"A long, long time ago, I can still remember," went the opening words to the song we all remember if we were reasonably young and tuned into a rock & roll radio station in 1971 or '72. Called "American Pie," written and sung by Don McLean, it was the most widely discussed and probably misinterpreted song of its age and one of these days we may even write our own interpretation of these pages.

That was not my work. A long time ago, at least 25 years is a long time in my book, I was working for Kentucky Highlands Investment Corporation (KHIC) in London and a significant part of my job consisted of calling up media types in the big cities anytime anything was happening in southeastern Kentucky that might make the region look a bit more appealing than the latest politician headed for jail.

In that process, I became acquainted with a host of writers and reporters at the big papers and the local network affiliates, and it got to the point that when I called them up, they showed up, because I did my homework, knew the facts and besides that, it was pretty big news if a new plant was opening in McKee or Mount Vernon or wherever, back in those days. Manufacturing jobs were scarce as hens' teeth and you couldn't even calculate unemployment because nobody had a clue who might apply for a job if one opened up.

Suffice to say that anytime a new manufacturing plant (located in the Cumberland Valley getting the news out was not a hard sell if I knew how to do it).

For example, when fashion designer, Laura Ashley, decided to locate a sewing operation in McKee, I simply got on the phone and asked reporters to guess who was gonna be seeing sexy underwear in Jackson County? They didn't even want to see a news release and as far as I know none of them wrecked on the way to McKee.

But my favorite place to sell was Rockcastle County.

I'm not sure why, but I fell in love with Rockcastle County when I first moved to this part of the country in the early seventies. Part of it was the lay of the land but a bigger part was the local leaders who took me in like family. The late Wayne Stewart became a father figure to me. William McClure, Roy Brown, Clay Colson, Hugh Durham, Sammy Ford, Bill

James and a host of others formed the Rockcastle Improvement Council of which, to this day, I believe to have been the most effective community-based change agent ever to exist in rural Kentucky.

They made me a voting member even though I didn't even live in the county and I am reasonably sure that I never missed a monthly meeting over the course of some eight years. I know for sure that I have never been associated with any other civic organization that gave me so much personal satisfaction.

The Council didn't do much on its own as a stand alone organization, but served instead, as a forum where people got together and shared the nitty-gritty of what was going on in other organizations. If somebody was stepping on somebody's toes it got worked out there and if there was somebody who had a project and needed help, arrangements got made. If an industrial prospect was coming to town or a potential new doctor was visiting, (at one time Rockcastle had one doctor for 13,000 residents) assignments and tour arrangements got made.

There's a bypass around town (Mount Vernon) now with a bunch of fast food places on the outskirts of town. But the old Rockcastle Steakhouse is still right there on the hill and still has the best tenderloin sandwich for the money in the world. There's an industrial park (actually there's two now) containing something like 2,000 jobs and Renfro Valley is the largest country music venue this side of Nashville (They don't even know how many people they employ. I've asked.) Big new chain hotels if you want to visit and live the high-life even though I prefer the Mom & Pops where you drive right up to the room and can see your car out the window some three feet away. Still a couple of the latter left.

The old high school is now a middle school and the new high school is right out there on the bypass across from the industrial park and looking wonderful even though I thought the old school was the prettiest in the state. But now the Rocks contented in the state finals in both academic and athletic competition. During the seventies we felt good about the Rocks if they made a deg.

## Acetaminophen Poisoning

Acetaminophen has become the main medicine used for pain and fever in children, particularly since the risk of Reye's Syndrome with aspirin has become known.

Though normally very safe, acetaminophen should still be locked up like all other medicines used in the home. Accidental acetaminophen poisonings are increasing and have become one of the most common overdoses in children.

The danger occurs when infants and young children discover the pleasant tasting tablets. As few as twenty junior strength tablets in a toddler can be harmful.

Symptoms do not occur for nearly a day after the ingestion and then they are often vague, such as nausea or malaise. Within 24-36 hours, the main toxic effect is taking place - liver damage. When the overdose is discovered early, it can be treated by emptying the stomach and using an antidote called N-acetylcysteine. There is very little help for the damaged liver other than the body's ability to heal itself.

