cap doesn't provide sun protection to vulnerable places on your ears, face or neck; so wear a wide hat, preferably with a three-inch brim.

Choose wraparound sunglasses with 100 percent UV radiation protection, because the most effective hats block only 50 percent of the UV rays that reach your eyes. Don't use tanning beds or sun lamps.

Check your skin monthly for abnormal or changing areas, especially moles. Have a doctor examine any changes. Some people have a greater risk for skin cancer. These groups include those with fair or light skin, individuals who work outside a lot, like farmers and people in the construction industry, and severely sunburned children.

Extended sun exposure is a major factor in skin cancer. For example, just one serious case of sunburn can increase the risk of developing skin cancer by up to 50 percent.

Whether you're working or playing outdoors, be aware of skin cancer risks and protect yourself and your family from the harmful effects of sun exposure.

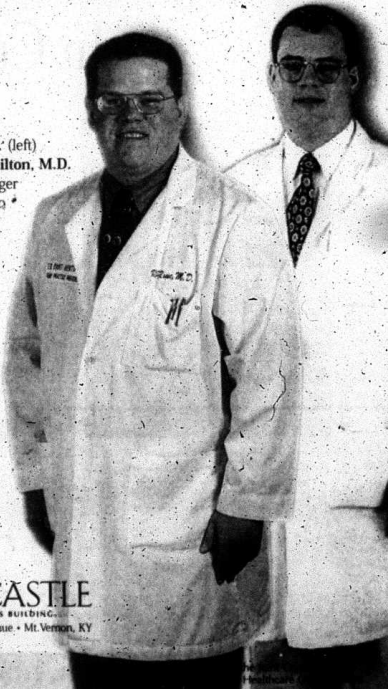

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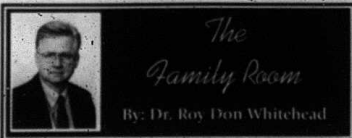

The Family Room

We grieve when we lose someone
With the death of her husband of forty-five years, Sandra (not her real name) entered a period of mourning. The shock of his death took months to wear off. She continued to expect him to walk through their front door as he had for all those years. She even heard his voice occasionally when she was alone in their big, empty house. It was so hard for her to believe that he was really gone.

Tonya's (not her real name) loss came in a different way—her husband of thirty-five years suddenly told her he wanted a divorce and moved out. She tried to talk to him, but he would not talk. Within a few weeks she learned that he had a girlfriend. That was when she realized that the marriage was really over. For days she could do nothing but cry.

Both Tonya and Sandra are going through grief. Grief is the process a person experiences when he loses someone. All kinds of losses, not just death, can trigger grief. Bryan's dog was run over and killed. Bryan mourned the loss for months. Clara lost her job at the factory where she had worked for twenty years, and she also mourned.

Grief is the normal response of bodies and emotions to loss. It is not caused by a lack of faith. Encouraging someone to stop grieving does not help.

Grief does not normally require counseling, unless the grieving process becomes blocked, and the grieving stops. This is one time when grief counseling is necessary. When Charlie (not his real name) lost his mother, he had to be the strong one in the family. His dad and siblings were falling apart, so Charlie handled everything. He put his own feelings on hold, and they became blocked. Charlie did need the help of a counselor.

Dr. Elizabeth Kubler-Ross identified five stages of grief in her 1969 book, *On Death and Dying*.

The first stage is denial. In this stage the person who is grieving does not want to accept the loss of that loved one. This is the stage of emotional shock and numbness. Moving through this stage means facing the reality of death, a little at a time. The second stage is anger. Where there is death and loss, there is almost always anger. The one who is grieving may feel anger at God, at the one who died or at friends who have never experienced such a loss. Being able to verbalize this anger to someone helps to move the process along.

Depression and despair are the third and fourth stages of grief. These are the hard times after the anger has gone when the death is fully realized. There is no more denial; the loss starts the grieving one in the face. Reminders bring the loved one to mind at every turn. In despair the grieving one wonders if there is a reason to go on. He may even contemplate suicide at this time. If this stage continues, a visit to both the counselor and the doctor is advisable.

The final stage according to Kubler-Ross is acceptance. This does not mean that all the pain is gone or that the one who left is forgotten. This is when the one who remains comes to terms with the loss and decides to go on with life. It marks the beginning of a new life.

As a minister, Dr. Whitehead has conducted many funerals and counseled with persons who are grieving. He is now a pastoral counselor in Somerset who helps families and individuals find help and hope for dealing with the problems of life. You may reach him at 679-4134 or 1-877-PASTOR-5.

