## Eastern water tank shotup

Offense would fall under Domestic Terrorism.

Eastern Rockcastle Water Association's 85,000 gallon water tank, located near Three Lins, was vandalized early Sunday morning when it was shot 15 times with a high-powered rifle, nine of which pierced the tank.

Randy Corry, general manager of the association, said Tuesday that a \$500 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties involved. Corry also said that the offense was not being considered just vandalism, but has been classified as domestic terrorism, a federal offense under Title 18, which can carry a 20-year jail sentence.

The stiffer penalty is because the incident involves a public water supply. In fact, all of Jackson County's water supply is affected when the Eastern's water supply is interrupted. The association lost about 100,000 gallons of water before the 1/2 inch holes could be temporarily plugged by Corry.

The tank is only three years old and this is the second incident; the first happened in early September. Corry said, when the tank was shot.

Corry and the Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department, along with state agencies and the office of Emergency Management are asking for anyone with any information about the incident to call the sheriff's office at 256-2032.

## Fiscal Court enters into agreement with UNITE

Will be part of pi county drug task force

At Tuesday's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, the court voted to enter into an agreement with a federally-funded non-profit corporation called Unlawful Narcotics Investigation, Treatment and Education, Inc. or UNITE.

County Attorney Jeff Burdette proposed the agreement to the court and, in a press release, said that UNITE has been set up to "declare an all out war against the illegal drug trade in our communities." "We are making headway with increased convictions, arrests and unprecedented cooperation between local, state and federal authorities, so now is not the time to let up,"

Burdette said. "Burdette was instrumental in initiating search and arrests that have resulted in several citations, and drug rings, being sentenced to significant jail and prison time in both state and federal courts."

UNITE was formed for the purpose of empowering local communities to combat illegal drug use through a comprehensive campaign of investigation, treatment and education and integrate the functions of government, the private sector, academia and volunteer citizen participation.

"Congressman Hal Rogers is to be assigned, to help end this scourge. I believe that with the help of county government, the private sector and our volunteer citizens, we will more effectively clear out the mess," Burdette stated.

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's office already has an officer that has concurrently county and federal jurisdiction. The Drug Enforcement Administration now has a constant presence in the community, and UNITE will further strengthen the partnership by allowing the task force members to have arrest powers inside the county boundaries. Task force members will consist of sworn officers of local and state law enforcement agencies.

Chief Sheriff's Deputy Nathaniel Price told the court Tuesday that the Task Force would be dealing with primarily street level drug activities.

In other action, the court: "Proclamational October as Roadside Pride Month." "Discussed adding constables to the county's health insurance program and approved the measure, if

## Test scores in Rockcastle improve again

Broadhead Elementary School posted the highest index score in the county school system with a score of 101.3, according to scores released by the system this week.

The results were for last school year.

Broadhead ranks tenth in the state and is the first school in Rockcastle County to surpass the state goal of 100.

According to Broadhead Principal, Caroline Graves, "Broadhead is very fortunate to have dedicated faculty, parents and community members who value education and strive to assure that every child achieves to their fullest potential." "These scores are only one piece of evidence that proves working together works," Graves said.

The Rockcastle County School System received a district accountability index of 81.3 when the state released last year's test results. This year for the first time an accountability index was assigned to each district.

"Rockcastle ranked 14th out of 176 districts." "This ranking places Rockcastle in the top eight percent in the state," said Rebecca Isaacs, District Assessment Coordinator for the school system.

The Commonwealth Accountability Testing System (CATS) shows how much a school has improved or declined.

Last year's scores represent the mid-way point toward a two-year accountability goal which is different for each school in the state. This year's score will be averaged with next year's score to determine a school's combined index.

"If that index meets or exceeds the school's goal, the school will receive monetary awards," according to David Pensol, District Instructional Supervisor for the local school system.

"And the good news for schools that may not meet their goal is that they could and most likely will receive assistance from the state," he added.

At one point, a few years ago, RCHS received some help from what the state labels a distinguished educator.

"The ultimate goal is for all schools to reach proficiency by 2014," said Larry Hammond Superintendent of the local school system, where he has served in the top job for the past nine years.

