For principal's job
RCMS council will choose from at least eight candidates

The Rockcastle County Middle School Site Based Decision Making Council will have to choose between at least eight people who have already applied for the vacant principal's job at the school. The opening came about after current principal Anthony Coffey resigned. Local applicants include current assistant principal Tammy Miller and RCMS 21st Century Director Jason Coguer. The other six applicants are from elsewhere. Rockcastle County Superintendent Larry Hammond said that applications will be received in his office until June 12th.

A recent Kentucky Court of Appeals ruling requires that Kentucky school superintendents submit all applications to the site based council. Before the recent ruling, superintendents had the authority to select only the applicants they felt would be best for the job. "I think the ruling brings the authority of the superintendent because even a principal who had been dismissed could apply and the superintendent would have to submit his or her's name to the council and if the council saw fit they could hire them again," he said.

Budget for schools is over \$22 million

The Rockcastle County Board of Education's tentative working budget for 2003-04 shows a decrease of expected revenue from the 2002-03 budget appropriation of \$23,538,304 to \$22,693,868, finance officer for Rockcastle Schools Richard Bray told the board at their May meeting. The difference of \$844,436 comes primarily in the expected beginning balance, down to \$3,250,000 from \$3,850,083. Another large part of the decrease comes from the 21st Century Grant which has expired although there is enough left of the grant to partially finance the program for another year.

The biggest single chunk of money the board receives comes from the state in the form of SEJK funds (Support Education Excellence in Kentucky) which was the former minimum foundation program. This money, \$11,829,321, is used to pay teachers and administrators salaries plus support staff. The other expected revenue for the general fund budget of \$13,866,321, includes \$1,935,000 from local sources (property taxes primarily) and \$150,000 from interest income, down from \$314,519 just two years ago because of the lower interest rates being offered. Other areas of the \$22,693,868 estimated revenue includes \$2,991,300 from state and federal grants such as Title I, the Migrant program; EvenStart, federal special education money, etc. This amount may go higher, Bray said, since some expected letters of approval have not

Arson suspected in Brodhead fire

According to KSP arson investigator Det. Steve Faulkner, arson is suspected in an April 30th fire at the home of Sharon Simpson on Bowling Ridge Road in Brodhead. According to Mrs. Simpson, her home was burning when she came home about 11 p.m. on April 30th. The fire apparently started in the laundry room in the rear of the home. The fire was extinguished but water and smoke damage ruined the interior of the one story five room dwelling. Mrs. Simpson, who had lived in the home almost all her life, said she and her son, Kevin, who lives with her, lost everything in the blaze. The house was not covered by insurance. No arrests have been made in connection with the incident.

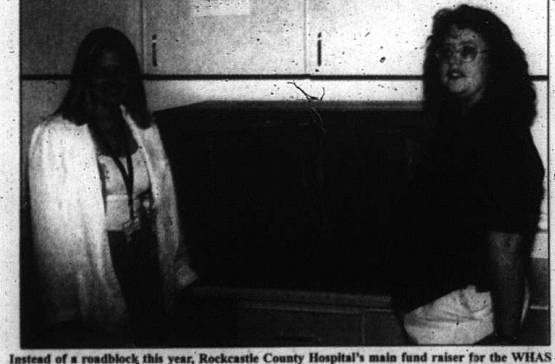
Graduation at RCHS set for Sat. at 4 p.m.

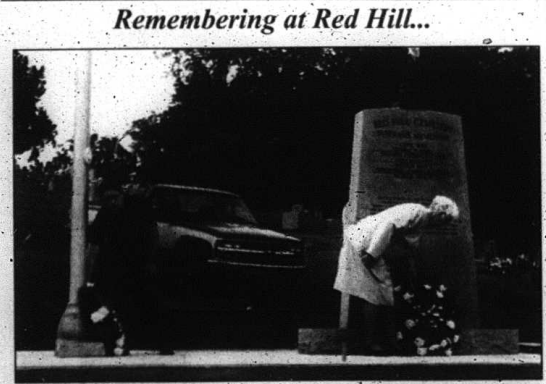


Renee Burdett to represent two schools

I was running my tiller last Thursday evening. I full throttle and over-drive and basically just mashing down and hanging onto the handles and making sure I'm going around without knocking down the 6 foot rock wall on one end of my garden or mauling in the industrial grade wire fence on the other end.

