## Ramsey indicted in brutal murder

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down eleven indictments last week for crimes ranging from murder to flagrant non-support of a minor child.

Bobby Ramsey, 39, of Berea, and formerly of Rockcastle County, was indicted for murder. He is accused of killing Karen Taylor, 40, who was apparently a friend he had met while in prison.

According to police, Ramsey shot Taylor several times and twisted her hands off in an attempt to conceal her identity.

Taylor's decomposed body was found a few days after she had been murdered in the Hummel section of Rockcastle County by two local men who were running.

Dr. Lee Cain and attorney Willis Coffey spotted Taylor's body, which was about ten feet from the roadway.

Ramsey is currently being held in the Madison County Detention Center. He was charged in that county for attempted bank robbery, after the July 3rd murder he is accused of.

Earlida Lee Cotton, 37, of Negro Town Hill Mt. Vernon was indicted on a charge of cultivating marijuana.

Clinton James Helman, 29, of Trotwood, Ohio was indicted on three counts in connection with an alleged break-in at Rite-Aid in Mt. Vernon on August 14th.

He was indicted for burglary, criminal mischief, and fleeing and evading police.

Eric S. Pittman, 26, of Monticello was indicted on a charge of flagrant non-support of his children in the

This year's Mt. Vernon's Bittersweet Festival kicks off at 4 p.m. Friday, October 10th with over 60 booths, including arts/crafts, jewelry, antiques, candles, face painting, wood crafts, pillows, floral arrangements, etc. and a booth manned by the Sheriff's department and Mt. Vernon city police to fingerprint your child. There will also be food vendors set up and pony rides and a petting zoo will be located below the courthouse at the "gravel pit".

At 6 p.m. C.C. Chance will be providing country-western music on stage. Fire the Choir and 40 Days West will be providing contemporary Christian music beginning at

6:30 and Wild River will begin performing at 8 p.m.

The annual 5K Run and Health Walk will be Saturday morning at 8 a.m. with late registration at 7 a.m. At 10 a.m., Northside Baptist Church's "puppets" will be performing, along with an interpretive movement by the church and more gospel singing. The Bittersweet Cloggers will perform at 11 a.m. and the parade will arrive at noon.

The evening's activities will conclude with a street dance with the Wild River Band performing, beginning at 8 p.m.

### Festival is deadline for signing petitions

The recent drive for signers of a petition in support of additional traffic signals on the bypass, will come to an end with the Bittersweet Festival the week end of October 10-11, according to Keith Bussell who is spearheading the effort.

Bussell said Tuesday that petitions will be collected from businesses on Thursday and Friday before the festival and will be available during the festival for additional signatures. They will then be compiled for presentation to the Cumberland Valley Area Development District and the State Transportation Cabinet.

The petition asks for additional traffic control devices at the bypass's intersection with Richmond Street and West Main Street. Also being requested is lowering of the speed limit to 55 all along the bypass and flashing warning lights before the signal at the West Main Street intersection.

## Several races locally

# Kentucky will elect new Governor in November

Rockcastle County voters along with voters in the rest of the state of Kentucky will have a lot of decisions to make in the 2003 General election.

Locally there is a race for a seat on the Rockcastle County Board of Education in a division one which consists of the voting precincts of South Mt. Vernon and East and West Livingston.

Board member Sam Stallworth resigned several weeks ago, after he realized he could not legally serve because he is the water superintendent in Livingston and was a member of the board.

State law prohibits a person from holding two government paid jobs and although the pay for sitting on the school board is low it is still considered a paid position by the state.

Stallworth's daughter, Angie Stallworth is trying to win her dad's vacant seat, as is Donna Hasty of Sand Springs who lost to Stallworth in the last school board election by only 31 votes.

In Livingston, there are two people on the ballot for council seats.

Curt McHargue, who is a former Livingston Mayor, was appointed in January by the council to fill a vacant seat and was required to run this fall.

Council member Jason Medley resigned from the council after he moved out of the city limits and left another vacancy on the council.

Charlie Newcomb, who is the son-in-law of Mayor, J.C. Griffin is on the ballot with McHargue. They will make up the four member council with Todd Mink and Kathy Carpenter.

