This was wonderful because I didn't have anyone else in the family or very close in the neighborhood for playing. I usually had to polish my grandma's silver and be sure it was cleaned well. Silver polish left between fork tines doesn't taste very good. I also helped make beds in the guestrooms, dust, and do other household cleaning. I also had to do the place settings at each meal after the guests arrived, even though

Just after dusk on a hot Saturday night, and in a slow, solemn, almost quaking voice and dabbling tears away the auctioneer begins, "This entire load, friends and neighbors, was imported from Southern Indiana just this morning and you know how them Hoosiers live high on the hog so hold your breath and get ready because this is bound to be one of the best lots of stuff we have all evening."

The man says he has over 20 new kitchen appliances including your toasters, mixers, electric skillets, steam irons, carving knives, along with table lamps and five sets of silverware that came from a marriage game had on the honeymoon.

"Seems the bride was so distraught that she sold him all the wedding presents before she even opened them and they've been stored in her Mama's basement and she didn't want no part of them either so Homer, here bought the whole shebang for \$35.00 just to help them out. And we ain't to put it in your house tonight at the highest bid and everything must go that has a bid." This may be the only chance you'll ever have to buy a brand new toaster for a nickel.

Then suddenly, like a thunder clap, came an Instagt change in

tempo from funeral-last rites to a booming "here comes the rodeo" tone of voice. "So whatcha we got here boys?!! Looks like a brand new teflon coated electric pan-cake griddle still in the box. Man! I love pancakes and this thing will even cook them waffle shaped. I need \$10.00 and I need it now so we can get on to the good stuff. Who'll give me 5 a five dollar bill, can I hear a 3?"

Dead silence. No bids. So the auctioneer says in his funeral voice, "Folks you are overlooking this brand new appliance. Would somebody give me a quarter because we have to pick up the pace here."

All of a sudden bids ring out and he urges them on in gossamer, two and now 2 and a quarter and three in the back and four here on the front and I needs quarter and there it is and now a five---- and finally sold to bidder 121 for \$26.50.

Mark down price at a discount-store with a guarantee and return policy would have been at least half that. But a good auctioneer, and I know several, can sell ice to Eskimos north of the Arctic Circle in January for three bucks a bucket whether they need it or not. You can't fault the auctioneer. And actually you could get some bargains. You still can at estate sales but folks usually caught on and I don't have to tell you about yard sales.

The other way to trade for goods was to listen in, if you were a buyer, or call if you were selling stuff to the Radio Station's public service show that normally aired for anywhere from 15 minutes up to an hour each day. My favorites were Whitesburg, and Richmond and I can't recall the call letters of either. I know that Whitesburg's program was Swap Shop and Richmond's was Man About Town.

In the late '70's I was living out in the country in Madison County and I was a regular listener of Man About Town which ran from noon till one on Saturdays. I bought numerous chickens, beehives, fresh vegetables,

Carpal Tunnel Syndrome

When your hand goes to sleep and feels "funny" it may mean that the nerve to the hand is being compressed as it passes through the wrist. Here, it has to go through a narrow "tunnel" which can easily get too tight for the nerve, thus causing carpal tunnel syndrome. This is more common in women than men and frequently affects both hands.

The earliest symptom often occur at night. The thumb and first two fingers of the hand become painful and numb. A person may get relief by rubbing or shaking the hand or hanging it over the side of the bed.

The pain is often brought on by repetitive movements of the wrist or fingers. This repetitive trauma or overuse of the wrist commonly occurs with certain types of factory work. Also, having the wrist cocked back, as in driving a car or writing on a blackboard, frequently makes it worse.

The pain can radiate up the forearm and even to the shoulder, making the diagnosis more difficult. In more severe cases, the thumb will become weak, and the muscles can even wither away at the base of the thumb.

The diagnosis is confirmed by an EMG (a nerve conduction test). Occasionally, x-rays are taken since old fractures, arthritis and other diseases can contribute to the problem.

Often, carpal tunnel syndrome will improve with medical treatment including anti-inflammatory medicines, cortisone injections, wrist braces, and a change in work or activities. If these do not help, it can be treated with surgery that opens the area that is compressing the nerve and removes some of the thickened tissue. This is a relatively simple procedure and gives almost immediate relief.