"A score of 100 or more means a school is proficient and I truly believe, with the staff we have employed and with the help and support of parents, we will accomplish our goals," Hammond said.

The Kentucky Core Content Test assesses students at grades 4,5,7,8,10, 11 and 12 in reading, math, science, social studies, arts and humanities, practical living/vocational studies and writing.

Students earn a performance

level of distinguished by scoring 140, proficient level is 100-139, apprentice, 40-59 and students who score the lowest on the scale are considered novice.

Locally, Broadhead, Mt. Vernon and Roundstone Schools exceeded their goals last year. RCHS and RCHS, while showing gains from 2001-2002, missed their goals by 1.2 and 1.9 index points, respectively.

"The 2002-2003 results will serve to boost the morale of the staff as we face the dilemma of meeting the expectations of both CATS and the No Child Left Behind Legislation," said Hammond.

"When the current results are viewed, in conjunction with previous years' data, it is evident that Rockcastle County Schools show a trend of continuous improvement. Consequently, I am both proud and thankful. I am most appreciative of the combined student effort, parental support and the entire staff that has followed the leadership team to reach the current level," said Hammond.

Roundstone continues to be one of the top performing elementary schools in the state of Kentucky with an index of 97.34, while Mt. Vernon showed the largest gain with an 8.8 increase over last year's score.

"The content area with the overall highest score was reading," Mrs. Isaacs said.

"We have had a strong focus on literacy skills, a strong emphasis on reading and writing integration which will eventually improve scores in all areas," she said.

Reading indices are 98.93 at the elementary level, 86.4 at the middle school and 75.1 at the high school.

Individual school report cards, containing complete content area program information, will be mailed to each student's home in January.

Mrs. Isaacs presented members of the Rockcastle County Board of Education with the results of last year's testing during their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday.

## Pipes East

It's dark here now, and has been for an hour on this nice, cool Monday evening where I live, just 1.2 miles from the heart of beautiful Downtown Paint Lick. Just as the sun set I had windows open on the ground floor in every room so the gentle breeze that stirs in this way from the west could waft it's way through the lower rooms and, by chance, make it of the lingering smell of burnt Captain Spice that I have been smoking all day.

Captain Spice is a wonderfully mild and deliciously aromatic pipe tobacco and among several other flavors that I order through the mail from the Abenaki Tribe in New Hampshire. The Abenakis produce a pipe tobacco, grown, I'm told, there on the reservation, that is unsmoked in taste and texture and it lights and burns more smoothly and evenly than any tobacco I've ever smoked. It hasn't crossed my mind to buy pipe tobacco from anybody else in years because nothing on the market quite compares in terms of taste and absolute quality. World class is an understatement. But best of all, the price is right.

The Abenakis apparently have a distaste for and refuse to be hindered by the taxes that the rest of the world attaches to tobacco. Two heavy (gen-

erous) and perfectly humidified ounces of any of their many blends (packed and shipped in a common ziplock bag) provides me several days of pleasure. A two-ounce pack will fill my pipe bowl 15 or 20 times and each bowl will burn for at least two hours if I'm not greedy and half a day if I'm only puffing now and then and the last puff always tastes as good as the first.

If you are a pipe smoker, drop a card in the mail to Abenaki Tobacco, PO Box 989 Country, NH 03318 and ask for a price list. Or go online to: www.tobaccoforpipes.com.

But if I walked out on my front porch to smoke my pipe right now and prepped my carcase down in the swing the way I like to, I'd have to take a carton of firecrackers or a 25 rifle if I intended to enjoy myself.

You see, I am surrounded by neighbors who love dogs and apparently love to hear them bark their fool heads off as much as I love to smoke, my pipe in the peace and quiet of the evening. Problem is that we have no peace and quiet here on the Lowell Branch suburb of our favorite city. What we have is several hundred dogs who sit on front porches, heads out the bedroom window, penned in

small fenced lots, tied to stakes out back or just let loose to roam the neighborhood and about an hour after the sun goes down every damn dog for several square miles tries to outbark his neighbor.

I have neighbors who can't bear-it-thunder because they have stuffed cotton in their ears because their dogs are barking on the front porch or in the back yard so loud that their windows have to rattle and the doors shaking—I'm talking half a mile or more away from my house and someone they sleep through it.

