Plan ahead, be prepared, and drive safely. Have tires and tire pressure checked. The air pressure decreases in colder weather. Depending on where you live and the amount of driving you do, snow three can provide better traction.



So, you got a nifty-weather station for Christmas, maybe an out-door/indoor thermometer, or maybe as ophisticated weather station that includes wind, precipitation, and other instruments. Maybe you need the statement of the sta

Weather spoiters provide the value able service to their communities that they can never be replaced by what-ever the latest and greatest technol-ogy advances that have been made. Weather spoiters provide the NWS with "ground-truth" reports that let us better interpret the images we see from weather satellite, radar, and computer images.

computer images.

As we enter the change of season that brings us into winter, weather spotters are needed to help us better serve our communities. Often, a win-

ter storm will begin as rain, then change to snow. Sometimes there will be a period of freezing rain pro-ducing a dangerous glaze on the roads, and posing a hazard to power lines. Sometimes, the weather ele-

roads, and possing a hazard to power learnest with the sometimes, the weather element will be determined by altitude, with snow in the higher levels, and arin in the valleys.

With timely reports on the actual weather conditions, we at the NWS are able to provide the public with an enhanced prediction as to what willcome. By being able to pinpoint an enhanced prediction as to what willcome. By being able to pinpoint ming to accumulate on tree branches, or if roads are becoming icy, then we are able to transmit a "big-picture" image of the storm, and its impact on community with greater accumer ande to Orannam and its impaction image of the storm, and its impaction regs. 