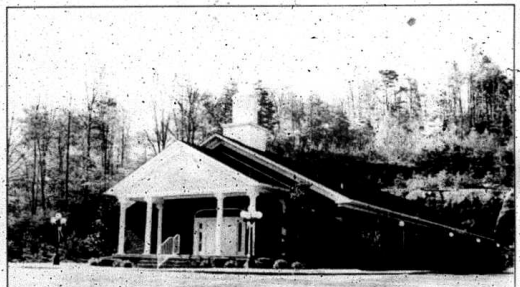

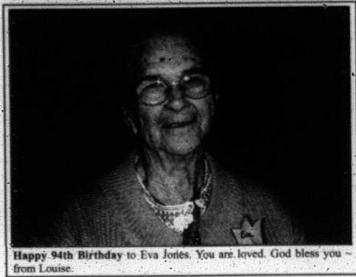

Does Crying Help?

There are two kinds of crying: productive and non-productive. Productive crying produces an improved mood. The one who cries feels some relief, as if a burden has been lifted.

"I have been crying for three days," Jean told me, "and I don't feel any better. In fact I feel worse than I did. Usually I feel better after I cry. What is wrong?" (All characters in today's column are fictitious.)

Non-productive crying is the crying that depression produces. When a person cries but does not feel better, depression may be involved. A visit to her physician and some anti-depressant medication helped Jean to feel better. "Now when I have a good cry, it helps!" she told me excitedly.

Productive crying is a precious gift. It is God's way of helping his manics deal with feelings, especially pain and hurt. Tears help to release the feelings that are pent up inside.

Since these pent up feelings can cause depression, crying is a way to avoid becoming depressed.

Males often have a difficult time expressing hurt. This is because of what they learned as children. Phil was going through a divorce. His wife had left him for another man and had taken their two children. He could only see his children once a week, and it was killing him, but he could not cry.

As we explored the problem in counseling, he explained, "I told me that I was a sissy if I cried. I never saw my dad cry, ever, not even when his mother died. I don't understand how he could keep me that I learned from him that I had to be strong, and being strong means not crying."

Other men have had similar experiences to Phil's. Being told that "big boys don't cry" and being called a "crybaby" teach young men to hold in those feelings of hurt. As adults they may have a difficult time letting tears flow, when actually they would feel better if they could cry.

While men are often told not to cry, the expression of anger is seen as a manly thing to do. This sometimes makes the cautious, and often dangerous, phenomenon whereby a male expresses his hurt by showing anger. The boy who was physically abused by his father and terribly hurt in the process may become an abuser, who deals with his hurt the only way he knows how: by becoming angry.

Females may also find their tear

ducts blocked at times. Sarah had turned off all her feelings. After a childhood of physical and sexual abuse, she had no feelings. When her son died in a car wreck, she did not cry. "I don't even feel like crying," she told a friend. "Do you think there is something wrong with me?" Sarah became more and more depressed in the months following the death of her son, eventually being hospitalized after a suicide attempt.

Tear ducts serve a dual purpose: they lubricate the eyes plus they provide release from emotional pressure. I hope your tear ducts are in good working order.

As a pastoral counselor Dr. Whitehead has counseled individuals and families since 1983. He helps individuals suffering from depression and anxiety, as well as counseling couples and families who are having problems.

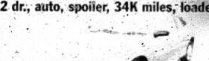

Talking to Kids about the Facts of Life

Keep the doors open. Children whose parents have talked with them about sex are more likely to delay first sex longer and to use protection when they do have sex, according to Advocates for Youth, a non-profit group that helps young people make informed and responsible decisions about reproductive and sexual health. Delaying sexual involvement and protecting their health are very good reasons to have the talks... and there definitely needs to be more than one talk. Talking with your kids about sex may be difficult, but it is a parent's right and responsibility. Many of us did not grow up in an environment where the subject was discussed. Some parents may be afraid they do not know the right answers, or are confused about the proper amount of information to offer. Start talking about sex when the child is young. Be open. Talk about what is right, instead of always saying what is wrong, or what not to do. Children receive a lot of sexual information from media, school, religious institutions and friends. But parents are the first and most important sexual educators for their children. Kids deserve facts and honest answers from adults who care about them.