You're supposed to be able to run a big Troybilt horse with one hand and pick your teeth, curl your hair, or write your memoirs with the other and really do nothing more than stand around a lot while the tiller does all the work if the ground you are working is not full of boulders and grown up in saw briars and locust sprouts.

When it gets dry enough to plow, you do so with a vengeance and you celebrate those rare occasions when you get your soil loose enough to put a seed or sprout confidently planted into Mother Earth.

But it has rained a lot upon my garden, or at least upon the modest plot wherein I normally tend vegetables. Name your favorite street in Manhattan, block it off, and I will still go up and plant whatever you wish

to grow. Then I'll go away and let cab drivers fight over the radishes and lettuce and peas etc., etc., etc. growing there where traffic used to be a problem, or as they say, "yada, yada, yada" which is THE thing to say to anybody you just met in New York City if you if you're just there visiting. It's a universal language. If vendors or store clerks look confused, revert to Pig Latin (if you can't make the proper enunciation of yada).

And if you can't do the yada thing or speak Pig Latin, don't go, because they will eat you alive and take all your money.

In the meantime, as I have fought the rains and tried to till my garden, I have been accompanied by a ground squirrel, off and on, who scampers out of the rock wall that I don't want to knock down and lies upright on his haunches at the edge of the garden

Finally, at the close of tilting last Thursday, I shut the tiller off and bent down to approach him. I got down on all fours and looked him in the eye. I held out my hand, ground level and palm-up and the chipmunk hopped upon it. He had obviously been caged and knew a bit about humans from times past.

I tried to pet him with my other hand but he wanted no part of that. "Stick with me pal", I thought as he hung around close by.

"I ain't going to New York if I can get this garden going."

Legislative Update

Airbags. They are a safety precaution that save thousands of lives every year, yet we rarely think about them until an accident forces us too.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that the combination of an air bag in addition to a lap and shoulder belt reduces the risk of serious head injury by 81 percent, compared with 60 percent reduction for belts alone.

Air bags are designed for front impact accidents, the kind of crashes responsible for more than half of all automobile deaths. Air bags are designed to limit head and chest injuries, but only supplement safety belts, they do not replace them.

Over half of the automobiles in the United States are equipped with at least one driver's side air bag. According to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, over 107 million of the over 207 million cars and light trucks on U.S. roads have driver air bags. More than 81 million of these also have passenger air bags.

By law, beginning with model year 1998, all new passenger cars are required to have driver and passenger air bags and safety belts. Light trucks are subject to the same requirement beginning with the 1999 model year.

While they may appear to be soft pillows of air and powder, air bags actually pack a great deal of power and can injure passengers who sit too close to them. They come out of the dashboard at up to 200 miles per hour. With that in mind, it's no surprise that air bag manufacturers advise following the safety precautions outlined in the automobile manual. Drivers and passengers who are unrestrained or are wearing only the lap portion of their safety belt can experience serious or even fatal injuries from deploying air bags.

Children ages 12 and under, including those in car seats, should always be properly restrained in a child safety seat or safety belt and ride in the back seat. Even if there is no passenger air bag in the motor vehicle, the safest place for infants and children is properly secured and buckled up in the back seat.

Just like a wrecked bumper or any other damaged car part, air bags can be replaced after they have deployed.

While safety experts and automobile manufacturers both advise that replacements be made with an air bag designed to be in line with federal safety regulations for the make, model and year of the vehicle, many auto repair shops offer replacement air bags that are not as a way to save money on repair work. Like everything else in life, a decision like this can be penny wise and pound foolish if the air bag fails to deploy because it is an improper fit or model.