Since early treatment is important, many doctors recommend that parents keep ipecac syrup at home to induce vomiting as soon as ingestion occurs. Parents should always check with their doctor first since he may recommend activated charcoal and because ipecac should not be used with certain poisonings. You can also get advice from your regional poison control center.

Always remember to lock up all medicines, even seemingly mild and safe ones, when there are children around.

## Playing With Your Children

There are a number of good reasons to make time to play with your children part of your daily routine.

Playing with children is a relaxed, easy-way to learn about their interests, worries and skills. It's a wonderful way to build relationships with your children as you share valuable communications and fun. Playing with them also gives children a fun way to learn skills that will prepare them for adulthood.

When playing with your children, be sure activities are based on what the children enjoy, whether it's playing tag-and-sides, having a tea party, or blasting off in a space ship.

The more children experience, the richer and more varied their playtime becomes. Take them to see people, places and things and allow them to feel and experience the events by climbing onto the seat of a fire engine, petting animals at the fair, covering themselves with sand at the beach, and the like.

Adding playfulness and fantasy to everyday situations can help children relax and enjoy routines more. For example, make cleanup more enjoyable by playing games like flying the airplane back to the airport or seeing how many toys they can carry at one time.

One way to become more involved with your children is to start a sentence each person completes in turn. For example, it could be "The most surprising thing I learned today was..." or "One of the things I did well today was..." The sentence goes around until everyone has shared their experiences.

Playing with your children motivates them, teaches cooperation and trust and builds self-esteem, independence and self-

sufficiency. It also helps them get to know themselves and their world. Play continues to be

important as children grow into teenage years and beyond. There are many delightful ways to play with your children. A few of these are listed below. Use imagination and children's interests to develop more ways to play with your children.

Play-board games. These teach children to pay attention, take turns and that winning isn't the most important thing in life. Rather, how you play and how much you enjoy the game are much more important.

Set aside an hour or two each week for family playtime. Let the kids take the lead on how to spend the time. This will build on their leadership skills and let them feel like they're in charge for a change.

Have a "no-television night" once a week; use the time to play games like charades, put on your own skits, or discuss what each person has been doing that week.

Make up stories with your children. Follow each child's lead as you work together to make up imaginary characters. You never know where these adventures will take you.

Encourage outdoor or physical activities such as bike riding or swimming. You can join other children in a tennis or basketball game.

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## RHRCC's ED nurses enjoy excitement, rewards of their work

Saving a life is something that most people never experience, but it's all in a day's work for emergency department nurses. Renee Robinson, RN, Emergency Department nursing coordinator at Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, and Judy Baker, RN, said their jobs are never boring.

The two nurses are very experienced in emergency care. Both have worked at Rockcastle Hospital for 19 years. Robinson has been in the Emergency Department for 16 of those years, and Baker has been there 13 years.

"A lot of people come through

these doors," Robinson said. "The exciting part for us is that you never know what type of case it will be."

Part of the hustle and bustle comes from the number of trauma cases that are seen in the emergency department, and there are many of those.

"The true emergency situations we're faced with are everything from heart attacks to gunshots and stabbings to farm, car and ATV accidents," she Robinson said. "When critically ill patients must be transferred to a trauma center, a nurse often accompanies them in the ambulance to monitor the patient during the transport."

Baker said some trauma cases also

are transported to UK via helicopter.

"It only takes about 20 minutes, and that can make a big difference for someone who needs the care of a trauma unit," she said. "It greatly improves their chances when they can be stabilized here, then quickly move to a trauma unit."

Both nurses said one of the most rewarding aspects of their job is when a patient comes back to see them.

"When someone says 'You saved my life,' it's a really good feeling," she said. "One former patient always hugs me when he sees me. He jokes about it and says 'I'm the only other woman his wife lets him hug.'"

Baker remembers the story of a man from Ohio who was traveling home. He stopped at Rockcastle's Emergency Department complaining of pain in his jaw. Baker told him it could indicate a heart problem. The traveler left saying he'd decided not to see a doctor, but returned a few minutes later saying he'd changed his mind.