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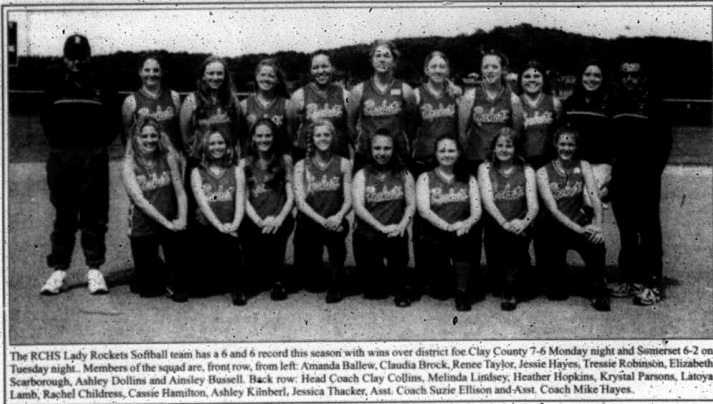
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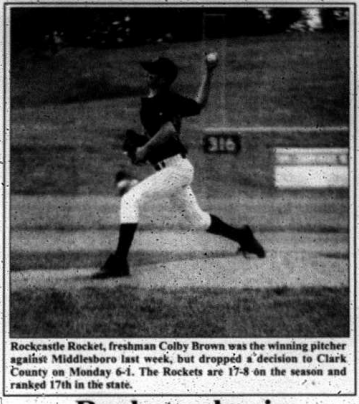

men in the country and we are lucky to have him here in Kentucky."

While in Congress, Fletcher has worked on several pieces of legislation, including spearheading the Patient's Bill of Rights effort for President Bush. He also worked in 2001 to get tax relief for Kentucky families and voted last week for another round of tax cuts.

"We need to make sure that government works for the people, and that the people aren't working for the government," Fletcher said. "And in state government, the problem isn't that we tax too little, it's that we spend too much."

Fletcher's stop in Rockcastle County was part of a campaign ending bus tour that will take Dr. Fletcher to Lexington on Saturday and visited Lancaster, Irvine, Somerset, and Nancy. On Monday, Fletcher's tour went through Bullitt, Hardin, Daviess, Ohio, Butler, and Warren Counties. Next weekend, Fletcher will make more stops ahead of Tuesday's election, including some in Eastern Kentucky.

Fletcher's main opponent is Steve Nunn, son of former Kentucky Governor Louie B. Nunn, the last Republican to be elected Governor in Kentucky. That was in 1987.

Nunn is a State Representative from Glasgow and he is trailing Fletcher by a wide margin in the polls.

Other races in next Tuesday's primary election include all state wide offices.

approval of blue light sirens, is a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$1000 or imprisonment of not more than 30 days in the county jail. If installed on a privately-owned vehicle, all lighting and other equipment used or installed in violation of KRS 189.110 to 189.950 shall be confiscated and forfeited to the county in which the offense occurred.

Magistrate Billy McKinney stated his concern for the liability of the court and the magistrates individually if a constable happened to be involved in an accident while using the lights/sirens which resulted in the loss of life.

"We are not liable for the Sheriff's Department because we didn't issue them their blue lights, the state did," McKinney said. "But, they can come after Billy McKinney if a constable cause a wreck," he added.

Burdette agreed that liability has been found, individually and as a body, when a fiscal court has "negligently" approved the use of lights/sirens. McKinney countered that negligence was up to a jury and "you never know what they'll do."

Sheriff Darrell Dain spoke up in support of the constables, saying, "They help us out a lot."

Burdette said the court there was actually a "long list" of things constables, who have county-wide jurisdiction, can do and noted that his office had recently began using them to serve papers on "hard to serve defendants," at a fee of \$10 per service.

In other action, Judge Carlotis discussed with the court the concern of a resident of the county about unfenced private pools. Carlotis said there was no state law requiring the fence but the court could pass an ordinance requiring that private pools be fenced.

However, there seemed to be little support for such an ordinance and no action was taken.

Carlotis also noted that if the caretakers of cemeteries in the county, where old flowers need to be picked up, would gather them at the gate, the county would pick them up, helping the cemeteries to be clean for Memorial Day.

The court also approved payment from the general fund of up to \$30,000 toward an approximate \$76,000 payment due in May on the jail renovation. The rest of the funds will come from jail revenue.

A report to the court by County Treasurer Joe Clontz showed all county funds in the black:

The installation of new officers, was the last order of business. Each officer and assistant was presented with their pin and escorted to their new position by the retiring officer.

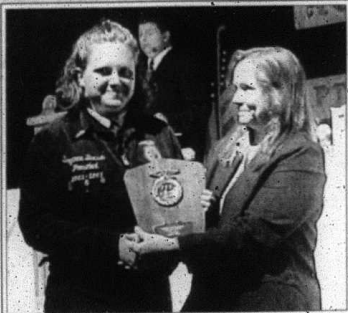
Plaques were given to the retiring officers and the senior officers gave their farewell speeches.

