

Rockcastle River anglers asked to release fish in study

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR), in conjunction with Eastern Kentucky University (EKU), has begun a walleye radio telemetry study in the Rockcastle River.

a watteye ranto tetemerty study in the Rockcastle River.

The telemetry study is being funded by KDFWR and conducted by Dr. Stanley Harrel at EKU. Obscituses of the study are to obtain movement patterns of the native walleye withinthe river and walleye stocked in Lake Cumberland and determine if there is interbreeding of Rockcastle River walleye, with Lake cumberland walleye.

The remnant Rock-castle river walleye may be identified as a native Kentucky walleye and is genetically distinct from walleye stocked in Lake Cumberland, Biologists have implanted several

Reducing the risk of Hepatitis A through proper handling of produce

Kentucky public health officials continue to closely monitor a recent hepatitis A outbreak, which appears to be associated with equify raw or lightly cooked green onions (scal-lions) in at least two commercial re-taurant chains located in Pennsylva-nia

nia In light of these recent outbreaks, the Kentucky Department for Public Health's Food Safety Branch is taking this opportunity to provide consumers with some general information regarding hepstitis A and guid-lines for ensuring the safety of raw produce and vegetables repeared at home or consumed in the restaurant setting.

In Bealthy individuals, Hepatitis A is a usually mild disease characterized by jaundice (yellow discoloration of the skin), fatigue, abdominal pain, loss of appetite, radiumes system, including the other by the company of the six of

The disease is typically spread by
n infected person who does not
properly wash his or her hiands be-fore handling ready-to-eat-foods, such as fruits and vegetables. Hepa-titis A and other food borne illnesses can also be spread by fruits find veg-etables that have came in contact with contaminated water or soil.

eanies that have came in contact with contaminated water or soil.

Because of the high temperatures involved, properly cooked foods are of less rigk in the transmission of hepatitis A. Cooking minimizes the risk of illness by reducing or eliminating the virias or other pathogens.

Contaminated foods that do not undergo cooking, or those that are lightly cooked, such as fruits and vegit and the cooking of the food Safey Branch, These are foods that are typically grown outdoors and, in the case of produce, in the soil.

Additionally, given the globalization of our food supply, long-distance transportation offers another avenue for possible product contamination.

for possible product contamination, Travis said.

The Food Safety Branch offers the following suggestions for minimizing microbial contamination on fresh fruits and vegetables:

Consumers should thoroughly-scrib and rinse the outside of all physical back of the contamination on the forecast of the conditions of the content of the content of the food will not be cooked, the combination of sorubbing and

be discarded. Remember, particularly if the food will not be cooked, the combination of scrubbing and water under pressure will reduce the number of pathogens that might be on the product.

• Proque hand washing remains one of the most effective tools in the prevention, of foodborne illness. Food contamination by unclean hands is a common cause of foodborne illness. Persons preparing food should always thoroughly wash their hands, (brisk crubbing and rinsing for at least 20 seconds under warm water) before preparing ready-to-enfoods, including finitis and vegetables. • If stored in the refrigerator, fresh fruits and vegetables should be stored in a manner that prevents contamination from the judes of raw meat, poultry and fish. Cleaned fruits and vegetables should not be stored with fruits and vegetables that have not been washed.