I have an outside dog (Ole Blue). He sleeps on the front porch. He howls when an ambulance goes by with the siren on up on the main road, half a mile away, because it hurts his ears, and I leave him alone in those circumstances. When it occurs to him to bark more than one yelp to hear his head rattle the way that most idiot dogs do here in the neighborhood, all I have to do is yell one time. It's like turning off a radio.

I wish my neighbors appreciated peace and quite as much as I do. If they can't train their dogs to stop barking, give me a call. I'll shoot em if they'll bury em.

In the meantime, Paint Lick is the place to be this weekend!! Villagefest 2003 complete with numerous sidewalk artisans, Chinese raffle, a host of folk-craft vendors, knife traders, live chickens, food to die for, elbow-to-elbow camaraderie with your friends and all of us locals, super deals galore, a huge raffle and a chance to block the road! Just find Paint Lick on the map and come out and join us. If you are in a hurry, take the long way home. Did I say raffle? Twenty five cents could win you a gas grill. A buck will get you a cup of coffee and a fresh fried apple pie.

And if you want a friendly barking dog, this may be the best chance you'll ever have to pick one up off the street. Someone will help you load it for free.

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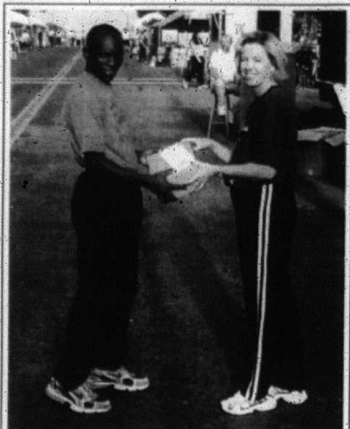

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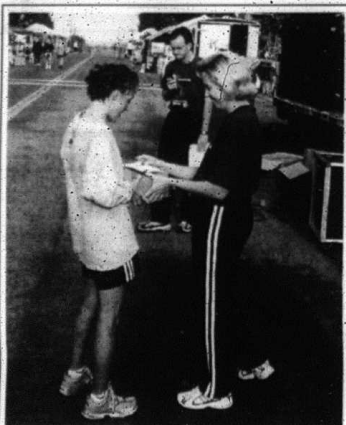

from the Native Americans. If you haven't guessed by now, I'm very sympathetic to these people, as I am one-fourth Native American. My family on my father's side, the Oxtordlines, go all the way back to a Sir Simon Oxtordline who lived in the early 1600s in Yorkshire, England. By the way, Pocahontas was taken back to England and hailed as a heroine from America. She couldn't tolerate the damp, foggy weather, however, and died of tuberculosis. She was buried in England. That's enough about history for now, but I do like to set the record straight where and whenever I can.

Stanley and I enjoyed the Native American festival. We sat inside the Sacred Circle, and watched the dancers put on a really good show. They were dressed in authentic regalia and danced as their ancestors did hundreds of years ago. They had a very good food drum, also. I can't wait to get my own regalia. I've wanted some for years. I attended my first powwow about ten years ago in Lumberton, North Carolina and it was a real spectacle. If I can ever get enough time and money, I would like to travel the powwow circuit for a few years.

I got several souvenirs, as did Stanley at the festival. One souvenir was sage. The Native Americans use sage not only for cooking but to burn in a smudge pot to cleanse from evil spirits, to prepare for a ceremony, or before meditation. They use the leaves before they are ground. Sage

is one of the four sacred plants. The others are tobacco, sweet grass, and cedar. The sage is used to bless an object or a person. In order to do this, one lets the smoke from the burning sage surround the thing to be blessed. This puts a whole new twist to making dressing at Thanksgiving, doesn't it?

I, like so many Americans, can trace my roots back to a rich heritage of Native American descent. It's to these brothers and sisters that I pay tribute. I know we are a proud people, and will contribute to the betterment of our Motherland for many centuries.