There are 10 tips from the experts at Advocates for Youth:
1. First, encourage communication by reassuring kids that they can talk to you about anything.
2. Take advantage of teachable moments. A friend's pregnancy, news article, or a TV show can help start a conversation.
3. Listen more than you talk. Think about what you're being asked. Confirm with your child that what you heard is in fact what he or she meant to say.
4. Don't jump to conclusions. The fact that a teen asks about sex does not mean they are having or thinking about having sex.
5. Answer questions simply and directly. Give factual, honest, short, and simple answers.
6. Respect your child's views. Share your thoughts and values and help your child express theirs.
7. Reassure young people that they are normal - as are their ques-

Local resident Greg Mink said that Bengt told him that he did not trust Albright to drive the truck, although he was the city's fire chief. Judge Carlotis basically told the crowd that the county did not have any control over the rural departments, although they had borrowed money for them through the Kentucky Association of Counties for the purchase of the building on Hwy. 70, but he also pointed out that the Berea member rural board was in charge of all decisions. Carlotis said that the fiscal court was always willing to help any fire department in the county if that was possible to make fire protection better for the residents of the county, but the court actually had no

say over what the departments decided on their own. The rural fire department does makes the payment on the building through the county, although the county pays their insurance and much of the maintenance on the trucks. When it was all said and done, with the help of Rural fire department Chairman David Colson and members of the Brodhead City Council, the two departments agreed the rural department would take a pumper truck back to the city of Brodhead's fire house. They also agreed that any certified firefighter, including Albright, would be allowed to drive the truck housed at Brodhead on a rural fire. Basically the decision put the fire protection of area residents back as the same way it had been for years, although both departments still exist and have two fire chiefs.

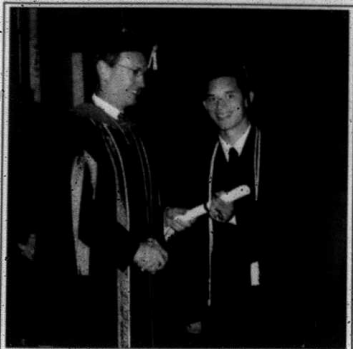

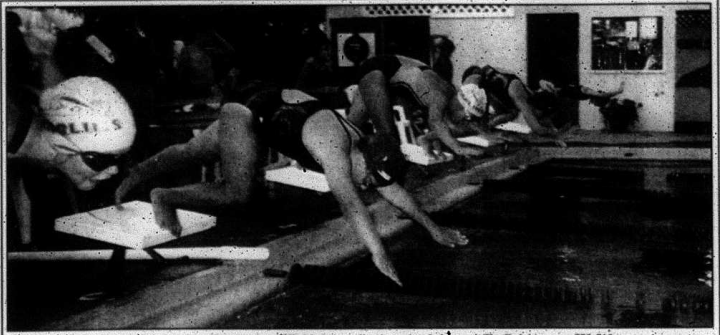
Other outstanding performances were turned in by David Gabbard,

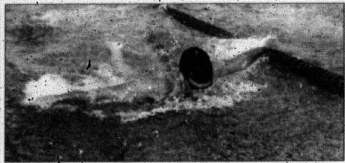
Alexander in 17-18. Cody had four first place finishes and one second.

11-12-year-old All Stars advance

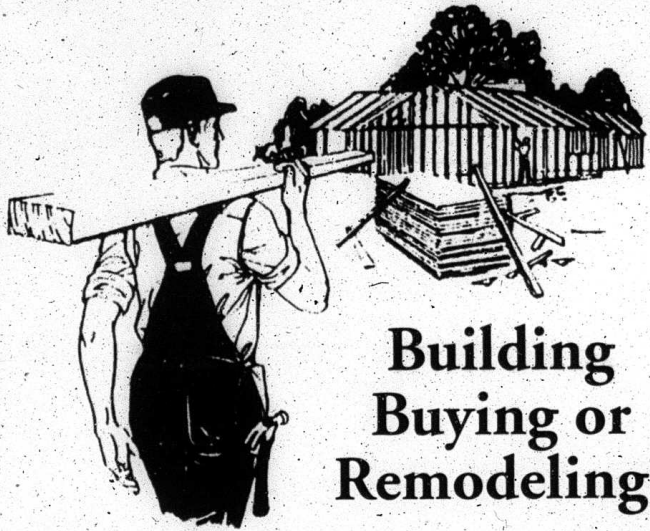
The Rockcastle County Little League 11-12 year old all stars are enroute to the state tournament.

On Friday night, there will be games at 6:30 and 8 p.m., all day Saturday and the tournament will wind up on Sunday.



