A couple of weeks ago we talked about the sport and sometimes necessary rifle of hunting small game—squirrels, rabbits, grouse, quail etc.—if you grew up in the mountains of eastern Kentucky. Groundhog, possum and coon were also considered fine table fare though I must admit that I never learned to snare possum. Accoon tasted better than meat at all but it was stringy and tough and coons were so scarce that eating one was more of a novelty than anything else.

By the sixties coon-hunting was a dog sport wherein you turned a bunch of Walker, Redbone, Plot or cross-bred hounds loose, chased them through the woods and bet on which one would tree a coon first. Once the coon was treed, and the argument about which dog barked first and which one actually treed the coon was settled, you left the ring-tail alone and headed for another holler to start all over again. If you had a gun at all on such "hunting" trips, you used it to kill copperheads.

But a lean groundhog, taken early in spring before it started fattening up on weeds and tasting like whatever it was eating, could weigh up to 20 to 25 pounds and cooked up sweet and tender. Not only that, but you could sell the hide, if you skinned and tanned it properly, to music instru-

ment makers to be used as a resonator head for a 5-string banjo because it would stretch tighter than anything made of synthetic material.

Uncle Stevie Craft called groundhogs, whistle pigs, because of their tendency to sit up on their hind legs like a prairie dog and whistle if danger was approaching and it was difficult to get within a hundred yards of one. Which didn't much bother Uncle Stevie because he always had a good single shot .22 rifle and, as he used to say, "Why spend good money on a fast loader (pump, bolt action, magazine, automatic, lever action, etc.) cause one shot is all you're gonna get anyway?"

Uncle Stevie could get all downwind of a whistle pig when he found its hole, set up a Prince Albert tobacco can beside the ground hog hole and within three shots have his gun sighted in so that he could hit the prince in the head (smaller than a dime)—with iron sights at 100 yards. Which meant he could hit a whistle pig between the eyes and I've been right beside him on dozens of occasions when he did just that. It takes a fine gun to be that reliable.

Ahhh! Isn't the first taste of fall just wonderful? The past few days have been some of the best since last spring temperature-wise. I hate hot and humid weather probably more, and more each steamy summer. ## What causes Urinary Tract Infections?

Bladder infections are one of the most common infections, especially in women. There is a constant battle between the body's defenses and the bacteria's tendency to spread to new areas. And the bacteria often win the battle.

Women have many more infections than men do because of the short distance from the outside of the body where the bacteria normally live, to the inside of the bladder.

The lining of the urethra and bladder protect against infections by producing antibodies which kill or inhibit bacteria. Women who lack this protection will get infections much more easily. This antibody protection is determined by genetics. A woman's immunity may also be suppressed by diabetes or other chronic illnesses. Use of bubble baths is another factor which may contribute to infections.

Once the bacteria get into the bladder, the body still has mechanisms to clean the infection. The body secretes the fight the bacteria, and the bladder empties frequently, which limits the number of bacteria present.

However, these mechanisms do not work well if there are bladder abnormalities such as a diverticulum or reflux of urine back up to the kidneys. If there is a catheter or bladder stone present, infections can not be totally cured.

One of the main factors causing infections is intercourse. Bacteria can be forced up the urethra and start an infection. It is always wise to empty the bladder after intercourse, and a woman who gets recurrent infections can see her doctor about taking a prophylactic antibiotic after intercourse.

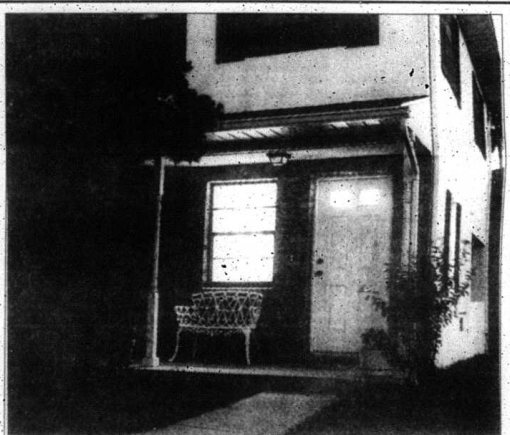

# Rockets lose to Dunbar

They didn't go down without a hard fight, but the Rockcastle County Rocket football team lost their first game of the 2003 campaign on Friday, when Paul Laurence Dunbar won 24-14.

The Rockets were ahead 14-11 at half-time, but could score no more points in the second half on the 12th-ranked team in class 4A.

The game was played in Lexington and the loss was the Rockets only second regular season defeat in four years including this season.

"We are certainly not looking over them and we also have some injuries from practice this week that concern us," Larkey said.

During practice this week, tailback Max Saylor, who has already had a very good year pulled a hamstring and junior linebacker Chris Croucher who also plays in the backfield had to have eight stitches.

"I think they both will be ready to play by Friday," the veteran coach said.

rifles and shotguns that they let us younger kids borrow to hunt with in the 50's and 60's and over the years they've been thrown back in closets, put out in the garage, or stuck in attics. Over the last 30 years I have rescued a few old guns, but I'm not a gunsmith. I live working on stocks and restoring them to beauty because most old gun stocks are remarkably wonderful pieces of wood.