Unfortunately, the car or truck owner may not even have the opportunity to make the decision when they are dealing with a small minority of body shops that try to shave money off of their costs by replacing air bags with a dummy bag. Even worse than a dummy bag, unscrupulous mechanics will stuff air bags with stinging wheels and dashboards with everything from Styrofoam peanuts to empty beer cans.

It's virtually impossible for the average consumer to test just by looking at a used car if it has phony airbags. Experts recommend doing research, and getting professional advice.

To ensure that does not happen, this year's General Assembly enacted a law - HB 63 - that requires used airbags to be replaced with airbags identical in make, model and year. If someone knowingly breaks this new law, they can be fined up to five thousand dollars or face a county jail sentence of up to twelve months.

Of course, this new law will not affect the honest repair shops. For that matter car owners who choose not to have a deployed air bag replaced. Nothing in the law requires an auto body shop to replace the air bag or prevents them from covering the empty space that once housed the air bag. However, car dealers are required to inform purchasers if an air bag has been replaced or replaced. It is a preventative measure that will ensure safety for every's sake.

How Much Exercise is Best?

One of the most important persevering and life extending habits is the adoption of a regular, rigorous exercise program into one's lifestyle. It should usually be carried out daily or at least six days a week and, as much as possible, at the same time every day.

The exercise can be in many different forms, but it should result in rapid, deep breathing as high as 40 times per minute and liberal perspiration. It should be between 30 and 60 minutes in length. The practice should be maintained as much as possible throughout one's lifetime! The exercise can be in the form of pumping iron, swimming, bicycling, treadmilling, jogging, etc. If the exercise consists of pounding the lower extremities, such as with running, jogging, or treadmilling, then one should do 5-10 knee bends every 3-5 minutes. This increases the joint pressure within the joints of the lower extremities and forces the natural lubricants into the cartilage, thereby preventing degenerative arthritis, the most common kind of arthritis.

My advice is influenced a great deal by my personal experience. Twenty-three years ago I suffered a severe heart attack. After recovery I ran three miles every other day. Twenty months later I was in trouble again and I required an angioplasty (dilatation of a blocked coronary artery). After that I ran 2- to 3 miles every day. For the past 21 years, I have not missed any workdays because of my health issues!

Benefits from daily exercise at 5:30 am each day (in my case) is a healthy heart, a daily feeling of exhilaration after exercise is completed (I never feel like doing the run before I do it), great vim and vigor for the day, no depression, and increased strength and work capacity. The benefits are almost unbelievable, unless of course, you do it and know what I am talking about.

One word of caution to one with heart disease, if you do embark on an exercise program, begin slowly and take weeks to get up to a treatable level. If you do not have a doctor's permission from the start. If the people of our community would adopt an exercise program as herein suggested, plus a lifestyle of eliminating tobacco, eating healthy, and adjusting their weight slowly if overweight (losing one pound per week), then Rockcastle County would be a shining example of people with improved health to the whole USA.

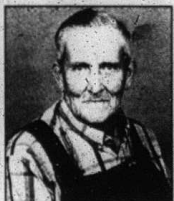

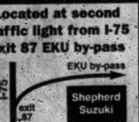

RCHS girls finish as regional runner-up; ranked 5th in state

The RCCHS girls' and boys' track and field teams recently competed in the Class 2A Region IV Championships held at Eastern Kentucky University.

The girls' team is currently ranked fifth in the state in Class 2A, despite having only twelve athletes. An amazing accomplishment considering the average grade level of the team is ninth grade. Both boys' and girls' teams have had great seasons, despite possibly the most challenging schedule in the history of RCCHS track and field.

This year's regional competition would prove to be the most competitive in recent years. On the girls' side, six of the top seventeen teams in the state are in Region IV. Among those,

Mercer County ranks fourth and Casey County seventh.