"He was having a heart attack," Baker said. "His heart actually stopped while he was here. We got it going again and administered a clot-dissolving drug. He was lucky that he suffered no damage."

"I hate to think what might have happened to him if he had tried to continue driving home that day," she said.

Baker said the man returned to the hospital with his wife at a later date just to thank the ED staff.

"That's very rewarding," Baker said. Unfortunately, as in all emergency departments, not all patient stories have a happy ending. For the nurses, the toughest part of the job is losing a patient.

"There will always be that one that can't be saved," Robinson said. "It's very upsetting to see someone pass away."

In addition to nursing skills, the emergency department nurses must be adept at comforting and counseling patients and family members.

"Every one deals with stress and grief differently," Robinson said. "We have to understand that and be ready to handle it."

Baker agrees, and said her faith plays a role in the way she performs her job.

"My Christian faith and the ability of our competent doctors and ED staff give me the courage and confidence to work in this department where I am faced with a wide variety of critical situations," she said.

But it's not all trauma and drama. Robinson said working in the ED

provides nurses a great opportunity to work with employees in all departments and to participate in many types of nursing activities.

"Occasionally, we even deliver a baby," she said. "Working in a small hospital, you learn to do everything, and you learn how every department works. Most of us have been in several other departments, which is great training for working in emergency."

Shirley Wallin Behr is very familiar with Rockcastle Hospital's Emergency Department and with Robinson, who is her neighbor.

"I worked for the state social services department and have brought many people to this hospital over the years," she said. "I've had treatment here myself, and have had good experiences. Renee and Millie Eaton are two of my favorite people."

Eaton is a clerk in the Emergency Department and is one of the first staff members people usually see when entering the hospital for most types of treatment.

Behr said Robinson has been a help to her outside the hospital as well.

"When my husband was ill, I could always count on Renee to come over and check on us and help out," Behr said.

Baker said working with the people of Rockcastle County is one of her favorite aspects of the job.

"People here are very friendly, and I like getting to see them and work with them," she said.

ED nurses at Rockcastle Hospital are certified in Advanced Cardiac Life Support and Basic Life Support. The department employs 10 people including nurses and clerks. Dr. William P. McElwain and Dr. David Brabon treat patients during the day Monday - Friday. Dr. Nancy Antontacci and her Lexington physician's group E-MC sees patients nights, weekends and holidays.

Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, Inc. is a not-for-profit community hospital that operates inpatient and outpatient acute care programs, 60 long-term care beds for ventilator-dependent patients, a home health care service, the Medical Arts Building and Rockcastle Health and Rehabilitation Center, Inc. The hospital was established in 1956, is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO), and treats patients from across Kentucky, Tennessee and several other states. 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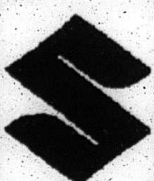
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## Quail Homemakers meet

up against a brick wall and twiddle my thumbs. Used to be, I'd know half the people on the street. "How you all doing today?" "Ain't this party weather" (or, conversely, "Lord ain't this weather awful!"). At least now you can ask, "How bout them Rockies?" and folks don't call the law because they think you're crazy.

Heather anchored the 1600-meter relay team to a state title in the event, narrowly missing the Class 2A state record. She was named all-state in each of her four events and eventually was selected as the KTCCA Middle School Athlete of the Year.

Heather's freshman track and field season was even more exciting and challenging. In order to improve her individual effectiveness on the team, Heather was taken out of the 1600-meter relay.

The 300-meter hurdles, an event that she had never tried, became a new challenge for her. The most difficult aspect of the race was the fact that the hurdles came directly after the 400-meter dash, leaving almost no time to recuperate. Heather accepted the challenge, despite the fact that no other athlete had ever won both races back-to-back. She pro-

gressed rapidly throughout the season. At the regional championships, Heather again dominated the competition, sweeping her events. She won regional titles in high jump, long jump, the 400-meter dash, and the 300-meter hurdles, despite the difficult nature of the back-to-back events. She led RCHS to their second straight regional championship title with a team record of 40 points.

At state that year, Heather had an impressive showing in her jumping events. She placed fourth in high jump and fifth in long jump.