Also locally there is a race for the position of Circuit Judge.

Former Circuit Judge Dan Venters, who set on the bench for nearly twenty years, resigned this summer, and was replaced by Robert E. Gillum, a Somerset attorney, who was appointed by Governor Paul Patton.

Noted Somerset defense attorney Mark Stanzano, who is a past president of the Kentucky Association of Criminal Defense Attorneys, is one of his opponents.

Gillum's other opponent is Mike Duncan a former assistant Commonwealth Attorney, who was defeated by a large margin by local attorney Debra Lambert when they ran for Family Court Circuit Judge.

Statewide, the Republican candidate is U.S. Congressman Ernie

Fletcher of Lexington and the Democratic candidate is Ben Chandler, a Versailles native and grandson of the late and very famous Kentucky Governor "Happy" Chandler. Chandler is currently the state's Attorney General and has held other statewide public offices.

Folls indicate the two men are in a virtual dead heat in their race to succeed Governor Paul Patton.

If Fletcher were to win, he would be the state's first Republican Governor since the 1960's when Louis B. Nunn of Glasgow was elected.

In the race for Secretary of State, Republican C.M. "Trey" Grayson will square off against Democrat Russ Maple.

In the race for Attorney General, Republican Jack D. Wood, Democrat State Representative Greg Stumbo and veteran office seeker Gatewood Galbraith will face off. Galbraith is on the ballot as an Independent candidate.

In the race for Auditor of Public Accounts, Democrat Cri Luellen, a former aide to Governor Patton will face Republican Linda Greenwell.

Republican Adam Koening will try to unseat Democrat Jonathan Miller in the race for State Treasurer.

Republican Richie Farmer is using his statewide notoriety as a former University of Kentucky basketball player to try and win the seat of Commissioner of Agriculture, but he faces a tough challenge from Alice Woods, Baesler, who is the wife of former U.S. Congressman Scotty Baesler, himself a former Wildcat player.

Baesler is also a former Lexington Mayor and a farmer.

In Rockcastle County there are 9,029 Republican's registered, 2,132 Democrats and 414 other registered voters.

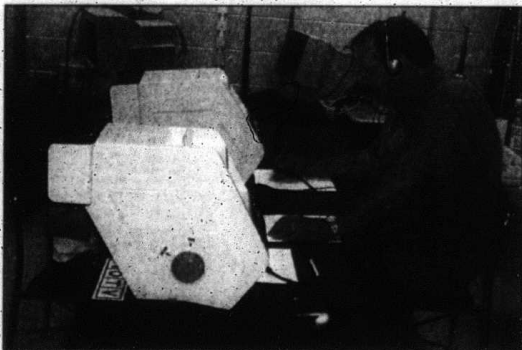

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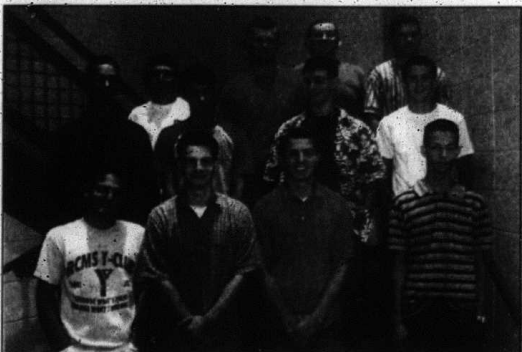
### Positions filled

like that are a piece of the roots of Rockcastle history and must be preserved.

Folks, we're sitting on a 'gold mine'! The Main Street area at Disney World is scarcely any larger than downtown Mt. Vernon. Disney had to reconstruct a town that was built around the turn of the century, about 1900. We already have such a place, an original. It just needs to be restored. Gatlinburg is about the size of Mt. Vernon. Look at all of the trade and tourism they get. Each shop makes hundreds of dollars a day. The downtown merchants, as well as the county, stand to make a little fortune in five to ten years if dollars, drive and destination are focused in the right direction.

The downtown shops could use the atmosphere of fine boutiques, gift shops or emporiums. Of course, there will still be room, for the necessary places of business in town such as the courthouse, legal offices and medical facilities. It's just that their surroundings will be enhanced.

