## E.J.'s Journal

"May I have your attention, please?" All customers are to bring their purchases to the checkout immediately. The store will be closing in approximately fifteen minutes. President John F. Kennedy has been killed by assassination in Dallas, Texas."

This was the harsh reality that blared from the speaker system of the Ben Franklin's Five and Ten Cent Store where I shopped with my Mom and Grandma that fall day forty years ago this past week. I wasn't even in school yet, but I could sense that something very bad had happened.

Little did I know that it was not only the end of "Camelot" but it was the end of the innocence in America. That was the day that marked the radical change that seems commonplace today. America isn't shocked by anything, anymore. Our conscience has been seared to the point that even as horrific and tragic as the World Trade Center attack was, it wasn't as shocking as the death of John F. Kennedy. You would have had to experience life "ante-assassination" to know the difference. I've witnessed both events and can compare them.

November twenty-second, nineteen sixty-three was a day that I'll never forget. It was cool and rainy, and thick dark clouds hung over Kentucky as soon it would have done all America, Mom, Grandma, and I had a day of shopping ahead, and were being chauffeured by my uncle. We stopped at Mrs. Fry's Beauty Shop in London at about six o'clock and had a makeover, and then went on to Corbin to shop. We had already gone to one or more stores before ending

up at the Five and Dime where we heard the tragic news. This was the pre-Wal-Mart era.

We hurriedly checked out and took our merchandise to the car where my uncle was waiting. We told him what we had heard, and he turned on the car's radio. The broadcast stayed on until we got back home at London, where we found my Grandma already watching the news on TV. This was the same Grandma whose ancestors invited the Democratic Party, so this made it even worse on our family.

The assassination was the only topic of conversation wherever you went for several weeks. I was almost five years old and was doing a lot of, thinking but nobody was interested in a child's opinion at a time like this. I was remembering all of those political rally speeches and State-of-the-Union addresses, and others that JFK had given which are now a piece of history. I thought he was just about the most kind and uninteresting person alive. I couldn't understand anything he was discussing. (I still have problems understanding what the Presidents are discussing.) Second to JFK in being dull was Walter Cronkite who I had to listen to every night at six-thirty with the evening news. "And that's the way it is."

During the three days just before the funeral this nation came to a virtual standstill in respect for the President. The whole nation was in shock and grief. The day of the funeral finally came. Our whole family gathered at my grandparent's house to watch a black-and-white TV in the living room projecting the images that are indelibly marked on

## Preventing Migraines

Migraines can be prevented in two ways. The first is to avoid the foods, stresses and changes in life that can trigger the headaches. The other is to use a medicine prophylactically to decrease the frequency and severity of the attacks.

Foods that should be avoided include cheeses, red wines, cured meats, pickled food, alcohol and caffeine. Food additives such as nitrates and monosodium glutamate (MSG) should also be avoided. Stresses in life, irregular dietary habits and lack of sleep or even excessive sleep can trigger migraines. A person should strive to maintain a regular routine; meals and sleep patterns should be kept consistent.

Medicines can be very useful in treating migraines. They can be used prophylactically to prevent migraines, or started at the very first sign of a headache to abort the headache. When abortive medicines are used, it is very important to start them immediately at the onset of a migraine.

Prophylactic medicines have been very popular and there are many to choose from. They are usually started if the frequency of the headaches and their effect on your daily life warrant their use.

Propranolol is a blood pressure medicine that is often the first choice. It is safe and can be taken once a day. Another category of blood pressure medicines, called the calcium channel blockers, provide useful prophylactic medicines.

There are also several other choices for migraine prophylaxis. If migraines affect your life, it may be time to discuss it with your doctor.

# 4H Speech Contest

The Rockcastle County 4H Council will hold their annual speech contest at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, December 2, 2003, at Mt. Vernon Elementary School. Just as last year, the contest will be held as a joint project with the school. Through 4H, winning speakers will have the opportunity to advance to area and state competition.

Any boy or girl, age 9-19, may participate in the 4H Talk Meet Program. (The participant does not presently have to be enrolled in a 4H club.) The top speeches from each grade will compete against other youth of their own age category and not necessarily against their grade. The age category is determined by their age as of January 1, 2004.

4H'ers cannot use the same speech this year in the county speech contest if he or she won with that speech at the county, area, or state level last year. Junior age categories are 9, 10, 11, 12, and 13, and talks are to be 3 to 5 minutes long. Senior age

categories are 14, 15, and 16-19 and talks are to be 5 to 7 minutes long.

