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Stumping for Fletcher President Bush to be in London

U.S. President George W. Bush is scheduled to attend a Republican Party political rally in London Saturday evening.

Bush is slated to arrive at the London-Corbin Airport from Paducah about 5:25 p.m., Nov. 1, the second stop in a last minute campaign push on behalf of GOP gubernatorial candidate Ernie Fletcher, who represents Kentucky's Sixth Congressional District.

It will mark the second time in a month that Bush has visited the Commonwealth to stump for Fletcher who faces Democrat Ben Chandler, the current state attorney general.

Regional coordinator for Fletcher's campaign, State Representative Danny Ford of Mt. Vernon, said Tuesday he was grateful for the President's appearance. "Ernie Fletcher is a very good person who will make a great governor. He will have everybody's interest at heart when he is elected," Ford said.

Ford served with Fletcher in the Ky. House and Fletcher is currently serving as a U.S. Congressman and resides in Lexington.

Tickets will be needed to attend the rally, Ford said and they are free, but will be limited. Approximately 10,000 tickets are expected to be made available throughout the 29 counties comprising the Fifth Congressional District of Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers.

No specifics on the President's visit have been formally announced, a spokesman in the White House's Media Affairs office said Monday.

On Friday, however, White House spokesman Taylor Gross said, "The President looks forward to returning to Kentucky and campaigning with Rep. Fletcher, whom the President knows will represent the people of Kentucky well as their next governor."

Largest ticket ever sold in county Mt. Vernon man cashes in on lottery

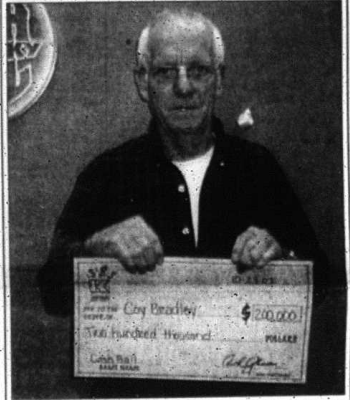
Coy Bradley, 63, of Mt. Vernon, recently became \$200,000 richer after winning Cash Ball from the Kentucky Lottery.

Supreme Court rules against pension increase

A pension provision, approved in the waning hours of the 2000 General Assembly, was struck down by a unanimous Kentucky Supreme Court last week.

The amendment, successfully added by Sen. Albert Robinson of London who, at the time, represented Rockcastle county in the state senate, would have nearly doubled the assumed salary upon which legislative pensions are based.

In their 6-0 ruling, justices called the provision "unintelligible" and "intentionally incompressible." Robinson, contacted at his Frankfort office Friday, continued to defend his actions.

"The Supreme Court's decision is unfortunate," Robinson said. "The

legislative action changed the wording of the statute to reflect cost of living adjustments in the legislators' assumed salaries for the purpose of retirement. These funds had already been paid into the retirement system. The assumed salary has not been changed since 1982. I believe then, as I do now, that the legislative action was reasonable."

Because legislators do not receive a salary -- they are paid each day spent on legislative business -- pensions are based upon an "assumed salary" which has been \$27,500 since 1982.

Robinson acknowledged the 72 percent jump appears large, but merely reflects, cost of living increases that have not been given to

legislators over the past 18 years.

The state he said, has been paying its share into the retirement system with a cost of living increase already figured in, so only future contributions would be based upon the larger assumed salary. "It cost the state no more," Robinson noted.

Legislators, however, have been basing their contributions on the 1982 amounts, Robinson said. The legislation also provided for continuing increases tied to the cost of living.

No benefits have been paid based upon the 2000 legislation, Robinson said.

Resolution of the two-year legal battle over the amendment is seen as

a victory for Attorney General Ben Chandler, the Democratic nominee for governor, who called the bill an example of "legislative greed" and often cited the case during his campaign against Republican nominee Ernie Fletcher.

Legislative watchdog groups, such as Common Cause of Kentucky, have opposed the bill because of the method in which it was approved, while noting there may be a need to use more realistic figures for benefits.

Robinson has consistently maintained that the amendment was not a last-minute attempt to sneak the pension increase into law, but had been on the table for discussion.