Personally, I have a lot of vision for the whole area. There is a wonderful resource here, the people. There's a sane fine line in the whole country. I know they want to better themselves and have a town to really be proud of and something to pass on to future generations better than what they had. Like a little cafe with such vision will hand together to make it happen. We'll use Petula Clark's "Downtown" as a battle cry.

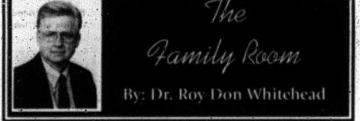

## The Family Room

**When Do You Rest? It Used to be that one day of the week was reserved for that. The Sabbath was set aside as a time for rest. The only man in the job, "meaning" that you had an emergency.**

Families stopped their work in the fields for the Sabbath. They attended church in the morning, ate a large lunch (cooked by Mom who had to work on the Sabbath anyway) and rested during the afternoon. They might visit friends or family. The Sabbath provided a break from their regular routine of hard work. Even Mom had a break because the family probably ate leftovers Sunday evening.

Some religious groups, Orthodox Jews for example, were very strict about what could and could not be done on the Sabbath. Cooking was not allowed, and Mom could rest, too.

Contrast that with the current situation. You or your spouse may be required to work on the Sabbath. Retail, food service and health care are only a few of the occupations that require work on the traditional day of rest. On the Sabbath you may attend worship, then eat out (served by people who are working), then do some shopping (more people at work) and go home and watch the evening news (broadcast by people who are working). The old "blue laws" that controlled what could be done on the day of rest have pretty much vanished.

Did you know that Americans are working more hours per week now than seventy years ago? What happened to all that extra time you were supposed to have because of the new "labor-saving devices"? Instead of more leisure time, you are required to work more hours. If you are self-employed and (theoretically) set your own hours, you are one of those most likely to be working more hours now than in 1980.

Other countries have more liberal vacation policies than the United States. France and Germany both require workers to take four to six weeks of pay year. How many jobs

do you know of in Kentucky that "require" six weeks vacation?  
 Even if you have accumulated the vacation time, you may be reluctant to take it. The boss may frown on it.

## Prostate Cancer is common

 Cancer of the prostate is one of the most common cancers—one in eleven men will eventually develop it.  
 Its incidence increases with age and it is more common in men of Northern European descent and African Americans. It is also more common in men who have diets high in fat.  
 Prostate cancer causes few symptoms and when it does, they are similar to the symptoms of other prostate disease. There may be difficulty urinating or stopping a stream of urine, frequency of urination (especially during the night), bloody urine, pain with voiding and pain in the back or thighs.  
 These symptoms are the same as those caused by benign conditions of the prostate. The best way to find the cancer early is to see your doctor annually for an exam. Of course, a man should see his doctor sooner if there is any change in urination or other symptoms.  
 Every man over 40 should have a rectal exam when he has his annual physical.  
 When a lump is felt in the prostate, a biopsy should be done to determine if the lump contains cancer cells. If further studies may need to be done to determine the extent of the cancer. One test your doctor may order is an ultrasound of the prostate. A blood test, called the PSA, is also available and is gaining popularity in evaluating the prostate.  
 If the cancer is in an early stage, surgery and radiation will cure it in many men. At other times hormone therapy is used. The outlook is generally quite good, especially when the cancer is found early with routine exams; deaths from prostate cancer are declining.

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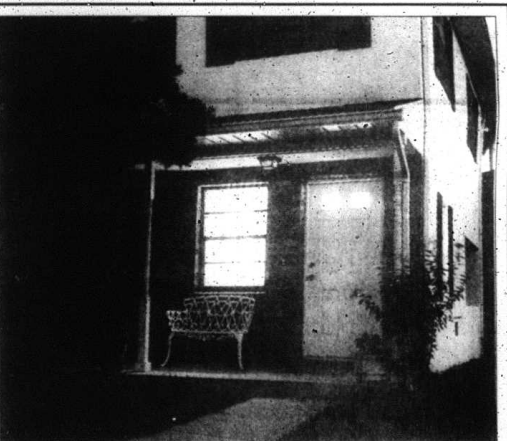

My father worked seven days a week. If you were a coal miner employed by Peabody Coal Company in those days, you had to work their schedule, and they did not shut those big machines down for anything, certainly not so that workers could take a break. Given Dad's example, I feel guilty for taking rest time. After all, shouldn't I work like he did?

