School board discusses pre-school program

The Rockckastle County School Board will be looking to making changes in the pre-school program in the future.

At their regular monthly m Rebecca Isaacs, Director Title 1 Su-pervisor for the local school system recover issues, Director Title I Su-pervisor for the local school system presented the board with the findings of several studies indicating the ef-fect of pre-school on literacy. According to Issaes, fifteen per-ent of the county's fourth grade stu-dents are scoring below proficient in literacy.

She told the board that recent stud-s show that about sixty percent of the children who are proficient in letters at entry to kindergarten can read words in context at the end of the first grade. Twenty-one percent of chil-dren who are not proficient in letters; at entry to kindergarten can read words by that same time. Much of the sectent focus on this level of education can be attributed to President Bash's "No Child Left Behind' grogman and meeting flower footen mangales.

The board is researching opti for a long-term plan and does not an-ticipate making any kind of decision for quite some time.

The board also received a presen-

tation from Jeannine Parsons, the Director of Food Service. Parsons

informed the board that the food ser-vice department has been self-suffi vice department has been self-suffi-cient for quite some time. The board does not give any money to food ser-

vice.

In other business, the board approved a request from The Rockeastle County Area Technology Center to use the district's substitute teacher list. The Technology Center will reimburse the district for any teacher use.

Adams said he could tell by the way his vehicle was responding that he was going too fast, so he slowed down and lost sight of Newcomb except for intermittently seeing his taillights.

Adams stopped and thought he would have to run after the men on foot, but when he got to the vehicle. neither man was able to get out of the car.

Attnough no mention of alcohol as a contributing factor in the accident was listed in the Kentucky State Police (KSP) report, an open container of alcohol was seen in the front seat and several full beers were in the

Chris Lanham, spokesperson for the KSP, confirmed that alcohol did contribute. He added that a can of beer was found in Newcomb's front pocket also.

According to Lanham, Adams was operating with official authority. Although the investigation and reconstruction of the accident continues, he felt like Adams would be cleared of any wrongdoing.