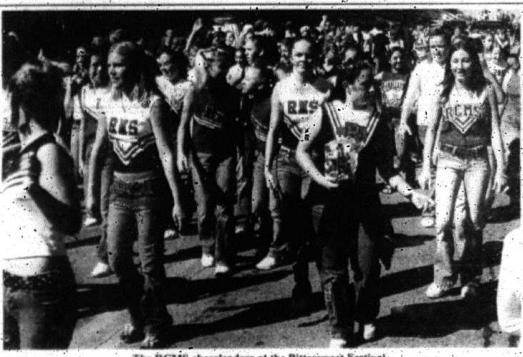

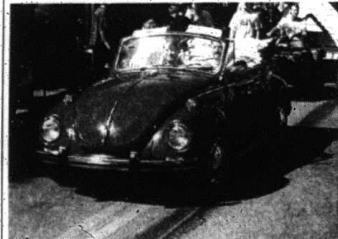

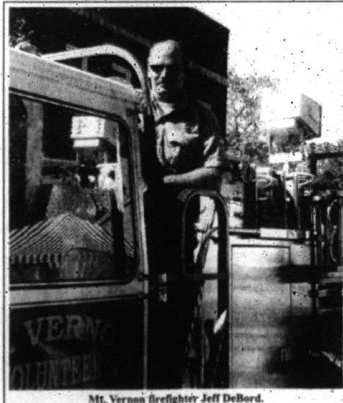

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# Lady Rockets take 13th Region volleyball title with win over Clay

*Title is first ever for sport*

The Rockcastle Lady Rockets volleyball team, in only their third year of existence, held sway over the Clay County Lady Tigers in the finals of the 13th Regional tournament Tuesday night to capture the school's first ever regional title.

It was a tough match for the Rockets who, after losing the first game, 16-25, and saw a 20-12 lead in the second game, respond to a 24-24 tie. The Lady Tigers were then called for being in the net and Jenna Owens came through with a winning serve that the Lady Tigers couldn't keep in bounds on the return. In that game, Amanda Rogers provided a real boost for her team, putting scores six straight serves and giving her team a 12-3 lead. Rogers also added two more winning serves late in the game.

This brought on the deciding third game and the Rocket were determined, taking the win 15-8 behind four strong serves, by Rachel Childress to put her team up for good. Rogers added three winners and Owens one.

In the match, Rogers led in service winners with 11. Childress got seven, including one ace. Owens accounted for seven. Price got two with one ace and Krystal Parsons and Allison Anderkin each were credited with two service winners and Jeni Durban got one. Defensively, the Rockets were led by Anderkin with four kills. Price got three and a block. Childress got two kills. Jessica Riddle one and Sarah Mullins was credited with one kill and a block.

Earlier in the night, the Rockets had easily dispatched Everts, winners in their district, 25-8 and 25-9. The Rockets were down 4-3 in the first game when Owens stepped up with 17 straight serves, including three aces to give her team a 21-

4 edge enroute to the big win.

Anderkin came through in the second game with seven straight serves, six of them aces and Childrens followed with three to tie the Rockets at only 12-11 lead and the eventual 25-9 win.

In that match, Owens led in serving with 17 and had seven aces and Mullins led defensively with three kills.

The Rockets advanced to final action on Tuesday night with a big win Monday night over Whitney County.

The Rockets seem to play best from a catch-up position and that exactly what they had to do against the Lady Colonels after losing the first game 21-25. But catch-up they did with wins in the final two games of 25-17 and 15-2.

Children took service honors in that match with 14, including three aces. Anderkin had 13 and three. Parsons was six and two Owens got five winners across. Riddle led defensively with 10 kills. Childrens had eight; Price and Mullins had three each and Mullins was credited with a block and Anderkin had two kills.

Named to the regional all-tournament team for the Rockets were: Rachel Childress, Jessica Riddle, and Jenna Owens and Allison Anderkin named MVP of the tournament.

The Rockets will play the opening match of the state tournament, scheduled at the Farnham-Dudgeon Civic Center in Frankfort, on Friday night, October 24th at 6 p.m.