Thursday's Supreme Court decision upheld a July 2002 ruling by a

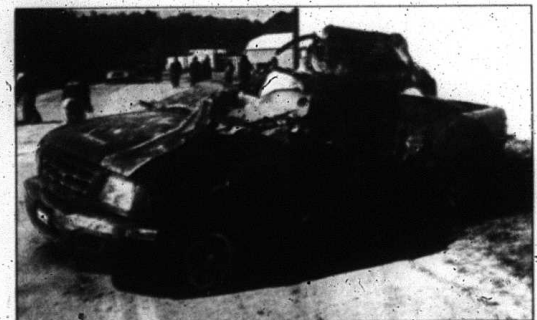
Court of Appeals.

Justice William Cooper wrote that the amendment violated a standard "designed" to prevent legislators from deliberately passing vaguely worded special interest - or self-interested - legislation and acting surprised when the true nature of the legislation comes to light.

Robinson's amendment stated, "Any accrual of benefits provided under this or any other applicable statute shall be no less than the benefit adjustment provided for in (state law) from the date of (the last establishment of that benefit)." Cooper said the legislature left it to the board of trustees of the retirement system to "guess at the intent

Are Immunizations Dangerous?

In recent years, there has been a clamor over the continued expansion of immunizations. Paralytic polio has occurred in some children or their family members and persons who have been blamed for brain damage. If rubella is given during pregnancy, it can potentially harm the baby. Unfortunately, virtually everything carries some risks, even something as safe as "baby shoes."

Parents fear of these complications reported by the media and it is easy to become alarmed. Unfortunately, today's parents are too young to remember when these diseases actually occurred, such as the polio epidemics of the 1950's or the measles epidemics haunting us into the 1990's.

The vaccines have been so effective, that most of today's doctors have never seen cases of polio, diphtheria, measles or lockjaw, much less small pox.

The risk of complications from immunizations is about 1-3 per million doses, so we can't ignore that there is some risk every time a person gets an immunization. Drug companies are developing low reactive vaccines, but there may always be some risk.

The countries, such as Great Britain, Finland and Japan, which have become lax with immunizations because of fear of these risks have all had outbreaks of these illnesses causing much greater harm than the side effects of the shots.

In comparison to the rare complications from shots, about 1000 young children die and many more are seriously injured each year in house fires caused by cigarettes. Having a parent who smokes is a much greater risk to a child than immunization.

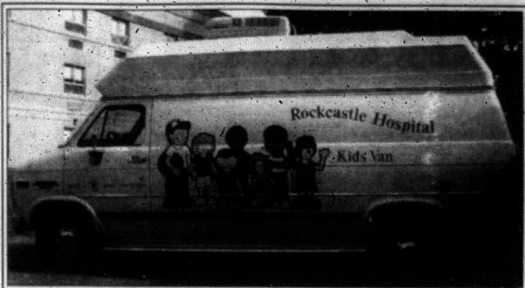

"We were very surprised and excited when the Crusade director offered us the van," Linda Gregory, director of speech therapy, said. "We jumped at the opportunity to enhance the delivery of pediatric services by gaining the mobility which the van offers."
Now it is used primarily for home therapy visits conducted by the Rehabilitation Department for approved home health pediatric patients and First Step Patients. First Step is a federally funded program for children up to three years old that allows in-home evaluation and treatment.
The van has become a therapy room on wheels and includes a wheelchair lift to ease the entry and exit for many patients. With ample storage space, it has cut down on the time and burden of hospital staff, who now don't have to load heavy equipment in and out of cars between every session.
"Receiving this van has made one of our dreams come true," Gregory said. "Not only is it convenient, but it can provide a quiet, controlled atmosphere that is conducive to good therapy sessions."
Rockcastle Hospital's Rehabilitation Department includes physical, occupational and speech therapy for adults and children. Services are provided to inpatients, outpatients and Home Health patients. For information about rehabilitation services, call 606-256-2195.

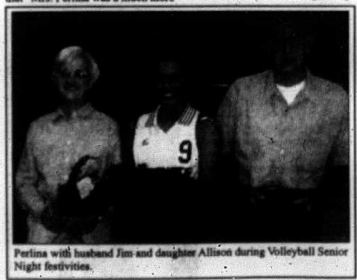

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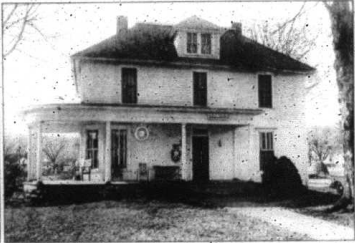

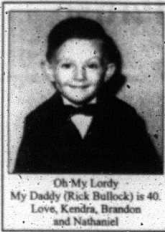

The parents, family members and friends of the cadets who came out to support the Rockcastle teams on Saturday are very much appreciated.