## Keeping Holiday Foods Safe

Food safety becomes increasingly important around the holidays because we often prepare larger meals, leave food out of the refrigerator longer, and can overload the refrigerator.

Never thaw a turkey or other frozen meat on the countertop. The preferred method is to thaw it in the original wrapping on a tray in a refrigerator set at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or lower. When thawing a large piece of meat or poultry, allow 24 hours for each five pounds. So you'll need to plan ahead if you have a big turkey or ham.

Do not cook a turkey overnight in an oven set at less than 200 degrees F, because it takes too long to kill disease-causing bacteria that may be present in the center of the bird. Instead, cook turkey, or any

other meat, no longer than 325 degrees F.

Use a meat thermometer to be sure meat dishes are thoroughly cooked. The thermometer should reach 180 degrees F on a whole turkey, and 170 degrees F for turkey parts or a breast. A ham should cook to a minimum internal temperature of 165 degrees F, or of lamb, to 160 degrees F.

It's best to bake stuffing separately in a casserole dish for uniform doneness and safety. Place a food thermometer in the center to be sure stuffing reaches a safe internal temperature of 165 degrees F.

If you do decide to cook stuffing inside the turkey, remember the stuffed bird will take longer to properly cook than one that's not stuffed. Use a food thermometer to check the internal temperature of the turkey and the stuffing.

Open mail-order food gifts

immediately and read the storage and handling instructions. Perishable meat products should be partially frozen, chilled, cold to the touch. If a food gift is labeled "Keep Refrigerated," it must be stored at a temperature of 40 degrees F or below to prevent growth of any bacteria that may be present.

Putting leftovers away probably is the last thing you want to do after eating a big holiday dinner. However, if turkey and trimmings and other perishable foods are left at room temperature for more than two hours, harmful bacteria can rapidly multiply to levels that can cause foodborne illness.

Remove meat from the carcass or bone and cut it into small pieces to allow it to cool quickly in the refrigerator. Put leftover foods in small aluminum foil packages, so they will cook quickly when refrigerated.

Putting too many large containers in the refrigerator can overload its cooling capacity,

resulting in an unsafe temperature. If you're traveling with food, remember to keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold.

It's not safe to travel with a stuffed turkey or warm stuffing. Remove stuffing and put it in small, shallow containers that will chill quickly.

Place all perishable foods in a pre-chilled, insulated cooler with a cold source such as ice or frozen gel packs.

Immediately transfer foods to a refrigerator when you reach your destination. Reheat foods in an oven set at 325 degrees F, or a microwave oven, until they reach an internal temperature of 165 degrees R, or are steaming hot.

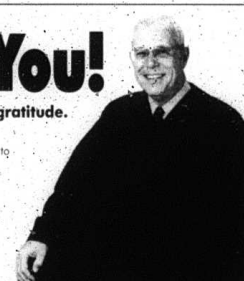

# Department for Public Health urges people to get Flu Shots

Kentucky's flu season is underway, with the state Public Health Laboratory confirming the first two positive influenza cultures yesterday. Last year, the first flu case wasn't confirmed until late January.  
The Department for Public Health reported the results to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), which has warned that the flu season may be more severe this year due to the early circulation of a group of influenza viruses that has in previous years caused a lot of people to become ill and to develop complications. The disease kills an average of 36,000 Americans every year.

Public Health Commissioner Dr. Rice Leach urges physicians, hospitals, public health departments, and other sponsoring influenza immunizations to make a special effort to see that Kentucky's senior citizens and other persons at high-risk of complication from influenza get protected against flu. He is also encouraging flu shots for Kentuckians 50 and over and children who are 6 months through age 23 months.  
"It's not too late to get a flu shot to protect yourself and your family from getting sick this year," Dr. Leach said. "It takes about two weeks to develop maximum protection after a flu shot, so we urge people not to delay."

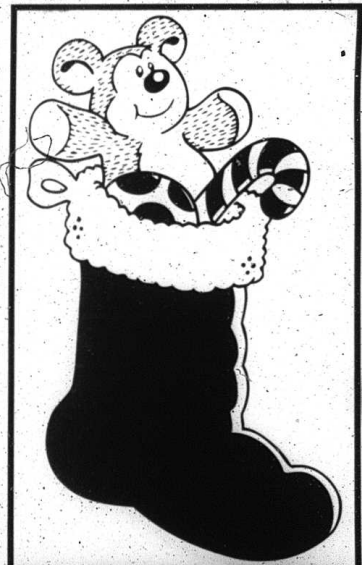
The vaccine is safe and effective, and because the vaccine is made with killed virus it will not give you the flu.  
An annual flu shot is recommended for the following groups of people who are at increased risk for serious complications from the flu:  
\* persons 50 years old and older;  
\* residents of nursing homes and other long-term care facilities that

bring a covered dish, meat and drink will be provided.  
The meal will be followed by the Christmas Tree Lighting and Christmas Caroling.  
Come out for a night of good, clean, family fun and lots of good friendly community fellowship.