In her other events, Heather narrowly missed what would have been possibly the most impressive double in state track and field history. She finished as state runner-up in the 400-meter dash with a new RCHS record time of 58.96. Immediately after, she ran the grueling 300-meter hurdles. She fought hard throughout the race and pulled away going into the last hurdle. A slight stumble after going over the final hurdle caused her to slip on the balance area and she was edged at the line by eight hundredths of a second. Her state runner-up finish was even more impressive from a team standpoint.

After much discussion before the meet, Heather decided to forego the opportunity to win one of the two events, which she could have easily done by eliminating the other. Heather was more interested in scoring as many points for the benefit of the team as possible. By putting the team first, Heather decreased her chances of winning a state title in either event, however, her selflessness helped RCHS to a fourth place overall team finish. Finishing as state runner-up in the 400 and 300 hurdles, back-to-back, was still an unprecedented feat. Heather was named all-state once again in all four of her events, capping an unbelievable freshman season.

Heather's sophomore season would prove to be her best and most exciting. It was also the most challenging. Many coaches throughout the state advised that competing in the 400 and 300 hurdles was a lost cause and that it was an impossible task to win them both at state. As most would point out, it's so seemingly impossible to win both that no one even attempts to do it anymore. Heather used this as her motivation for the season as she worked every day to improve upon her freshman year.

When the regional championships came around, Heather was beginning to put it altogether. Her performance in practice became a spectacle for teammates, coaches, and others as it became evident that she would have a definite chance to achieve the impossible.

Heather once again dominated regional competition, no small feat considering that many of the state's best runners compete in the same region as Rockcastle. She won long jump, high jump, the 400-meter dash, and the 300-meter hurdles while matching her own team record of 40 points in a regional championship meet. This gave her eleven regional championship titles in the past three years.

The state meet was a culmination of extremely hard work and very high expectations. Heather began the first day of competition with an unbelievable series of jumps in the state long jump competition. She easily won the state championship on her first jump. She finished with three jumps of 17' with her best effort being 17'2".

Heather rushed through her high jump competition to have time to prepare for the 400 and 300 hurdles. She still managed a seventh place finish in the event. The 400-meter dash

proved to be a very exhilarating race. Heather and Farni Akjolie, one of the best athletes Paducah Tilghman has ever produced, ran a tight race throughout with Heather leading most of the way. They battled each other down the final one hundred meter stretch to a photo finish.

When all was said and done, Heather had claimed her second state championship in the event with a new RCHS record time. The brief transition between the 400 and the 400 hurdles was very difficult. Heather barely had time to catch her breath when they began lining runners up for the race. Despite the heat and lack of rest time, Heather began the race very aggressively and pulled away after the first one hundred meters. She finished the race in her best time ever at state, winning her first state championship in the event. She also completed the seemingly impossible back-to-back double, winning both the 400 and 300 hurdles for the first time ever at state, an amazing accomplishment to say the least. This marked her team to a fourth place finish with an RCHS team record of 93 points in state competition. Her three state titles gave her five total for her track career.

As mentioned earlier, Heather's impressive season earned her first team all-state selections in long jump, the 400 dash, and the 300 hurdles. This marked nine titles and Heather had been district and all-region track and field. She also earned the distinction of being named KTCCA Class 2A Girls' Track and Field All-State of the Year for her outstanding season and performance at state. Besides her awesome athletic accomplishments, Heather was also named 1st team academic all-state for the 2002 season.

Besides her track and field success, Heather is also a member of the RCHS cross-country team that finished as regional champions and placed seventh at state. She is also an all-district and all-region basketball player for the Lady Rockets regional runner-up team.

Heather looks to improve even further upon her success as her junior and track career somewhere in the Southeastern Conference.

Heather is the daughter of Eddie and Roxanne Hammond of Mt. Vernon.

"I commend officials in Rockcastle County for taking the initiative to clean up this area," said Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5), who secured the federal funding that makes PRIDE grant programs possible. "PRIDE is based on a partnership that links volunteers with the resources of local, state and federal governments. Each partner has to do their share so that we can meet our goal of restoring the region's natural beauty."