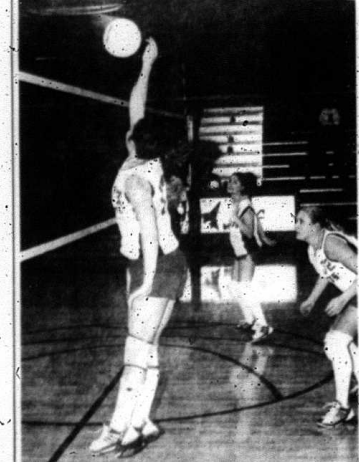

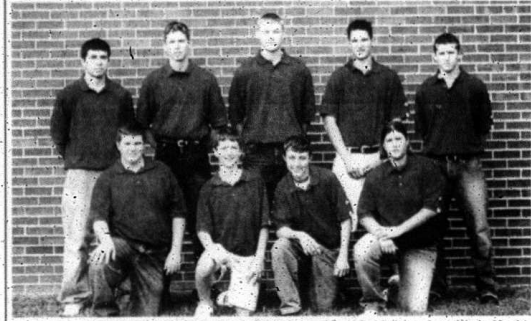

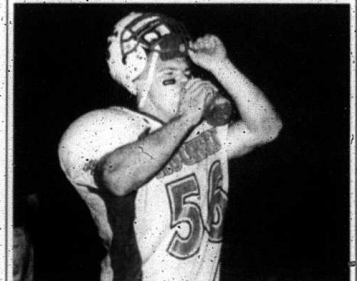
Nick Thomas had two tackles and Devin Bussell one. Bussell also suffered a high ankle sprain and will likely be out three to four weeks.

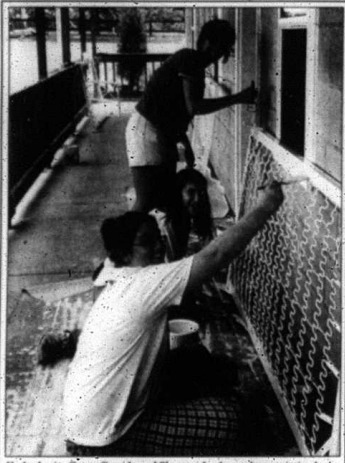

# Chance of Rain 30%... What Does it Mean?

There is a joke among meteorologists that says: "If there are 10 forecasters in a room, and three think it might rain, and the other seven don't, then you have a 30% chance for the day."

Probability of precipitation, given in a percentage chance, is actually figured out a little differently. It is a little difficult to explain, but by the end of this article, you might find it a little easier to understand. The 30% probability of rain literally means that you have a three out of 10 chance of measurable rain at any given point within the forecast area. Huh??

OK, let's pretend that you have kept records at your house every day for 100 days and each day has a 30% chance of rain in the forecast. During the 100 day period, you should have logged 30 days of measurable rain, leaving the other 70 days rain-free. This is fairly straightforward, as it clearly shows a better picture of the probability forecast, but it also underlines a perception problem in understanding the forecast.

In this same scenario, even though the forecast has been verified, it appears to have been wrong for each of those 100 days. This is one of the problems faced by a forecaster with every probability forecast made. For 30 of those logged weather days, you recorded measurable rainfall, meaning that it rained. To you, it was not a 30% chance; it was a full 100% because it rained on those days. The other 70 days did not have 30% because no rain occurred, so to you, it was 0%.

Sometimes there is a clearly defined front system with a relatively narrow band of precipitation that accompanies it. In this case, the forecast can be more specific due to timing the weather system and the forecast might read: "Cloudy this morning with 70% chance of showers; clearing by this afternoon." It is easier to understand that the morning hours will have some periods of rain off and on, and expect to see sunshine by the afternoon. But what about the usual summertime forecast that reads, "Partly cloudy with a 40%

chance of afternoon thunderstorms."

To better visualize this scenario, consider this analogy. You are going to put a pot of water on the stove and turn on the burner, but only for a given time. If you leave the burner on long enough, you can reasonably expect to see bubbles rise as the water begins to boil. That is what the meteorologist expects. The atmosphere is the pot of water, and the sun is the burner on the stove. If there is enough moisture in the atmosphere, and it is heated enough during the day, the moisture will begin to condense and to "boil" within the depth of a thunderstorm cloud.

Back to our scenario, as you watch your pot of water on the stove, do you know exactly where, within this pot, the first bubbles will appear?