house persons of any age who have long-term illnesses;  
\* adults and children over 6 months of age who have chronic heart or lung conditions, including asthma;  
\* adults and children over 6 months of age who need regular medical care or had to be in a hospital because of metabolic diseases (like diabetes), chronic kidney disease, or weakened immune system (including immune system problems caused by medicine or by infection with human immunodeficiency virus [HIV/AIDS]);

\* children and teenagers (aged 6 months to 18 years) who are on long-term aspirin therapy and therefore could develop Reye Syndrome after the flu;  
\* women who will be more than 3 months pregnant during the flu season; and  
\* health-care personnel, and care givers and household contacts of those who are high risk.  
\* Because young, otherwise healthy children are at increased risk for influenza-related hospitalization, influenza vaccination of healthy children aged 6-23 months is encouraged when feasible.

Those in the high-risk categories should ask their health care provider about getting a flu shot soon.

## In Memory



The following was written by Leola Allen Huffman in memory of her mother, Gertrude Allen of Mt. Vernon. It was printed in the Dryden Rd. Church bulletin.

We always called our parents, "Mommy" and "Daddy" and still do. They raised six children in the hills of Kentucky when times were rough. Daddy worked on the railroad for many years and was home only on weekends. Therefore, Mommy had most of the responsibility of raising us alone. Mommy got saved when she was a young girl and always relied totally on the Lord. I believe that every waking hour my Mother lived; her first priority was to live in a way pleasing to the Lord. She weighed every word she spoke.

I can remember times when someone would say something or make a remark that wasn't too nice (we had lots of non-Christian relatives), we would say, "Mommy, why don't you tell them off!" She would always say, "Children, it's not in me." She was a true saint and we, even as children, were constantly amazed at her purity.

When a preacher would come into the country to hold a revival they would always stay at our house. We

had little material, but Mommy and Daddy made sure they got the best we had, especially the most private room, so he could pray and rest.

Mommy worked so hard, cooking, cleaning, gardening, canning and sewing. I can see her sitting at her old Singer sewing machine. A long lock of hair fallen over the side of her face with her foot working the pedal. We could hardly wait for the finished masterpiece. We'd be so proud of our little, four sack dresses with bright colored ric-rac trim. And, of course, they were holiness dresses!

Everyone who knew her marveled at her. And she left a lasting impression on them with her hospitality, sincerity, kindness, gentleness, patience, compassion and love. She had such a sweet and quiet spirit but, yet so powerful. She certainly had a hot line to heaven.

When my brother Ralph was younger, he did some drinking (I'm sorry, Ralph). There was a VFW Club somewhere they're called in the area.

Rockcastle County is a dry county, but they were allowed to serve beer in this place. Mommy had seen Ralph's car parked there and she couldn't stand for her boy to be going into a beer joint. So, she started praying about it and asked the Lord to let it burn down without anyone getting hurt. Two weeks later, it burned to the ground, nobody was hurt! Today, her boy is saved, has been for a long time and singing "God has saved her wandering boy." And, he's almost as sweet as Mommy.

In later years, when we'd all be home and gathered around, our conversations would always, and still do, go back to our childhood. One time we mentioned that as children playing barefoot in the fields and woods, how strange that we never even saw any snakes. Mommy said, "children, everyday when I turned you out to play, I first turned you over to the Lord." I think something in us all ways knew that our safekeeping was

due to the watchful eye of Mommy's "babysitter."

Many years went by with her health continually declining. My sister, Carleen, went home for a visit during a time when she had been having mini strokes. She would often cry out in pain. Carleen heard her in her bedroom -- thinking she was in pain, she ran to her. Mommy was lying on her bed singing, "I am blessed, I am blessed, every day that I live, I am blessed!" She patted her chest and told Carleen, "Honey, the joy of the Lord is in there and just has to come out."

As her health worsened, she talked more and more about wanting to go home. Her body was failing and her vision growing dim, but her spirit and her hope and faith in God's promises never diminished.

Ralph lives next door to them and he said that anytime he would come in after dark, he could see Mommy, through the large bay window, sitting on the couch holding her big magnifying glass up to her eyes, reading her Bible.