PRIDE awarded 55 grants this year, totaling \$1,949,473, to counties, cities and nonprofit organizations throughout the PRIDE service area. Since the PRIDE initiative began in 1997, 438 community grants have been awarded, totaling \$31,434,533.

The PRIDE Community Grant program provides up to \$50,000 to counties, cities, other public entities and nonprofit organizations for environmental improvement projects.

Three serves by Anderkin, including an ace, put the Rockets ahead and they never looked back, winning 15-5.

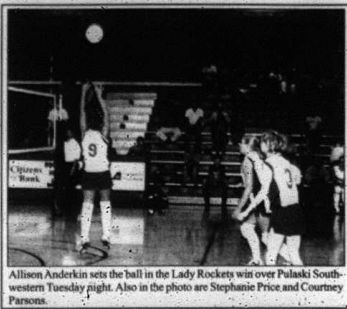

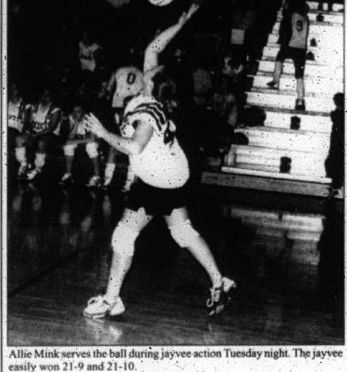

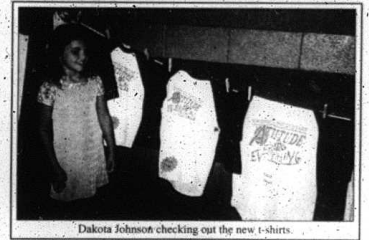

servng 14 to 17 years. But Walker indicated there is some doubt that Thompson has fully cooperated throughout the process, and had he fully cooperated, he could have received a 10-year sentence.

Appearing with Thompson beside him, Cox defended his client regarding his reputation as police officer and cooperation since his arrest. He said there are several "redeeming features" in Thompson's favor, including helping resolve the issues of some of the others arrested in the drug trafficking ring. And, he told Forester, that Thompson was a good police officer.

"He single-handedly caught a murderer...and helped convict murderers," said Cox.

"He's done everything he agreed to do in the plea," Cox added.

Cox said the only doubt in the plea agreement stemmed from a polygraph test that Thompson did not pass. But, he said Thompson wasn't required to pass it. "He's been very forthcoming in everything except the polygraph," Cox told Forester.

Another Defendant, Robert "Bobby" Durham of Stanford, received a five-year sentence Friday for each of the eight charges that will run concurrently.

Prior to the sentencing, Forester asked Durham if he had anything to say about the crimes he committed. "I'm sorry for all of this," Durham replied.

In addition to the prison term, Durham was ordered to participate in a drug education program and must submit to drug, substance abuse, and alcohol testing and treatment and abstain from using alcohol.

Following the sentencing, Walker requested that all remaining counts be dismissed. Durham must report to prison November 1.

A third defendant, Robert Hernandez, was scheduled to be sentenced Friday, but Walker said the hearing has been continued.

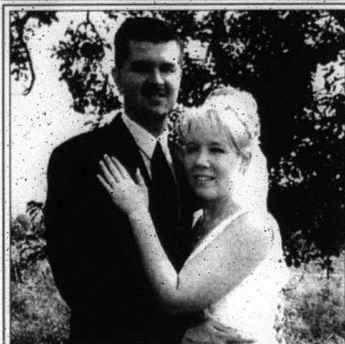

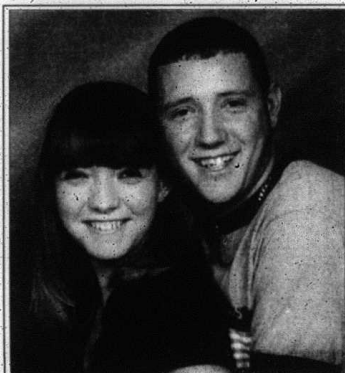

## Agricultural News

### County Committee Monthly Meeting

The Rockcastle County Farm Service Committee (COC) will hold monthly meetings open to the public, the first Thursday of each month beginning at 8 a.m. The meeting will be at the Rockcastle County FSA office located in the USDA Service Center on Hwy. 150 in Mt. Vernon. The next meeting is scheduled for Thurs., August 14, 2003.