The whole pot of water has the potential to boil, but if the heat is turned off, not all of this potential will be reached. Some bubbles will rise, but not uniformly. As the meteorologist watches the day progress into the heat of a summertime afternoon, scattered showers begin to grow into thunderstorms. But as evening approaches, the energy source is cut off, so the atmosphere does not reach its full potential. Again, over a given area, 40% on this afternoon got rain, and 60% did not, and each group felt that the forecast was wrong.

Today, there are so many resources to use that will enhance the traditional forecast. One of the easiest ways to check the weather radar. Once a mystery to the majority of the population, radar images are easily understood by everyone, at least to the degree of being able to tell where rain is, and where it isn't, and where it is moving to.

Twenty-four hour coverage is available via the Internet for the National Weather Service office here in Jackson. A quick glance of the radar, along with checking the wealth of other information available, will let you assign your own judgment to the daily forecast. ## Camp Wildcat reenactment takes place October 17-19

The Battle of Camp Wildcat Civil War Reenactment will take place October 17-19 near London. The reenactment is coordinated by the Laurel Home Guard, the organization which has planned the event since 1989.

This year's event will be co-hosted by the First Cavalry, U.S.A. and Morgan's Second Artillery U.S.A., and will be held on a portion of the original Confederate encampment about eight miles north of London off Hazel Patch Road.

Justin Westerfield, president of the Laurel Home Guard, said this promises to be the biggest Camp Wildcat Reenactment to date. Westerfield said she has received registrations for 15 cannons, 44 cavalry, 100 infantry, 40 civilians, two sergeants, a chaplain and eight sitters. Union President Abraham Lincoln and Confederate President Jefferson Davis will also make celebrity guest appearances at the event. The Civil War era presidents are portrayed by Jim Sayre and Cliff Howard, respectively.

Friday, Oct. 17 is "School Day." The camp is closed to the public, but will host 1,150 elementary, junior high and high school students from area schools. The students will observe period craft demonstrations and talk with reenactors about military and civilian life during the 1860s.

The camp is open to the public from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturday

and Sunday, Oct. 18 and 19. Visitors can walk through the Confederate and Union encampments and observe military and civilian demonstrations, ladies social events, historic speakers, a period church service and other 1860s era activities between 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. each day.

Battle reenactments will be fought at 2:30 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday. A memorial service will be held at 4:15 p.m. on Saturday at the original battle site on the mountain.

The reenactment event and activities are free and open to the public. Donations are gratefully accepted. Concession will be available.

Directions to the reenactment site: Take Exit 49 off Interstate 75. This is the Livingston Exit, Hwy. 909. Southbound travelers turn left onto Hwy. 909 and go over the interstate; northbound travelers turn right onto Hwy. 909. Travel 6 miles on Hwy. 909 to U.S. 25. Turn right (south) onto Hazel Patch Road (look for the "CW" sign). Parking for the reenactment is on the left, approximately 0.2 miles from U.S. 25 on Hazel Patch Road.

## Basketmaker Janet Northern to demonstrate at New Center

On Saturday, October 18th, basketmaker Janet Northern of Mt. Vernon will be demonstrating how she makes honeysuckle baskets from 10:30 am - 3:30 pm at the newly opened Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea.

Janet Northern has been making baskets for 18 years, and is self taught. She utilizes the wood and natural vines that she finds in the region surrounding her Rockcastle County farm. The Eastern Kentucky woodlands give Janet inspiration as well as material from which to work.

Starting from a piece of wood, Janet begins to design her asymmetri-

cal one-of-a-kind basket forms. To prepare the honeysuckle vines, Janet boils the vines for 30 minutes and then strips off the outer bark to reveal the honey colored, pliable surface of the vine. When the vines are freshly cut they are pliable, but after time they need to be soaked in water to soften them. Janet's smaller baskets are often made with reed and drywood.

Visit the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea on Saturday, October 18th from 10:30 am - 3:30 pm to see Janet Northern of Mt. Vernon demonstrate basketmaking and talk about the process.

The Center's exhibit and travel information area, shop, and restaurant are all open daily from 8 am to 8 pm, and admission is free.
