As many faithful readers of this column know, in the late 80's my buddy, Ralph King, and I enjoyed a three-year stint as Snow Pea Barons in that we almost certainly produced the largest crop of said delicacy in the state of Kentucky, and to the best of our knowledge, east of the Mississippi River.

Notice that I said we enjoyed being Barons and made no mention of any joy to be found in growing, harvesting and marketing the crop.

During our heyday, oriental restaurants and big grocery stores in the Ohio Valley bought their snow peas from growers mostly located in the cool, damp climates of northern California, Oregon and Washington State and they sold locally, wined and dined with chemicals to keep them fresh, for \$3.99 a pound.

In those days you could go to a good Chinese carry out and order the "Shrimp and Snow Peas" entrée and they'd fix you up with a quart of wonderfully-seasoned sauce into which they had combined a cup of water chestnuts, some chunks of your favorite choy and other green stuff, 18 to 24 jumbo shrimp and 4 painful little snow pea pods all for \$5.50. The same dish, without the snow peas, was \$1.99.

Ralph and I were selling fresh, organically grown, snow peas for \$28.00 a bushel—less than a dollar a pound, and we had the market by the tail. We actually had oriental restaurants calling us and paying whatever we asked without going through all the dickering that you normally have to go through to sell something to a Chinese buyer.

We hired high school kids who wanted to make \$8 bucks an hour and then got to the point that we had enlisted all our friends and family to get them picked—and still half the crop went to waste in the field. Snow peas grow faster than mushrooms when they are really coming on. You can get to the end of a row and the blooms that were just budding out half an hour earlier will have made peas four inches long where you started picking. It is a tremendously aggravating way to harvest a crop.

Anyway, in 1990 Ralph and I decided to go on sabbatical from the pea patch and we have not, since then, seen the opportunity to replant and make a profit. Word is out that snow peas will grow in Kentucky and they are being grown by a new generation of farmers who migrated to our state several years ago. I personally admire them and wish them well be-

cause they have more ambition and tenacity than anything we could ever manage.

Of course the break that Ralph and I took from farming snow peas happened before a single migrant farm worker had set foot in central Kentucky and about the same time that Kentuckians for hire decided that they'd rather starve than do any work harder than riding a lawn mower and they preferred one with an air conditioned cab at that.

Without migrant workers, the tobacco industry in Kentucky would have died 12 years ago. The horse industry would be under similar straits. "Agrarian" is no longer an adjective you can use to describe a significant workforce indigenous to Kentucky. But that does not mean that we can't provide some of the richest soil in the nation to produce gourmet quality crops, help to feed a rising demand for quality produce and embrace the folks who love to help grow and harvest it in the process. We simply have to rearrange and get comfortable with a new farm economy and learn to love and take care of our Latino brethren.

In the meantime, I have harvested two or three gallons of, five-inch snow peas off the vines in my little garden and they are oh-so fine when tossed about in the wok over high heat by the hands full with a bit of soy sauce, a hand-full each of cress and choy, some kohlrabi substituted for water chestnuts, half a cup of chicken stock and four or five big shrimp for flavoring. They are even good raw, right off the vine, and sweet as sugar.

On the other hand, I've had no desire for strawberries even though they have held at the best prices in years because it has been too wet to pick them. I picked enough when I was in grade and high school to do me the rest of my life.

In the meantime, Ralph and I are looking hard at growing brown rice in Kentucky and literally mourning over the fact that we didn't put out a crop this year. We are also looking into growing those four-legged catfish, (native to Florida and really popular with Japanese gourmet types), that can crawl across dry land from one field to another so they can fertilize the rice fields here in the Madison County bottom-lands. People laughed (ha ha) before they became Snow Pea Barons. Just wait until you see what happens when we capture the central Kentucky sushi market.

Does Poison Ivy spread?

Poison ivy causes a rash with blisters that sometimes just seems to keep increasing. Because of this, many people believe that poison ivy spreads and that the fluid from the blisters contains a poison.

There are a couple reasons why the rash of poison ivy spreads, but the fluid from the blisters is not one of them. This fluid is just serum from the body, the same as any other "waste blister".

The damage from poison ivy occurs almost immediately after contact with the plant. The allergic reaction occurs when the resin in the sap binds with proteins of the skin. Only by washing the area within minutes of exposure can some of the reaction be averted. After the resin has become bound to the skin it is only a matter of time—usually 2-3 days—before a person breaks out with the typical red, itchy skin and blisters of poison ivy.

Follen and dust allergies occur immediately because the reaction is caused by a pre-formed antibody. With poison ivy, the poison binds with the skin immediately, but the rash is delayed because the reaction is caused by allergic cells which take time to multiply.