The COC members are vital to the day-to-day operations of FSA. The COC members help FSA at the local level by deciding the kind of programs their counties will have and how they will operate. FSA committees operate without official regulations designed to carry out Federal laws and applying their judgment and knowledge to make decisions.

### Deloach vs. Phillip Morris Class Action Settlement

While FSA office will not be acting in the class action settlement applications mailed to producers, we will provide information helpful to those producers wishing to participate. Producers may file a written request to FSA requesting the basic quota and marketing for crop years 1996-2000. Also, FSA has blank applications available for those who wish to participate and did not re-

ceive an application. Producers are reminded it is their responsibility to verify the data provided.

If you need help completing the form, please contact the local County Extension Office or call the help line at 1-800-371-9820.

### Continuous CRP Sign-up

Eligible acreage devoted to certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt toleration vegetation and shallow water areas for wildlife may be enrolled at any time under CCA's continuous CRP sign-up. These practices are not subject to competitive bidding. For more information, contact your local FSA office.

No deadline for sign-up has been announced.

**Crop Disaster Program**  
On February 20, 2003, the Agricultural Assistance Act of 2003 (the ACT), was signed into law. The ACT provides for Crop Disaster Program (CDP) for losses because of weather-related disasters to agricultural commodities in crop year 2001 and 2002. Producers filing for losses must provide production evidence or records to substantiate the 35% loss of the crop. Tobacco and pasture are not eligible under CDP. Producers receiving payments on losses must purchase insurance to cover losses for crop years 2004 and 2005.

No deadline for sign-up has been announced.

**Farm Storage Facility Loans**  
The FSA office has Farm Storage Facility Loans available to producers who have a need for increased storage. In order to be eligible, a producer must have a satisfactory credit history, have no delinquent federal debt, be a producer of facility loan commodities such as corn, soybeans or wheat, demonstrate the ability to repay the debt and be in compliance with USDA provisions for highly erodible land and wetlands.

### Disaster Leasing

Farmers who suffer a barley tobacco disaster may file a report with FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster

lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer, the transferring farm must file a crop acreage report, file the effective quota, provide a measurement fee, have suffered more than a 20% loss and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing, the measurement fee will be refunded to the producer.

**Remember, if you are a producer whose tobacco is suffering from poor weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease, etc., come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions PRIOR TO HARVEST.**

### Farm Changes

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

# School Has Started. Watch Out For Our Children.

## BE ALERT TO VISUAL CUES:

Watch for school zone signs, cross walks, school crossing guards, buses, and kids walking along the roadway. Around parked cars, watch for shadows and motion-signs that a child may be present.



**SLOW DOWN:** At only 20 mph, a car travels 41 feet between the time you see a child and actually stop. If you're sleepy or distracted, reaction time and stopping distances increase. Worn tires and wet pavement have a similar effect.



**ALLOW YOURSELF TIME TO REACT:** On two-lane streets, move as close to the center line as possible, allowing room for bicyclists and pedestrians. As mornings become darker this fall, drive with your headlights on so that you can see and also be seen.



**USE YOUR HORN JUDICIOUSLY:** A light touch is all that's really necessary, whereas a blast might scare a child.



**USE CAUTION AROUND BUSES:** Motorists are required to stop for loading/unloading buses and remain stopped as long as the bus has its red lights flashing and stop sign extended. However, drivers on multi-lane highways (more than 4 lanes) need not stop for loading/unloading school buses traveling in the OPPOSITE direction. Keep in mind that buses require extra room for turning at intersections.



**BE PATIENT, PARTICULARLY ON THE WAY HOME:** Risk of accidents is FOUR times greater in the afternoon - due to human psychology. Drivers are less alert and are irritable after a long day at the office. Kids, however, are excited to be out of school. As frustrating as it may be, keep your temper. Being two minutes late for dinner won't kill you or anyone else. Rushing just might.