The group left school Friday, October 31st, anticipating cold weather for the weekend Friday night was freezing but the rest of the weekend was beautiful. Upon arrival, the group immediately set up their pup tents and cook tent. Team captains were called to a briefing while the other cadets gathered plenty of firewood for the weekend.

Upon their return, three teams of eight were required to be at their first event, The Mystery Event. Each cadet had to run, jump and grab a rope as high as possible and swing their

bodies across a 10 foot trench, filled with freezing, muddy water for the best team time. All but two ended up in the water, so, immediately, they started their weekend with muddy, wet BDU's, most of which had to be dried around the campfire over makeshift clothes dryers (sticks). The teams also completed in a map reading contest Friday evening before chow. Afterward, everyone grilled their own hotdogs for supper with all the extras.

The following morning began with a 5 a.m. wake-up. After breakfast, team leaders checked their members to ensure everyone had the required gear which included a full canteen.

The team marched off at 6:45 a.m. to the first event of the day, Cross Country Rescue, a grueling event that would test a grown-man's physical endurance. But these cadets ran, jumped and crawled under and over obstacles, all the while carrying a litter, a five-gallon water can and sand bags and ammo crates full of rocks. At no time can any item touch the ground, except while the team negotiates a 30-foot low crawl under wire in mud. The team must also negotiate a five-foot log wall. This event really pushes the team's endurance.

The next event was the one-rope bridge. Most of the team's training time has gone into perfecting the knots and teamwork necessary to be competitive in this event. On the signal from the judge, the team burst into frantic activity. This year's event was over a ten foot gully of muddy water.

Immediately following the one-rope bridge competition, the teams headed to chow then on to the obstacle course. Individual stations are a five-foot wall, a rolling log, a tunnel, two log jumps, island hopper,

another wall, rope climb, another tunnel, low crawl under wire, inverted well, inverted balance beam, hand over hand across a pipe, an eight foot wall and rolling balance beams.

The next event was the Army Physical Fitness Test. This test measures strength, endurance and speed. Members perform the maximum amount of push-ups they can in two minutes, followed by the maximum number of sit-ups in two minutes, followed by a two-mile run. The teams push everything they have into this event. The last event consisted of three four-man teams to run four miles cross-country. This was an extremely exhausting event but the Rockcastle teams did themselves proud.

Even though the Rockcastle team didn't win any trophies, they had a great weekend, followed by their annual stop at Cumberland Falls before returning home.

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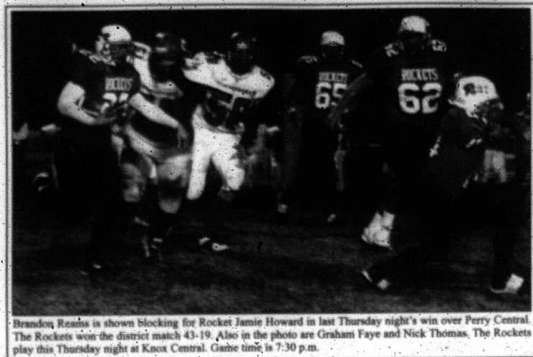

Celebrates All-Time Best Record

Rockcastle's Elementary Girls' Cross-Country Team places fourth at State Championships

Rockcastle's elementary cross-country teams recently competed in the KTCCA State Championships held at Cave Lake Park in Wayne County. More than four hundred elementary runners from across the state were present for the annual competition.

Rockcastle's elementary girls' team has been the most consistent elementary team in the state over the past three years of the event. During the first year of the state meet, Rockcastle's girls' placed 3rd. Last season, they finished as state runner-up, missing the state title by only two points. This season, they hoped for another great finish, despite the loss of their best runner, number one ranked Laura Dollins, who moved to Madison Southern this year. The team put together a tremendous group effort and finished 4th overall in a very exciting race that featured 220 runners. 3rd grader Michaela Hunter solidified her position as the best 4th grade and under elementary runner in the state with an electrifying 8th place finish in 13:02.63. 5th grader Sara Hammond was close behind with a terrific performance of her own. Sara placed 15th overall in 13:24.68. 6th grader Bethany Clontz ran one of her best races ever and finished 27th overall in 13:41.45. 6th grader Kristen Baker stayed close to the rest of the pack and finished a great race in 30th place with an exceptional effort of 13:49.2. 5th grader Kristen Bullock ran perhaps the most courageous race of any competitor. Competing with a sprained ankle, Kristen fought her way through the 1.8-mile course with an excellent time of 14:47.4 and a 2nd place finish. 5th grader Jasmine Johnson also ran her best race of the