She always told us she wanted "Zions Hill" sung at her funeral. We had Mommy's funeral June 21, 1999. What a beautiful home-going day. An unusual thing happened. When the last song was sung, her six children sitting on the front row with Daddy simultaneously joined in singing "Zions Hill."

Someday there'll be a glad tomorrow. Where gates of pearl swing open wide. And when I cross this veil of sorrow. I'll camp upon the other side!

Oh how blessed we, her children were and are, that God would give to us a most wonderful, beautiful lady, Gertrude Davidson Allen, to be our Mother. This precious virtuous woman. Her price far above rubies.

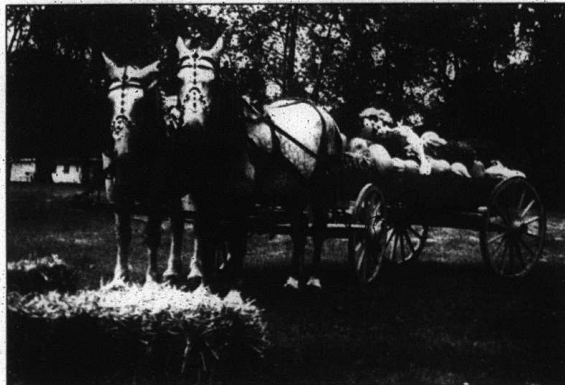

## Agricultural News

By Warden Alexander, FSA Director

### December 1st deadline to vote

Rockcastle County Committee election ballots were mailed to producers for voting in LAA #2 on November 18, 2003. Warden Alexander, CED for Rockcastle County, today reminds all farmers that December 1, 2003 is the deadline to return voted ballots to FSA.

Producers who wish to vote and did not receive a ballot may request a ballot from the FSA office.

Voters are farmers located in the Rockcastle County area of LAA #2 which is the southeastern area of Rockcastle County bounded by Pulaski and Laurel County. Highway boundaries are Hwy 70, Hwy 150 and Hwy 25.

The county committees are a direct link between FSA and the agricultural community in which they serve. All eligible producers are strongly encouraged to participate in the election process and cast their vote by December 1, 2003.

Marketers who have sold all tobacco for the current year are reminded to return the marketing card back to the FSA office immediately. A card is a barley referendum year and cards are needed in the county office as sales are final. Also, this avoids producers misplacing the card.

Remember, when returning the marketing card, if you are a producer who has purchased a tobacco quota in the past 3 years you must furnish the FSA office a sales bill reflecting the monies allocated to each producer along with any expenses (fertilizer, lime, chemicals, etc.).

**Warehouse designation**  
As a condition of price support for burley tobacco producers are required to inform FSA of the warehouse where they will market tobacco. This is required by completing the form FSA 808, Warehouse Designation, to indicate where the tobacco will be sold. Initial designation ended August 1st.

After the initial designation period ends producers will be limited to designate for the farm to any one day during the following regular re-designation period: December 1 - December 5, 2003 with the marketing card being effective December 1, 2003.

The warehouse number will be indicated with a number on the marketing card. Therefore, if a producer decides to market at a warehouse other than the one specified on the card, the producer must return the card to the FSA office in a specific time period to request another marketing card.

FSA has a listing for public notice of warehouses, receiving stations and dealers posted on the bulletin board in the county office available through March 31st.

**Sign-up for 2004 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program**  
Warden Alexander, County Executive Director, of Rockcastle County Farm Service Agency wishes to inform producers that the enrollment for the 2004 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) begins October 1, 2003 beginning the second year of successful implementation of the 2002 Farm Bill.

Producers must sign DCP contracts annually, beginning with the 2003 crop year, which is a change from production flexibility contract requirements under the previous farm legislation.

Producers have until June 1, 2004 to enroll for the 2004 DCP. Producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. Counter-cyclical payment rates, on the other hand, vary depending on market prices.

For sign-up and payment dates contact FSA.

**Farm changes**  
Producers who have purchased or sold land should inform the FSA office of the change. A copy of the deed or land contract sales is required to

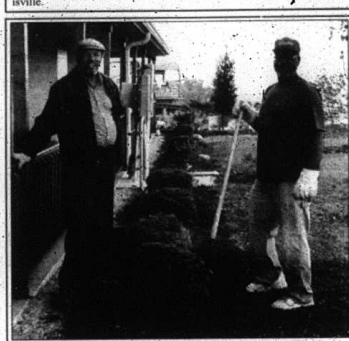

## Reducing the risk of Hepatitis A through proper handling of produce

Kentucky public health officials continue to closely monitor a recent hepatitis A outbreak, which appears to be associated with eating raw or lightly cooked green onions (scallions) in at least two commercial restaurant chains located in Pennsylvania.

