Fiscal court opens bids on bridge over Roundstone Creek

Only one bid was submitted for a new single-span bridge over Roundstone Creek, just north of Roundstone School on the Homer







I have already received the first

We have had three major surgeries, gall bladder surgery, two kidney stones, lengthy hospital stays, chemotherapy, radiation and outpatient treatments for a chronic health condition. I estimate the total medical bill for my family over the last two years at more than \$600,000.