On the boys' side, three of the top eleven teams compete in Region IV, including fifth ranked Boyle County and Lexington Catholic. Regional competition began on Wednesday with finals in the 3200-meter relay and all field events. Preliminaries for several other events were also held.

The girls' 3200-meter relay team got the most off to a great start. The team of freshman Kayla Hayes, Jessi Asher, Danielle Arnold, and eighth grader Morgan Kincaid ran their best race ever, finishing in a state-qualifying second place. They shattered their previous best time from earlier this season by nearly twenty seconds, finishing with a season's best effort of 10:34.61.

Freshman Elizabeth Busell and seventh grader Courtney Bullock competed in the 100-meter dash preliminaries. Elizabeth ran a great race and finished 14th in 15.39. Courtney also ran very well and placed 17th in 15.72.

Sophomore Sarah Parsons ran a great race in the 200-meter dash preliminaries. Sarah easily qualified for the finals on Saturday with a time of 28.28.

Six-time all-state sophomore Heather Hammond came into regional competition ranked among the top two competitors in the state in each of her four events. She easily qualified for the finals in the 400-meter dash, cruising her way to victory in her heat with a time of 59.55. Eighth grader Morgan Kincaid also qualified for the finals with a great effort of 1:08.38.

Heather immediately followed her 400 with a tremendous qualifying race in the 300-meter hurdles. Despite the difficulty of back-to-back events with almost no recovery time, Heather sprinted her way to another easy win in her heat with a new RCCHS record time of 47.22, shattering her own mark from a year ago.

After the 400-meter dash, no other running events were contested with all finals coming on Saturday. RCCHS did have several field event competitors who competed on Wednesday.

Sophomore Chere's Embs entered the triple jump competition as one of the top seven jumpers in the state in Class 2A. She further solidified her position with an electrifying performance. Her last two jumps of the finals included efforts of 34'1" and 34'1.75". She narrowly missed the RCCHS record by 0.25 inches and placed second overall, qualifying for the state championships. In the process, Chere's defeated last year's Class 2A state champion in the triple jump competition from Casey County. This also placed Chere third in the state on the performance list going

into the state finals.

Heather and Chere's swept the top two spots in the long jump competition. Heather won her first regional championship of this year's competition with an awesome leap of 15'9". This was her second straight regional title in long jump. Chere also jumped exceptionally well and finished as regional runner-up with a leap of 14'7.5". Both girls qualified for the state championships.

Heather's dominance carried over to the high jump competition. She easily won her second regional title of the evening with a leap of 5'0". This marked the third straight year that Heather has won the regional high jump title.

Junior Anna Guilfoif competed exceptionally well in the discus competition. Anna placed seventh overall with a personal best effort of 69'8". Freshman teammate Ashley Bullock also performed very well and placed 16th overall with a throw of 47'2".

Anna also competed in shot put for RCCHS. She threw exceptionally well and placed seventh overall with a throw of 25'1". Teammate Elizabeth Busell also threw well and placed 12th overall with a great effort of 18'4".

The boys' have relied on the strength of a few to carry their team this year. Despite the lack of athletes, they've completed very well as a team thus far this season.

The boys' 3200-meter relay team ran exceptionally well in their only running event of the first day of competition. The team of junior Andrew Nelson and Florian Trummer, along with sophomore Brandon Cole and freshman Derrick Baker, broke their own RCCHS record with a new best time of 9:03.63. Despite their awesome time, the team finished fifth overall due to the strength of the region in this particular area.

Florian Trummer also ran very well in the preliminaries of the 400-meter dash. He placed 11th overall with an exceptional effort of 59.3.

The only other event finals for the boys came in the shot put and discus competitions. Jackson Bray and Gabe Guilfoif both competed in shot put. Jackson threw very well and placed 13th overall with an effort of 33'11.5". Gabe also performed very well and placed 20th with a throw of 29'6". In the discus competition, Jackson placed 14th overall with an impressive throw of 82'7".

Saturday's regional finals would prove to be very exciting for both the girls' and boys' teams with several competitors qualifying for the state championships.