What has this lack of rest done to us? We have become a nation of overworked people who desperately need a break from our labors.

I recently decided that I am one of these "ired workers. I am physically, mentally and emotionally exhausted. How did I discover this? I learned it as I have learned many things since becoming a counselor: from one of my clients. As she described her symptoms of overwork and burnout, the lightbulb finally came on in my head and I realized that she was describing my situation.

I have decided to take some time off. After listening to people talk about depression, anxiety, abuse and addiction for eighteen years, it is time

for a break. If you call and get my answering machine instead of me, you will know why. I plan to return rested and refreshed.

Do you need a break? It may be for an afternoon or a weekend or a week or a month. If you need it, I encourage you to take it.

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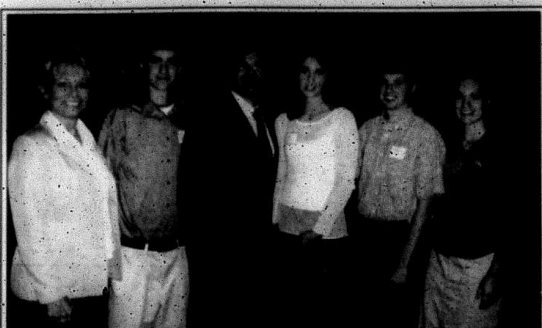

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## Warriors fight hard but lose Rockets pull out 14-0 victory Friday

There are some football programs in the state of Kentucky that are respected and even feared. When they take the field the other opponent knows they are in for a fight.

And tradition wins a lot of games and players in a respected program, play harder in most cases and expect to leave the field with a win.

Southwestern Pulaski County is certainly one of those teams who respect the ROCK and although they put up a good fight and held the ROCK to just 180 yards of offense on Friday night, they still went to the showers with a 14-0 loss.

On the flip side of the coin, Rocket defensive coordinator Adam Coleman's unit held Southwestern to just 8 yards, all gained on the ground.

In a nutshell, Friday night's contest was a defensive battle.

At half-time the score was tied at 0-0.

But the Rockets picked up two scores in the second half, one on a rush by Senior Devin Taylor and the other on a recovered blocked punt in the end zone by Junior Josh Bueckler.

"I'm extremely proud of our defense, who shut down a very good team. Although Southwestern is winless this season they will still be a contender for their district championship," said Rocket head coach Tom Larkey.

"They have played possibly the toughest schedule in the state so far this year and they have made a lot of turnovers," Larkey said.

On Friday night the Warriors fumbled the ball twice and the Rockets blocked a punt, which was good for one of their scores.

An indication of how close the game was throughout, the Rockets had possession of the football 24 minutes and 43 seconds. The Warriors had 23 minutes and 17 seconds.

The Rockets picked up seven first downs and the Warriors had six.

The Rockets were penalized eight times for 78 yards at the War-

riors had five penalties for 28 yards. The ROCK's average time of possession of the football was two minutes and 28 seconds.

Southwestern's average time of possession was one minute and 56 seconds.

Middle linebacker Chris Croucher turned in his best performance ever as a Rocket, picking up 21 tackles and assists on the night.

"Chris did a great job doing what we asked him to do and our defensive line did their job as well so he could be in the right spot at the right time," Coleman said.

The Rocket's division one college prospect, Jason Eger, also turned in a great performance on defense with 14 tackles and assists and he also recovered a Warrior fumble.

Senior Nick Thomas also had a stellar performance with eight tackles and assists and he recovered the other Warrior fumble.