In light of these recent outbreaks, the Kentucky Department for Public Health's Food Safety Branch is taking every opportunity to provide consumers with some general information regarding hepatitis A and guidelines for ensuring the safety of raw produce and vegetables prepared at home or consumed in the restaurant setting.

Hepatitis A is a liver disease that usually develops within six weeks of an exposure. In healthy individuals, Hepatitis A is a usually mild disease characterized by jaundice (yellow discoloration of the skin), fatigue, abdominal pain, loss of appetite, nausea, diarrhea, and fever.

Those with a compromised immune system, including the elderly, young children, pregnant women, organ transplant recipients, and individuals taking medications may be at risk of experiencing more severe symptoms.

The disease is typically spread by an infected person who does not properly wash his or her hands before handling ready-to-eat foods, such as fruits and vegetables. Hepatitis A and other food borne illnesses can also be spread by fruits/veg. vegetables that have come in contact with contaminated water or soil.

Because of the high temperatures involved, properly cooked foods are of less risk in the transmission of hepatitis A. Cooking minimizes the risk of illness by reducing or eliminating the virus or other pathogens. Contaminated foods that do not undergo cooking, or those that are lightly cooked, such as fruits and vegetables, are often at greater risk of transmitting hepatitis A.

It's important to remember Mother Nature designed these foods," said Anita Trice, manager of the Food Safety Branch. "These are foods that are typically grown outdoors and, in the case of produce, in the soil."

Consequently, "this environment offers an ideal setting for contamination by a number of foodborne pathogens, including hepatitis A."

Additionally, given the globalization of our food supply, long-distance transportation offers another avenue for possible product contamination, Travis said.

The Food Safety Branch offers the following suggestions for minimizing microbial contamination on fresh fruits and vegetables:

- Consumers should thoroughly scrub and rinse the outside of all produce items, before cutting or slicing. In the case of lettuce and other leafy produce items, the outer leaves should be discarded. Remember, particularly if the food will also be cooked, the combination of scrubbing and water under pressure will reduce the number of pathogens that might be on the product.

- Proper hand washing remains one of the most effective tools in the prevention of foodborne illness. Food contamination by unclean hands is a common cause of foodborne illness. Persons preparing food should always thoroughly wash their hands (brisk scrubbing and rinsing for at least 20 seconds under warm water) before preparing ready-to-eat foods, including fruits and vegetables. Hands should be washed after using the restroom, after handling uncooked meat, poultry or fish, and after any other activity that contaminates the hands.

- If stored in the refrigerator, fresh fruits and vegetables should be stored in a manner that prevents contamination from the juices of raw meat, poultry and fish. Cleaned fruits and vegetables should not be stored with fruits and vegetables that have not been washed.

- Produce should not be cut on the same cutting board or cutting surfaces as raw meat, poultry or fish. A separate cutting board, or surface should be used for clean, rinsed fresh fruits and vegetables.

- Persons who are experiencing symptoms that could be hepatitis A should consult their health care provider or their local health department.

The word of truth is what we really need, to bring about spiritual health, sound doctrine. The word sound means, whole, healthy. I want the truth that will make me whole and healthy. I know sometimes medicine tastes bad and applying medicine to a wound, makes it sting, but it's the only kind that will help.

4. Unpaid taxes or liens of record at the time of entry of judgment shall be paid out of the proceeds of the sale.

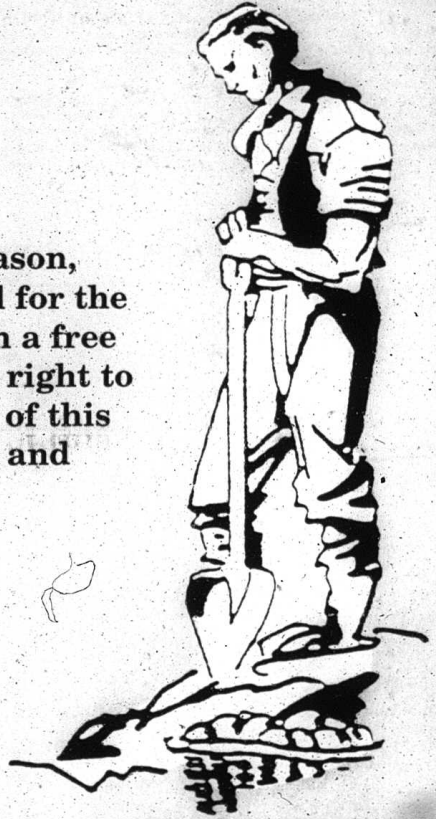