The girls' 800-meter relay team of Sarah Parsons, Morgan Kincaid, Chere's Embs, and Morgan Thacker got the day off to a good start with a

great effort. They finished sixth overall in 1:56.65. The same four girls also ran an awesome race in the 400-meter relay. They finished fifth overall with a season's best time of 54.66 and narrowly missed the school record in the event.

In the 400-meter dash finals, Heather Hammond dominated the competition and blazed her way to her third straight regional title in the event with an exceptional time of 59.19. Teammate Morgan Kincaid also ran a tremendous race and finished sixth overall with a new personal best time of 1:06.02.

The 300-meter hurdles came next for Heather as she sought her second straight regional title in the event. Heather ran a great race and won the event going away with a time of 44.74. This marked Heather's fourth championship title of this year's regional competition and the eleventh of her career. She qualified for state in all four of her events for the third year in a row.

In the girls' 200-meter dash finals, Sarah Parsons came through with an awesome performance. She placed fourth overall with an excellent race and a time of 28.36.

Freshman Kayla Hayes looked to sweep the 1600 and 3200-meter runs after finishing as regional runner-up in both a year ago. Teammate Jessi Asher was unable to compete in both due to illness. Despite her valiant attempt to warm up, Jessi was just too ill to compete.

Kayla ran a very intelligent race in the 1600 and came away with her first regional crown in the event, winning the race with a time of 5:36.51. In the 3200-meter run, Kayla led the entire race and easily pulled away at the finish for her second regional title of the day. She won with a new RCCHS record effort of 12:15.49, nearly two seconds' better than the record she established earlier this season. Kayla automatically qualified for both the 1600 and 3200-meter run championships at state and ranks fourth in the 3200 going into state competition.

Kayla also had the daunting task of competing in the 800-meter run between her 1600 and 3200-meter races. She ran exceptionally well in the 800 and placed fourth overall in 2:36.01 due to an amazing finish. Teammate Danielle Arnold also ran extremely well in the 800 and finished eighth overall with an awesome time of 2:40.94.

The 1600-meter relay team ran one of the most exciting races of the day. Sarah Parsons, Courtney Bullock, Danielle Arnold, and Morgan Thacker finished fourth overall with an amazing race and a season's best time of 4:33.57. This shattered their previous best time this season by nearly twenty seconds.

Andrew Nelson and Brandon Cole started the scoring for the boys' team on Saturday. In the 1600-meter run, Andrew ran an unbelievable race and placed third overall, narrowly missing state qualification. Andrew finished with a tremendous time of 4:49.43. Brandon also had an awe-

some race and placed fourth overall with an amazing effort of 4:33.01.

Both Andrew and Brandon also ran extremely well in 3200-meter run. Andrew qualified for the state championships in the event after a brilliant race and a second place finish. He covered the two-mile race in an amazing 10:36.28. Brandon also ran exceptionally well and finished fifth overall in 11:06.13.

Florian made RCCHS history in the 800-meter run with an awesome performance. He finished seventh overall with a new RCCHS record time of 2:09.23. Teammate Derrick Baker also ran well and finished 13th in 2:22.29.

When all was said and done, the girls' team totaled 100 points and finished as regional runner-up to Mercer County. This marked six straight seasons that the girls' team has either been regional champion or runner-

up. The girls' accomplishment was even more amazing considering that they have only one junior and no seniors on the team. Mercer County will lose five seniors from this year's team. Previously, the RCCHS girls' had won three regional titles in a row. The team qualified for eight events at the state championships and hope to improve upon their fifth place ranking going into the state finals.

The boys' teams placed eighth overall despite having only six varsity competitors. Junior Andrew Nelson will represent the boys' team and will compete for the 3200-meter run state title.

The Class 2A Track and Field State Championships will be held Friday, May 30 and Saturday, May 31 at the University of Kentucky Track and Field Complex. Class 2A competition will begin at 8:30 each day.

