Carloftis said he could not rule on Carloftis said he could not rule on the matter since the Brodhead Vol-uniteer Fire Department was organized under the City of Brothead, a legal municipality, and the Brodhead Rurial Volunteer Fire Department (how Westeri Rockcastle Volunteer (free Department) was organized pussuant to KRS chapter 273 as a non-profife copporation and, as such, is not subject to a ruling by him on bound-ary lines.

The problem, basically, appears that under present boundary lines, the City of Brodhead only has responsibilty for fire protection of property within the city limits while Western Volunteer Fire Department has re-sponsibility for the area surrounding

the town.

This creates a problem for property owners such as Dee Bussell, who was at the meeting, who lives 3'4 mile from the railroad tracks in the

The City of Mt. Vernon has been sued again over alleged abuse by a former Mt. Vernon police officer.

Besides, the city, Sim Thacker, a former city police officer, was also named as a defendant in the suit, filed ittee and Wilma by local attorney Willis Coffey on (Cont. to A-10) behalf of Roger "Crow" Mink of Rt.

ATTENTION Parents of 5th Grade Students

The Kentucky Department of Education requires that any student entering the 6th grade must have a second physical and a current up-to-date immunization certificate.

The physical must be reported on the correct Kentucky Form for 6th grade entry. If the student is going to play any type of sports, he/she will also be required to have a physical documented on a Kentucky athletic form. The athletic physical will not be accepted as a 6th grade physical.

The immunization certificate must reflect all immunizations that the student has had. Students entering the 6th grade are required to have a second MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella), a Tetanus-Diphtheria (TD) booster, and the 3-doses of Hepatitis-B vaccine. The Hepatitis-B vaccine is given over a 4-6 months period. Therefore, the student should be taken as soon as possible to start this series.

These health forms must be presented the first day of school in order for the student to be enrolled at the Middle School. If your child receives these services before the end of the fifth grade, please send the forms to school so that they can be filed in his/her chart.

You are strongly urged to get this matter taken care of as soon as possible. Doctor offices will be extra busy during the summer. You may be unable to get an appointment if you wait too late.

Again, please be aware that students will not be enrolled at the Middle School without these forms. If you have any questions concerning these requirements, please call the school.

Your cooperation in providing these health records before your child enters the sixth grade will be greatly appreciated.

NOTICE **Rockcastle County** Schools Plan For Inclement Weather **School Closings Early Dismissal**

Every effort will be made to keep parents and concerned citizens informed as to school closings, early dismissals and possibly a delay plan.

The number one concern is the safety of students. After an extensive evaluation of road conditions in the county, taking into consideration all roads, a decision will be made in regard to closing

School closings will be announced on radio stations and three television stations. They are as follows: Radio - WRVK (AM 1460), WVLK (FM 93), WBUL (FM 98.1), WMXL (FM 94.5), WLAP (630 AM), WRSL (FM 96.3), WLKT (FM 104.5) WKQQ (FM 100.1) WKDP (99.5). Television - WKYT (Channel 27), WLEX (Channel 18), WTVQ (Channel 36). If possible, the closing will be announced the evening before the closing date. If a determination cannot be made the day prior to the closing date, every possible effort will be made to reach a decision by 6:00 a.m. The announcement will be made no later than 6:30 a.m. This will be conducted the same for the delay plan, if it is concluded the delay plan would be the appropriate plan of action.

Early dismissal of school due to inclement weather will be announced on WRVK. Roads will be closely monitored as school is in session to determine if there is a need for early dismissal. If the need for early dismissal does occur, parents should make arrangements to meet children as they arrive safely.

Parents and students should not call any radio or television sta tions to inquire about school closings. This could delay the infor-mation distribution to the necessary channel by tying up the phone

There may be a time when a few isolated bus routes may not be made or may be delayed while the rest of the bus routes will be made on the regular schedule. These bus routes will be announced only on WRVK radio station.
