# Fletcher's proposed budget would cost local school system \$170,000

poseu ouoge goes mo encet, and 1.3% pay raise for teachers and clas-sified personnel, would cost the Rockcastle County School System \$170,000 out of its general fund, School Finance Officer Richard Bray said Tugesday. However, Bray pointed out that the budget must still be sent to the House and Sentie and then come out of a budget conference committee. Bray said the dinn't expect the final draft to be as harsh on oducation as the proposal. "Hobby its tell me that they think the governor presented a bad" budget on purpose to enable him to get his final cuts through more easily." Bray added.

"Uncle Harry" was the son of Brighthering C. Chasteen (1819-1884) and Eliza Ann Branaman (1837-1882). His mother died wheir she was only 45 and Harrison Branaman reared him. He was married to Adeline. "Addie" Hatt (1881-1941). They had four children: Oma Gertrude, Eliza, William Herman and Herbert.





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