RATC News

In early spring, six students traveled to Coburn ATC to take the Ford AAA Student Auto Skills written test. Four of the students were Rodney Payne, Matt Miller, Donald Thompson and Jackie Weaver, who were seniors. Two juniors, Dustin Lear and John Keens also participated. All of these students attend Rockcastle County Area Technology Centers Advanced Automotive Program.

Only two students from the top 10 highest scoring schools would win the right to compete in the hands-on competition at Kentucky Speedway at Sparta. Rodney Payne and Dustin Lear had the two highest written test scores and would be the team to compete against ten other A.T.C.'s from the state.

The vehicle the teams would be working on was a 2003 Mercury Mountaineer, which had identical repair problems.

Ken Fannin, automotive instructor at RATC, approached Fred Sizemore, service manager of Commonwealth Ford Lincoln Mercury in Richmond, to sponsor the team from Rockcastle. Ken Ruhl, owner of Commonwealth Ford and Mr. Sizemore were more than willing to help sponsor RATA. Rodney and Dustin spent three days at Commonwealth Ford, training for the Ford AAA Student Auto Skills Contest, under the guidance of Mark Baker, Master ASE and Ford Certified Automotive Technician. The competition began in mid-April and the teams were given a repair order that had ten electrical and mechanical problems to correct within an hour and a half. The vehicle had to have the hood closed before time ran out or they would be disqualified and the repaired vehicles had to be driven to final judging.

All of the teams worked at a furious pace and the competition was tough. When the competitions were over, the teams were judged on the number of items repaired, quality of workmanship and time.

Rodney Payne and Dustin Lear drove their Mercury to final judging and placed seventh in the state. Ford AAA Student Auto Skills Contest.

Mr. Fannin said, "These fine

young men were really disappointed that they didn't win but I told them I was very proud of them for showing the effort and guts it took to win seventh place in the state."

Mark Baker said, "I knew they were going to throw the whole refrigerator at them but they did the best they could and learned a lot of what the real world of work is like. I am very proud of you."

been received. Capital Outlay money from the state (\$100 per child per average daily attendance) is estimated at \$268,590.

The board expects to receive \$1,223,342 from the state under the Facilities Support Program of Kentucky (FSPK). This amount includes a \$493,434 beginning balance. FSPK is restricted for new construction and is the fund which will be used for construction of the new visitor bleachers at the football field. The board is awaiting approval from the state for this project.

Revenue from the food service is expected to be \$1,035,500. Bray said, with expenditures estimated at \$1,090,500, primarily for salaries of \$507,726 and \$465,000 food costs, etc.

"The food service fund is a self-supporting proprietary fund," Bray told the board when presenting the working budget, "but it's becoming a thin line." Increased food costs and salary increases for workers were two reasons cited by Bray for the food service fund being in jeopardy of being in the red. "We get reimbursed \$2.16 each for free lunches and reduced price lunches bring in \$1.98 total," Bray said, "but we only get reimbursed \$1.53 for regular lunches

that the number of children being qualified for the special education program has caused the need for 3 1/2 additional teaching positions for next year and the majority of this money will have to come from the general fund. "Right now our student/teacher ratio is 20-1," Bray said, "but as special education needs increase, this ratio may have to be increased to 21 or 22 to 1." Bray also pointed out that salary needs have increased because employee benefits have increased so much and there are more teachers with a Rank 1 degree (Masters or equivalent plus 30 semester hours). There are more Rank 1 teachers than we have had since I went into the finance office in January, 1989," Bray said.

Salary Schedule
Bray also presented the board with the 2003-03 salary schedule which showed salaries for certified staff ranking from \$29,290 for a Rank 3 teacher (9 years experience, bachelors degree, teaching certificate) to \$47,334 for a teacher with 26 plus years experience, masters or equivalent, plus 30 semester-hours and teaching certificate (Rank 1). Bray told the board that the largest percentage of teachers fall into the Rank 2 category (masters degree and teaching certificate) which ranges from \$32,994 for a new teacher to \$43,553 for 26+ years.