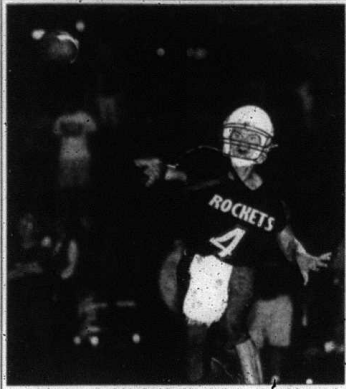

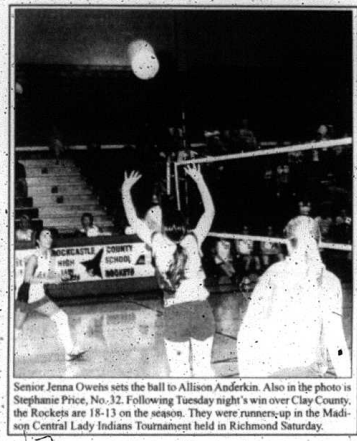

**Agricultural News**

**Livestock Assistance Program (LAP)**

Rockcastle County has been added to the counties as being approved for the Livestock Assistance Program for the 2001 crop year.

To be eligible for LAP, the county must have suffered at least a 40 percent grazing loss in three or more consecutive months in a calendar year. A producer may receive a LAP payment on a per-head basis of eligible livestock when the producer has control of adequate grazing land to support the eligible livestock. Eligible livestock include: sheep and dairy cattle, buffalo, beef and goats, swine and other certain equine animals.

To qualify, a livestock producer must have suffered a 40 percent or greater loss of grazing production for three or more consecutive months due to drought, hot weather, disease, insect infestation, flood, fire, hurricane, earthquake, severe storm or other natural disaster. LAP payments will be reduced by the amount of assistance received by that producer under previous Livestock compensation programs (LCP-1, LCP-2) and the 2002 Cattle Feed Program. A producer must possess beneficial and financial interests in eligible livestock that have been owned or leased for at least three months. A \$40,000 payment limitation also applies to LAP assistance.

**Warehouse Designation**

As a condition of price support of burley tobacco producers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they will market tobacco. This is acquired by completing the form FSA-808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Initial designation will end August 31.

After the initial designation period ends, producers will be limited to designate for the term for any one day during the following regular re-designation periods:

- September 29-October 3, 2003 with the marketing card being effective October 13, 2003.
- November 3-November 7, 2003 with the marketing card being effective November 17, 2003.
- December 1-December 5, 2003 with the marketing card being effective December 15, 2003.
- December 26 - January 2, 2004 with the marketing card being effective January 12, 2004.
- February 2 - February 6, 2004 with the marketing card being effective February 18, 2004.
- March 1 - March 5, 2004 with the marketing card being effective March 15, 2004.

The warehouse number will be indicated with a number on the marketing card. Therefore, if a producer decides to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the

card. The producer must return the card to the FSA office in a specific time period to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31st.

**Disaster Leasing**

Farmers who suffer a burley tobacco disaster must file a report with the FSA prior to harvest to retain eligibility to lease quota away under the disaster lease provisions. The disaster lease provision was implemented to provide relief to producers that suffer a disaster loss and are unable to produce and market the farm's effective quota. To be eligible to disaster lease and transfer, the transferring farmer must file a crop acreage report, file the effective quota, provide a measurement fee, have suffered more than a 20% loss and meet all price support eligibility requirements. If determined eligible for disaster leasing, the measurement fee will be refunded to the producer.

**Remember, if you are a producer whose tobacco is suffering from severe weather conditions, black shank, blue mold, root disease, etc., come to the FSA office and file under the disaster provisions PRIOR TO HARVEST.**

**Farm Storage Facility Loans**

The FSA office has Farm Storage Facility Loans available to producers who have a need for increased storage. In order to be eligible, a producer must have a satisfactory credit history, have no delinquent federal debt, be a producer of facility loan commodities such as corn, soybeans or wheat, demonstrate the ability to repay the debt and be in compliance with USDA provisions for highly erodible land and wetlands.

**Continuing CRP Sign-up**

Eligible acreage devoted to certain special conservation practices such as riparian buffers, filter strips, grassed waterways, shelter belts, living snow fences, contour grass strips, salt tolerance vegetation and shallow water areas for wildlife may be enrolled in any time under CCC's continuing CRP sign-up. These practices are not subject to competitive bidding. For more information, contact your local FSA office.