Kayla Hayes led the way for RCHS with a solid 2nd place performance and a time of 21:13.86. Jessi Asher also had a great race and finished 12th overall in 23:20.86. Elizabeth Bassell ran well despite recovering from an illness. She finished 21st overall in 25:13.05. 8th grader Courtney Bullock decided to skip an opportunity to compete in the

middle school state championships in order to better prepare herself for the regional meet. She ran an exceptional race, finishing 27th overall in 26:28.85. Courtney has also been under the weather, but ran an efficient race nonetheless. Ashley Bullock also ran very well, placing 30th in 27:14.66.

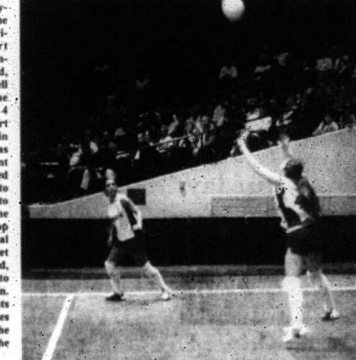
Three named to 13th Region All Stars

Sign-up for 2004 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program
Warden Alexander, County Executive Director of Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency, informs producers that enrollment for the 2004 Direct and Counter-Cyclical program (DCCP) began October 1, 2003, beginning the second year of successful implementation of the 2002 Farm Bill.
Producers must sign contracts annually under the DCCP, which is a change from Production Flexibility Contract requirements under previous farm legislation.
Producers have until June 1, 2004 to enroll for the 2004 DCCP. Late-filed applications will be accepted through September 30, 2004, if accompanied by a \$100 late fee. Producers may opt out of participating in the program any time if they choose. For both the 2002 and 2003 years, more than 98 percent of the eligible base was enrolled.
The 2002 Farm Bill authorizes direct and counter-cyclical payments to enrolled producers. Both payments are computed, using the base acres and payment yields established for each farm. Producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. Counter-cyclical payment rates, on the other hand, vary depending on market prices. Counter-cyclical payments are issued only when the effective price (which takes into account the direct payment rate, market price and loan rate) for a crop is below the target price for the commodity. For "other cultures," because of the existing loan rate, the minimum counter-cyclical payment rate is zero.
The following is the schedule of payments for the 2004 DCCP:
-Beginning December, 2003 - 50 percent advance direct payment.
-October 2004 - 50 percent final direct payment.
-October 2004 - first advance counter-cyclical payment (up to 35 percent of projected payment).
-February 2005 - second advance counter-cyclical payment (up to 70% of project payment less first advance).
-Dates vary by crop. In general, 30 days following the end of the marketing year. Final counter-cyclical payment (100 percent of actual payment, less any advances received).
2004 Burley Tobacco Penalty Rate

house operators for marketing excess tobacco during the 2003-2004 marketing year.
Section 314 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended, requires that USDA collect these penalties. The penalty rate is 75 percent of the average market price for that kind of tobacco for the previous marketing year. This statutory provision applies to every kind of tobacco subject to marketing quotas. When the average market price for each kind of tobacco are determined and announced, the penalty rates are then calculated.
For the 2003-2004 Marketing Year Burley Tobacco (type 311) rate of penalty is \$1.48 per pound.
2003 Burley Tobacco Grade Loan Rates
The US Department of Agriculture Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) has announced grade loan rates for the 2003 crop of burley tobacco, based on the price support level of \$1.849 per pound.
The 2003 crop grade loan rates range from \$0.85 to \$2.08 per pound for the 2003 crop. For the 2003 crop, the price support was \$1.835 per pound and the loan rates ranged from \$0.85 to \$2.08 per pound. The Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association and the Burley Stabilization Corporation will deduct one cent per pound from the grade loan rates for administrative overhead costs.
CCC will not provide loans on burley tobacco graded non-descript second quality light to medium color (N2L), non-descript second quality medium to dark color (N2S), non-descript second quality crude grade (N2G), no grade (No-G), doubtful keeping order (W) and unsorted (C) or scrap.

Burley Tobacco Opening/Delivery Dates Announced
Burley auction warehouses are scheduled to begin opening on November 17, 2003.