The state's budget woes trickled down to the local level, of course, and Bray told the board that one area he saved money in this year was by allocating for the purchase of only one new bus instead of the four or five normally purchased for a savings of \$200,000. "We have been very aggressive in maintaining a high standards for our bus fleet so there is no concern about only purchasing one bus in 2003-04," Bray told the board.

Also, Bray said, if a problem arises that requires the purchase of an additional bus, it can be purchased from the contingency fund. And, Bray said, a savings for the general fund occurred when the state legislature allowed, for one year only, the payment of about \$70,000 in property insurance which is normally a restricted fund. Bray also pointed out to the board

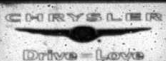

cleftRock Retreat Center hosts mission team

Recently my husband and I had the privilege of going on our first mission trip with fourteen other members from Southeast and Northside Christian. We embarked on the Spring Appalachian Mission Trip on April 9th.

The friendships we developed not only within our group but with many other people touched our hearts and deepened our resolve to serve Him with our lives.

We stayed at a retreat center called cleftRock and this facility served as our home base during the mission trip. This beautiful facility is located about 15 miles from Mt. Vernon, high up in the hills of Eastern Kentucky. Our guest host, Bob & Eddie Fields, greeted us with open arms. They were still grieving over the tragic death of their only son, Todd, at the end of March. He was serving as a

missionary in Honduras, when he was killed by robbers as he was driving a passenger van filled with teenagers. Todd left behind a wife and two children.

The funeral service was held in Mt. Vernon on April 5th. Todd's life was poured out for Christ and the memorial service commemorating his life lived cleftRock County. Todd was loved by all who knew him. He showed everyone the love of Christ, following in his parent's footsteps.

This tragic event did not dissuade Bob & Eddie from insisting that we come to serve the people of cleftRock County. They were such gracious hosts. They believe that Jesus Christ will use this event to bring others to salvation. They shared their true faith with us and made us aware how important Christ was in helping them get through each day.

We ate breakfast at the retreat each morning served by E. B. & Sylvia Smith. These two beautiful people had recently come home from serving as teachers and missionaries in China for nearly a year. E. B. and

Sylvia were among the founding families of cleftRock Retreat Center. They came from their home in Lexington to serve our group during our stay. One evening, they shared their missionary experience with us, telling us how God used them in China to share the gospel.

Each morning, after breakfast, we would have prayer and set out into the community to provide a loving touch to those in need. The days were long but so enjoyable! God was always there, giving us strength to be His hands, feet and heart. We each knew by the end of the day that he would recharge our batteries for the next task ahead.

Phyllis Holbrook, a dedicated Christian who works for the community as a social worker, arranged our visits to the different homes in the area. She also arranged for lunches to be delivered to us each day and we always shared our lunches with the people we were serving.

The churches in the area (First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon, Bible Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon, Wildie Christian Church of Mt. Vernon, Fairview Baptist Church, Ottawa Missionary Baptist Church and Our Lady of Mt. Vernon Catholic Church) provided lunches and dinners. It was so encouraging to experience churches serving us and expressing

powerful interest in our mission effort in their community. We certainly didn't want for food. In fact, I believe some of us might have gained a few pounds. We were all so appreciative of their kindness and sweet spirit.

What we were most touched by, were the people we served. We met some wonderful people and had an opportunity to share our faith with them. We served elderly people, families that were struggling daily to meet their needs, families where one or more members had significant health problems, and people who were lonely. We cleaned homes, cleaned carpets, built wheelchair ramps, repaired floors, doors, ceilings and walls, rebuilt a small porch roof, repaired leaking roofs, built a wooden deck and helped in the construction of a new cabin.