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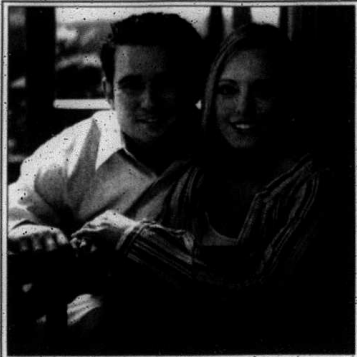

Governor Paul Patton and the Department for Local Government announced 27 projects today that will receive funds through the Appalachian Regional Commission's (ARC) J-1e-E grant program.
 The two-year old program provides financial assistance to Appalachian counties for projects that better prepare communities to deal with development issues.
 Gov. Patton said, "These mini-grants enable communities to plan and implement activities that remove barriers to economic development, and promote leadership and civic involvement."

The Department for Local Government (DLG) administers Kentucky's ARC program.
 The funded projects fall into five categories: creating strategic development plans, implementing existing development plans, building leadership skills and fostering civic involvement, conducting market research, and assessing the performance of existing development plans.
 One of the grant recipients is the Rockcastle County Development Board which plans to implement some of the findings from their strategic development plan, including marketing strategies, leadership and workforce development, education, housing, and healthcare. The grant amount is \$20,000.

Grant recipients are selected by a committee consisting of representatives of the Kentucky Appalachian Regional Council, the Kentucky Appalachian Advisory Council and the Department for Local Government.

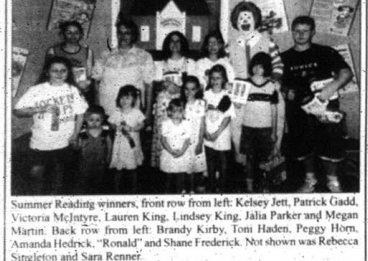

Group from Covington, TN returns to Christ's Outreach for the Blind

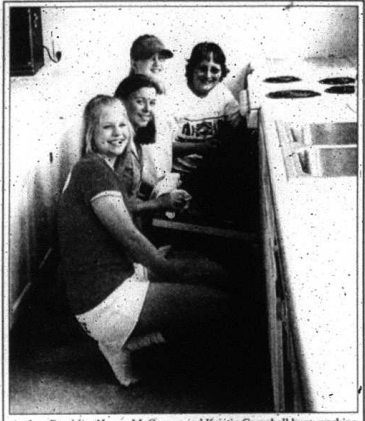

Health insurance paid most of my gall bladder expenses

On July the fourth I decided to have my gall bladder removed. No, it is not as if I was bored and decided on a whim to have surgery. I had my second gall bladder attack on the fourth, after the initial one four days earlier. If you have never had a gall bladder attack, consider yourself one of the fortunate ones. It is not an enjoyable experience. Both times I ended up in the emergency room asking (begging) someone to hurry up with the morphine.

After the first attack, I saw my surgeon and he said, "It needs to come out." After the second attack, he said, "We are taking it out now." That is why I was in the operating room of Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital late on the evening of July 5.

I was surprised at the lack of pain after surgery. After a couple of jobs of morphine, I needed no more pain medication at all. The skill of the surgeon and the modern tools of surgery meant that only four small cuts in my abdomen were necessary to remove the offending body part. Twenty years ago gall bladder surgery required a long incision, a lot of pain medication and a one week stay in the hospital. Today it is a procedure that can be done as an outpatient.

I have already received the first bill. The cost of my first emergency room visit is \$1800 and does not include the physician's charges which will be billed separately. That sounds like a lot of money. No, that IS a lot of money. I know the workers must be paid and the building paid for and a profit generated for shareholders, but that is still a lot of money.

On the bill the part that said "Patient's Responsibility" was marked \$0.00.

That is correct. As of right now I owe the hospital nothing. "Why?"

you ask. Am I getting a special deal? No. I owe them nothing now because I have health insurance, and the hospital will first bill my insurance before billing me for the balance. I will still end up paying a part of the bill. After my insurance company pays most of it, the copayments and

deductibles will be my responsibility.

While I will pay something, I will pay now-here near the full amount.

Health insurance has saved my family over the last two years. We have had three major surgeries, gall bladder surgery, two kidney stones, lengthy hospital stays, chemotherapy, radiation and outpatient treatments for a chronic health condition. I estimate the total medical bill for my family over the last two years at more than \$600,000.

What of the family that does not have health insurance? How do they pay for health care? They scrape and scrimp and often do without necessary care. These are people who are employed but neither they nor their employer can afford health insurance for them.

The state of Maine has just become the first state in the union to approve a plan to provide health insurance for every man, woman and child in the state. Maine is a poor, mostly rural state, much like Kentucky. They are doing the fair thing, the right thing. Leaving some Americans without health insurance is not fair. When will the other forty-nine states do the right thing?