Jenny getting the dirt daubers nests out of a barrel and like that and refinishing a gun to a state of perfection such that the owner would be

embarrassed to let it deteriorate again, but I can only do three or four a year and if things like a firing pin needs replacing or my springs are broken, I can't do it at all, and to be perfectly honest, I have my hands full and I'm not looking for business.

My friend, Budd Gardstein, however, lives in the little Laurel County community of Lily, Kentucky, just outside London. He is the most passionate gunsmith I've ever known and all he does, when he isn't sleeping, is work on guns or think about working on them. I love him so well because he does not think about firearms as weapons or killing devices nearly as much as he thinks about them as works of art combined with mechanical and engineering perfection.

Budd is a Federally Licensed Firearms dealer and if you call him up he can recite the part numbers to about any gun ever made in this country or abroad and he can refurbish a gun to its original luster and hue in a matter of a few days that might take me or other gunners three or four months. If he can't find the part that keeps your old gun from cooking or firing, or otherwise functioning properly, he sits down and makes the part himself.

At his shop, Budd regularly refurbishes or repairs sophisticated military and police rifles and side-arms for law enforcement agencies and converts old rifles from all over the world into modern hunting guns. But his real love is an old rusted-down, beat-up, single-shot or side-by-side double barrel Winchester, Iver Johnson, Remington, H&R, Ithaca, Smith or whatever, old 22's rifle; old powder-fired musket or rifle or pistols that need to be rescued before they rust and rot into obscurity.

I'm of the opinion that Uncle Steve's and all my other uncles' old guns are rotting away somewhere and they ought to be restored and handed down to a new generation of hunters—or they ought to be restored and given to museums or retained in mint condition as family heirlooms. I know for sure that Budd can make them look and function like new including refinishing stocks, bluing the barrels and metal and that he'll do it at prices that are far more than all cost you to restore it.

If you want to really treat your teenage son with something important at Christmas this year, pull off Grandpa's or Great Grandpa's rusted old gun from the basement or attic or closet and have Budd restore it to like new for you.

Cass said there were three residences on the road or property owned by Dick Arley plus his recently purchased home and that, fulfilled one requirement for at least four residences on a road. ## Gillum announces new drug court for Rockcastle and Pulaski

Circuit Judge Robert E. Gillum has announced the establishment of a Drug Court Program to enable Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties to participate in the \$1.7 million dollars appropriated by Congress for the establishment of drug courts in the 5th Congressional District. Judge Gillum and Judge William T. Cain will devise rules for the program which they expect to be fully implemented in January, 2004.

Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers and Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court Joseph Lambert have been instrumental in the development and funding of the Drug Court concept. Traditionally, non-violent drug offenders are incarcerated with little or no opportunity for substance abuse treatment. The Drug Court Program provides judges with the means to apply court-supervised treatment and education to promote a positive life change for non-violent drug offenders. Additionally, it provides the full range of punishment for those who fail to comply with the treatment program.

Studies have shown that there are many social benefits to such a program. Those who graduate from such a program are less likely to commit

The Community Walking Program is for all residents of Rockcastle County who are interested in improving their health. The goal of the program is to walk a minimum of five days a week for thirty minutes. The program will last for 24 weeks. There will be 12 weeks in the spring and 12 weeks in the fall. Participants who complete the program and turn in their walking logs will be eligible to receive incentives or prizes.



Participants will register at the Rockcastle County Health Department. Each person will receive a registration packet and a walking log-book to track their time or mileage. At the time of registration, it is not required, but walkers can have their height, weight, and pulse recorded. In addition, body measurements such as circumference of waist, hips, thighs and arms can also be recorded. These body measurements can provide the walker valuable information and encouragement as you see positive changes in your body with a consistent exercise program. Follow-up measurements will be offered at the end of the program.

Walking will be done at each individual's convenience, wherever he or she desires. Mileage or time will be documented on the honor system. At the end of the program, walkers that complete the program will be eligible to receive incentives and recognition for their outstanding effort!

If you need more forms you should contact the Health Dept. to find out when you can come in to pick up a walking log and be measured.

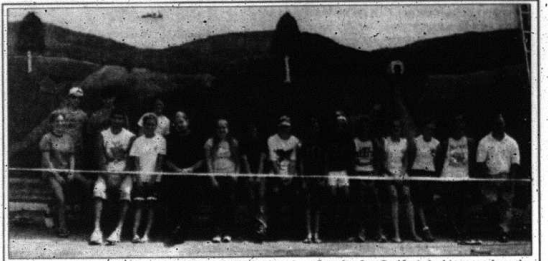

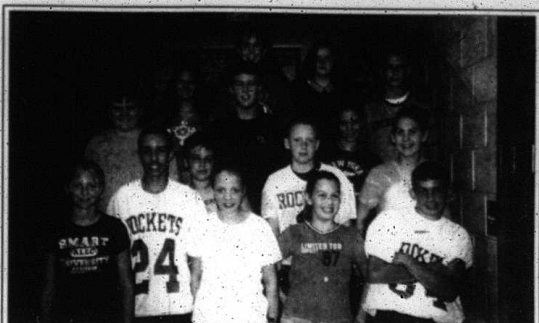
