#### RCMS council will choose from at least eight candidates

The Rockcastle County Middle School Site Based Decision Making Council will have to choose between at least eight people who have al-ready applied for the vacant principal's job at the school. The opening came about after current principal Anthony Coffey re-signed.

signed. applicants include current assistant principal Tammy Miller and KCMS 21st Century Director Jamon Coguer. The other ax applicants are from elsewhere. Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said that applications will be received in his office until June 12th.

Before the recent ruling, super-intendents had the authority to sub-mit only the applicants they felt would be best for the job.

"I think the ruling hurts the au-thority of the superintendent because even a principal who had been dis-missed could apply and the superin-tendent would have to submit his or her's name to the council and if the council saw fit they could hire them again," he said.

#### **Budget for schools** is over \$22 million

The Rockcastle County Board of Education's tentative working budget for 2003-04 shows a decreased expected revenue from 123-338-004 to 322-903-868, finance officer for Rockcastle Schools Richard Favy told the board at their May meeting. 

Like everything else in life, a decision like this can be penny wise and pound fool-haif the airbag falls to deploy because it is an improper fit or model. Unfortunately, the car or truck owner may not even have the opportunity to make the decision when they be dealing with a small minority of body shops that try to shave money off of their costs by replacing air bags with a duimny bag. Even worse than a dummy bag, unscrupulous mechanics will stuff airbag wells in steering wheels and dashboards with everything from Stryorfoam peanuts to empty beer cans.

It's virtually impossible for the average consumer to tell just by looking at a used car if it has phony airbags. Experts recommend doing at a wide car if it has phony airbags. Experts recommend doing research, and getting professional advice.

One of the most important persevering and life doption of a regular, rigorous exercise program hould usually be carried out daily or at least six da week and, as much as possible, at the same in overview.

The exercise can be in many different forms, but it should result in rapid, deep breathing as high as 40 times per minute and liberal perspiration. It should be between 30 and 60 minutes in length. The practice should be maintained as much as possible throughout one's lifetime! The exercise can be in the form of pumping iron, swimming, bicycling, treadmilling, jogging, etc. If the exercise consists of pounding the lower extremities, such as with running, jogging, or treadmilling, then one should do 5-10 knee bends every 3-5 minutes. This increases the joint pressure within the joints of the lower extremities and forces the natural lubricants into the cartilage, thereby preventing degenerative arthrits, the most comnon kind of arthritis.