**Farm Changes**

Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A signed deed or land contract is required to update FSA records with correct ownership. Producers are also reminded to inform the FSA office of any change of address.

**Yards to Paradise**

**So You Want a Watergarden?**

When planning to build a watergarden, considerations must be addressed. First, what aspect of a water feature is important to you. Then, where, how large, and the cost. And if not an avid do-it-yourselfer, how should you go about hiring someone to complete your project.

When it comes to what you want in a water feature, be it large or small, with or without fish, simple or grandly fashioned, a gentle waterfall at pond's edge or a roaring cascade of water over multiple waterfalls, I would encourage future pond owners to go ahead and build the watergarden of their dreams. (So often, folks wish it built a bigger one and end up re-doing it after a few years.)

If it is mostly fish you are interested in, then you may need just a pond, a few plants, plus filtration and aeration. For koi, clean water and two feet or more depth is desirable. Goldfish do well with less water and lesser water quality.

Maybe it is a waterfall you mainly want, if so, a small pond/reservoir or even a pondless waterfall may work.

Desire a bubbling brook or a roaring mountain waterfall. Visit some of nature's best for inspiration. Consider if they could be duplicated in your own backyard.

Even bringing the element of falling water indoors is a real special treat for those who have tried it.

I recently worked on such a project, and let me tell you, it was wild.

Including the deer, bobcat, and wild turkey and logs and rocks for

decoration.

Now that you have narrowed the type of watergarden or its function, where should you put it. Some decide out front for the curb appeal, some bring it inside, but most often folks opt for a backyard location. What views, what seating/observation areas would you be most likely to enjoy it from. Can you hear it from your favorite outdoor seating area and see it?

Or will you build the watergarden and in time put a path to it. (Or add a love seat, or a gazebo.)

It chagrins me to meet someone who asks for a price quote on constructing a water feature to be located where they must go out of their way to, even view or appreciate it unless they also plan to create a new outdoor room for quiet, get-away moments of for entertaining purposes. Watergardens should be located where they will be enjoyed.

When it comes to size, I hesitate to suggest an ideal size, an 8x10 size might be good, or one 15 x 21 like mine. Rather, how big do you think you want? (Then do it a bit bigger, if you budget will allow it.)

How about the cost? Well, low-end systems put in by the do-it-yourselfer method may run a few hundred dollars. High quality systems with state-of-the-art filtration systems may run towards a couple thousand dollars just for the liner, pump, skimmers-filter, waterfall filter unit, etc. Plus plants, rocks, etc. And if hiring a qualified contractor, add his labor and overhead charges, not to mention something for taxes and a profit.

Literally, a budget of a few thou-

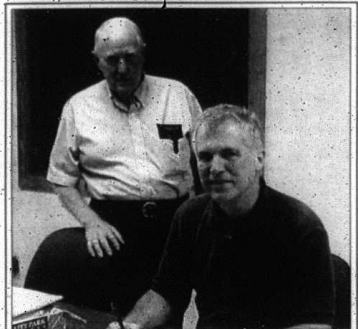
sand dollars may be required. Tens of thousands for really large and outstanding residential or commercial waterfalls, fountains, etc.

Who should build your watergarden? Maybe you would enjoy spending a vacation or several weekends doing it yourself? (If you would change the windows and doors to your home yourself, perhaps if you would take pouring your own concrete driveway yourself, or buying a pre-cut gazebo and assembling it yourself, then a watergarden might be a piece of cake for you. If so, enjoy creating something very special. You will be rightfully proud of your creation!)

But if spending 30 to 100 hours sweating with shovels and carrying heavy stones (about 5 or 6 tons for the average pond) and troubleshooting might be not exactly your forte, it may be wise to hire a qualified or certified contractor.

Carefully select a company or qualified craftsman who will demonstrate his abilities with references, pictures, and some considerable experience in the sort of project you have in mind. He should affirm insurance in case damage to your property were to occur, and be willing to agree to a stated contract price and best of everything to you if you are ready to join the growing number of homeowners who have added a pond and some fish or even a large water feature. Water is a big plus if one wants paradise at home in the backyard.