I guess the most touching event for my husband and I was when we arrived at a home that housed the three young children and their mother. She worked so hard just to make ends meet and she needed help. The smiles and laughter we saw and heard with the children brought tears to our eyes. The children were so innocent and didn't seem to want for many of the everyday concerns we take for granted. Some of our team members played games with the kids, helped them to make fun shapes with Play-Doh, and gave them horseback rides.

We had prayer with each family at the end of our visits. They all were

very eager for prayer and fellowship. We will always cherish our trip and the relationships we built, but most of all we will cherish what God had done for us on our walk with Him.

We know in our hearts that God led us in this direction and we also are confident that he will provide a way for us to serve Him on future mission trips.

Kentucky Chautauqua presents: Daniel Boone, Pathfinder

By the time of his death, Daniel Boone (1734-1820) had become a legend, and so he remains. But much of what Americans think they know about this great frontiersman is off the mark. Neither a backwoods bumpkin nor an epic slayer of Indians (and he never wore a coonskin cap), Boone was an intrepid explorer and natural leader whose actual exploits easily justify his larger-than-life reputation.

Boone played a crucial role in the exploration and settlement of Kentucky and the American West. He first began to seriously explore Kentucky in 1769, and, in 1775, led the expedition that founded

Boonesborough in present-day Madison County. Some of his most famous exploits soon followed: his rescue of his daughter from Indian kidnappers, his own escape from captivity to warn Boonesborough of an impending attack, leading the defense of the fort against the nine-day Shawnee siege. In the 1790s, Boone ran a tavern in Limestone (now Maysville) and later served as a delegate in the Virginia Assembly. Having lost all his land, he left Kentucky in 1799 for Missouri, where he died in 1820. Twenty-five years later, when he was believed to be the bodies of Boone and his wife, Rebecca, were brought to Kentucky and reinterred in Frankfort Cemetery.

Scott New, who portrays Daniel Boone, has had a lifelong interest in the Kentucky frontier and early American history. He is the owner/operator of Transylvania Company Mercantile, a re-created 18th century trading post at Fort Boonesborough State Park. New also appears at numerous living history events in Kentucky and throughout the country.

Real Men Face Real Depression (Part 3)

Men often have a difficult time acknowledging that they are depressed. It is seen as a weakness that a "real man" should not have. Therefore, men are reluctant to get help when help is readily available. Here is what some men have said about their own experiences with depression. (Quotes are from the National Institute for Mental Health.)

"As you get sick, as you become drawn in more and more by depression, you lose that perspective. Events become irritating, you get more frustrated about getting things done. You feel angrier, you feel sadder. Everything's magnified in an abnormal way." - Paul Gottlieb, Publisher

"You don't have any interest in thinking about the future, because you don't feel that there is going to be any future." - Shaun Cotton, National Diving Champion

"I wouldn't feel rested at all. I'd always feel tired. I could get from an hour's sleep to eight hours sleep and I would always feel tired." - Rene Rubalho, Police Officer

Depression can be a fatal disease. Some men who are depressed do attempt suicide. Men are more likely than women to succeed when they attempt suicide because men tend to use guns while women use pills. Not everyone who is depressed contemplates suicide, but listens to one man who did:

"You are pushed to the point of considering suicide, because living becomes very painful. You are looking for a way out, you're looking for a way to eliminate this terrible psychic pain." - Paul Gottlieb, Publisher

While there can be much danger in being depressed, there need be no shame.

Depression is not caused by weakness or lack of will power. Depression is a disease of the brain that has

actual, physical causes. Modern brain-imaging technologies reveal that the brain of a depressed person is malfunctioning.

Neural circuits do not connect as they should and neurotransmitters-chemicals that carry messages throughout the brain-are out of balance.

These brain malfunctions may be inherited or they may occur without any family history. It may also be true that early childhood abuse affects the development of the brain and makes depression more likely. None of these causes has anything to do with weakness or lack of emotional will power.

A malfunctioning brain often requires medication to get better. This is one of the treatments for depression that has been proven to work. Another treatment that works is therapy or counseling. Talking the problem over with a knowledgeable helper can relieve the stress.