One of the reasons that the reactions appear to spread is because thinner skin may break out quicker than areas of thicker skin. The more sensitive skin will feel the reaction first, but the other areas will follow. Also, areas with greater exposure to the poison will break out sooner. Finally, repeated exposures to poison ivy or even indirectly from animals, tools, clothes or other objects will cause more blisters to break out.

Prevention is the key, of course, but medicines can help slow the reaction and decrease the symptoms.

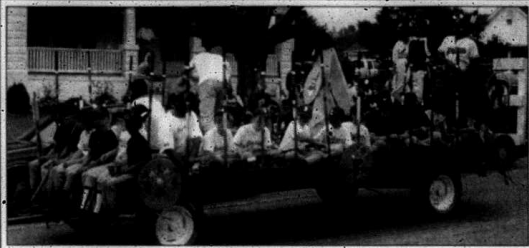

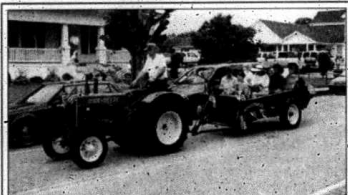

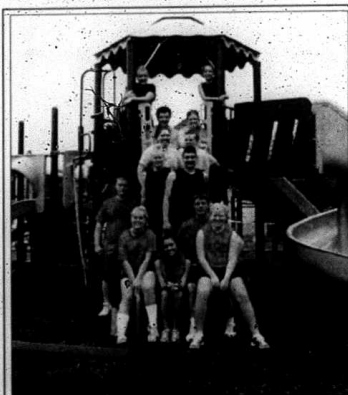

"When a team executes and plays fundamentally sound baseball like we did for three games, they are going to reap the benefits," third year head coach J.D. Bussell said.

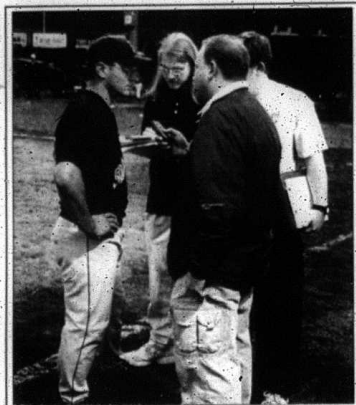
"I'm really proud of our guys but we now have to prepare for Hazard and take the state tournament one game at a time," he added.

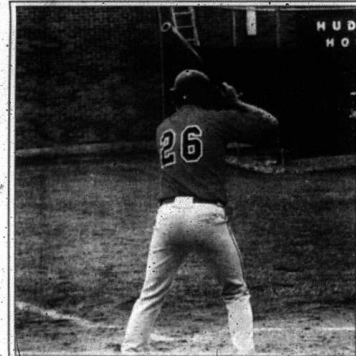
The Rockets have already defeated Hazard this season at Bell County, 4-0.

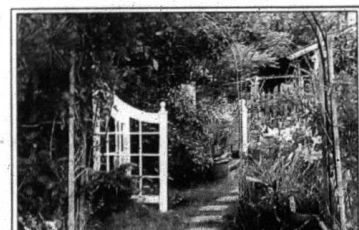

Rockcastle students build Energy Cycle

Rockcastle Area Technology Center students, in partnership with Appalachia - Science in the Public Interest (ASPI), have just completed their part in building an "Energy Cycle".

This is a portable device featuring solar panels and a bicycle-typed system which helps kids and adults understand solar power and gives them a direct experience of the energy required to power various small electrical devices such as a DC fan, and incandescent, fluorescent, and LED lighting technologies.

Eight electricity students and three welding students did most of the work on the project. The electricity students, supervised by instructor Gerald Hammons, were Derrick Burdette, Jacob Cooper, Dustin Emerson, Alex Martin, Scotty Miller, Coby Neal, and Adam and Russell Paquette. The welding students, under instructor Sherman Cook, were Jason Abney, Charles Hensley and Wayne Smith. ASPI's Solar Engineer Joshua Bills coordinated the project.

Kids or adults sit down in a recycled automobile bucket seat and turn the pedals as the demonstrator switches from one device to the other, increasing or decreasing the resistance, according to the energy efficiency of the device being powered. They can also compare their leg power to the power generated by the solar panel. ASPI has been borrowing an Energy Cycle from Berea College (built by Joshua Bills) for special events and it is always a big hit with kids.

When completed, the "Energy Cycle" will reside at ASPI's Mary E. Fritch Nature Center on the Rockcastle River or at ASPI's Mt. Vernon office. It will be available for the Rockcastle County School System anytime there is no direct conflict with an ASPI event.

ASPI also encourages any youth, church or civic groups to call them at 256-0077 if you are interested in an Energy Cycle demonstration for a meeting or event. The project was funded by a grant from the Captain Planet Foundation.