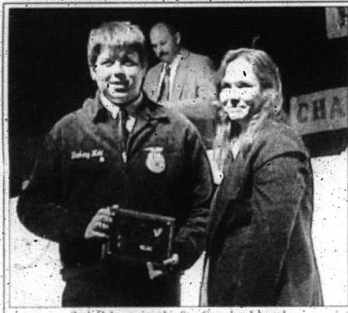

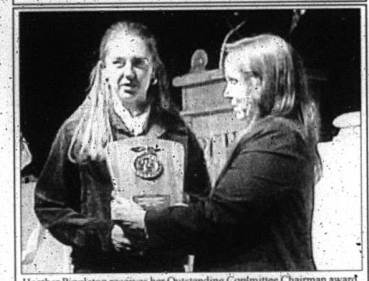

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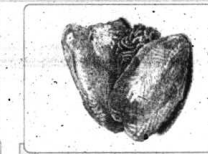

The Secretary has announced the national marketing quota and national reserve for the 2003 crop of barley tobacco as follows:

• Marketing quota is 287.8 million pounds.

• Reserve for New Farms is 24,300 pounds and for Correcting and adjusting inequities is 100,000 pounds.

The national factors are as follows:

• Quota is 0.8890

• Current year equivalent is 0.8890

The notice of barley tobacco quotas are scheduled to be mailed to producers on April 18, 2003 with leasing to begin Monday, April 21. Leasing will end July 1, 2003.

Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) Ends May 16th Did you own a farm for which tobacco quota was established in 2002? Did you own land on which tobacco was planted in 2002? Were you the grower of tobacco planted in 2002? If so, then the Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) is for you.

The Tobacco Payment Program (TOPP) will provide \$53 million to eligible applicants to help enhance the economic stability of tobacco producers. On Feb. 20, 2003, the President signed the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003, which included provisions to provide direct payments to all acreage allotment/marketing quota holders and tobacco growers.

Applications for direct payment sign-up for TOPP begins March 17 and ends May 16, 2003. Late filed applications will not be accepted. Funds will be dispersed according to allocation formulas tied to the various types of tobacco with payments being issued between mid-May and June 1, 2003.

Eligible persons are one who owns, controls or produces eligible tobacco on a farm for which an acreage allotment/marketing quota was established for the 2002 marketing

year. Eligible types of tobacco include flue-cured (types 11-14), Burley (type 21), flue-cured (types 21-23), Dark air-cured (types 35-38), Virginia sun-cured (type 37), Cigar filler/binder (types 42-44 and 54-55).

Payments shall be made by direct deposit unless a waiver is on file. Therefore, to expedite things, please bring a voided check for sign-up in direct deposit when applying for TOPP.

You need more information about TOPP, please contact your local FSA office. Information is also available on FSA's Web site at: <http://www.fsa.usda.gov>.

Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) The Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003 extended the Livestock Compensation Program (LCP), originally created in 2002, into 2003. The 2003 LCP is an emergency initiative administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA) that provides immediate assistance to eligible owners and cash lessees of certain types of livestock for damages and losses due to any natural disaster.

Producers who did not receive assistance under the 2002 LCP and who are in counties that were approved as a disaster area are eligible for LCP.

To be eligible, a producer's livestock operation headquarters must be physically located in a county with a qualifying disaster designation. Eligible livestock are livestock owned or cash leased on or before June 1, 2002 and have been owned or cash leased for a minimum of 90 calendar days and include cattle, sheep, goats and buffalo as well as catfish.

Tobacco Producers who are leasing the 2003 barley tobacco quota are reminded all producers transferring and receiving must sign by the deadline of July 1, 2003.

2003 DCO Contracts

Warden Alexander, CED with the Farm Service Agency in Rockcastle County, would like to take this time and opportunity to remind farmers they need to contact their FSA County Office to complete their 2003 Direct and Counter Cyclical Programs as soon as possible.

To date, approximately 85 percent of the farmers in Rockcastle County have completed the necessary program selections and signed contracts.

Program participation is voluntary and producers are responsible for meeting deadlines and complying with rules and regulations concerning information on this and other FSA programs is available at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/farmbill>.

Conservation Reserve Program USDA Farm Service (FSA) is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant long-term, resource-conserving crops to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion, and enhance wildlife habitat. In return, FSA provides participants with rental payments and cost share assistance. Contract duration is between 10 and 15 years.

FSA will hold CRP sign-up 26 for a four-week period ending May 30, 2003.

CRP sign-up 26 is the first general sign-up to benefit from personal computer-based computing environment (CCE) technology. Through CCE, FSA local offices can, for the first time, enroll producers and calculate eligible acre and rental rates in an automated environment.

To be eligible for CRP enrollment,

a producer must have owned or leased the land for at least 12 months prior to close of the CRP sign-up period, unless:

- The new owner acquired the land due to the previous owner's death
- Ownership change occurred due to foreclosure where the owner exercised a timely right of redemption in accordance with state law, or
- The circumstances of the acquisition prevent adequate assurance to FSA that the owner did not acquire the land for the purpose of placing it in To be eligible for placement in CRP, land must be either:

- Cropland that is planted or considered planted to an agricultural commodity 4 of the previous 6 crop years from 1996 to 2001, and which is physically and legally capable of being planted in a normal manner to an agricultural commodity; or
- Certain marginal pastureland that is enrolled in the Water Bank Program.