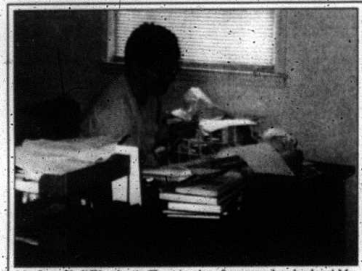

yet but the local Soil Conservation Service must adopt the proposal before the total \$10,000 grant would be available.

Also discussed was the program whereby all improper septic systems, both straight pipe and underground, are being mapped by the federal government through via satellite.

Carolofs said there were 100% funds available for those who qualify through the PRIDE program. Carolofs also said that homeowners with illegal systems were being notified and that when the mapping was complete, fines would begin being levied. Improperly working systems pose a danger to ground water and cause disease.

Magistrate McKinney said he had been told that Sandy Whitaker with the Soil Conservation Service had personally signed up more people than any other county.

Hal Holbrook, emergency management director, told the court that a truck to pull the decontamination trailer would be given by the county by the federal government if the county would agree to provide insurance and maintenance of the truck, valued at over \$70,000. The truck will be housed at the Brindle Ridge fire department. The court agreed to this proposal.

The court also agreed to look into a request by Dick Artley to work on the hill going to his home. The road is not a county road, Carolofs said, and reminded the court that any road worked on must have a 30 ft. easement (a state requirement) and have at least four residences on the road. The court also voted to issue a "Resolution of Appreciation" to Bill Mink, who resigned this week as Chief of Police.

"He did not want to leave and I'm sure he was willing to work for the lesser pay, because he wanted to work in Mt. Vernon. But the way I remember it, I was told he would be laid off by the Mayor and always tried to take care of the people who worked for me. I felt it was my obligation to tell him, so that he would have an opportunity to find other employment," Mink said Tuesday.

At last week's city council meeting, the Mayor said Jones left for better pay and said he should be required to pay the city back for the cost of his training.

As to Mink's comment, Kirby disagreed, saying she did not intend to lay him off.

Several local officials made comments this week about Mink's resignation and the resignation of the other officers.

"Our office regrets hearing of the resignation of Chief Mink and the other officers. Chief Mink has proven invaluable to our goal of creating a team approach to effective law enforcement," Rockcastle County Attorney Jeff Burdette said Tuesday.

"With his leadership and that of others we were able to combine the knowledge and experience of federal, state, county and city officers to more effectively deal with issues facing our communities," he continued.

Rockcastle Sheriff Darrell Doan said, "the recent loss of Chief Mink is surprising and he will truly be missed. I have worked with Chief Mink for many years and his vision helped all of us in our service to Rockcastle County. He knew how to be a law enforcement officer and how to be Chief," Doan said.

Chief Mink's Deputy Nathaniel Price also indicated at Tuesday's Fiscal-Court meeting, that Chief Mink was a future in local law enforcement. "He has been here long enough to know who to talk with to get things done. Whether it was the Sheriff's department, the state police or federal authorities everyone knows and respects Chief Mink. His shoes will be tough to fill," Price said.

Price is also a former Mt. Vernon officer who worked under Mink.

Of this amount, Kentucky will receive \$6,854,500 to provide cost share assistance to farmers. This is nearly three times what Kentucky received when EQIP was first authorized in 1996. Last year, Kentucky entered into EQIP contracts with landowners providing them over \$4.9 million. In addition to the cost-share funding, Kentucky will receive funding to provide technical assistance to landowners.

EQIP is a voluntary conservation program that promotes environmental quality. Farmers may receive financial and technical assistance for certain conservation practices on eligible agricultural land.

"These funds will enable farmers to enhance and protect our nation's soil, air and water resources for the future by implementing sound conservation practices today," said David Sawyer, state conservationist for USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). NRCS administers the program. "Farmers and ranchers are the best stewards of the land and USDA continues its strong

commitment to providing additional tools to enhance conservation efforts on working farmlands."

This year's funding will be available statewide. Earlier this year, local groups met to identify and prioritize the natural resource concerns of their areas, and the conservation practices needed to address those concerns. The state has been divided into 14 ranking areas, based on similar concerns. Each of the areas will receive funding; applicants will be scored according to local ranking criteria and ranked against other applicants in their area. This will be done so that applicants in one region of the state will not have to compete against a different region, but only against applicants with similar resource concerns.

Although EQIP has a continuous application period, cut off dates are set in order to rank applications. The next cut off date for ranking applications in Kentucky is July 11, 2003. Persons interested in signing up for EQIP should visit their USDA service center as soon as possible.

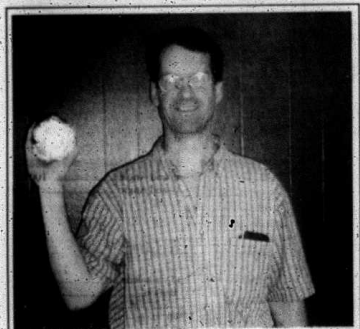
